An integrated English 5 and U.S. History class highlighted the English curriculum this year. Mrs. Dennie Moore and Mr. Don Miller taught this class, which was offered to juniors. The class stressed the similarities between English and history.

Shadle's Humanities course, introduced last year, remained popular with the seniors again this year. "Lectures and semi nars stress philosophy, culture, fine arts, and other divisions of the humanities," said Mr. Frank Yuse, who taught the class with Mr. Frank Windishar.

Sophomores studied mythology for the first time in English class. The English 3 classes also received lectures on how to get the most out of reading a newspaper. All three English levels gained the added benefit of film lectures on the classics.

## Russian Culture Adds

Introducing Russian this year climaxed changes to the foreign language curriculum.

Taught by Mr. IImar Kuljus, the class had twenty-six students learning first year Russian. Books, tapes, and oral discussions dominated classroom instruction.

Mr. Carlos Flores, a native of Mexico and Shadle's new Spanish teacher, gave his students first hand knowledge of the Spanish language and culture of the land.

Using new techniques, many foreign language students advanced in their studies this year. French and Latin classes
became acquainted with new texts, while Spanish students took a more oral approach by using the language laboratory and tapes.

Extension of the lab last year gave all classes a better chance to use its facilities. More tapes were used by all classes, and Latin students used tapes for the first time.

Possibilities for new experiences within the language courses include a one-act play in French by fourth year French students. If enrollment is sufficient, a fourth year Spanish class will be added to the language program for next year's curriculum.

## Unusual Science Classes Stress Student Interest, Course Content

Offering Paleobiology and Integrated Science for a second year, Shadle science instructors attempted to satisfy student interest with unique course content.

Paleobiology, a senior class, emphasizes historical geology of the Northwest. Students could choose any of seven field trips in Washington and Montana.

In the classroom, Mr. Joseph Heslin lectured on rocks, minerals and natural forces, using films and slides for illustration.

Mrs. Margaret Ostness' ecology section of Integrated Science studies show bugs under various environments to test their development, adaptation, and preferences in relation to plants.

Also in Integrated Science, students in Mr. Paul Jensen's chemistry section determined the amount of oxygen and water consumed by goldfish.

In the third Integrated Science section, Mr. E. B. Chrisman guides a physical study of sound-how it originates, is manipulated, and controlled.

Seven classes of General Chemistry, offered only at Shadle, resemble a college preparatory course, although they are not as rigorous as CHEM Study or the Honors section of Chemistry.

Observing live organisms and their life function, general biology classes studied plant life, insecticides, weed killers, and landscaping.

New teaching devices enabled Shadle students to gain a better understanding of modern math.

Teachers found that the wide differences in student abilities created problems. Applying the objective technique, faster students could help the slower pupils. Students could then progress at their own pace.

Overhead projectors served as ideal teaching aids. "Students can become more involved working with the overhead projectors because it's more like working out the problem themselves," remarked Mr. Robinette.

## DE Aids Vocational Business Education

"Those who plan on entering the business world after graduation find business education and vocational courses at Shadle Park especially useful," stated Mr. Ed Feldhusen, Business Education Department head.

Advanced typing and shorthand were taught in the secretarial science course, a two hour block, which also gave students experience by performing the actual secretarial duties in class.

Distributive Education, a class for seniors only, offered parttime work for students. Inclass instruction on marketing, sales promotion, and social and economic responsibilities benefited them on the job.

By working in the public and business offices, students acquired clerical skills and practical experience.

## Boys Invade Home Ec; Girls Return to Shop

Invading the Home Economic classes for a second year, boys learned how to buy, plan and prepare meals. Students in the foods department heard speakers from the $U$ and I Sugar Company and the State Wheat Commission.

Girls made jackets, skirts and a suit or coat in tailoring classes. To see if they liked their suits or not, the girls made them out of a less expensive material before finishing them in wool.

Home Furnishings became popular with students as the enrollment increased this year. They learned how to re-
finish wood furniture and reupholster other furniture. Field trips to outstanding homes and to a home furnishings display at Fort Wright College added interest.

Future interests in interior decorating encouraged girls to take drafting, while boys took it for architecture work. Boys learned how to construct furniture in wood shop. They also studied how trees grow and are cut for construction.

The sole girl in electronics studied the principles of electricity with her fellow students. The course prepares them for electronic careers.

## Expansion Typifies District 81; Enrollment, Curriculum Grows

Expansion characterized the work of School District No. 81 this year, as enrollments in Spokane schools reached an all time high of 35,400 , observed Dr. Albert Ayars, Superintendent.

To accommodate the obvious increase, the district purchased land and began plans for a new junior high in northeast Spokane, with construction scheduled to begin this summer. The Building Advisory committee considered various ideas for a north side high school.

Curriculum, too, expanded to
meet the students' needs, with foreign languages receiving emphasis. The addition of Russian and Japanese increased the total of foreign languages taught to six. Eventually the schools hope to offer six consecutive years of foreign language, explained Dr. Ayars.

Stressing occupational skills, the district began work experience programs. Home economics students in the program spent an hour working in nursing homes, hospitals, and other community agencies, for every hour spent in the classroom. Similiar pro-
grams included experience in industry and business. Distributive Education classes noted rapidly increasing memberships. Driver's Education classes also grew tremendously.

Shadle's benefits from the district included the new paint job on the back of the building, the construction of the student parking lot, the first Russian class, and the increased use of team teaching. The district also remodeled the library-teachers' lounge area of the building and enlarged the business machines room.

## Cooks Confront Famished Mass; Custodians Maintain 68 Rooms

Serving approximately 4,500 lunches each week, Shadle's cooks faced hungry students who consumed over 300 lbs. of ground beef, between 40 and 50 lbs . of hot dogs, 75 lbs . of butter, and 7,300 bottles of milk a week. Additionally, the cooks prepared and served 2,300 snacks each week.

The purchase of a new hot box to keep food warm until served helped the cooks meet these constant demands.

Maintaining and cleaning Shadle's 68 classrooms kept the 13 custodians busy. "The students have a tremendous amount of building pride. We couldn't possibly keep up if they didn't," stated Mr. Hugh Leppell, head custodian.

Waxing the floors, the custodians' biggest job, took 6,048 man hours. The custodians also wash Shadle's 38,000 square feet of glass during the summer months.
