## Music Leader Earns Sporran Dedication

From vigorously cheering at gametime to seriously revising a musical score, Mr. John R. Harris, music department head, has actively enlivened and promoted Shadle's Highlander tradition for the past ten years. He directs the orchestra, the concert, cadet, and stage bands, assists the Highlandaires, supervises the Piper Band and also serves as stage manager.

Mr. Harris' music career began at college, where he was the leader of a band. He received his master's degree from Eastern Washington State College, and he taught music at Havermale before joining Shadle's faculty.

In 1958, Mr. Harris and Mr. William Thomas, a member of
the Lilac City Pipe Band, originated Shadle's Bagpipe Band. With Mr. Harris organizing and Mr. Thomas teaching bagpipe lessons, the Scottish theme of the school developed.

Through local performances and personal services, Mr. Harris helped the community become more aware of Shadle Park. He performs for the annual Shrine Circus and Ice Capade Shows, and plays first trumpet in the Spokane Symphony Orchestra, a position he has held for 20 years.

For his outstanding contributions and services to Shadle and the community, the staff proudly dedicates the 1967 Sporran to Mr. John R. Harris, an enthusiastic member of the faculty.

"Students can better understand the aftermath of war by experiencing the post war years of World War II," expressed Mr. Chattin. The class was designed to help the students see what might occur if there was to be another World War.

Continued use of films, with special emphasis on the new releases which added up-to-date interpretation and facts, marked the year for the 2300 "enrollees" in the social studies classes. (Department Head Mr. Howard McNew said that at least 430 students took two classes, thus raising the total department enrollment.)

Social studies film bookings through the audio visual center totaled 442 or 48 per cent of the school's total use of films, indicating the department's reliance on this media.


## History Department Modernizes

Exciting, different, and a little hard, expressed the opinion of many students from the new World I and II and Humanities course that entered the history department this year. Lectures and individual research work replaced the conventional text books. Students also received a college credit for the Humanities course.

Government, Economics, and Contemporary World Problems classes modernized their techniques by analyzing recent laws passed, the story of corporation, and foreign aid. Guest speakers helped to stimulate student interest in economic classes. Mr. George Manning, who taught Government and United States History this year stated, "Even the students who don't, or haven't liked history have
taken a more active interest this year than formerly." Going on, he said, "Students today seem better informed on world and political affairs; this is largely due to television."
Art, literature, and music helped the U.S. History students understand the philosophical approach to history, as they worked on a research paper this year.
Finding new answers to old problems and working independently, the sophomores studied the basic facts of World History.
Northwest History replaced Washington State History for those who didn't receive Washington State History as freshmen. Students are required to take this course to graduate.

The Humanities class was divided into four groups. While two of these small seminars were in session, two other groups of approximately the same size studied individually in the library. These groups were a part of the plan for college level study and comments made by the students showed their effectiveness. One girl remarked on how each day was scheduled to prepare her for the days to follow and how this helped to increase her understanding of every topic.

## New Course Offers College Credits

Humanities, a new course offered to seniors this year, gave the students an opportunity to study on a college level. They were able to delve into fine arts, philosophy, and heritage of English and history.

Students spent two periods a day in this class combining independent study, seminars, lectures, and writing. According to Mr. Frank Yuse, the seminars helped the student ask his own questions while challenging his opinions and positions.

Mr. Frank Windishar, a new history teacher, shared classtime with Mr. Frank Yuse, who was also the instigator of the
experimental, college-credit course.

Since this was a college credited course, the class was required to do outside reading during the summer. They were expected to read the books well enough to pass any test or write any paper required.

Two new faculty members were added to the English department this year. Mrs. Louise Forsyth headed a drama group. Mrs. Lynn Burnham directed a debate class from which the debate team for next year was chosen. This made a total of 16 teachers in the English department.

## Integrated Science Class Introduces Team-Teaching

Experimental team-teaching, introduced this year in the Integrated Science classes, enabled students to examine science from three viewpoints. Each teacher, working with the class for a six-week period, interpreted the course from their special discipline. In this manner students gained a better understanding of general scientific principles.

Paleobiology, a spring semester elective course, dealt with geology and prehistoric life of the Pacific Northwest. Field trips and lab work added variety to this course, the only one of its kind in Spokane.

Traditional lab courses in Bi ology, Chemistry and Physics completed the curriculum for college-bound students.

Extending language lab facilities and adding classroom workbooks and texts contributed to foreign language classes this year.

Latin students used the language lab for the first time this year. Instructors taught basic drills over the microphone since no Latin tapes were available.

Workbooks for classroom study and a new German text, The German Heritage, aided teachers and students by introducing a more modern interpretation of the language.

Scenic photos helped give experience in speaking and forming sentences. After seeing a photo, the class would discuss it and answer queries.

## Business Education Classes <br> Stress New Business Skills

Office Practice and Automation classes, offered for the first time, stressed development of business skills for full-time employment and personal use. Bookkeeping, typing, stenography and office machines prepared 1066 Business Education students for future careers.
Office Practice emphasized
working in a business atmosphere, while Automation familiarized the student with business machines.

Typing and shorthand prepared students for their futures as secretaries, businessmen, or housewives. Balancing bookkeeping assignments provided practical experience
for budgeters. Business majors learned to operate electric typewriters, key-driven calculators, full-keyboard machines and duplicating and transcribing machines.

All Business courses strove to acquaint the students with the ever-changing techniques of the business world.




## Experiment, Guest Musician Climax Musical Activities

Playing "guinea pig" for a national experiment in music theory and history plus culminating weeks of rehearsal and hard work under the baton of Nelson Riddle in the tenth annual Pops Concert climaxed the music department's year.

Choir members became the experimental group studying a prescribed music course. The band was the "control" group. They were tested with the choir at the beginning and end of the year. Test results showed how much choir members had learned because of the course.

Almost every year a Shadle student has received an art college scholarship. Senior Studio is headed by Mrs. Faith Snider, who also teaches creative drawing and painting.

## Courses Exchange

Boys invaded Home Economics classes as girls picked up the tools in electronics labs this year, beginning an experimental program in which students enrolled in traditionally unmixed classes.

The boys, besides learning to cook, operate a range and wash dishes, learned to plan a meal with nutritional value. The 27 "would-be chefs," distributed in three classes, occasionally requested aid from the girls. Ron Huston, one of the boys in Mrs. Harriet Kresel's class, said, "It's really a lot of fun and a good experience." Mrs. Kresel explained many of the boys want to be chefs, while a few just want to be able to cook for themselves.

In other Home Economic areas, projects for the girls in Tailoring class included making jackets, suits, and coats, either of winter or spring materials. "The girls make up a pattern of quilt material before beginning a suit of expensive wool," said Mrs. Margaret Kroske, instructor.

Advanced Clothing and Clothing 1 and 2 classes assembled jumpers and jackets in current fashion fabrics. In the spring the girls made short and long formals.

Completing the exchange, girls assembled tape recorders, receivers, amplifiers and magnetically operated devices to meet Electronics class challenges.

## Inovations Provide Unique Program

Mash fins and snorkles contributed to Shadle's physical fitness program this year. Discussion groups and training for lifetime sports emphasized mental alertness.

Basic water skills and life saving techniques helped develop a feeling of confidence, while new equipment aided basic skin-diving lessons. Swimmers played hilldill and waterball for recreation.

Scuba diving and skiing experts familiarized boys with the basic skills of these sports. Ice skating, bowling
and golf classes introduced other lifetime sports.

Weekly discussions gave girls a chance to debate points of etiquette, fashion and dating. Mrs. Charlotte Jones, head of Girls' PE, felt these sessions were informative and helpful for self-expression.

Provided with all the apparatus recommended for girls, gymnastics teachers stressed balance and agility while achieving confidence in working at different heights. Boys worked to develop strength in their arms and shoulders.

"I've learned to see things with humor since l've been here," said Lutgart Matthys, Shadle's American Field Service exchange student from Belgium. At first she found the United States and its customs unusual but she rapidly learned to adapt to them. "I thought I'd see cowboys and Indians," Lu disappointedly explained. Having heard so much about the West she naturally assumed she would find a "frontier."

Lu felt that the two countries' school systems were the major differences. Because of a national custom no high schools are co-educational in Belgium. Students study sixteen subjects during the year. Because of the strict schedule, many Belgians do not
graduate and those that do are automatically accepted into college.

Although Lu misses her parents and nine brothers and sisters, she plans to come back to the U.S. However, her contract with the A.F.S. requires that she spend at least two years in Europe before she returns to this country.
A.F.S. is a two-way street for international understanding, and Shadle students attempted to make the street useful. Cheryl Bently, junior, and Greg Sanford, senior, applied for European study in the fall and were named area finalists in mid-December. Notified in the spring if they were national finalists, they would be assigned a foreign "home" during the summer.

## Sporran Staff Increases Book Size,

Stimulated by first place ratings from the Columbia Scholastic Press Association and the National Scholastic Press Association, the Sporran staff adopted a new four-column format and enlarged the page size to provide a more unified and interesting yearbook.

Attending a summer clinic at the University of Washington, the editor and assistant editor learned the fundamentals of planning a yearbook theme and layout using the new format. In the fall, Whitworth College held a one-day clinic that nine staff members attended, which furthered their understanding of yearbook ideas.

Accompanying students on the fall trips was advisorteacher Mr. Ted Clark. He encouraged the staff to maintain a professional and academic approach to the pro-
duction of a yearbook. In the classroom, he stressed the use of creativity and exactness of layouts.

Financing the yearbook was completed in September by students who sold orders for the book and by staff members who solicited advertising. A mass balance format was used for the first time in the ad section of the book. Onethird of staff members sold ads and raised approximately $\$ 1700$ to balance the book's budget.
"Do you want to buy a Sporran?" became a common phrase as 30 school salesmen succeeded in selling 1760 yearbooks to students and faculty. The top 15 salesmen were honored at a dinner given by the Pischel publishers and the top 10 received free yearbooks.

## Stage Crew Supervises Cons, Builds Sets, Changes Lights

"Testing, 1 ... $2 \ldots 3$...." often echoes through the barren auditorium as the stage crew prepares for an upcoming convocation, play or rehearsal. Working the largest stage in Spokane, the stage crew operates lights and props for performances given by various schools, churches and organizations.

Changing stage lights, checking the spotlights and lecos, moving props, the podium and chairs are all required for a pep con. Checking with Mr. John Harris, the crew makes last minute preparations and changes. During the pep con, jobs include operating stage lights and controlling microphone volumes. After the con,
the stage crew spends half an hour putting away chairs, microphones and props used in the cons.

Crew members must take one semester of electronics, then spend many hours during and after school to operate the stage equipment.


Meeting with Stage Advisur Mr. John Harris, Stage Manager Ken Sammons checks the schedule and makes preparations for adjusting the switches on the Davis Dimmer Board. Making sure that they are labeled correctly, Ken glances through the color patterns needed for the Senior Con. The Davis Dimmer Board is the central operating unit on the stage. The board controls the stage lights and the two lecos, changing of color patterns and turning lights off or on according to the schedule.

Making final preparations for an upcoming con, stage crew members Jim Shelden, Bruce Bjork and Gary Bunney put up and adjust stage lights and props. The constant changing of light bulbs and the arranging of lights is needed to keep the eighty-nine stage lights in good working order.

## Four Picked for All-City Honors

Combining skill and determination to turn in outstanding performances during the football season, four Shadle gridders were named to all-city teams. Selected were end Steve Moyle, first teams Review and Chronicle; quarterback Ed Fisher, first team Chronicle; halfback Steve Ogilvie and linebacker Steve Barker, both second team Chronicle.
Moyle, rarely out of the game, rolled up 257 yards and 5 touchdowns on 15 receptions. Defensively he was among the leaders in team tackling. Coach Gary Davis termed Moyle, along with Fisher, "our most consistent player."
Fisher played well on offense and defense as well as handling the punting and conversion duties during the year. Passing for 791 yards and 8 touchdowns, he placed second in the city in that department while claiming the number three spot in total offense. For the second straight year he led
the city in passing percentage by completing 55 of 110 tosses. Ed established a league record by throwing 17 career touchdown passes and tied another league mark by connecting for four touchdowns in a single game.
Fisher set a school record by scoring 88 career points, intercepted three passes during the season, and led the league in punting, averaging 35.7 yards, including a record 61yard boot.

"The summer is the busiest time of the year for us," states Mr. Hugh Leppell, head custodian. "We clean the building, water the grounds and clean the pools before school opens in the fall."
The grounds are watered and kept green; the walls, floors, and ceilings are all washed and necessary painting is done. All electric light fixtures are removed from the ceilings and cleaned. The furniture is repaired, cleaned, and placed in the rooms by the custodians. "It's quite a job," said Mr. Harmon Ranney, engineer custodian.

The floors are stripped of all wax, washed and re-waxed. The job takes 55 gallons of liquid soap and 140 gallons of wax.
