COACHES COLLEGE

Bruce Bizzoco associate dean of instruction, returned *This summer from the United States Fencing Association National Coaches College Development Program, a three-week instruction program housed at the United States Olympic Training Center in Colorado Springs, Colorado.*

Bizzoco was one of approximately 90 instructors and coaches from across the United States invited to attend.

The national coaches college was created to increase the quality of fencing instruction in the United States and consists of practical and classroom sessions. Bizzoco was one of 60 coaches selected for the first class 20 years ago. After four years, Bizzoco graduated with an instructors rating in three weapons, foil, saber, and epee.

NEW GRANT RECEIVED

Community Service Programs of West Alabama and Shelton State Community College recently heard that they have received a new Welfare to Work grant for this area. Jackie Standridge of Community Service Programs is overseeing the grant. Fran Viselli has been involved in the grant for the college.

The purpose of this grant is to provide job training services to participants in the Temporary Assistance to Needy Families (TANF) program.

One segment of the grant includes services for the non-custodial parent, normally the father, who is not living with the family, in order to improve his employability and thus, his support of the family.

About 50 of the 160 program participants will be in classes at Shelton. These classes include auto body, truck driving, diesel, and carpentry. The program at Shelton will be a 16 month program that includes work keys and work key training. The participants will be from Tuscaloosa and Greene counties.

REMEMBERING SEPTEMBER 11

I remember a little bit about World War II, although I was a very young child. We had no Coca Colas, no Hershey bars, and the neighborhood kids would play "war" out in my garage in Baytown, Texas.

During the Vietnam War, I was busy having babies. My memories of that war are much like the memories of many Americans. I remember the bloodshed on nightly television and the rush of the Vietnamese people to board the boats leaving Vietnam at the end of the war.

The Gulf conflict affected me. I was old enough, and perhaps wiser, to realize the potential devastation and I knew some of the people over there. We were all thankful when it ended as quickly and antiseptically as it did.

All of this is to say that what happened on September 11 was different. As we watched it off and on all day in the President's Conference room, it became surreal. My daughter once worked on the 102 floor of the tower. I had seen the buildings, been in them. This couldn't be happening in our country.

The firemen, the policemen, the rescue units - the people who continue to put their lives on the line to help find survivors are the heroes of all of this. The rest of us are just onlookers. I personally feel somewhat useless.

I plan to give blood during the college's blood drive. My prayers will continue to go out to all the victims and their families each day. I also pray our government can find the right answers and solutions. There is much riding on the hope that they will.
