## William Sorenson, Executive Officer of Board of Education, Responsible for Regulations Set Forth by the Board

William C. Sorenson, as Superintendent of Schools for District 81, is considered the chief executive officer of the Board of Education and is responsible for carrying out all policies or rules and regulations established by the Board of Directors. Mr. Sorenson makes the rules which are necessary to make the policies of the Board of Directors effective.

All individuals employed by the boand are responsible to Mr. Sorenson. Sulmitting in writing his recommendations for all candidates for employment, being responsible for the assignment of all personnel within the school district and providing professional leadership for the educational program of the schools are more duties delegated to him.

Mr. Sorenson also is responsible for the development of a plan of maintenance, improvement, or expansion of buildings and site facilities needed and means of keeping the community informed about school matters. He also brings back various ideas which can be used in our school system from meetings with other school officials.

At the beginning of each fiscal year, Mr. Sorenson must submit to the Board of Directors a preliminary budget for the ensuing year and at the end of each school year make a report on the operation of the school system.

This year the Downtown Kiwanis Club, sponsor of the newly organized Key Club at North Central, gave Mr. Sorenson a special award and much recognition for his service in organizing the club.

## Board of Dístrict No. 81 Dírectly Responsible for School Policies

School District 81 is an example of local government which has been authorized by the Constitution of the State of Washington. The School Board's functions are primarily legislative. The Board of Directors is directly responsible for estab)lishing local school policies.
Employing a city superintendent of schools, teathers, janitors, one or more assistant city superintendems, supervisors of instruction and all other necessaty persons for the well-being of the school district is the main responsibility of the Board of Directors. Adopting and enforcing such rules as may be deemed essential and determining the lenget of time that school shall be maintained are more duties delegated to the board.

The Board of Directors must also provide textbooks and supplies to be used by the students and prohibit all secret fraternities and sororities among the students in any of the schools of the district.

## Príncípal John P. Rodkey Bears Many Responsíbilitíes

John P'. Rodkey, as principal of North Central, assumes many responsibilities. Before he comes to schoot, he makes arrangements for substitute teachers. After arriving at school, he consults with teachers about grading and other problems.

In the morning, Mr. Rodkey works with the deans and vice-principal on acute discipline cases and has orientation with cadet teachers assigned by the near-lby teacher-training colleges. Lunch, if any at all, is usually taken shortly after noon.

In the afternoon, Mr. Rodkey attends meetings with other secondary principals of the school district and with the ahtetic board of control to discuss league schedules and problems. Every

Tuesday after school he conducts a faculty meeting for the in-service training of teachers. Mr. Rodkey also edits the daily bulletin of school news and when completing this, he olten has a meeting at the Administration building to work on millage and bond levies or other school matters with the board and superintendent.

During his busy diay, Mr. Rodkey answers numerous phone calls, writes volumes of correspondence regarding former students, discusses curricuhum problems with department heads and makes plans for building improvements. In the evenings, he attends the athletic, music and drama events of the school and helps chaperone the school dances.


## Vice-Principal Edward Gill Assists Smooth, Efficient School Operation

F. Eduard Gill, as vice-principal, is the executive officer of the school, responsible to the principal for the smooth and efficient operation of the school, and, in the absence of the principal, serves as administrative head of the school. Assisting staff members in matters of stadent control and procedures and being responsible for the class schectule and the assigmment of students are more of Mr. Gill's duties. Mr. Gill must also assist the principal in the supervision of school functions, such as assemblies, evening programs and athletic contests. He has charge of pupil accounting and atuthorizes the drop card of students leaving school.

Team Teaching Is Experimenta

Team teaching in English 5 and 6 has been ann experimental project for the departinent. Three teachers combined their classes two days each week for lectures and instructional material on American literature as well as grammar, punctuation and compostion. Two days each week these classes were divided into discussion groups of 12 to 15 students while the others worked independently in the library. On the fifth day the students were assigned individual conferences, making it possible for each student to discuss his themes, tests and daily exercises with his teacher.

Rapidly increasing interest in foreign languages has been shown by North Central students churing the past few years. This imerest was increased to the point where two new classes were added to the department's curriculum. A basic foundation for other languages can be attained by taking Latin. Latin also serves as a classical background. The thirelyear Latin students are concentrating on reading, especially that of Cicero.

In the three modern languages offered, Spanish, French and German, an eannest effort is made to teach the studem to speak the language, as well as to read and write it. In his study of the language, the student also learns mnch about the people of the country-their customs, their history, their literature, their way of thinking.

Valuable courses in everyday life and in earning a living are offered in the business education department. Typing is a timesaving skill that nearly everyone needs. In addition to its vocational and personal values, the study of bookkeeping makes an individual aware of the problems of the American way of life. Skill in shorthand will open the door of opportunity to many graduates. A knowledge of office machines, filing, business arithmetic, business English and letter writing increases the potential value of a graduate in the business world.

To attain these goals, the business colucation department offers two-year courses in typing, bookkeeping and shorthand, and at onc-year course in office practice. Typing is open to all students; bookkeeping to sophomores, juniors and seniors: shorthand to juniors and seniors, aud office practice on seniors only.

If one wishes to be vocationally proficient in typing, shorthand or bookkeeping, it is highly recommended that these sub). jects be studied for two years. For personal use, one year is usually sufficient, and will fulfill any necessary experience after gradwation.
