The mathematics department has added an analysis course for second semester seniors to better prepare them for college mathematics.

Students may become thoroughly versed in quantitative fundamentals by enrolling in courses in algebra, geometry, trigonometry and analysis. Courses offered by the science department are necessary for students planning for college or for a carcer in fields such as medicine, engineering or nursing.


General science and biology courses of fered by the science department provide a background for advanced studies. Physics and chemistry give an understanding of the properties and behavior of matter and prepare students for college work.
