EDIT: A view of SINCUS from WesB.'s recent survey:

80% have owned a ZX81/TS1000 and 2 are borrowing for six months.  
30% own a memory pack, 20% have a printer. Overall we rate our selves a 2.9 out of 5.0 on experience. 33% are enjoying a computer for the first time. Half are having problems with loading or saving. Next comes power supply and overheating problems. Less than 50% of the members responded, so picture isnt complete.
