ARCHAEOLOGIST DEAD IN MUMMY'S TOMB

Karnak, March 4

Professor Ebenizer Turnbull, organizer of the Knitcht Tomb expedition, was found dead in the tomb early this meming. The inner chamber was resched early in the year after much difficult labour, and the archaeologists were quite cettain cover the excellent condition of the saccophagus, chamber artifacts and the Kateber Mummy itself. The party was in the final weeks of its work in the sraw when disaster struck.

Mr. Turnbull had worked late into the night, remaining in the chamber alone after other members of the party had retired for the night. His body was discovered by Mr. Andrew Weatherby, another of the project archaeologists. Mr. Tumbull had been strangled to death. Ancient linen bundages were found around his neck.

Demonges were room around an serock.

Upon hearing of the Professor's death, several of the natives working on the excavation called upon lists and Osin's for protection and for forgiveness for disturbing the sacred fomb. Inscriptions found on the canopic jars and doors indicate that this death may be the mysterious work of the ancient god Tunmautef and his goddess, Neth.

DISASTER AT SEA

Our Philadelphia Correspondent telegraphs: - A Gloucester, Massachusetts despatch brings a terrible tale of the sea, told by Captain Ryan, of the schooner S.D. Story. He arrived yesterday from Iceland, having sailed on Oct. 19. Off the south coast of leeland he reports that a large fleet of French fishing vessels had gathered to fish, when a heavy gale came on causing great destruction among the fleet, and scattering it in all directions. Six vessels were lost with their crews. One had her deck sweps, losing her captain and 11 men, another her captain and three men, and a third her captain and two men. The total loss, as far as ascertained, is 137 men. Many of the vessels were so badly damaged that they had to be abandoned, causing 300 men to be left in Iceland in a destitute condition until a steamer arrived to carry them away. The supply of food was limited. There were few natives living there, and the men endured great hardships.

Dr. Gilbert, surgeon at Holloway Gaol. said the prisoner was of very weak intellect and almost an imbecile, but he knew what he was doing

The jury, after a considerable absence from Court, found the prisoner Guilty on the second count of wounding with the intent to do graevous bodily barm and added that they were of opinion that he was of weak mind, but not irresponsible for his actions

MR. JUSTICE BUCHANAN said the case was a very shocking one, and he sentenced the prisoner to seven years' penal servitude.

ANARCHIST FOUND DEAD IN ROOMS

A man identified as Nickolai Gorski was found shot to death in his room near Aldgate Station. Gorski, a Russian exile, was known to be involved in exile political activities. Police attribute his murder to those warring Russian factions. Parliament has asked the Home Secretary to bring pressure to bear upon foreign governments to end their use of British soil as a buttleground for foreign internal strife.

A similar request last year fell on deaf ears, but it is hoped that recent events will change that circumstance.
