

## Indian Refuge

Time changes all things-customs, peoples, londs. Yet there are some that remain estronged from the possage of time. These ore the ones that do what history connot. They open a door to the living post. A chronological portroyal of events can depict social, economic ond theological lessons, but never can it animote the common everydoy joys of long ogo. Whot are these keys to other years? Perhops it is a portrait of a girl pointed a century ago. Or, is it on Indian orrowhead, on oncient diary, o Sponish gold coin? All these are objects that corry the foncy that is yesterday into the reality that is today. They make me wonder if life would mean the same to me had I lived in a rough cobin on o frontier instead of a white house focing a locust-lined street.

Yet strongely enough, it is none of these things that turned the lock for me. It was not on object to hold in my hond, but o place, to hold in my heart. From the monotonous greybrown of soge brush desert stretching oway from the Columbio, this place stands aloof. With its high mountoins, virgin timber, and plocid lokes, it is more than a mere oosis. It is o lond of long ago holding out a key to other veors. It is on Indian Reservation. I have alwoys felt that very word, "Indian," is a magical, inseporable link with a time when the shining mountoins were formidoble. And I have always wondered why the white mon's success in his struggle for freedom had to terminate the red mon's corefree life.

So, the moment I stood on the shores of one of the Reservotion's lokes, I beheld a legend written in the shodowy script of time ocross the glossy water and up the velvet mountainside. A silent testoment of those years before our cities rose, it spoke of moccosin-podded silences ond dusky, rooming men. Into my foncy, it brought o song of summer with the bright sun's roys etching golden potterns on the earth below. It might have always been this way, and even today, a lone dark, swimmer might have streoked his woy ocross the woter. A swimmer, swift and silent, and like a beover, leaving only a wake of quiet ripples to mark his course. And whot of fishermen in this porodise? Are they the ones who rely only upon shorp eyes ond o steody speor?

Then too, my legend wos o tole of winter. I sow soft, white hills guording o block, block jewel. Here, during snowtime, hunters must come to find, by the woter's edge, deer silhoueted ogoinst the pole moon.

But my reverie was ended obruptly. There, in a corner boy, my eye cought a dock and diving board. A dirt road skirted the modern

convenience, and hurried off into the hills. No, this is no longer a home of silent swimmers. And fishermen have long since traded spears for rods, flies, and other surer tockle. Trees that once sow hunters gliding beneath their limbs now shelter brozen compers from the night.

Yet, somehow, I om glod that this modern mon who hos come is dusky, like the silent one. For I still retain my fancy that in some long ago time, the One Great Spirit created this land of high mountains and virgin timber for his branzecolored children. In the course of time, the American Indian was pushed from many parts of his notive land by light-complexioned men. But in their rush for power, the newcomers poused long enough to leave him this, on edohhow.
