



Mark & Lottie Salton and Their Collection

Foreword by Harvey G. Stack

Over the years I have shared many stories of my family and their decades as leaders in the rare coin business. In 1933, Joseph and Morton opened a shop on 6th Avenue and 23rd Street, creating what became one of the most successful and influential numismatic firms of all time. Prior to World War II, catalogs and price lists were studied by the two brothers and this, along with interacting with some of the most famous numismatists of the time, provided them a perfect numismatic education.

Just five years earlier, in 1928, Felix Schlessinger started his own numismatic and banking business in Berlin, Germany, a thriving enterprise that was joined by Felix's son Max. Looking to escape anti-Jewish sentiment in the 1930s, Felix moved his family and business to Amsterdam. There he continued this popular business until 1943 when the Germans invaded the Netherlands', attacked the residents, and began confiscating their belongings. Max went underground, resisting the occupiers, and relocated to Portugal where he worked with the Free Dutch Forces. After the war, he moved to the United States where he took the name Mark Salton. He earned a master's degree in international banking at New York University, attained an executive post at Manufacturers Hanover Trust and established himself as a part-time coin dealer under the name of Mark M. Salton-Schlessinger.

The Stack family continued their legacy of numismatic expertise in New York City when I joined the firm in 1947. After the war, Stack's became a haven for many of the numismatic dealers and collectors who came to New York and other eastern cities. Among these was Mark Salton, and we began a friendship that would last into the 21st century.

In 1948, Mark met and married Lottie Aronstein, who had also fled the Nazis as a teenager. They shared the excitement of building significant, historical collections for decades. They also shared a mission to educate museums, libraries, and collectors about numismatics. Mark remained a full time banker, but he was passionate about building his collection, which included great studies of the ancient Greek and Roman series and classic European coins. He traveled with Lottie worldwide to collect and learn about the series he wanted to own, and Lottie became a superb numismatist in her own right. When they were in New York, they were frequent visitors at Stack's Rare Coins, and the friendship between the Saltons and the Stack family continued to grow.

My son, Larry, joined the firm in 1973 adding another generation to manage the Stack's family business. As the years went by, Larry and I often met with the Saltons at

special lectures at the American Numismatic Society annual meetings and dinners, as well as at conventions and shows we attended. It truly felt like a "family get together" and every gathering was enjoyed by all. Larry was very fortunate to have many numismatic "fathers and grandfathers" in the business/hobby with Mark being one of the most prominent. Larry modeled his fabulous Renaissance Collection after studying the exhibit the Saltons had on loan to Bowdoin College in Maine. Mark provided Larry with personal guidance and expertise until Mark passed away. We often shared our enthusiasm for the ANS and its efforts. Mark and Lottie always wanted to help institutions to catalog and display their collections so that viewers would have a better understanding of the coins and their history.

Almost every year, Mark and Lottie would make a charitable donation to some museum or institution to further educate those interested in medieval and ancient coins. Stack's was pleased to provide the documentation

and valuations for these incredible donations with our compliments. To show their gratitude, Lottie would stop by with rare bottles of wine for each of us. Over the years we remained close friends and I will always cherish the time we spent together as warm family friends and numismatic colleagues.

It is with great pleasure and respect to our dear friends the Saltons that we showcase their collections in a series of catalogs in conjunction with our European partners Künker. These presentations will be a lasting tribute to Mark and Lottie Salton, their incredible lives, and their unwavering dedication to the numismatic hobby.

The Mark & Lottie Salton Collection

Mark and Lottie Salton have been well known in American numismatic circles since the 1950s—they were active collectors and dealers as well as benefactors of numismatic and other educational institutions. Though probably little known to current generations of collectors, their collections, built quietly in the post-war era when supply was flush and prices were a fraction of today's levels, are some of the finest to come to market in decades. This exquisite collection was put together through the knowledge and connections Mark built in his family's prewar coin business in Germany, as well Lottie's determined study of numismatics after meeting Mark in the late 1940s. As numismatic bookseller David Fanning wrote in the introduction to Kolbe & Fanning's recently concluded auction of the Saltons' numismatic library, "Mark and Lottie Salton represented a transitional period in the numismatic trade, being direct links between the European dealers of the era before the Second World War and the modern American coin trade of the post-war years."

I knew the Saltons only vicariously through my mentors Harvey and Larry Stack, who were long-time friends of the Saltons and spoke warmly of their many encounters over the decades. And I knew them through the stories of Ira Rezak, who was their close friend, and whose published obituaries of both Mark and Lottie have informed much of what is generally known of the Saltons in public numismatic circles.

My entrée to the numismatic genius of the Saltons is from first-hand knowledge of and exposure to their immense and immensely significant collections. The 437 lots in this sale catalog are but a small fraction of the many thousands of coins—ancient and modern—that will be put back into the hands of collectors and museums over the course of a series of auction sales held by Stack's

Bowers Galleries in the United States and by Künker in Germany, a powerful auction duo chosen by Mark and Lottie themselves.

Mark passed away in 2005, and Lottie in April 2020, and their intention was that their coins were to be sold after they had both parted this life. As with just about everything in the world these days, the coronavirus pandemic delayed the reintroduction of the Salton Collection into the marketplace, so it was with much anticipation that Stack's Bowers Galleries received the collection in the summer of 2021. Though Harvey and Larry had seen snippets of the collection over the years, as had others, even the Saltons' closest numismatic friends didn't know the true extent of Mark and Lottie's numismatic holdings. Boy, were we all in for a surprise! With over 8,000 pieces ranging from the sublime to the obscure to the common, the collections were awe-inspiring to say the least.

As we studied the collections in greater depth in preparation for their sale at auction, the Saltons' eye for quality, rarity and pedigree stood out. Much of the collection was built with the goal of gathering together many numismatic masterpieces—both modern European and their ancient progenitors—in one place, while some of the collections are more academic gatherings of ancient or modern types. Other sections are more commercial—for example modern, common gold coins of the world and other pieces which are undoubtedly items retained from Mark's days as a home-based part-time dealer of coins in the 1950s and 1960s.

Stack's Bowers Galleries will be selling the entirety of the Saltons' ancient Greek holdings, of which the first part is offered in this sale catalog. This is most certainly not a random assortment of coins. "Curated" is perhaps a better verb than "collected" when speaking of how the Saltons









amassed this remarkable cabinet. Every piece is impressive, and there is a reason for the inclusion of each coin, whether it be extreme rarity, superb quality, exceptional eye appeal, or incredible provenance. Even the coins with modest estimates will surely delight even advanced collectors, and we surmise that the final prices realized will be a better judge of a coin's desirability in the market.

A few favorites among the Greeks are the incredibly artistic Geloan Tetradrachm from Ars Classica's sale XVI in 1933—the head and forepart of the man-headed bull a sculptural tour-de-force in miniature. Two Syracusan Dekadrachms—one by artist Kimon, the other by artist Euainetos—are both incredibly well balanced and attractive for the issues. Rare Macedonian types include such delicacies as a tribal issue stater of the Letaioi with visible ethnic and a superb, fine style Tetradrachm of Mende with an inebriated Dionysos reclining on the back of a donkey—both of these rarities have documented pedigrees stretching back over a century. An Olympian Stater from the period of the 89th-90th Olympiad, ex Seltman and Jameson collections, portrays a bold and artistic standing eagle clutching a serpent in its beak. And though silver issues outnumber gold, we would be remiss not to cite a lustrous Mint State gold Oktadrachm of Arsinoe II Philadelphos, pedigreed to 1934 and once gracing the Conte Allessandro Magnaguti collection.

The Saltons collected not only ancient coins (their Roman collections will be sold by Künker), but they also collected coins of the world, with a concentration on medieval and modern European coins in gold and silver. As with the ancient Greek, the coins of the world will delight due to their superb quality and rarity. In our auctions, Stack's Bowers Galleries will be offering the Saltons' Polish, Russian and British coinages, and in this inaugural offering is a small but incredibly powerful array of Polish and Russian rarities.

No fewer than four Polish multiple ducats from the famed Frankiewicz Collection, sold by Mark Salton's father's firm in 1930, are part of this inaugural offering. Included is a sumptuous and extremely rare medallic 7 Ducats

of Danzig issued by Sigismund III featuring confronted figures of Neptune and Annona on its reverse, thought to commemorate Sigismund's efforts at navigation and agriculture in his vast kingdom. Also intriguing is a 1654 Ducat of John Casimir minted at the Wschowa mint, the first Polish coin from this short-lived mint I can recall seeing in the pages of our catalogs in my 22 year tenure at Stack's Bowers Galleries.

Gold rarities will also impress among the Russian coins, including an extremely rare 2 Rubles Novodel of 1722 graded PCGS Specimen-65, which is at the nexus of quality and rarity; it may very well be the same specimen last offered in a 1932 Adolph Hess auction. The 1753 Russian Ducat Novodel in double weight and thickness graded PCGS Specimen-63+ is quite a contrast to the worn, bent or impaired pieces usually seen on 18th century circulation strike ducat issues in the Russian series.

If you have even a passing interesting in Ancient Greek, Polish, or Russian numismatics, I encourage you to visit us during our lot exhibitions in our California headquarters, in our flagship New York City Gallery, or at the auction venue itself to see these miniature works of art in person. Many of the treasures in the pages to follow have not been in the marketplace for half a century or more, and they might not again see the light of day for decades once they enter their next caretakers' hands.

I must impress upon all our clients that the Salton Collection represents an ultimate learning and buying opportunity. It is the culmination of the fruits of decades of efforts and multiple generations' accumulated knowledge and relationships, things that money can't buy. But you can take advantage of the Saltons' efforts at curating one of the most incredible cabinets of ancient and world coins built in the 20th century. If you take home even one of these coins on auction day, it will be impossible to be disappointed!

A timeless classic in terms of elegance and artistry, the engraving of Kimon is always prized among advanced collectors of the ancient world, as it reveals more of a realistic nature to portraiture, as opposed to the somewhat more idealized representations of his contemporaries, such as Euainetos. Not often encountered so dazzling and alluring, especially when featuring Kimon's signature, this incredible specimen should undoubtedly generate tremendous enthusiasm excitement. Increasing this intrigue even further is the fact that this appearance likely represents its first time at a public sale in over a century. Compare to a similar example of the same die pair, though clearly of inferior metal quality, that realized a total of nearly \$470,000 in June 2021.

Salton's ticket and card file describes this majestic specimen as emanating from the collections of J. P. Morgan, Mable Morgan Satterley Ingalls (Morgan's graddaughter), and Dr. Herbert E. Ives. The elder Morgan did own another Kimon specimen of this die pairing (listed as # 160 in Wayte Raymond's catalog and specified as originally from the Sambon Collection [there as # 358]), but that example is not the present piece, meaning that it is quite possible that he presented the current specimen here to his granddaughter Mable, who would have been a child then (Morgan passed away in 1913, Mable was born in 1901). Since she is not otherwise known to have been a coin collector, this might have been a gift—and a rather extravagant one at that. Given Morgan's immense wealth, however, a token of affection of this stature from grandfather to granddaughter would not be surprising. It is highly likely that Mark Salton had been told this fact by Herbert Ives, who was well known to Salton in his role as President of the American Numismatic Society. As such, this would explain its absence from Jongkees' 1941 study on the Dekadrachms of Kimon.

Undoubtedly one of the fabled types of antiquity, the Syracusan Dekadrachms are endlessly sought after given the ambitious artistry that their large flans allow as a canvas. Even more desired are those which are signed by their creators, such as this stunning example. Located below that dolphin that gracefully swims under the neck of Arethousa, the signature—abbreviated as EYAINE($TO\Sigma$)—can be seen, as the artist clearly wanted to leave his mark for all to see and remember. **RARELY** encountered as such, and especially on a flan of good metal that has survived quite wholesomely and problem-free. Rather

attractively toned, and with a well centered strike upon each side, this alluring specimen should garner spirited enthusiasm and interest, as it stands as a stunning artistic relic from the height Sicilian engraving. Compare to similar well centered and tremendously preserved example (an NGC Ch AU★, Strike: 5/5 Surface: 5/5, Fine Style), though rather importantly, from unsigned dies in the style of Euainetos, that realized a total of \$348,000 [!] in August 2014.

Though mentioned in the Jameson catalog as emanating from the collection of R. Hobart Smith, a search of the latter collector's 1897 sale by Sotheby, Wilkinson & Hodge reveals that a different signed Dekadrachm by the hand of Euainetos was offered (Gallatin dies-C.III/R.III, #6). Quite possibly, Jameson became confused in that the Egger sale in which this specimen was offered also featured a Dekadrachm from the aforementioned die pairing (Gallatin dies-C.III/R.III, #5, and appearing in the Egger sale as Lot # 176). The present specimen as Lot # 175 in that Egger sale.

Patches of luster remain on the honey golden surfaces, and this piece is a beautiful problem free example. Sure to spark much interest, this beautiful and RARE piece is magnetic with lore and appeal.

Some coins are simply exceptional to behold, and this ULTRA-RARE Danzig 7 Ducats medallic issue is the epitome of exceptional. Not much is known with certainty about this issue, beyond its stellar beauty, but what is certain is that it predates 1594, when Sigismund III was crowned the king of Sweden. Lacking a Swedish title, this issue was likely struck at some point in 1592 or 1593, with most sources agreeing on 1592. Sigismund III ruled Poland at the highest point of Poland's European influence. His staunch Roman Catholicism and proactive campaign of counterreformation make him, even today, a controversial figure in Poland's history. His magnificent issues of coins and medals in gold remain among the most popular and desirable issues in the whole bourse of numismatics. This coin appears to have been struck to commemorate Sigismund III's efforts at both navigation and agriculture in his vast kingdom. The nature of the reverse design implies a desire for Poland to have a relationship with both the fertile earth and the mighty waves as epitomized by Annona and Neptune, respectively.

Very few examples of this type are known to have ever reached an auction podium, with an example of the same type, but at higher weight, bearing graffiti selling in 2008. This particular example appears to have originated in a 1930 auction from the Frankiewicz collection sold by Salton's father, Schlessinger, in 1930. The pedigree reaches ever further back to a 1909 Helbing auction Enthaltend Münzen und Medaillen verschiedener Länder des Mittelalters und der Neuzeit: darunter Sammlung polnischer Münzen und Medaillen besonders der Städte Danzig und Thorn [Containing coins and medals from various countries from the Middle Ages and modern times: including a collection of Polish coins and medals, especially from the cities of Danzig and Thorn] Lot #629. Though the coin is plated in this Helbing sale, the plate makes it impossible to confirm it is the same specimen.

This example is fully struck in all the splendor common to Sigismund III gold issues. A rich golden luster remains, with very little evidence of handling present, even on the high points. Given the supreme rarity of this piece, it is probable that this sale may be the only chance in a generation to acquire an example. Such a conclusion is sure to drive major interest, and competition for the piece should be strong. This specimen is reserved for the most advanced collectors and belongs proudly at the head of the finest of numismatic cabinets.

This magnificent and generous gold issue, straddles the line between coin and medal. Struck in the weight of a 10 Ducats, Dutkowski places this piece in the medals section and assigns it as a Vilnius issue. The date on this issue of 1595 has special significance, being that at the end of 1594 the Kingdom of Sweden became part of the Polish-Lithuanian commonwealth. Probably struck to mark such a momentous political change, the fantastic reverse alludes to the recent unification by having the respective arms of Sweden, Lithuania, and Poland all under the same crown. This unification lasted only until 1599, though Sigismund III retained the title of king of Sweden on his coinage thereafter.

This particular example was in a Felix Schlessinger sale, from the Frankiewicz Collection, in September of 1930, as lot #185. The coin is plated in that catalog, and Salton also attributes it to a later Christian Zinck Collection. Two years prior to

the Schlessinger sale, this issue was in a Sally Rosenberg sale (11/1928) as lot #293 [Incorrectly plated as 292]. Both Rosenberg and Schlessinger were based in Frankfurt, so there seems to be a logical connection between Schlessinger and Rosenberg, though it is mere speculation as to how it ended up into Salton's hands from this pedigree.

As the PCGS encapsulation notes there is some tooling present, at some point in the past there was an attempt to make Sigismund's beard radiant. Some very light wear is present on the mustache of the portrait, and on the borders of the arms on the reverse. These drawbacks should be considered minor when compared to the overall beauty, history, and nature of the piece as a crown jewel. A beautiful light honeycomb tone exists across the surfaces, with plenty of original mint sheen and bloom present. Perhaps the highest pinnacle of the Salton Collection's lofty assemblage of Polish gold, this type of piece comes to market perhaps even less than once a generation. Fierce bidding should reign when this stunner crosses the auction block, perhaps far exceeding the bounds of the estimate.

In 1581 Riga was fully subsumed into the Polish-Lithuanian Commonwealth where it remained until 1621, when it fell under the aegis of the Kingdom of Sweden. Given the briefness of time Riga spent as part of the Commonwealth, all gold issues from this period are of the HIGHEST RARITY. In 2000, CNG estimated that no more the 20 pieces from Riga struck during Sigismund III's reign survive.

This example is nicely struck on a wafer thin planchet that shows no signs of circulation or handling. Very little scuffing is evident in the fields or on the devices, which leaves the shimmering golden luster intact. The date shows clear evidence of repunching where the '88' was changed to '99'. This choice example is sure to excite, and the rarity of the piece ensure some amount of rivalry will be present when bidding.
