Support for Sobell has broadened in the past year to include groups and individuals of widely divergent political views. The Central Conference of American Rabbis and the California Democratic Council last year targed a review of the case.

"SLENDER IN PROOF": An independent study by a group including Dr. Nie-buhr and Prof. Edmund Cahn of New York University concluded that the cast against Sobell was "vague in content and slender in proof." The appeal by clergymen to be presented to President

Eisenhoper states:

"Whenever human beings are implied in matters of judgment and justice, there does exist the possibility of human error. Most particularly, when a trial reflects the national tensions of the day, the verdict may suffer from prejudice or unreason, too difficult to dismiss. Every American who thinks about his own freedoms cannot help but concern himself when the question of this kind of an injustice is raised.

"It is impressive, therefore, that throughout his imprisonment, Morton Sobell has proclaimed his innocence. Moreover, 30 years is a lifetime sentence that the mother, wife and children of Morton Sobell share with him. It is the quality of mercy that insists that we, who feel the conscience of the United States as a particular responsibility, advices you, Mr. President, to ask that you use your great office to urge a new trip! for Morton Sobell, or grant him clentency by commutation of his sentence."


Morton Sobell has been in prison since August, 1950, that is, since he was kidnapped from Mexico by FBI agents and held for trial with the Rosenbergs in 1951 for conspiracy to commit espionage. He has proclaimed his innocence and his wife Helen, his mother Rose and unfold thousands of Americans have fought unceasingly for legal justice for him, and for executive clemency to terminate his 30-year scatence. In prison he has developed a gallstone condition which may require surgery. He has been riging to follow a correcfive dict, but without cooperation of Atlanta Pentiertiary authorities. Ted Jacobs, director of the Committee to Secure Justice for Morton Sobell, notified members of the Committee by letter about the rejection the host recent appeal for clemency. The letter follows in part:

A ITH DISILLUSIONMENT and anger, we report that the Kennedy Administration, acting through its Justice Department, has refused clemency to Morton Sobell. The months of assurances from the White House that a fresh study of the case was being made have culminated in a cold, unyielding letter from Deptuy Attorney General Byron White adhering to the past position that elemency would be considered only if parole were denied. The furthest possible parole eligibility date is relterated (Aug. a, 1962), and there is nothing to indicate that purole would even then be considered favorably.

Immediate phone conversations with people in the White House failed to establish whether or not President Kennedy participated in the decision. But unless it is shown to be otherwise, we must assume that this is the Administration's callous answer to the poignant appeals for a symbolic act of humanity and justice.

At the same time the Justice Department was condemning Morton to still further suffering. President Kennedy was announcing the promotion of trial judge Irving Kaufman to the U.S. Court of Appeals. Kaufman's chief claim to fame is his death sentence of the Rosenbergs, president

of hysteria that shamed us before the world. He is rewarded. Morton Sobell, an innocent man Kaufman condemned to an outrageous 30-year sentence, is condemned to further torment.

HEN THE NEWS of the latest setback came, Helen Sobell, Morton's wife, was sitting in the office of attorney Marshall Perlin. She said: "They're killing my husband slowly, but just as surely as if it were done at once." In those words were the accumulation of years of torment. But then immediately she wrote to President Kennedy:

"If it is indeed your decision, Mr. President, which has answered the appeals of so many enjanet Americans, and of our family, by denying to us the chance of life, let us hear it from you. Even then I shall exercise my right to do all in my power to raise up every voice which will speak for decency and

bring it clamoring to your door to thange your decision."

weariness from our long efforts which we hoped would be ending. Yet we know all of us committed to justice in this case can only react in one unified way—rebound with a completely overhauled public drive geared to the new situation. Together we have moved mountains to bring the vast support that exists. We will move bigger mountains to tear open this case in the glaring light of public opinion so that public officials will have no choice but to release Morton Sobell.

With speedy action essential, we de-

- 1. There must be an entirely new type of effort. To plan this jointly, we are calling Sobell Committee representatives to an Emergency National Sobell Committee Meeting for the weekend of Oct. 14 and 15, in New York City. Preliminary ideas are being sent all committees for local discussion.
- 2. Our attorneys, the firm of Donner. Perlin and Piel, will be in court within a few weeks with a battery of new motions prepared for this eventuality. The attorneys are also acting to guarantee Morton adequate diet and medical care in the face of a possible need for gall bladder surgery.
- 3. At once, you should call important persons in your city who have appealed previously, and ask them to write rejecting the deputy Attorney General's letter as the President's final answer.
- 4. We urgently need funds to take care of all that must be done immediately.

In conclusion, we do not minimize the severity of the blow from Washington. We do not fool ourselves about the enormity of what must be accomplished. Nor do we have the answers for all that we must do.

We do know with all our strength, that the Bobell case cannot be buried with a "no" from Washington, whether the frontier be new or old.

REPORT TO READERS

Volume 14, No. 1

THIS IS THE FIRST ISSUE of the 14th year of the NATIONAL GUARDIAN. Anniversaries are an evocative time and as each bright blue October rolls around and the GUARDIAN completes another year, the temptation is strong to review the past, tick off the bright spots and the gloomy ones and tot up a current score.

But we believe history is a continuing process, nurtured in the past, for good or evil; making its way (sometimes backward) in the present, and casting the portents of the time to come. In this sense, as we come back up from October, 1948, we can say with reason: Wasn't that a time to try the soul of man—and isn't it still?

Born as it was in a time of hope in the Progressive Party, the GUAPDIAN looked ahead then—albeit with storm warnings raised—to a break in the ominous gathering of the cold-war clouds. But there was no break: indeed the storms broke often, and the hurricane still threatens. Roosevelt was dead. The warrior Churchill had spoken at Fulton, Mo., and the narrow mind of Harry Truman confined the sights of America. The brothers Dulles moved to the fore with J. Edgar Hoover and the Congress of the United States became openly the lickspittle for the great industrial combines and their lobbies.

Sobell children appeal to world leaders

ORTON SOBELL'S children, Mark 12 and Sydney, 21, have written an appeal to world leaders for their father's freedom from prison, to be presented at a demonstration before the United Nations buildings in New York from 5 to 6:30 p.m., Thursday, Nov. 16, organized by the Committee for Justice for Morton of the Organized by the Committee for Justice for Morton

Sobell, 940 Broadway, N.Y. 10. The appeal cites the support of world figures such as Bertrand Russell, Pablo Casals, Jean Paul Sartre, Martin Buber, Harold Urey, Linus Pauling and Martin Luther King, and expresses confidence that other world leaders will join them "when you have looked at this case and know that all our family was brutally kidnaped while we were on a vacation in Mexico, that our father was beaten on the head with a gun, that he was told to confess to a crime which he had not committed, and then sent to Alcatraz because he refused to testify untruthfully against the Rosenbergs."

Only one witness appeared against their father at his trial in 1951, the appeal said, "and he [Max Elitcher—Ed.] was an ad-

mitted perjurer."
The appeal asks intervention by the Hunan Rights Division of the UN.

ON SUNDAY. NOV. 26, between 2:30 and 5 p.m., persons from all over the Eastern seaboard will appeal at the White House for Sobell's release. Special buses will leave for Washington at 9 a.m. from 940 Broadway, New York City, returning to New York by 10:30 p.m. The roundarip is \$16.

HE SOBELL FAMILY—Morton Sobeli's elderly mother, Rose; his wife, Helen, and his son and daughter, Mark, 12, and Sydney, 21-are taking the light for Sobell's freedom both to the White House Kennedy Jamily and to world leaders through the UN.

On Nov. 13, they were joined in a "prayer walk" before the White House by a group of Ohio ministers and rabbis, protesting the 30-year sentence, of which Sobell has served more than ten, for alleged participation in an espionage conspiracy, and urging that the sentence be commuted to the time he has served.

• The Sunday after Thanksgiving. Nov. 26, the Committee of Secure Justice for Morton Sobell, arranged a White House vigil by busloads of Sobell supporters from the eastern seaboard, and the sobell family planned to hold a vigil of its own at wherever the White House Kennedys ate Thanksgiving dinner.

EANWHILE, on Nov. 18, the four Sobells with a gathering of friends picketed the dedication of the new Fordham University School of Law in New York's Lincoln Square cultural center, where Attorney General Robert Kennedy made the principal speech. Among the guests at the dedication were Federal Judge Irving S. Kaufman, a Fordham graduate and the judge who sentenced Sobell to 30 years and the Rosenbergs to death when they were tried jointly in 1951; and Herbert Brownell, attorney general under the first Eisenhower Administration who, like his predecessor under President Truman, shelved elemency pleas for the Rosenbergs from people all over the world including the Pope.

Kaufman left the ceremony without being seen by the pickets. Brownell spoke briefly with Helen Sobell, who reminded him of the years she had tried to bring the case to his personal attention.

When Attorney General Kennedy came out, the Sobell family walked along with him for a block or more. The picket signs told who they were. Twelve-year old Mark exclaimed, "My father is innocent. Please let my father go!" Sydney, a poised young woman, reminded him of the many times the family had tried to see him. Helen Sobell asked for an interview then and there on one aspect of the case. "Come to Washington," Kennedy replied. "There are people there to hear such appeals as yours."

"Do you mean Byron White?" Mrs. Sobell asked, referring to Kennedy's assistant, with whom she had been corresponding.

"Your attorneys know who to see," Kennedy replied. "They are very active in your husband's behalf." He added that he had given the case personal study, and concurred with the decisions in it

HAT HELEN SOBELL sought to discuss with Kennedy was not the verdict and sentence—which have been protested by tens of thousands of people from all nations and walks of life during the last decade—but the present decision of the government, communicated to Mrs. Sobell by Byron White, to exact from Sobell an additional 437 days of imprisonment before considering his right to parole. The little-known story is this:

Prior to his trial, Sobeli was held in prison eight months for lack of \$100,000 bail. After his conviction he was taken to Atlanta penitentiary and the family did not have enough money to pay for lawyers' trips to prepare his appeal. In order to be transferred back to New York to be able to confer with his lawyers, Sobell signed a document electing not to begin service of his sentince pending the outcome of his appeal. So that, although Sobell has been imprisoned continuously since the summer of 1950, his term tecnically began Dec. 19, 1952, when his appeal was rejected.

Mrs. Sobell wrote to Byron White this month that her husband would have been free during the eight months preceding the trial [and customarily during the appeal period too] if they had been able to post the \$100.000 bail. "He was then being punished for one reason only," she wrote, "lack of money, I cannot believe that our Constitution and law can accept this as equitable treatment."

THIS AND OTHER constitutional points will be fought out in the ensuing weeks and months by Sobell's family and lawyers. Meanwhile the family asks all its supporters to "give a day of your life" or even a few minutes or a few dollars to help press the fight.

At least, write to the Attorney General and the President, asking executive elemency for Sobell; or at the very least, send a contribution today to Helen Sobell at the committee office, 940 Broadway, New York 10, N.Y.



SAMPAIGN FOR RELEASE OF HER HUSBAND

London welcomes Helen Sobell, Paris refuses to admit her

By Gordon Schaffer

RS. MORTON SOBELL won the support of many prominent persons in her campaign for the release of her imprisoned husband during her stay in London on the first leg of her European visit. She departed for Amsterdam on Feb. 11, and from there goes on to Brussels, Paris, Rome and Stockholm, then returning to London. Sobell is serving 30 years on a conviction of conspiracy to commit espionage in wartime.

"I have been able to do a great deal in a very short time," Mrs. Sobell said, "because so many people know about the, unjust imprisonment of my husband and, are anxious to help. In other cities friends, will be waiting for me and arrangements have been made for me to see leading people."

Mrs. Sobell received sympathetic publicity in the newspapers, including the Times, the Daily Telegraph and the Daily Herald.

MP PETITION: Mrs. Sobell had tea at the House of Lords with Lord Chorley and also met a group of Labor MPs who plan to get signatures of other MPs to a letter calling for Sobell's release.

A lawyers organization, the Haldane Society, called a meeting for Mrs. Sobell at the London School of Economics. The Bishop of Woolwich has expressed his desire to help and many clergymen are interested in the case. Scientists have also indicated readiness to aid, and Eermand Russell told the Daily Herald, "I investigated the case and I consider Sobell's trial was a complete missarriage of justice."

Mrs. Sobell also talked to trade union leaders and to writers, including Arnold Wesker. Before leaving for Amsterdam she wrote to Winston Churchill, asking him to back her appeal.

When Mrs. Sobell returns to London a number of groups will be ready for action. The first step will be an appeal for Sobell's immediate release through executive elemency.

I alighted from the plane in Paris almost gaily, carrying gifts of fine Belgian lace and an exquisite little gold box of chocolates. As I handed my passport and embarkation card to the officer I saw him become agitated. He quickly reported to his superior at the other desk, and I was told to stand aside, I was not alarmed, thinking that my friends in Paris had perhaps made some special arrangements with regard to gaining public support.

NO ENTRY: The officer led me to a small room and through an interpreter told me that I was not to be permitted entry into Paris but must purchase another ticket and return to Brussels of London. I asked the reason and was told that there was none, only an order from the Prime Minister. I asked to be permitted to speak to my friend in Paris, but this was refused, as were my requests to call Brussels or London to make arrangements. Nor could I be permitted to go on to Rome, a procedure which would at least have saved me the expense of a return trip I had not anticipated.

When I realized I would be permitted no choice in the matter, I refused to have anything further to do with it. The officer took my handbag when he saw I had no intention of assisting him in carrying out these decisions, and he proceeded to runnings through my letters from my husband.

cradle of liberty: They then proceeded first to coax and then command me to leave, but I felt this was not my responsibility, and so they then carried me in the chair on which I was sitting out to the airplane. I waved and called to my waiting friends, "Goodby, I'm sorry I can not come to you. Please help me free my innocent husband."

They lifted me out of the chair and carried me feet first up the steps of the plane, and with a great sigh of relief deposited my 100 pounds on the last seat in the cabin. I almost laughed at the entire incident as we rose over beautiful Paris the cradle of liberty, but it was a heart-ick laugh, full of sorrow at what could happen in a once proud city.



"As I sat in homes which had billeted the Nazis and spoke to those who had seen the ravages of war I understood the depth of feeling which I found." Mrs. Sobell told me. "To the people of Europe Morton was a man who had suffered as many of them had and they looked to his release as a sign of the ending of the Cold War and the beginning of justice."

She had met with Bertrand Russell, Gunnar Myrdal, Lord Chorley, playwright Arnold Wesker, and the Bishop of Woolwich. All promised to send statements to President Kennedy asking for her husband's release. Thirty MPs with whom she lunched at the House of Commons promised to send statements and to visit the American ambassador in London. H. E. Newbold, secretary of the Lancashire Federation of Trades Councils, has written: "I wish to associate my name with the campaign being waged for the re-lease of Morton Sobell, who was unjustifiably imprisoned by the U.S. Government on a charge of theft of atom-bomb secrets in which the chief state witness has confessed to perjury. In the name of justice and humanity. I support the world-wide call for this man's release." The council, which represents 2 million workers, was to discuss a resolution seeking Sobell's release at its annual conference March 24.

There was wide coverage of Mrs. Sobell's visit in each country. The French press carried reports of her ejection from Paris. She had been denied entry "on an order from the Prime Minister." No reason was given.

The President of the Italian Senate promised Mrs. Sobell that he would visit the American ambassador in Rome. The League for the Rights of Man in Belgium will request executive elemency. The Queen Mother of Belgium is sending a greeting to the April 7 meeting in New York, and wrote President Kennedy urging Sobell's release.

Helen Sobell and I talked the day before she departed for the West Coast. It had been a week since her return from Europe. As she left me to hurry to another appointment, she appeared fresh and rested and eager to push on in the elemency campaigh. In smazement, I asked: "Why aren't you tired?" She turned as she half-ran down the street. "I am," she said, laughing.

A new appeal for Sebell

ELEN SOBELL and he son, Mark, presented an appeal on April 7 to Ambassador Adlai Stevenson urging that President Kennedy free Morton Sobell frem prison. Mrs. Sobell led 200 persons in a "walk for justice" from the Hotel Lelmont Piaza, where a breakfast meeting had been held, to the U.S. Mission to the United Nations.

Mrs. Sobell presented an appeal by 30 British Labor Party Members of Parliament, British attorney Gerald Gardiner and Queen Elisabeth, the Queen Mother of Belgium. Mrs. Sobell reported that Stevenson said, "It will be my pleasure to do something about looking into your petition."

At the breakfast meeting Murrat Kempton, columnist, lauded the Sobells as "a great and noble couple."

Two days earlier the sixth appeal by Sobell was denied. Sobell sought a new trial or his release. Attorney Marshall Perlin had argued that Sotell's interests had been prejudiced by the unconstitutional cross-examination of Ethel Rosenberg during which she answered quistions which she had refused to answer on Fifth Amendment grounds to a grand jury. Judge John F. X. McGohey in denying the petition said: "The rule is clear that one who joins an existing conspiracy takes it as it is, and is therefore held accountable for the prior conduct of the co-conspirators." Sabell was convicted/ of conspiracy to commit espionage.

Among those who support Sobell's clemency plea are: Lord Bertrand Russell, Dr. Martin Buber, Jean-Paul Sartre and Pablo Casals.



The state of the nation

A STREAM of recent events should disturb everyone concerned about the welfare of the nation.

The United States Information Service is now distributing as its official propaganda the book You Can Trust the Communists, by fascist-oriented Dr. Fred Schwarz, head of the Unristian-Anti-Communist Crusade. Attorney General Robert Kennedy has announced that he won't even submit the case of Morton Sobell to President John F. Kennedy to be considered for executive elemency.

The Pentagon announces it has prepared a list of 4,000 "defense facilities," with many thousands more to be added, where all workers are to be screened to bar members of any "communistation organization." The lawyer who guided the CIO in its purge of all dissenting left-wing unions and unionists and braintrusted the era of AFL-CIO McCarthyism, Arthur Goldberg, is appointed to the Supreme Court. A leading Catholic magazine edited by Jesus priests, America, makes an attack against American Jews for their support of the Supreme Court's stand against religious practices in public schools and warns the Jews that their efforts may invite increased anti-Semitism.

N THE SOUTH 69 Northern religious leaders are jailed for publicly praying for desegration in Albany, Ga. In Cairo, Ill., seven

weiling persons are chain-whipped and bloodied as the police idin watch. The righth school year since the Supreme Courf desegregation decision begins, with only token compliance in most of the South, and no compliance in three states. The nation's civil rights leaders vainly call for effective aid while the nation's leaders, headed by President Kennedy, stand aside from the brutal struggle.

In Spain a compliant Adhai Stevenson bows and scrapes, and flatters the Fascist Franco dictatorship already tottering before the gathering democratic fury of the Spanish people, and Stevenson thereby earns the bitter hostility of all liberal Spaniards (see the del Vayo story, page 1). On the floor of Congress a disgraceful parade of Northern Democrats pays disgusting tribute to Franco, with no rebuke from Congress or White House President Kennedy cyaically tells the world that he's against invading Cuba "at this time" and the cynical press corps laughs knowingly.

THE MARGIN of one vote in a single congressional committee more than 900,000 long-term jobless are deprived of even a limited and temporary extension of their already exhausted jobless benefits. The Senate kills a plan to end a billion-dollar tax evasion of the rich by collecting taxes on interest and dividends just as wage taxes are now collected. Medical care for aged is defeated almost without a fight, keeping the U.S. near the bottom of the list of nations in social security standards. Meanwhile Congress gives a space satellite bonanza worth \$24 billion into the hands of the American Telephone & Telegraph Co.

The coming of the fifth post-World War II recession is generally and complacently accepted, while at the top of today's "boom" the steel industry works at 50% capacity and 8 million Americans lack full-time 10bs.

HESE ARE THE MARKS of a nation losing its pace and its place. They are the signals of a nation faltering before the great political, economic and technological challenges and potentialities of the 20th Century. Abraham Lincoln said, "To remain silent in the face of evil makes cowards of men." Today America needs an avalanche of bold protest to reverse this dismal descent and restore the country to the path of peace, of semante democracy, and of social and economic progress.

Sobell committee to hold conference

in a letter to Mrs. Morton Sobell dates Aug. 29, Robert Kennedy said the question of Sobell's release is up to the parole board, which recently denied his application. The attorney general said the petition for executive elemency got "careful consideration" and it was decided the President "should not be asked" to act.

In an answering letter dated Aug. 29, Mrs. Sobell wrote: "For the past two years now we have been given to understand by spokesmen for this administration that my husband, Morton Sobell, would be freed. Air. Byron White's letter postponing the decision on executive elemency until after the parole period had been reached was the culmination of a series of unconscionable promises and half-promises. You seek now to place this matter within the complete jurisdiction of the parole board in an effort to avoid a responsibility which is rightly that of the President.



The death of Dr. Soblen

OBERT SOBLEN IS DEAD, and the weighty volumes on the codes of jurisprudence which have been promulgated under our Judeo-Christian civilization have been slammed shut on three continents. But the closed covers will not banish the haunting figure who has claimed headlines in the press of the world.

The spectacle of the government of the United States, using all the powerful forces at its command to hound a man halfway across the world and to threaten and blackmail two sovereign governments to do its biddin, will not soon be forgotten. Nor will the weasely and hypocritical actions on the part of Israel and Britain

The facts in the Soblen case have been presented in this paper for many months past, and are summed up on page 3 by William A. Reuben, a reporter whose stubborn persistence in the Soblen case, and in the Rosenberg-Sobell case before it, will one day be acclaimed for the searching and responsible journalism which it is. Dr. Soblen was found guilty, to be sure, but the question of his guilt or innocence could hardly be determined on the basis of the government's presentation in what the high-minded—if blood-thirsty—editorial writers refer to as an "open and fair trial in a free society."

ORDS ARE USED TO FILL THE GAP where reason leaves off.
The Soblen case goes far beyond the question of guilt or inmovence. Robert Soblen, dead of his own hand in a London hospital,
is a victim of the Cold War as sure as Ethel and Julius Rosenberg,
dead of the hand of the state, are victims of the Cold War; and
Morton Sobell, wasting in a prison cell, is a victim for refusing to
sell his soul to advance the big lie of the Cold War's directorate.

This directorate needs cases like the Soblen case to maneuver a misinformed public into accepting repressive legislation like the Smith Act and the McCarran Internal Security Act, the Walter-McCarran Immigration Act and the Taft-Hartley Act with its anti-communist oath provisions. It needs these legislative abortions to stifle opposition to the Cold War and the fantastic profit-tuking that is its main by-product. What does it matter that there may be innocent victums? These, after all, are part of the price a "free society" must pay to preserve our way of plunder under the protective umbrella of the federal law.

THE EXPERIENCES OF THE SOBLEN CASE have a direct bearing on an address by Supreme Court Justice William O. Douglas at the Earl Warren Institute of Ethics and Human Relations in Los Angeles in June. There was, he said, a long history behind the decline in American prestige which began after World War II. We of the West, he said, powerful in ideas and in armed strength, are "somewhat crippled." The sapping of this strength he attributed not to subversion but to "prejudices and fear." He went on:

takes place even on crucial issues. . . Why has silence overtaken us? Why has the pattern of no discussion reached into atomic testing, disarmament, Berlin, and other issues that involve the problems of survival or extinction? Is forcign policy—the key to life and death for all forms of life in this nuclear age—beyond the bounds of debate?"

A survey of the press, he said, shows coast-to-coast "the low estate of dialogue on domestic as well as foreign issues. [The press rindicated this finding by almost blacking out the Douglas address I Money-makers have taken over the press. . . The result is a press which with few exceptions gives no true account of forces at work in the world. Ignorance alone is tragedy enough. Further tragedy lies in the fact that the people of the United States—the ones who could, if awakened, take up the challenge of the Cold War and win it—are largely immobilized. Fears of communism are subtly translated into fears of the unorthodox."

Justice Douglas's comments, coming as they do from the apparatus of American justice which dealt with the Soblen case, are like a burst of fresh air in a suffocating cell. We would, if we were editing the speech, change only one word. We would say "end" the Cold War rather than "win" it. For it is our belief that there can be no winner in this war. There can be only a world-wide holocaust... or an end which would set the stage for a peaceful competition between systems in which there could actually be a winner—for the benefit of mankind.

In such a setting there would be no sufferance for a Soblen case or a Rosenberg case; and a Morton Sobell would be working in a laboratory, in freedom, seeking, let us say, a cure for leukemia.

Abraham A. Heller

BRAHAM A. HELLER, one of the pioneers of socialism and one of the earliest friends of the Soviet Union, died on Sept. 18 after an illness of several months. When some of us gathered the next dirt with his family and relatives, there was not one among as who did not feel that the life of a very unusual man had come to an end. Abe would have been 88 in October.

Abe Heller came to the United States from Russia as a boy of 16, a member of a large and poor Jewish family from Moscow. He had attended a good Russian school, where he acquired a solid education; he was an avid reader, well acquainted with the best in Russian literature, a museum visitor, a lover of music and theater.

The economic circumstances of his family and the discrimination against Jews compelled him to abandon his wish to become an ingineer; and, once in the U.S., he went to night school to learn English and study American literature, but was unable to acquire any specialized training since, like so many other immigrants, he had to go to work immediately. He had an almost insatiable inirectly learning and knowledge and, at the age of 44, enrolled as a student at Harvard, where he intended to study for several years to prepare himself for "a socialist career" as a writtr and

lecturer. However, he left Harvard after a brief time to become commercial attache to the first representative of the Soviet Union in the U.S.

Heller became a successful businessman. His father and he started as peddlers of supplies needed for the repair of jewelry and watches; they were later joined by one of Abe's brothers and developed a profitable jewelry business which, after retively few years, took

Abe to Europe, where he established business contacts in the jewelry centers. Later he became head of the European branch of the
family business with headquarters in Paris, where, with his flate for
business opportunities, he developed from merchant into industrialist. He started, with the help of a French chemist, production
of synthetic gems and, what eventually became more important,
bought French patents for the production of oxygen in the U.S. and
Canada, which enabled him to establish successful oxygen plants
in North America.

HE DEVELOPMENT of these businesses made him economically more and more independent and permitted him to cook. It first, part of his time and, later, all his time and his unusual energy to his many activities in behalf of socialism. Abe had acquired, at an early age, a critical understanding of capitalism; socialism became his creed which, despite his business ventures, was his constant and ever-present preoccupation, and to which he was at all times ready to make any sacrifice compatible with the necessities of life.

As a youngster, he became a member of the Russian Social-Democratic Club on East Broadway; he later joined De Leon's Socialist Labor Party, which he seems to have left together with a segment of the party that formed the Socialist Pary. Heller remained active in the party, but always belonged to the "left" and was one of those who, after the Russian Revolution, broke away from the party to start the organized Communist movement in the U.S.

Abe's association with the first Soviet Mission to the U.S. was the beginning of many years of activities in behalf of the Soviet Union. He was one of the first American visitors to Soviet Russia and revisited the country many times. He helped organized trade with the Soviet Union and assisted effectively in her early industrialization. During that period he devoted more and more time to organizational work in the U.S., particularly after having retired completely from business at a relatively early age.

OR MANY YEARS, there was nothing happening on the American Left to which Abe Heller did not contribute his help, his financial resources and his time. To mention a few: Soviet Russia Today, of which he was the first editor: Friends of the Soviet Union, the National Council of American-Soviet Friendship, the League against War and Fascism and the North-American Committee to Help Loyalist Spain. Because of his belief in education and his interest in the distribution of Marxist literature, he was particularly pleased about the successful development of International Publishers and the Jefferson School, both of which he had helped establish tas some years before he had assisted in organization of the Rand School).

While it would be difficult to enumerate all the causes in which Heller was active, mention must be made of the Committee to Secure Justice for Morton Sobell, one of his chief interests.

However important Heller's activities were, more important was the kind of man he was: he was a most modest, unassuming and gracious person, of rare generosity, great integrity and unfaltering loyalty to his ideals and convictions. He was blessed by being able to devote a large part of his life and energy to the work which meant most to him: to help in the development of a socialist society.

ORD BERTRAND RUSSELL, in a message to a Washington hearing Oct. 30 of the U.S. Parole Board, charged that imprisoned scientist Morton Sobell was "an innocent man" whose 30-year sentence "was a vicious act of injustice in the tradition of judicial murders which have been prevalent at different periods of American history."

Declaring Sobell was convicted of corpiracy to commit esplonage "on the solo and uncorroborated testimony of an acmowledged perjurer," the British philtesopher said: "Twelve years (in fail) is long enough for vengeance, guilty or innocent. But this is an innocent man. I appeal for his release in the name of conscience, mercy and human decency."

The Parole Board in its first hearing on the Sobell case, heard pleas from many persons. Mrs. Helen Sobell gave the board a print of a new documentary film on the case and asked the members to view it, in the hope it would continue the members to release her husband, now imprisoned in Atlanta

ORE THAN A DECADE of legal procedures, of judges, prosecutors, death, and the living death of 30 years in prison weighted the pause in which Judya Thurgood Marshall waited for the answer of U.S. Attorney Robert J. Geniesse, Judge Marshall had asked, "If Ethel Rosenberg were tried, say last spring, and we had her conviction before this court today, wouldn't we have to reverse on the authority of Grunewald?" A hush fell upon the courtroom of the Second Circuit of Appeals in Foley Square, New York, Judges Henry J. Friendly and Thomas W. Swan, listened attentively to the argument being presented to the three-judge bench.

HIS SCENE TOOK PLACE Dec. 7, well into the 13th year of imprisonment for my husband, Morton Sobell, and as the tenth anniversary of the execution of Ethel and Julius Rosenberg approached. A new examination of "the outstanding political trial of our generation" was being demanded. Our attorneys, Marshall Perlin and Sanford Katz, had finished their discussion of two motions that challenge both the decision and sentencing in the Rosenberg-Sobell case. Perlin had discussed the conduct of the prosecutor as he questioned Ethel Rosenberg in March, 1951, during

the trial. As Ethel had answered question after question, the prosecutor asked each time, "But when you were asked this question before the Grand Jury, tidn't you then refuse to answer this quistion because you said it would incriminate you?"

Ethel had stated, and her attorney, the late Emanuel Bloch, h a d pointed out again and againi that no inference may be drawn from the use of the Fifth Amendment, that it is the refuge of the innocent against the overwhelming power of the state. More than 125 questions were -asked of Ethel relating to her appearance beiors the Grand Jury. It was four years after her death that the U.S. Supreme Court had ruled, in the Grunewald case, which involved tax evasion, that



it was prejudical error for a judge to permit such questioning.

HE U.S. ATTORNEY, answering our lawyers, argued that after 12 years we were not entitled to be heard, that the time had long since run out, that any number of appeals had already been turned down, etc. It was on technical and procedural grounds that this appeal must be summarily disposed of, he said. Further, he argued that even if this Grunewald decision applied, it was so far away from Morton Sobell that he could not avail himself of it because the prejudice would have to be connected from Sobell through Elitcher (the only witness against Sobell), through Julius Rosenb. 3, to Ethel. Judge Friendly commented that the defense could use the same reasoning and "get more mileage" out of it.

Again in debating our second motion, which held that the wartime Sobell sentence of 30 years was illegal, Geniesse stressed the time lapse since the decision. One judge then asked, almost angrily, "Hasn't this man been in Atlanta prison during this period? You're not arguing that he wanted to say there and was biding his time?"

Our challenge was based on the fact that the charge by Judge Irving R. Kaufman had omitted the element charging the jury to find that the alleged crime had been committed in time of war. When this was revealed there seemed to be a flurry of shock on the banch. "Why wasn't this raised before?" Perlin replied, "It was the teaching of Lee v. Madigan which brought this hitherto administrative question into the purview of the court." (In that case the Supreme Court held the war ended with the cessation of hostilities.)

THIS COURTROOM where I had sat before, in this building where I had watched the lying witnesses and the scheming prosecutor talk away the lives of Ethel and Julius, and send Morton to the unbelievable years of Alcatraz and Atlanta, for the first time there seemed to be a listening. All the many persons who had never accepted the Rosenberg-Sobell verdicts seemed crowded into the quiet room. The Pope, the President of France, the millions from all over the world who cried, "Wait, there are doubts," converged upon the moment of waiting.

Judge Marshall had stripped the question of mumbo-jumbo as he asked what effect the Grunewald ruling might have had on the Rosenberg verdicts. And the U.S. attorney answered: "This court would probably have to rule in favor of the defendant." His words cannot bring life to Ethel and Julius. If the lesson can be learned, it can bring Morton's freedom.

A doctor who has examined all available information about Morton's health says he may be in a dangerous condition. Don't permit this senseless forment to continue so that years later another U.S. Attorney can admit that justice was woefully served. Please write how to the President asking for Christmas release for Morton. My mother Rose and I ask for your help.—Helen Subell

KENNEDY URGED TO GRANT RELEASE

A new appeal for Sobell

PROSECUTION statement in recent court proceedings that Ethel Rosenberg would probably be entitled to a new trial today has been cited as basis for an appeal to President Kennedy to grant a new year release to imprisoned Morton Sobell. The appeal was filed by Helen Sobell in behalf of her husband, serving the 13th year of a 30-year sentence and still trying to prove his innocence of the "conspiracy to commit espionage" of which he was convicted in the 1951 trial with Julius and Ethel Rosenberg.

On Dec. 7, during argument before the U.S. Court of Appeals on Sobell's motions for a new trial or freedom (GUARDIAN, Dec. 13), Judge Thurgood Marshall posed a question. It was asked in light of the U.S. Supreme Court ruling in the Grune-wald-Halperin tax case condemning as illegal prosecution cross-examination at-

tacking a witness for having asserted Constitutional rights under the Flfth Amendment before the Grand Jury, as was the case with Ethel Rosenberg.

"If Ethel Rosenberg were tried, say last spring." Marshall asked, "and we had her conviction before the court to-day, wouldn't we have to reverse?"

U.S. Attorney Robert J. Geniesse responded, "Yes, it would probably have to reverse."

While Sobell was not accused of acts related to atomic espionage, his case was influenced by any unfair cross-examination of Ethel Rosenberg because it was a conspiracy trial, Sobell's attorneys have pointed out.

The U.S. Parole Board is weighing possible release in view of Sobell's parole eligibility. The U.S. Court of Appeals has the legal motions under advisement.

Sobeli turned down again in parole bid

HE UNITED STATES Parole Board in Washington, D.C., has denied the new appeal for parole of Morton Sobell, serving a 30-year prison term on conviction of conspiring to commit espionage.

Parole Executive Joseph N. Shore, in letters dated Jan. 7 to Sobell's wife Helen and his mother Rose, said the board, while denying parole, is seeking further information on Sobell's physical condition. Sobell has been suffering severtion, Sobell has been suffering severtionach discomfert, not alleviated by a gall bladder removal in prison, and his coctor expressed serious concern for him at the parole hearing Oct. 30.

The parole denial was assailed by Prof. Thomas I. Emerson of the Yale Law School as a "disgrace to our democratic society." Emerson said it seemed to be the general policy of the board to deny parole to persons convicted of politice offenses. Others who protested inch dediwriter Dwight Macdonald, Rabbi Philip Horowitz of Cleveland and Rev. David Colwell, chairman of the department of church and society, Council of Churches, Washington, D.C.

The Rosenberg verdict

BROOKLYN, N. Y.
Attorneys for Morton Sobell. and astute questioning by Cir-Judge Court Marshall, elicited a major concessica Dec. 7 from the U.S. Attorney. In the appeal of Morion Sobell in the Federal Court-house in New York, Robert J Geniesse, while arguing against Sobell's plea, conceded that if Ethel Rosenberg's appeal were held now, under fair conditions, particularly in the light of the Supreme Court decision in the Grunewald case (dealing with methods of questioning), conviction would "prob-"probably have to be reversed (GUARD-IAN, Dec. 12). While Mr. Geniesse did not extend his concession to cover Julius Rosenberg, it is clear that the reversal would have had to apply to him, too. It is almost ten years since U.S Supreme Court Justice Hugo Black protested bitterly on the day of the Rosenbergs' execu-tions, June 19, 1953: "This court has never reviewed this record to determine whether the de-fendants had received a fair trini." If Justice Black's wisdom had only been heeded, the U.S. would not, now, have the Rosenberns' lives on its conscience! The unfairness which victim-

ized the Rosenbergs can never be undone. Their co-detendant Morton Sobell, is still around, however, now spending his 13th year in prison at Atlanta Penitentiary in Georgia. Since his "guilt" was predicated upon that of the Rosenberge, he is entitled to the same reversal which fair play, admittedly, would have required for Julius and Ethel Rosenberg

A new trial or freedom for Sobell is even more argent when we recall that Sobell's conviction rested on the totally uncorroborated testimony of only one witness, a confessed perjurer, testifying in hopes of not being punished (he never was) for his own crimes.

Court rebuffs Sobell, despite new-trial grounds

N IMPORTANT decision of the Unit.

ed States Court of Appeals Feb. 6, while denying a new trial to Morton Sobell, has acknowledged that under the law a interpreted today to Rosembergs and Sobell would be entitled to a new trial.

In a 29-page opinion Judges Swan. Friendly and Marshall of the U.S. Second Circuit Court of Appeals held in the main that even though there might have been grounds for challenging aspects of the trial pertaining to Sobell at the time, it is too late now and he must remain in prison.

credibility of a defendant because he previously exercised Constitutional rights under the 5th Amendment to questions answered at the trial. It was the same Second Circuit Appeals Court now refusing Sobell's plea that the Supreme Court overruled in the Grunewald case.

The Sobell Committee, hoping the Appeals Court will be overruled again, is taking steps to carry the case to the Supreme Court.

The decision, referring to the way the prosecution attacked Ethel Rosenberg in cross-examination, said that "the inquiry about the prior claim of privilege in regard to crossions answered at the trial otherwise than by outright denials—for example those concerning Mrs. Rosenberg's relations with the Greenglasses and her consultation with her lawyer—would fall under the analysis made by the majority in Grunewald."

If the question had been raised in direct appeal earlier to show that Sobell's trial was unfair the court said in effect, his appeal might have prevailed. But to raise the question now under technical

requirements of the law, he must show a constitutional violation, the court contends, and "any constitutional implications must be limited to the person whose claim of privilege was later used against him,"

The court noted that "there is an inevitable attraction" in the position that a person convicted of a serious crime should receive a new trial whenever a later decision of the highest court indicates that with the benefit of hind-sight, a different course should have been followed at his trial in any consequential respect." But the judges hold that such steps would both cause interminable litigation and impair the government.

The Sobell Committee commented:
"There certainly is an inevitable attraction to the principle of righting a wrong.
America now has benefit of hindsight.
But this hindsight can't bring back the Rosenbergs to life. The courts know this, and that is the crux of the twisting and dodging in an effort to protect the verdict at all costs. The same can be said of

A letter to Morton Sobell

A Los Angeles reader has sent the GUARDIAN the following letter:

EAR MORTON SOBELL: Seeing your picture in the Feb. 23 GUARDIAN, I note that you, too, are aging. We are both showing our 40-odd years. I am deeply disappointed that your last ten have been so bitter, or should I say so bitterly untair to year You haven't been bitter, though well you might.

I have to tell you something else. Last week one of the gentlemen who wear hats, who come in pairs so often, telephoned me. I am a public school employe, subject to all sorts of oaths and special rulings. I was asked about a friend who is in jeopardy of various sorts. I declined, gently but firmly to talk to the nice man about him. The caller said. "You signed a loyalty oath?" I replied, "Of course!" Of course I did! The nice man said. "I thought that being a public employe you'd "preier to cooperate." I said, gently, "No. I think not at all." He said, gently too, "This will be part of the record, that you refuse to cooperate." I agreed, "Yes, I suppose it will."

All the time I was thinking that loss of job the possible follow-up—this person refused to cooperate with THE gov-ernment agency, surely you don't want this person, the reaction of my conservative community, all the things that have happened to so many-I thought of you and the brave, beautiful Rosenbergs. I thought how contemptible of me to even be gently polite when the CIA is rampaging again and Betancourt's appearable is setting off a train leading to the war we just dodged. I thought how minor my job loss would be compared to your ordeal.

I thank you for steadying my voice and resolve in a nasty moment. Life begins at 40. I am aging and wrinkling, as I think you are too, but by 40 one is no longer prey to slings and acrows, for we have chosen our fates by this time. I applaud and thank you for your choice.





THE UNITED STATES Supreme Court has been asked by Morton Sobeli, still battling to prove his innocence in his 13th year of imprisonment on a charge of conspiracy to commit espionage, to break with its past refusal to hear his case and review it for the first time.

The latest appeal, filed April 6 by counsel for Sobell, is from a Feb. 6 decision of the U.S. Second Circuit Court of Appeals. Admitting that Ethel Rosenberg, if she had not been executed, might have been able to have her trial voided as unfair under Supreme Court rulings since the execution, the Appeals Court denied Sobell the right to a new trial. The court said the legal point in question was raised too late.



Hay 19, 1953: Ten years after the

death of the Rosenbergs

The NATIONAL GUARDIAN stands in horror and chame before the crime committed by the United Spites government—a crime which stains America's name before the world; which writes the date "June 19, 1953," in mourning black for future generations—mourning for the hope and glory that America once meant to humanity. The hope and the glory will come again. The heroism of the two who have gone to their death is the testimony of that.

—Editorial in the GUARDIAN, June 22, 1953

HE MEMORY OF THE NIGHT the lines above were written is engraved forever in the mind of this writer. The staff was spread around the city and in Washington covering the late developments as the clock ticked the last hours of the lives of Ethel and Julius Rosenberg. The paper was ready for the pressall except page one and the editorial page. All that was needed was a "new lead" to the story which we dreaded writing. It was hours past tress time, but as the clock moved toward 8 that friday night, the princer was with us in the little office above the composing room. "Don't worry about overtime," he said, and he said down to listen with Cedric Belirage, John T. Mc-Minus and me to the radio bulletins.

The last bulletin finally came. I went down with the printer to the composing room and wrote the two-word headline: ROSENBERGS EXECUTED. In a race with God, the government had managed to pull the switch minutes before the beginning of the Jewish Sabbath; it would have been unseemly after sundown.

This week marks the tenth anniversary of the death of Ethel and Julius Rosenberg, convicted on a charge of conspiracy to commit espionage, and the 13th year in prison for Morton Sobell, serving a 30-year term on a similar charge. From the first issue in which the GUARDIAN began to shatter the conspiracy of silence that surrounded this case—Aug. 15, 1961, with a series of articles by William A. Reuben—we have been persuaded of the imposence of the Rosenbergs and Sobell.

It was the GUARDIAN's articles which sparked a world-wide protest campaign exceeding even that of the Tom Mooney case and the Sacco-Vanzetti tragedy. The campaign did not succeed; that is clear. The decision to kill the Rosenbergs was a political one. That was manifest in the attitude of two Cold War Presidents—Truman and Eisenhower—who refused clemency; of the judge and the prosecutor who have since been rewarded by promotion; of the press which was

hot on the scent of burning flesh; and of a Chief Justice of the Supreme Court—a Truman hack named Fred Vinson who put down a court out 11th-hour move by Justice William O. Douglas to preserve the integrity of the court.

the lives of the Rosenbergs, it riveted the spotlight of world opinion on a government and its policies which one day must face a day of reckoning for its distortion of the democratic process.

The June 29, 1953, issue of the GUARDIAN was taken up entirely with reports of the execution and its aftermath. Ten thousand persons jammed into Union Square in New York as the bell tolled the hour of death. In Washington 13,000 picketed the White House. In London and Paris and other capitals of the world, thousands more demonstrated. Headlings from the New York Herald Tribune (same day, same page) reproduced in the GUARDIAN read: "Eisenhower Rules Rosenbergs Must Die; Got 'Full Justice' for 'Most Perious Crime,'" and "Eisenhower Practices His Golf on Grounds of the White House."

In Brooklyn's Flatbush section July 1 more than

12,000 persons came to the funeral, despite the fact that the police in a minutary maneuver had taken over the area with fundreds of uniformed men, and authorities declared that subversive squads would take down the license-plate numbers of all cars in the area.

It remained for Dr. W. E. B. Du Bois, standing bare-headed in the 94-degree heat, to pronounce a nine-word eulogy as the bodies were lowered into the grave at Pinelawn Conjetery in Long Island—a eulogy which is a profound judgment of our time. He said: "These people were killed because they would not lie."

"THE ROSENBERGS ARE DEAD but their case will never die until the truth has fully been told. In the intervening years, more
and more people of troubled conscience have made inquiry and
come forward as witnesses to a gross injustice. They have found
that the convictions were based not on documentary evidence but
on the testimony of a strange brother and a friend who is a selftonfessed perjurer "scared to death" of government prosecution.
They have found that the Supreme Court, in the words of Justice
Black, "has never reviewed the record and has never affirmed the
fairness of the trial." They are aware of new evidence which screams
"Frameup" and of an Appeals Court decision which acknowledged
that under current interpretation of the law the trial of Ethel
Rosenberg would have been considered unfair. Legally speaking,
this decision said, it would not be too late for Ethel Rosenberg
to raise the point—if she were alive.

She is not alive because there had to be sterifices to maintain the Bir Lie of the Cold War: the threat of communism. Judge Manfatan, in his includes 1963 mer, apribute to the Resembergs at least 50,000 dead Americans in the Morean War as a result of their alleged passing to the Russians of "accret" information (which the Russians had published in scientific papers in 1940, ten years earlier). The Big Lie is still the cornerstone of U.S. policy. In the years since 1953 there have been many merifices—not so final, but harsh and painful—to this lie. Let it be recalled that the GUARD-IAN's founding editor Cedric Belfrage was arrested and held for deportation just one month before the Rosenbergs died, and that a Trayent fight in the same courts that rejected the Rosenberg's Sobell appeals was equally unavailing.

UT IF THE ROSENBERGS ARE DEAD, Morton Sobell is allive—a more accurate description would be "buried alive"—and he remains a living testament to the distortion of justice in the Rosenberg case. During the 1960 Presidential campaign, John F. Kennedy and his associates indicated in meetings with Sobell petitioners that they would seek a full review of the case. After the election, actions happined.

Last Ap. Il Sobth's attorneys added the U.S. Supreme Court to break with its past refusal to hear his case and to review it for the first time.

Thus there is still hope of vindication in the highest court, and it would be an appropriate wibute to Justices Douglas and Black, who fought so valiantly to see that justice was done in the Rosenberg case.

There is also hope of even earlier action—a medical parole for Soboli, despite Judge Kanfinger's vinclicitive request that he never be granted parole. Soboli, suffering from a severe internal disorder, has been transferred from Atlanta penitentiary to the federal medical prison at Springfield, Mo. He had expected to be shifted to Lewisburg in Pennsylvania. His last letters to his wife Helen, indicated a turmoil of anxiety and hope that he date not express.

If he is released, it will be because of this love, and because of the devotion of countless thousands of persons in this country and abroad who have never lost faith that the hope and glory will come to America again.





PARDON CAMPAIGN IS ON

This story by Helen Sobell describes a pilgrimage she and her son Mark, 14, made to the Prison Medical Center at Springfield, Mo., to visit Morton Sobell. Sobell is serving his 14th year in prison on charges of conspiring to commit espionage, after conviction in 1951 with Ethel and Julius Rosenberg. The Committee to Secure Justice for Morton Sobell, which has campaigned in the past to win freedom for Sobell on humanitarian grounds or because of doubts raised, has now begun circulating petitions urging a full pardon on the ground of innocence. By Helen Sobell Prison Medical Center in Springfield, Mo, are from 8:30 40 10:30 a.m. and from 1 40 % p.m. The prison is three miles transportation. For those who have no cars, taxis are available for \$1,25 each way to and from Springfield Sometimes visitors sit in the waiting room for the 21/2 hours between visiting periods.

The visiting room itself is about 40 feet wide where the guards at their table, and about 20 in the part farthest from them. The seats are arranged in groups in every case a low coffee table separates the single seat, that of the prisoner from his visitors. It is permitted to kiss at the beginning and end of the visit, one may hold hands across the table, but it is forbidden to sit side by side.

The visitors themselves were diverse. Morton introduced us to the family of a conscientious objector before we left that morning. We saw the mink-opated young wife of a notorious racketeer meet her husband as he came in in his wheelchair. Another wife with two small girls came to see her labor-organizer busband who had refused to wirn on his chief. Abject pover- FEAR'S VISITING: This sime we

ty and posh elegance were represented'.

My 14-year-old son Mark patiently waited through the first two-hour visit while Morton and I stalked about the family, the committee, Mark's school; Morton's health, and the various, greetings that had been sent. For the afternoon, however, Mark came armed with his Amateur's Radio Handbook. He and Morty had been corresponding for weeks about their plan of doing some studying together.

.When Mark handed the book to the guard to get it ekayed, he was shocked to learn that It could not be taken into the Visiting room.

The next day Mark had agreed that most of the morning should be devoted to discussion between Morty and me. He brought a book along to read — "Microbe Hunters." When he asked the guard if he could take it in to use for himself, the guard misunderstood and, after checking with his superior, said it was all right for Mark to show the book to his father. Mark didn't say a word, but as soon as this visit was over we dashed back to the motel to get the Amateur Salle Handbook. This time there was no question. The book went in.

had 20 hours of visiting, since the usual eight per month had an extra added because of Christmas, and we were permitted to take the January time a little early. For all the previous years we had only been permitted two hours each month. This was a whole year's visiting for us, in six days.

Afterward Morty wrote in his first letter, "It may be silly of me, but somehow I feel that this visit will alter our relationship. No, dearest, not in any overt fashion, but the fact that we could talk at length in such almost normal fashion will, I feel, make itself felt some way.

"But, of course, more than my relation with thee, I believe that my relation with Mark will take on new meaning. We never had the advantage, he and I, of a relationship prior to my imprisonment. Thus all he knew of me, and I of him, was what took place between us during those few hours spent together during the visits.

"What impression did I get this time? I can't really say. After all, one must evaluate in terms of other 14 year olds, and I don't know what other 14 year olds are like. Of course I like him, and I'd give my right arm to be out there with him. He means as much to me as you do.

"I am overjoyed that the case is owing rought on the only legitimate issue—innocence. Perhaps we will lose some support, but at least for me it will be honest. (Not that the other was dishonest, but it lacked the purity which I value over all.) I hope others will see it in this light."

DEADLINE OF LIFE: Again and again, at the start of each visit-, ing period, and as we went on to each difference subject, Morty, would come back to the need for the fight to be on the basis of his innocence.

. "We must not be worn down by the long years. We must not be pushed into a defensive role, If we are to survive the next: period the strength must come from dignity and integrity. Remember, there is a deadline for us of life, not of death. Unlike Sacco and Vanzetti, unlike Ethel and Julius Rosenberg, there will come a time when the gate will unlock, and I will be free. I do no more than any ordinary man should do when I protect any name and honor. Every man does as much when he takes his stand against injustice. Who can take from anyone that living peide which is a remembrance of the vigils, the petitions, the meetings for Mooney and Billings, for Sacco and Vanzetti, for the Rosenbergs, yes, and even for me?"

2,000 sign petitions for Sobell pardoning

UBLIC SUPPORT is building for a full pardon for Morton Sobell, imprisoned 13 years on an esplonage charge, based on his innocence. The Committee to Secure Justice for Morton Sobell has announced that more than 2,000 persons have signed a petition demanding the scientist's release from federal jail.

In addition, Carl Damso, president of LWU Local 142 in Hawaii, has sent a letter to President Johnson on behalf of the local's 22,000 members urging a full pardon for Sobell. "Morton Sobell has protested his innocence through more

than 13 years of imprisonment," he wrote. "He was tried and sentenced during a period of great Cold-War tension Many eminent persons in the U.S. and abroad have found the evidence wanting, questioned the fairness of the trial and voiced shock at the extreme cruelty of the 30-year sentence. We believe it is time to remove this burden of doubt from the conscience of our nation."

The Sobell Committee is sponsoring a "full pardon" meeting for Sobell at Cooper Union, New York, at 8 p.m. April 23. Admission is \$1 or a completed petition with aix signatures. Prof. Fred Rodell of Yale Law School will speak. Folk singer Paul Ochs will entertain.





CRISES COME and crises go; but the planet remains somehow or other intact, despite our vows to blow it up if people we don't like insist on contaminating it by their presence, and the postman continues on his rounds. One day he delivers a reminder to us from our own world of living dead. It is about

a single human being who haunts us—Morton Sobell. The mimeo from New York breaks into our optimistic musings about how far we have advanced out of "McCarthyism." It reminds us that Sobell is now in his 15th year behind bars out of the 30 to which he was sentenced in the Rosenberg-Sobell trial. After five years in Alcatraz, he was moved to Atlanta "following world-wide appeals"; then to Springfield, Molbecause of "poor health requiring hospitalization." and now to a new cell at Lewisburg, Pa. The drawnout agony inflicted upon this good man is recapitulated and brought up-to-date in an almost impassive "release"-style prose that shatters the heart. His wife Helen, who has given up her life for him, comments.

"The transfer closer to home will ease the burden of travel that our family has borne for so many years. We hope this step means that we are a bit closer to the only goal we can accept in this disgraceful case—the long-overdue complete freedom of my innocent husband."

"More than 7,000," the release adds, "have signed a petition to President Johnson asking Sobell's release." There is something infinitely sad in that "more than," The petition campaign is led by Dr. Harold C. Urey who has fearlessly stuck his neck out from the start of the Rosenberg-Sobell outrage. The only other Americans of world eminence listed as signers are Linus Pauling and Reinhold Niebuhr.

THOSE OF US who have moments to spare for pity and anger should face the situation frankly, Sobell is insisting that he will accept nothing less than recognition of his innocence; he rejects in advance any compromise to get out of hell. What odds would a shrewd bookmaker quote against his chance of freedom on these terms?

Let us not forget—Sobell and his family assureding to not—what he is in jail for, and what Ethel and Julius Rosenberg died for. Not for "atom spying": few with the trial record ever believed that it.

we should realize that the Sobell case is the barometer par excellence of America's domestic Cold War, whose atmospheric pressure rises or falls with that of the global Cold War. If the whole pressure were reduced, his chances of returning to life would improve. Thus to a large extent his fate hangs on eyents across the earth in Indo-China. Each action for peace is an action to right this unspeakable wrong to the man in Lewisburg and the woman in New York.

AS LONG AS the pressure remains high, their chances, depend entirely on the number and standing of those Americans who will stand up and be counted; only the political power of a multitude, with prestige at its head, can prevail No praise is adequate for the gallantry and persistence with which Heien Sobell has labored to stir America's conscience. But an American imprisoned for 1 the sime of

self-respect, with 15 more to go, and 7,000-od when his 180 million fellow citizens have signed the self-tion. And probably the great majority of the 7,000 is "politically sympathetic" to Sobell, although this is a case of what we once used to call simple justice.

Presumably one reason rank-and-file signers and pitifully few is that the eminent Americans of our day—the "names," above all the intellectuals—have aim—ply abdicated. This is the fact that has duminfounded other nations ever since the Rosenbergs were murdered against a roar of protest from around the world including the Vatican: a roar from everywhere except the U.S. itself, where there was only an informated murmur from unknowns and political lepers. Where were the American Nobel Prize winners, the Hemingways, the Paulkners, the Steinbetts, was the great American scientists, with the exception of Great The multimillionaires of Hollywood; the theologians the distinguished statesmen, the crusading editors the renowned sportsmen, the philosophers?







'BOMB' SKETCH SOUGHT

New legal move in Sobell case

HE FEDERAL District Court in New York City has been asked to terminate a 16-year secrecy surrounding a reputed drawing of the atom bomb, a crucial piece of evidence impounded in the 1951 trial which sent Ethel and Julius Rosenberg to the electric chair and their co-defendant Morton Sobell to prison for 30 years.

Attorneys for Sobell have demanded access to the sketch made by David Greenglass, Mrs. Rosenberg's brother, as a preliminary move to a full-scale assault on the prosecution's case against the Rosenbergs and Sobell in which, they charge, "the government fabricated and knowingly, willfully, intentionally and deliberately utilized false and perjurious testimony and documents."

IMPOUNDING of the Greenglass drawing, the Sobell attorneys state, left the impression that it contained "a acientific secret of enormous proportion" and "the prejudicial nature of this impression ... can hardly be underestimated."

The move was made March 28 before judge Thomas Murphy by New York attorneys William M. Kunstler and Marshall Perlin, who are associated with Arthur Kinoy of New York, Benjamin O. Dreyfus of San Francisco and Malcolm Sharp of Alburquerque, N.M. The government asked for a two-week postponement to clear release of the material with the Atomic Energy Commission. Murphy granted a week's delay and set a new hearing on the motion April 4.

THE BASIS of the new legal moves charging deliberate government forgery in the Rosenberg-Sobell case, is the book Invitation to an Inquest by Walter and Miriam Schneir (Doubleday) which concludes that not only were the defendants innocent, but that the crime they were charged with-delivery of the atom bomb secret to the Soviet Union-never took place.

Sobell is now serving the 16th year of his sentence.



NEW PETITION GIVEN FEDERAL COURT IN N. Y.

Evidence fa<u>ke</u>d, Sobell lawyers s<u>ay</u>

By William A. Price

CHARGING THAT the government "knowingly created, contrived and used false and perjurious testimony and evidence" to send Ethel and Julius Rosenberg to the electric chair and Morton Sobell to prison for 30 years, attorneys for Sobell have launched a massive attack to release him from his 16th year of imprisonment.

The attorneys charge that a crucial piece of evidence which went unchallenged at the 1951 trial was forged and that testimony was invented to create a link between the Rosenbergs and Sobell and an international atomic spying. In U.S. District Court, Foley Square, New York, the lawyers petitioned May 13 for a hearing at which they can present demands for the reversal of Sobell's conviction, or at least a new trial.

If successful, the new legal moves could destroy one of the major pillars upon which a national Cold-War philosophy was built in the early 1950s. It would also substantiate the role of the



Federal Bureau of Investigation and the Department of Justice in foldiering evidence to support charges that alleged Communist Party members engaged in espionage for the Soviet Union—charges that had devastating palitical repercussions.

ONE OF THE CRITICAL items under scrutiny in the court move is the photostat of a hotel registration card measuring about 4 by 6 inches, allegedly filled out on June 3, 1945, at the Hilton Hotel, Albuquerque, N.M., by confessed atom spy Harry Gold. At the trial, the government never introduced the original card but placed in svidence, instead, a photostat which became government "Exhibit No. 16." Sobell attorneys charge that the exhibit is a "false, fraudulent and after-contrived document and not a photostal of a registration card signed by Hairy Gold."

They add: "Gold did not register at the aforesaid hotel that day and no such registration card ever came hit existence in the regular course of auxiliary."

The card photostat, however, the sitomeys argue, was "vital" to the sivernment's case in order to fabricate a meeting between Gold and David Greenglass, Ethel Rosenberg's brother. Proof of such a link was needed to place the entire case in the framework of an international spy conspiracy tied to Klaus Fuchs, who had confessed espionage in England.

The card photostat is one of the Ezms whose authenticity is challenged in Invitation to an Inquest, by Walter and Miriam Schneir (Doubleday, 1965), in which the authors trace in detail the origin of crucial bits of evidence used against the Rosenbergs and Sobell. The Schneirs' detective work is the basis of the new court pleas.

IN ANALYSING the card photostat the Sobell petition declares:

• The date-time stamp on the sard's reverse side is for a date when Gold Mm-self testified that he was not in Albumereuse.

• The card does not have the small initials of FBI agents to identify #

· The government, by its own recent admission in correspondence with Sobell attorneys, returned the alleged original card to the Albuquerque hotel where it would be desiroyed prior to final appeals and disposition of a case involving the death sentence.

· The government "well knows that it is more difficult to determine and detect forgery from a photostat than from original documents."

THE STARTLING disclosure that the government had permitted the destruction of the registration card it said existed came in a Dec. 22, 1965, letter to Sobell attorney William M. Kunstler of New York from assistant U.S. Attorney General J. Walter Yeagley, who heads the Internal Security Division of the Department of Justice. The letter is part of extensive correspondence with the Justice Department and FBI chief J. Edper Hoover in which Sobell attorneys have sought information about trial exlibits and pre-trial testimony.

In Yeagley's letter he contends that an original of the card did exist but was returned to the Hotel Hilton on Aug. 4. 1951, after the Rosenbergs and Sobell had been convicted but before final appeals were exhausted. At any point, the Sobell lawyers point out, the courts could have ordered a new trial and it is highly unusual for the government to permit destruction of evidence which might again become so vital to its own case.

In the same letter, Yeagley characterizes the Schneirs' question about the card as "baseless accusations," and adds: "We find it difficult to believe that you would seriously consider the fantastic hypothesis that the Federal Bureau of Investigation would either instigate, or, be a party to, a conspircay to manufac-

ture or falsify evidence.

Aside from questioning the card which allegedly links Gold with the Rosenbergs and Sobell, a petition submitted to the federal district court also asks that the court order the government to make evallable to Sobell attorneys Gold's pretrial testimony, and authorize the attorneys to interview Gold before his release from Lewisburg, Pa., federal penitentiary, which was scheduled for May 18.

DBELL PETITION argues that

the government knew, in advance of the Rosenberg-Sobell trial, that Gold was "an acknowledged and proven pathological and congenital liar." At the trial, the government, monetheless, "offered him as its main and indispensable witness. representing and vouching for his complete credibility."

"As the government well knew," the Sobell petition states, "Gold's life was such a fabrication of lies and deceptions that it was impossible even for him to determine when he was telling the truth or mot."

"A graphic example of this psychotic disability," the Sobell petition states, occurred at a trial in Ohio in 1955, when Gold testified that he had "lied for a period of 16 years." that he had invented for himself a non-existent family about which he told friends and associates, and that ". . . That, I created this wife whom I did not have. Then there had to be children to go along with the wife, and they had to grow old, so I had to keep building one [lie] on top of the other.

At the May 13 hearing in New York, District Court Judge Marvin E. Frankel refused to authorize Sobell attorneys to take a deposition from Gold in prison, but the government attorney stipulated that if Frankel, after considering all the evidence, ordered such a deposition, it would produce Gold (who will be on probatton) for interviewing.

Frankel also withheld decision on other Bobell demands and set June 20 as a date for a hearing to determine whether a full review-which could set Sobell free-should be ordered. With Kunstler in court was attorney Marshall Perlin.

THE LATEST court moves follow the release April 4 of the controversial "Exhibit No. 8," the purported sketch of an atomic bomb which was impounded at the 1951 trial at the suggestion of the Rosenberg's defense lawyer, Emanuel Bloch. The stipulation at this earlier hearing was that the sketch could not be made available to the public. It is now theing studied by physicists.

ROSENBERG CASE EVIDENÇE A 'CARICATURE'

Physicists deride

A-trial sketch

Aug. 22 declared that the so-called sketch of a cross-section of the atomic bomb—key evidence which sent Ethel and Julius Rosenberg to their deaths—was worthless. They were highly critical of the government and the prosecution for the use that was made of this purported evidence.

The scientists were Dr. Philip Morrison, of MIT, and Dr. Henry Linschits of Brandeis University. Both had taken part in the production and assembly of the bomb which was exploded over Nagasaki in August, 1945. Their testimony was set forth in affidavits presented to the court by attorneys seeking freedom for Morton Sobell, now beginning the 17th year of a 30-year sentence on a conviction of conspiracy to commit estimates as the Rosenbergs.

AN AMENDED BRIEF by the defense also charged that the government had prepared a trap for Emanuel Bloch, attorney for the Rosenbergs, in connection with the sketch allegedly drawn by David Greenglass, Mrs. Rosenberg's brother, whose testimony was decisive in their conviction. The brief said that the prosecution had announced its intention to call as witnessess to support the validity of the sketch such persons as Dr. J. Robert Oppenheimer and Prof. Harold C. Urey. Neither was called nor consulted. It also made much ado about conferences with the Atomic Energy Commission and the Joint Congressional Committee on Atomic Energy, all designed to impress the court, jury and defense with the enormous national interest at stake in the evidence. lawyers said Bloch, in asking that the sketch and the testimony on it be impounded, had walked right into the trap.

The brief also charged the government with forging a vital hotel registration card for Harry Gold, a prosecution witness who linked Greenglass and himself with Klaus Fuchs, a British nuclear physicist sentenced to 14 years in prison in Britain for passing atomic information to the Soviet Union. Fuchs's contession has never been made available to the Sobell defense. The registration card was the only alleged link between Gold and Greenglass.

LINSCHITZ CHARGED Rosenberg trial Judge Irving Kaufman with "a misunderstanding of the nature of modern technology, a misunderstanding which in this case has had tragic consequen-

ces." He referred to Kaufman's sentencing statement that the Rosenbergs by their alleged conduct had been responsible for 50,000 dead U.S. servicemen in Korea. Linschitz said the Greenglass information "was too incomplete, ambiguous and even incorrect to be of any service or value to the Russlans." Morrison called the sketch a "caricature" of the bomb. He said: "The testimony and the drawing itself entirely omit two important spherical components of that bomb, without which it could not operate."

There was no such thing as a single "secret" to the development of the bomb even in 1941, said Linschitz. The time of the alleged passing of information was 1945. Linschitz said: "It is not possible in any technologically useful way to condense the results of a \$2 billion development effort into a diagram, drawn by a high school graduate machinist on a single sheet of paper."

Both scientists said that John A. Derry, an electrical engineer called by the prosecution to verify the Greenglass, sketch, was thoroughly unqualified. The defense said that the government knew Derry was not qualified and used him deliberately. Morrison said that if Derry had seen the bomb, as he testified, he would have discredited the sketch.

The Sobell brief charged that the entire Rosenberg-Sobell case was a frameup, that the government had knowingly used perjured testimony and had caused Cold to change his testimony. The government has two weeks to reply. Oral argument is scheduled for Sept. 12 in federal court in New York on the matter of a full hearing for Sobell.

The Rosenberg case today

THE CONTROVERSIAL SKETCH (right) of an alleged cross-section of the atomic bomb, precisely as it figured in the trial of Ethel and Julius Rosenberg in 1951, was released by a federal court judge in New York Aug. 4. Along with the sketch was the testimony of David Greenglass, the purported author of the drawing.

It will remain for scientific experts to determine the significance of the sketch—specifically for Philip Morrison of the Massachusetts Institute of Technology and Henry Linschitz of Brandeis University, who were intimately involved in the assembly of the first U.S. bombs—but enough evidence has been submitted in the last 15 years to prove that the Russians knew all they needed to know about the atomic bomb without any assist from an alleged U.S. espionage agent. And whatever was disclosed in the Greenglass sketch—if he did make the sketch—had already been published in the U.S. long before the trial of the Rosenbergs and Morton Sobell.

The basic issue on the sketch, as the Sobeli defense has insisted, is not whether any part of the drawing is false or meaningless, but whether, as the government contended in 1961 at the trial of the Rosenbergs and still contends today, it was in fact a sketch of a cross-section of the atomic bomb. The defense says it was not, and therefore the Rosenbergs and Sobell could not have been guilty, as charged, of a conspiracy to turn over to the Russians a sketch of a cross-section of the bomb.

IF THIS CONTENTION is proved—as this writer firmly believes it will be—the charge of Judge Irving Kaufman, who sentenced the Rosenbergs to death and Sobell to 30 years in prison, becomes even more ghoulish. Kaufman said in sentencing the Rosenbergs that their alleged action had paved the way for the war in Korea and was responsible for the death of thousands of American soldiers. It is conceivable that the hearings on the petition for a new trial for Sobell, expected within a month, may bring to light evidence which would tarnish the whole investigative and judicial apparatus of the U.S. government and brand it as an arm of U.S. policy without regard for honest inquiry and impartial justice.

It has been the contention of the GUARDIAN from the beginning of its own investigation in August, 1951, after the trial and the sentence, that the Rosenberg-Sobell case was a political case from the beginning; that it was conducted in an atmosphere of national anti-communist hysteria which made calm reason impossible, and that the guilty verdict was a forgone conclusion.

Whether the making public of the Greenglass sketch at the trial would have affected the outcome of the case, it is difficult to say from the hindsight of 15 years. What must be said, as attorney Emanuel Bloch himself conceded, according to physicist Morrison, was

there was defense request to seal the sketch at the time of the trial was a grievous error which gave the government important ammunition it would not otherwise have had. This is a point which Irwin Edelman (see GUARDIAN, June 18), a dogged crusader for justice in the Rosenberg case, has stressed since he read the transcript of the trial in 1951. It was he whose last minute intervention (presented by attorneys Pyke Farmer and Daniel Marshall) caused Supreme Court Justice Douglas to seek to stay the execution.

But even here the political nature of the case was apparent when Chief Justice Vinson summoned the entire court to overrule Douglas. It is a little-appreciated fact that the Supreme Court has never reviewed the issues in the Rosenberg-Sobell case.

FOR A NEW GENERATION it is difficult to reassemble in brief form this most complicated case in a most frightening time. But it is important that the significance of the case—and a possible reversal of the verdict against Morton Sobell be interpreted for this new generation.

For this writer, the involvement of the GUARD-IAN in the Rosenberg-Sobell case in the two years preceding the execution of the Rosenbergs holds wivid memories which at times achieve the quality of a living nightmare. My colleagues Cedric Belfrage, now in exile in Mexico, and the late John T. McManus, and I became intimately involved in the effort to save the Rosenbergs as the result of our decision to lay the case open for public examination in August, 1951. It was this series of articles, by special correspondent William A. Reuben, which launched a world-wide crusade in behalf of the Rosenbergs and Sobell.




ekunarating and gratifying it was to be a port of the great crusade that sought to save two in nocent persons from judicial murder.

The Rosenbergs were used as an instrument of U.B. policy for justifying the wicked U.S. war to Korea. They were used as an instrument of hate directed against the Soviet Union at the peak of the Cold War, just as new victims will be found to be used against China today. They were nimed to frighten an entire generation into silence, as the government and the press blazoned the Mo Carthy charges in page one headlines and buried or ignored the proven fraud of the accusations and the suffering of the victims. They were used, in the last analysis, to enshrine the methods and the ends of McCarthyiam-in quieter and subtler ways, of course—in a calculated program to attfle protest against new adventures in imperialistic policy - in Cuba, the Congo, in Latin America and ultimately in Vietnam.

This is the lesson for a new generation. History is continuity. It does not begin and end bruptly, for all its twists and turns. The Rosenberg-Sobell case has meaning for the American people and particularly for the young radicals, just as the case of Tom Mooney has for American labor; as the case of Sacco and Vannetti has for the foreign born and the right of political dissent; as the case of the Scottsboro Boys and the murders of young Chaney, Goodman and Schwerner in Mississippi have for the black people of America.

If Morion Sobell is vindicated in his neveryielding assertion of innocence, then the traud, the miscarriage of justice and the ugliness of the murder of the Rosenbergs will be laid bare, with all the machinations of the governmental appearatus in the making of the murder and the research

This is the significance of the perseverance of the fight to secure a posthumous justice for Fibel and Julius Rosenberg and a living justice for Morton Sobell.

fense. The government made its move on the ground of national security, although the Atomic Energy Commission, according to the defense, maintains that the sketch is "declassified" information.

o In a seeming shift of attitude, Judge Palmieri set a hearing for Aug. 3 at which time he said he would not accept representations from the U.S. government that the sketch should stay sealed in the interest of security, but would insist on factual evidence to support its position. At the Aug. 3 session, which will be open, a constitutional question will be argued: whether the government has the right to insist on closed sessions in the face of a defendant's insistence on an open hearing.

PERLIN MADE his charges on the sketch as he presented a motion to amend the defense papers in support of a new trial for Sobell. The motion was granted, over government objections, by federal judge David N. Edelstein. The amended complaint is to be filed Aug. 8. Perlin said that the government knew that the testimony at the original trial in 1951 by Greenglass, Mrs. Rosenberg's

named John A. Derry, was "comparedly false."

The original brief for a new trial is based largely on information contained in the book invitation to an Impact, by Miriam and Walter Schneir, which lays out a case that the FBI had forged another vital piece of evidence—a hotel registration card which the government contended in the original trial linked Harry Gold, a principal government witness, with Julius Rosenberg. The card was for a hotel in Albuquerque, N.M. The PBI has refused to comment on the charge.

THE CELEBRATED SKETCH of the bomb was impounded at the 1951 trial at the request of the Rosenbergs' attorney, Emanuel Bloch, now dead. The move has come to be acknowledged as a serious error that added weight to the sketch evidence, although the defense at the Rosenberg trial established that dreenglass was incompetent to produce such a complicated drawing, even if he had access to such classified material. Greenglass was admittedly a person of severely limited education.

The sketch had remained sealed from the time of the trial in 1951 until April, 1966, when it was made available to Sobell's attorneys to prepare their case. It was then returned to the court. Then the government moved to re-seal it. The reasons for its zealous efforts to keep the evidence from public view was underscored by the New York Times' reporter Sidney Zion July 28. He wrote:

"If the court permits a hearing and Mr. Perlin produces the proof he has promised, the effects could be dramatic. If the charges are substantiated it would seriously undermine the integrity of those who handled the prosecution of the Rosenberg case."

PERLIN SAID THAT the Justice Department "has no jurisdiction to describe mine what is secret information.
