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## School Has 25th Anniversary

## 1932-1957



GOING UP - at a cost of half a million dollars to accommodate 1200 students . .
"Monday, February 1, 1932, may have been just an ordinary Monday to millions, but to the 1000 eager students of John R. Rogers it was one of the big days of a lifetime.
"Although the mercury had settled to zero, there were no 'ten o'clock scholars' on that first day . . . indeed there was a bery of extra impatient ones.
"In 1907 the Hillyard community celebrated the establishment of the first Hillyard high school. There were 50 students and it was felt that this building was large enough for many years to come. Five years later, there came a pressing need for larger quarters and the first section of the Hillyard high school building was erected. In 1922 the tower annex was built. In 1927 the old Arlington butilding (later destroyed by fire) and five portables were added. Like Topsy, it had 'just growed.'
"Bonds for Rogers were voted in 1930 and 18 months later the building was begun."

## District 81 School Administrators and Directors

Directing the activities of all the Spokane Public Schools is the responsibility of Superintendent John A. Shaw; his administrative staff, and the Board of Directors.

Today's administrators had much in common with those of 25 years ago; for both of these groups were concerned with the school population growth.

Present-day directors, faced with the orercrowded conditions, asked for an $\$ 8,000,000$ bond issue which the voters passed last fall. From this. approximately $\$ 600,000$ will be used to remodel and build additions to Rogers High School.

In 1929 the directors roted to ask for a $\$ 500,000$ bond issue to build a high school in the northeast area; however, it was not until April, 1931, that the building contract was given out.

School officials of 1932 who worked untiringly to establish John R. Rogers were Evan Berg. President: Alex Turnbull, Vice-President; Mrs. Kate F. Simpson, Chairman, Building and Grounds Committee; Dr. T. D. Burger, Roy A. Redfield: Robert A. Wilson, Secretary to the Board; Orville C. Pratt, City School Superintendent, and F. J. Williamson, Superintendent of Buildings and Grounds.

## Work Together to Keep Pace With Population Growth

In the history of John R. Rogers there have been only two principals.

John D. Meyer, principal of Hillyard High for six and one-half years before becoming principal of Rogers in 1932, helped to design and draw plans for the present school.

Upon Mr. Meyer's death in 1948, J. L. Purdy was appointed principal. He had been acting principal since November when Mr. Meyer became ill. Mr. l'urdy assumed his new duties as principal January 14.

Coming to Hillyard in 1926, Mr. Purdy taught English, Mathematics and Drama until his appointment as vice-principal in 1943, when E. R. Jinnett became Assistant Superintendent of Spokane Public Schools.

Mr. Purdy, a graduate of Hastings College in Nebraska, took advanced work at Colorado State Teachers, Washington State and Whitworth Colleges.

Much of Mr: l'urdy's time this year has been spent on working out the plans for the proposed remodeling and additions to Rogers.

## Vice-Principal Has Many and Varied Duties

Nine years ago Paul C. MacGown became viceprincipal of Rogers.

Mr. MacGown is the third man to hold this position since Rogers' begimning in 1932. Preceding Mr. MacGown were Mr. J. L. Purdy and Mr. E. R. Jinnett, who was Rogers' first vice-principal.

A graduate of Whitman college, Mr. MacGown taught at Walla Walla High School before coming to Rogers in 1938 to teach in the English department. Until 1948, he served as Boys' adviser for three years and also did some coaching.

One of Mr. MacGown's cluties is the general school discipline. Scheduling classes and registration of students are also his responsibilities as vice-principal. Mr. MacGown advised student council and several ASB committees until this year.

Secretarial duties for both the principal and viceprincipal are handled by Mrs. Daphne Sprague and Mrs. Alice Barmon, office clerks. Mrs. Sprague, who has been with the school for 11 years, works primarily with attendance.

Working in both the main and the business offices is Mrs. Harriet Foland, who came late last fall.


## Counselors and Staff Play Important Role

Both the counselors and business staff have duties inportant to the daily operation of Rogers. Advising the girls as well as the Girls' League keeps Mrs. LaVelle Black busy. Before becoming League adviser in 1944, Mrs. Black was a physical education instructor.

Heading the guidance department is Mr. E. B. Chrisman, Boys' counselor, who, until this spring, also advised the Boys' Federation. Mr. Chrisman was a physics and chemistry teacher from 19431950 when he was appointed to the advisory post.

Managing the business affairs of Rogers since 1951, Miss Rene McMahan previously operated the bookroom and also taught commercial courses. She is one of nine faculty members who have been at Rogers for 25 years.

Bookroom clerk since 1954, Mrs. Arden Rowe's many jobs include keeping a record of all textbooks and supervising the selling of supplies to students.
Assisting Mr. Chrisman by recording guidance test grades and issuing early dismissal work passes, Mrs. Pearl Gower. '53, often helps in the main office.

## Students Always Have Had Say in Government

From the beginning the students have had a say in the government of their school. At first, the student body was governed by a Student Council, composed of the Cirls' League Council, the Boys' Federation Council, the edtitor of the Rogers Record. the student treasurer, the president and a representative from each class.

In 1936, however. the governing body was changed to homeroom representatives with the presidents of the League and Federation as members of the Council.

The first official act of the 1932 Council was
changing the school mascot from "the cowardly panther to the bold, brave Pirate." The Pirate idea was suggested because of the similarity of the school name. Rogers, to that of a Pirate's flag -"Jolly Roger." And, in 1954, this symbol became a "reality" when "Lil Buc" was created.

This year's council asked the elections committee to revise the party system similar to the national elections. Plans included using the two parties in the primaries to create more interest in elections. So in the spring the introduction convocation was held before the primaries.

## Change in Election Procedure Introduced in 1939

One of the most important changes in the election procedure of student body officers was introduced in 1939.

An amendment to the Constitution provided that the election of officers be held according to the nationals. Until this time, the student council had elected officers from its ranks each term.

Three parties supported candidates for student body office in 1940 under the new election system.

The Pirate, White, and Buccaneer parties were Rogers' first political groups.

Elections of 1945 brought another change. The practice of nominating ASB candidates by petition with 25 signatures was adopted and used until 1954, when the student body reverted to the use of the party system. Also in 1954, each student voter was required to register to vote in the ASB elections.

## Girls' League Has Motto

## Group Was First in City

John Rogers was the first school in the city to organize boys in a group whose job it was to promote friendliness and service to the school.

This organization, known as the Boys' Federation, was a carryover from Hillyard High where the group was begun in 1927. Meetings held on the final Monday of each month were supervised by an Executive Committee. The committees inchuded Athletics, Entertainment, Outdoor Life, Science and Handicraft. These committecs were later revised in 1936 in hopes of promoting more school service.

## Beginnings Also Date to Hillyard

In 1932 the orchestra played for convocations, school plays and the operetta, as well as accompanied the choral groups. Alter 1925, when the orchestra was organized, it had increased so that two classes were necessary to handle the entire group. Class total was 41 , with George Scott directing.

A beginners' orchestra and ensemble were started in 1935. In 1936 Mr. Scott lsft and Clenn [3. Starr directed until 1940 when Harold Anderson took over.

Screral small groups were formed from the orchestra in 1944 to play for programs where a larger group was inconvenient. After being an orchestra member for three scmesters, the student received a felt letter. and after six, a gold pin.

Mr. William Thomas came to Rogers in the fall of 1946 and this year Mr. Robert Foster succeeded him as director of instrumental music.

## Rogers Has Great Athletic Heritage

That little something known as "Rogers Spirit" has been an indispensable part of l'irate teams in the great athletic history of John Rogers. High School.

Sports at Rogers have come a long way since the day when little Hillyard was the whipping boy of the larger city schools. In the past 15 years. Pirate squarls have won more city league major sports championships than any other school.

Football has always been the big sport at Rogers, as it is at most other schools. Buc elevens have won or shared ten city loop crowns and have become legendary in local gridiron annals. Rogers teams have perennially been the league's smallest, with the emphasis on speed rather than size.

The 1934 fontball title was the first major sport championship fer logers. In 1935 the Bucs won the mythical Pacific Northwest crown bey defeating l'ortland's champs. In 1943 they downed Pellingham for the methical state title. The $1942,1949,1950$ and 1954 squads are also rated among the finest ever.

Kogers has won onle three hasketball championships.
but lirate teams have been famous for their hustle and acrap. Most of the loop scoring records are held byPirates Ken Eilmes and 'Terry Campbell.
Rogers can claim eight baseball championships and has donated many stars to the professional ranks. The 1956 state champion nine has been called by many as the greatest. but also ranking high are the 1938 and 1948 teams.
Despite taking only six undisputed titles, Rogers has seldom finished below second in track and is a long standing cincler power. The 19+6 thinclads won the state crown and many former Pirates have made their marks in the state record books: Gene Wirsch, Walt Krogel, Tom Bradley, Dean Mock, Jack Fanning and Denṇ Driskill.
It took 15 years for a tennis championship to come to Roger:- but in the last ten years Bue netters have won seven crowns. Top all-time tennis star was nationally rankerl '1̌erry' Campbell.
There is a great athletic heritage at Rogers. The history is filled with hundreds of thrills and as many stars. loor all-around supremacy in sports, no school can match Rogers record. It is a great tradition to uphold.

Rogers 1956 varsity football tean featured a wide open, pass minded offerse that never failed to provide thrills. The Pirates used a pro style formation with the fullback flanked to the right and both ends split giving quarterback Norm Harding plenty of pass targets.

The season got under way with the annual Merry-Go-Round gane and Rogers became the first possessors of the new Vic Dessert Memorial Trophy by crushing North Central, 12-0 in the first (puarter and coming back in the final stanza to edge Lewis and Clark. 7-6.

Football fortunes turned sour the next week as the Bullpups pounded out a decisive 19-0 victory over the Buc eleven.

The next week against NC the Pirates found themselves and seemed to head for victory until the Indians went ( 60 yards for the winning touchdown in the final minute of play for a $12-7$ win.

Rogers' crew, led by Norm Harding and the open field running of Jim Slawter. gave the Tigers their only licking of the season, 35-13.

After downing an outclassed Central Valley at Grenacres, 28-7, the Pirates started their second round of city play.

Before a crowd of 18,000 at the Shrine game, the Bucs came from behind in the final minute on a 35 -yard pass play from Harding to Art Auderson to down NC 20-13.

From there on out the Pirates were not to win a game as they fell in consecutive weeks to Gonzaga, 20-13 and a powerful Richland sfuad, 26-14.

In the final game of the season with City League champ LC, virtually the whole game was played in Tiger territory but the Pirates couldn't quite reach the LC goal line and bowed to the Tigers, 14-7. So ended the season with a $3-5$ season record and seven players chosen on various all-city squads.

## Basketball Provides Sports High Light of Year

Basketball for 1956.57 provided the sports high light of the year in the Rogers athletic parade. For the second time in the 25 -year history, a basketball five went all the way in city play and made the trip to the state toumament in Seatte.

The Rogers quintet, playing the toughest preseason sehedule in recent years, started out in preleague play looking anything but like future city champions as a powerful Richland squad, led by all-state Norris Brown, overwhelmed the Pirates, 83-49.

The Pirates went on to repeat their wins over Gonzaga and CV and came to the Lewis and Clark gane needing a win to keep alive hopes of state.

Before more than 1400 " 13 ig R " rooters. the Bucs got off to a poor start, trailing by as much as 19 points in the first half. After intermission the scrappy Pirates came back and steadily closed the LC margin until, as the final buzzer sounded, the score was tied, $51-5$. The Bucs couldn't be stopped in overtime and came out on top, $55-52$.

The rest of the season proved anticlimax to the LC tilt as the Pirates swept NC and WV and prepared for the State Tournament. The squad went into the tournanent with an unimpressive 12-8 record.
