We are officially now 28 members strong and growing. All of the membership is on tape; check your name for correct address, spelling, and dues. Bring a friend, tell a co-worker about us. The society was formed to bring together owners of Sinclair computers, to share ideas and problems, and maybe together find solutions. It has been suggested that if enough are interested in buying C20 tapes (blank) we could order them as a group, at a savings in cost per tape to you. A library is in the works, both for publications and programs. If you have something to contribute contact Jim Jones. See Roger Pufky about the tapes. Sinclairs need solid state TV's. An old tube type won't do it.

A small (7 or 10 inch) portable seems to work best, and some are in black and look professional with the Sinclair. Problems with interference, if they occur, may be corrected by moving the computer away from the TV, or by using a different circuit (wall outlet) from the TV. If possible, place the Sinclair at a lower level than the TV (elevate the TV on a stand, etc.) Suggestions as to how best to set up a computer work station (table design, etc.) are welcome.
