



But even now, after so many years of development their dream has yet to be fully realized. They set their goals so high that we still strive for them.



Len Renner, who ran last year as a senior, returned this year to assist the coach. A cadet teacher, Mr. Greg Wallace also assisted coach Schuerman. Coach Schuerman said, "The team was young and inexperienced, but a fine job was done." In the one big invitational meet at Richland, Rogers placed sixth out of 23 schools. The Bucs also placed seventh in the district and fourth in the city. Only one boy, Steve Williams, attended the state meet representating Rogers. Steve will return to lead the team next year.














