The squad tied with West Valley for third place in the Northeast District Debate League. Highest honors at the Pacific Lutheran College Tournament went to the junior division debaters as they captured the Junior Division Sweepstakes trophy in a tie with Mercer Island, Seattle.

North Central was one of 20 schools receiving a plaque from the College of Puget Sound for outstanding contributions in the field of forensics during the past decade.

Students who have had no previous debate experience may enter the beginning class where principles of research, elementary logic, and basic speaking techniques are studied.






