Explosion cause isn't determined

Investigators are awaiting the results of chemical laboratory tests to determine the cause of the explosions that ripped through a propane gas storage field in Romulus

Authorities evacuated hundreds of families from Romulus and Taylor around the storage field, which is on the corner of Ecorse and Inkster Roads. Firemen battled for two hours before the resulting fires were brought under control.

"We're waiting for word from the state fire marshall who is analyzing some of the equipment," said Inspector Dick Novak of the Wayne County Sheriff Department

"We can't forsee arson as the cause, because there were too many people around for someone to be sneaky," he added. "However, we can't rule arson out until we get the final analysis from the laboratory."

Hundreds of small propane gas tanks, the type which are used in house trailers, were blown apart. The tanks were being stored in a shed at the Propane Services, Inc. yard.

There was no available estimate on the loss in the fire. Several new tank trucks were destroyed as well as the loading dock area, the storage

Wayne County Sheriff Department officials have speculated that the small tanks were set off by a carelessly thrown cigaret or some type of a spark.

The residents in a surrounding square mile area were eyacuated because of the fear that a large 18,000-gallon tank might explode. The tank, which is used to fill the smaller portable tanks, is several hundred feet from where most of the explosions

"If it had gone up," said a workman, "You'd need more than the fire department. There wouldn't have been anything but a big hole in the



storage shed containing 500 small propane gas tanks became a pile of twisted metal beams after being ripped by hundreds of small explosions. The explosions started

Metro Airport officials said no flights were affected by the explosions or fires.

More guards approved with county budget OK

Additional guards and medical personnel at the Wayne County jail and additional inspectors to check for air pollution will be provided by a new budget, \$17.3 million higher than the present budget, adopted by the Wayne County Board of Commissioners Friday.

The new budget which takes effect Dec. 1 also anticipates a \$7 million surplus.

The budget will add 26 guards and 10 medical aides to the jail's present staff to provide for 24-hour, seven-day medical coverage for the jail's new diagnostic center on which construction is scheduled to begin soon.

Board Chairman Robert E. FitzPatrick said the county may provide even more medical personnel as the center is

Sheriff William Lucas has asked for 80 additional deputies and medical personnel.

"It appears the commissioners are attempting within their financial means to take the necessary humane steps to insure that some of the outstanding complaints leveled at the jail to add additional positions that I requested as the need arises

"For the first time we'll be able to give proper diagnostic

The board earmarked \$200,000 as the county's share for an expected \$600,000 federal grant for the additional personnel. The overall jail budget was increased by \$500,000 - from \$3.2

The commissioners have been under a court order to improve the old jail and to build a new one.

The county's total budget amounts to \$253.8 million which compares with \$236.5 million for the present year.

The county's air pollution control division will get an additional \$301,765, boosting its total budget to nearly \$2 million. Morton Sterling, division director, said the increased budget would allow for seven new inspectors and initiation of weekend and evening inspection on a regular basis.

National no-fault will try again next year

One of the questions a fellow in my job gets quite often from high school interviewers is: "What is the most challenging domestic endeavor you have undertaken?

And the answer for the past couple of years has been: "Trying to persuade Congress that a \$3 billion industry, operated by people of good reputation and great eloquence, many of whom are good friends, ought to be disbanded.

The industry is composed of thousands of persons - mostly lawyers - who derive income from determining who is at fault in thousands of auto accidents each year. The issue is the Magnuson-Hart bill to create a national system of nofault insurance that would make auto insurance claims payable very much like health or life insurance.

If you wind up in the hospital with pneumonia, Blue Cross pays off without inquiring whether you walked in the rain without galoshes. And Blue Cross, spared all those investigative costs, pays back 94 cents for every premium dollar it takes in.

But in auto insurance, only 42 cents of each liability

premium dollar goes back to the victims of accidents. Much of the rest is consumed by the "injury industry," those thousands who have the assignment of determining fault in individual cases so that it may be decided which insurance company will pay

The no-fault bill, of course, would change all this. It would simply require compensation for medical expenses, rehabilitation, wage loss and funeral expenses by the company insuring the car in which the victim was riding.

Only in cases of catastrophic injury will law suits be necessary. If a victim's medical expenses exceed \$25,000 for example, he can go to court to collect the remainder from an

Perhaps predictably, lawyers who do negligence work have not viewed the bill with complacency. And since 301 of Congress' 535 members are lawyers, no-fault proponents have been somewhat in the position of salesmen trying to sell plastic desks at a lumbermen's convention.

Senators from rural states, moreover, are not enthused about no-fault because in sparsely populated areas most accidents are one-car crashes where fault isn't often an

The White House too was opposed to the Magnuson-Hart bill. All these factors added up to a three-vote defeat when the bill came to the floor of the Senate

An opponent of no-fault Senator Roman Hruska (R-Neb) moved that the bill go back for study in the Judiciary Committee and his motion carried, 49-46. But early next year we will be back for another try. No-fault can be delayed, but eventual passage, in my opinion, is inevitable. The logic is overwhelming

For example, in Puerto Rico, where no-fault has been in effect since 1968, 90 cents is now being paid back for every premium dollar taken in. That means Puerto Rican motorists are getting rougly twice as much for their dollars is are most mainland Americans. And in Massachusetts, a partial no-fault plan has dramatically reduced the cost of

pensation to the victims. It is our notion that the wasteful wrangling ought to be eliminated, that the motorist ought to be able to buy insurance on his car much the way he buys insurance on his

It will save time. It will save money. It is a reform, I think, whose time has arrived.

Question: I don't seem to hear as much about LSD today as

before. Is it being used less? Answer: LSD ("acid", "sunshine" etc.) is still very much around. This most potent of the mindaltering durgs was a big

thing a few years ago. Today it is suffering from a rather well deserved lapse in popularity. This mostly because of its documented hazards to the mind. Oddly enough, traffic in the drug has not particularly

diminished. It is merely being sold as something else currently in vogue, most generally mescaline.

Question: Can LSD cause schizophrenia?

M.R., Redford

Answer: It certainly can cause something. However, schizophrenia (a severe form of mental disturbance) is not identical to the effects sometimes caused by LSD. There are enough similarities between some LSD "bad trips" and schizophrenia to have resulted in confusing the two. Technically, the experiences are not identical; in this particular instance we'd say that close does count.

Question: Are LSD "flashbacks" now considered a real problem? Or was this just part of the "scare" propaganda bout LSD?

Answer: The phenomenon of LSD flashbacks (reoccurences of earlier drug-induced hallucinations) was undoubtedly used by some as a "scare tactic." This particular scare happened to have some basis in fact. The people who work in drug treatment centers say that the flashback problem is a real one today. These experiences, which can be utterly terrifying, were thought to happen spontaneously but now are considered more likely to be caused by some emotional stress.

Motorists should have kits

motorist's preparation for the snow and ice which will soon prevail in our area, according to Romulus Police Chief Jacob J. Koch.

The way out of an emergency may well come out of the trunk of your car," was the way the chief put it.

Chief Koch recommended following list of items to make up an emergency kit.

Battery cables — An essential item in case your battery should fail or you inadvertently leave your lights on. Cables should be of heavy gauge. They should be long enough to connect to your battery and reach at least four feet beyond the outside edge of your fender.

Flares (or reflectors) — At least four long-burning, 20-minute flares should be carried. If you should break down or be involved in an accident, mark your car both front and rear with flares, or at least, reflectors. Flares should not be used when spilled gasoline or oil is present.

First aid — One of the commercially available auto first aid kits will prove useful in treating minor cuts and bruises of any origin.

Tire chains — Both the National Safety Council and the International Association of Chiefs of Police recommend carrying reinforced tire chains for use in severe weather. Tire chains provide from

four to seven times the traction of conventional tires in heavy snow and glare ice.
Other items — Carry a flashlight or battery lantern, a pair of gloves and a small rug or piece of coarse matting should you have to change a tire or do other work on your

car - day or night. The matting can also be used as a quick traction aid beneath the drive wheels of your car. Be sure a tow chain, sand or rock salt and a shovel

are also included. A spare can of windshield washer solution, spare wiper blades and extra bulbs for directional signals and stop lights will also prove their value should you need them.

Chief Koch also advised, "Should you end up in a snowbank, put the piece of carpeting under your drive wheels. Turn your front wheels from side to side to clear away snow and put your transmission in drive or second gear. Then, with a light touch on the accelerator, pull back onto the cleared road-

This, of course, doesn't take anything away from Nowak's triumph. He is the best in the state. And we hope no one interprets the column as an attempt to diminish the Wayne Memorial harrier's victory.

But, it would have been interesting to have the two youths un it out to see who would finish first

And we hope the coaches and the MHSAA will someday devise a system where the team and the individual championships can be run simultaneously.

Here's the Answer

By ANDY LANG

Q .- I am going to paint our kitchen. My wife says she wants to wash the walls first but isn't sure what to wash them with. Can you help?

A.-Your wife has made a wise decision. For most jobs of this kind, washing with a mild detergent and warm water will take off the accumulated grease and grime. For especially stubborn areas, use a stronger detergent. When washing the walls, do it differently than most persons. Start at the bottom and work upwards. If you start at the top, the dirty water will run down the walls, mingling with the old dirt and causing a difficult removal task. When

cleaned surface, it wipes off

Q.-I want to use varnish on the new trim in our house. I intend to use the flat type as I do not want it to be too glossy. How many coats are needed?

A.-For new trim, at least two and preferably three coats should be thinned with a quart of turpentine to each gallon of varnish. Succeeding coats should be used full strength, allowing at least five days for each coat to dry.




