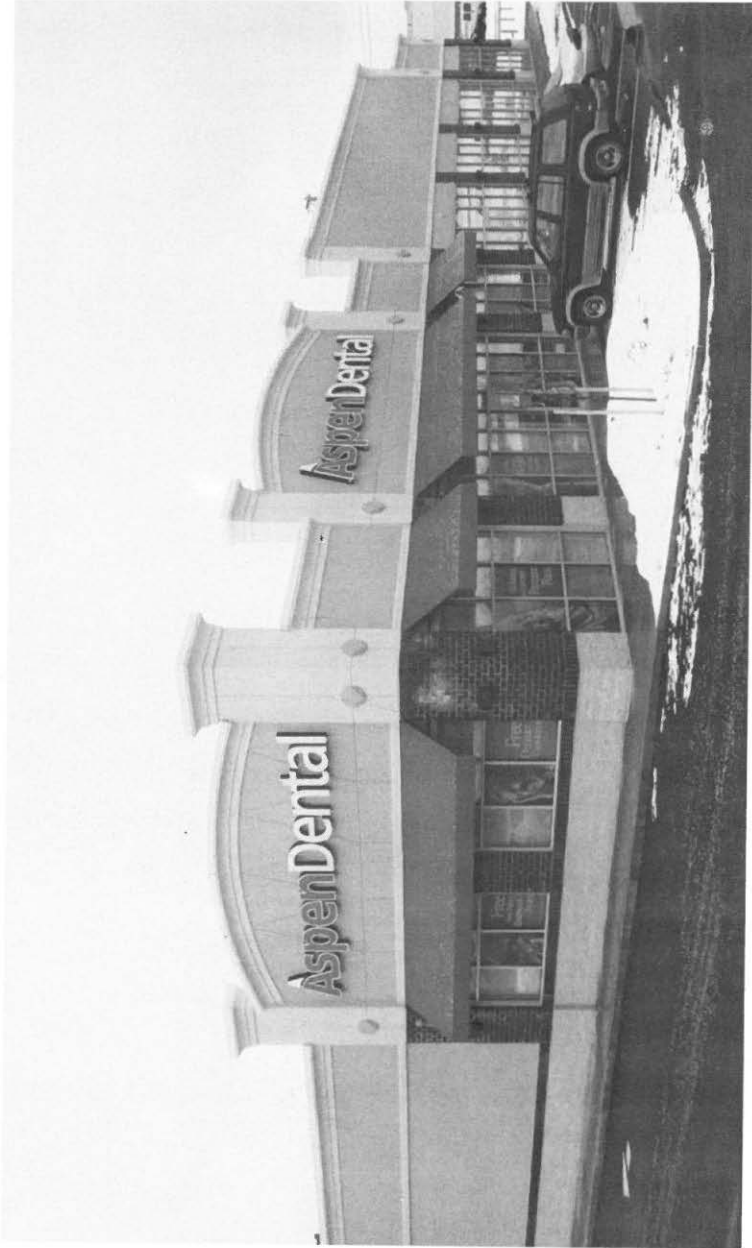
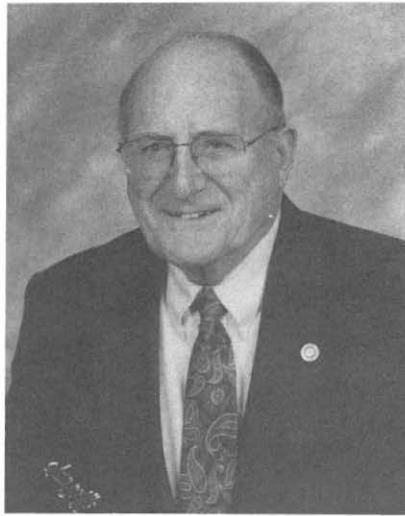

RICHARD J. DEL BIANCO

The 2009 Rutland Town Report is dedicated to Richard J. Del Bianco, IN MEMORIAM. Dubbed the “unofficial mayor of Center Rutland”, Dick was fiercely proud of his town, his church, his kids and his grandkids.

Dick spent most of his life in Center Rutland, living first on Barrett Hill, then Old Falls Rd. He attended Center Rutland School, which later became his office. He graduated in 1948 from Mount Saint Joseph Academy and was hired by the Vermont Marble Company as a draftsman. He continued his career with the Detroit Marble Company until he was drafted by the Army where he served in the Korean War.

After his service discharge, he returned to work at the Vermont Marble Company where he met his wife, Marilyn, and they were married in 1954. They lived in Proctor until 1958 when they moved to East Proctor Road. Dick worked for the Howe-Richardson Scale Company for 20 years. The plant’s closing turned out to be a blessing in disguise because Dick’s next job was his true calling. He became Town Clerk/Treasurer of Rutland Town, a position he held until his retirement, 21 years later. He spent the last 12 years serving as a Selectman, attending his last meeting the night before his stroke.

Dick was a Charter Member of the Rutland Town Fire Department, Rutland Town School Board, Town & City Clerk’s Association, Knights of Columbus, American Legion Post #31, Italian Aid Society, Proctor-Pittsford Country Club, St. Peter’s Church and Parish Council. He had a 23 year perfect attendance record at Rutland South Rotary Club and earned the distinction of becoming a Paul Harris fellow.

Dick was famous for his Bob Newhart skits which he performed in front of audiences big and small. He was thrilled to meet Bob in person in Burlington in 1990 and died on Bob’s 80th birthday. But as funny as it was to hear him perform “The Driver Instructor” or “The Retirement Party”, perhaps his funniest skit was the one he wrote himself about his time spent as a Rutland Town fireman.

Dick and Marilyn were extremely proud of their five children and seven grandchildren.

Dick touched the lives of so many. May we all remember his zest for life, his positive spirit, his love of family, his dedication to the Town and his sense of humor.

On Tuesday, March 2, 2010 at 7:00 AM at the Town Hall in Center Rutland for voters living on the West Side of Route 7, and the Elementary School on Post Road for voters on the East Side of Route 7 to vote on articles #1 thru #25 inclusive, by Australian Ballot. Polls will close at 7:00 PM on March 2, 2010.


1. Shall the voters authorize the Select Board to borrow money in anticipation of taxes?






The polls will open at 7:00 A.M. and close at 7:00 P.M. Voting will be by Australian ballot.

3. To elect other school district officials as required by law.





TOWN OF RUTLAND SELECT BOARD OBSTRUCTION ORDINANCE

No person, whether as landowner, lessee, agent, employee or volunteer, shall deposit, or cause to be deposited, material of any kind within the Town highway right-of-way, or obstruct a ditch, culvert or drainage course without a written permit from the Select Board, in accordance with Title 19, S 303 of V.S.A.

Material for the purpose of this ordinance shall include, but not limited to: logs, snow, ice, rocks or dirt, which have been pushed, plowed, or deposited by any means within a highway right-of-way.

Any person who violates the provisions of this ordinance shall pay a fine of not less than Ten Dollars (\$10.00) or more than Two Hundred and Fifty Dollars (\$250.00) for each violation, together with the cost of prosecution, including service fees, court costs and attorney fees. Each day during which such violation exists shall be a separate offense for the purpose of this ordinance.

The provisions of this ordinance are in addition to, and not substitution of any other rights and remedies, criminal or civil, which the Select Board may have.

OPEN BURNING Residents of Rutland Town

For some of you in Town, the information here will be a reminder. For others, it will be new.

Open burning is the burning of materials in the open air, where smoke and by-products do not pass through a chimney, stack, or flue. The only material that may be burned is clean, natural wood. Clean, natural wood is any wood unpainted and untreated with any chemicals. Plywood, chip-board, or pressure treated lumber **is not** natural wood.

All open burning requires a permit year round and may be obtained from the Fire Warden, Fire Chief, or Assistant Fire Chief. Burning hours are generally from daylight until dark; Monday through Saturday. All permitted fires are subject to the conditions given at the time they are issued.

The burning of any solid wastes, such as papers, cardboard, or household garbage is prohibited; no permits will be issued for these materials. The use of approved incinerators is allowed; however, only clean, natural wood may be burned in them. **The backyard practice of burning household refuse and solid waste in burn barrels is illegal in the State of Vermont and Rutland Town.**

SWAC is composed of the towns of Benson, Chittenden, Fair Haven, Middletown Springs, Pawlet, Rutland Town, Shrewsbury, Sudbury, Tinmouth, and West Haven. These towns work cooperatively to resolve solid waste and hazardous waste issues in a cost effective manner. SWAC functions with one Administrator, and SWAC fulfills the statutory requirements of the state laws covering solid waste and hazardous waste. In 2009, SWAC

- ❖ Oversaw implementation of the 10 town SWAC Solid Waste Implementation Plan (SWIP). The SWIP is available for review at www.rutlandcountyswac.org. SWAC will be filing a SWIP Implementation report, as required by the Agency of Natural Resources, in 2010.
- ❖ Continued its support of the Vermont Product Stewardship Council (VTPSC). (www.vtpsc.org) The VTPSC was formed to shift Vermont's product waste management system from government funded, taxpayer and ratepayer financed waste diversion to producer responsibility that encourages green product design and more local distribution networks with producers having the primary responsibility to establish, fund, and manage end of life systems. The Council will be supporting electronics and paint manufacturer responsibility legislation in 2010. SWAC encourages individual municipalities as well as individuals to join the Council and add their support to these ongoing efforts.
- ❖ Sponsored seven Household Hazardous Waste Collection events in SWAC towns as required by the State. SWAC also contracted for year-round hazardous waste drop-off service for residents at the Rutland County Solid Waste Management District (RCSWMD) Hazardous Waste Depot on Gleason Road in Rutland.

REMINDER: IN ADDITION TO THE COLLECTION EVENTS, ANY SWAC RESIDENT CAN DROP OFF HOUSEHOLD HAZARDOUS WASTE AT THE DEPOT ON GLEASON ROAD DURING REGULARLY SCHEDULED HOURS.

Residents are not charged at either the collection events or at the drop-off facility. In 2009, 1,810 linear feet of fluorescent bulbs and 100 pounds of ballasts were collected; 449.50 gallons of motor oil; 49.25 gallons of antifreeze/glycols; 73.5 pounds and 11.33 gallons of pesticides; 346.25 gallons of flammables/solvents; 484 pounds of batteries; 21.91 gallons of miscellaneous chemicals; 421 aerosols; and 349 gallons of paint related materials were collected. This year motor oil topped the list for the largest quantity of material collected with paint coming in second. Many of the SWAC towns do not have waste oil collection tanks. 145 households participated in collection events. Over 33,500 pounds of clothing/textiles were collected.

Each member town (with the exception of West Haven) has an electronics/computer collection container. 55,067 pounds of electronics were collected from business and residents in 2009. 49,807 pounds was collected from residents. 5,260 pounds of electronics were collected from businesses. In 2008, approximately 12,000 pounds of electronics were collected.

The large increase in collection was largely due to a free electronics collection day hosted by SWAC and the Rutland County Solid Waste District. The one-day collection was sponsored and paid for by Samsung Electronics.

- ❖ Maintained a website (www.rutlandcountyswac.org) providing information on topics such as transfer station information, household hazardous waste education and collection event schedules, recycling, and composting.

NOTE

A person who owns or keeps a dog more than six months old shall annually, on or before April 1, cause it to be licensed and shall pay \$15.00 for each neutered male or spayed female dog, \$19.00 for each intact male or female dog. If the license fee for any dog is not paid by April 1, a 50% penalty is added.

Before a person shall be entitled to obtain a license for a spayed female or neutered male dog, he or she shall exhibit to the Clerk a certificate signed by a duly licensed veterinarian showing that the female or male has been sterilized.

Before obtaining a license for a dog six months of age or older, a person shall deliver to the Town Clerk a certificate or certified copy thereof signed by a duly licensed veterinarian, stating that the dog has within 36 months been vaccinated against rabies with a vaccine approved by the Department of Agriculture. The Town Clerk shall keep the certificates or copies thereof on file.

THE COMMISSION'S 2009 ACTIVITIES INCLUDED:

- **Technical assistance** on community development issues - including the update and implementation of town plans, zoning & subdivision regulations.
- Regular **roundtables of local road commissioners** to share information and discuss common problems and solutions.
- Support of the **Local Emergency Planning Committee**.
- Used **GIS (Geographic Information Systems)** tools to work on transportation, watershed planning, town planning and zoning, and infrastructure mapping.
- Supported the **Rutland Region Transportation Council** which is planning for the future multi-modal transportation needs of the Region; completed additional **bridge, culvert and network inventories**, which help to reduce the local share of some highway projects, undertook 48 traffic counts, began implementation of the **Stone Valley Byway**, and worked with the Sustainable Communities Recreation Committee on the **Multi-use Creek Path**.
- The **Brownfields Assessment** program worked on four sites to identify and assess potentially contamination and make them useable for development.
- Supported **Agricultural Viability** through assistance to the Rutland Area Farm and Food Link.
- **Education, training, and information programs** for municipal officials, reimbursement for program fees as well as a periodic Newsletter, and an updated web site.

In Rutland Town the Regional Planning Commission:

- Continued environmental assessment work at the Flory property on Route 4.
- Assisted on Town Plan update.
- Developed Route 7 Corridor Management Plan.
- Paid for local officials' participation in planning & zoning workshops.
- Provided general GIS help for Town Administrator and road commissioner.
- Created a set of road surface management, guard rails, under drains and culvert maps for the road commissioner.
- Included town on VT Community Energy Mobilization grant application.
- Provided information on transportation stimulus grants.
- Updated local annex of the All-Hazards Mitigation Plan.
- Prepared Town Plan Maps.
- Created a build-out analysis as part of the Route 7 Corridor Management Plan.
- Updating culvert information in VOBCIT.

RUTLAND REGION TRANSPORTATION COUNCIL

The Rutland Region Transportation Council (RRTC) provides a forum for public involvement in transportation planning, the development of regional transportation planning and transportation projects, coordinates policies and priorities with the Vermont Agency of Transportation and promotes cooperation on transportation issues in the Rutland Region. The Rutland Regional Planning Commission provides planning, administrative, and geographic information system staff to the Council.

All municipalities in the Rutland Region can participate in the Transportation Council and those with representatives named to the Council may vote on any issues. Meetings are held once each month, normally on the fourth Thursday, in Rutland. All are invited to attend. Questions about the Transportation Council may be directed to the following individuals: Susan Schreiber, Senior Planner (775-0871) or Richard Baker, Chair (247-6366) or check the website-<http://rutlandrpc.org/transportation.php>.

Highlights of the last fiscal year (10/08-9/09) include:

- Assess and prioritize the Rutland Region's VTrans transportation project list. Differences this year were identifying new candidate town highway bridge projects and a proposal for substitution of Wallingford's realignment of 103 candidate roadway project for a project to construct shoulders on VT 22A in Benson and West Haven to correct the existing roadway deficiencies of Vermont 22A to solve regional transportation problems;
- Continued work on projects such as improvements to the US 7 and 4 corridors, the development of a US7 Corridor Management Plan for Rutland Town and Clarendon, improvements at Rutland Southern Vermont Regional Airport, and public transportation planning;
- Assisted with the planning, engineering and permitting for a multi-use path along the East and Otter Creeks in Rutland;
- Developing signs, a logo, promotional materials and a website and successfully sought funding for interpretive panels and podcasts for the Stone Valley Scenic Byway which extends along Route 30 from Poultney through Wells and Pawlet to Manchester in Bennington County;
- Advised VTrans on various studies, documents and programs, specifically the Western Corridor Management Plan, which is in final draft form;
- Assisted individual towns with infrastructure (culverts, road and equipment) inventories to reduce their local match on bridge and structure grants, speed studies, traffic counts in Ira, Pittsford, Poultney, Proctor, Rutland City, Shrewsbury, and Wells;
- High Risk Rural Road Studies in Castleton at the intersections of Main and North/South Streets and in Poultney at Church/York Depot Streets;
- Continued support on the Safe Routes to Schools Program with Poultney, Proctor, and Rutland City Schools, on the non-infrastructure component of the program;
- Worked with the Rutland Physical Activity Coalition to increase bicycle and pedestrian facilities and programs;
- Helped coordinate the Region's application for the elderly and disabled transit program;
- Coordinated monthly networking sessions for the Road Commissioners/Foremen;
- Promoted access management and sound land use / transportation planning practices for developments and in the review of Act 250 applications.

Currently and in the future the RRTC will continue working on these efforts, with the goal of coordinating land use and transportation to create a more balanced, efficient multi-modal transportation network.

To the Honorable Citizens of the Town of Rutland:

We are pleased to present our 26th annual report to the Citizens we serve. Regional Ambulance Service, Inc. has continually provided emergency and non-emergency ambulance service for twenty-six years. From 1983 to the end of this fiscal year, Regional has responded to 135,529 ambulance calls. This past year, ending June 30, 2009, the service responded to a total of 7,453 ambulance calls in our 12 communities and an additional 403 "Medic One" paramedic intercept calls. Having reached our 26th Anniversary, we are proud of our accomplishments and look forward to serving the public.

We also congratulate EMT-I Wendi Fitz-Gerald for being honored as our "Stars of Life" at the American Ambulance Association's Stars of Life celebration in our nation's capital.

Next year's assessment request has been lowered 5.8% from \$4.25 per capita to \$4.00 per capita. This would not be possible without the public support of our Membership program, direct donations, memorials and estate gifts that have been vital to our success. Thank you for your support. With the continued support of the citizens, our employees, and community governing bodies, we have been able to level fund or lower our assessment rate for the past 25 years. Since 1990 the Assessment rate has been decreased by 36%.

This past year two new ambulances were put into service to replace older ambulances with more than 100,000 miles of service on each of them. Regional Ambulance has seven advanced life support equipped ambulances.

Our motto "Serving People First with Pride, Proficiency and Professionalism" is demonstrated by our employee's commitment to continuing EMS training. Each year our employees have specialized training in Critical Care Paramedicine, Advanced Cardiac Life Support, Basic Life Support, Prehospital Advanced Trauma Life Support, Pediatric Advanced Life Support, Neonatal Resuscitation, Emergency Vehicle Operations, Bloodborn Pathogens and a variety of continuing education programs. Our professional staff is extremely capable and dedicated.

Monthly C.P.R. classes are taught at Regional Ambulance. Last year, through the R.A.S. Training Center, 1,682 people were trained in C.P.R. Tours, lectures, demonstrations, and C.P.R. classes are available for the general public. Child Car Seat inspections are held Thursdays at Regional Ambulance building. In cooperation with the Rutland County Safety Coalition 279 inspections were completed.

The public is encouraged to visit and talk to the employees and Administrator at our Stratton Road facility. Please feel free to contact James Finger, Chief Executive Administrator, or your Representative, if you have any questions concerning the service.

We are proud of our accomplishments and look forward to serving you in the future. The Board of Directors, Administration and employees of Regional Ambulance Service, Inc. will continue working to provide the highest quality of emergency ambulance care at the lowest possible cost to all of the citizens we serve.

RUTLAND COUNTY SHERIFF'S OFFICE 2009 TOWN REPORT

During 2009, the Rutland County Sheriff's Office saw several changes and grew in many areas. We currently have 19 full time Deputy Sheriff's. Two deputies are funded by the State of Vermont as Transport Deputies. Two are assigned as School Resource Deputies, one full time in Mill River High School and the second half time funded at West Rutland School. Four Deputies are assigned full time at Rutland District and Family Court and one is at Rutland Superior Court. One Deputy is assigned to Animal Control duties with funding from West Rutland, Proctor, Brandon, Killington, Mount Holly, Chittenden and Hubbardton. Six Deputies and one Sergeant are assigned our contract patrol Towns of West Rutland, Proctor, Chittenden, Pittsfield, Hubbardton, Clarendon and Wallingford. The remaining four Deputies are assigned to general and administrative duties.

Budgeting has been a challenge. Working with Side Judges Coloutti and Burke we have been able to level fund the amount of County support we receive, and have found ways to save money in the area of public official's liability. Financially the Department is in good shape. I continue to run it as a law enforcement business and a government agency. We are careful about expenses. I balance the pay and benefits of our department employees with the rates we charge our customers. We have a good ratio of grant funding to generated revenue and by doing so we will be able to provide more value to the taxpayers of this County.

We have acquired one COPS Hiring Recovery Program position. This Deputy is assigned to work with our contract Towns on Neighborhood Watch projects, update and streamline our web site and deal with issues as they arise in our area. The website will be much more informative and will include access to our activities for the Selectboards in our contract Towns. We will also be adding a tip section where residents will be able to send us information. These communications can be left anonymously or with your contact information so we can follow-up with you. There will also be an interactive email group set up that will be able to be used for communication between residents and law enforcement about suspicious activities, burglaries or other criminal activities. These postings will be screened and passed on to the rest of the email group. Communications from my office or other area law enforcement will be added in an effort to keep the public informed.

We continue to provide services in the areas of snowmobile patrol, drug enforcement, highway safety enforcement, court ordered sign-ins, civil process, and other contracted services.

Annual Report - 2009

The Vermont Coalition of Municipalities was organized in 1997 in response to the passage of Act 60. The Coalition is a non-profit association of 47 Vermont cities and towns united in the belief that Vermont's education finance laws, Act 60 and now Act 68, are not viable, long-term, equitable solutions to the problem of providing equal educational opportunities for students.

For twelve years the Coalition has used and **will continue to use** lobbying, public information, grass root petitions, and, when feasible, legal means to attempt to change the education funding system or at least to block further excesses.

We have closely monitored the meetings of the State Education Finance and Effectiveness Committee which was created by the Legislature this year to examine potential improvements to the structure and funding of the educational system. The Committee will report its recommendations to the Legislature and Governor by the end of 2009. The Committee has heard from many Vermonters concerning the flaws in the system. We do not expect the Committee to make a recommendation for a needed fundamental change, but we will closely scrutinize any proposals it makes.

The Coalition has reviewed and supports needed changes in the State's property valuation system. Some towns have been particularly hard hit by the decline in property values and are unnecessarily being taxed. Our analysis shows the need for a change in the valuation system and the state not the towns should pay when a taxpayer wins an appeal.

The huge 1.4 billion dollar state education fund, financed primarily by local property taxes, has become a target as a source of money for other government programs. Along with others, we have successfully fought most of these raids on the Education Fund through town petitions, lobbying and public information. In these tough economic times with the state budget crisis we will oppose the renewed attempts to raid the education fund.

The Vermont Coalition of Municipalities maintains that there are fundamental flaws in the statewide property tax, which are:

- Over-dependence on the property tax to fund education;
- Reliance on a flawed property valuation and equalization system coupled with the current downturn threatens to cost some towns huge amounts when property evaluations are appealed;
- A Common Level of Appraisal (CLA) system that continues to increase tax rates even as values are readjusted;
- A system based on tax rate instead of tax burden;
- Tax policy inhibiting economic development and job creation;
- A system forcing many Vermonters to sell their homes and land; and
- A system that has not provided substantially equal education opportunity.

Without major reforms the tax burden imposed by the statewide property tax will continue to increase due to declining enrollments and rising school expenditures. The Vermont Coalition of Municipalities will continue to recommend and urge the Legislature and the Administration to replace the unfair statewide property tax system with a system that greatly reduces the burden of the property tax on local taxpayers.

Certainly the passing of fellow Select Board member, Richard J. Del Bianco was the unfortunate event marking this past year. This is the first time in 32 years that Dick did not have a hand in preparing any of the proposed budgets. We sorely miss him as a Board member and as a friend. Former Select Board member, Steve Hawley, graciously stepped up to fill the sudden vacancy on the Board. To this I think Dick would approve.

This past year saw two years of paving done in one year. It also saw a new environmental assessment on the proposed railyard relocation. The south end of Town continues to develop with the addition of Aspen Dental, a state-of-the-art dental office off Holiday Drive. Across the street the expansion of Alderman's Toyota is taking shape in addition to a new used car dealership and carwash additions. The U.S. Army Reserves are expected to build a new facility in 2010 at the north end of Town off U.S. Route 7.

Town residents will be inconvenienced in 2010 as repairs are made to the McKinley Avenue Bridge. The Town is working with the State of Vermont and Federal Stimulus Funds (our share \$36,294.00) to re-deck the bridge at a total cost of \$570,000.00. The original McKinley Bridge was built in 1950 at a cost of \$36,000.00

In 2009 a total of \$452,000.00 was generated from the Town's 1% tax. The amount represents only two full collection quarters in 2009. The Town Select Board is optimistic we will see the amount increase as the local economy rebounds from the recession.

Finally, the Select Board is in a unique position where we can reduce taxes for the Town taxpayers and give our employees a 4% increase. This is after under going the mother of all reappraisals. The 1% retail tax allows us to do this after giving our employees nothing last year.

My sincere thanks to everyone that offers positive attitudes with positive solutions. From the Board level to the employees and townspeople this is what makes Rutland Town a Town.

Annual Report

This past construction season will be remembered as the year we did two years of paving in one year. The previous year's paving was not done due to huge increases in the cost of liquid asphalt. These increases leveled off and declined during the winter months to levels seen the previous spring allowing us to complete the previous year's paving as well as the current year's paving at reduced costs. Cleanup work after paving started in June and continued through September. The following are the streets that received work this year: East Pittsford Road, North Grove Street, Meadowlake Drive, McKinley Avenue hill, Quarterline Road, Boardman Hill Road, Creek Road, Connor Drive, Karen Drive, Grand Ledge Estates, East Mountain View Drive, Maplewood Drive, Avenue A, Avenue B, Post Road and Park Lane.

The process has been started this fall for the deck replacement on the McKinley Avenue Bridge using Federal Stimulus money. An early spring start for this project is anticipated.

To help prevent road salt shortages this year, municipalities could be included in the State's contract if signed up ahead of the contract being advertised. We did just that in early spring.

Thank you to my staff (Walt Tripp and Tom Gallipo) and all the contractors that helped with winter and summer maintenance. Your efforts are appreciated. Thank you to all the Town citizens for your support of the Highway Department and its budget. I look forward to another year.

The reappraisal for the Town of Rutland was completed for the April 1, 2009 grand list. The common level of appraisal (CLA) that is a measurement of Town listed values to fair market value has risen from 58.05% to 99.06%. The CLA change is a reflection of how property values have increased since the Towns last reappraisal that was done in 1998. The State of Vermont Department of Taxes sets the CLA and three years of sales are used for calculating the rate.

We have noted a downturn in the housing market during the past year and will monitor sales in Rutland Town to see what impact it might have on our grand list. Future sales and market conditions will determine if we will need to make further adjustments to the grand list.

SCHOOL BOARD REPORT

The 2009-2010 school year has brought difficult challenges to the educational system in Rutland Town. Although the national media reports that the economic recession is easing, it seems clear that the economy of the State of Vermont is not enjoying a rapid recovery. At the State level the message to school boards is loud and clear that reductions in spending must be considered and implemented. In an effort to save money, the State is now considering a complete restructuring of the supervisory system, which may include the consolidation of supervisory unions. At our own level, the Rutland Central Supervisory Union has sought to find ways to reduce spending through combined purchasing and the sharing of physical and educational resources. These efforts, along with seeking to procure new grant monies continue at the supervisory level.

In terms of the Rutland Town School, the School Board has made every effort to present a level funded budget to town taxpayers. In the upcoming fiscal year, we are hopeful that our budget will actually decrease. Next year's budget, provides no allocation for raises to our teaching staff. Negotiations continue and are, as of this report, at the "fact finding" phase. While as a Board we certainly appreciate the efforts of our teachers in terms of the quality of the education, which they offer, to our students; the financial reality makes it such that we honestly believe that raises at this time are inappropriate. We remain hopeful, however, that an amicable agreement will ultimately be reached with our teaching staff.

Turning next to the physical plant of the Rutland Town School, we are pleased that the voters supported our roof project. The roof is now complete and should not need attention for the next 40 or 50 years. As a Board we are also pleased that in the area of technology improvements are scheduled to be made to our computer lab, which will provide added opportunities for our students and teachers.

Despite the challenges of the past few years, we want our taxpayers and residents to know that the quality of the education at the Rutland Town School remains in excellent condition. As our economy improves, we likewise hope to improve our facility and the programs, which are offered to our students. We are proud of the achievements made by our students as they progress through high school and college. Each year, the high school Honor Rolls and College Graduation Lists are testament to the strong foundation, which our children receive, in their K-8 years. We encourage taxpayers to show their continued support for our children and the school by approving budgets, which we believe, are both fiscally and educationally sound. We also encourage parents and friends to continue with the support of music and athletic programs and in the day-to-day "life" of the Rutland Town School. The public is also more than welcome to attend our regular School Board meetings and to voice concerns, questions and opinions.

And finally, on a personal note, inasmuch as this will be my final report as chairman of the Board, I wish to thank the other Board members, administrators, teachers and staff with whom I have had the privilege to be associated with for many years. I would especially like to thank Lynette Gallipo who has served as secretary/clerk of the School Board for well over 20 years. Although we have not always agreed on every issue, I have valued her friendship and dedication to the children of our Town. It has been my privilege to have served as a member of the Rutland Town School Board.

Superintendent's Annual Report

I would like to thank those who so graciously welcomed me to my new role as superintendent. It's an interesting time to take on such a role. Though it's not unusual for public education to be scrutinized at all levels, the current state fiscal crisis certainly adds new challenges. Demands for cuts in spending, increased taxes and debt, and cost shifts are all at unprecedented levels. Topics such as school consolidation, vouchers, and charter schools are being proposed as economy measures despite little evidence of their ability to save money or improve education.

Many of us who care about public education are disheartened by the "fixes" put forth by our political leaders, as they too often promote simplistic answers that attempt to change education from the outside in. The school boards and administrators within the Rutland Central Supervisory Union work very hard to balance solid educational programs with fiscal realities. This responsibility is taken seriously, even as it gets more and more difficult each year.

We must seek ways to embrace and strengthen the heart and spirit of our communities. The time has come to engage in powerful dialogues and meaningful experiences for which we all yearn. We must make an effort to offer an education that allows our children to feel deeply connected to themselves, to their family and community, and to the larger world.

Controversy and confusion can only divide us. We must work together to transform the controversy into a lively dialogue – to take on the challenge and to face our fears regarding the educational future of our children. This will require each and every one of us to strive to understand the dynamics of teaching and learning, to understand the deepest needs of our children, and to understand the longings of our own adult hearts. Recognition of all that is being done within your current educational system, and what may be lost, is just as crucial to the conversation as the changes that are needed.

The national, state, and local conversation about educational reform is not new. However, the challenges facing us locally are greater than ever. I believe we all agree on the need to equip today's young people for effective learning, but we must also begin to address our priorities and what has meaning for us all, in order for the children of our community to embrace all they can be – which in the end benefits each and every one of us.

There are many wonderful things happening through the supervisory union and within the central office. I encourage you to stop by your school and our office to see for yourself.

Business Office

The RCSU Business Office is currently in the second year of implementing the Advanced Data Systems (ADS) software. ADS offers complete financial, payroll and human resource solutions developed to meet the unique requirements of schools. The software is designed to meet the changing needs of the educational environment, as well as the numerous operational demands. In addition, it provides powerful reporting tools that enable us to meet changing mandates and decision-making needs. It has also helped us to streamline our budget process, providing detailed information that has been crucial in developing efficient and accurate school budgets. A special thank you goes to Cheryl Scarzello and her team for the many hours of training and time spent on converting our system to one that I know will have a positive impact for years to come.

Technology

I would like to welcome our new technology coordinator to the district. Jesse Safran has taken on the immense responsibility of coordinating, maintaining, and extending the use of technology throughout the supervisory union. He and his assistant, Neil Daub, have been focusing their attention on identifying the needs of our entire system – from the infrastructure to the utilization of technology – no small task. For the first time, we will be viewing our needs in a systemic manner, and developing a long-range plan that embraces all technology has to offer for our students, staff and the community at large.

Student Services

The student support services of the Rutland Central Supervisory Union has had a flurry of activity focused on professional development for all staff, implementation of a new data management system and advocacy with the Vermont Department of Education.

During the 2009-2010 school year, all teachers and support staff are engaging in professional development that will help them to meet the needs of all students within their area of instruction. The learning opportunities, an extension of the Universal Design for Learning instruction initiated in 2008, deepens the understanding of typical learning profiles associated with specific disabilities. By strengthening the capacity of staff to tailor, accommodate and modify lesson plans based on learning differences, students' growth is accelerated.

The special educators within RCSU are implementing a new data management system for the completion and maintenance of special education paperwork. The program, Goalview, has been designed and is being implemented by 10 supervisory unions in our region. The benefits of using this system include: increased capability to monitor student progress, ability to transfer records between schools in our region in the event a student moves, consistent writing of legally compliant plans for students, and allowing for better allocation of resources.

In the fall of 2009, the Vermont Department of Education proposed changes to the current special education regulations. Some of the changes would have adversely impacted the services and supports provided to our children, as well as the funding associated with providing said services. In collaboration with the regional and state-wide organizations, Rutland Central's administrative team advocated for a change in direction of the proposed regulations throughout the public comment period. As a result of the input provided to the Department, many of the changes were not included in the final regulations.

A special congratulations goes to Pamela Reed, our Director of Student Services, for being recognized by the VT Council of Special Education Administrators. Pam was awarded the Gail Link Administrator of the Year Award in May. This award recognizes "exemplary effort and achievement on behalf of the educational needs of Vermont children." Those who know Pam were not surprised to learn of this recognition, as she truly exemplifies excellence in the field of special education.

Curriculum, Instruction and Assessment

Faculty members of RCSU have been involved in professional development around making curriculum, instruction and assessment more universally designed for the learner. Teachers are learning how to take the most recent brain research around learning and apply it to their classrooms. They are learning about wiki sites, vodcasting, podcasting, disabilities, search engines, and social emotional learning, and then applying it in their lessons. As of this school year, 90% of our faculty and staff will have been trained in the initial concepts and are working to implement the strategies they have learned.

Groups of teachers from each of the four schools meet regularly in the areas of language arts, math and science to develop and support the use of common assessments, as well as to support the curriculum and its instruction. These common assessments are structured to give teachers important landmarks for student learning using the national and state standards as guidelines.

Thirty-six teachers have received training in the newest research in the teaching of math. Science teachers have also been instrumental in developing science performance tasks which are reviewed and published for use on the web. These tasks are used to help students develop their inquiry science skills and teachers to assess those skills. Of the 33 tasks which have been published on the Southwest Curriculum Coordinators' website, 50% have been written by our RCSU teachers.

The Unified Arts teachers plan activities to be shared by teachers and students within RCSU. Look for our annual Arts Night, Seventh Grade Adventure Day, Poetry and Arts reading night, and a new grade three/four instructional folk dance day with a music and historical perspective.

Our college entrance exam review preparation program continues for all students who live in the RCSU area. We have had approximately 30 students register for the program over the last six years.

I'd like to thank Lynne Blair who continues to work very hard for the children and staff of RCSU. She should also be recognized for her contribution to the region as a whole. RCSU is greatly respected for the work that has been done over the past few years, from local assessment to participation in numerous professional development opportunities, due to the tireless efforts of people like Lynne and the regional Southwest Curriculum Coordinators' Collaborative.

Social and Emotional Learning

A new social and emotional learning curriculum was implemented this year after a year of strategic planning. The Lions Quest program is a sequential, developmentally appropriate curriculum for children in grades K-12. It emphasizes parent and community partnerships with schools and includes a strong service-learning component.

I'd like to recognize the numerous staff members and administrators, the district study group led by Martha Coulter, RCSU District Psychologist, and the Vermont (District 45) Lions Club, for their time and support in coordinating and implementing a program that I'm sure will have a positive impact on the children across our supervisory union.

In conclusion, I'm proud to serve the communities of Proctor, Rutland Town and West Rutland. It is my hope that we can work together to see through the challenges that face our public schools today, and find the courage to identify and embrace what is truly important for the well-being of our children, our communities, and our world at large.

For the 2009 calendar year the department is pleased to report an overall reduction of 18% for emergency service calls. All categories of response saw downward trends. We would like to believe the department's various fire prevention programs and the personal prevention work of the citizenry are the reason for these improvements.

The enclosed data sheet reflects the following percents of a total of 188 calls: fire calls 18%, rescue & EMS calls 18%, hazardous condition calls 9%, citizen assist or service call 12%, good intent calls 7%, false alarms 38%. Each of the varied situations to which the department responded was handled with the usual professionalism of the membership.

I would like to remind all citizens of the importance of properly installed and maintained photoelectric smoke detectors and carbon monoxide detectors in their homes. These devices save lives and minimize property loss. Utilization of these detectors can help prevent each of us from becoming one of next year's statistics.

The department has an on-going extensive training program led by Training Officer Steve Pulling. His in-house training program insures that skills needed to meet any situation are kept up to date and well honed. We presently have members attending both Vermont Firefighter Level I, and Firefighter Level II programs. Our members also regularly attend many training opportunities in and out of the state.

As mentioned, Craig Robideau's Fire Prevention Program endeavors to educate the public on the measures that can keep us all safe. Our elementary school students are annually instructed in how to respond to numerous emergencies. We take advantage of every opportunity to interact with public about fire prevention and safety topics.

The department's truck committee, under the leadership of Asst. Chief Egan, is currently designing a truck to replace our Tanker #31. The present vehicle is over thirty years old and in need of replacement. With good wisdom many years ago the taxpayers instituted a depreciation fund for the department. This fund enables the department to maintain a fleet of serviceable apparatus. The expense of the new tanker will, with the approval of the Board of Selectmen, come from this fund. The committee will insure a vehicle is purchased that meets the needs of the town for the most economical cost.

I would like to extend the appreciation of the department's members to the many people and agencies that enable us to operate effectively.

Foremost, we thank the citizens of Rutland Town for their continued support. Their positive response to the department's budget requests has allowed the department to stay current with the latest equipment and training. The voters can be assured that the department will continue to do everything possible to present them with a responsible budget.

The members of the select board must be thanked. Their guidance and oversight ensure the department's fiscally accountable budget development. Their counsel on those issues that always seem to arise is greatly valued.

Rutland Town is fortunate to have a highway department that is always prepared to provide the community with vital services. We thank Byron Hathaway and his staff for their on-going efforts.

We interact with the Rutland Town Police Department regularly. They respond to a vast majority of fire department calls, often arriving before the department. Chief John Sly, Captain Jean Paul Faignant, and Sergeant Edward Dumas, we appreciate your professionalism and expertise.

We are grateful to the talented staff at town hall. Their advice and assistance are invaluable to the department and we look forward to working with them in the future.

We thank the members of Women's Auxiliary for their interest in and support of the department. They must also be recognized for their community service projects.

I want to convey my personal thanks to each member of the department for their tireless efforts. Their hard work and professionalism help insure the well being of the entire community. Furthermore, our members would be unable to perform their duties without the love and support of their respective families. I thank them for their patience and understanding while their loved ones are away from the family serving Rutland Town.



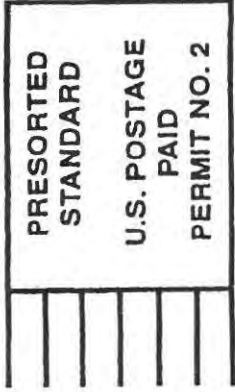
