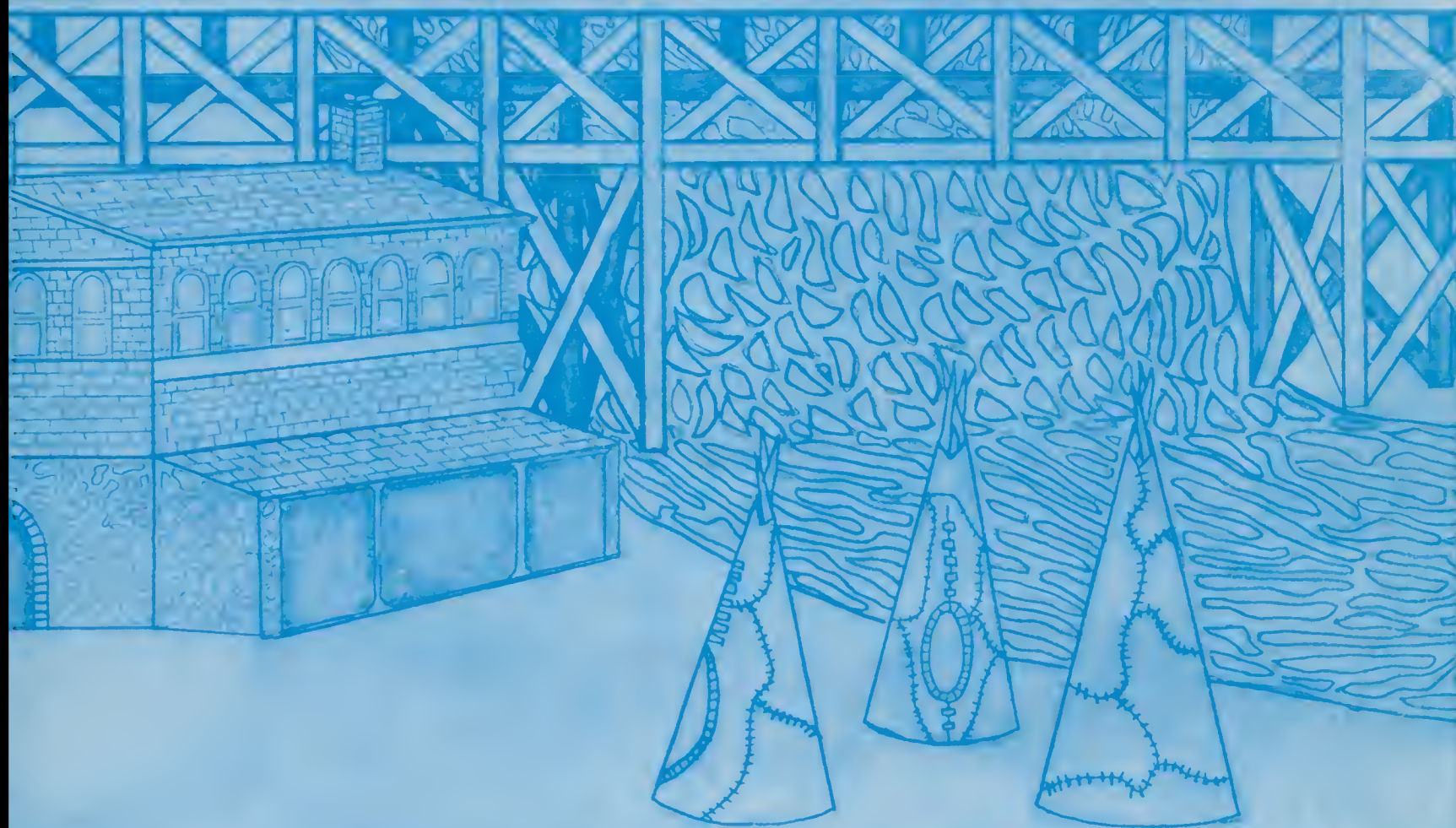
# SPOKANE FALLS



Spokane Falls wilderness was part of the great Oregon Country at the turn of the 19th Century.

Here the Spo-kan-ee, (Spokane Indians — Children of the Sun) quiet, honest, and inoffensive hunted the abundant wildlife, particularly deer, for food and shelter. They wintered on the South Hill and moved below the falls in the summer. In June, the white salmon spawned. In October, the red salmon. Both banks of the river were then scenes of cleaning and drying fish.

Thus they were living in this lovely paradise, under the leadership of their old chief, Illum Spokaneee, or the Son of the Sun, when the white man arrived.

# SPOKANE FALLS

When Sir George Simpson asked that a promising boy of the Middle Spokanes be sent to the Protestant Mission School at Winnipeg, the Red River Settlement, Illim-Spokane sent his oldest son and the future chief, Spokane Garry.

Besides languages, Garry acquired considerable knowledge of agriculture. He returned to his people as a teacher and preacher, and at first had great success.

Later on, life for this man was a series of bitter disappointments — rival chiefs foreswore his counsel, white men betrayed him. Yet Garry was never bitter and in 1892 departed for the Heaven that he steadfastly believed was for good Indians and upright white people alike.

From this early time, education has always been a prime concern of the Spokane people, and their school administration is among the finest in the Northwest.

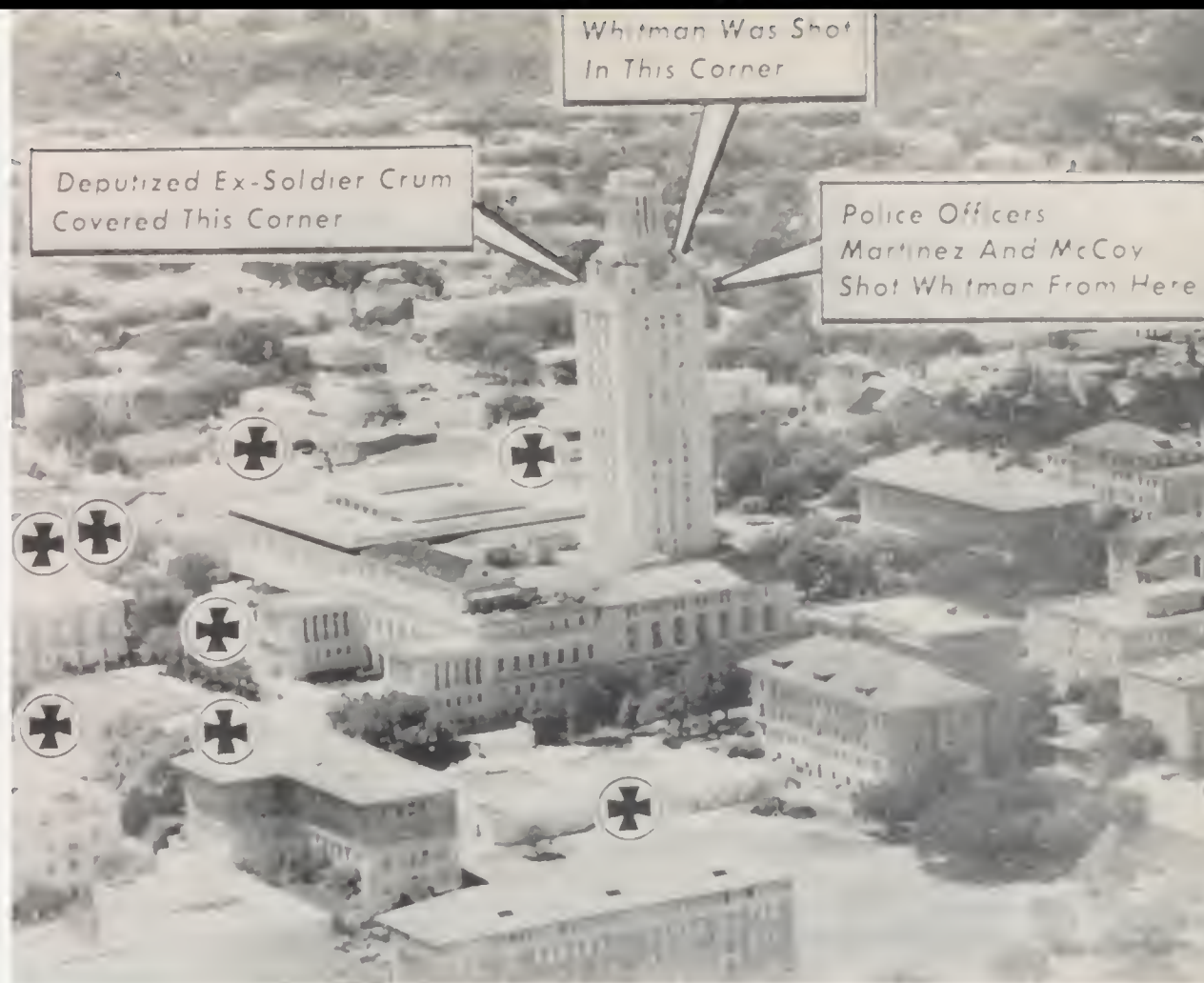

## School Board Decides Policy

Who gives our principal permission to leave town on school business? Why, the School Board of School District 81. That's who!

Decisions on widely ranged school problems concerning policy, rules, enforcement, and matters of varying magnitudes is their job. Approval of staff, improvements in relations of particular schools are also the duty of our directors.

Appointment of a city superintendent is made by the School Board. Dr. Albert Ayars has served two years. It is the School Board's job to employ assistants, supervisors, teachers, janitors, cooks and other personnel for the functioning of schools. Details such as provisions for textbooks, audio-visual aids, and essential supplies to aid teachers are directed by the Board.

Though their main concern is for the public schools, they also serve in the control and operation of the Spokane Community College at Fort George Wright.

Passage in the election of November, 1966, of Referendum 14 and 15, the Senate Joint Resolution, Part I and III, dealing with increases in funds for school improvement and expansion will affect the School Board's plans for the new fiscal year, providing local citizens approve special school financing.

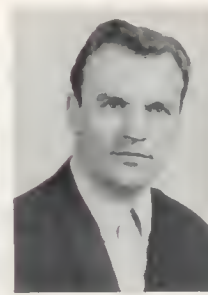

Frequent experiments in science classes enable students to better understand the world they live in. Since one year of a laboratory science is required, a large majority of sophomores are completing the biology course. Juniors and seniors may broaden their science background by taking chemistry or physics. Integrated physical science is another optional course offered to North Central students.

Mathematical courses are aimed to stimulate logical thinking by the students. Although students are not required to take math above their freshman year, many continue after completing freshman algebra. Geometry, intermediate mathematics and advanced mathematics provide students with an opportunity to further their mathematical ability. In senior math students review all of the basic fundamentals of math.



# Languages, Business Ed Lay Career Foundations

Those who plan on entering the business world after graduation find the courses and vocational education offered at North Central especially useful. This year a new system was added in which the combination of shorthand, business machines and typing were offered for these students. These skills proved to be very helpful while in high school and were of great benefit to those looking for employment.

North Central's foreign language classes teach students the ability to understand other languages as well as a better understanding of English. Latin, German, French, and Spanish are offered. In addition, Russian was introduced to the students this year. It is offered to those who have a 3.0 average. In this course students learn the Russian alphabet and the skill of speaking the language.

Audio-lingual methods of teaching aim to enable students to understand and speak the language with fewer inhibitions.

Students who are struggling in these languages today gain an understanding of foreign peoples which may help to bring peace in the world tomorrow.

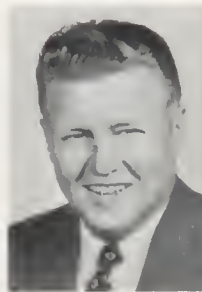

# Homemaking, Industrial Arts Are Essential

Increasing numbers of mothers are assuming the dual roles of homemaker and career women and it is important for girls, while in high school, to develop a greater proficiency in homemaking skills. The girls are given an excellent chance to receive this training in cookery and sewing classes. The girls also must have an understanding of human relationships that will help in rearing their children properly and providing a happy, stable, and satisfying home for the whole family. Instruction in this area is offered in such courses as child development and social relations.

All girls are required to take two credits in some homemaking courses. Up to two years in any subject are available.

Learning useful skills and those important to future vocations is the main objective of the boys who engage themselves in industrial arts classes. The courses taught are designed to help the boys to be well rounded in such arts and able to do more things, such as household repair, themselves.

Auto shop, a class which most boys are interested in, proves valuable to those owning cars, and will help them greatly in the future.

Wood, metal, and electronics shops and vocational metal and mechanical drawing are offered to the male students in the junior and senior years.

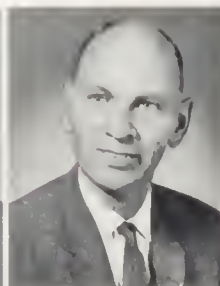

# Is Making NC Function Smoothly

Preparing and serving well-balanced meals is the main task the cafeteria personnel perform. The nourishing and attractive hot lunches are served at a low cost to many of North Central's students. Those who bring cold lunches from home frequently use the snack bar which is a supplement to the hot lunch program. The hot sandwich line offers a variation in the main course served, but is still an appetizing hot lunch.

The cooking staff is constantly planning ahead for future meals, and the cafeteria is a busy place during most of the school day. This year they have added a super-lunch which has an extra main serving for a slightly higher price.

Shortly after the students finish their school day, the custodians begin their job of restoring order to the empty halls and classrooms. They are kept busy cleaning blackboards, pushing trash containers, sweeping and dusting the main building, three portables and the boys' gym.

Also they are responsible for keeping the electric and heating systems in proper working order. They promptly make necessary repairs and replace burned-out lights. Maintaining the grounds is another duty which keeps the custodial staff busy with many hours of work.

# SPokane Falls



Governor Stevens, at a great council held in Walla Walla in 1855, proposed depriving interior Indians and the Spokanes, of large areas of their land and placing them on reservations. Several tribes at once broke into open warfare.

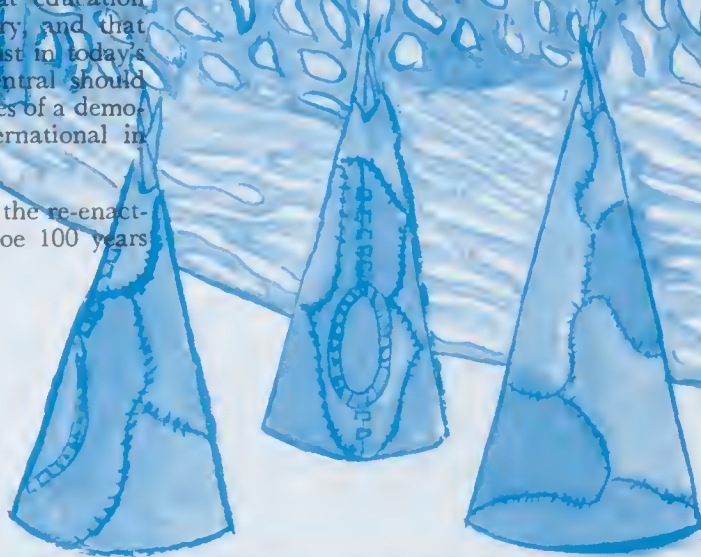
Then followed in rapid succession the defeat of Colonel Steptoe, Colonel George Wright's pursuit of the Indians up river toward Liberty Lake, and the slaughtering of hundreds of their horses and burning of their granaries.

Poverty-stricken and disinherited, with no spot officially theirs, unless they went west of the Columbia, the Spokanes did the best they could. Garry in 1887 made a last useless attempt to have a reservation definitely assigned to his people.

Garry maintained that the white man needed to learn that the only difference between white man and Indian is a matter of color and clothing — blood and body are the same. If the words of this wise man and those whites who agreed with him had been observed, much needless bloodshed could have been averted.

Spokane's secondary schools recognize that education determines the behavior of a nation's citizenry, and that tolerance and understanding of others is a must in today's complex society. So a graduate of North Central should understand the social, moral, and political values of a democratic society — community, national, or international in scope.

# SPokane FALLS



In 1872, School District #81 was organized. Henry Cowley, Cyrus Yeaton and L. S. Swift were directors and missionary Henry Cowley was chosen as teacher.

Enrollment fluctuated, there was no school house. At last public clamor for a building was strong enough so county officials took the necessary steps and with tax money and additional funds accruing from such affairs as formal balls, etc., the building came into existence in 1873. The little structure was of unpainted boards, with an entrance door in the center of one end and three windows on each side. Inside was a single room, furnished with crude, home-made desks and heated by an old-fashioned "box" stove with a "drum." The total investment, building, equipment and all, was about what the city now pays for two or three microscopes for student use in the high schools. The little building stood on or near the Northern Pacific right of way, about at the intersection with Lincoln Street.

In 1879 enrollment reached twenty-two. *The Times* reported in September: "School was opened last Monday by Captain Tobias, who speaks very flatteringly of his pupils. We are pleased to learn that the captain is favorably impressed with his school. He is the right man in the right place. He has fifteen years' experience in the school room."

From these modest beginnings the school system in Spokane has grown into one of the finest in the Northwest. Over 140 elementary and high schools serve metropolitan Spokane.

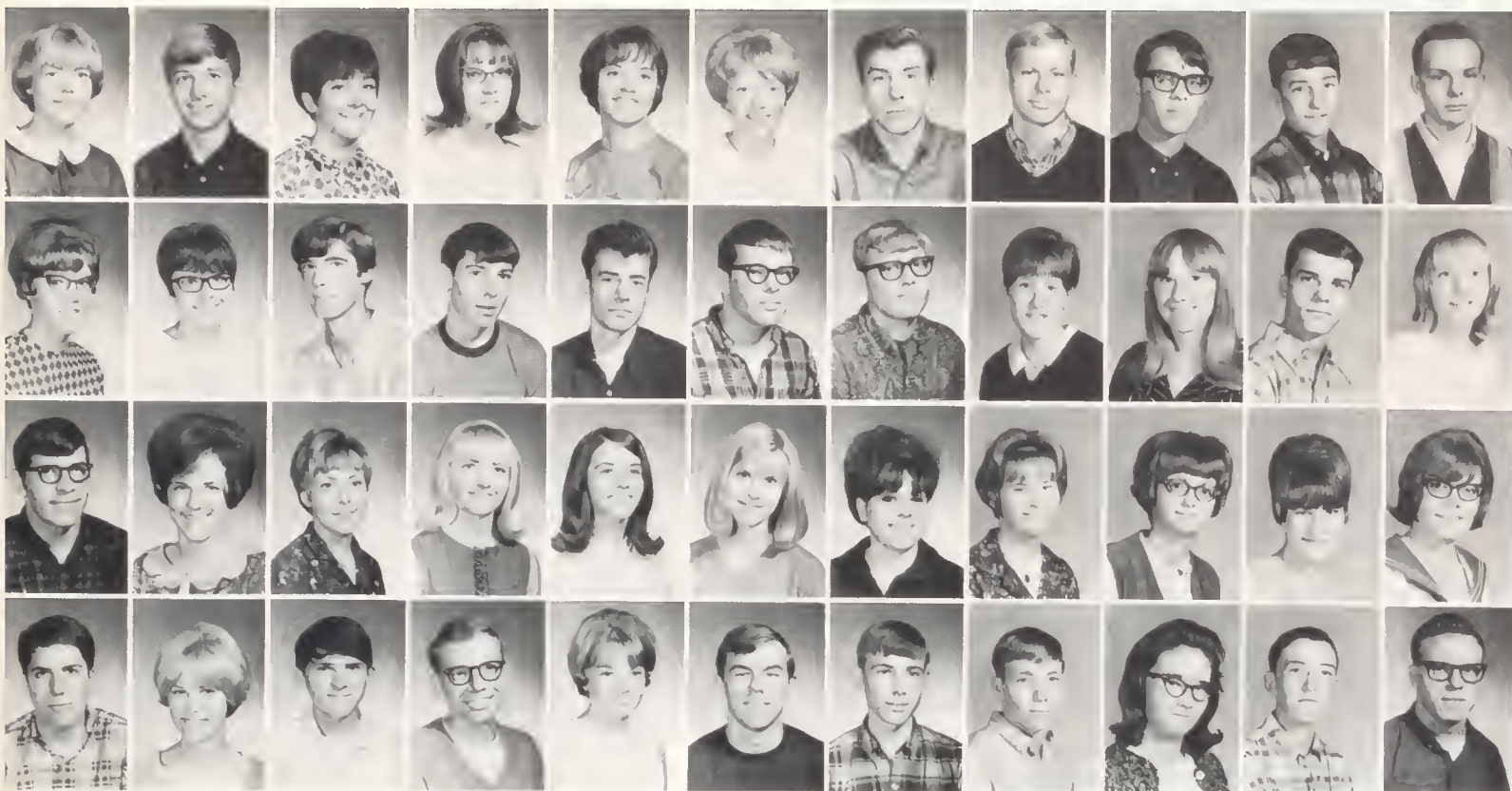

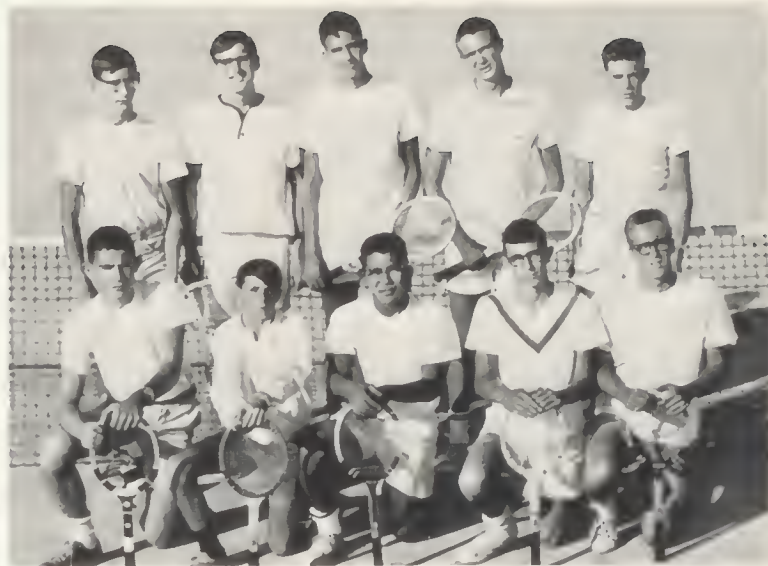

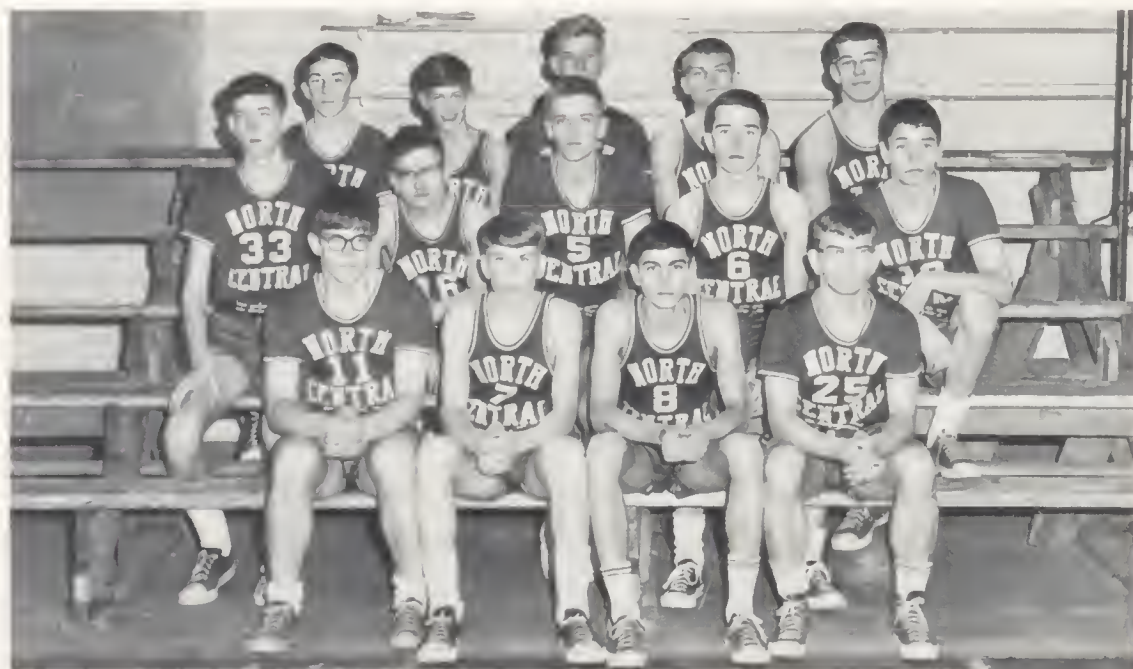

Tri-District meet.

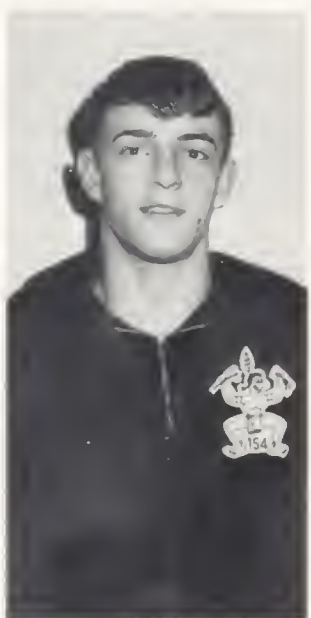

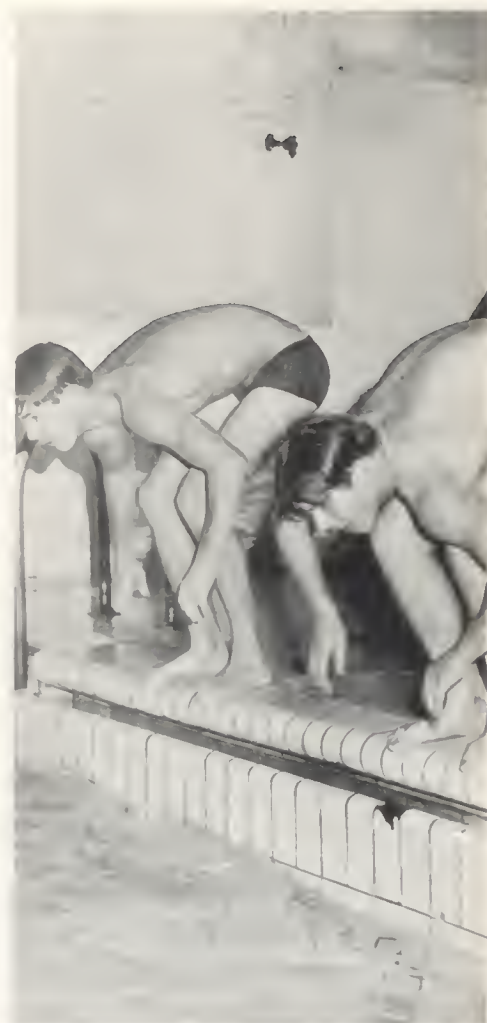

# SPokane FALLS



On a Sunday in August, 1889, fire broke out in a lodging house. The volunteer fire department could not function, for the superintendent of the Holly Water System was at Lake Coeur d'Alene, and the water system's keys with him.

Flames roared through the wooden structures. Burning shingles were wafted on cushions of heat. Flying over the city, they fell on other buildings, starting new fires.

Buildings blocks away were dynamited, and with a change in the wind, the fire was brought under control, but thirty-two blocks in the heart of the business district had been destroyed.

Perhaps the fire was a blessing, for with the aid that poured in, while the ashes were still smoldering, debris was removed and the foundations were laid for what is today the metropolis of the Inland Empire.

This determination of an unconquerable, spirited and active people has been reflected throughout the history of Spokane and shows itself in the young whose many school activities have won not only local but national recognition.

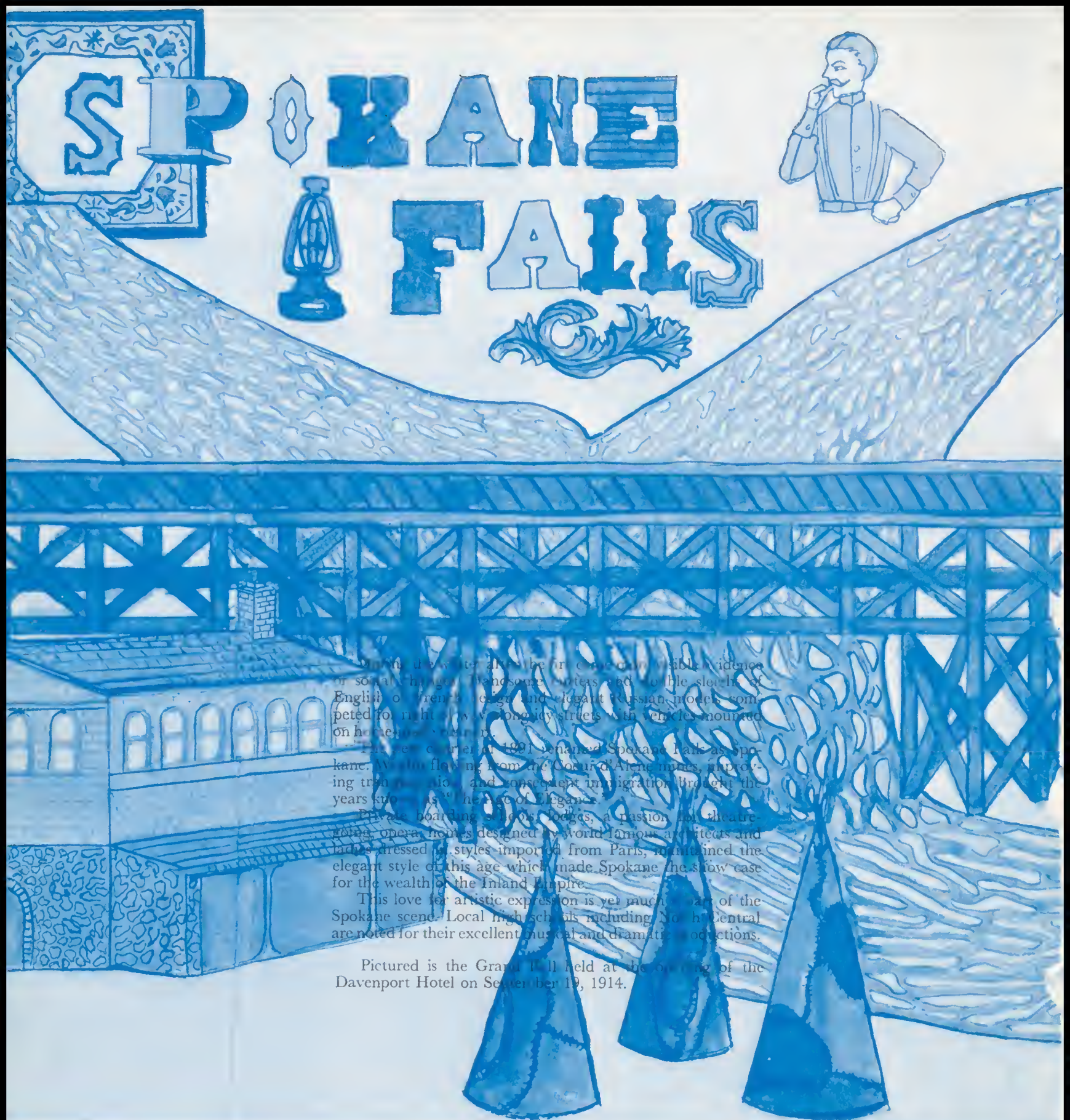

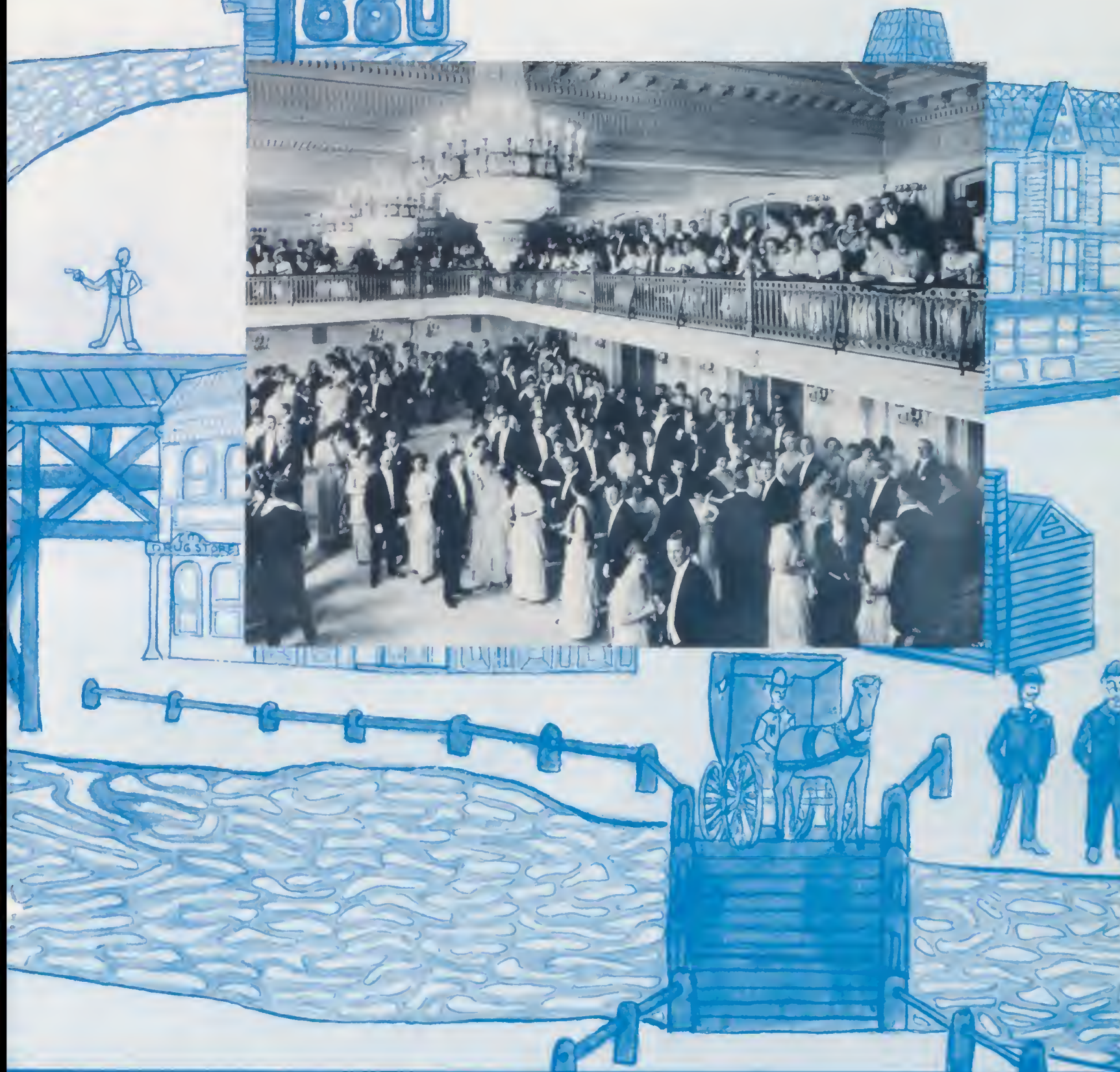
This love for artistic expression is yet much a part of the Spokane scene. Local high schools including North Central are noted for their excellent musical and dramatic productions.

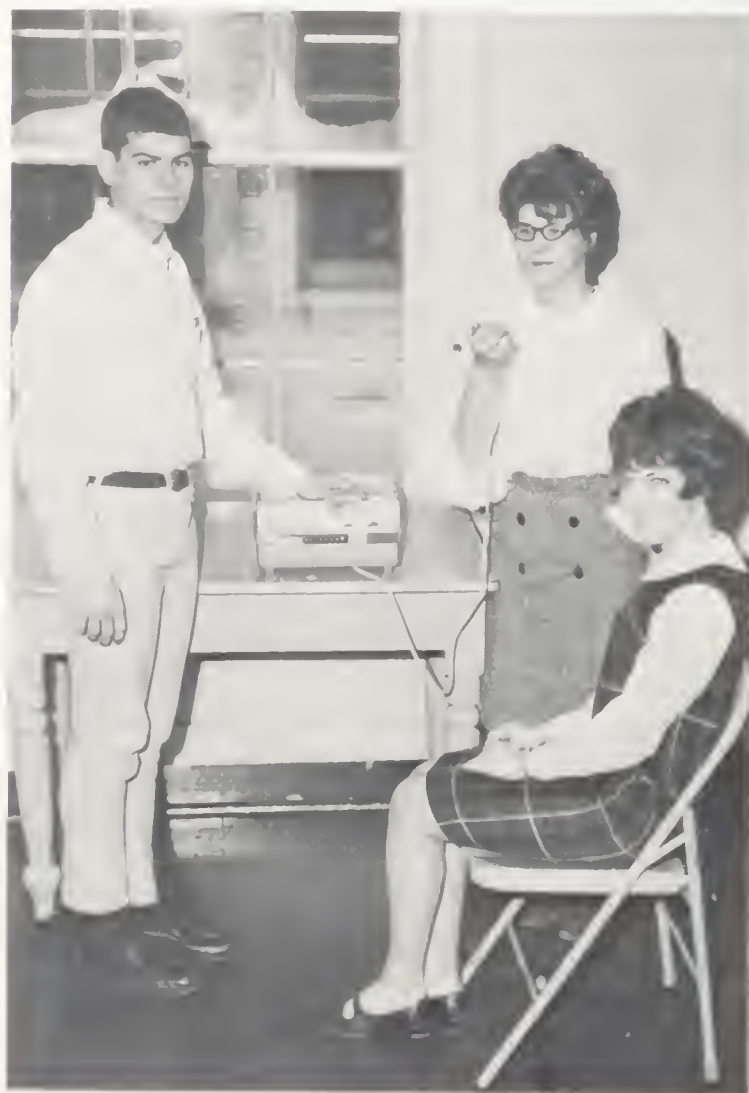

# SPOKANE

Spokane was known as "the mining capital of the United States." Beneath the recklessness typical of this type of wealth, stable business was developing.

Rapid growth of transportation facilities and generous publicity were primarily responsible for this type of business development.

By the end of the century Spokane had two transcontinental railroads, the Great Northern and Northern Pacific. Networks of railroad tracks reached out to the Inland Empire communities.

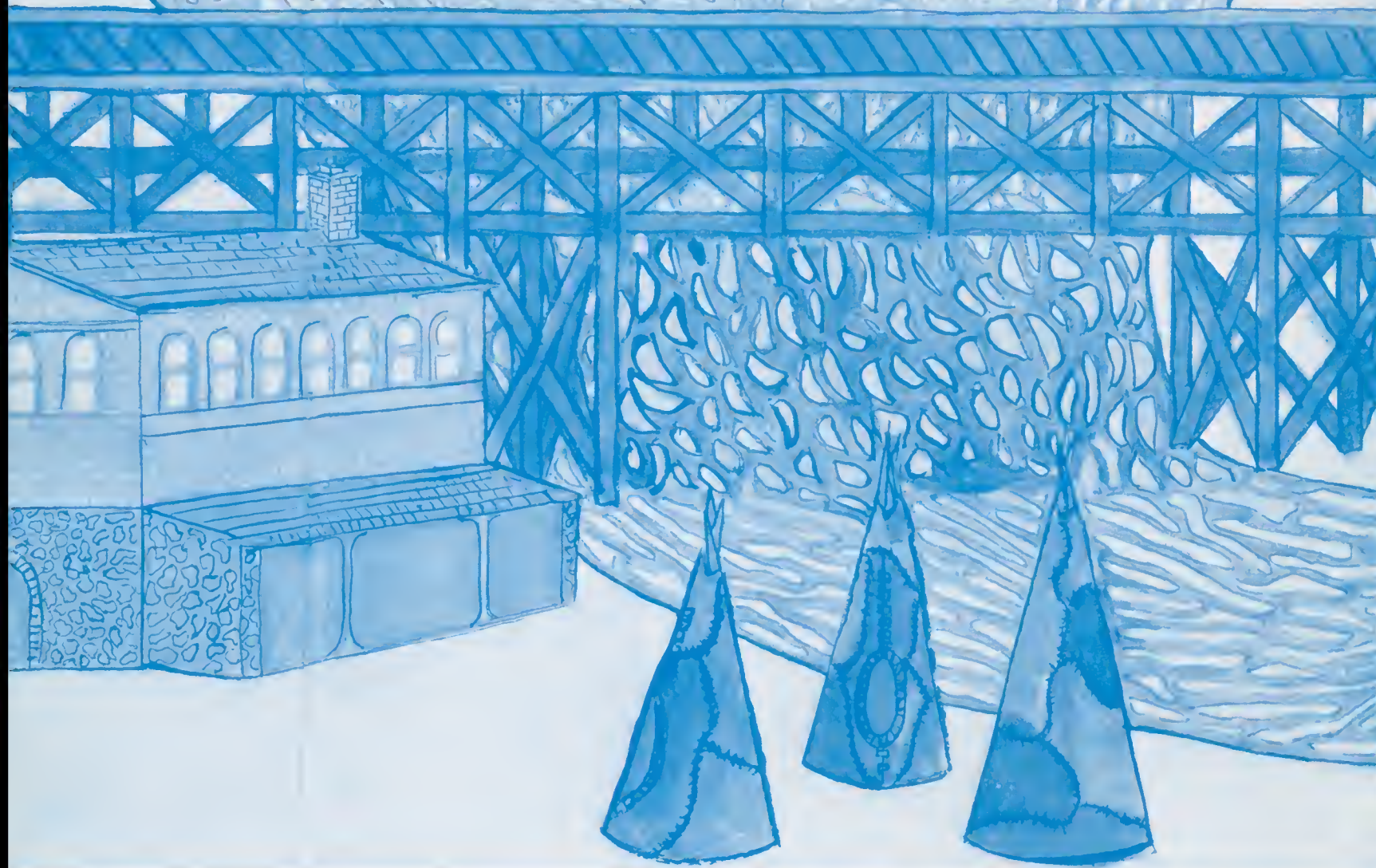
Also the natural water power was harnessed in 1889, first, for illumination, then for sawing wood, a paper press, and finally for The Ross Park Railway, an electric street car line.

Vast forest stands, plentiful water power, rich lands for farming, and numerous mineral resources have made Spokane the industrial, shopping, entertainment and cultural hub of the Inland Empire.

It is now ninety-six years since the first settlers arrived at Spokane Falls. In 1880, there were 350 people living here. Now the population numbers 186,750 in Spokane proper — 292,800 in metropolitan Spokane.

Few indeed, are the cities which have so attractive a setting. Located at the west end of the broad, fertile, irrigated valley of the Spokane River where the river drops in a series of falls and rapids, residential sections climb steep valley slopes to north and south spreading out on the higher levels above. Mingled with factories and industrial plants, residences also spread east in the beautiful suburban countryside.

Paved parkways take one westward through the canyon-like valley, remarkably scenic with high lava

walls, the tortured water at the Bowl and Pitcher rapids, and the perpendicular walls of Deep Creek Canyon.

Spokane offers many opportunities for making a good living with its broad-based economy — agriculture, lumbering, mining, Army and Air Force installations, reserve units of Army, Air Force, Air National Guard, Navy, Marine and Coast Guard, and manufacturing. Combined with this is a rare opportunity for outdoor life — many close lakes, streams, forests, and mountains yield recreation both summer and winter for sportsmen.

Spokane is a young and vital city looking forward from a proud and vigorous past toward a most promising future.
