CSNY 48, of known reliability, made available to the New York Office information concerning the above-captioned subject, obtained from the building located at 23 West 26th Street, New York City. This building is occupied by the American Committee for Protection of Foreign Born, Joint Anti-Fascist Refugee Committee and Veterans of the Abraham Lincoln Brigade, all of which have been declared by the Attorney General of the United States to fall within the purview of Executive Order 9835. In addition, other Communist Party front groups and individual Communist Party members of sympathizers occupy offices at this address. Prior to 2/1/53 the State and National Offices of the Civil Rights Congress were located at this address. Subsequent to that date space in the building has been occupied by SRT Publications, Inc., publishers of "New World Review" formerly known as "Soviet Russia Today" which has been cited as a Communist Front by the Special Committee on Un-American Activities, House of Representatives, 6/25/42 and 3/29/44.

Strict care must be exercised so that the existence of this important source of evidence will not become known to any outside agency. It is also to be noted that because of the nature of this source of information it will be impossible to recontact the source regarding information furnished.

SYNOPSIS OF FACTS:

SECURITY INFORMATION - CONFIDENTIAL

Motorcade held in Oakland and Berkeley, California to swell demand for clemency for ROSENBERGs. Committee announced in June, 1953 that 50,000 pieces of literature had been distributed calling for action to save the ROSENBERGs. Committee placed ad in newspapers stating new evidence found in this case. On 6/20/53, automobile parade held in San Francisco ending at Civic Center. All day conference held on 7/18/53, at which time 100 persons pledged themselves to secure new trial for MORTON SOBELL and main speakers were JOSEPH BRAININ and DAVID ALMAN.

I GENERAL ACTIVITIES

The Daily People's World, a West Coast Communist newspaper, of June 5, 1953, page 3, columns one and two, contained an article entitled, "ROSENBERG Motorcade in East Bay; San Francisco Active". The article stated a motor caravan would wind through Oakland and Berkeley on June 7, 1953 to swell the world-wide demand to President EISENHOWER to grant clemency to JULIUS and ETHEL ROSENBERG. This caravan was called by the East Bay Committee to Save the ROSENBERGs.

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Placards would request observers to write, wire or telephone the President asking that he spare the lives of the ROSENBERGs. This article further reflected that twenty-two neighborhood committees in San Francisco would intensify activity on the week end for executive clemency for the ROSENBERGs. The article stated tables would be set up throughout the city equipped with literature, stationery and telegram blanks for those wishing to address the President.

On May 21, 1953, San Francisco [redacted] advised that in May, 1953 SYLVIA STEINGART, Executive Secretary of the San Francisco ROSENBERG Committee, stated that there was very little activity in the San Francisco area; that the committees were not functioning and she was not getting the cooperation of local people. b7d

SYLVIA STEINGART has been identified as a Communist Party member by San Francisco [redacted] b7d

The "Daily People's World" of May 20, 1953, page three, columns one and two, contained an article entitled, "Challenge Set in Fight to Save the ROSENBERGs". This article reflected that STEPHEN LOVE, Professor of Law at Northwestern University and Chairman of the Chicago and Illinois Bar Associations, gave a speech on May 17, 1953 at a dinner at the Mart Club in San Francisco.

Professor LOVE stated, "If we can get the facts of the ROSENBERG case to enough of the American people there will be such a waive of protest no one will dare act against them." Another speaker was Dr. HERWARD L. LOOLER, Dean of the Divinity School, University of Chicago and author of a letter to President EISENHOWER pleading for clemency for the ROSENBERGs which was signed by 2,300 ministers. Dr. LOOLER pointed out that the worldwide concern for the ROSENBERGs reflected the fact that "the genius of the case is that the issues at stake take on more dimensions than the ROSENBERGs themselves."

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San Francisco [redacted] advised on June 12, 1953 that the ROSENBERG Committee held an emergency meeting on May 28, 1953 at 150 Golden Gate Avenue, San Francisco. San Francisco [redacted] advised that approximately seventy-five people were present and SYLVIA STEINGART explained the procedures of the emergency measures that would be taken. STEINGART stated there would be a concerted city-wide campaign, and telephone campaigns, neighborhood distribution of literature and requests that people write or wire the President asking for clemency. STEINGART stated all ministers, priests and rabbis in the neighborhood churches would be asked to speak out to their congregations on Sunday. b7d

The "Daily People's World" of June 8, 1953, page eight, columns one and two, contained an article entitled, "SF Mass Meeting Due Wednesday". This article reflected that the San Francisco Committee to Save the ROSENBERGS announced it would hold an emergency clemency rally on June 10, 1953. This article stated that DAVID ALLAN, National Executive Secretary of the Committee to Secure Justice in the ROSENBERG Case would be one of the speakers at the rally.

The article reflected that the announcement of this affair came as hundreds of volunteers took to the streets of the city over the week end in an outpouring which the Committee described as tremendous. The article stated that more than 50,000 pieces of literature calling for action to save the ROSENBERGS was distributed.

The "Daily People's World" of June 12, 1953 page 3, column one, contained an article entitled, "Intensive Week End Activities". The article stated that clemency campaign activities would reach an intensive pitch this week end, according to reports from the Save the ROSENBERGs Committee in the Bay Area. The article reflected that in San Francisco, 2,500 copies of a new four-page leaflet on perjured testimony would be distributed by neighborhood committees.

The San Francisco Chronicle, a daily San Francisco newspaper, of June 16, 1953 contained an ad placed by the Bay Area Committee to Save the ROSENBERGs, 228 McAllister Street, San Francisco, which stated that new evidence cried out the ROSENBERGs must not die. The ad requested individuals to wire or phone President EISENHOWER demanding clemency for the ROSENBERGs.

The "Daily People's World" of June 16, 1953, page 3, column 5, contained an article entitled, "Clemency Drive Spurred". The article stated that the San Francisco Save the ROSENBERGs Committee urged that only telegrams and person-to-person telephone calls for ROSENBERG clemency could reach President EISENHOWER in time to beat the executioner's switch.

The article stated that SYLVIA STEINGART, Executive Secretary of the Local Committee, noted that the percentage of persons approached who were willing to add their names to the clemency appeals had increased many fold. STEINGART had stated that approximately two thousand signatures to letters and petitions were collected over the week end.

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The "Daily People's World" of June 17, 1953, page one, columns one, two and three, contained an announcement entitled, "Zero Hour Actions Set". This announcement stated that in California supporters of clemency for the ROSENBERGs had announced public gatherings to muster public interest for the last-ditch effort to save the lives of the young couple. In San Francisco a 24 hour clemency vigil would start on June 17, 1953 at the U. S. Post Office Building. In Oakland, an open-air rally and prayer meeting for clemency would be held at the City Hall Plaza on June 17, 1953.

The San Francisco Examiner, a daily San Francisco newspaper, of June 20, 1953, contained an article entitled, "Bay Protest Staged". The article stated that a parade and two meetings were held in the Bay Area on June 19, 1953 protesting the execution of the ROSENBERGs. The article stated an automobile parade up Market Street in San Francisco ended at the Civic Center Plaza where PAUL SCHNUR, Chairman of the Committee to Free the ROSENBERGs spoke. According to the article, a second meeting was held at 150 Golden Gate Avenue. The article reflected that in Berkeley forty-five persons held a meeting at Constitution Square after a short parade.

San Francisco [redacted] has identified PAUL SCHNUR as a member of the Communist Party. b 2

The "Daily People's World" of June 22, 1953, page three, column three, contained an article entitled, "In Berkeley 200 Held Memorial". The article stated that two hundred persons gathered on Shattuck Avenue in Berkeley on June 19, 1953 and vowed to keep working until the innocence of the ROSENBERGs is made known to the world. The article further stated that the tearful crowd called under the auspices of the ROSENBERG Defense Committee, had rallied in hope of gathering last minute signatures supporting a plea for clemency to President EISENHOWER. The article stated that the ROSENBERGs were executed before the crowd could act.

The "Daily People's World" of June 29, 1953, page eight, columns one through five, contained an article entitled, "Nation-Wide Campaign Pressed to Win New Trial for SOBELL". This article stated that the National Committee to Secure Justice in the ROSENBERG Case announced plans of an intensified drive to obtain a new trial for MORTON SOBELL, who was sentenced to thirty years imprisonment as a codefendant of the ROSENBERGs.

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The "Daily People's World" of July 16, 1953, page 6, column five, contained an article entitled, "SF ROSENBERG Conference on Saturday". This article stated that the case of EDWYNE SOBELL would be discussed by HELEN SOBELL and by DAVID ALMAN, Executive Secretary of the National ROSENBERG Committee on July 18, 1953 at 150 Golden Gate Avenue, San Francisco. The article stated that plans for a new trial for SOBELL would also be discussed. The article stated this affair would be an all-day conference on aspects of the ROSENBERG - SOBELL Case.

The "Daily People's World" of July 20, 1953, page three, column four, contained an article stating that more than one hundred persons had pledged themselves to secure a new trial for EDWYNE SOBELL at a day-long conference on July 18, 1953 at 150 Golden Gate Avenue. At this conference HELEN SOBELL told of the events which lead to her husband's arrest.

The article stated that as part of the campaign to secure a new trial for SOBELL, members of the local and national Committee to Secure Justice in the ROSENBERG Case called for the following:

1. Placing of a full page advertisement on behalf of SOBELL in a major San Francisco newspaper.
2. Calling for a national conference in September to present a full report on finances and achievements of the ROSENBERG Committee, after which the Committee would probably be dissolved and replaced by a SOBELL Committee.
3. Changing the organizational structure of the Committee to provide for three in the west, mid-west and east, rather than a single committee centered in New York.
4. Establishment of a National Legal Committee to consult with SOBELL's attorney.

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The article further stated that JOSEPH BRAININ, Chairman of the National ROSENBERG Committee, and DAVID ALMAN, Executive Secretary, noted that final policy as to how the campaign should be carried out would be made after discussion with ROSENBERG - SOBELL Committees in all parts of the country.

The article further reflected that EMILY ALMAN, a member of the National ROSENBERG Committee, told how, in the last terrible moments when they knew the ROSENBERGS would die, the Committee was only able to get through a message telling of their love and pledging to take care of the children. Mrs. ALMAN asked for a wide sale of the ROSENBERG Death-house Letters, money from which would go to the children's fund.

II OFFICERS

On April 21, 1953, San Francisco [redacted] furnished a letter concerning a meeting of the Bay Area Committee to Save the ROSENBERGS scheduled on [redacted] San Francisco. This letter was signed by SILVIA STEINGART as Executive Secretary. The letter stated the meeting was scheduled for the purpose of hearing AARON SCHNEIDER, Organizational Secretary of the National ROSENBERG Trade Union Committee, who would answer questions on the latest developments in the ROSENBERG Case. b7d

The "Daily People's World" of June 10, 1953, page six, column two, contained an article entitled, "Conference on ROSENBERGS Set for July 18," which stated that Mrs. HELEN SOBELL, whose husband, MORTON SOBELL, who was a codefendant in the ROSENBERG Case, would speak on July 18, 1953 at an all-day conference to plan vindication of the ROSENBERGS and freeing SOBELL.

The article stated that JOSEPH BRAININ, Chairman of the ROSENBERG Defense Committee, DAVID ALMAN, Secretary of the Committee, and BENJAMIN DREYFUS, Associate Consul for SOBELL, would be the key speakers.

San Francisco [redacted] has identified DREYFUS as a Communist Party member. b7d

III SUBVERSIVE RAIFIFICATIONS

A. Connections with the Communist Party:

San Francisco [redacted] advised on June 10, 1953 that the Bay Area Committee to Save the ROSENBERGS held a meeting on May 28, 1953 at 150 Golden Gate Avenue, San Francisco. At this meeting ERNIE FOX made a plea for support of the ROSENBERGS and urged formation of small groups to hand out literature, ring doorbells and urge the sending of letters to President EISENHOWER. FOX particularly called upon waterfront workers to organize into such groups. San Francisco [redacted] advised that approximately seventy persons were present at this meeting. b7d

In August, 1952 ERNIE FOX was convicted in U. S. District Court, Los Angeles, California, for violation of the Smith Act.

B. Implementation of Communist Party Line:

An editorial in the "Daily People's World" of May 6, 1953, page one, column two, stated. "The Supreme Court has been expected weeks ago to hand down a cut-and-dried verdict turning down the third ROSENBERG appeal. Instead the high court has again delayed final action. These delays are in the last analysis the product of the world-wide movement for clemency. If the time now won is used to rally further action on behalf of JULIUS and ETHEL ROSENBERG it will be well used. But if apathy and complacency are permitted to dull the edge of popular protest the precious days will be frittered away. The determining factor will be what all of us do now. We urge our readers to spur every form of action including petitions, mass meetings and the like, to the end that the Supreme Court shall hear the conscience of the American people and act accordingly."

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IV FUNDS

On September 25, 1952 San Francisco [redacted] advised that the ROSENBERG Committee opened a bank account at the Bank of Commerce, Oakland, California, on December 11, 1952 with an initial deposit of \$255. This account was closed on July 29, 1953 and reopened on August 5, 1953 with a deposit of \$62.95. On August 20, 1953 a deposit of \$72.95 was made.

San Francisco [redacted] advised that during August three checks were drawn on this account. One of these checks was made payable to GENOLA BURKS. San Francisco [redacted] could not furnish any further information concerning other checks drawn on this account. San Francisco [redacted] advised that as of September 25, 1953 there remained a balance of 95¢ in this account. San Francisco [redacted] further advised that GENOLA BURKS and BARBARA BRODMELL were authorized to sign checks on this account.

San Francisco [redacted] has identified BURKS as a Communist Party member. San Francisco [redacted] has identified BARBARA BRODMELL as a Communist Party member in 1946. *b2, 7d*

San Francisco [redacted] advised on September 25, 1953 that the Bay Area Committee to Save the ROSENBERGS had an account at the Anglo-California National Bank, Market and Jones Street, San Francisco. On September 25, 1953 this account had a balance of \$311.74. San Francisco [redacted] could furnish no further information concerning the deposits to this account. *b7d*

This account further reflected that on August 27, 1953, a check for \$32.65 was issued to SYLVIA STEINGART and on September 11, 1953 a check was issued to BELLE ELEFT for \$5. San Francisco [redacted] advised that PAUL SCHUR and SYLVIA STEINGART were authorized to sign checks on this account. *b7d*

San Francisco [redacted] identified BELLE ELEFT as a member of the Communist Party in 1947. *b2*

V. PAMPHLETS AND PUBLICATIONS

On June 10, 1953 San Francisco [redacted] furnished a copy of a mimeographed letter being distributed by the Bay Area Committee to Save the ROSENBERGS addressed to President EISENHOWER. This letter stated that only the President's personal intervention could prevent a great injustice which would write a page of history shameful to all liberty-loving Americans. This letter demanded clemency for the ROSENBERGS. b7d

On June 10, 1953 San Francisco [redacted] furnished a copy of a leaflet issued by the National Committee to Secure Justice in the ROSENBERG Case and bearing a stamp of the Bay Area Committee to Save the ROSENBERGS. This leaflet was entitled, "New Evidence in the ROSENBERG Case." This leaflet reflected that two sensational documents just revealed showed that the ROSENBERGS were sent to the death-house on the word of a liar. One of the documents was written by DAVID GREENGLASS, in which he flatly contradicted his own testimony at the trial and admitted he lied to the FBI. b7d

The second document was a lawyer's memorandum based on an interview with RUTH GREENGLASS, the wife of DAVID GREENGLASS, in which she described her husband as having a "tendency to hysteria". This leaflet requested individuals to write and wire President EISENHOWER commanding clemency for the ROSENBERGS.

San Francisco [redacted] on June 12, 1953 furnished a copy of a "ROSENBERG Newsletter" issued by the Bay Area Committee to Save the ROSENBERGS. This newsletter announced a clemency dinner to be held on May 18, 1953 at 1355 Market Street, San Francisco. The letter reflected that new evidence that the prosecution's key witness against the ROSENBERGS lied; the Pope's third clemency appeal; and the Supreme Court's delay in acting on the ROSENBERG Case for many weeks had spurred the campaign to save the ROSENBERGS. The leaflet stated that the ROSENBERG Committee had launched an unlimited telephone campaign to bring facts in the ROSENBERG Case to the people in order to stimulate a clemency campaign. b7d

On June 16, 1953 San Francisco [redacted] furnished a copy of a leaflet entitled, "An Appeal for Clemency". This leaflet contained an excerpt from a statement from the Vatican in Rome. The leaflet also requested that individuals write and wire the President requesting clemency for the ROSENBERGS. b7d

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San Francisco [redacted] on June 16, 1953 furnished a copy of a leaflet entitled, "All Faiths Ask Clemency for the ROSENBERGs". This leaflet contained a statement from L'Osservatore Romano, official organ of the Vatican. The leaflet reflected that twenty Israeli Rabbis had cabled President EISENHOWER appealing for clemency for the ROSENBERGs. This leaflet requested that individuals write or wire the President asking for clemency for the ROSENBERGs and also that the President grant them a new trial. b7d

San Francisco [redacted] on June 16, 1952 furnished a copy of a leaflet entitled, "Parents to Die on Wedding Anniversary", "ROSENBERG Children Plead With President". This leaflet contained a copy of a letter written by the ROSENBERG children to President EISENHOWER. The leaflet demanded clemency for the ROSENBERGs. b7d

San Francisco [redacted] on June 20, 1953 furnished a copy of a leaflet entitled, "Perjury in the ROSENBERG Case". This leaflet reflected that DAVID and RUTH GREENGLASS, prosecution witnesses, lied on the witness stand. The leaflet stated that documents not available during the trial now offer absolute proof that the ROSENBERGs were sent to the death-house on lies. The leaflet suggested individuals write the President demanding clemency for the ROSENBERGs. b7d

San Francisco [redacted] furnished a copy of the "ROSENBERG - SOBELL Newsletter" dated August, 1953 and issued by the Bay Area Committee to Save the ROSENBERGs. This newsletter reported that a national conference would be called toward the end of September in Chicago, at which time representatives of ROSENBERG Committees throughout the country would assemble for the following purposes: b7d

1. Evaluation of the ROSENBERG Clemency Campaign
2. Reorganization of the National Committee to provide a more complete representation in plans and policy making.
3. Discussion of the nature and plans for SOBELL campaign.
4. Election of Regional Co-Chairman and other officers.

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The newsletter reported that the Bay Area hoped to send three representatives to this national conference. The newsletter also declared that individuals in the San Francisco Bay Area could cooperate with local ROSENBERG Committees by taking the following actions:

1. Distribute new pamphlets
2. Use tape recording of speech by Mrs. SOBELL for house gatherings
3. Help raise money through sustainers and house gatherings to raise money for the continued functioning of the committee and to send delegates to the National Conference
4. Help circulate "Death-house Letters," the profit of which would go to a trust fund for the ROSENBERG children.

Morton Sobell, the third defendant in the case and the father of two children, sits in a cell in Alcatraz under a living death sentence of thirty years. Sobell swears that he is completely innocent. The only "evidence" against him was the testimony of an admitted perjurer.

Scientist Dr. Harold Urey says: "Sobell's sentence of 30 years at Alcatraz is completely out of line with any evidence of wrong doing which the government was believed to present. In fact, I do not know what he did do."

Morton Sobell must receive the full measure of justice that the Rosenbergs were denied. Justice to Sobell means the vindication of the Rosenbergs. The National Committee to Secure Justice in the Rosenberg case urges Justice for Morton Sobell. A new trial would be a step toward guaranteeing that the injustice suffered by the Rosenbergs will never again stain the conscience of America.

"Without my knowledge or consent the enclosed communist propaganda was sent to me. I pass it on to you, having meantime written the editors that I wish all the communists in the country could either share the Rosenbergs' fate or be deported to the U.S.S.R.

"It might pay you to look into the backgrounds and activities of the people who get out this rot; I dare say you would find persons already upon your subversive list, to say nothing of other questionable characters."

Correspondent's letter enclosed three leaflets entitled "Did the Rosenbergs Have Full Measure of Justice?", "America's Conscience Speaks"; and "In Memory of Ethel and Julius Rosenberg." The first two leaflets which are undated reflect that they were published by the National Committee to Secure Justice in the Rosenberg Case, 1050 Sixth Avenue, New York City. Dear Friend:

The irregularities by which the Rosenbergs were hurried to their execution are now being repeated in the appeals on behalf of Morton Sobell.

On October 6, Howard Meyer, attorney for Morton Sobell, argued before the U.S. Court of Appeals, basing himself on the voluminous new evidence in the case.

On October 8, the U.S. Court of Appeals, after the briefest possible consideration, rejected these arguments and upheld the Attorney General's plea that no further investigation be made of the case.

But not until October 13 was Sobell's attorney informed of this adverse decision, thereby reducing the time for preparation of a plea to the Supreme Court.

This confronts us with the necessity of immediately raising \$2,500 to cover the cost of printing the appeal proceedings before Judge Kaufman for the Supreme Court. New evidence and new affidavits will be included in this printed record. (A reprint of this brief to the Supreme Court will be made for distribution to committees, attorneys, and other interested persons throughout the country.)

The deadline for raising this \$2,500 is October 24, on which day we must present a certified check for that amount to the Clerk of the Supreme Court.

There is only one suitable reply to this obvious attempt to make a quick disposition of the Sobell appeal, and that is to meet the deadline the courts have set for us.

In April 1952, we were confronted with an even more serious problem — that of raising \$10,000 to print the record of the entire trial for the Supreme Court. Within ten days we received some \$18,000 in contributions and loans. Every one of those loans was repaid.

Your contributions and loans are needed now to meet this new deadline.

Please make your checks payable to Joseph Brainin and indicate whether it is a contribution, whether all or part of it is a loan, and when such loans are to be repaid.

Your checks must be deposited in our banks by the 21st, so that they will have time to clear and thus enable us to have a certified check on the 24th.

We know that you will cooperate.

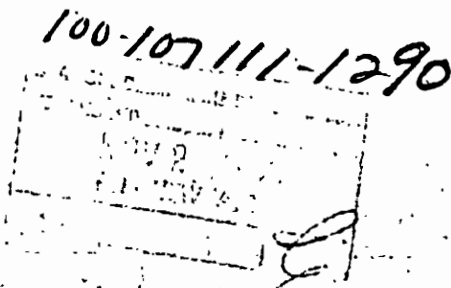

The meeting was officially opened by the chairman, JANET STEVENSON, and she explained the purpose of the meeting stating that the ROSENBERGS' death was a result of frame-up, murder, and intimidation.

REID ROBINSON spoke on the necessity of the Chicago Conference, to set policy and plan organization of a solid defense, with the broader forces brought into the campaign. ROBINSON then presented the literature that was on sale at this meeting.

BENJAMIN DREYFUS then spoke concerning the legal aspects of the SOBELL Case and he described his visits with MORTON SOBELL in Alcatraz. DREYFUS described SOBELL as a mild mannered man with a great love for America and a man who was dedicated to the preservation of peace and the well being of people. DREYFUS then told how this innocent man was "kidnapped" by the U.S. authorities, with the help of the Mexican Government all without due process of law. He stated that SOBELL was shanghaied back to a living death. He stated that all this was done under the myth of stealing atomic secrets. DREYFUS stated, however, that SOBELL was sent to prison solely because he happened to know JULIUS and ETHEL ROSENBERG and he stated that every effort of an enraged people of the U.S., and the rest of the world, must be put forth to rectify the total miscarriage of justice by a "fear ridden government."

WILLIAM L. PATTERSON spoke and stated that all people of the U.S. were being enslaved as was the Negro by a Fascist Government of the worst kind. PATTERSON stated that the very life of the working people was in jeopardy and unless the people rose up and ended this menace to mankind, all would be lost. PATTERSON compared the ROSENBERG and SOBELL Cases with WESLEY WELLS and he stated that the conspiracy to frame this Negro (WELLS) was the same procedure followed by the courts in the Rosenberg Case. PATTERSON stated that the judiciary system was "rotten to the core" and many more of the working class would be framed and murdered in the same manner in years to come. PATTERSON pleaded with the audience to go out and arouse the entire nation to action against the Fascist movement in the U.S.

JANET STEVENSON pleaded for funds to carry on the fight and for funds to financially support MORTON SOBELL's defense.

Subsequent to that date space in the building has been occupied by SRT Publications, Inc., publishers of "New World Review" formerly known as "Soviet Russia Today" which has been cited as a Communist Front by the Special Committee on Un-American Activities, House of Representatives, 6/25/42 and 3/29/44.

Strict care must be exercised so that the existence of this important source of evidence will not become known to any outside agency. It is also to be noted that because of the nature of this source of information it will be impossible to recontact the source regarding information furnished.

But in the course of our activities, which at the present time are primarily directed towards securing freedom for ~~Morton Sobell, we do at all times consider it our responsibility to add our efforts to the task of securing the future of Michael and Robbie Rosenberg.~~

On November 8, our New Jersey co-workers will present you with a substantial sum for your Trust Fund. Other local groups are awaiting your visit to do likewise.

We are firmly convinced that within the next few months, the total sum required by your Trust Fund will have been raised, the more so since we are not relenting ~~our efforts to dispose of the Death House Letter books~~ for the benefit of the Trust Fund.

We have followed with grave concern the recent difficulties placed in the way of the Rosenberg children but we do hope that the children's trustees, under your and Dr. Sharp's leadership will succeed in settling these problems to the best interest of the children.

Please rest assured of our continued and most active cooperation.

On 1/23/53, SHAIVITZ was interviewed by SA ROY E. OXFORD, at which time SHAIVITZ identified the exhibit and expressed his willingness to testify that he received it through the mail and subsequently turned it over to ROWLEY. It was at this time that SHAIVITZ scribbled the notation "received approx. Nov. 26, 1952 Sol Shavitiz", which appears on the attached photostats.

It is also noted that on 12/8/52 another copy of this exhibit was furnished by Mr. HARRY SINGERMAN, Room 346, Equitable Building, Baltimore, Maryland, who received it through the mail, to Dr. LEON SACKS, Room 1752 Nathanson Building, Baltimore, Maryland. I. ACTIVITIES

A. Meetings

According to Confidential Informant Detroit T-1 a meeting of the National Committee to Secure Justice in the Rosenberg Case (NCSJRC) was held [REDACTED]

for the purpose of discussing the ROSENBERG case and planning for future activities of the Committee. [REDACTED] 070

According to Mrs. BERENIECE BALDWIN, a self-admitted CP District 7 member from 1943 to 1951 and who has testified before the House Committee on Un-American Activities, ROSE ROSEN was a member of the Communist Party, District 7, during 1946, 1947 and 1948.

(DE 100-20938)

The Communist Party has been designated by the Attorney General of the United States pursuant to Executive Order 10450.

Informant T-1 reported on March 6, 1953 that a meeting of the ROSENBERG Committee had been held on February 27, 1953 at 4811 Sturtevant, Detroit, where DAVID ALMAN, Executive Secretary of the NCSJRC, was the featured speaker. ALMAN stated that the War Department wanted the ROSENBERGS dead and claimed that sixteen Congressmen and Senators are behind them in their fight for the ROSENBERGS. T-1 estimated that 20 to 25 persons were present [REDACTED] b7D

According to Confidential Informant Detroit T-2 a meeting sponsored by the NCSJRC was held on May 6, 1953 at Parkside Hall, 3119 Fenkell, Detroit, which featured as the guest speaker STEPHEN LOVE, Professor of Law, Northwestern University, at which approximately 250 people were in attendance. According to T-2, LOVE stated that the ROSENBERGS were convicted on circumstantial evidence and that law rather than justice determined their conviction. LOVE also contended that Judge KAUFMAN had been pro-Government in his conduct of the trial. A collection, which was taken for use in the ROSENBERGS' defense, [REDACTED] b7D

According to Confidential Informant Detroit T-7, ISADORE STARR was Chairman of the meeting and LOVE in his speech stated that the ROSENBERGS had been railroaded by the courts, particularly Judge KAUFMAN.

According to Confidential Informant Detroit T-4, ISADORE STARR, a Detroit attorney, was a member of the National Lawyers' Guild as of December 6, 1949 and had been since March 26, 1944.

The National Lawyers' Guild has been designated by the House Committee on Un-American Activities as a Communist front organization.

(DE 100-20938)

According to Confidential Informant Detroit T-5, the meeting held on May 6, 1953 was sponsored by the members of the Michigan Bar and many persons, [REDACTED] were present. b7D

According to Confidential Informants Detroit T-1, T-5, T-6, T-7 and T-8, a meeting "to save the ROSENBERGS" and sponsored by the Civil Rights Congress of Michigan (MCRD) was held at Parkside Hall, 3119 Fenkell, Detroit, on June 9, 1953. According to the Informants, two phonograph records of the ROSENBERG trial were played and MORRIS GLEICHER, Chairman, Detroit Chapter of the NCSJRC, was the speaker. GLEICHER pleaded for the ROSENBERGS and then made the collection speech. Reportedly 50 to 60 persons were present [REDACTED] IDA OLSHANSKY asked for volunteers for a delegation to Washington on Sunday, June 14, 1953, to parade in front of the White House in behalf of the ROSENBERGS. AARON SCHNEIDER, National Organizational Secretary of the NCSJRC, made the principal speech deriding the ROSENBERGS' trial and branding the case as a "farce". b7D

The Civil Rights Congress and affiliated organizations have been designated by the Attorney General of the United States pursuant to Executive Order 10450.

Confidential Informant Detroit T-9 stated that IDA OLSHANSKY was Chairman of the 12th Street Communist Club in 1947.

[REDACTED] Parkside Hall, 3119 Fenkell, Detroit, advised on June 9, 1953 that IDA OLSHANSKY, 15888 Wisconsin, [REDACTED] contacted [REDACTED] and gave [REDACTED] \$10.00 deposit to secure use of the hall on the evening of June 9, 1953 for a meeting of the ROSENBERG Committee. b7D

Confidential Informant Detroit T-3 reported that a meeting of the ROSENBERG Committee was held on June 16, 1953 at 12617 Old Mill Road, Detroit, the residence of LILLIAN ANGEL.

(DE 100-20938)

According to Confidential Informant Detroit T-12, LILLIAN ANGEL was a member of the Progressive Party of Michigan during 1949 and 1950 and, according to Informant T-12 and Confidential Informant Detroit T-13, another Governmental agency which conducts security investigations, was a member of the CRC during 1949, 1950 and 1951. U

The Progressive Party of Michigan, according to Confidential Informant Detroit T-14, on February 24, 1951, was organized and completely controlled by CP functionaries. U

[REDACTED] B1

Confidential Informant T-6 advised that a meeting held on September 22, 1953 at Parkside Hall, 3119 Fenkoll, Detroit, was sponsored by the ROSENBERG Committee. EMANUEL BLOCH, featured speaker, spoke of the unfair treatment given the ROSENBERGS and made pleas for donations so that the ROSENBERG children could have a decent living and good schooling. Approximately 200 to 225 persons were present.

[REDACTED] B2

According to Confidential Informant Detroit T-16, the above meeting was presided over by ISADORE STARR and Reverend CHARLES HILL gave the invocation. T-16 also reported that an appeal for funds was made [REDACTED] U B2

Confidential Informant Detroit T-17 advised that Reverend CHARLES HILL was National Vice-Chairman of the CRC in 1948. U

According to Confidential Informant Detroit T-18, of known reliability but whose original sources are unknown, BLOCH indicated in his speech that he was presently on a U

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nation-wide tour to raise money for a \$75,000 trust fund for the maintenance and education of the ROSENBERG children.

[REDACTED] Parkside Hall, 3119 Fenkell, Detroit, advised the Reporting Agent on September 22, 1953 that IDA OLSHANSKY and SIDNEY ROSEN had made the arrangements for hiring the hall for the NCSJRC for the evening of September 22, 1953. b7D

Confidential Informant Detroit T-19, whose original sources are unknown, reported on July 11, 1950 that SIDNEY ROSEN was at that time treasurer of the Progressive Party of Michigan.

B. Literature Disseminated in the Detroit Area

On February 17, 1953 Confidential Informant Detroit T-20 made available the following literature:

1. A one page announcement of a speech to be given by B. Z. GOLDBERG at the Mayfair Catering, 13305 Dexter, on December 20, 1952. GOLDBERG is described as "nationally syndicated columnist for the Jewish Day, a sponsor of the National Committee To Secure Justice in the Rosenberg Case". His speech was entitled "The Truth about the Rosenberg Case".
2. A pamphlet entitled "If You Knew" issued by the "National Labor Committee for Clemency for the Rosenbergs".
3. An open letter to President TRUMAN requesting clemency in the ROSENBERG case written by HENRY HITT CRANE and reprinted by the National Committee to Secure Justice in the Rosenberg Case, 1050 6th Avenue, New York, New York.

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4. A card announcing a meeting to be held on January 30, 1953 at the Jewish Cultural Center, at which WILLIAM L. PATTERSON, National Executive Secretary of the CRC, was to speak on the ROSENBERG case. The meeting was to be under the auspices of the CRC of Michigan, 918 Charlevoix Building, Detroit, Michigan, according to this card.
5. An unsigned postcard addressed to the President of the United States with a printed appeal for clemency for the ROSENBERGS. The bottom of the card was left open for signature and address.

On January 29, 1953 a pamphlet entitled "The People Speak Out - On the Rosenberg Case" was received from Confidential Informant T-1. This pamphlet was issued by the National Committee to Secure Justice in the Rosenberg Case, 1050 6th Avenue, New York 18, New York. The pamphlet contains excerpts of statements made by various people all over the United States and from foreign countries who were critical of the death sentence meted out to the ROSENBERGS. Some of the statements not only criticized the death sentence but also questioned the guilt of the ROSENBERGS.

On February 2, 1953 Confidential Informant Detroit T-22 made available a leaflet entitled "Ethel and Julius Rosenberg's Appeal for Clemency", issued by the National Committee to Secure Justice in the Rosenberg Case. T-22 also made available a flyer entitled, "An Appeal for Clemency for Ethel and Julius Rosenberg", issued by the National Committee to Secure Justice in the Rosenberg Case.

According to T-22, the above described literature was received at a rally held at the Jewish Cultural Center, 2705 Joy Road, Detroit, on January 30, 1953.

On December 1, 1952 Confidential Informant Detroit T-23 presented a thirty-one page pamphlet entitled, "To Secure Justice in the Rosenberg Case". This pamphlet was issued by the "National Committee to Secure Justice in the Rosenberg Case, 246 5th Avenue, New York 1, New York".

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and contained, in slightly abridged form, the articles published in the "National Guardian".

Confidential Informant Detroit T-24 advised that the "National Guardian" identifies itself as "the only publication officially endorsed by the National and State Organizations of the Progressive Party and American Labor Party.

The American Labor Party was cited on March 29, 1944 by the House Committee on Un-American Activities as a Communist Front organization.

Informant T-23 furnished on January 4, 1953 a throwaway captioned "The Rosenbergs Must Not Die" and issued by the CRC, 1442 Griswold, Detroit. The throwaway pertained to ETHEL and JULIUS ROSENBERG and the death sentence handed down to them. It states that the General Council of Ford Local 600, UAW-CIO after a thorough discussion on the ROSENBERG case at its regular meeting held on December 14, 1952, went on record demanding that President TRUMAN set aside the death sentence for the ROSENBERGS. The throwaway also contains a notice to come and hear "the truth about the ROSENBERG case" at the Mayfair Catering, 13305 Dexter, at 8:00 P.M. BEN ZION GOLDBERG, columnist on "Dare Tag" (The Day), was to be the main speaker.

According to Informant T-16, "Der Tag" is a Yiddish language newspaper printed in New York City which presents Orthodox, religious and Zionist viewpoints, and is legitimate in nature.

On February 4, 1953 Informant T-11 furnished a four page pamphlet issued by the National Committee to Secure Justice in the Rosenberg Case captioned, "Appeal for Clemency December 30, 1952".

On January 9, 1953 Confidential Informant Detroit T-25 made available a letter on the letterhead of the CRC of Michigan dated December 29, 1952 under the signature of ARTHUR MC PHAUL concerning the efforts on behalf of the

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ROSENBERGS. A petition was enclosed with this letter seeking funds for the National Lobby and Demonstration in Washington on January 5, 1953 for the ROSENBERGS' defense.

Informant T-25 advised that ARTHUR MC PHAUL was the Executive Secretary of the CRC of Michigan in 1952.

Confidential Informant Detroit T-26 on February 25, 1953 furnished a pamphlet entitled, "The Rosenberg Case - A Fact Sheet". The pamphlet was published by the National Committee to Secure Justice in the Rosenberg Case, 1050 6th Avenue, New York 1, New York.

On March 27, 1953 there was obtained from Informant T-8 a letter dated March 4, 1953. This mimeographed letter is on the stationery of the CRC of Michigan and carries the salutation "Dear Friend". This letter carries an appeal to the reader to wire or write the President of the United States DWIGHT D. EISENHOWER, White House, Washington, appealing for the ROSENBERGS. This letter carries the mimeographed signature of ANN SHORE, Director of Organization.

According to Informant T-11, ANN SHORE was Director of Organization of the Michigan CRC in 1951.

Informant T-23 on April 14, 1953 provided this office with a pamphlet entitled, "The Negro People Speak Out on the Rosenberg Case". The pamphlet contains various comments made by individuals regarding the ROSENBERG case. These individuals are described as responsible Negro leaders who have spoken in an effort to defend American justice by saving the ROSENBERGS' lives.

On March 30, 1953 there was received from Confidential Informant Detroit T-27 a printed sheet entitled, "Amicus Brief in the Rosenberg Case", issued by the National Committee to Secure Justice in the Rosenberg Case. This "Brief" solicited the names of individuals which will be presented to the United States Supreme Court petitioning that

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the ROSENBERG verdict be set aside and that a new trial be ordered. T-27 also provided a printed sheet entitled, "All Faiths Ask Clemency for the Rosenbergs", issued by the National Committee to Secure Justice in the Rosenberg Case. The article suggested that individuals write or wire the President and the Attorney General to secure clemency and grant the ROSENBERGS a new trial.

Confidential Informant Detroit T-21 on March 23, 1953 made available a leaflet issued by the National Committee to Secure Justice in the Rosenberg Case, 1050 6th Avenue, New York 18, New York, stating in part, "The United States Court of Appeals says there are serious questions in the Rosenberg Case".

On May 15, 1953 [REDACTED]

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[REDACTED] called at this office and advised that her husband had received a letter from an organization entitled, "National Committee to Secure Justice in the Rosenberg Case, 1050 6th Avenue, New York, New York," which letter had been mailed to them postmarked in Detroit. The letter consists of two printed sheets; one entitled, "The Rosenberg Case", and signed by STEPHEN LOVE; the second is a letter captioned "Dear Citizens of Michigan" and is signed by the "Committee for Clemency in the Rosenberg Case". Included in the envelope is a card upon which is mimeographed a statement as follows:

"I wish to add my name to the millions of others, including His Holiness Pope Pius XII, 1500 clergymen, Dr. ALBERT EINSTEIN, and Dr. HAROLD C. UREY in the appeal for Presidential clemency for JULIUS and ETHEL ROSENBERG. I urge upon President EISENHOWER that he reconsider his decision and commute the death sentence."

At the bottom of the card are spaces for name, address, city and title. At the bottom of the card are the words, "for identification only". The card bears no return address.

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On June 17, 1953 there was received from Confidential Informant T-1 the following pieces of literature:

1. "New Evidence in the Rosenberg Case". This is a 15 page pamphlet issued by the National Committee to Secure Justice in the Rosenberg Case.
2. "Would You Give Two Minutes To Save Two Lives And Spare The Misery Of These Children?" This is a four page pamphlet issued by the Detroit Committee for Clemency in the Rosenberg Case, 8430 Grand River Avenue, Detroit 4, Michigan.

According to Confidential Informant T-6, GERT SCHATZ was one of three individuals distributing petitions "to save the ROSENBERGS" at a concert by PAUL ROBESON, at Calvary Baptist Church, 1330 Jos Campau, Detroit, Michigan, on May 31, 1953. U

PAUL ROBESON is the Chairman of the Council on African Affairs, an organization which has been designated by the Attorney General of the United States pursuant to Executive Order 10450. U

Confidential Informant T-11 reported on March 4, 1953 that GERT SCHATZ was still active in the CP and the CRC. She is the wife of PHIL SCHATZ, presently under indictment for violation of the Smith Act. U

Confidential Informant Detroit T-10 reported that on June 5, 1953 ANN SHORE indicated that she had rounded up 100 people to distribute leaflets in the ROSENBERG case and that markets, individual homes and public events, such as fights and baseball games, would be covered. SHORE further stated that the main distribution was to take place on or after June 11, 1953. U

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Informant T-10 advised that on June 8, 1953 MORRY GLEICHER, Chairman, Detroit Chapter of the NCSJRC, was to print the pamphlet on the ROSENBERG case and that FAYE GROSSMAN and GERT SCHATZ were to distribute this literature at Ford Motor Company.

According to [REDACTED] FAYE GROSSMAN was Educational Director of the Oakland Club, CP District 7 in February 1950. b7d

Informant T-10 reported on June 9, 1953 that BEN KOCEL was to lead the distribution of literature on the ROSENBERG case, on the night shift of an unidentified automobile factory.

According to T-10, ANN SHORE indicated that 200,000 leaflets were to be distributed during that week.

BEN KOCEL was identified as a District 7 CP member by Mrs. BERENIECE BALDWIN at the House Committee on Un-American Activities hearings in Detroit on February 29, 1952.

Informant T-10 indicated on June 10, 1953 that DOROTHY MARSH was planning to cover the Highland Park area in the distribution of ROSENBERG literature. T-10 reported that LYDLA MATES was organizing a group for the distribution of ROSENBERG leaflets, which group was to report at the CRC office on June 11, 1953. According to T-10 IDA. OLSHANSKY was handling the arrangements for the distribution on June 12, 1953.

Confidential Informant Detroit T-29 advised that in August 1950 DOROTHY MARSH was Chairman of the McGraw Club, CP, District 7.


LYDLA MATES was identified as a District 7 CP member by Mrs. BERENIECE BALDWIN at the House Committee on Un-American Activities hearings held in Detroit on February 29, 1952.

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Informant T-10 indicated on June 10, 1953 that ~~ESTHER SHAPIRO~~ intended to distribute material on the ROSENBERGS in the downtown area of Detroit on June 11, 1953. According to T-10 ARTHUR MC PHAUL was to handle the distribution of ROSENBERG literature at the gates of the United States Rubber Company on June 15, 1953. U

Informant T-10 further indicated that FAYE GROSSMAN, together with five other unidentified individuals, intended distributing approximately 2,000 ROSENBERG leaflets at the Jeffries Housing Project on June 17, 1953. U

D. Picketing at Washington, D.C.

 According to Informant T-21, COLEMAN YOUNG is National Executive Secretary of the National Negro Labor Council. U

Informant T-21 advised that in 1952 the National Negro Labor Council was an organization that served the CP in its activities in the Trade Union field. U

On June 5, 1953 Confidential Informant T-10 disclosed that GERT SCHATZ had contacted the Pennsylvania Railroad regarding fares and accommodations for ten to twenty-five persons who would be going to Washington, D.C. on a ROSENBERG project. According to SCHATZ, the group was to leave on June 13, 1953 and return on June 15, 1953. U

Confidential Informant Detroit T-30 advised that GERT SCHATZ was planning to go to Washington, D.C. with the ROSENBERG delegation on the weekend of June 13, 1953. She planned on leaving Saturday, June 13, 1953 at about 5:30 to 6:30 P.M. and returning Monday morning at about 8:30 A.M. U

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Informant T-30 advised further that ANNA GANLEY was soliciting donations to help with the fares of those who would go.

ANNA GANLEY, according to T-11, as of December 1952, was active in the Michigan Committee for the Protection of Foreign Born. ANNA GANLEY is the wife of NAT GANLEY, presently under indictment for violation of the Smith Act.

According to Informant T-11, the Michigan Committee for the Protection of Foreign Born is the Michigan affiliate of the American Committee for the Protection of Foreign Born, an organization designated by the Attorney General of the United States pursuant to Executive Order 10450.

According to Informants T-10 and T-15, 40 persons were planning to participate in the Detroit delegates to Washington, D.C. for mass picketing of the White House, which was to take place on Sunday, June 14, 1953. The delegations were to register at Inspiration House, 1867 Kalorama Road, Washington, D.C. upon their arrival in Washington. According to the Informants, approximately 12 persons would be traveling by car, 4 by plane and 13 by rail. 13 others would be going by unknown means.

According to Informant T-20 approximately 200 persons were present and a recording of the ROSENBERG trial entitled, "The Rosenberg Story" was played. PATTERSON spoke on the "many ways that the ROSENBERG case could be approached" and contended that the prosecution had handpicked the jury and thus deprived the ROSENBERGS of due process of law.

Informants T-11 and T-25 reported that the CRC organized a caravan of cars on February 21, 1953 which caravan circulated through the Northern section of Detroit bearing signs protesting the ROSENBERG execution. According to the Informant, ARTHUR MC PHAUL had organized the caravan.

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A letter on the stationery of the Civil Rights Congress of Michigan carrying the salutation "Dear Friend" was made available by Informant T-8. The letter carries an appeal to the reader to wire or write the President, White House, Washington, appealing for the ROSENBERGS. The letter carries the mimeographed signature of ANNE SHORE, Director of Organization.

Informant T-28 provided a throwaway issued by the Civil Rights Congress, 1442 Griswold, Detroit, pertaining to ETHEL and JULIUS ROSENBERG and the death sentence given them. The throwaway contains a notice to attend an affair at 11305 Dexter, Detroit, on December 20, 1952 and hear "the truth about the ROSENBERG case".

On June 5, 1953, according to Informant T-10, ANNE SHORE, Director of Organization, Civil Rights Congress of Michigan, organized the distribution of 100,000 leaflets concerning the ROSENBERG case and ARTHUR MC PHAUL was to participate in the distribution of the literature at the gates of the United States Rubber Company on June 15, 1953.

SYNOPSIS OF FACTS:

The National Committee to Secure Justice in the Rosenberg Case continues to maintain a checking account at the Chase National Bank, New York City. Informant furnished information concerning the identity of numerous contributors to the Committee, details of which are set forth. The deposits in July amounted to \$12,900.84, August, \$3,935.53 and September, \$9,700.40. The balance in this account as of 9/30/53 amounted to \$1,016.01. The informant was also able to identify various payments made by the Committee during the months of July, August and September, 1953. The credit to this account during the period July 16, 1952 to September 30, 1953 amounted to \$303,861.05. Informant advised that on July 14, 1953 a checking account was opened at the Chase National Bank, New York City in the name of the Rosenberg Book Committee, 1050 Avenue of the Americas, New York City. BACKGROUND FOR NATIONAL COMMITTEE TO SECURE JUSTICE IN THE ROSENBERG CASE (NCSJ)

On March 29, 1951, JULIUS ROSENBERG and his wife, ETHEL, were convicted in the United States District Court for the Southern District of New York of conspiracy to commit espionage for the Soviet Union. On June 19, 1953 they were both executed at Sing Sing Prison, Ossining, New York.

On January 3, 1952 there was announced the formation of the National Committee to Secure Justice in the Rosenberg Case (NCSJ). Mr. HOWARD RUSHMORE, writer for the "New York Journal-American" made available a copy of a press release announcing the formation of this committee which was dated December 31, 1951. This committee is headed by JOSEPH BRJMIN, who is described as a journalist and author. With this committee he holds the rank of Chairman while DAVID ALAN is the Executive Secretary. The purpose of this committee was to raise money for the defense of the ROSENBERGS and to arouse public sympathy for them.

THE ROSENBERG BOOK COMMITTEE

T-1, of known reliability, on July 14, 1953 advised that a checking account was opened at the Times Square Branch of the Chase National Bank, New York City in the name of the Rosenberg Book Committee, 1050 Avenue of the Americas, New York City. It will be noted that this is the same address used by the NCSJ. The signers for this account are SARAH LITCHENBERG and NORIA ARONSON.

The "National Guardian" dated June 15, 1953 stated that the "Death House Letters of Ethel and Julius Rosenberg, a one dollar book of the letters of the couple to each other, their children, their attorneys and others, came off the press June 11. Published by Jero Publishing Company. The book is distributed by the NCSJ, 1050 Sixth Avenue, New York City. Profits will be held in trust for the Rosenberg Children, Michael and Robbie"

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PUBLISHED FINANCIAL STATEMENT

The following article concerning the moneys collected by the NCSJ and disposition thereof was reported in the "New York Times" of October 11, 1953 and is set out as follows:

"ROSENBERG FUND REPORTS

"Propaganda Spending Was Heavy in Case of Executed Spies

"Chicago, Oct. 10 (UP)—The National Committee to Secure Justice in the Rosenberg Case reported today it spent almost twice as much on propaganda as it did in actually defending Julius and Ethel Rosenberg against spy charges for which they were executed at Sing Sing.

"Joseph Brainin, committee chairman, said the group raised \$302,530 from public contributions, sale of trial transcripts and other literature. It spent \$71,815 for leaflets, pamphlets, petitions and postcards to \$29,541 for legal fees and expenses and \$11,323 for legal printing.

"Mr. Brainin gave the report at a meeting here which was set up to win a new trial for Morton Sobell, the Rosenbergs' conspirator."

We have audited your books and records for the period of November 1951 to August 31, 1953. In connection therewith we submit the attached statement of assets and liabilities and a Statement of Income and Expenses for the above-mentioned period.

Our audit included an examination of all the cancelled checks and a reconciliation of the cash in the bank with the monthly bank statements. We made test checks and examinations of invoices, petty cash slips and receipt books. These examinations were made in conformity with accepted accounting standards and to a degree which we felt were sufficient.

The figures on the Statements which are herewith submitted were taken from your books and records. We did not confirm by direct correspondence the assets and liabilities as of August 31, 1953 that appear on the Statements.

Subject to the above comments, the attached exhibits correctly reflect the Statement of Assets and Liabilities as at August 31, 1953 and the Statement of Income and Expenses shows the financial operations for the period of November 1951 to August 1953.

** In addition to the printing of many thousands of form letters for mailing purposes, this expenditure made possible the printing and circulation of approximately 6 million leaflets and pamphlets and half a million petitions and postcards.

*** All told the Committee sent some 10 organizers out into the field at one time or another during its two year campaign. Trips for organization and investigations ran from 3 days to 6 weeks, reaching hundreds of communities and covering many hundreds of thousands of miles.

**** The Committee purchased directly about 250 separate ads for a total of about 40,000 lines.

***** Most funds for the Rosenberg children went directly to Mr. Bloch rather than through our Committee. The above sum went directly to the children for camp expenses, clothes, gifts, etc. Income from the Death House Letters is kept in a separate fund and is not shown here. Income received by the Committee for the Children's Fund is likewise kept in a separate trust account, and is not included in this report.
