## Sporran Honors Retiring Mr. Taylor With Dedication

September, 1957-A new high school joined the Spokane ranks: The Highlanders of Shadle Park had been born.

At the beginning, Principal William Taylor and a staff of 61 teachers and 5 secretaries greeted 1515 new students and began to build Spokane's most dynamic student body.

In thirteen years 6,025 students have graduated from Shadle Park; over 20,800 students have passed through the "Highland Halls;" 41 of the original staff have gone, but Mr. Taylor has guided the growth of Shadle Park for all 13 years.

## New Ideas Change English Department's

'More freedom for individual teachers characterized the English Curriculum for 1970," explained Mr. Frank Yuse, English Department Mead.

This year's English Department tried new methods of teaching. Guidelines have been set up to give the teachers a bit more freedom in the material they teach.

Many different choices of English were available to the student. Sophomores and Juniors were able to take Humanities for the first time this past year.

English classes took advantage of the visual aids available to them by making films of their interpretations of literature by using the video tape and 16 mm camera.

Mr. Carl Crowe, new to Shadle's faculty this past year, taught the beginning and advanced drama students
in the finer points of acting. The advanced students put on a play for the student body entitled "The Different Drummer."

Students with an interest in some special aspect of English had a number of classes to choose from for electives. These included Vocabulary, Shakespeare and Speech classes.

English classes in the past have focused mainly on the set standards of what must be taught. But they have moved away from that and English taught this past year has been related to other subjects taught and more of the teacher's own approach to English, explained Mr. Yuse.

A new debate class was added to the English department this past year. Most of the students enrolled in this class were also on the varsity debate team.

A new class, sophomore humanities, appeared in the social studies curriculum this year. Though humanities has been offered to, and widely accepted by, seniors for four years, this is the first year it has been available at any other grade level at Shadle Park.

Taught cooperatively by Mrs. Georgiana Sutherlin and Mrs. Betty Partridge, sophomore
humanities employs three main teaching methods in presenting concepts of world history and literature. Lectures to the entire class of 60; 15-student seminars; and "lab" (experiments in writing and large group discussions) were all used in the new 10th grade study.

Basic courses in the social studies area were offered as usual.

## Science Department Suffer with Crowded Conditions

Crowded conditions hampered the Science Department during the 69-70 school year. Science classes averaged about thirty-seven students per room and the Science Department had to use a Home Economics room for one of its Biology classes.

One year of science was required of high school students. Most students earned their science credit in Biology. Approximately $95 \%$ of all sophomores took Biology.

All students did not stop after one year of science, however. About 30\% of the juniors took Chemistry. Some $10-15 \%$ of the students who had taken Chemistry went on to Physics in their senior year.

About one hundred students took three years of science. About $90 \%$ of these one

hundred students will seek careers in science, estimated Mr. Tex Clark, in an evaluation of the Science Department.

Mr. Clark, physics and integrated science teacher, talked of a more balanced science curriculum. "One semester of biology, one semester of chemistry, and one semester of physics," stated Mr. Clark, "would give students a more balanced outlook on science than the present two semesters required in one science."

Chemistry classes received new textbooks last year. Shadle was the only school using these books, fulfilling the one year trial period required of all new texts, said Mr. Clark. These books opened the door for new experiments and teaching techniques.
class. Lab assistants duties included helping set up experiments, and putting away chemicals, plus doing any other odd jobs teachers may have for them.


## Department Adds Italian Language to '70 Curriculum

Italian has been added to Shadle's language curriculum this year. The subject is being taught by Miss Elena Galliena, a Fulbright Exchange teacher from Milan, Italy.

Also offered for the first time this year is third level Russian, being taught by Mr. IImar Kuljus. Russian is the only Asiatic language offered at Shadle.
"Classes this year are what they have always been teaching the skills of using a foreign tongue and trying to understand their culture and think in their terms," stated Mr. Frank Yuse, head of English and Foreign Lan. guage Department.

According to Mr. Yuse the enrollment is about the same
as last year even though a new class has been added. One more classroom has been added for the Italian class.

This year no special devices were used. The teachers still use a cross between traditional and the new audiolingual method. The new concept allows the student to hear a recording of the language and then repeat it to help him understand the pronunciation.

A foreign language gives the student a skill for the future and may help him in attending college.

New electronic facilities and a new publication advisor marked a revised mass communications emphasis at Shadle in '70.

A twelve-man student crew operated the three-channel closed circuit TV system, in which live and taped programs are circulated to the classrooms. This enabled the teachers to maintain a classroom atmosphere and avoid traveling to different locations. Three students worked evenings at KSPS-TV for additional experience.

The system was completed for the second semester. Mr. Ted Clark, Closed Circuit TV Coordinator, feels that the program is very promising;
providing new benefits for the teacher and the student body.

With the arrival of Mr. Kent Jones as journalism instructor and newspaper advisor, a proposed program would require only a semester of journalism before working on the HI-LITES or the SPORRAN. Eventually journalism I! will be a course in electronic journalism. The emphasis would be on television journalism - for example the writing and production of news.

Mr. Kent Jones has stated that, "Hopefully journalism can be an exciting experience as the mass media has become such an integral part of our life."

## PE Program Offers Multiple Student Training Units

Many feats of performance characterize Shadle's 1970 physical education program In the fall, students are divided into groups and then rotated each six weeks into different performance areas.

## School District Adds New Classes to '70 Curriculum

Highlighting Shadle's curriculum development this year was the new power mechanics lab, closed circuit T.V., sophomore humanities and freshman football, emphasized Dr. Albert Ayars, Superintendent of Spokane Public Schools.

The power mechanics lab is an elective open to all boys and allows the student to develop skills for future jobs. This gives the student a basic idea of what will be required in the work area
which he is studying.
Closed circuit T.V., a system in which students are able to view supplementary material by a taped or televised program, provides the teacher with an easy and convenient resource in teaching. Great expansion in this area is expected for the future.

Humanities has increased to provide for a sophomore class. Dr. Ayars stated that the Humanities course has
been expanded to give more recognition to history and culture. Dr. Ayars also stated that he felt that this course brought the students closer together in their feelings for our culture.

Freshman football has also been a point of interest to Dr. Ayars. He feels that since Shadle Park hasn't a Freshman class, it has taken on a commendable service to not only the school but also the community. The community has also taken on a great in-
terest in the development of Freshman football. This operation was a great success.

Stressing occupational skills, the schools have also added work experience programs for students. Home Economics has offered Chec I and II. The students in this program work one hour a day in the community and spend one hour a day in class. A similar program is $\mathrm{Co}-\mathrm{Op}$, which works in the same manner as Chec I and II. Distributive Education has also increased.
