A review of the letterhead memorandum furnished by relet discloses you have characterized the National Committee to Secure Justice for Morton Sobell as having been designated pursuant to Executive Order 10450. For your information, this characterization is incorrect and your attention is directed to the proper characterization for captioned organization as set out in SAC Letter 50-2 (F).

"JEAN FRANTJIS, a member of the Planning Committee of the Philadelphia Sobell Committee, chaired the meeting and she introduced Reverend ALVA TOMPKINS, Pastor of the Olivet Presbyterian Church, Chicago, Illinois, as the principal speaker. In her introduction, FRANTJIS said that the small number of people present at the meeting was no indication of the great interest in the case of MORTON SOBELL and she said that the small turnout was probably attributable to the Jewish holidays.

"TOMPKINS, at the start of his speech, said he did not care about the small turnout; that the important thing was for him to reach the people present. He said that he had been to Washington, D. C., attempting to obtain clemency for MORTON SOBELL through both executive and judicial channels, and that he planned to again visit Washington, D. C., before he returned to his church in Chicago.

"TOMPKINS said that the important thing at the present time is to get MORTON SOBELL out of jail either on the basis of executive tlemency or by obtaining a new trial He said that it was not important whether for him. people trying to get SOBELL out of jail thought he was guilty or not, since SOBELL's innocence could be established later. TOMPKINS said that he had reviewed the transcript of MORTON SOBELL's trial and he thought personally that SOBELL was not guilty of conspiracy to commit espionage and he emphasized that SOBELL was convicted solely on the testimony of a known perjuror, MAX ELITCHER. TOMPKINS continued that he had read the book 'The Atom Spy Hoax' by WILLIAM A. REUBEN and after reading this book, he was also convinced that JULIUS and ETHEL ROSENBERG were also not guilty of conspiracy to commit espionage.

"TOMPKINS continued that he had initiated an appeal to clergymen in the Chicago area, urging them to join in the campaign to obtain clemency for MORTON SOBELL. He said that he had sent out 1,000 pieces of literature in

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"connection with this clergy appeal in the Chicago area and had received 240 responses. TOMPKINS said it is necessary for the Philadelphia Sobell Committee and others who are working for clemency for SOBELL to spread word of SOBELL's innocence to church groups, trade unions, and other organizations. TOMPKINS pointed out that SOBELL has been in prison for ten years, which is a long time, and he said that SOBELL should be released now whether or not he was guilty.

"TOMPKINS said that many members of his congregation are ex-convicts and that his church in Chicago is located in a 'tenderloin district' and it was his observation that jail had done no good for any of these ex-convicts.

"During TOMPKINS' speech, he made reference to the Sacco-Vancetti and TOM MOONEY Cases and he said that these individuals were victims of miscarriages of justice. TOMPKINS also said that MOONEY, after his release from prison, became a 'big mouth and a person to be avoided' because jail had destroyed him, and TOMPKINS was afraid that jail might destroy MORTON SOBELL. TOMPKINS did not appear to be familiar with the Sacco-Vancetti Case, as was evidenced by his repeated mispronounciations of their names.

"During his speech, TOMPKINS stated that some of his relatives were in the audience and he added that he had not seen these people for several years. TOMPKINS did not refer to these relatives by name, nor did he single them out in the audience.

"After TOMPKINS' speech, a question and answer period was held and one of the question and answer period was held and one of the questions directed to TOMPKINS was why the American Civil Liberties Union refused to take a stand on the MORTON SOBELL Case. 



A STATEMENT ON THE CASE OF MORTON SOBELL

The undersigned are American citizens who believe that the sentence of Morton Sobell should now be commuted. Sobell was convicted of conspiring with others to transmit to the Soviet Union writings and information relating to the national defense of the United States and was sentenced on April 1, 1951 to serve thirty years in Federal Prison.

Morton Sobell was tried with Julius and Ethel Rosenberg, who were convicted of espionage in connection with the atomic bomb and who were sentenced to death and later executed. Sobell, however, was never implicated in any way with involvement in the atomic espionage for which the Rosenbergs were convicted. This fact was confirmed by the judge who sentenced Sobell.

This statement is not concerned with the Rosenberg conviction. The undersigned are and consistently have been convinced anti-Communists. None is associated with any organization, committee, or group of any kind concerned either with the case of the Rosenbergs or that of Sobell, nor are any of the undersigned connected in any way with Morton Sobell or any members of his family. After study of the case, we believe that the following considerations warrant a commutation of the very heavy sentence Sobell is now serving.

- 1) Sobell was never implicated with atomic espionage for which the Rosenbergs were convicted.
- The charges against Sobell, supported mainly by the testimony of one man, Max Elitcher, were that he had solicited information, and had on one occasion taken something which looked like a can of film to Julius Rosenberg. No specific item of information supposed to have been secured by him or transmitted by him to anyone else is specified in the record. The case against him, therefore, is vague in content and slender in proof. The possibility that a trip to Mexico which he and his family took should be construed as flight cannot be ignored, though it is subject to various interpretations.
- 3) Whether or not the judge and prosecution made sufficient efforts to provide a fair trial, we ought to recognize that the emotions surrounding the trial of the Rosenbergs and the fact that Sobell's case was tried with theirs made it difficult to separate the two cases and to recognize the very different character of the two charges and the evidence introduced to support them respectively.
- 4) Sobell has already served, with good conduct, nearly eight years in prison, s.x of them in Alcatraz.
- As Americans we are fully aware of the threat of communism to our freedom and way of life. Any attack on that freedom from without or within must be resisted. Nevertheless, one of the factors which makes that freedom so precious is its capacity to practice a discipline and humane administration of justice precisely in those cases where emotions are aroused which make it difficult to remain objective about the merits of a specific case. We believe a commutation of the Sobell Sentence would demonstrate our national faith in that freedom.

A statement by Irwin Edelman, the "intruder" who in 1958 faced the resistance and sabotage of the Rosenberg defense committee in his almost successful effort to save Julius & Ethel Rosenberg from death.

I SUBMIT a most serious charge against the leaders of the Sobell defense committee. I accuse them of deliberately holding back from the courts of law and the court of public opinion certain vital facts which seven years ago could have saved the Rosenbergs and today can force the liberation of Morton Sobell. I am well aware that this charge will abock some good people but it is high time that good people are shocked.

In November 1952 I published a pamphlet in which I displayed what—at best—was a shocking blunder committed in the Rosenberg-Sobell trial by the Rosenberg defense attorney, Emanuel H. Bloch. The pamphlet attracted the attention of a Nashville attorney, Fyke Farmer, who went in for research and uncovered additional important defense errors of which I as a layman had no conception. When he brought them to the attention of Bloch and the Committee heads, they displayed not the slightest inclination to make use of them.

The upshot was that, after making every reasonable effort to get Bloch and/or the Committee to act, Mr. Farmer, a few days before the scheduled execution, filed an appeal in my name as "next friend" of the Rosenbergs. Trial Judge Kaufman angrily denied it, calling us "intruders and interlopers." But Supreme Court Justice Douglas looked into it and ordered that world-stirring stay which almost saved their lives. The ostensible friends of the Rosenbergs and the Government were at the time extricated from a most serious predicament by the Attorney General's unprecedented call for a special session of the full Supreme Court. The Court immediately rushed back from its vacation, its majority cancelled the Douglas order, and the Rosenbergs were quickly killed.

In the opinion of Mr. Farmer (and other competent attorneys I have spoken to) the discovered errors should long have been included in the appeals to free Sobell. My efforts in 1954 to interest Helen Sobell in this, and in 1956-57 to interest the Committee and its lawyers, were fruitless. The inescapable conclusion I have been led to is that those in charge of the Committee are content with the house parties, the \$50 and \$100 a plate Dinners, and other of their fundraising activities, and that they would be very unhappy to have Morton Sobell freed, particularly on the kind of legal grounds that would expose how the Rosenbergs could have been saved.

The trial and execution of the Rosenbergs has implanted dangerous anti-Semitic and other confusion in tens of millions of minds, confusion that could erupt with volcanic fury if a demagogue decided to play on it in a time of national or social tension. It is primarily for the purpose of clearing the confusion that I have been working for close to seven years now on a booklength report of The Suppressed Facts in the Rosenberg-Sobell Case—that is its tentative title. The shocking facts I present there constitute an indictment of both the avowed friends and the avowed foes of the Rosenbergs. In the real crime against the murdered, there is a complex of motivations, all of them sordid and ugly.

The overall conclusion from the facts is that the Rosenbergs were caught as in a vise between rot on the Right and rot on the Left, and crushed. Within the limits of this brochure I can in this connection only point to a highly suggestive fact—the long silence of the subsequently most vocal defenders—the incredible fact that the Daily Worker, the Jewish Morning Freiheit, the west coast People's World, the weekly National Guardian, and other reputedly crusading leftwing publications, never reported the arrest of the Rosenbergs and Sobell, never mentioned the pre-trial developments, and published not a word about the case during the entire 23-day period that the trial lasted.

Suggestive also in this connection is that the National Guardian refused a paid ad for the pamphlet in which I exposed the mismanagement of the defense and to this day has maintained a tight silence on the issues raised.

Seven years is a long time. Why is my report not published?

The answer, I am sorry to say, is that I am anything but a success in the matter of rounding up the help I need for the effective and speedy completion of the project. I have been and am working with the flimsiest resources, with no typing or other secretarial or editorial assistance whatsoever. That is why the pace of my progress has been painfully slow. What in all this time has kept me going, what stopped me from tearing up the manuscript in disgust was the fact that men of acknowledged competence and integrity, men like Lewis Mumford and the late Lion Feuchtwanger and Albert Einstein had taken the trouble to read what I had written and to tell me that they were much impressed.

In the summer of 1954 Albert Einstein, after reading an early draft, said in his letter of comment that he saw eye-to-eye with me on "the lamentable role the legal defense has played, a behavior bordering on treachery." His letter of comment on a later draft opened with:

"I have read carefully everything you have sent me. Your account of the proceedings in the Rosenberg case I find excellent, also your analysis of the political background. I believe there are few people who could fail to learn something essential. You have convinced me that—from the viewpoint of restoring sanity to our political climate—one must not let this case rest."

More recently, in March 1958, the Minister of the First Unitarian Church of Los Angeles, Mr. Stephen H. Fritchman, in his letter of comment wrote, "I enjoyed far more than these words will convey the [reading of the] manuscript. . . . You have done a tremendous service to the cause of human justice in preparing this material. I am appalled at the implications. . . ."

The 9-year dialogue between the Rosenberg-Sobell "friends" and their foes has produced hardly a ripple in the climate of opinion on the case. There is a third side to the Rosenberg-Sobell case which urgently needs telling. It has been and is my firm intention to do so. But to do it, effectively and to do it in time, I need help—financial, secretarial, editorial. The job I am trying to do should be everybody's business.

Confidential sources, who have furnished reliable information in the past, advised on May 25, 1960, that a public meeting of the CSJMS was held at 8:15 P.M. on May 24, 1960, at the Community Church of New York, 40 East 35th Street, New York City. Norman Thomas made a plea for annesty for all political prisoners, stating that the Communists were being "picked on" and caying that the sentence of Sobell was too severe.

Congressman Randall S. Harmon said that he thought that if he were an attorney, he could free Sobell and gave a lengthy explanation of his side of what he termed the "Front Porch Case" wherein he was criticized for using his front porch as his office.

Howard Radest made a plea for funds in order to purchase a full-page ad in the "New York Times" at a cost of \$5,400.00. A collection was taken up and the receipts were announced as being over \$950.00. It was stated that additional contributions should be mailed to Dr. Horace Kallen, care of the Sobell office. It was announced that the Reverend Thomas Kilgore was unable to attend because of illness.

As the correspondent has indicated in his letter, the National Committee to Secure Justice for Morton Sobell (NCSJMS) has been cited in the House Committee on Un-American Activities publication "Guide to Subversive Organizations and Publications" as a communist front organization. In addition, it is also the subject of a security investigation in which New York is office of origin, New York file 100-107111.

The American Friends Service Committee is a pacifist group which has opposed military conflict, preparedness and drafting of men since its inception in 1917. It was the subject of investigation in 1942; however, it was found not to be engaged in subversive activities.

Dear Mr. Hoover:

At the 12th Annual Topeka Institute of International Relations, held with the cooperation of the American Friends Service Committee, many items of free literature were available to those in attendance. One of the items was a tabloid-style paper called "Today's Verdict", published by the National Committee to Secure Justice for Porton Sobell. After reading this paper, issue of July 1959, I began to think that somewhere I had seen reference to this organization as a Communist-front or Communist-dominated group. Likewise, some of the names appearing as supporters of the Cause seemed to ring a bell in my head.

Sure enough, I found this organization listed in the Guide to Subversive Organizations and Publications of the House Committee on Un-American Activities as well as some of the sister groups, i.e. the Chicago Sobell Committee. Also, the Committee report "Trial By Treason" (Heuse Document No. 206) has quite extensive coverage of these organizations and individuals, as you probably know.

Since this could be a possible cause for a great deal of embarrassment to the local Institute coumittee, if well-meaning citizens send in their money to this organization and later find it to be rather left-wing in nature, we are trying to get the straight facts together.

I would like to have your personal opinion, based on the information you have, as to whether or not this National Committee to Secure Justice for Morton Sobell is, in fact, Communist-dominated or a Communist-front group. Anything you could say with regard to this particular publication would, also, be greatly appreciated.

These papers were distributed by the Peace Director of the Friends Service Committee. I asked him if the Friends Service Committee supported this organization and he told me that it did not, but he personally did.

Another source, who has furnished reliable information in the past, stated on February 8, 1954 that during the fall of 1953 the Boston Committee to Secure Clemency in the Rosenberg Case changed its name to the National Rosenberg-Sobell Committee. This same source stated on March 5, 1954 that the National Rosenberg-Sobell Committee was last active in the Greater Boston, Massachusetts area in July, 1953.

A third source, who has furnished reliable information in the past, advised in February, 1958 that the Committee to Secure Justice for Morton Sobell was activated during the first part of 1958 in Boston.

Under the chairmanship of Professor of Law William Kunstler, of New York Law School, on Tuesday evening, May 24th, in the Community Church, in New York, there was a mass meeting of about 500 people, in conjunction with the fight to free Morton Sobell.

April 1, 1951, Morton Sobell was sentenced to a 30 year jail term on the charge of engaging in explonage for the loylet Union.

Those the addressed the meeting, without exception, emphasized that even if-Sobell did commit the crime with which he was charged, - and of which he has maintained all along that he is innocent - the punishment is gruesome and that there was no just ground for sentencing him for 30 years. 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
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

Subject: The Gus Hall address (The Summit and what now?) in the Brunswick Room, Andrews Botel, Minneapolis, Minnesota.

The meeting was scheduled to begin at 8PM and got started at $^{-2}$ \sim 815PM.

SAM DAVIS introduced GUS HALL. DAVIS described GUS HALL as a great fighter for Communism, who 26 years ago took part in the great Minneapolis strikes, who was sent to prison for Communist beliefs, but who in spite of it has remained loyal to the party and now the party is moving forward under his wise leadership and courage.

The failure of the Summit is the result of EISENHOWER's double dealing said HALL. EISKNHOWER talked peace but got caught preparing for war. HALL said EISKNHOWER was like JOSHUA Who sent in spies to search out the land. That is what the the U-2 spie plane was doing. 

Attorney Marshall Perlin, representing the attorneys in the case reported that very shortly they will enter the courts with a request for a new trial and a challenge of the legality of the 30 year sentence based on important points of law. He also referred to investigatory work under way, in the hope of obtaining the basis for court motions in addition to those already in preparation.

Great encouragement was expressed at the results of the clergy appeals through-out the country. The Chicago clergy appeal, as initiated by Rev. Alva Tompkins was recognized as the most successful to date. Appointments in Washington are now being planned by Rev. Tompkins to present the appeals of 225 Chicago clergy. This will be the first presentation. Appeals from the rest of the country will be presented later.

One of the most exciting reports was of the work in Washington and of the sharp gains of support and concern in the Senate and Bouse and on the Washington scene generally. Wany specific suggestions for increasing the concern were discussed and adopted. Still one of the most effective means is writing and visiting our individual representatives. We shall increase our efforts to encourage more and more people to do so.

She claimed that MAX ELITCHER, the prosecution witness, an admitted perjurer, told only of the telephone calls between himself, SOBELL, and ROSENBERGS and of his visit to the SOBELL home in New York, and had related a conversation between himself and SOBELL in which SOBELL, speaking about JULIUS ROSENBERG, had stated that ROSENBERG had spoken to ELIZABETH BENTLEY on the telephone but that he did not think she knew who he was and therefore everything was okay.

NEWMAN also stated that she knew the ROSENBERGS were innocent because they were never really proven guilty. She said that they were killed because they took the Fifth Amendment and death was their punishment during the McCARTHY era.

NEWMAN declared that she began fighting for SOBELL's retrial in 1953 after she attended a mass meeting in Los Angeles and that there are now some twenty-five major cities which have organized committees.

"In siding at the first United Nations debate with Argentina's claim that her sovereignty has been infringed by the manner in which EICHMANN was removed," the United States is now demanding of Israel a higher nobility than the United States Supreme Court's interpretation of our Constitution requires of American states....

"Moreover, the United States has in this decade, proposed a different standard for itself than it now proposes for Israel. Our government has taken the position that it has the right to try a Communist spy Allegedly Ridmapped on foreign territory with American consilvance.

"Morton Sobell arguing that he had been so midnapped in Maxleo, claimed that This conviction would be a nullity if it were proved that the government thus secured jurisdiction over his present in violation of United States law and international agreement. The government answers that, even if United States officials had participated in Sobell's alleged kidnapping, the court in a criminal case, unlike a civil case, would still have jurisdiction over his person as long as he was physically present at the trial."

"Now we have the United States saying that it may participate in the kidnapping abroad of a Communist spy for trial here, but that Israel cannot seize-rithout adequate reparations-one of the greatest mass murderers in history."




