## season's

Surprises galore - that pretty much summed up Shadle's first year of varsity compctition in Spokane's City league.

As usual, intracity competition opencd with the annual Merry-Go-Round game in Mcmorial stadium - and the Highlanders leamed right away that winning in the City loop isn't easy. Shadle finished last in the M-G-R. but bounced back in regular season play to post a 3-3 record, good enough for a fourth-place finish in the seven-team league.

In its first regular game, Shadle mystified the experts by rumning up an 18-0 halftime lead on defending champion Lewis and Clark and then holding off the resurging Tigers for an 18-12 victory. Junior quarterback Tom Conlon was the star for Shadle as he passed for two touchdowns and ripped off three long gains on "bootleg" plays.

Again Shadle struck hard in the first half as the Highlanders stopped West Valley, 20-13 in their next outing. But John Rogers' Pirates snapped Shadle's win streak at two straight the next week by shutting out the Highlanders, $21-0$, on a bitterly cold, windy night in the stadium.

Coach Jack Peterson's crew had bcen blanked in two junior varsity games with Central Valley,

but Shadle rolled up a 26-12 triumph over the Bears on the valley field.
Then hopes for the title went a-glimmering as Gonzaga Prep grabbed a narrow, 21-19 victory over Shadle. And in their league finale, the Hightanders lost another 21-0 decision - this time to North Central, as the Indians finished their loop season undefcated and untied.

The last time Shadle's 21 seniors donned Highlander cleats was at Pullman where - in 13-degree weather with a steady wind blowing - the Clan pulled out a $27-20$ victory and ruined the Greyhound's perfect season. Fulliback Lynn Lupfer intercepted a Pullman lateral late in the game and raced 66 yards for the winning touchdown.

Lupfer, a 195 -pound senior transfer from Lubbock, Texas, later was named to the SpokesmanReview's All-City first team, and also the Spokane Daily Chronicle's All-City second team. Other All-City second team berths went to senior tackle Clark Claymon, junior end Barry Livengood, who tied the lcague record for touchdown passes caught, and junior guard Jim Paton.

Looking back on the last three basketball years, Shadles graduating seniors who played for Coach Paul Henley as the first Highlanders will remember one thing in years to come - "We went to State!"

Seniors Jerry Russell, Steve Bell, Dave Knostman, Jim Brinkmam, Demn Turnbull, Bill IIoblin and Rich Wharf will remember playing together on a baskethall court for the first time as sophomores, being members of Shadle's first entry in the fast and furious City league as juniors, and of joumeying to Seattle and the Hee Edmundson Pavilion for the State AA tournament as semiors.

The varsity's junior members, Barry Livengood, John McFarland. Ron Bogue, Vie Johmson and Tom Conlon, and sophomores Bob Stephan and Howard Yarbrough, have next year, and the season after that, to try to follow in the footsteps of the first senior hoopsters.

No one can forget those tense and heart-stopping games leading up the road to State. No one will forget that one-point win over Conzaga Prep. The game was wedged between sessions of the State B tournament in the Coliseum. And, like the regular City loop games, Shadle's student body was wellrepresented by the Girls' Pep club and Hi-Lassies.

All the pressure of sudden comebacks by Shadle and Gonzaga to carn playoff spots was imminent. This was THE game. This was do or die for both squads. The final score was 49-48, for Shadle, with the Clan thus earning the right to another playoff game with the Walla Walla Blue Devils.

A large group of frenzied Highlanders accompanied their team to Walla Walla where the Scots clobbered the highly ranked and favored Blue Devils, 59-49. Everyone was stumned - and, naturally, Coach Henley was very happy. It was like a dreain, a threc-year myth, that had finally become real. Shadle was going to State.

Shadle went to State - accompanied by about 750 loyal rooters - and established firmly the name of the three-year-old school. In the first game, the IIighlanders faced the Renton Inclians, destined to become the 1960 State champions. Renton beat Shadle Park 61-37. Shadle was in the lead at half-

time, $21-20$, but finally fell before the fine rebounding of 6 -foot- 8 Clint Peebles and the 28 -point shooting of Lowell Scott, the tournament's most valuable player.

Shadle met the Wapato Wolves the next morning in a losers' bracket game, and Shadle pulled through with a $62-5 t$ win, despite a rally in the final minutes by Wapato.

On the third day, Shadle met Wilson of Tacoma. Both teams were about evenly matched, with Shadle holding a $33-31$ lead with seconds to go in the game. It looked as if they would take back to Spokane either a fifth or eighth place trophy, but - What was intended to be a good pass turned out to be disaster for the IIighlanders. The ball hit the backing of the Ram net, bounced into the waiting arms of a Wilson player and was durked for the tying points. The gane then went into overtime, with Shadle losing 53-51.

What about the regular season? Shadle started out with two quick losses to Central Valley, Spokane's other representative to State, and Gonzaga. But the road to recovery and pre-season bets seemed won as the Highlanders came back with an eleven-game winning streak, including victories over North Central, West Valley, Lewis and Clark and John Rogers in league play.

Then the cycle took its turn for the worse again, and it seemed as though Shadle would have to wait till 1961 for a State tourney berth.

But again the SP squad got rolling and grabbed the necessary wins to make the playoffs.
The rest is known. But one important point has not been touched upon. In 1959, Shadle's first try in the City league, Steve Bell proved the star all season as he landed spots on the city's all-city first teams. This year the spotlight changed and focused on guard Jerry Russell, who was the consistent sparkplug of the Shadle offense. He, too, made the newspapers' first strings.

Who will it be next year? That's one of the big questions to be answered as soon as Coach Paul Henley again issues the call for Shadle basketball players and the new season gets under way.
