The first task under the new government was the setting up of an election commission to direct the first student body election in North Central's history. 'The members of the House of Representatives had been elected in January to serve as a spring S. R.A. until the constitution was approved.

The length of office of senators, representatives, and officers, was, however, short, as only a litte more than two months remained in the semester. Elections for fall semester officers and senators were held at the end of the year.
