COMMITTEE TO SECURE JUSTICE
FOR MARTIN SOBELL

A source, who has furnished reliable information in the past, advised on June 27, 1960, that Helen Sobell, wife of Morton Sobell, was the featured speaker at a Chicago Sobell Committee meeting held on June 25, 1960, at 1316 East Madison Park, Chicago, Illinois.

Sobell stated that she had arrived in Chicago on the morning of June 24, 1960, and that she had just visited Minneapolis, Cleveland, and Detroit. According to Sobell, since arriving in Chicago she had met with photographers and newsmen and one newsman, Irving Kupcinet, a reporter for the "Chicago Sun-Times" had taken her to lunch. She said that Kupcinet, who has a television show called "At Random," promised to have her on this show soon.

Sobell said that she had also appeared for two minutes on Television Station WBBM, Channel 2, and answered a number of questions concerning her work on behalf of her husband, Morton Sobell, and their future plans if and when he is released.

Sobell had a few copies of the June 20, 1960, edition of the "New York Times" which contains an advertisement on behalf of Morton Sobell. She said that this advertisement was paid for by a group of sponsors who held a big church meeting in May, 1960, and that the Sobell Committee in Detroit is planning to have 20,000 copies of it printed. Also contained in the advertisement was a letter from Congressman William Meyer of Vermont which apparently was written sometime ago on behalf of Morton Sobell.


Sobell announced that a large three day meeting was to be held on November 19, 20, 21, 1960, in Washington, D. C. According to Sobell, among those attending this meeting will be members of the clergy and the professions from all over the United States, and it is hoped a large

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group of Congressmen. Sobell said that appeals will be sent from the meeting to the White House and the Justice Department and that these appeals should make a big impression.

Sobell said that, if the appeals are not successful in getting amnesty for Morton Sobell, an appeal can be made on behalf of Morton in April, 1961, because he will have, as of then, served one-third of his sentence.

Sobell stated that the law firm of attorney Frank Donner is representing Morton Sobell and that on June 27, 1960, she will be in Washington, D.C., and she will find out, at that time, whether or not they will be able to obtain the services of a prominent attorney there.

Morton Sobell

Morton Sobell was convicted in the United States District Court, Southern District of New York, on March 29, 1951, of conspiracy to commit espionage on behalf of the Soviet Union. Sobell on April 5, 1951, was sentenced to serve thirty years imprisonment and is currently serving his sentence at the United States Penitentiary, Atlanta, Georgia.

CHICAGO SOBELL COMMITTEE, aka., Chicago
Committee to Secure Justice for Morton Sobell

A source on December 3, 1959, advised that the Chicago Sobell Committee, which is also known as Chicago Committee to Secure Justice for Morton Sobell, and was formerly known as Chicago Rosenberg-Sobell Committee and Chicago Committee to Secure Justice in the Rosenberg Case, is a small group of volunteers who do Sobell fund raising and programing in the Chicago area. The Chicago Committee, since its inception in 1952, has been an affiliate of the Committee to Secure Justice for Morton Sobell, which is also known as the National Committee to Secure Justice for Morton Sobell and was formerly known as the National Rosenberg-Sobell Committee and the National Committee to Secure Justice in the Rosenberg Case, with headquarters in New York.

Source said that the office of the Chicago Sobell Committee is currently located at 20 West Jackson Boulevard, Chicago, Illinois,

Another source advised during October, 1959, that the Chicago Sobell Committee maintains a bank account at the Amalgamated Trust and Savings Bank, 111 South Dearborn, Chicago, Illinois, and that DAVID SOLTKER is listed in this bank account as the Secretary of the Chicago Sobell Committee.

The above information cannot be made public except in the usual proceedings following the issuance of a subpoena duces tecum.

The files of the Special Committee on Un-American Activities House of Representatives, as reviewed in August, 1943, reflected that the names of DAVID and GERTRUDE SOLTKER appear as signers on the Communist Party election petition submitted to the State of Illinois in 1940.

Another source in 1943 advised that GERTRUDE SOLTKER, as of 1943, was a member of the Communist Party.

Another source furnished information in 1949 which indicates that at that time SYLVIA LEVINSON was Vice Chairman of the Congress of American Women.

The Communist Party and the Congress of American Women have been designated by the Attorney General of the United States pursuant to Executive Order #10450.

COMMITTEE TO SECURE JUSTICE
FOR MORTON SOBELL

"Following the execution of atomic spies Ethel and Julius Rosenberg in June, 1953, the 'Communist campaign assumed a different emphasis. Its major effort centered upon Morton Sobell', the Rosenbergs' codefendant. The National Committee to Secure Justice in the Rosenberg Case - a communist front which had been conducting the campaign in the United States - was reconstituted as the National Rosenberg-Sobell Committee at a conference in Chicago in October, 1953 and 'then as the National Committee to Secure Justice for Morton Sobell in the Rosenberg case'"

("Guide to Subversive Organizations and Publications" dated January 2, 1957, issued by the House Committee on Un-American Activities, page 60.)

In September, 1954, the name "National Committee to Secure Justice for Morton Sobell" appeared on literature issued by the Committee. In March, 1955, the current name, "Committee to Secure Justice for Morton Sobell," first appeared on literature issued by the Committee.

The 1959-1960 Borough of Manhattan telephone directory lists the "Committee to Secure Justice for Morton Sobell" as being located at 940 Broadway, New York, New York.

The "Morning Freiheit" of June 19, 1960, on page 5, columns 1-5, reflected an article by S. D. LEVINE, entitled: "When The World Cried Out For the Rosenbergs".

The article opens with: "This Sunday, June 19th, will be seven years since the two innocent martyrs, Ethel and Julius Rosenberg were executed." Levine repeats part of the history of the case. He ~~repeated~~ the witnesses and evidence used against them in the trial. "The Trial was held at a time when McCarthy-hysteria had reached its pinnacle and while the Korean War was on. Only at such a time of hysteria and witch-hunting could these two martyrs have been convicted on the basis of such insignificant, often fantastic proof."...."This barbaric sentence against the Rosenbergs caused a tremendous storm in the United States and throughout the world. In the United States a national committee was organized to demand justice for the innocent victims. Tremendous mass demonstrations were held in dozens of cities and towns across the land. Tans of thousands of people participated in the picket lines in front of the White House in Washington. Broad strata of the people voiced their anger and displeasure over the gruesome sentence."

"But the leading circles in Washington did not listen to the protests. Appeals to the Supreme Court and to President Eisenhower were of no avail..." Levine quotes from some of the Rosenberg letters, and concludes:

"The Rosenbergs went to their death courageously with a profound realization of their martyrdom and with a sacred belief in a better future for humanity".

The following report is from the "Morning Freiheit" of June 21, 1960, on page 2, columns 4-5:

Seventh Anniversary Of The Death Of The
Rosenbergs Marked At Their Graves

An impressive and very moving memorial gathering was held on Sunday afternoon at the graves of martyrs Ethel and Julius Rosenberg on the seventh anniversary of their death.

Among the friends and followers present was Julius' mother, who never took her eyes off the two modest tomb-stones with the traditional Hebrew inscriptions: Yonah Rosenberg and Ethel Rosenberg.

Ben Ratner, a friend of the family, opened the ceremony with the prayer for the dead and made a short talk about the Rosenbergs. A close friend of Ethel and Julius spoke about them and about the great idealism which filled their short lives. She also read from John Wexley's book describing a few moving moments in the last days of their courageous and honorable lives and about how, to the last minute, they were certain that, finally, it would be realized that they are innocent.

Edith Segal read a few of her powerful poems concerning the Rosenberg tragedy. The poems made a profound impression on the people.

The assemblage placed flowers on the graves and, with tears in their eyes and deeply moved, left the cemetery.

A. CHARACTERIZATIONS

Committee To Secure Justice For Morton Sobell

"Following the execution of atomic spies ETHEL and JULIUS ROSENBERG in June, 1953, the 'Communist campaign assumed a different emphasis. Its major effort centered upon MORTON SOBELL,' the ROSENBERGS' codefendant. The National Committee to Secure Justice in the Rosenberg case - a Communist front which had been conducting the campaign in the United States - was reconstituted as the National Rosenberg-Sobell Committee at a conference in Chicago in October, 1953, and 'then as the National Committee to Secure Justice for Morton Sobell in the Rosenberg case'" u

("Guide to Subversive Organizations and Publications" dated January 2, 1957, issued by the House Committee on Un-American Activities, page 60.) u

In September, 1954, the name "National Committee to Secure Justice for Morton Sobell" appeared on literature issued by the Committee. In March, 1955, the current name, "Committee to Secure Justice for Morton Sobell," first appeared on literature issued by the Committee. u

The 195⁵¹-1960 Borough of Manhattan telephone directory lists the "Committee to Secure Justice for Morton Sobell" as being located at 940 Broadway, New York, New York. u

JULIUS and ETHEL ROSENBERG and MORTON SOBELL were convicted in the United States District Court, Southern District of New York, on March 29, 1951, on a charge of Conspiracy to

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commit Espionage on behalf of the Union of Soviet Socialist Republics (USSR). The ROSENBERGS were sentenced to death on April 5, 1951, and MORTON SOBELL was sentenced to 30 years imprisonment on the same date. JULIUS and ETHEL ROSENBERG were legally executed at Sing Sing Prison, Ossining, New York, on June 19, 1953. MORTON SOBELL is currently serving his sentence at the United States Penitentiary, Atlanta, Georgia.

NO SWP

The Communist Party, United States of America (CP, USA), and the Socialist Workers Party (SWP) have been designated by the Attorney General of the United States pursuant to Executive Order 10450.

The Committee to Secure Justice for Morton Sobell, the New York Committee to Secure Justice for Morton Sobell and the Sobell Committee will be referred to by the initials CSJMS, NYCSJMS and SC where appropriate in this report.

B. PURPOSE OF THE COMMITTEE

On July 18, 1960, NY T-1 advised that the CSJMS was an organization engaged in activities to secure the release of MORTON SOBELL from prison. NY T-1 advised that MORTON SOBELL had been convicted of Conspiracy to commit Espionage with his codefendants JULIUS and ETHEL ROSENBERG and had been sentenced to serve 30 years in prison. The informant said that the Committee had been originally formed approximately 10 years previously to secure the freedom of all three persons, but that a few years later it was decided that concentration of the efforts of the Committee should be on MORTON SOBELL, who was still living, and that after he was freed, the work of the Committee would concentrate on vindicating ETHEL and JULIUS ROSENBERG.





DWIGHT D. EISENHOWER, President of the United States,
for the period January 1, 1959, to January 1, 1960".
This release, which contains quotes from prominent indi-
viduals, the clergy, may be quoted in part as follows: u

"Summary of Reasons for Executive Action

"The many people who have been appealing in
Morton Sobell's behalf have given varied reasons for
their actions. They include the following facts:

"1. The trial was held in the midst of the
tension of the Korean War. Not only did it take place
when McCarthyism was at its height, but one of the
prosecutors was Roy Cohn, who rose to become McCarthy's
aid partly as a result of the notoriety he received in
this trial.

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"2. The United States Supreme Court has never reviewed the case or passed upon the merits of the trial below. 4

"3. Morton Sobell was not accused of atomic espionage. 1

"4. Judge Jerome Frank of the U. S. Court of Appeals stated that Morton Sobell should have had a new trial because his case should have been separated from the atomic espionage conspiracy accusations against the Rosenbergs.

"5. Only one witness gave any testimony connecting Morton Sobell with the conspiracy to commit espionage charge.

"6. This witness, Max Elitcher, was tainted. He admitted on the witness stand that he had been guilty of perjury on another matter, that the FBI knew about his perjury, and that he was testifying in hopes that he would not be prosecuted. He never was. His was accomplice testimony, generally regarded as weak or suspect.

"7. Elitcher's testimony was uncorroborated. It was replete with contradictions, inconsistencies, and implausibilities.

"8. The credibility of the witness against Sobell has never been examined by a higher court.

"9. No specific overt acts were listed against Sobell in the indictment.

"10. It was not claimed in the trial that Sobell ever gave or received any classified information.

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"11. The Appeals Court at one point alluded to the 'wholly reprehensible' conduct of the prosecution, and indicated that a new trial would have been justified had the defense objected in time. 4
1

"12. The kidnapping of Morton Sobell and his family from Mexico by the prosecution resulted in prejudicial stories in the press, and was used by the prosecution to prejudice the atmosphere at the trial.

"13. The hysteria of the time placed an undue burden on Morton Sobell and his attorneys. It was impossible for the attorneys to learn what Morton Sobell was accused of doing in order to prepare a defense. At the trial itself, the attorneys were faced with the choice of putting Morton Sobell on the stand in an inflamed atmosphere, or resting on his plea of innocence according to Constitutional guarantees. The fact that to this day prosecutor Roy Cohn holds that not taking the stand indicated Sobell's guilt is evidence of how the rightful use of Constitutional guarantees can be misinterpreted in moments of extreme tension.

"14. The 30-year sentence against Sobell is far out of proportion. Even persons accused of treason in wartime, acting on behalf of enemy powers, have been accorded far less severe sentences.

"15. The judge based his harsh sentencing policy on the premise that Russia obtained the atomic bomb because of espionage. Today scientists, even conceding some help through espionage, say this was a distorted and harmful illusion that prevented our country from having a true picture of Russia's scientific capabilities. Morton Sobell, although not even accused of atomic espionage, was victimized by the attitudes of the time. Today, the atmosphere has changed, yet he remains a prisoner of that era.

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"16. Law journals which have studied the case have indicated that Sobell did not receive justice. No law review has held that Sobell's sentence was just. u

"17. Many authorities who have studied the case are convinced not only that the trial or sentence were unfair, but that Morton Sobell is an innocent man, as he maintains. |

"18. When so many individuals and publications in our country raise basic questions about such an important case, these voices must be respected. The fact that such widespread doubt has been raised is in itself an urgent argument for Morton Sobell's release through Executive action. It is our tradition that where there are doubts, such questions must be resolved to the benefit of the individual, not the prosecution.

"19. Acting positively in this case would help to rectify wrongs done in the McCarthy era, and be a strong re-affirmation to the world of our country's dedication to the high ideas of justice, honor and compassion.

"Conclusion

"Mr. President, we urge with all our hearts that you give this case a personal examination. We urge that you please listen to the voice of educators, clergymen, writers, and editors representing the American people. Whatever arguments there may be regarding the innocence or guilt of Morton Sobell, the fairness or unfairness of the trial, there can be no moral justification for the 30-year sentence imposed upon him on the flimsy testimony presented. The only basis for such a sentence was the passion of the time in which he was tried. Certainly he and his family have suffered more than enough. Certainly our country has the greatness to

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correct an injustice rather than compound it by continuing to imprison a man who has been wronged. We appeal to you to end this ordeal by commuting Morton Sobell's sentence to the time he has served."

The April, 1959, issue reported that "Jewish Currents" is published by Jewish Currents, Inc., Room 601, 22 East 17th Street, New York City.

Concerning "Jewish Life," the Guide to Subversive Organizations and Publications, dated January 2, 1957, and prepared by the Committee on Un-American Activities, United States House of Representatives, stated:

"(1) Cited as a Communist front which first appeared in November, 1946, as a monthly published by the Morning Freiheit Association, publishers of the Yiddish Communist daily, 'Morning Freiheit'..... The first issue contained this announcement of policy: 'Jewish Life dedicates itself to strengthening the friendship of the Jewish people with the Soviet Union.....'

"(Committee on Un-American Activities, Report, 'Trial by Treason: The National Committee to Secure Justice for the Rosenbergs and Morton Sobell,' August 25, 1956, p.93.)"

A confidential source advised on May 10, 1960, that instant organization was formed on November 19, 1955, by a group of Communist Party (CP) sympathizers and suspected CP members, to support the "National Guardian" by subscriptions, donations, and programs designed to arouse interest in the issues being favored by the "National Guardian". The club was inactive from June 17, 1956, until September 19, 1958.

This source and another source advised on May 10, 1960, that the club was reactivated on September 19, 1958, by members of the Socialist Workers Party (SWP) for recruiting purposes. These sources advised that the club is now completely dominated and controlled by the San Diego Branch of the SWP. Its sole activity consists in presenting SWP selected speakers at meetings held under the auspices of the club.

The 1949 report of the California Committee on Un-American Activities cited the "National Guardian" as a publication launched in New York in 1948, aiming at national circulation, which it found to be from its inception notoriously Stalinist in its staff, writers, management and content. (1949 report of the California Senate Fact Finding Committee on Un-American Activities, page 394)

The masthead of the "National Guardian", issue of May 16, 1960, reflects that it is published weekly by Weekly Guardian Associates, Incorporated, 197 East 4th Street, New York City.

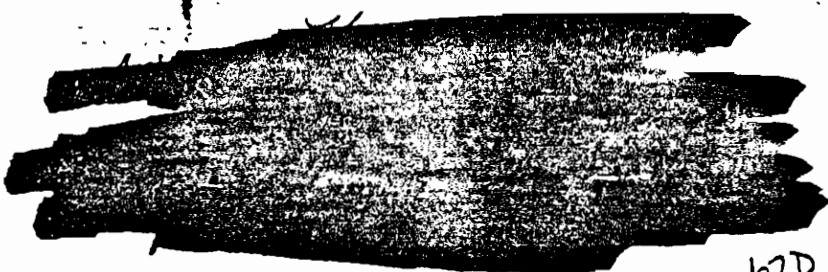

The case of Morton Sobell

At the Assembly, both Dr. Paul Lehmann and Dr. Gardner Murphy called attention to the Morton Sobell trial and sentence. Student Christian Associations should study the record of this case. Whenever a possible avenue and fountain of justice in any society exists, that society cannot go long without examining its behavior and practice.

The following statement has been made by a group of distinguished citizens. We commend it to the attention of every Christian Association.

THE UNDERSIGNED are American citizens who believe that the sentence of Morton Sobell should now be commuted. Sobell was convicted of conspiring with others to transmit to the Soviet Union writings and information relating to the national defense of the United States and was sentenced on April 1, 1951 to serve thirty years in Federal Prison.

Morton Sobell was tried with Julius and Ethel Rosenberg, who were convicted of espionage in connection with the atomic bomb and who were sentenced to death and later executed. Sobell, however, was never implicated in any way with involvement in the atomic espionage for which the Rosenbergs were convicted. This fact was confirmed by the judge who sentenced Sobell.

This statement is not concerned with the Rosenberg conviction. The undersigned are and consistently have been convinced anti-Communists. None are associated with any organization, committee or group of any kind concerned either with the case of the Rosenbergs or that of Sobell, nor are any of the undersigned connected in any way with Morton Sobell or any members of his family. After study of the case, we believe that the following considerations warrant a commutation of the very heavy sentence Sobell is now serving.

1. Sobell was never implicated with atomic espionage for which the Rosenbergs were convicted.

2. The charges against Sobell, supported mainly by the testimony of one man, Max Elitcher, were that he had solicited information, and had on one occasion taken something which looked like a can of film to Julius Rosenberg. No specific item of information supposed to have been secured by him or transmitted by him to anyone else is specified in the record. The case against him, therefore, is vague in content and slender in proof. The possibility that a trip to Mexico which he and his family took should be construed as flight cannot be ignored, though it is subject to various interpretations.

3. Whether or not the judge and prosecution made sufficient efforts to provide a fair trial, we ought to recognize that the emotions surrounding the trial of the Rosenbergs and the fact that Sobell's case was tried with theirs made it difficult to separate the two cases and to recognize

the very different character of the two charges and the evidence introduced to support them respectively.

4. Sobell has already served, with good conduct, nearly eight years in prison, six of them in Alcatraz.

5. As Americans we are fully aware of the threat of communism to our freedom and way of life. Any attack on that freedom from without or within must be resisted. Nevertheless, one of the factors which makes that freedom so precious is its capacity to practice a disciplined and humane administration of justice precisely in those cases where emotions are aroused which make it difficult to remain objective about the merits of a specific case. We believe a commutation of the Sobell sentence would demonstrate our national faith in that freedom.

NOTE: The following comments on the Morton Sobell case by Dr. Paul Lehmann of the Harvard Divinity School are being sent by the Intercollegian, student YMCA-YWCA publication, in response to requests for more information about the trial and imprisonment of Mr. Sobell.

MORTON SOBELL: SYMBOL OF THE
CHRISTIAN'S CONCERN FOR JUSTICE

The Christian's concern for justice is a basic response to what the God revealed to us in Jesus Christ and described in the Bible is doing in the world. Images get to the heart of the matter more quickly than do concepts, and a careful reading of the Bible will disclose that the characteristic images in terms of which the Bible describes what God is doing in the world are political images. They are political images in the fundamental sense of the word "political"; for politics has to do with what it takes to make and to keep human life human. The God of the Bible is thus at work in the world "to destroy and to overthrow, to build and to plant" (Jeremiah 1:10); "he has gathered the proud in the imagination of their hearts, he has put down the mighty from their thrones, and exalted those of low degree" (Luke 1:51-52); he chooses "what is low and despised in the world, even things that are not, to bring to nothing things that are, so that no human being might boast in the presence of God" (1 Corinthians 1:28-29). In this context, justice is the setting right of what is not right in the world, the breaking down of every barrier to the fulfillment of human wholeness and the making room for what is genuinely human in the relations of men in their dealings with themselves and with one another.

Morton Sobell was convicted and sentenced to prison in the wake of the trial, convictions and sentencing of Julius and Ethel Rosenberg (1951-53). His case has been called "the outstanding example of the serious lasting effects of the spy scare". The precepts and processes of justice are the right and proper instruments through which human societies order the common life, and endeavor both to protect and to further man's humanity as against his inhumanity to man. But in the actual exercise of justice, human societies not infrequently subordinate the claims of justice to the interests of power, and from time to time in the course of human affairs the destructive impulses and capacities of men, their hatreds and their fears, become compounded with irrational, deep and widespread insecurity, so that the very procedures and structures of justice become the instruments of the miscarriage of justice. I say "miscarriage" not because all legal processes have not been duly exercised and the judgment of wise and learned jurists asked. But a "miscarriage of justice" arises because the rules of legal evidence and the more delicate, difficult and fundamental human evidence are at variance, if not in conflict, the one with the other. The maxim "beyond reasonable doubt", designed to keep a healthy tension between the legal and the human evidence when the question of justice or injustice is up, proves under conditions of public hysteria to be a slender reed upon which a society can rest its conscience and its peace.

All this may be granted by non-Christians as well as by Christians. Indeed, non-Christians have often been more sensitive to the cleavage between legal and human evidence in matters of justice than Christians have been. Nevertheless, the authentic response of Christian faith to what God is doing in the world is nowhere more evident than in the persistent and restless sensitivity to miscarriage of justice which cannot come to peace with itself until law has once again been restored to its authentic function as an instrument for the humanization of man in his relatedness to man.

Morton Sobell was sentenced to prison for a thirty-year term in 1951. First in Leavenworth and then in Alcatraz, symbols of American punitive power at its worst, Sobell has been serving his sentence amidst rising doubts in the body politic of the United States about the evidence upon which he was actually convicted and

which lift the Sobell case above the level of the processes whereby injustice can be legally redressed, and transfer it to a level of symbolic significance of the sanity, stability and integrity of the common life in the United States. It is this symbolic significance which sharply juxtaposes the power of the state and the human significance of an individual citizen. It is this symbolic significance which sharply poses the question whether any society can safely allow a serious malfeasance of justice to continue without redress. It is this symbolic significance which sharply poses the question whether Morton Sobell has not in the last analysis been caught up by forces which are so vastly more powerful and ominous than he or his deeds or misdeeds could possibly be, so that the humanistic foundations of justice in a society which has imprisoned him are at stake.

In a time of conformity, when non-conformity is a risk, students and their campuses do not need - above all things - the antidote of causes. What they need above all things is to remember that human creativity has always been high when men have kept sensitive to what was immediately around them and out of joint. Whether one come to the conclusion that the Sobell case should be reviewed or not, that Morton Sobell should be pardoned by executive clemency or not, a serious study and discussion of the issues and the significance of Morton Sobell's ordeal may well serve as an unforgettable undergraduate experience in what it takes to be and to stay a human being in this kind of world.

Whether or not Sobell is a Christian, I do not know. It does not matter. Christ died - not for Christians only - but for the ungodly, that is for all men, Christians included. As God in Christ makes no conditions for forgiving men their sins, and including them in fellowship with Him, so Christians make no conditions for their obedient concern for all sorts and conditions of men. The Christian doctrines of the incarnation and Atonement mean nothing so much as that God who is revealed in Christ is active and at work on the frontiers of man's humanity to man. Student YM and YWCA's have lost their real excuse for being unless they are steadily responsive to what God is doing at that frontier. Thus it comes about that Morton Sobell is the next-door neighbor of every campus YM and YWCA, who confronts them out of a great silence with the question of the integrity of their obedience to what God is doing in the world.

The basic factual materials for a discussion of the issues and significance of the Sobell case are of course the trial record itself. This can be obtained from the Committee to Secure Justice for Morton Sobell at 940 Broadway, New York 10, New York. But this record is long and tedious and perhaps not the most rewarding way to begin to understand the case. For this purpose the book by Professor Malcolm T. Sharp, of the Faculty of Law at the University of Chicago, entitled *Was Justice Done?*, New York, 1956, The Monthly Review Press, is the best point of departure. I could imagine groups of faculty and students under the leadership of the campus YM and YWCA spending a series of evenings in fruitful discussion of Professor Sharp's book, and going on from there as the discussion pointed the way. In some such way as this, intelligence, information, and conviction could be brought to bear upon one concrete issue of justice in our present society, and some glimpse be gained of what it means to live not in conformity, but in the freedom of a transforming faith.

Further Development in Morton Sobell Case
Since Report to President Eisenhower was Submitted

APPEAL BY DEMOCRATS--The California Democratic Council, held in Fresno, Cal., and attended by some 3000 delegates representing 30 Congressional districts passed the following resolution unanimously: "Morton Sobell is serving his 10th year in prison. He has steadfastly proclaimed his innocence throughout his imprisonment. Many eminent Americans and other world figures including jurists, scientists, clergymen have also expressed substantial doubt as to his guilt. There does exist the possibility of human error in matters of judgment when that judgment has been subjected to the political tensions of the day. The California Democratic Council has traditionally expressed concern for possible infringements upon justice and civil liberty. The California Democratic Council calls upon the President of the United States to review again the facts in the Sobell case and take necessary action to secure ultimate justice."

WASHINGTON MEETING--An important meeting on the Sobell case has been held in Washington, D.C., with appeals being made by Gerhard Van Arkel, noted Washington attorney, and Raymond Wilson, executive secretary of the Friends Committee on National Legislation. The WASHINGTON POST AND TIMES HERALD reported that messages of support were read from Representatives Randall S. Harmon (D-Ind), William H. Meyer (D-Vt), and John A. Blatnik (D-Minn). The WASHINGTON DAILY NEWS also carried a report of the meeting under the heading "Might Be Acquitted Now--Sobell Conviction 'Debatable'."

NOTABLES IN SPECIAL PLEA--A letter has been published in the NEW YORK TIMES (Feb. 16) asking release of Morton Sobell and signed by Nathan Glazer, sociologist, Sidney Hook, professor at New York University, Irving Kristol, editor of the REPORTER magazine, and Dwight Macdonald of the NEW YORKER magazine. The signers take the position that even though they believe Sobell guilty, there was very little he was accused of doing and that his imprisonment should now be ended after 10 years. They also recommend release of David Greenglass and Harry Gold on the ground of excessive imprisonment.

ISRAELIS ACT FOR SOBELL--Fifteen eminent persons in Israel have sent a letter to President Eisenhower joining in the appeal for Sobell's freedom made by Lord Bertrand Russell of England and Dr. Martin Buber of Israel. Among those appealing are Dr. E. J. Jaruš, Chairman of the Israeli League for the Rights of Man, J. Grünbaum, former Minister of the Interior of the Government of Israel, and Anna Weizmann, Professor Emeritus of the Weizman Institute of Science and sister of Chaim Weizmann.

MINNESOTA EDITORIAL--An editorial in the WILMAR (Minn) TRIBUNE titled "Seek Release of Sobell" presents the Sobell case as a carry-over from the days of McCarthyism and asserts: "Surely if we want to forget this blot on the history of American freedom, freedom of speech and such, if we admit that a lot of people lost their heads in those days and grievous mistakes were made, then we ought to try to correct one of these mistakes in the case of Sobell."

MARQUIS CHILDS WRITES ON SOBELL--In a column dealing with the effects of the McCarthy era, syndicated columnist Marquis Childs writing in the WASHINGTON POST AND TIMES HERALD and other newspapers throughout the country cited the case of Morton Sobell as a subject which needs re-examination. He wrote: "Undoubtedly, the atmosphere has cleared and one evidence is a re-examination of conscience. Last year the Portland OREGONIAN suggested in an editorial that someday the public conscience might be sufficiently stirred to determine whether Morton Sobell, now serving a 30-year sentence for conspiracy, was convicted of a crime or whether he was a victim of the emotionalism surrounding the Rosenberg case. With the clearing atmosphere there is a growing realization that freedom is not something we periodically pat ourselves on the back about. It is a creative act to be constantly renewed."

CLERGYMEN APPEAL--The Palo Alto Ministerial Association in California has sent the following communication to the Bay Area Council of Sobell Committees: "Convinced that a request for clemency in the case of Morton Sobell is most certainly justified, we, the undersigned of the PALO ALTO MINISTERIAL ASSOCIATION submit this letter to you. It is our hope that it will help in the efforts to release Mr. Sobell from prison and to provide for his reunion with his family."

In New York, the BAPTIST MINISTERS CONFERENCE passed a resolution urging Sobell's release and has submitted it to President Eisenhower.

There continues to be an increase in letters from individual clergymen, and many clergymen in various cities are circulating a special appeal already signed by some 700 clergymen.

RADIO STATIONS AIR CASE--Helen Sobell has recently discussed her husband's case over two important programs in Washington, D.C. and in Philadelphia. In Washington she was interviewed by Steve Allison over Station WWDC, and in Philadelphia a taped interview was made by Paul Parker of Station WIP.

I. F. STONE URGES CLEMENCY--Journalist I. F. Stone, in his weekly Washington newsletter of March 7, cites the recent public meeting in Washington as a "significant barometric indicator" of changing times. After reporting the meeting, Stone commented: "This August, Sobell will have been in prison ten years. The severity of his 30-year sentence contrasts with the vagueness of the offense with which he was charged, and the thinness of the threads linking him with the Rosenbergs. Had he been willing to testify against them, he might have escaped indictment. Had he been tried separately, it would have been difficult to convict him. Executive clemency is long overdue."

PABLO CASALS BELIEVES SOBELL INNOCENT--Mrs. Morton Sobell has received a letter in behalf of the renown musician Pablo Casals, written by his wife, Marta Casals. Writing that doctor's health restrictions make it impossible for him to attend a reception in honor of Morton Sobell, although he would like to accept, Mrs. Casals states: "Mr. Casals would like to transmit his best wishes to you and Mr. Sobell and his hopes that you may be successful in your work to secure justice for your husband, as he believes in

CHURCH COUNCIL BULLETIN--The December, 1959, Bulletin of the National Council of Churches of Christ in the U.S.A.'s Department of Religious Liberty has an important recommendation concerning the Sobell case. It says concerning the book "Was Justice Done?" and the efforts for clemency: "If you have doubts, after examining Prof. Malcolm Sharp's thoughtful and moderate book on Morton Sobell, foreword by Dr. Harold C. Urey, you will probably be moved at least to write to the White House seeking clemency. (Monthly Review Press, \$3.50--can be obtained from the Committee to Secure Justice for Morton Sobell, 940 Broadway, New York 10, N.Y.)"

MILWAUKEE CLERGY APPEAL--"Six Area Ministers, Rabbi, Join Sobell Clemency Plea" was the headline in the Milwaukee Sentinel of Sunday, March 13. The clergymen have sent the following statement throughout the state of Wisconsin: "We the undersigned, members of the clergy in Milwaukee, have reviewed the trial and sentence of Morton Sobell, who was convicted of conspiracy to commit espionage in 1951 during the height of national hysteria. We firmly believe that regardless of arguments for innocence or guilt of Morton Sobell, there can be no justification for the 30-year sentence imposed upon him on the flimsy evidence presented. Additional evidence in recent years has cast further doubt on the entire case. Documentary material is enclosed indicating Morton Sobell's innocence. We are appealing to the President, asking long-overdue clemency, and urging you to do likewise. All Americans with a sense of justice and concern for right will want to see this blot wiped out from our nation's history. It is still not too late to act in correcting one of the dark shadows hovering over American Jurisprudence. We agree with Dr. Reinhold Niebuhr and his co-signers who said 'Commutation of Sobell's sentence would demonstrate our national capacity for disciplined and humane administration of justice.' Thousands of other eminent Americans have added their voices to this appeal. Will you join them?" The plea was signed by Rev. Kenneth Smith, Rev. Raymond Ley, Rev. M.J. Battle, Rev. A.C. Pittman, Rev. John W. Cyrus, Rev. Lucius Walker, Jr., and Rabbi David S. Shapiro.

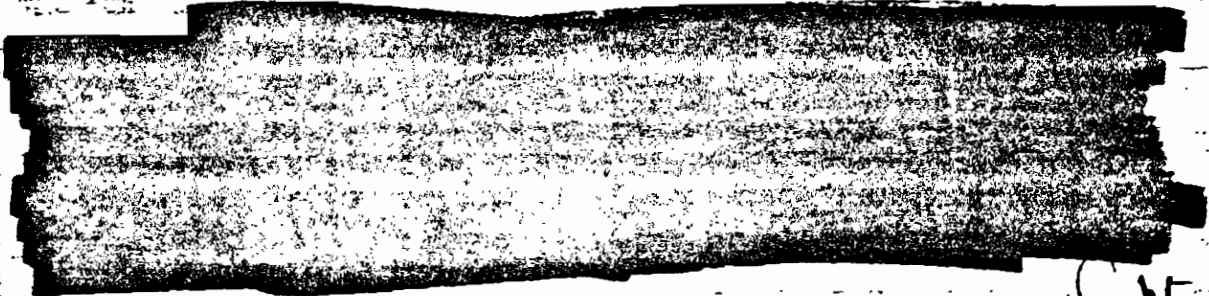

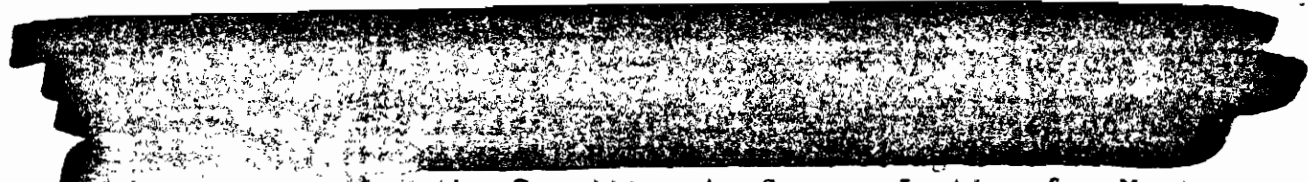

the Committee to Secure Justice for Morton Sobell is attempting to contact influential people in Washington, D. C. in an effort to get the notice of Morton Sobell back into the courts. the Committee to Secure Justice for Morton Sobell had in 1959 received \$33,569.19 and had spent \$33,032.95.

MP T-3 on June 6, 1960 advised that as of June, 1960, the Minnesota Committee to Secure Justice for Morton Sobell was an affiliate of the Committee to Secure Justice for Morton Sobell and that the prime objective of the affiliate and of the Committee to Secure Justice for Morton Sobell was to obtain the release of MORTON SOBELL from prison.

"There does exist the possibility of human error in matters of judgment when that judgment has been subjected to the political tensions of the day.



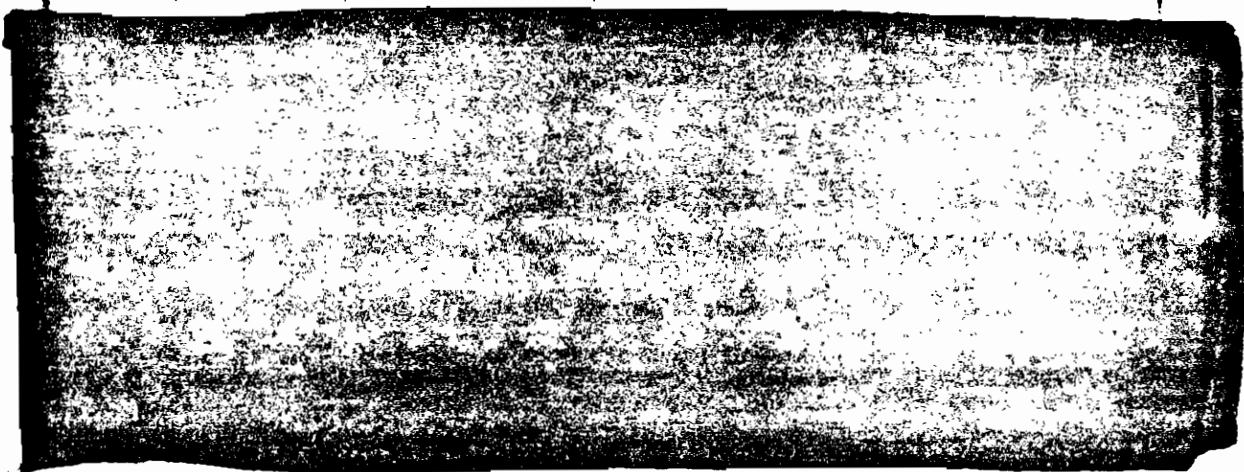
"The California Democratic Council calls upon the President of the United States to review again the facts in the Sobell case and take necessary action to secure ultimate justice."

The above letter stressed the urgent need for financial aid and also enclosed a reprint of an editorial appearing in the "West Central Daily Tribune," Willmar, Minnesota, concerning MORTON SOBELL. This editorial appeared on January 25, 1960 and was written by O. B. AUGUSTSON, editor, "West Central Daily Tribune." The editorial is as follows:

"During the hysteria of the Korean War and the now deplored era of the witch hunters and McCarthyism a man by the name of MORTON SOBELL was convicted on the charge of conspiracy to commit espionage. He was given a 30 year sentence and has already served ten years of them in prison. Last Thanksgiving Day a petition signed by many eminent people, including many of the clergy appealed to President EISENHOWER to release SOBELL and commute his sentence. As part of this some 30 labor organizations on the West

coast carried an article entitled 'A Wrong to Be Righted.' The efforts in behalf of the imprisoned man proved of no avail at that time. Now a new appeal has been made to the president from the national headquarters of the Committee to Secure Justice for Morton Sobell. Again it will be pointed out that SOBELL became a victim of hysteria and the overzealous witch hunters, that the only witnesses that gave testimony connecting SOBELL with the conspiracy charge was MAX ELITCHER who admitted on the witness stand that he had perjured himself on another matter, and that SOBELL's case should have been tried separately from the atomic espionage accusations of ETHEL and JULIUS ROSENBERG. Here was mighty flimsy evidence and an unduly harsh sentence. The whole legality of the trial and the sentence are being challenged. Seems to us that Americans generally would like to forget that period when many innocent people were villified and besmirched while the 100% so-called patriots ran wild to see whom they might devour. McCARTHY himself underwent censure. The period is one that found many in high places too frightened to speak out. Now they do when the heat is off. Surely if we want to forget this blot on the history of American freedom, freedom of speech and such, if we admit that a lot of people lost their heads in those days and grievous mistakes were made, then we ought to try to correct one of those mistakes in the case of SOBELL. During those hysterical days there were many informers whose reputations were bad in the first place, on top of that they were later exposed as confirmed liars - yet in the eagerness to get victims their testimony was seized upon with glee but with not too much of honesty or qualms of conscience. Reminds one of the terrible days of the Inquisition when any irresponsible talk on the street was apt to send the hapless victim to the stake."

In the May 18, 1960 issue of the "Minnesota Daily," the official newspaper of the University of Minnesota, it was reported on Page 7 that WIDGET NEWMAN began a Midwest tour to organize regional committees to influence reconsideration of the case of MORTON SOBELL, who has served 10 years of a 30-year sentence in Federal prison for espionage as an accomplice of executed atom spies JULIUS and ETHEL ROSENBERG. The article reported NEWMAN as stating that she believed SOBELL was innocent and that his conviction was solely the result of one perjured witness, MAX ELITCHER. The article reported NEWMAN as stating that she began her work in behalf of MORTON SOBELL as a result of a mass meeting held in Los Angeles, California in 1953 and that through the effort of people interested in MORTON SOBELL there are now some 25 major cities which have organized committees in behalf of MORTON SOBELL.

The June 8, 1960 issue of the "Minneapolis Star," a metropolitan newspaper, reported that Mrs. MORTON SOBELL, wife of the convicted spy, would speak on June 16, 1960 at a public meeting in the Unity Unitarian Church, St. Paul, Minnesota. The article further reported that Mrs. SOBELL has been appealing for help to free her husband for a period of nine years.

The June 16, 1960 issue of the "Minneapolis Star" reported that Mrs. MORTON SOBELL was presently in the Twin Cities seeking aid for her husband, MORTON SOBELL. The article reported that Mrs. SOBELL stated that she feels that this is the year her husband will be free to come home, culminating a 10-year battle which has been fortified by a knowledge of her husband's innocence and the belief that the truth would become known. The article added that Mrs. SOBELL would speak at a public meeting at the Unity Church, St. Paul, Minnesota, at 8:00 p.m. that date.

On June 20, 1960, MP T-8 advised that on June 16, 1960, a public meeting was sponsored by the Minnesota Sobell Committee at the Unity Unitarian Church, St. Paul, Minnesota, and that HELEN SOBELL was the principal speaker. MP T-8 advised that Mrs. SOBELL stated that her husband had been sentenced to 30 years in prison for a crime that he did not commit and that he has now served ten years of the 30 years with good conduct. Mrs. SOBELL emotionally appealed to the audience pointing out the love his family had for him and their desire to live together again as a family. Mrs. SOBELL pointed out that her husband was convicted solely on the false testimony of MAX ELITCHER, who was mentally unbalanced and had for a long time been under the care of a psychiatrist. She pointed out that many professional men in the legal field, after reviewing the transcript of the conspiracy trial, were of the opinion that MORTON SOBELL was innocent and that he is unjustly confined. MP T-8 advised that in a question and answer period that followed an individual from the audience, who was a member of the American Legion, asked Mrs. SOBELL that if MORTON SOBELL was innocent, why did he and his family flee to Mexico? Mrs. SOBELL answered that they did not flee to Mexico, that they went there as a result of a planned trip and that MORTON SOBELL was interested in attempting to find work in Mexico. Mrs. SOBELL stated that while they did not have a visa to

After Mexico, they did have a tourist card and that is all that is required. Mrs. SOBELL continued by stating that in Mexico they had rented an apartment in their own name and made no attempt to make it appear that they were other than who they actually were. MP T-8 advised that approximately 55 individuals attended the meeting. [REDACTED]

held at the Quaker House and was arranged in order to give HELEN SOBELL and the Law Professor an opportunity to present MORTON SOBELL's case in a favorable way, i.e., to show he is innocent of Espionage charges of which he was convicted in the early 1950's, and sentenced to thirty years.

FELDMAN told [redacted] the law professor did most of the speaking and HELEN SOBELL made a short speech. FELDMAN stated most of the clergy appeared to be very much impressed with the case made for MORTON SOBELL by the Professor. FELDMAN said the Professor and HELEN SOBELL handed out some literature stating the case for MORTON SOBELL and promised to mail more literature in the future. They presented a petition asking that MORTON be released, which carried signatures of many New York ministers, priests and Rabbis as well as numerous prominent persons. FELDMAN also told [redacted] he believed the Professor and HELEN SOBELL plan to hold more meetings in Atlanta in the future and will probably attempt to get signatures to the petition at that time. They did not ask anyone to sign at the above luncheon, but merely requested those present to study the case as presented in the literature.

Informant stated that the announcement described Rev. TOMPKINS as the initiator of an appeal to clergymen of Chicago to work for the freedom of MORTON SOBELL. PHT-1 stated that this item also reflected that Rev. TOMPKINS was visiting Washington, D.C., on April 19 - 21, 1960, to implement further support of the SOBELL case through Executive and Judicial channels and that he planned to stay over at a number of Eastern cities, including Philadelphia, on his return to Chicago.

On April 28, 1960, PHT-12 advised that the PSC sponsored a meeting at the Central YMCA, 1421 Arch Street, on Friday, April 22, 1960. JEAN FRANTJIS served as Chairman and introduced the main speaker, Rev. ALVA TOMPKINS, a Presbyterian minister from Chicago, Ill. Rev. TOMPKINS spoke on his activities in the interest of justice for MORTON SOBELL. He said that his study of the case had convinced him that SOBELL was innocent and urged those in attendance to lend their assistance to win SOBELL's freedom. PHT-12 advised that about 22 persons attended this affair. [REDACTED]

PHT-10 advised on April 25, 1960, and PHT-13 advised on April 27, 1960, that the PSC sponsored a meeting at the Central YMCA, 1421 Arch Street on April 22, 1960. These informants advised that they attended this meeting and both furnished substantially the same information regarding this affair as PHT-12.

PHT-14 reported on April 25, 1952, that although he had no specific information which would indicate Communist activity or membership on the part of Dr. DERK BODDE, it was indicated to the informant as a result of BODDE's statements and activities that BODDE might have Communist sympathy or be involved in Communist activities.

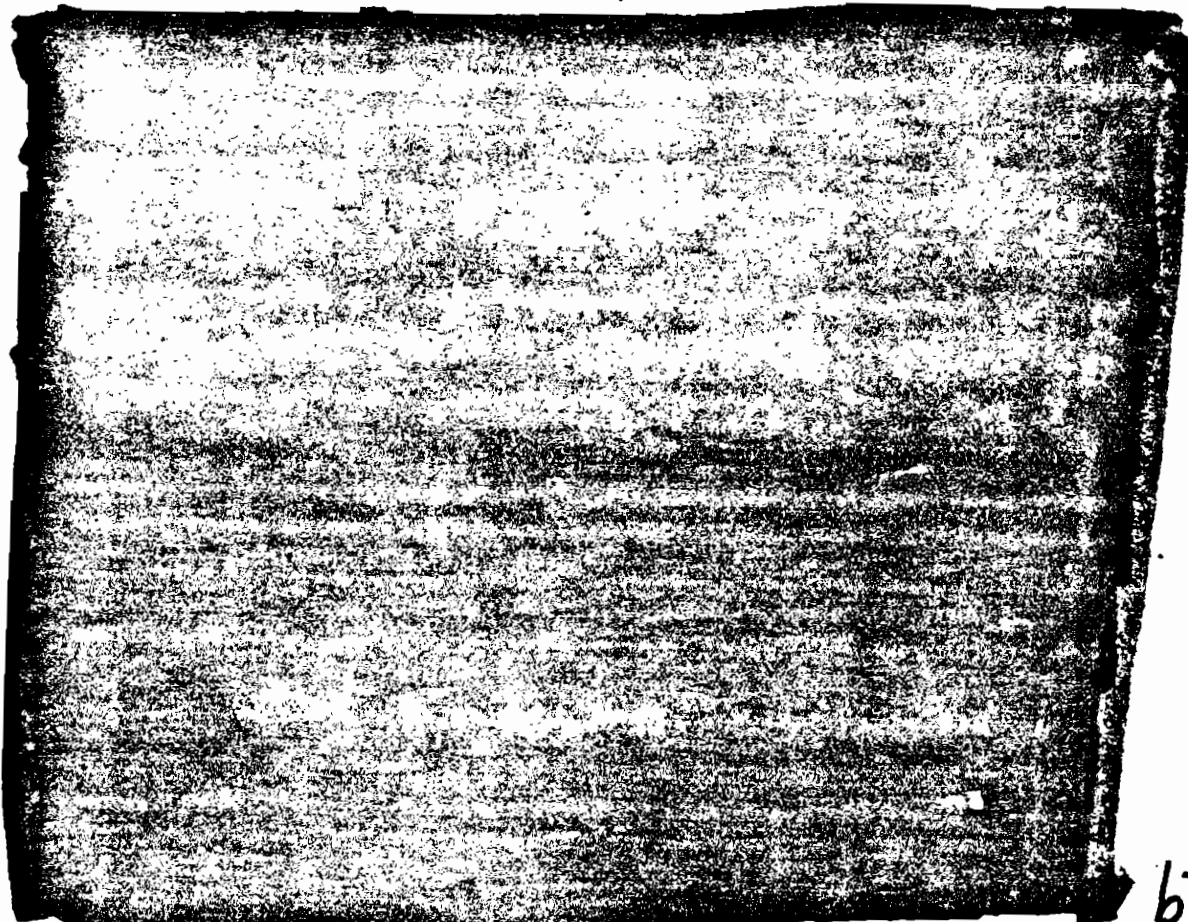
PHT-4 advised on April 1, 1957, that as of March 1957 SOL ROTENBERG was a member of the District Committee, CPEPD.

St. Ann's Avenue, Bronx, N.Y., advised during 1950 that the SOBELL family had resided at this address from July 1931 to December 1940.

[REDACTED] believed ROSE SOBELL to be a CP member he could not confirm her as a member of the CP or Communist front organization. b7D

Informant advised that Rev. MC CORMACK stated that he and Rev. GAEDE had been traveling together for the past eight weeks from the West Coast to the East Coast in connection with the MORTON SOBELL case. He stated that on May 16, 1960, they called on Chief Justice of the Supreme Court EARL WARREN, seeking the release of SOBELL. He said that on the same day they attempted to contact President EISENHOWER but that President EISENHOWER was attending the Summit Conference in Paris, France. Rev. MC CORMACK stated that he and Rev. GAEDE agree that SOBELL is innocent and they have organized 97 clergymen who also support their belief and are working toward the release of SOBELL.

CONNECTIONS WITH OTHER ORGANIZATIONS

CPEPD

PHT-15 advised on November 19, 1959, that THOMAS NABRIED was invited to a PSC affair scheduled to be held in Philadelphia on December 10, 1959, by a member of the PC of the PSC. According to this informant, the affair would feature HELEN SOBELL as the guest speaker. It was hoped that NABRIED would attend this affair and possibly bring others with him as well as collect "a few dollars" for the defense of MORTON SOBELL.

PHT-15 advised on November 19, 1959, that THOMAS NABRIED as of that date was Chairman of the CPEPD.

On November 29, 1959, PHT-16 reported that THOMAS NABRIED recently met with a CPUSA official from New York City. The MORTON SOBELL case was discussed and NABRIED wondered why the CP had not taken more action in this matter. Informant stated that the individual from New York City thought the CP could make another "SACCO VANZETTI" out of the SOBELL case by "whipping up hysteria." NABRIED remarked that in Philadelphia there was quite a bit of activity around the SOBELL case but the CP was standing aloof from this activity and had not taken a forthright political position in the matter. NABRIED stated he thought the CP should take a position.

PHT-16 advised on December 30, 1959, that the District Committee, CPEPD, was interested in setting up

a civil rights committee to handle a variety of civil rights matters. THOMAS NABRIED told the informant earlier in December 1959 that he did not believe civil rights work could be handled by the PSC because of the nature of the Committee itself and because JEAN FRANTJIS no longer held the real post of responsibility in the PSC.

PHT-17 advised on April 22, 1960, a "forum" was sponsored by the West Philadelphia Section, CPEPD, at the residence of JEAN FRANTJIS, 249 South Melville Street, on April 21, 1960. Approximately 30 persons attended this forum. JEAN FRANTJIS served as Chairman and at the conclusion of the affair, announced that the PSC would sponsor a meeting on April 22, 1960, at the Central YMCA in Philadelphia. She urged her listeners to attend this meeting.

On May 6, 1960, PHT-17 reported that the CPEPD sponsored a May Day celebration at the Broadwood Hotel on Sunday, May 1, 1960. Approximately 175 persons attended and the principal speaker was JAMES E. JACKSON, Editor of "The Worker," from New York City. Toward the end of this affair, JEAN FRANTJIS read a resolution asking clemency on behalf of MORTON SOBELL. PHT-17 advised that this resolution was approved and it was announced that it would be forwarded to President EISENHOWER for his consideration.

"The Worker" is a weekly East Coast Communist publication.

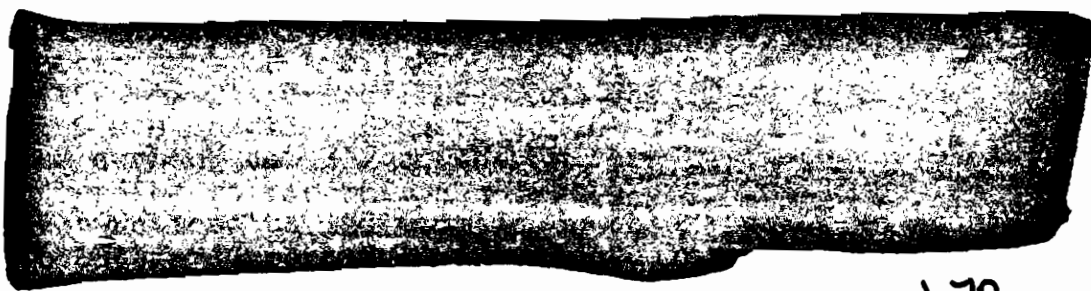
PHT-12 advised on May 3, 1960, and PHT-18 advised on May 12, 1960, that the CPEPD sponsored a May Day celebration at the Broadwood Hotel on May 1, 1960. These informants attended and both furnished substantially the same information regarding this affair as PHT-17.

On December 16, 1959, PHT-1 advised that the PSSFC sponsored an affair at the Adelphia Hotel on December 11, 1959. About 50 persons attended this affair. Informant stated HELEN SOBELL was introduced at this affair and spoke briefly regarding her work on behalf of her husband, MORTON SOBELL. She solicited the aid of those in attendance.

COMMITTEE TO SECURE JUSTICE FOR MORTON SOBELL

"Following the execution of atomic spies Ethel and Julius Rosenberg in June 1953, the 'Communist campaign assumed a different emphasis. Its major effort centered upon Morton Sobell,' the Rosenbergs' codefendant. The National Committee to Secure Justice in the Rosenberg Case - a communist front which had been conducting the campaign in the United States - was reconstituted as the National Rosenberg-Sobell Committee at a conference in Chicago in October 1953 and 'then as the National Committee to Secure Justice for Morton Sobell in the Rosenberg case' "

dated January 2, 1957, issued by the House Committee
on Un-American Activities, page 60.)

In September, 1954, the name "National Committee to Secure Justice for Morton Sobell" appeared on literature issued by the Committee. In March, 1955, the current name, "Committee to Secure Justice for Morton Sobell," first appeared on literature issued by the Committee.

The 1959-1960 Borough of Manhattan telephone directory lists the "Committee to Secure Justice for Morton Sobell" as being located at 910 Broadway, New York, New York.

A source on 7/30/57, advised as follows:

The Philadelphia Jewish Cultural Clubs (PJCC), aka Jewish Cultural Clubs of Philadelphia, were formed in the spring months of 1954. Actually, the basis for the formation of the PJCC was laid in the fall months of 1953 when it appeared certain that the International Workers Order (IWO) would be dissolved pursuant to an order of liquidation by the New York state courts.

SOL ROTENBERG, former Executive Director, Philadelphia Jewish People's Fraternal Order (JFFO), IWO, in late 1953 laid the groundwork for the formation of the PJCC, using as a nucleus former JFFO, IWO members. In early 1954, he provided leadership in the establishment of the PJCC and also set up the Coordinating Committee, PJCC, composed of delegates from the Culture Clubs of the PJCC. The purpose of this committee was to provide leadership, long-range planning and coordination of the activities of the various culture clubs.

A second source on 6/21/54, advised that SOL ROTENBERG was a member of the Philadelphia City Committee, CPEPD, as of June 1954. On 4/1/57, this source advised that as of March 1957, ROTENBERG was a member of the District Committee, CPEPD.

A third source advised on 5/27/60, that the PJCC continues to be active in Philadelphia with the Sholem Aleichem Club being the largest, most active and aggressive in the PJCC with a membership of more than 125 people. The source further advised that the following cultural clubs are also active in Philadelphia, but do not have the large membership of the Sholem Aleichem Club:

On 1/23/53, [REDACTED] Commissioner of Police THOMAS J. GIBBONS, Philadelphia Police Department, advised that by letter dated 10/10/52, the Philadelphia Police Department had received notification of a meeting under the sponsorship of the Philadelphia Committee to Secure Justice in the Rosenberg Case to be held in Philadelphia on 10/14/52.


On 4/14/53, the [REDACTED] Division of Solicitations, Department of Public Instructions, Commonwealth of Pennsylvania, 812 Blackstone Building, Harrisburg, Pa., advised that by letter dated 2/17/53, JEAN D. FRANTOIS, as Executive Secretary of the Philadelphia Committee to Secure Justice in the Rosenberg Case, Post Office Box 805, Philadelphia, Pa., had advised the Division of Solicitations that the Philadelphia Committee was an affiliate of the National Committee to Secure Justice in the Rosenberg Case, and that the purpose of the local committee was to solicit money to be used to meet expenses in carrying on appeals in the Rosenberg Case and maintaining the Rosenberg children.

On 3/14/56, a source advised that the Philadelphia Committee to Secure Justice for Morton Sobell in the Rosenberg Case was being disbanded because of a lack of funds and a lack of activity on the part of the Committee.

Another source advised on 5/29/60, that the Philadelphia Sobell Committee continues to operate as a local affiliate of the Committee to Secure Justice for Morton Sobell. It is a non-membership organization which conducts its activities through a Planning Committee consisting of no set number of people, usually eight to twelve individuals. PEARL CHERTOV is the Chairman of the Philadelphia Sobell Committee, and JEAN D. FRANTJIS takes a leading role in the Planning Committee activities.

A third source advised on 5/26/60, that as of that date PEARL CHERTOV was the Organizer of the Philadelphia Branch of the Socialist Workers Party.

[REDACTED] a series of forums under the nominal sponsorship of the Philadelphia Social Science Forum Committee (PSSFC). The source stated the PSSFC was merely a paper organization, and this series of forums was organized by the District Education Commission (CPEFD). [REDACTED]

This source advised 6/12/59, that the PSSFC remained under the control of the District Education Commission, CPEFD. It was planned by RUBIN that a new series of forums would be conducted in the fall of 1959.

The same source advised 11/5/59, that a new series of PSSFC forums would be held on the second Friday of each month, beginning 11/13/59, and running through May 1960, at the Adelphi Hotel, Philadelphia. [REDACTED]

This source further advised on 5/24/60, that the final forum of the current series is scheduled for May 27, 1960. Interest has waned, and no plans exist at the present time for resumption of the forum series in the fall of 1960. The source reported that DANIEL RUBIN, who was largely responsible for the success of the PSSFC, in January 1960, was appointed National Youth Secretary, CPUSA, and no one has shown the same interest in promoting the PSSFC.
