Student to build house

Twenty students from six western Wayne County school districts, including the Huron School District, are participants in the area vocational education cooperative - building a three-bedroom ranch type house. The school districts, which have each contributed \$5,000 to finance the construction of the house in an on-the-job student training program besides the Huron School District are Flat Rock, Airport, Gibraltar, Grosse Ile and Woodhaven.

The Huron students participating in the home building program are Jerry Block, Rocky Brannon, Randall Burke, Mark Davis, Kevin Krzyske and Eugene South. The construction is located at 27089 W. Huron River Dr., Flat Rock.

The students began the building training in October following basement excavation work performed by an area firm.

The walls, roof, doors and windows are up. The students are engaged in inside construction work. They work on the project Monday through Friday.

Earl Leicht, director of the Area Vocational Education Cooperative said the program provides actual experience in building. The house should be completed in April.

Anti-trust group probes houses

Officials from Washington representing the Anti-Trust Committee headed by Senator Philip A. Hart and the offices of Senator Robert P. Griffin and Congressman William D. Ford made on-the-spot investigations last week of residents' complaints involving two relatively new Romulus subdivisions.

The officials were given personal tours of the Meadowdale and Applewoode Subdivisions by leaders of a concerned citizens group residing in the subdivisions

which are under city-federal investigation.

They were invited by a resident-citizen group composed of Mrs. Joyce Palmer, Mrs. Joan Lee, Mrs. Jerry Kubiak and William Kemp. Mrs. Palmer said the Washington officials were "surprised and impressed" with what they saw and said "prompt construction action" would be taken.

Conferences with officials of the federal agencies and banks involved in the financing of homes in the subdivisions were initiated by the representatives.

The residents of the subdivisions have complained of vandalism, thefts and numerous violations of city codes and ordinances in the subdivisions, which are located in the vicinity of Eureka Road between Inkster and Middlebelt Roads.

They have made several appearances before the Romulus City Council and demanded action.

The council has requested a formal federal probe of the situation and also requested the inspection by federal officials.

Another meeting of city officials, department aides and representatives of Kaufman & Broad Homes Inc. of Southfield builder of the subdivisions and U.S. Department of Housing and Urban Development (HUD) is scheduled for 10 a.m. tomorrow at the Romulus City Hall.

The meeting will be held to hear progress reports on the settlement of residents' complaints and the responsibility for the maintenance and repairs to vandalized vacant houses.

At a recent meeting held in the home of Mr. and Mrs. Jerry Kubiak, 28490 Cherry St., Romulus, a residents committee were told more police protection and patrols will be made in the area. Two sheriff's department patrol cars have been in the area for longer periods of patrol duty. (Continued on Page 3)

At storage field

Explosion cause isn't determined

Investigators are awaiting the results of chemical laboratory tests to determine the cause of the explosions that ripped through a propane gas storage field in Romulus Wednesday.

Authorities evacuated hundreds of families from Romulus and Taylor around the storage field, which is on the corner of Ecorse and Inkster Roads. Firemen battled for two hours before the resulting fires were brought under control.

"We're waiting for word from the state fire marshal who is analyzing some of the equipment," said Inspector Dick Novak of the Wayne County Sheriff Department Monday.

"We can't foresee arson as the cause, because there were too many people around for someone to be sneaky," he added. "However, we can't rule arson out until we get the final analysis from the laboratory."

Hundreds of small propane gas tanks, the type which are used in house trailers, were blown apart. The tanks were being stored in a shed at the Propane Services, Inc. yard.

There was no available estimate on the loss in the fire. Several new tank trucks were destroyed as well as the loading dock area, the storage shed and an office area.

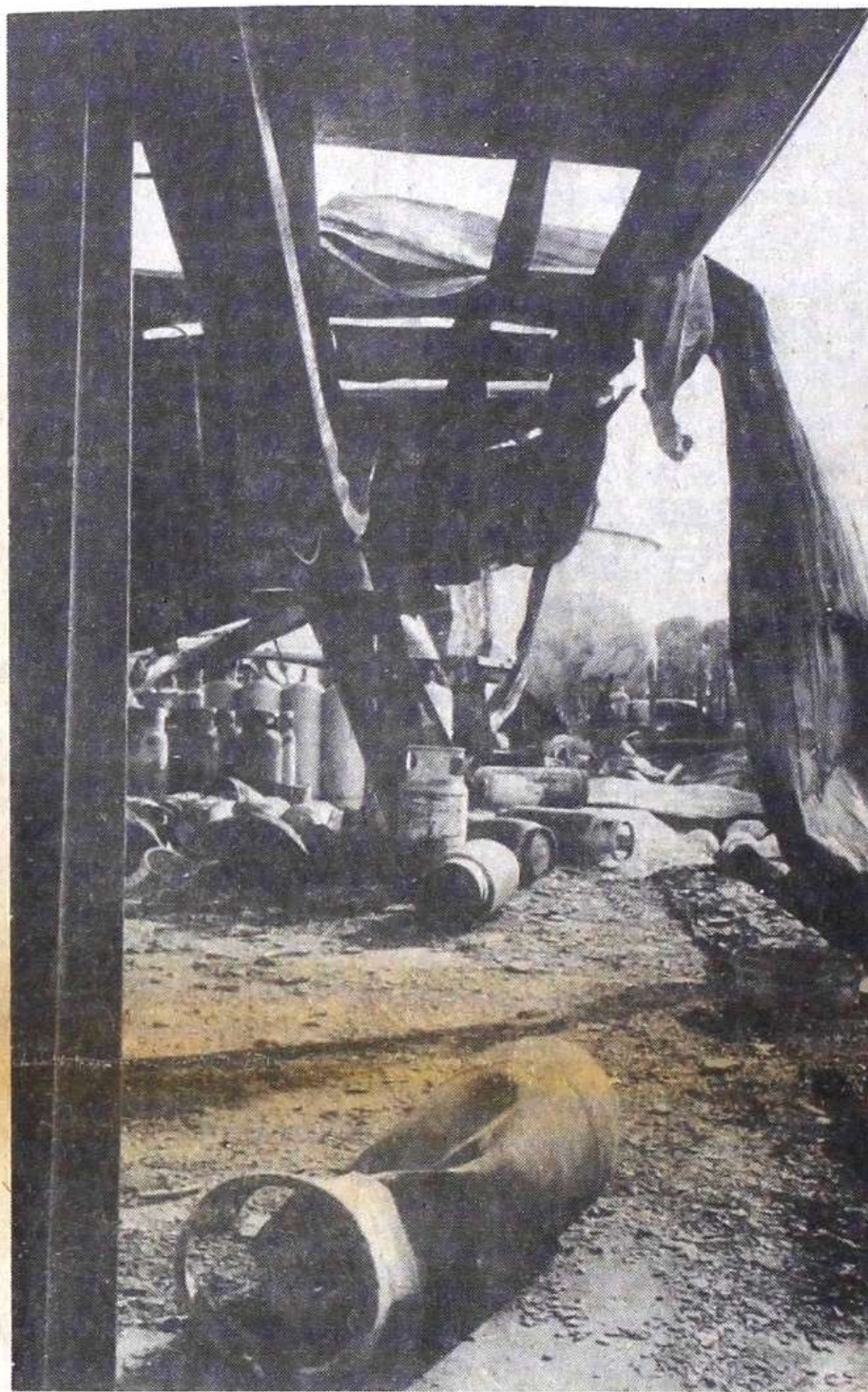
Wayne County Sheriff Department officials have speculated that the small tanks were set off by a carelessly thrown cigaret or some type of a spark.

The residents in a surrounding square mile area were evacuated because of the fear that a large 18,000-gallon tank might explode. The tank, which is used to fill the smaller portable tanks, is several hundred feet from where most of the explosions occurred.

"If it had gone up," said a workman, "You'd need more than the fire department. There wouldn't have been anything but a big hole in the ground."

Families were evacuated by sheriff deputies and Romulus and Taylor police. The "all clear" signal to return was given at 10:15 p.m., nearly an hour and a half after the first explosion.

Eight employees were reported working in the

storage area at the time of the explosions. One was injured. He was identified as David E. Copley of Taylor.

Copley was treated at Wayne County General Hospital.

A night foreman at the field, Charles Helka of Taylor, said the fire started in the storage shed.

"We got out of there and then the tanks started to blow," Helka said.

The propane field sits just north of Interstate-94 and about two miles northeast of Metropolitan Airport. Traffic on the expressway and the roads surrounding the field was blocked by police until 10:15 p.m.

Man's body found in trunk -- 'gangland' slaying victim

The body of an unidentified man was found in the trunk of a car at Detroit's Metropolitan Airport in Romulus Monday night.

Wayne County Sheriff deputies said the man had been shot several times. Deputies found the body after an anonymous woman telephone caller said she had seen a man killed and saw his body placed in the trunk of a car. She told deputies that the body was in a 1965 Buick Electra at the airport. The call came shortly after 8 p.m.

Wayne County Sheriff William Lucas said the man

was obviously the victim of a "gangland style" execution. He had been expertly tied and

gagged, the sheriff said. He was believed to be in his fifties.

Lucas said there was no identification immediately available. Police are checking the registration of the car.

The telephone tip was received at the Wayne County Road Patrol Station at 3100 Henry Ruff.

The trunk of an auto matching the description given by the tipster was pried open and the body was found.

Lucas said this was the third body found in the Metro Airport parking lots in the last year and a half.

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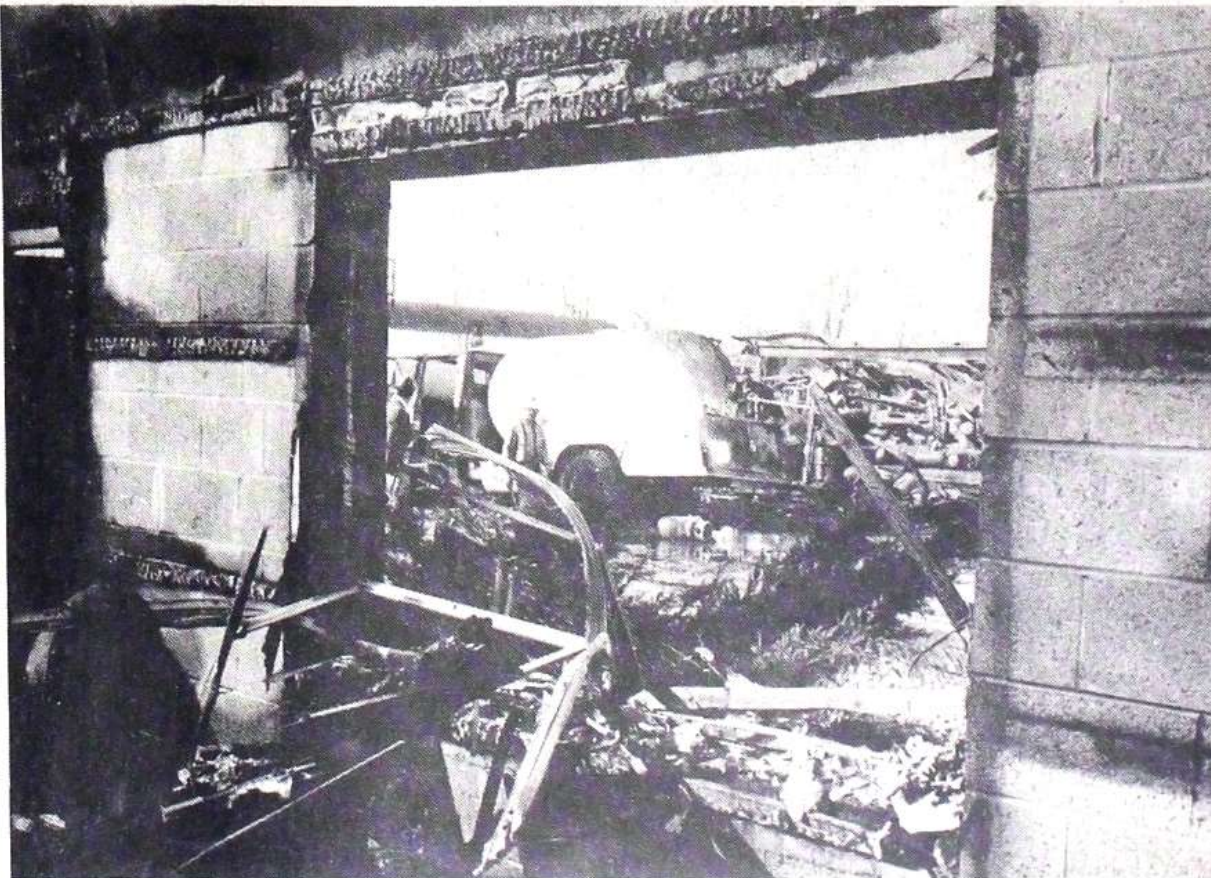

For automobile safety

Seatbelts are more effective than airbags

Voluntary wearing of car safety belts by drivers and passengers — not mandatory use of airbags — is called the most effective way to reduce traffic injuries and deaths, according to Automobile Club of Michigan.

"Airbags as we know them today are not ready for use as mandatory passive restraint systems on 1976 U.S. automobiles, as required by

Federal Government Standard 208," said Leonard R. Barnes, editor of Motor News magazine.

While seatbelts protect passengers in accidents involving rear and side collisions and rollovers, airbags protect only in head-on crashes, he added.

William B. Bachman, immediate past president of the

National AAA and Auto Club's first vice president, asked recently: "Why not spend a modest \$5 or \$10 million in a real attempt to educate people to use the lap and shoulder belts they are already paying for before we burden them with an individual bill of at least \$100 a car or a billion dollars a year for airbags that many are scared to death of, don't want, or will render inoperative."

Auto Club now has a "Safety Belt Convincer," a car seat on an angled, 15-foot platform which travels down an incline at seven miles an hour, with a belted human passenger. The jolt received when the seat hits a stopper bar at the end of the track convinces riders that seat belts are necessary.

The device is being demonstrated in parking lots of Auto Club offices across the state, at fairs and other public events, at shopping centers and to driver training classes at high schools, to help show motorists that safety belts are

necessary even in low-speed crashes.

"Current airbag fleet tests trumpeted by the government and some private companies as proving the reliability of airbags are not tests of passive restraint systems at all," Barnes said.

Each of those tests requires that seat belts be worn too, and there are a lot of other rules, constraints and cautions connected with the tests.

"A passive restraint system," Barnes said, "is one where those in a car do not have to do anything to be

protected in a collision. This is what Federal Government Standard 208 for 1976 cars requires."

If seatbelts are to be needed with airbags, the cost-benefit relationship of airbags must be re-examined, he added.

"When perfected," Barnes writes, "airbags could save lives and prevent injuries. But an August Motor News article revealed 17 known failures of airbags to inflate in tests, or if they did inflate, failed to protect."

Motor News raises several questions about the present effectiveness of airbags. Could rough roads inflate them

accidentally? What will happen, when an airbag inflates, to persons other than in upright, seatbelted, shoulder-harnesses positions, or to children standing on the floor in front? What about people wearing glasses?

Barnes also asks: "Is the sudden, powerful activation of an airbag a hazard to pregnant women? What about the noise level of airbag detonation? What happens if a man is smoking a pipe or a red-hot cigar? How long will

an airbag continue to be dependable after it has been in a car a year or more in extremes of heat and cold?

"If anybody knows the answers to those questions, they have been keeping them secret," Barnes comments.

Applications for Senior Citizens Homestead Tax Exemptions for 1973 are being taken at the city assessor's office in the Romulus Municipal Building, 11111 S. Wayne Rd., Romulus and at the clerk's office in Van Buren Township Hall, 46425 Tyler Rd., Belleville, it was announced Monday.

Persons who have not previously filed and will be 65 years old on or before Dec. 31, are eligible for tax exemption for 1973.

The applicants who previously filed will receive a letter the first part of January giving further instructions on their exemption affidavit.

New applicants must meet the following requirements:

1. Own homestead on or before tax day, Dec. 31, 1972.
2. Occupy homestead on tax day, Dec. 31, 1972.
3. Gross income of applicant and/or spouse and other joint owners may not exceed \$6,000 in the prior calendar year.
4. Resident of Michigan five (5) years of the last ten (10), and residing in Michigan six (6) months out of twelve (12) of the five (5) years.
5. Age sixty-five (65) years on or before tax day, Dec. 31, 1972.

Blood-screening tests set at PCHA facility

Free blood-screening tests to detect diabetes will be available here during the annual observance of Diabetes Week, Nov. 12-18, as part of the search for more than 102,000 "unknown" diabetics in Michigan.

The detection drive is sponsored by the Michigan Diabetes Association, a United Fund agency, in cooperation with Michigan hospitals, health departments and local medical societies.

The presence of diabetes may be indicated by excessive thirst, excessive urination, loss of weight, itching, constant hunger, easy tiring, slow healing of cuts and scratches and changes in vision.

Diabetes has become a major public health problem. While the total population rose about 35 percent between 1950 and 1970, the number of diagnosed diabetics rose by 115 percent.

In Michigan, diabetes is ranked as the fourth leading cause of death by disease, the second leading cause of blindness, and a major cause of heart attacks and kidney failure.

Results of last year's drive showed that of the 31,334 persons tested, 465 were new diabetics, 222 were potential diabetics and 57 had "low" blood sugar.

The tests will be available during the hours of 9 to 11 a.m. from Nov. 13 through Nov. 17.

Veteran exemption applications out

Veterans who have not filed previously may be eligible for tax exemption for 1973. They contact their respective office for an application.

Applicants who filed previously will receive a letter giving further instructions at a later date.

New Applicants must meet the following requirements:

1. All widows whose husbands were receiving pensions or compensation at the time of death must have Veterans Administration statement in order to obtain maximum benefit.
2. All Veterans with a service connected disability of 60 per cent or greater must have a Veterans Administration Form 20-5455 (Statement From Benefit Payment

Records) in order to receive the larger exemption.

3. Veterans may use Form 20-5455 (Statement From Benefit Payment Records) in lieu of Veterans Administration check as proof of disability.
4. The homestead exemption for disabled veterans with specially adapted housing covered under Act 179 granting total exemption has not changed.
5. Total value of homestead and other owned taxable real property in Michigan cannot be of a greater value than \$10,000 state equalized valuation.
6. Income cannot be in excess of \$7,500 per calendar year unless in receipt of compensation paid by the Veterans Administration, or the armed forces of the United States, for service incurred disabilities.

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More guards approved with county budget OK

Additional guards and medical personnel at the Wayne County jail and additional inspectors to check for air pollution will be provided by a new budget, \$17.3 million higher than the present budget, adopted by the Wayne County Board of Commissioners Friday.

The new budget which takes effect Dec. 1 also anticipates a \$7 million surplus.

The budget will add 26 guards and 10 medical aides to the jail's present staff to provide for 24-hour, seven-day medical coverage for the jail's new diagnostic center on which construction is scheduled to begin soon.

Board Chairman Robert E. FitzPatrick said the county may provide even more medical personnel as the center is completed.

Sheriff William Lucas has asked for 80 additional deputies and medical personnel.

"It appears the commissioners are attempting within their financial means to take the necessary humane steps to insure that some of the outstanding complaints leveled at the jail

are eliminated," Lucas said. "I understand that they intend to add additional positions that I requested as the need arises (at the diagnostic center)."

"For the first time we'll be able to give proper diagnostic service."

The board earmarked \$200,000 as the county's share for an expected \$600,000 federal grant for the additional personnel. The overall jail budget was increased by \$500,000 - from \$3.2 million to \$3.7 million.

The commissioners have been under a court order to improve the old jail and to build a new one.

The county's total budget amounts to \$253.8 million which compares with \$236.5 million for the present year.

The county's air pollution control division will get an additional \$301,765, boosting its total budget to nearly \$2 million. Morton Sterling, division director, said the increased budget would allow for seven new inspectors and initiation of weekend and evening inspection on a regular basis.

Complaints of unkempt premises, junk cars, parking violations and debris will be taken care of by increased code enforcement.

Detroit officials of the United States Department of Housing and Urban Development (HUD) owner of about 20 vacant homes, have been in touch with residents and city officials.

These homes as well as others in the subdivisions have been financed under provisions of the Federal Housing Administration (FHA) Act 235 subsidized program for low and moderate income families.

The subdivisions were developed and built by Kaufman & Broad Homes Inc. More than 630 homes have been completed or are under construction. More homes for the area are planned by the firm.

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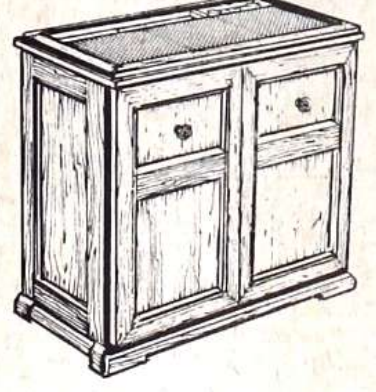

- 2 egg whites

- $\frac{1}{2}$ cup sugar
- 1 tablespoon lemon juice

Cream butter. Gradually add $\frac{1}{2}$ cup sugar, creaming well after each addition. Beat in egg yolks, one at a time, beating thoroughly after each. Blend in salt and flour. Stir in 1 cup of the coconut, the pecans, and lemon rind. Spread evenly in a lightly greased 13x9-inch pan. Bake at 350 degrees about 20 minutes, or until golden brown around edges.

Meanwhile, beat egg whites with cream of tartar until foamy throughout. Gradually add $\frac{1}{2}$ cup sugar, beating thoroughly after each addition. Gradually add lemon juice and continue beating until meringue will form very stiff shiny peaks. Spread over pastry in pan. Sprinkle top with remaining $\frac{1}{4}$ cup coconut. Bake at 375 degrees for 10 to 15 minutes, or until topping is golden brown. Cool; then cut into $1\frac{1}{2}$ x2-inch bars. Cover and store at room temperature. Makes 32 bars.

Registration is open to any area resident.

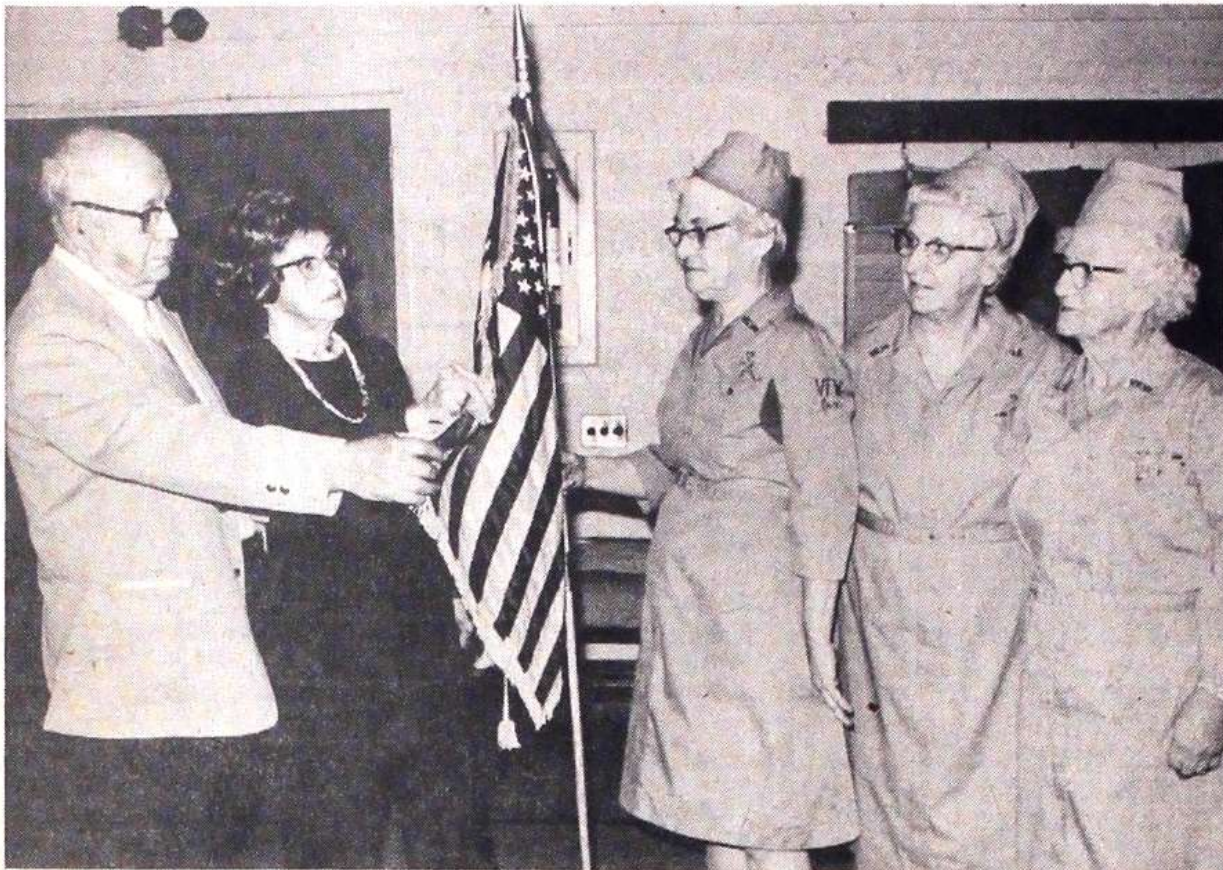

Motorists should have kits

A winter emergency kit is an essential part of every motorist's preparation for the snow and ice which will soon prevail in our area, according to Romulus Police Chief Jacob J. Koch.

"The way out of an emergency may well come out of the trunk of your car," was the way the chief put it.

Chief Koch recommended following list of items to make up an emergency kit.

Battery cables — An essential item in case your battery should fail or you inadvertently leave your lights on. Cables should be of heavy gauge. They should be long enough to connect to your battery and reach at least four feet beyond the outside edge of your fender.

Flares (or reflectors) — At least four long-burning, 20-minute flares should be carried. If you should break down or be involved in an accident, mark your car both front and rear with flares, or at least, reflectors. Flares should not be used when spilled gasoline or oil is present.

First aid — One of the commercially available auto first aid kits will prove useful in treating minor cuts and bruises of any origin.

Tire chains — Both the National Safety Council and the International Association of Chiefs of Police recommend carrying reinforced tire chains for use in severe weather.

Tire chains provide from four to seven times the traction of conventional tires in heavy snow and glare ice.

Other items — Carry a flashlight or battery lantern, a pair of gloves and a small rug or piece of coarse matting should you have to change a tire or do other work on your car — day or night.

The matting can also be used as a quick traction aid beneath the drive wheels of your car. Be sure a tow chain, sand or rock salt and a shovel are also included.

A spare can of windshield washer solution, spare wiper blades and extra bulbs for directional signals and stop lights will also prove their value should you need them.

Chief Koch also advised, "Should you end up in a snowbank, put the piece of carpeting under your drive wheels. Turn your front wheels from side to side to clear away snow and put your transmission in drive or second gear. Then, with a light touch on the accelerator, pull back onto the cleared roadway."

"Romulus' drivers can save themselves a great amount of trouble and help keep traffic moving on our streets and highways," Chief Koch pointed out. Then he added, "We hope emergencies do not occur, but it's better part of common sense to always be prepared."

Aerobic program set in Van Buren

A new phase in physical conditioning - the aerobic program - has been initiated by the Van Buren Township Recreation Department.

The program is being held in conjunction with the township's winter recreational program and it is under the direction of Ben Robertson.

Program sessions are held at the Belleville High School gymnasium three nights a week.

According to Robertson, aerobic exercise is a system of exercise designed to improve the overall health, but particularly the condition of the heart, lungs and blood vessels.

"The main objective of an aerobic program is to increase the maximum amount of oxygen that your body can process within a given time," he said. "It is dependent upon an ability to (1) rapidly breathe large amounts of air, (2) forcefully deliver large volumes of blood and (3) effectively deliver oxygen to all parts of the body.

"In short it depends upon efficient lungs, a powerful heart and a good vascular system. Because it reflects the conditions of these vital organs, the aerobic capacity is the best index of overall physical fitness.

"Collectively, the changes induced by exercise in the various systems and organs of the body are called the training effect. Unless the exercise is of sufficient intensity and duration, it will not produce a training effect and cannot be classified as an aerobic exercise."

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Variety of musical styles

Versatility: Edition's byword

NASHVILLE, Tenn. — Versatility. It's one of those words that's tossed around too much when used to describe musical groups. But a look at Kenny Rogers and The First Edition, puts it back in its rightful place.

When The First Edition band came together in 1967, the group's four members had a professional background tailored mostly to folk music.

Their first hit, through, was a psychedelic rock piece. The second hit was in the Top Ten on the Country music charts. And the many hits they've had since have embodied a vast array of musical style, mostly blending rock and country.

The group is living proof that rock-pop music, with a country foundation, is a highly sellable product.

It's the kind of talent that has produced a million-selling record on the average of once a year for Rogers and the others.

"Country music is the white man's rhythm and blues. It'll always be around. To me, country music is the foundation for all the music we play," said Rogers, a bearded bulky singer-guitarist who was raised in Houston and now lives in Los Angeles with the other members.

The group now has six musician-singers: Rogers, Terry Williams, guitarist; Jimmy Hassell, vocalist and lead guitarist; Mickey Jones, drummer; Mary Arnold, singer; and Jane Lorenzo, pianist-organist.

Together, they have produced million sellers in "Tell It All Brothers," "Reuben James," "Something's Burning," "Ruby" and "Just Dropped In To See What Condition My Condition Was In."

The last was their first smash, and their only hard rock hit.

Perhaps the group's greatest strength lies with the vocal dissimilarity of its members.

chimed in: "The healthiest thing about this group is the fact that anything creatively that you want to do, you can do it."

Rogers said the group continually makes an effort not to seek one musical direction. Their philosophy was quickly challenged with their first hit five years ago, "Just Dropped In."

"We didn't want to be

labeled a psychedelic group because we knew it was just a fad," he said.

"But we didn't want to be labeled a country group, either, because that's limiting, market wise."

The only kind of music which the First Edition avoids producing is hard rock. It's not that they don't like it, said Rogers. It's just that hard rock doesn't fit the group's image in the record-radio market.

On stage, though, that's another matter for the First Edition can open with a rock song and close with a ballad. And in between, you'll find country, folk and pop music.

Image is the crux of maintaining their popularity, said Rogers. Referring to a hard rock piece that's now being toyed with, he said:

"We'll never release it under the First Edition. We'll release it under another name because it'll sell under a different name."

"We'll go in phases," he said. "We're constantly experimenting with our product. But the key is maintaining some kind of common denominator."

What is that denominator? "I don't like to refer to us as a country group. But, face it, we are country oriented," Rogers said.

of both jazz worlds; the arranged framework supplied them by the Duke and the solos called for within the arrangements. In fact, the Duke has built whole compositions around the work of his soloists.

Mrs. Philip H. Power, chairman of the Benefit Committee, said, "To the true jazz fan, an Ellington concert is a real treat, but the jam session afterwards will provide even greater thrills as the musicians play unhampered by arrangements or the restrictions of time or program."

And it will need its best Friday night when state-ranked Ypsilanti will help Coach Keith Emerson's Tigers bring down the curtains to the season. "Ypsilanti a good football team that is rated among the best 10 in the state," said Emerson who saw his Tigers maul Bentley 43-12 in the Suburban 8 Conference finale last Friday. "And that alone

speaks for itself. If we get a solid effort by our people we have a chance to beat them." Belleville came up with more than a solid effort against the Livonians who found the Tigers impregnable after the host got on the scoreboard early in the first quarter.

Bentley jolted its visitors by taking the opening kickoff and marching 62-yard to score on a two-yard plunge by Robert Wasilewski. But that's about all it managed to do against the first string Tiger defense which buckled down instead of buckling after the Bulldogs scored.

Belleville came right back to tie the score when runningback Mike Dansard, who had a spectacular evening, scored his first of three touchdowns. Dansard capped a 64-yard drive with a 11-yard touchdown sprint.

That initial drive was kept alive thanks to key plays, including a 18-yard pass reception by Ralph Cohen from quarterback Gary VanBuhler and Dansard's 28-yard rush.

Tony Guisasaola put Belleville ahead for good when he booted the point after.

Dansard capped another long drive, which covered 74-yards later in the quarter with a one-yard lunge. He set up his own TD with a 39-yard run, the longest of the year and also picked up 13 yards to keep the offensive machine going.

At the Bentley 25, VanBuhler, momentarily stalled, tossed a six-yard pass to Guisasaola for the first down. Dansard slipped through for the two-point conversion.

Belleville exploded for 14 points in the second quarter as a fumble recovery set up, Dansard's third TD of the evening. He raced 30-yards into the end zone and also accounted for the two-point conversion.

Then, the Tiger QB put six-points on the scoreboard with a six-yard toss to Guisasaola that polished off a 69-yard drive. A VanBuhler to Terry Pate pass that covered 28 yards and 31-yard dash by Dansard kept the drive going.

Pate ran 17 yards with a fumble recovery in the third quarter to account for Belleville final TD of the third quarter.

Bentley came back in the fourth with Robert Decon's 2-yard touchdown plunge, which was set up by a poor Tiger punt that wound up on the visitors' 37-yard line.

Lee Stilner, who moved in to quarterback the Tiger's in the final quarter, raced two-yards for the final Belleville score. That climaxed a 52-yard drive which was helped along by Bruce Ford's 22 yard rush and Stan Mar's sprints of 14 and 15 yards.

Sports Spectrum

Those unsung heroes in the front lines

Earlier this week I received a call from a football fan who was wondering why a certain player had not received more recognition on our sports pages.

The player in question is an offensive lineman on one of the area high school teams. The caller mentioned that he had seen most of this team's games and he felt that the player had done a good job throughout the season.

I have also had the opportunity to see this team play and I told the caller that I, too, had been impressed by the player.

The tone of this fan's call was friendly, rather than harsh. He just wanted to make sure that we knew of this particular player's existence.

I told him that we did and guaranteed that the area's top offensive linemen would receive their just recognition within the next several weeks.

It may be true that we have not given proper credit to some of our area's better centers, guards, and tackles, but this isn't anything new.

Wherever football is written about you'll find that the people who throw, carry, and catch the ball receive the major share of the publicity, while those who do the blocking are mentioned far less frequently.

There are several reasons for this. First of all, only a certain amount of space can be allotted for newspaper accounts of football games and some of this space must always be filled with the names of those who scored the touchdowns.

Then again, it's hard for anyone who is watching a game to notice the play of all of the offensive linemen. It's possible to notice a few good blocks, or missed blocks, on the part of each man. But nobody, including the coaches, can give a complete judgment of each lineman's play at the game's end.

That's one reason why football coaches on the scholastic, collegiate, and professional levels view game films. By watching each play numerous times a coach can determine how each of his men performed on that play. After he's done this with every play he can give an assessment of each man's over-all showing.

When we ask the coaches to give a post-game analysis they'll often mention several offensive linemen but then add that they "really can't be sure until after the films are viewed."

This is understandable, but newspapers have deadlines and they arrive long before the grid coaches are able to review their games on film. Thus, unfortunately, our stories must be written before we can get the "full story" from the coaches.

Down through the decades the lineman has always been the unsung hero.

Millions of fans can recite the names of the Four Horsemen of Notre Dame. But how many know the names of the Seven Mules, who cleared the paths for those Irish backs during the mid-1920's?

Similar examples can be found in the present era.

In many instances the play-by-play men on pro and college football telecasts do not even take the time to identify the starting offensive linemen at the beginning of a game.

As a game progresses some of the men up front will be spotlighted in an occasional instant replay. But often a lineman will play an entire game without once having his name mentioned on the air.

The best offensive linemen do eventually get their deserved publicity in pro football, but this isn't always the case in the college game. While the All-Pro teams are generally accurate, the All-American teams leave much to be desired.

With more than 600 colleges fielding football teams it's virtually impossible for anyone taking part in an All-American balloting to select the nation's best players.

It's hard to know about linemen you haven't seen play and when most writers and broadcasters fill out a ballot they have to vote for men they have only read about in magazines, newspapers, and promotional literature.

Some voters get their information from pre-season football magazines, and this can lead to problems.

There have been instances in which linemen who were injured before the start of the season and did not play a single down have been honorable mention picks on the wire service All-American teams.

You can be sure that this won't be the case when our All-Area football team is chosen later this month.

The Michigan High School Athletic Association has come a long way in devising an equitable system whereby outstanding prep runners whose teams don't make it through the regionals can compete for a state cross country title.

In past years if the team didn't place first, second or third in a regional meet, the runners didn't advance to the finals. And many an outstanding young runner was denied an opportunity to compete on the state level.

However, with the present system, the top two teams at a regional advance to the finals while the top 10 runners, ex-

It is possible for a runner on a team to have a better time than an individual competing in the "individual championship" and not be crowned the state champ.

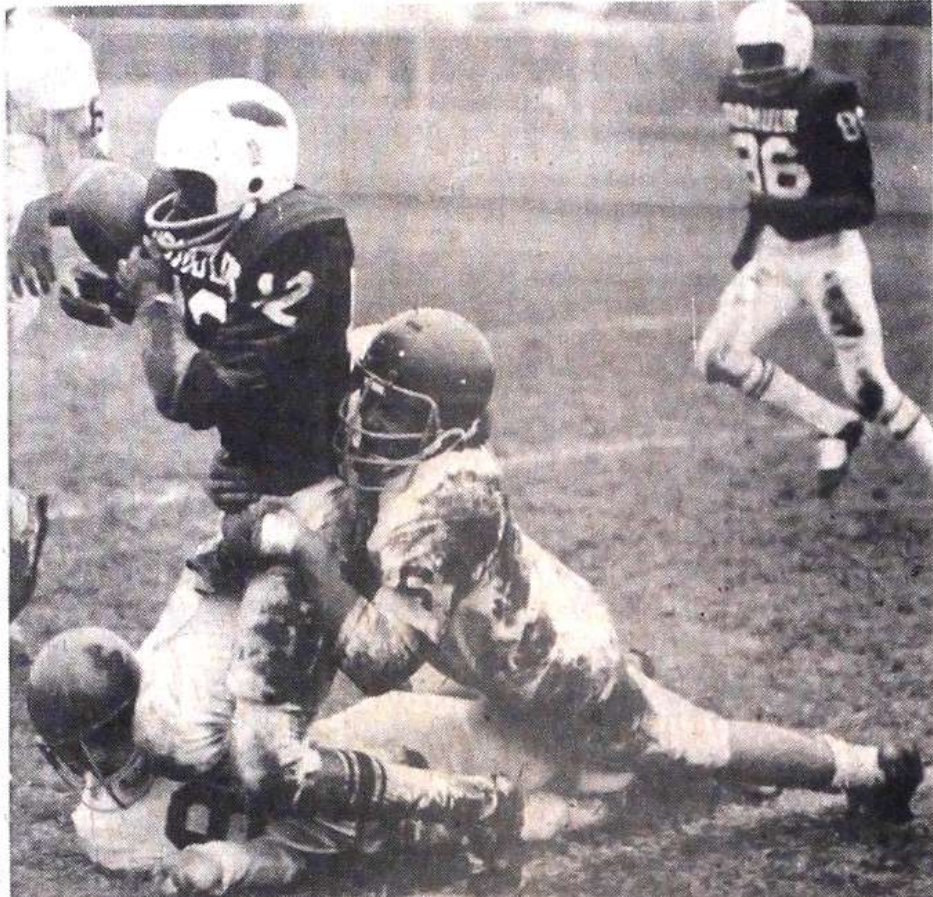
And that leaves fans asking: "Who is the best?"

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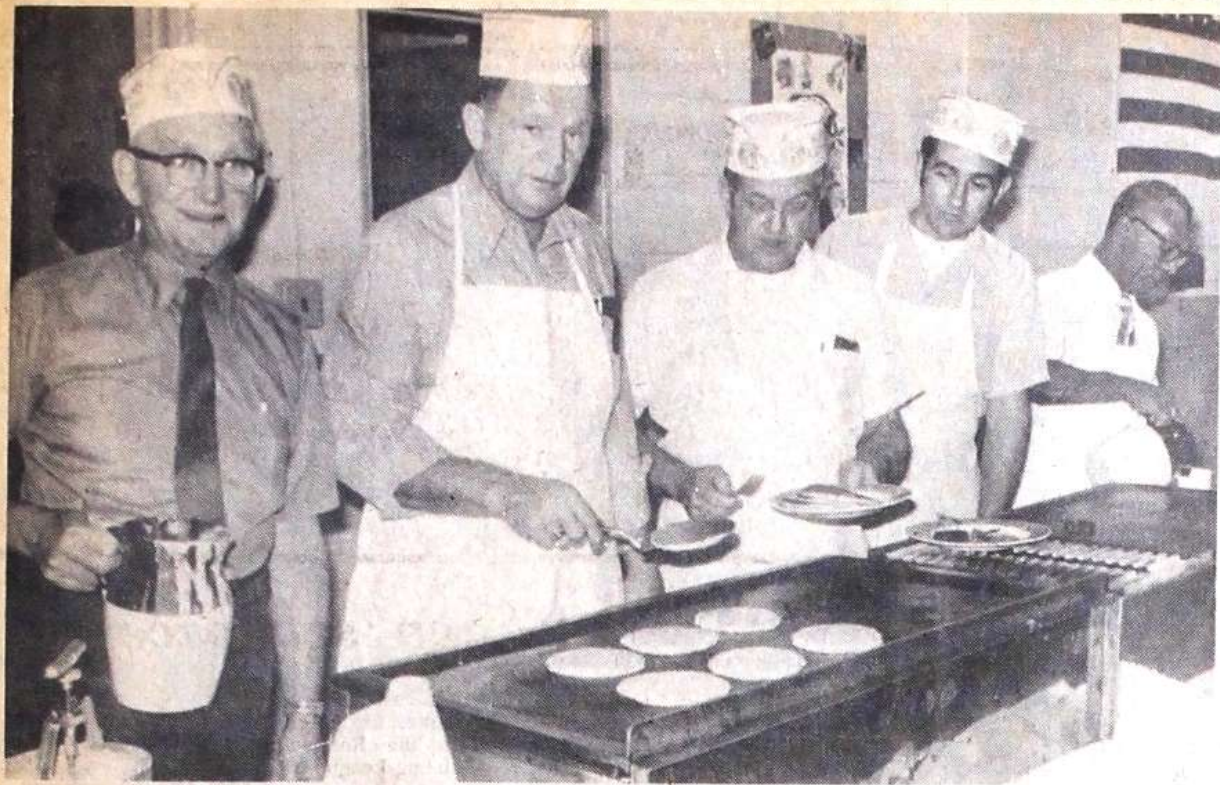

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Here's the Answer

Q—I am going to paint our kitchen. My wife says she wants to wash the walls first but isn't sure what to wash them with. Can you help?

A—Your wife has made a wise decision. For most jobs of this kind, washing with a mild detergent and warm water will take off the accumulated grease and grime. For especially stubborn areas, use a stronger detergent. When washing the walls, do it differently than most persons. Start at the bottom and work upwards. If you start at the top, the dirty water will run down the walls, mingling with the old dirt and causing a difficult removal task. When dirty water runs down a just-

cleaned surface, it wipes off easily.

Q—I want to use varnish on the new trim in our house. I intend to use the flat type as I do not want it to be too glossy. How many coats are needed?

A—For new trim, at least two and preferably three coats are required. The first coat should be thinned with a quart of turpentine to each gallon of varnish. Succeeding coats should be used full strength, allowing at least five days for each coat to dry.

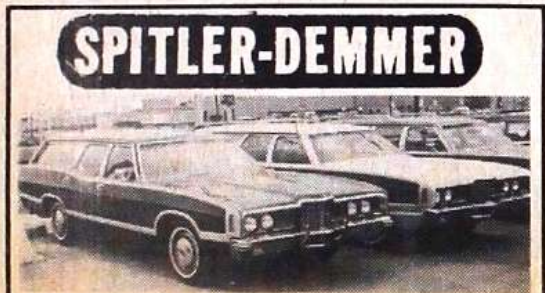
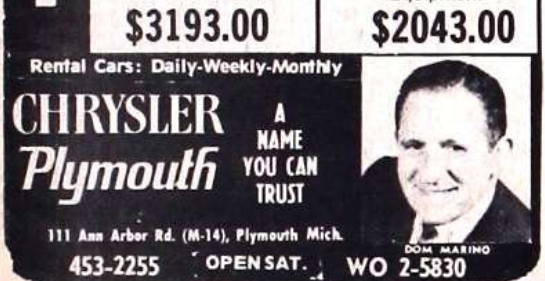

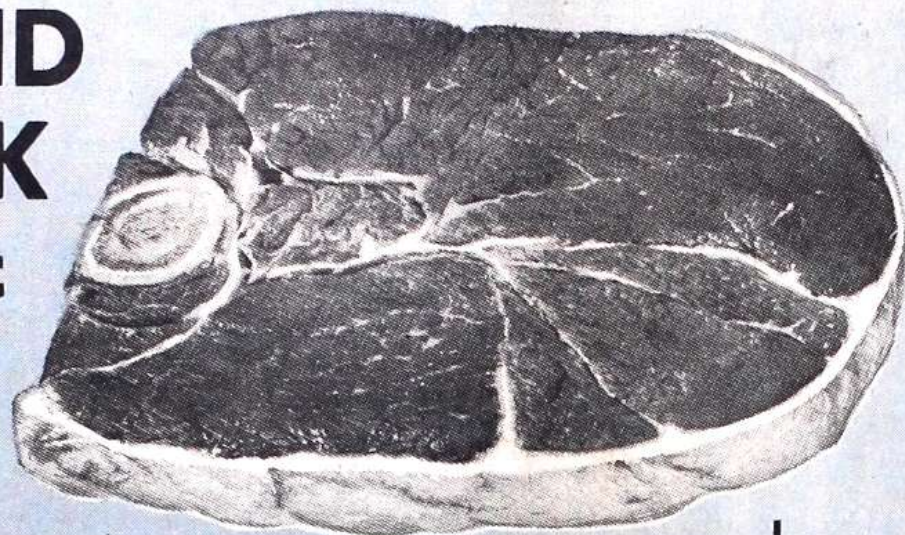
