Of course，during the first years，we were under the guidance of the members of the wher tribes，but as the latter passed on，we filled their vaeancirs in clubs，on athletic teams and other organizatons．In the spring all of the girls participated in a Gym Show．They danced and exhihited their skill in various lines．The proceeds of this show hard surfaced three tennis courts and helped improve the playfield．

In the fall of 19：33 we reached the Senior liver and started our journey down it peare－ fully．In the annual foothall wars agninst the Pirates，Tigers and Bulldogs，the Indians re－ turned with the eity championship．No douht the vietories were partly due to the enthusiasm of the student body．The warriors represent－ ing our tribe were Max Tatman，IBol） Carey，Dave Jamme，Leonard Sullivan，Jerry Sage．Jimmie Billberg，John I3ickert，Frank Taylor and Fred Olsen，manager．In basket－ hall we were outplayed by the＇Tigers only．

Ied by Chief Jerry Stage，we finally reaclact a fork in the river．The other offieers of the senior It class were：Lillian（irimsrud，vier president；Viola Miller，secretary；and ken neth Jones，treasurer．

Jones served us so well in the past that we derided to bet them keep their former offices． We also had la dorglish for sergeant at arms． and Ilerb Jacobs，Jack＇Turner and Frank Kingery for checer leaders．Audrey Cross was chosell president of the Girls＇I，cague，and Max＇Tatman the head of the Boys＇Feclera－ tion．
In the line of entertainment some of the girls presented the Doll shop；the dramaties class demonstrated its abilities in a modern phay＂The Moyal Faataly of 13roadway＂with Joyece Ihaxen．Jane Stone，Aliee Glassford， John Ilackett and boh Ferris playing the leads；and the Delts put on their snnuat Ili－ Jinx．Although the squads of baseball and track were composed mainly of greell men， the teanis represelited North Central well．In temis the pirls，captained by \％ola Thompoon， pailucl many victories．
We sighted the cond of the river marking the and of our long journey in June of 1934 and inmediately launched the S．S．＇Tanarack．＇Yire launehing was supervised by．＂Skipper＂Jones． In these last days of our trek we gave a big dance，the Serior from．All the handsome braves and pretty madens were present．As we bade farewell to one another，some of us were glad and others sad；but we all afreet that we＇ve had a inarvelous time traveling together and certainly hope that the finture generations of Indians rnake many sucerssfol treks through the North Central plains．
