THE CASE AGAINST THE ROSENBERGS OUTRAGES LOGIC AND JUSTICE. IT DEPENDS ON THE TESTIMONY OF GREENGLASS AND HIS WIFE, BOTH CONFESSED SPIES AND ALLEGED ACCOMPLICES OF THE ROSENBERGS. GREENGLASS IS SUPPOSED TO HAVE REVEALED TO THE RUSSIANS THE 'SECRET' OF THE ATOMIC BOMB. THOUGH THE INFORMATION SUPPOSED TO HAVE BEEN TRANSMITTED COULD HAVE BEEN IMPORTANT, A MAN OF GREENGLASS' CAPACITY IS WHOLLY INCAPABLE OF TRANSMITTING THE PHYSICS' CHEMISTRY AND MATHEMATICS OF THE ATOMIC BOMB TO ANYONE. HE AND HIS WIFE WERE THE ONLY ONES WHO PRETENDED TO CONNECT THE ROSENBERGS WITH ATOMIC ESPIONAGE. Dear Friend:

It is late -- BUT NOT TOO LATE -- to save the lives of the Rosenbergs who are scheduled to die on June 18, the day of their fourteenth wedding anniversary. THEIR time is growing short, but you still have precious time to do something to save two lives.

All legal processes are not exhausted. New evidence keeps pouring in. Help them in the name of humanity and human conscience to present this evidence while they still live.

Pope Pius XII has asked mercy for these parents of two sons. Prof. Malcolm Sharp of the University of Chicago Law School declares the Pope's mercy plea "has reinforced the criticism made by many Americans of the severity of the sentence" and declares the new evidence now available "shakes the confidence" in the guilty verdict. Prof. Albert Einstein asks mercy and joins Dr. Harold Urey, Nobel Prize winner and foremost atomic authority, in casting doubt on some of the evidence that convicted the Rosenbergs. Twenty-three hundred Protestant Clergymen and countless Rabbis ask mercy and Americans from coast to coast have appealed to President Eisenhower for clemency.



Statement on the Execution of Ethel and Julius Rosenberg

Two lives have been taken, a mother and father.

Our nation's security is not greater for it; it is less because we have given up that charity of spirit and greatness of heart without which no nation is strong.

Our nation's conscience is not more serene; it lies in shadow because we permitted the hue and cry of passion to drown out the inner voice of mercy.

Our nation's light does not shine brighter; it is dimmer because we turned our backs on the counsel of all the great religious and lay leaders of our time.

Our nation must pray tonight that remorse gives courage to those who know the truth, so that they will not keep silence, so that even though the Rosenbergs have been put to death, their children may someday reap the reward of vindication.

The opinions of Justices Douglas, Black and Frankfurter emphasize once more the uncertainties and doubts which have plagued the Rosenberg case from the first. The division of opinion itself, where human life is at stake, is an eloquent argument for commutation of the death sentence.

The execution of Ethel and Julius Rosenberg would be a tragedy greater than that affecting the lives of two human beings and their families. The tragedy would be our nation's, for we would be rejecting the impassioned and sincere pleas of our closest friend and allies.

We must pause to ask whether the spiritual leaders of the Catholic, Protestant and Jewish religions and the political leaders of France, Great Britain and Italy are all wrong in pleading for clemency, and that our country in which millions have also asked for clemency, is utterly and infallibly right in putting the Rosenbergs to death.

No explanation can be given to the world and our own conscience for this first espionage death sentence, for the contrast with the sentences given to Axis Sally, Tokyo Rose, David Provo, many leading Nazi war criminals who are accused not of giving information to an ally, but of aiding an enemy in time of war.

The electric chair cannot answer these questions.

We believe that President Eisenhower conscious of the great strength of our nation and of our exemplary heritage of justice and mercy, should commute the death sentences of Ethel and Julius Rosenberg.

The Committee has sent a telegram to the President requesting an appointment for our officers today. The telegram was signed by Mr. Joseph Brainin, National Chairman.



TEXT OF TELEGRAM TO PRESIDENT EISENHOWER

For two years we of the National Committee to Secure Justice in the Rosenberg Case, among whom number many friends and neighbors of Ethel and Julius Rosenberg, have labored to save their lives.

We were moved to this by no partisan interest or personal gain, except that benefit which we believe would be shared by all our fellow citizens by an act of mercy and fairness.

We are greatly heartened and encouraged, when upon taking the unprecedented step of publishing the entire court record, we received the support of countless attorneys and jurists who commended the sense of objectivity which led to that document publication and circulation.

There is no town or city in our country, Mr. President, from which we have not received more human compassionate aid in this undertaking.

In any religious persuasion, in every profession and trade we have found an echo of our humble efforts for clemency.

We have learned something of our country in these two years, Mr. President. It is peopled by men and women who, in their love of our country and its traditions, are ever ready to give their neighborly support to a just cause.

Mr. President, we plead with you to give us a little of your time, so that we may tell you of the deep feeling for clemency that we have found in the hearts of our fellow Americans.

Dear Friend:

We are sure that you have been concerned as we are with the tragic developments of the recent days in the execution of Ethel and Julius Rosenberg. And you too must be asking yourself, "What next?"

In this light, we believe you will be interested in the thinking of the National Committee to Secure Justice in the Rosenberg Case, which has just announced that it will work to obtain a new trial for Morton Sobell, who was sentenced to thirty years at Alcatraz as a co-defendant with Ethel and Julius Rosenberg.

The following is the Committee's statement of plans:

"The execution of Ethel and Julius Rosenberg was carried out in the same atmosphere of extreme passion, disregard for due process and abandonment of humane considerations that marked their trial and sentencing.

"Justice Felix Frankfurter confirms this tragic state of affairs in these words: 'Painful as it is, I am bound to say that circumstances precluded what to me are indispensable conditions for solid judicial judgment.'

"Justice Frankfurter's opinion, coming several days after the execution, bears out the fact that the Rosenberg case is not closed.

"We believe that it would be in the best interests of our country and its judicial process to continue all efforts to ascertain the truth in the Rosenberg Case; that the trial and sentencing of the Rosenbergs' co-defendant, Morton Sobell, requires steps leading towards a new trial; that efforts be made to secure public support for a transfer of Morton Sobell from imprisonment at Alcatraz where he will not be permitted to see his children for many years; that the two small sons of Ethel and Julius Rosenberg require adequate and responsible care in an atmosphere of warmth and devotion, shielded in their childhood from the aftermath of the tragedy which tore their parents from them.

"To these ends, the committee calls upon the many diverse groups and individuals throughout the country who concerned themselves with either a new trial or clemency for the Rosenbergs to dedicate themselves anew to justice in the Rosenberg-Sobell Case; to prepare factual material on Morton Sobell's trial, sentence and imprisonment; and to contribute adequately to whatever centralized agency there arises to care for the Rosenberg children.

"Our committee reiterates the position it took two years ago. We have grave doubts in the Rosenberg-Sobell Case. These doubts did not die in the electric chair. In truth, the circumstances under which the Rosenbergs were so hurriedly executed tend to confirm the doubts which are now world-wide.

"Finally, we wish to address ourselves to the many thousands who have in the past few days, poured out their grief to us: We share your grief. With you, we are prepared to abjure all motives of partisanship or vengeance. What we seek is justice!"

Dear Friend:

The future of Michael and Robbie Rosenberg weighs heavily on our hearts and minds these days. We feel that every possible effort should be made to guarantee the Rosenberg children a carefree, healthy childhood and an adequate education to prepare them for a useful, full life. Equally important is that the Rosenberg children grow up feeling that their parents have been full vindicated and that the name they bear is an honored one throughout the world.

Mr. Emanuel H. Bloch was appointed, by Ethel and Julius, Trustee of the funds for the Rosenberg children. He has assured us that he is in the process of setting up such a Trust Fund as the authorized agency to receive and disburse the funds in accordance with the wishes expressed by Ethel and Julius Rosenberg.

We are, therefore, urging all our friends to address their donations for the Trust Fund to Mr. Bloch, Trustee, 401 Broadway, N.Y. 13, N.Y.

It goes without saying that we, who have labored incessantly to save the Rosenbergs and reunite them with their children, are vitally interested in and tremendously concerned with building up a Trust Fund for the Rosenberg children, a fund which would guarantee the future of Michael and Robbie.

The responsibility for the establishment of the Rosenberg Trust Fund rests solely with Mr. Bloch. It is his legal as well as personal duty. However, our committee has undertaken a very important task, a task which should add substantially to the resources of the Trust Fund. We refer to the sale of the Death House Letters. As you know, the entire profits of the sale of this book are assigned by our committee to the Trust Fund.

The distribution of the book of letters is our obligation. With your wholehearted cooperation, it can serve a double purpose:

1. It should produce substantial monies for the Rosenberg Trust Fund.
2. It will contribute much toward the dissemination of the truth about the innocence of Ethel and Julius Rosenberg.

Thus a large distribution of the letters will serve as a powerful factor in the vindication of Ethel and Julius Rosenberg.

However, even the widest possible distribution of the letters cannot by itself achieve this end.

The Rosenbergs can win vindication only if we succeed in securing justice for Morton Sobell, co-defendant in the Rosenberg case, who has been sentenced to a living death for 30 years in Alcatraz, America's penitentiary for hardened criminals.

By undertaking the responsibility to secure justice for Morton Sobell, we reopen the entire Rosenberg Case. This is the primary task that confronts the forces who fought for the lives of Ethel and Julius Rosenberg. The sacred obligation we must assume if we intend to make certain that a Rosenberg-Sobell frame-up does not happen again.

We urge you to work fully with your local committee to prosecute the work in every respect. Particularly, we urge your full support in the great Dedication Rally at Triboro Stadium, Randall's Island, N.Y. on the evening of August 19th, 1953 or to your local Dedication Rally.

# Did the Rosenbergs Have Full Measure of Justice?

Justices Reveal the Rosenbergs  
Did Not Have Their Day in Court

Americans who picked up their newspapers on Thursday morning, June 18th, learned that it might not be legal to execute Ethel and Julius Rosenberg. Supreme Court Justice William Douglas had stated his grave doubts and granted a stay so the courts would be enabled to study the case. Newspaper reports indicated the possibility that the entire case might be thrown out of court. The New York Times, for instance, featured the headline "CASE SEEN IN PERIL."

The next day the Rosenbergs died in the electric chair.

American justice is still reeling from the haste with which the Rosenbergs were rushed to their deaths. The world is appalled that a mother and father were electrocuted while grave legal doubts still remained.

And there is no mistake about that. Grave doubts do exist. Justices Hugo Black, William Douglas and Felix Frankfurter are agreed that Ethel and Julius Rosenberg may have gone to their deaths illegally. All three have said that more time was needed by the courts.

The misconception has been foisted on the public that the Rosenbergs received the full measure of justice and had their day in court. President Eisenhower, in denying clemency, said that "when in their most solemn judgment the tribunals of the United States have adjudged them guilty and the sentence just, I will not intervene in the matter."

But President Eisenhower has confused a repeated denial of justice with a prolonged consideration of the case.

It is an incontrovertible fact that the Supreme Court, the highest court of the land, never passed on the fairness of the trial and the justness of the death sentence. It never reviewed the case, and consequently it never read the trial transcript.

#### DEATH DECREED REGARDLESS OF INNOCENCE OR GUILT

Ethel and Julius Rosenberg swore that they were completely innocent. Against their word was the word of David Greenglass, who claimed that the Rosenbergs induced him to steal the "secret" of the atomic bomb. Judge Jerome N. Frank of the U. S. Circuit Court of Appeals said that without the Greenglass testimony there would be no case against the Rosenbergs.

One week before the execution Dr. Harold C. Urey, the nation's foremost atomic scientist, a man who helped develop the atomic bomb, told President Eisenhower that Greenglass could not possibly have stolen the secret. He said in a telegram that "a man of Greenglass' capacity is wholly incapable of transmitting the physics, chemistry and mathematics of the atomic bomb to any one." Dr. Urey asserted that the prosecution's case "depends upon the blowing up of patently perjured testimony." He asked President Eisenhower for an appointment to present his understanding of the case personally.

But Dr. Urey never received an answer to his telegram. Nor was he able to get an appointment with Attorney General Herbert Brown-

ell, who refused to see any one connected with the legal defense or clemency appeals.

This unwillingness to discuss the Rosenberg case with Dr. Urey was characteristic of the role the Justice Department had played for the past two years. Every attempt on the part of the defense to present new evidence was opposed. Every effort at postponing the execution to allow presentation of new facts was blocked.

The Attorney General's office was determined not to entertain any delay in the execution. It wanted an execution, not the truth. June 18th, the Rosenbergs' fourteenth wedding anniversary, was set for the double execution.

#### JUSTICE DOUGLAS GRANTS A STAY

Throughout America and throughout the world there were appeals that the Rosenbergs be spared. As the execution date neared the pleas mounted. Vincent Auriol, the President of France, urged clemency.

Douglas Dillon, U. S. Ambassador to France, reported that the Embassy in Paris had been besieged with clemency pleas and warned that the execution would hurt U. S. prestige abroad. In England a delegation of members of Parliament urged Prime Minister Churchill to intervene with President Eisenhower. The Vatican radio, elaborating on previous pleas for mercy made by Pope Pius XII, broadcast recommendations of clemency. "Save the Rosenbergs" had become a world wide cry.

In Washington, 13,000 men, women and children from all parts of the United States gathered before the White House on Sunday, June 14 to call upon President Eisenhower to grant clemency. The gathering, which police said was the largest they had ever seen at the White House, represented Americans of all political and religious beliefs who had been moved by the plight of the Rosenbergs. Clemency had been requested by reknowned scientists, religious leaders, labor leaders, leaders of the Negro people, professors, and legal authorities.

On Tuesday, June 16, the Rosenberg defense asked Justice Douglas for a stay of execution. It is within the power of a single Supreme Court Justice to grant such a stay. Mr. Justice Douglas was presented with an argument that had not previously been considered by the High Court. It was argued that the Rosenbergs should have been tried under the Atomic Energy Act of 1946, not the Espionage Act of

1917. Under the Espionage Act the judge can impose the death penalty at his own discretion. Under the Atomic Energy Act a jury recommendation is needed for the death sentence. There was no such jury recommendation in the Rosenberg case, only the decision of Judge Irving Kaufman.

For twelve hours Justice Douglas deliberated, carefully weighing the law. *The following day, on Wednesday, June 17th, he announced that he was granting a stay.* Justice Douglas said that the point raised in behalf of the Rosenbergs was a substantial one that needed more time for study by the lower courts. He said:

"It is important that the country be protected against the nefarious plans of spies who would destroy us. It is also important that before we allow human lives to be snuffed out we be sure—emphatically sure—that we act within the law. If we are not sure, there will be lingering doubts to plague the conscience after the event."

Humanity breathed easier. The Rosenbergs had been granted a legal reprieve, at least until the fall of 1953.

#### THE JUSTICE DEPARTMENT IS ASTOUNDED

Newsmen reported that Attorney General Brownell, America's administrator of justice, was astounded by the action of Justice Douglas. He seemed to feel that the execution was slipping away, since the normal procedure now required that the case be held over until the fall, the courts having adjourned for the summer.

But these were not days of normal procedure. Attorney General Brownell insisted that Chief Justice Vinson reconvene the Supreme Court immediately in special session, to reverse Justice Douglas so the execution could go on as scheduled.

Commented Justice Black in his opinion:

"Surely the Court is not here establishing a precedent which will require it to call extra sessions during vacation every time a federal or state official asks it to hasten the electrocution of defendants without affording this Court adequate time or opportunity for exploration and study of serious legal questions."

Chief Justice Vinson promptly recalled the Justices from their vacations for a new term on Thursday, June 18th. Meanwhile, there were attempts on the part of those who wanted to rush the Rosenbergs to their death to create a mob atmosphere to pressure the court. Representative Wheeler of Georgia introduced in Congress a move to impeach Justice Douglas. Newspaper editorials charged Mr. Douglas with obstructing justice. An attempt obviously was being made to create the false impression that Justice Douglas had acted illegally and had usurped the authority of the entire Court.

The Supreme Court itself, however, contradicted this impression when it made clear, on June 19th, that

"The Acting Solicitor General agrees and we do not doubt that Mr. Justice Douglas had power to issue the stay in these proceedings."

What *was* doubtful was whether the entire Court had the power to set aside the stay granted by Justice Douglas.

Justice Black wrote, on June 19th:

"The Government argues that this Court has power to set aside the stay granted by Mr. Justice Douglas. I think this is doubtful. I have found no statute or rule of court which permits the full Court to set aside a mere temporary stay entered by a Justice in obedience to his statutory obligations."

Representative Francis E. Walter of Pennsylvania, a member of the House Judiciary subcommittee, also said that the Supreme Court did not have the authority to reverse Justice Douglas.

"There is absolutely nothing in the act of 1925 (under which Justice Douglas granted the stay)," Walter said on June 19, "that gives the Supreme Court authority to review the action of one of the Justices acting under the statutes."

Walter explained that the action of a single justice must send the whole case back to the lower courts. To return to the full Supreme Court, it must be processed through District and Appeals Courts.

#### THE EXECUTIONER STANDS BY

Observers could not recall another instance in American history when the United States Supreme Court was meeting while an executioner stood by waiting to go into action as soon as the Court would render its decision. What made the Department of Justice so certain that the decision would be death? Yet on Thursday, June 18th, officials at Sing Sing were going ahead with their preparations to put the Rosenbergs to death that very night—while the Supreme Court was still sitting in extraordinary session. Until late that afternoon the Rosenbergs themselves were subjected to the unparalleled torture of not knowing whether they would live or die that night. Finally the Court announced that it would make its decision known the following day—Friday, June 19th.

After noon on Friday, June 19th, the Court announced that it was vacating the stay granted by Justice Douglas. Justice Douglas, Black and Frankfurter dissented.

The execution followed so rapidly that Justice Frankfurter did not have time to make his dissent public until after Ethel and Julius Rosenberg were dead.

The following Monday Justice Frankfurter wrote:

"To be writing an opinion in a case affecting two lives after the curtain has been rung down upon them has the appearance of pathetic futility. But history also has its claims."

### THE MISSING DAY IN COURT

Those who say the Rosenbergs had their day in court are repeating a myth. But, one may ask, didn't the Supreme Court consider the case

so many times? The answer is, as Justice Frankfurter has stated, that refusal by the Supreme Court to review a case in no way implies approval of the decision by the lower courts. The Supreme Court never passed on the fairness of the trial or the justness of the sentence.

Even the majority opinion of the Supreme Court's rejection of the Rosenbergs' final plea, written by Mr. Justice Jackson and concurred in by Justices Vinson, Reed, Burton, Clark and Minton, said:

"Vacating this stay is not to be construed as indorsing the wisdom or appropriateness to this case of a death sentence."

Justice Black wrote in his dissent:

"It is not amiss to point out that this Court has never reviewed this record and has never affirmed the fairness of the trial below. Without an affirmance of the fairness of the trial by the highest court in the land there may always be questions as to whether these executions were legally and rightfully carried out. I would still grant certiorari and let this Court approve or disapprove the fairness of the trials."

All three dissenting Justices criticized the irregular and injudicious haste of the executions.

To quote Justice Black:

"I do not believe that Government counsel or this Court has had time or an adequate opportunity to investigate and decide the very serious question raised in asking this Court to vacate the stay granted by Mr. Justice Douglas. . . . I add my regret that the rush of this case has deprived me of any opportunity to do more at this time than hastily

sketch my view on the important questions raised. . . .

"Judicial haste is peculiarly out of place where the death penalty has been imposed for conduct part of which took place at a time when Congress appears to have barred the imposition of that death penalty by district judges acting without a jury's recommendation. And it seems to me that this court has not had time or opportunity for sufficient study to give the kind of informed decision on this important question it would if the case should take its regular course."

Justice Frankfurter wrote:

"Neither counsel nor the Court, in the time available, were able to go below the surface of the question raised by the application for a stay which Mr. Justice Douglas granted. More time was needed than was had for adequate consideration. . . .

"The crux of all I am suggesting is that none of the obvious considerations for bringing the all too leaden-footed proceedings in this case to an end should have barred the full employment of the deliberative process necessary for reaching a firm conclusion on the issue on which the Court has now spoken, however unfortunate it may be that the issue did not emerge earlier than it did."

### THE DOUBTS MOUNT

The doubts in the Rosenberg case did not die in the electric chair. They are now intensified as a result of the dissenting opinions of Justices Black, Douglas and Frankfurter, who question the legality of the death sentence. Was the execution within the law?

Justice Black declared:

"It is my view, based on the limited arguments we have heard, that after passage of the Atomic Energy Act of 1946 it was unlawful for a judge to impose the death penalty for unlawful transmittal of atomic secrets unless such a penalty was recommended by the jury trying the case."

Justice Douglas said:

"The cold truth is that the death sentence may not be imposed for what the Rosenbergs did unless the jury so recommends. . . . I know deep in my heart that I am right on the law. Knowing that my duty is clear."

Justice Frankfurter wrote:

"It thus appears—although, of course, I would feel more secure in my conviction had I had the opportunity to make a thorough study of the lengthy record in this case—that the conspiracy with which the Rosenbergs were charged is one falling in part within the terms of the Atomic Energy Act, passed by Congress in 1946 and specifically dealing with classified information pertaining to the recent developments



in atomic energy. There remains the question whether the sentence for such a conspiracy could be imposed under the Espionage Act."

What if the Rosenbergs had been tried under the Atomic Energy Act? The prosecution attorney told the Supreme Court that the government would have been laughed out of court if the indictment had been brought under the Atomic Energy Act. Justice Douglas agreed. So, with the Rosenbergs already executed, we have an admission that they would not have been convicted if tried under the law that three Supreme Court Justices believe applied to the case.

All of these opinions do not take into account the mounting evidence that the Rosenbergs were convicted on perjured testimony. What about the documents proving that David Greenglass lied, that the Rosenbergs bought the controversial console table at a department store and did not get it from the Russians as the prosecution had charged, that Greenglass was incapable of stealing atomic secrets?

#### **NEW TRIAL FOR SOBELL**

History may recognize the injustice done to them, but there can be no compensation for the Rosenbergs. No future apology will bring their parents to little Michael and Robbie, nor will it wipe out the crushing blow to American traditions of justice and mercy.

However, there is still time to halt a miscarriage of justice in the case of Morton Sobell, who was a co-defendant with Ethel and Julius Rosenberg. Sobell, convicted on the word of a man who faced a perjury indictment, was sentenced to thirty years at Alcatraz. He swears he is completely innocent.

Alcatraz is a place reserved for murderers and hardened criminals. No children are allowed to visit there. This means that Sobell cannot see his four-year-old son Mark or his daughter Sydney, who is 13.

The many and grave doubts surrounding the entire Rosenberg case call for a new trial for Morton Sobell. He must get the day in court, the full measure of justice that the Rosenbergs never had. Meanwhile he should be removed from the inhumane conditions at Alcatraz to another prison where he can see his children while waiting for all of the facts in his case to come to light.

The National Committee to Secure Justice in the Rosenberg Case urges justice for Morton Sobell. A new trial would be a step toward guaranteeing that the injustice suffered by the Rosenbergs will never again stain the conscience of America.

# Did the Rosenbergs Have Full Measure of Justice?

Three U. S. Supreme Court  
Justices Reveal the Rosenbergs  
Did Not Have Their Day in Court

Americans who picked up their newspapers on Thursday morning, June 18th, learned that it might not be legal to execute Ethel and Julius Rosenberg. Supreme Court Justice William Douglas had stated his grave doubts and granted a stay so the courts would be enabled to study the case. Newspaper reports indicated the possibility that the entire case might be thrown out of court. The New York Times, for instance, featured the headline "CASE SEEN IN PERIL."

The next day the Rosenbergs died in the electric chair.

American justice is still reeling from the haste with which the Rosenbergs were rushed to their deaths. The world is appalled that a mother and father were electrocuted while grave legal doubts still remained.

And there is no mistake about that. Grave doubts do exist. Justices Hugo Black, William Douglas and Felix Frankfurter are agreed that Ethel and Julius Rosenberg may have gone to their deaths illegally. All three have said that more time was needed by the courts.

The misconception has been foisted on the public that the Rosenbergs received the full measure of justice and had their day in court. President Eisenhower, in denying clemency, said that "when in their most solemn judgment the tribunals of the United States have adjudged them guilty and the sentence just, I will not intervene in the matter."

But President Eisenhower has confused a repeated denial of justice with a prolonged consideration of the case.

It is an incontrovertible fact that the Supreme Court, the highest court of the land, never passed on the fairness of the trial and the justness of the death sentence. It never reviewed the case, and consequently it never read the trial transcript.

#### DEATH DECREED REGARDLESS OF INNOCENCE OR GUILT

Ethel and Julius Rosenberg swore that they were completely innocent. Against their word was the word of David Greenglass, who claimed that the Rosenbergs induced him to steal the "secret" of the atomic bomb. Judge Jerome N. Frank of the U. S. Circuit Court of Appeals said that without the Greenglass testimony there would be no case against the Rosenbergs.

One week before the execution Dr. Harold C. Urey, the nation's foremost atomic scientist, a man who helped develop the atomic bomb, told President Eisenhower that Greenglass could not possibly have stolen the secret. He said in a telegram that "a man of Greenglass' capacity is wholly incapable of transmitting the physics, chemistry and mathematics of the atomic bomb to any one." Dr. Urey asserted that the prosecution's case "depends upon the blowing up of patently perjured testimony." He asked President Eisenhower for an appointment to present his understanding of the case personally.

But Dr. Urey never received an answer to his telegram. Nor was he able to get an appointment with Attorney General Herbert Brown-

ell, who refused to see any one connected with the legal defense or clemency appeals.

This unwillingness to discuss the Rosenberg case with Dr. Urey was characteristic of the role the Justice Department had played for the past two years. Every attempt on the part of the defense to present new evidence was opposed. Every effort at postponing the execution to allow presentation of new facts was blocked.

The Attorney General's office was determined not to entertain any delay in the execution. It wanted an execution, not the truth. June 18th, the Rosenbergs' fourteenth wedding anniversary, was set for the double execution.

Even the majority opinion of the Supreme Court's rejection of the Rosenbergs' final plea, written by Mr. Justice Jackson and concurred in by Justices Vinson, Reed, Burton, Clark and Minton, said:

"Vacating this stay is not to be construed as indorsing the wisdom or appropriateness to this case of a death sentence."

Justice Black wrote in his dissent:

"It is not amiss to point out that this Court has never reviewed this record and has never affirmed the fairness of the trial below. Without an affirmance of the fairness of the trial by the highest court in the land there may always be questions as to whether these executions were legally and rightfully carried out. I would still grant certiorari and let this Court approve or disapprove the fairness of the trials."

All three dissenting Justices criticized the irregular and injudicious haste of the executions.

To quote Justice Black:

"I do not believe that Government counsel or this Court has had time or an adequate opportunity to investigate and decide the very serious question raised in asking this Court to vacate the stay granted by Mr. Justice Douglas. . . . I add my regret that the rush of this case has deprived me of any opportunity to do more at this time than hastily

sketch my view on the important questions raised. . . .

"Judicial haste is peculiarly out of place where the death penalty has been imposed for conduct part of which took place at a time when Congress appears to have barred the imposition of that death penalty by district judges acting without a jury's recommendation. And it seems to me that this court has not had time or opportunity for sufficient study to give the kind of informed decision on this important question it would if the case should take its regular course."

Justice Frankfurter wrote:

"Neither counsel nor the Court, in the time available, were able to go below the surface of the question raised by the application for a stay which Mr. Justice Douglas granted. More time was needed than was had for adequate consideration. . . .

"The crux of all I am suggesting is that none of the obvious considerations for bringing the all too leaden-footed proceedings in this case to an end should have barred the full employment of the deliberative process necessary for reaching a firm conclusion on the issue on which the Court has now spoken, however unfortunate it may be that the issue did not emerge earlier than it did."

### THE DOUBTS MOUNT

The doubts in the Rosenberg case did not die in the electric chair. They are now intensified as a result of the dissenting opinions of Justices Black, Douglas and Frankfurter, who question the legality of the death sentence. Was the execution within the law?

Justice Black declared:

"It is my view, based on the limited arguments we have heard, that after passage of the Atomic Energy Act of 1946 it was unlawful for a judge to impose the death penalty for unlawful transmittal of atomic secrets unless such a penalty was recommended by the jury trying the case."

Justice Douglas said:

"The cold truth is that the death sentence may not be imposed for what the Rosenbergs did unless the jury so recommends. . . . I know deep in my heart that I am right on the law. Knowing that my duty is clear."

Justice Frankfurter wrote:

"It thus appears—although, of course, I would feel more secure in my conviction had I had the opportunity to make a thorough study of the lengthy record in this case—that the conspiracy with which the Rosenbergs were charged is one falling in part within the terms of the Atomic Energy Act, passed by Congress in 1946 and specifically dealing with classified information pertaining to the recent developments

in atomic energy. There remains the question whether the sentence for such a conspiracy could be imposed under the Espionage Act."

What if the Rosenbergs had been tried under the Atomic Energy Act? The prosecution attorney told the Supreme Court that the government would have been laughed out of court if the indictment had been brought under the Atomic Energy Act. Justice Douglas agreed. So, with the Rosenbergs already executed, we have an admission that they would not have been convicted if tried under the law that three Supreme Court Justices believe applied to the case.

All of these opinions do not take into account the mounting evidence that the Rosenbergs were convicted on perjured testimony. What about the documents proving that David Greenglass lied, that the Rosenbergs bought the controversial console table at a department store and did not get it from the Russians as the prosecution had charged, that Greenglass was incapable of stealing atomic secrets?

#### **NEW TRIAL FOR SOBELL**

History may recognize the injustice done to them, but there can be no compensation for the Rosenbergs. No future apology will bring their parents to little Michael and Robbie, nor will it wipe out the crushing blow to American traditions of justice and mercy.

However, there is still time to halt a miscarriage of justice in the case of Morton Sobell, who was a co-defendant with Ethel and Julius Rosenberg. Sobell, convicted on the word of a man who faced a perjury indictment, was sentenced to thirty years at Alcatraz. He swears he is completely innocent.

Alcatraz is a place reserved for murderers and hardened criminals. No children are allowed to visit there. This means that Sobell cannot see his four-year-old son Mark or his daughter Sydney, who is 13.

The many and grave doubts surrounding the entire Rosenberg case call for a new trial for Morton Sobell. He must get the day in court, the full measure of justice that the Rosenbergs never had. Meanwhile he should be removed from the inhumane conditions at Alcatraz to another prison where he can see his children while waiting for all of the facts in his case to come to light.

The National Committee to Secure Justice in the Rosenberg Case urges justice for Morton Sobell. A new trial would be a step toward guaranteeing that the injustice suffered by the Rosenbergs will never again stain the conscience of America.

# EINSTEIN SUPPORTS ROSENBERG APPEAL

Prof. Albert Einstein, the venerable mathematician who lives in Princeton, N. J., announced that he had written the President Monday asking for mercy. His note said: "Dear Mr. President: My conscience compels me to urge you to commute the death sentence of Julius and Ethel Rosenberg." "This appeal to you is prompted by the same reasons which were set forth so convincingly by my distinguished colleague, Harold C. Urey, in his letter of Jan. 3, 1953." "Respectfully yours, ALBERT EINSTEIN."

TO THE EDITOR OF THE NEW YORK TIMES:

After reading the testimony of the Rosenberg case I find that I cannot but wish to cite the following points:

(1) Max Elitcher's testimony is of doubtful value. He says that he and Julius talked about espionage but never transferred any information for some five years. This doesn't seem probable to me.

(2) No certain conspiracy between Sobell and Rosenberg is established.

(3) The connections to others than Ruth and David Greenglass are not established. Miss Bentley was unable to identify the telephone voice that said, "This is Julius with the voice of Julius Rosenberg." If Julius did not refer to him in this case, it probably did not when Harry Gold said, "I came from Julius" when he met Greenglass in New Mexico. From Gold's testimony it seems that he knew nothing of Rosenberg at all. It seems unbelievable to me that the name of an arch conspirator would be used in such identification phrases.

(4) No contact between the Rosenbergs and Anatoli A. Yakovlev is established.

(5) The Government's case rests on the testimony of Ruth and David Greenglass. He had pleaded guilty, but had not been sentenced and hoped for clemency. She has never been charged and tried, obviously it seems as a reward for her testimony. A family feud between the Greenglasses and Rosenbergs existed because of a business alteration. The Rosenbergs' testimony flatly contradicted that of the Greenglasses.

The testimony of Rosenbergs

I found the Rosenbergs' testimony more believable than that of the Greenglasses, although I realize that I have not had the jurors' advantage of hearing and seeing the witnesses. Is it customary for spies to be paid in wrist watches and console tables? Greenglass and Fuchs were paid in cash. The Rosenbergs appear to have been as poor as churchmice and the statement that Julius was spending \$50 or \$75 a night in night clubs seems to me to be a very doubtful one. Had he done this, he would have been obviously and unaccountably rich to all his associates.

However, even if the verdict is correct, I am amazed at the unequal punishment for the same crime. For the very same conspiracy Ruth Greenglass

was never brought to trial, though she admitted her guilt on the witness stand. David Greenglass got fifteen years, Morton Sobell and Harry Gold got thirty years, and Ethel and Julius Rosenberg got death. Only the last two took the witness stand and maintained their innocence. If capital punishment is to be given in the future for espionage I should like to have it introduced in a case for which the evidence rests on the testimony of witnesses who did not stand to profit from their testimony. I do not regard self-confessed criminals as reliable witnesses.

We are engaged in a cold war with the tyrannical Government of the U. S. S. R. We wish to win the approval and loyalty of the good people of the world. Would it not be embarrassing if, after the execution of the Rosenbergs, it could be shown that the United States had executed two innocent people and let a guilty one go completely free? And remember, somewhere there is a representative of the U. S. S. R. who knows what the facts are.

I strongly urge a careful reconsideration of this sentence.

### NEW EVIDENCE, POPE'S THIRD APPEAL, SUPREME COURT DELAY INCREASE CHANCE OF SAVING ROSENBERGS

Sensational new evidence that prosecution's key witness against the Rosenbergs lied; Pope's third clemency appeal; Supreme Court's delay in acting on Rosenberg case for many weeks have spurred campaign to save Julius and Ethel Rosenberg.

**GREENGLASS LIED** Evidence that witness David Greenglass lied in testimony against Rosenbergs revealed when conservative French newspapers, "Combat" and "Le Monde," published document in Greenglass' handwriting. Greenglass says in document he manufactured stories of events that never took place. These stories were central in sending Rosenbergs to death house. Other parts of Greenglass document contradict his courtroom testimony against Rosenbergs. Greenglass attorney W.O. John Rogge indicated document's authenticity to New York Times. Handwriting expert Elizabeth McCarthy verified Greenglass handwriting in document. On basis of this expose, new clemency appeal went to Pres. Eisenhower from National Committee to Secure Justice in Rosenberg Case.

**POPE'S NEW APPEAL** Pope Pius XII's third clemency appeal covered in Vatican newspaper L'Osservatore Romano. The case of the young couple sentenced to die together is so pitiful as to arouse in core commiseration even in those not animated by any ignoble partisan interest in wanting to save their lives, Vatican paper said.

**MORE TIME WON** Meanwhile, another Monday goes by with no Supreme Court action on Rosenberg case. Court had been expected to act nearly last month. Rosenberg supporters using time gained to step up activity.
