

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
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ON

FAMILY WORSHIP.

I HAVE been requested by the publisher to introduce the following work with a few observations; and as the object is good, and the result may, with the Divine blessing, be salutary, and as it is intended, by the cheapness of the form, to reach classes of the community which have not hitherto enjoyed the assistance which such a publication supplies, I gladly comply with the call.

Much, alas ! as it is to be feared, Family Worship is neglected by many professed

Christians, there can be no question regarding its obligation and advantages. Most. indeed, in words acknowledge these. Whether we turn to reason, scripture, or experience, we find a clear and strong and united testimony in behalf of family religion. Does the reader need to be reminded, that true religion, unlike the false systems of man, is all-pervading-that it penetrates not some but all the relations in which man can stand-the individual, domestic, and social-the public as well as the private? All who believe that there is a God, must confess that he should be acknowledged; but if he is to be acknowledged by individuals, for the same or similar reasons it becomes men to acknowledge him in their families. The relationship of families is a special one, and cannot be suitably recognised by the homage paid by

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an individual. The family, therefore, must worship God. This becomes more evident when it is remembered that a family stands in a particular relationship to God -that the members of the family stand in a special relationship to each other, and that the head of the house stands in a special relationship to the members of the family, and to the world. The peopling of the earth by generations of successive families, instead of by continual creations at the full-grown estate of man, is not an accidental circumstance. It is the arrangement of infinite wisdom and goodness. God is the source of all the happiness of families, and is well entitled to all their Moreover, families from their homage. very nature-the proximity in point of place, and affection of the members-have special opportunities and advantages for

worshipping the Great Father of all. Then the relationship between the members -common mercies in which they have shared -common sins to be confessed-common afflictions to be sanctified-common blessings, temporal and spiritual, to be sought, demand the acknowledgment of Family Worship. Indeed in no other way can these be suitably recognised. Next, the head of a house is, from his very station, armed with a degree of authority over the members, and owes them particular duties, such as defence, support, and instruction; but how can these requirements of his headship be met or fulfilled without such a mutual acknowledgment of God as Family Worship involves? Besides, the whole population of the world is made up of families, and the separate parts are bound to aim at the general good of the whole, and

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how can this be so well attained as by the culture and diffusion of the social virtues : and what again can be a better soil for these than the daily sacrifices of the family altar? So strongly have these considerations of nature and reason been felt, that in all ages even the heathen have confessed their truth, and had their household gods, as well as their gods of cities and nations. If we turn to Scripture, we find that the word of God moves in perfect harmony with the views which have been presented. There may not be any injunction in as many words to worship God in our families, just as there is no express command for secret prayer, and many other undoubted duties. The Bible is more a book of principles, than detailed rules. Family Worship cannot be observed by all in precisely the same way; and hence the Divine Wisdom of ra-

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ther entrusting the care of it to the conscience, than to any rigid prescription. But the Scriptures recognise principles and give forth precepts, and furnish examples which evidently take for granted and imply Family Worship. We are exhorted to "pray always," and "every where," and " in every thing;" and is it possible to obey these general directions without family prayer? The Lord's Prayer is a family prayer. It was first given to the members of Christ's family-a distinction is drawn between secret and social prayer. It is said "Our Father"-"give us"-"lead us"implying that more than one is present. It is also a daily prayer-" give us our daily bread"-and social daily prayer, for the most part, cannot be observed but in a family. Then we have Scripture example. As soon as Noah was delivered from the ark, he and

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his family, before providing for their own accommodation, built an altar to Jehovah. and offered up family sacrifices. So of Abraham and his family; besides he is specially commended for the care which he bestowed upon the religious instruction of his household. Moses enjoins the people of Israel to study the statutes and commandments of the Lord, not only for themselves, but to teach them diligently to their children, when they lie down and when they rise up-in other words, morning and evening. Joshua resolves for his house, as well as himself, that he will serve the Lord. Job, David, Daniel, and Cornelius, might all be quoted, as exemplifying the same duty-but it is unnecessary; let me only remark, that while Jehovah is said to prefer "the gates of Zion," in other words, the exercises of public worship, he is said

to "love the dwellings of Jacob," the exercises of domestic religion,—that it is declared by one prophet, God will pour out his displeasure upon the heathen that have not known him, and "upon the families that call not upon his name," implying that there *are* families which do honour him as families,—and by another prophet, that when the Jewish people are restored to the Lord, one of the most glorious periods of Scripture prophecy, they are to mourn, not merely as individuals, but as families.

Is it necessary to speak of the advantages of family religion as attested by experience? These advantages are important to the heads of families,—to the members under their care,—and to the general interests of Christianity in the world. How is Family Worship fitted to draw forth the respect, affection, and submission of

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the members of a household towards its head, and to draw down the divine blessing upon his temporal affairs? The virtues which family religion cultivates conduce to outward prosperity, and God, we know, has said, He will honour those who honour Him. Besides, how does Family Worship tend to restrain excess of every kind, to preserve alive upon the mind of the master of the family a sense of the divine presence. to comfort him amid family duties and difficulties, and to cherish dispositions of kindness and love to all the members of his house? What father of a family would not feel the check of regular and recurring Family Worship upon profane swearing or dishonest dealings, or the harsh treatment of domestics? To the members of the household, again, how beneficial the influence of domestic worship. How will praise, в2

and reading the word of God, and prayer, insensibly teach children and servants the great truths and duties of religion-lead them to prayer for themselves-affectionately attach them to parents and mastersrestrain from many sins and temptationsfit for the discharge of active duty, and, in short, make them a blessing, instead of a source of contamination and mischief, not only to those in the house, but to the families around. The claims of family religion, then, are supported by the most powerful motives-by a regard to divine authorityby the tie of natural relationship-by the call of natural affection-by the argument of self-interest. There is yet another consideration-the claims of public usefulness. in other words, the influence of Family Worship in reviving and forwarding the general interests of religion, and so the

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welfare of the Church of Christ, and of the nation to which we have the happiness to belong. Churches and nations are all composed of families, and just according to the moral and religious state of families, will be the condition of churches and nations. Now, Family Worship keeps up and transmits religion from generation to generation. It prepares individuals better to profit by the public ordinances of the sanctuary, making them intelligent and impressible; yea, providing for a blessing on the word by previous prayer: and then how does it gladden and enrich the nation? Nations are the creatures of God, as well as families, and he delights in grace to work through these great relationships of nature. We lie under inexpressible obligations to God for our national privileges, civil and religious, and are bound to seek the good

of our land; but how can we better do so than by cultivating and exemplifying that domestic devotion which is one of the best protectors against social vice, and one of the best ministers of social virtue, and also multiplying the number of those faithful intercessors, for whose sakes a guilty city or nation may be spared even in the eleventh hour of its crime?

These things are no speculations. The advantages of Family Worship are proclaimed by facts. How often has the recollection of domestic devotion and parental example operated as a shield in the season of temptation, and led the erring youth to consider and retrace his steps? How often have servants been indebted for their first saving impressions to the edifying instruction and example of pious families? and who cau doubt, on the other hand, that

the irreligion and profligacy of children may often be traced to the neglect of domestic worship, and that the seduction, intemperance, and ruin of thousands of servants, both male and female, may with equal truth be ascribed to the absence of family religion, and the pernicious example set before them, in the houses in which their lot happened to be cast at an early period of life? Who can doubt that the crime which is the reproach of our landthe disobedience to parents, the self-will, the licentiousness, the violence, over which the patriot and the Christian mourn, flow forth from the irreligious families where the domestic altar is unknown? and who can question if the solemn reading of the word of God, accompanied with earnest prayer and warm-hearted praise, were universally introduced into the families of our

land, and regularly maintained, that, under the blessing of the Holy Spirit, many vices would ere long disappear, and the Christianity of the country assume a new and beautiful aspect. Instances are on record of irreligious men of the world being brought to repentance and the acknowledgment of the truth by over-hearing the family devotions of poor Christian neighbours; of slaves thus instructing their proprietors; of apprentices being converted to God from being present at their master's family altar, and in their turn stirring up their master when he is in danger of abandoning the duty. There are instances, too, of criminals not only deeply deploring their contempt of family religion, and attributing to it their ignominious end, but also of their being deeply shaken in their course of iniquity by coming accidentally

into contact with the devotions of a Godfearing family. Such was the case with two of the young men who suffered death for public rioting and robbery on the streets of Edinburgh on New-year's-day, 1812. It is recorded, that on coming to Glasgow for concealment, they happened to lodge in a family where one evening the worship of God was observed, and that they were so much impressed with the exercise that they were driven to the inquiring whether there be a God and a world to come ? and though they at this time decided in the negative, as they afterwards acknowledged, solely because they wished it so, yet mark the power of Family Worship even upon minds fresh from crime: convictions were awakened, anxieties called forth; and though for a season these were overborne by wilful infidelity, they recurred, and, in the judgment of several of the ablest ministers of Edinburgh, who attended the young men in their last days, with such effect as to give favourable hopes respecting their change of character.

But why confine the reader's attention to individual cases of good; why not appeal to the influence of Family Worship, with kindred exercises, upon the character of communities and nations? It is well known that in the history of the Church of Scotland, especially the earlier periods, few duties were more earnestly and frequently pressed upon the attention of her people than those of Family Worship. Besides the standards, repeated are the acts of the General Assembly and Church Courts, calling to diligence in this matter; giving directions how to observe the duty, and, where disregarded, suggesting a suit-

able discipline for the negligent. At a very early season it was made part of the duty of ministers and elders, to see that the worship of God, every morning and evening, and the catechising of children and servants, be set up in every family in their respective parishes and districts. And what was the fruit of these and similar exertions of religious duty? Did the people under them, as some imagine, become poor ignorant fanatics-contracted in their views -rebellious in their spirit-unfit for the business of life? No; they became eminently the reverse. One historian, Kirkton, speaking of the first Reformation, declares, that such were the labours of the ministers, under the blessing of God, "that within ten years after Popery was discharged in Scotland, there was not, in all the country, ten persons of quality to be

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found who did not profess the true Reformed religion, and so it was among the commons in proportion." Livingstone. in his Memoirs, speaks of fifty persons of high rank making a profession of the true doctrine; and a modern writer, highly prejudiced against the Church of Scotland, says of her earlier periods, that "all the nobility of Scotland, except a few, almost all the gentry or barons, the most even of the king's state officers, together with the wealthiest men in the burghs, and the great bulk of the common people were decided in their affection for the evangelical doctrines preached by the Presbyterian clergy," and that the Romish faith was maintained only by four or five leading noblemen and their dependents. This was the state of things not many years from the beginning of the Reformation ; and what does it show

but the amazing zeal and power of the Church, and as these were not founded on ignorance or superstition, so that the result must have been owing to the faithful use of the word of God, and those measures which it suggests? The very army, which the defence of their religious liberties afterwards constrained the people to raise, was marked with a character which never had been beheld in armies before. Intemperance, swearing, and obscenity were unknown. The voice of family devotion mingled with the sound of arms. So far from there being any inconsistency between the strictest attention to the duties of family religion, and an enlightened regard to all the great interests of life, the period,-the middle of the seventeenth century,-when the acts of the General Assembly refer most fully to the obligations

of Family Worship, is the very period when the Church was acting the part of the great civilizer, as well as religious instructor of the country; when she was one day collecting for the building of bridges or harbours, the next for the redemption of British sailors from Turkish slavery, a third for educational purposes at home, a fourth for persecuted Protestants abroad. The period of greatest family religion in Scotland, was the period when the warmest loyalty was blended with the most resolute courage, and the most extraordinary sacrifices for civil, but above all for religious freedom. Are these the qualities of ignorant and narrow-minded men? And vet, this was the character to which religion and its exercises formed the great mass of a nation, in a comparatively brief space of time. At a later day, good Mat-

thew Henry, in his account of his friend, Dr Benyon, who sojourned in Glasgow in 1703, says, "He observed, to his great satisfaction, that all the while he was in Glasgow, though he lay in a public inn, he never saw any drunk, nor heard any swear; nay, he observed that in all the inns of the road to that part of Scotland where he lay, though some of them mean, they had Family Worship performed morning and evening, from which, and other remarks made in that journey, he inferred that practical religion doth not depend on worldly wealth, for where he had seen the marks of poverty, there he had seen withal the marks of piety." Here we see that not only the large towns, such as Glasgow, but the very inns bore their part in the Family Worship of God. Though, doubtless, a considerable share of the piety which had c 2

set up this Family Worship, and which, in its turn, was nourished by it, had disappeared seventy years afterwards, yet the form was still general, and, we trust, not a little of the power; showing at least how prevailing the spirit had been at an earlier date. A near relative, afterwards an eminent minister of the Church of Scotland, but a vouth in 1770, remembered well the solitude of the streets of Glasgow, on the sabbath evening, broken only by the voice of family praise, when called, by the illness of a relation, to go abroad for medical aid. Whitfield was struck with the voice of psalms, issuing from almost every house, in passing down the High Street, on a Sabbath morning, in the middle of last century. Similar testimonies of the same period, not only as to Glasgew, but other considerable towns in Scotland, I have re-

peatedly heard from intelligent witnesses. And were our countrymen the worse for thus honouring God? or have their posterity improved greatly by the change which, in this respect, too many, alas, have undergone? Our country may be far superior to what it was in arts and sciences, in wealth and outward accommodations, but is it superior in its moral character? Are the intelligence, and worth, and happiness of its families greater than they were when Family Worship was the order of the day? Are the same class of men as well instructed, and generous, and self-denied, and courageous in the maintenance of the truest liberty as their fathers were, when the whole public revenue of Scotland did not exceed £75,000 a-year? Is it not rather the case that, with departing family piety, sound education, and good order, and true benev-

olence, and filial love, and all the domestic and social virtues have been sadly deteriorated? I might appeal to other quarters for the proof of the same doctrine, and show that it was when the Non-conformists of England, and the descendants of the pilgrim Fathers of New England were most distinguished for the exercises of family devotion, they were also most distinguished for high intellectual and moral qualities, and that, just as they sunk in the one, did they lose the other: but I must not enlarge; let me only remind the reader that the Protestant Church of France is an interesting example of the advantage and power of Family Worship. When, by the revocation of the edict of Nantes, that noble Church was persecuted well nigh unto death, and all her ministers, and a million of her best people were com-

pelled to leave their native country, and public worship was forbidden, how did survivors, for many years, keep up the spirit of religion? It was by Family Worship, restricted as, in some respects, even that was. The exiled pastors exhorted their scattered, impoverished, and oppressed flocks in such terms as these, "Keep carefully your books of piety and devotion, and read them with singular diligence and attention ;--above all, keep, as your most precious jewels, the most holy bible, and suffer every thing rather than your bibles to be snatched away from you. Read them daily, and with the greatest devotion. If you can, at any time, meet together secretly by night in the retirements of your houses, let it be for the reading of God's word and of good books, capable of instructing you; but, above all, for prayer. Family duties,

family prayer hath been either neglected or very negligently performed. That you may turn away God's wrath from you, set upon the religious performance of these religious duties : let them be frequent, prolonged and with greater fervency." These counsels were given shortly after 1685, and were so far attended to that, eighty years afterwards, an intelligent writer, Job Orton, records-" The poor persecuted Protestants are extremely diligent in the duty of Family Worship, and this preserves a remnant, a seed among them, which, I doubt not, will appear abundantly when the time to favour Zion, even the set time, is come. Nothing will be so likely to prevent our land becoming like theirs as Family Worship." If the domestic altar thus proved so useful in the dark days of persecution, surely it will not be useless in the days of

outward peace and prosperity. Who can tell but that, if faithful in offering its sacrifices, the Spirit of God may descend and make the men of the present as distinguished, for every private and public virtue, as the men of former generations.

It is one of the gratifying signs of the times that there is a large and growing demand for works of a devotional character. There are scarcely any which have been puolisned of late years, that have not met with a wide circulation. Still a large class of society has not been reached, and it is hoped the present publication may find its way to them. While the call for books of private, and especially, family devotion, is to be hailed as a symptom of religious revival, the sign of a felt want which it is most desirable should be supplied by works of an unexceptionable character, there is,

at the same time, a danger of ministering to religious formality, one of the besetting sins of our nature and age. When the great spiritual Adversary can no longer prevent men becoming concerned about religion, his next effort is to make them formalists, and so neutralize their concern and deceive them. Hence it becomes welldisposed families to be on their guardnot to rest in the forms with which they are supplied, but to use them as helps-never imagining that the mere observance of them, however regular, will make them truly religious, but that their only safety lies in a cordial reception and steadfast maintenance of the great truths which the prayers present, and a life of unwearied faith on the Son of God, and good works, flowing from dependence on him, and upheld by the Holy Spirit.

The better to guard against the evils to which even what is in itself good stands exposed, and also to secure the full advantages of family worship, I beg to extract a few sentences from the "Directions for Family Worship, approved by the General Assembly in 1647," subsequently ratified by repeated Acts, and usually bound up with the Confession of Faith.

"The ordinary duties comprehended under the exercise of piety, which should be in families, when they are convened to that effect, are these: first, prayer and praises performed with a special reference, as well as to the public condition of the kirk of God and this kingdom, as to the present case of the family, and every member thereof. Next, reading of the scriptures, with catechizing in a plain way, that the understandings of the simpler may be the

better enabled to profit under the public ordinances, and they made more capable to understand the scriptures when they are read; together with godly conferences tending to the edification of all the members in the most holy faith: as also admonition and rebuke, upon just reasons, from those who have authority in the family.

"The head of the family is to take care that none of the family withdraw himself from any part of family worship: and, seeing the ordinary performance of all the parts of family worship belongeth properly to the head of the family, the minister is to stir up such as are lazy, and train up such as are weak, to a fitness to these exercises.

"On the Lord's day, after every one of the family apart, and the whole family together, have sought the Lord (in whose

hands the preparation of men's hearts are). to fit them for the public worship, and to bless to them the public ordinances, the master of the family ought to take care that all within his charge repair to the public worship, that he and they may join with the rest of the congregation : and the public worship being finished, after prayer, he should take an account what they have heard; and thereafter, to spend the rest of the time which they may spare in catechizing, and in spiritual conferences upon the word of God: or else (going apart) they ought to apply themselves to reading, meditation, and secret prayer, that they may confirm and increase their communion with God: that so the profit which they found in the public ordinances may be cherished and promoved, and they more edified unto eternal life.

"So many as can conceive prayer, ought to make use of that gift of God; albeit those who are rude and weaker may begin at a set form of prayer, but so as they be not sluggish in stirring up in themselves (according to their daily necessities) the spirit of prayer, which is given to all the children of God in some measure: to which effect they ought to be more fervent and frequent in secret prayer to God, for enabling of their hearts to conceive, and their tongues to express, convenient desires to God for their family." And, in the mean time, for their greater encouragement, let

* Even in families where the extemporaneous prayer is practised, it may not be unsuitable to have forms, which may be used when the head of the house is absent or unwell, or when there is no one present who can, with propriety, conduct the service. Thus there will be no occasion ever to intermit the duty. these materials of prayer be meditated upon, and made use of as followeth :---

"Let them confess to God how unworthy they are to come into his presence, and how unfit to worship his Majesty; and therefore earnestly ask of God the spirit of prayer.

"' They are to confess their sins, and the sins of the family; accusing, judging, and condemning themselves for them, till they bring their souls to some measure of true humiliation.

"' They are to pour out their souls to God, in the name of Christ, by the Spirit, for forgiveness of sins; for grace to repent, to believe, and to live soberly, righteously, and godly; and that they may serve God with joy and delight, walking before him.

". They are to give thanks to God for his many mercies to his people, and to

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themselves, and especially for his love in Christ, and for the light of the gospel.

"' They are to pray for such particular benefits, spiritual and temporal, as they stand in need of for the time, (whether it be morning or evening,) as anent health or sickness, prosperity or adversity.

"' They ought to pray for the Kirk of Christ in general, for all the reformed kirks, and for this kirk in particular, and for all that suffer for the name of Christ; for all our superiors, the king's majesty, the queen, and their children; for the magistrates, ministers, and whole body of the congregation whereof they are members, as well for their neighbours absent in their lawful affairs, as for those that are at home.

"The prayer may be closed with an earnest desire that God may be glorified in the coming of the kingdom of his Son, and in doing of his will, and with assurance that themselves are accepted, and what they have asked according to his will shall be done.'

"These exercises ought to be performed in great sincerity, without delay, laying aside all exercises of worldly business or hindrances, notwithstanding the mockings of atheists and profane men; in respect of the great mercies of God to this land, and of his severe corrections wherewith lately he hath exercised us."

I shall not detain the reader farther than to remark, that if it may be said of a duty so urgent, and permanent, and universally binding as Family Worship, that at one season it is more peculiarly called for than another, we may safely hold the present to be that season. When we think of the open

infidelity which is ever and anon presenting itself, the loose religious notions which prevail, the speedy independence of parental authority to which so many children almost necessarily attain, the divisions which rend the church of Christ, the popish tendencies of a luxurious age, the multitude of undertakings of Christian usefulness which are in operation, both at home and abroad-when these things are considered, every intelligent Christian must see that there is a peculiar call for the instructing, restraining, hallowing, healing, prayerful influence of the domestic altar; especially that there is a loud call to honour the Holy Spirit, the Author of light, and faith, and love, and union, and spiritual success.

I have only farther to add that the following series of prayers was selected and

arranged, not by me, but by another person, and that I have made no change upon the work, with the exception of once or twice altering an ambiguous expression. The names of the authors. I should think, are a sufficient security for their excellence. I have added a distinct form of prayer for the Conversion of God's ancient people the Jews, an object which is daily and justly drawing more and more the attention of the Christian Church, and on the success of which the most glorious prospects for Christianity are suspended. With , some abridgment and additions, it is taken from the Records of the London Society for promoting the Conversion of the Jews, in 1811.


I have much pleasure in commending the work, and those who shall use it, to the care and blessing of the Great Hearer and

First Week.

SABBATH MORNING.

WE keep this day holy to the honour of thee, O God the Father Almighty, the maker of heaven and earth, in remembrance of the work of creation, that work of wonder, in which thou madest all things out of nothing, by the word of thy power, and all very good; and they continue to this day according to their ordinance, for all are thy servants. Thou art worthy to receive blessing, and honour, and glory, and power, for thou hast created all things, and for thy pleasure they are and were created. O thou who at first didst command the light to shine out of darkness, who saidst on the first day of the week, Let there be light, and there was light; we pray thee shine this day into our hearts, to give us more and more of the light of the knowledge of thy glory; so let us be thy workmanship, created in Christ Jesus unto good works.

We also sanctify this day to the honour of our Lord Jesus Christ, thy only begotten Son. and our exalted Redeemer, in remembrance of his resurrection from the dead on the first day of the week, by which he was declared to be the Son of God with power. We bless thee, that having laid down his life to make atonement for sin, he rose again for our justification, that he might bring in an everlasting righteousness; that the stone which the builders refused is become the head of the corner; this is the Lord's doing, and wonderful in our We bless thee that he is risen from the eyes. dead. as the first-fruits of them that slept, that he might be the resurrection and the life And we pray, that while we are celeto us. brating the memorial of that great event with joy and triumph, we may experience in our souls the power and virtue of his resurrection: that we may rise from the death of sin, to the life of righteousness; from the dust of this world, to a holy, heavenly, spiritual, and divine life.

We likewise sanctify this day to the honour of the eternal Spirit, that blessed Spirit of grace, the Comforter, rejoicing at the remem-

brance of the descent of the Spirit upon the Apostles on the day of Pentecost, the first day of the week likewise. We bless thee, that when Jesus was glorified, the Holy Ghost was given to supply the want of his bodily presence, to carry on his undertaking, and to prepare for his second coming; and that we have a promise that he shall abide with us for ever. And we pray that the Spirit of him who raised up Jesus from the dead, may dwell and rule in every one of us, to make us partakers of a new and divine nature. Come, O blessed Spirit of grace, and breathe upon our hearts, that they may live; and be in us a Spirit of faith, and love, and holiness.

O God, we bless thee for the great gospel record, that thou hast given to us eternal life, and this life in thy Son. Lord, we receive it as worthy of all acceptation, we venture our immortal souls upon it, and by it are encouraged to come to thee, imploring an interest in the Mediation of thy Son. O may we be effectually called into fellowship with him, and by faith be united to him, so that Christ may live in us, and we may through him have eternal life. We bless thee for the new covenant made with us in Jesus Christ. Lord, we fly for refuge to it, we take hold of it as the hope set before us. O receive us graciously in the bonds of this covenant.

We pray thee, for Christ's sake, to forgive

all our sins, known and unknown, in thought, word, and deed; through him may we be acquitted of all guilt. O let there be no cloud to interpose between us and our God, and to intercept our communion with him; let our iniquity be taken away and our sins covered.

Let grace be with all those who love the Lord Jesus Christ in sincerity. In the chariot of the everlasting gospel, let the great Redeemer ride forth triumphantly, conquering and to conquer; and let every thought be brought into obedience to him. Let many believe the report of the Gospel, many sinners be converted, and the members of thy church built up in faith, holiness, and comfort unto salvation. Now the Lord of peace give us peace alway—the God of hope fill us with joy and peace in believing, through Jesus Christ our blessed Saviour and Redeemer. Amen. —Our Father, &c.

SABBATH EVENING.

O RTERNAL and for ever blessed and glorious Lord God! thou art God over all, and rich in mercy to all that call upon thee; most wise and powerful, holy, just, and good; the King of kings, and Lord of lords.

We bewail before thee, that, by the corruption of our natures, we are become utterly unfit to inherit the kingdom of God, and by our many actual transgressions are become obnoxious to thy justice, and liable to thy wrath and curse. Being by nature children of disobedience, we are children of wrath, and have reason both to blush and tremble in all our approaches to the holy and righteous God. We desire to have no more to do with sin, and pray as earnestly that the power of sin may be broken in us, as that the guilt of sin may be removed from us. We beg, that being justified by faith, we may have peace with God through him who was set forth to be the propitation

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for sin. Through him, let us who know no righteousness of our own, be acceptable as righteous.

Convince us, we pray thee, of the worth of our own souls, the weight of eternity, and the awfulness of that everlasting state upon the brink of which we are standing, and make us diligent and serious in our preparation for it, labouring less for the meat which perisheth, and more for that which endureth to life eternal. O that time, and the things of time, may be as nothing compared to eternity! May that eternity be much in our hearts, and ever in our sight. May we be governed by that faith which is the substance of things hoped for, and the evidence of things not seen.

Prepare us, we beseech thee, for whatever we may meet with betwixt us and the grave. We know not what is before us, and therefore know not what particular provision to make. We beg of thee to fit us by thy grace for all the services and all the sufferings which thou shalt at any time call upon us to encounter. Arm us against every temptation by which we may at any time be assaulted, that we may at all times and in all conditions glorify God, keep a good conscience, and be found in the way of our duty; and keep up our hope and joy in Christ, believing in eternal life, and then welcome the holy will of God in all things.

We humbly pray thee, accomplish all thou

hast promised concerning thy Church in the latter days. Fill the earth with thy glory. May the fulness of the Gentiles be brought in, and all Israel be saved. Let our country flourish in all its public interests; and thine everlasting Gospel be the glory in the midst of us, and thy providence a wall of fire around us.

Be very gracious to our sovereign lady the Queen; protect her person, prolong her days, guide her councils, let her reign be prosperous, and crown with thy blessing all her endeavours for the public good; and let all subordinate magistrates, in their several places, be faithful and serviceable to the nation.

Bless all the ministers of thy holy word and sacraments; make them burning and shining lights, faithful to Christ and to the souls of men. Unite all thy ministers and people together in the truth, and in love to one another. We bless thee for all the mercies of this thine own holy day; make us meet for the everlasting Sabbath, which we hope to keep within the veil, when time and days shall be no more. As we began this Lord's day with the joyful memorials of Christ's resurrection, so we desire to conclude it with the joyful expectations of Christ's second coming, and of our own resurrection to a life of immortality, triumphing in hope of the glory of God. Praise the Lord, O our souls, and let us love his holy name, for he is good, and his mercy endureth for ever-

MONDAY MORNING.

O GoD of the spirits of all flesh, let every day begin with thee. We have had the privilege of waiting on thee in thine house. And we desire to be thankful, that we were not suffered to waste that time in idleness or pleasure, which thou in mercy gavest us for the work of our salvation.

But we must likewise implore thy forgiveness; for though we have reason to praise thee for keeping us from profaning the Sabbath, yet we may look back with shame on the manner in which we performed its duties. But although the day of rest is over, and we must now be employed in the affairs of the present life, we are yet in thy sight, and ought to endeavour to approve ourselves to thee, even in the common affairs of life.

We begin, therefore, this part of the week with supplication to thee, O God of all grace; humbly beseeching thee to make us so mindful of thy continual presence, that all our behaviour may serve to shew thou art still in our thoughts.

Defend us, O Lord our God, while we are employed about the things of this life, from the hurtful influence which they may have on our minds. Mercifully regard thy frail creatures who have to encounter with the cares, the difficulties, the allurements of this present world: let them not overwhelm us, nor make us forgetful of those blessed truths which we so lately heard.

O Lord, we feel our weakness: we remember how we have been borne away by the crowd of temporal affairs, that have pressed on us as soon as the Sabbath was over. Before the evening of another day has come, the serious and salutary impressions that had been made upon us by thy word, have almost

been effaced. Sometimes we have lost almost the relish of those good things which we have tasted: and have been scarcely able to recollect the peace, the hope, and the joy, which we felt in the closet, and in the congregation.

O let it not be thus with us this day. In our most busy hours let us not lose a sense of thy presence, O God. Let the influence of thy holy word be forcible and abiding; having heard it, we are now called to shew forth the effect it should have on our hearts, and lives O may it be manifest, that we are endeavouring to practise, whilst we are out of thy house, the heavenly lessons which we received when we were within it.

And permit us, O Father of mercies, to petition for others, as well as for ourselves. We would feel for those thoughtless persons, on whom the advantages of the day of rest are bestowed in vain. Have mercy, O Lord, on those who set at nought all thy counsel, who are deaf even to the voice of mercy, even to the voice of Jesus the Mediator, and to the blood of sprinkling, which speaketh better things than the blood of Abel. O thou, who canst enlighten the darkest mind, and soften the hardest heart, be merciful to all such, and give them to see and feel those weighty, those eternal truths, which it will be our salvation to regard, but our ruin to neglect.

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And O let not those who may have given some attention to thy word, satisfy themselves with the knowledge of the truth. Let us be deeply convinced of the impossibility of being happy till our hearts are truly reconciled to thy will. May we not only know the truth, but may the truth make us free. Break every bond of iniquity; and enable us seriously to consider that if but one chain hold us in the service of sin, the highest attainments in religious knowledge will avail us nothing.

O spirit of truth and love, do thou not only enlighten our minds, but warm our hearts with holy fire. Make our will conformable to thy will. Sanctify every affection of our hearts. Let all our powers conspire to glorify our Creator.

We ask these blessings in the name of that Saviour, who taught us to address thee in these words,—Our Father, &c.

O LORD GOD, to whom we are indebted for all our enjoyments, graciously vouchsafe to hear us while we acknowledge them. From thee we receive all that renders the day pleasant, and the night peaceful. Thou didst

bestow on us the cheerful light of day for our necessary employments, and thou hast now brought on the stillness of the night, that we may be at rest, and that our wearied nature may be refreshed with sleep.

We bless thee for sending thy dear Son into the world, by whom thou couldst, consistently with thy truth and righteousness, reconcile us unto thyself, and be at once just, and yet the justifier of penitent and believing sinners.

We would remember, in the use and enjoyment of all our bodily comforts, that we are sinful creatures. We would not forget, that there is not a single blessing which we have not forfeited by our disobedience. We would humbly and thankfully recollect the means through which we receive all our blessings, and that they are restored through the compassionate mediation of Him, who was slain to take away the sin of the world. The health, we have enjoyed this day, the food with which our table has been spread, the sleep we hope for this night, and all that renders life comfortable, we owe to divine grace.

And if for these enjoyments, we are bound to sing of thy mercy, how much more for the richer blessings of that redemption, which we obtain through the blood of Jesus! O Lord, we have no words that will fully express our obligations to thee for these mercies. Here thou art exalted above all blessing and praise. But we will endeavour to sing thy praise with all our powers; and thy grace shall be the subject of our thanksgiving.

And now, O Lord, since thou art willing to impart unto us spiritual and everlasting blessings, give us wisdom and grace to seek unto thee for them. May we be more desirous of these than of the comforts of the present life; yea so may we learn to estimate the things that belong to our peace, as to count all things

but loss, for the excellency of the knowledge of Christ Jesus our Lord.

Blessed be thy holy name for offering these greater mercies to us miserable sinners, without money and without price. Blessed be thy holy name for declaring that whosoever will, may come, and take of the water of life freely. Encouraged by this gracious invitation, so suited to our low estate, we now apply to thee for spiritual blessings.

Vouchsafe unto us, most gracious God, the pardon of all our sins. Grant unto us the spirit of true repentance, that we may feel that godly sorrow which becometh those who have transgressed thy laws. Sanctify us in body, soul, and spirit. And if it please thee, may we be favoured with a comfortable persuasion of our being in a state of reconciliation with thee; that our days may be brightened by faith and hope, that in our temporal enjoyments we may taste thy love, and that we may be preserved from all those distressing thoughts, to which a consciousness of sin renders us liable.

Gracious God may every one of us feel an earnest desire to be of thy family. May every one of us be enabled to lie down in the spirit of adoption; committing himself to thee as a child into the hands of a father. This is a privilege, O Lord, with which thou condescendest to honour thy servants. Help us to put away every thing that may prevent 'our

enjoyment of it, and enable us to walk as obedient children.

Forgive, O Lord, whatever has been inconsistent with that character in our behaviour this day. Pity and pardon us, O most gracious Father, and be mercifully pleased still to visit us with thy favour, and grant us a peaceful and refreshing night. And if we have another day given to us, may we endeavour to walk like those whom thou hast redeemed and sanctified.

These great blessings we implore at thy merciful hands, in the name of thy dear Son, our only Advocate, who condescended to teach us thus to pray:—Our Father, &c.

TUESDAY MORNING.

ALMIGHTY God, whose eyes run to and fro throughout all the earth, to show thyself strong in behalf of those who fear thee, we adore and magnify thee, as the author of all our blessings, and the source of all our happiness.

As thou hast kept us from the terror by night, and from the pestilence that walketh in darkness, so may it please thee to save us from the arrow that flieth by day, and from the destruction that wasteth at noon. Especially save us from those who lie in wait for our souls.

Thou hast shewed us, O Lord, what is good: and what thou requirest of us. Help us to obey thy commandment, to do justly, to love mercy, and to walk humbly with thee, our God. And, having received how we ought to walk and please thee, may we abound more Vouchsafe, we beseech thee, conand more. tinually to direct, sanctify, and govern both our hearts and bodies in the ways of thy laws, and in the works of thy commandments; that, through thy most mighty protection, both here and ever, we may be preserved in body and soul.

O thou God of kingdoms, and Lord of heaven and earth, give thy blessing to all nations; especially to that in which thou hast cast our lot.

We are indeed a sinful people, laden with iniquity; and it is entirely of thy mercies that we have not been consumed. But continue, we pray thee, to spare and to bless us: and grant that all thy goodness towards us may lead us to repentance. Be thou our God; and may we be thy people: that all the world may know that thou art our Defender and Almighty Deliverer.

O Lord, save thy people, and bless thine heritage. May they continue in the faith, grounded and settled, and not be moved away from the hope of the gospel. And as many as walk according to this rule, peace be upon them, and upon the Israel of God.

We now desire, O heavenly father, humbly to commend ourselves, and all who belong to us, unto the care of thy good providence.

How excellent is thy loving-kindness, O Therefore do the children of men put God! their trust under the shadow of thy wing; and therefore do we, thy sinful and helpless creatures, implore thy protection through the hours of darkness. Watch over us with thy allseeing eye; and vouchsafe unto us comfortable sleep. May we lie down in peace and take our rest. May we dwell safely, and be quiet from fear of evil. But keep us mindful, O Lord, at the close of every day, that the end of all things is at hand; that we may be sober and watch unto prayer. Stir us up to work, while it is called to-day, as those who know that the night of death cometh, when we can work no longer.

Grant this for Jesus Christ's sake; in whose name and words we conclude these our petitions:—Our Father, &c.

WEDNESDAY MORNING.

Make us diligent and watchful, pure and temperate, and so moderate in our most lawful enjoyments, that they may never become a snare. O communicate some portion of thy Spirit to our souls, that we may worthily receive this inestimable gift, becoming, in all humility and unfeigned repentance, in faith, hope, and charity, partakers of the blessings, and heirs of the kingdom purchased by the merits of our ever-blessed Redeemer, Lord and Saviour, Jesus Christ. Amen.—Our Father, &c.

WEDNESDAY EVENING.

ETERNAL God, Almighty Father of men and angels, by whose care and providence we are preserved and blessed. comforted and assisted, we humbly beg of these to pardon the sins and follies of our lives, the weaknesses of our services, the rashness of our words, and the vanity and evil of our actions. O God, how long shall we confess our sins, and pray against them, and yet continue to commit them? O let it be so no more. Let us never return to the follies of which we are ashamed, which bring sorrow and death, and thy displeasure, which is worse than death. Give us a com-

mand over our evil inclinations, together with a perfect hatred of sin, and a love to thee above all the desires of this world. Be pleased to bless and preserve us this night from all sin, from unforeseen accidents, and from malicious wickedness. Watch over us in our sleep, and, whether we sleep or wake, let us be thy servants. Be thou the first and last in all our thoughts, and the guide and continual assistance of all our actions. Blessed and for ever hallowed be thy name, for that never ceasing shower of blessings by which we live and are content, and comforted and provided for, and set forward in our duty to heaven. "Blessing, honour, glory, and power be unto him that sitteth on the throne, and to the Lamb for ever." Amen.—Our Father, &c.

THURSDAY MORNING.

O THOU, Father of our Lord Jesus Christ, who hast so loved the world as to give thy only begotten Son, to the end that all who believe in him should not perish but have everlasting life, mercifully regard us miserable sinners. Thou seest how slow we are to believe the record that is given of thy Son. Though we read of his glory how little does it affect us! Have compassion on us, O Lord, and help us. Give us what thou hast most graciously promised, the Spirit of truth to open our un-

Let this benefit, at least, be found from our family devotion, that we agree better together, and live more in peace, and love, and quietness, than those who call not upon thee, who lie down and rise up like the herd in the stall

Comfort and protect continually all our near relatives and dear friends. Sanctify to them their present circumstances, whatever they may be; may they consider the things of the Spirit, and never be deluded by the things of time and sense. Be their guide through life, and at death give them admission into thy kingdom and glory.

Promote, O God, the welfare of this our country. Let thy servant, our most gracious sovereign, be continually guided by thy counsel, and reign over us in righteousness. Visit and relieve all who are distressed or oppressed. Regard their tears, hear their sighs; give them to see their sin in their suffering, to humble themselves under thy hand, and find that it is good for them to have been afflicted. Bless our enemies, do good to them that hate us, and ever enable us to return good for evil.

Accept our praises for our continued preservation by thy goodness, which has first brought us into being—for sleep upon our beds—for the return of day after the shades of darkness—for the use of our reason, the comfort of this opportunity of worshipping thy name—above all, for the light of life, the Sun of Righteousness, for whom we bless thy name, and in whom we commend ourselves and all our services to thee, and to whom, with thyself and the Holy Ghost, one God over all, be all honour, praise, love, and obedience, for evermore. Amen—Qur Father, &o.

THURSDAY EVENING.

BLESSED and holy Lord God, who didst make all things by thy power, who rulest all things by thy providence, and fillest all places with thy presence, we, thy poor creatures, beseech thee to fill every one of our hearts with an awful sense of thee, and with humility, sincerity, and faith in Christ, in our approaches to thee. We thus fully acknowledge our absolute dependence upon thee-that our lives, and all the comforts of them, are the effects of thy Thy mercy brought us into the bounty. world, and has ever since filled us with variety of good. Most justly mightest thou have brought upon us all the curses written in the book of thy law against our transgressions. And had thy ways been as our ways when we are injured, and thy thoughts like our thoughts toward our enemies, we had long since been past the power of ever offering to thee our thanks and praise-beyond the benefit of prayer or the hope of pardon.

Increase in us, good Lord, that faith by which alone we can be justified, and have peace with thee through our Lord Jesus Christ; for though we have no righteousness of our own that we dare to plead in the eye of thy law, thou hast thyself provided for sinners an all-sufficient righteousness in thy Son, that, believing on him, we might be pardoned, and through his stripes we might be healed.

Accompany thy pardoning mercy with thy purifying grace; and as our Lord Jesus Christ died for sin to condemn it in the flesh, let us die unto sin, and utterly subdue it: may it never reign within us that we should fulfil the desires thereof. Help us, O Father, God of all power and might, to put off the old man, which is corrupt, and to put on the new man, which is created after thine own image, in righteousness and true holiness. Give us hearts weaned from the pomps and pleasures, the profits and honours, and all the transitory enjoyments of the flesh; but hungering and thirsting after righteousness, never to be satisfied. Prevent us by thy grace, and restrain us

by thy Spirit, that we may never more commit sin with the false deceitful hope of gaining any advantage by it. Impress us continually with the certainty of that truth, that the gaining of the whole world can be no recompense for the loss of the soul. O let that solemn account we must ere long give, when the throne shall be set, the books opened, and the dead, small and great, shall stand before God, order the whole course of our lives; let its influence pervade our whole conversation, and be made mighty in operation to form our conduct; let us so believe and so obey, that when Christ shall come in the clouds with power and with great glory, we may arise with joy, and be glad in his salvation.

We humbly commit ourselves, our dear friends, relatives, and neighbours, to thy merciful protection this night. Defend, we beseech thee, our persons, and dwellings, and our possessions, from all danger. Refresh and strengthen us; and with all the health of our bodies and vigour of our minds, let us serve thee all our days, till we enter into that blessed kingdom, where we shall receive the end of our faith, even the salvation of our souls, through Jesus Christour Lord; to whom with thee, O Father, and the Holy Spirit, be all power and glory ascribed, world without end. Amen.—Our Father, &c.

FRIDAY MORNING.

Make us to be in the fear of the Lord all the day long, and may it never enter into our

breasts to do any thing unworthy of such excessive goodness to us; but may we perfectly love thee, and worthily magnify thy holy name through Jesus Christ our Lord. Amen.—Our Father, &c.

FRIDAY EVENING.

O ETERNAL God, infinitely great, wise, and good, our reconciled Father in Christ Jesus, reject us not, vile and miserable sinners, who, constrained by our necessities, and invited by thy goodness, cast down ourselves in the humble confession of our sins, and thankful acknowledgment of thy mercies, and earnestly beg thy farther grace.

Let his converting, sanctifying virtue,

kill in us the love of the pleasures, honours, and riches of this world, and give us a settled hatred of all sin, and fill our hearts with a fervent love to thee, thy word, thy ways, and servants, and to all men in their several capacities; and cause us to delight our souls in Leave us not to serve thee outwardly thee. and unwillingly, from fear alone, but make thy love and service to be our food and our feast, our business and our recreation. Let the thoughts of thy precious love in Christ, of our pardon and peace with thee, and of the heavenly endless joys with Christ which thou hast promised us, be the readiest and sweetest thoughts of our minds, and a daily cordial at our hearts, to rejoice them under all the crosses and vexations of this world, and the pains of our flesh, and the foresight of death, and to comfort us at a dying hour. Cause us to overcome in all temptations, and to persevere unto the end; that, having lived soberly, righteously, and godly in this world, we may joyfully receive the sentence of death, and that that may be the day of our entrance into the heavenly joys, which is the terror of the wicked, and the beginning of their endless We beseech thee, O Lord, to keep miserv. us from henceforth in all holiness, love, and peace, and in our duties to one another; and let thy blessing be on all our souls and bodies, and on our labours and affairs; and let not

thy judgments seize upon us, but bring us ever onwards on our way rejoicing.

We thank thee for all the mercies of our lives to soul and body, and particularly for preserving us this day. We have had another day's time of repentance, to prepare for our last day: but, alas, how little good have we got done! Forgive all our sins of omission and commission; and protect us this night from the evils that we deserve.

Refresh us with safety, rest, and sleep; and let our meditations of thee be sweet, and thy comforts still delight our souls. Prepare us for the mercies and duties of the day following; and teach us to live in thy service and praise, that we may live with thee for evermore, through Jesus Christ our Lord and Saviour. Amen.—Our Father, &c.

SATURDAY MORNING.

WE will extol thee, our God, O King; and we will bless thy name for ever and ever. Every day will we bless thee, and we will praise thy name for ever and ever. Enable us this morning to abase ourselves in thine awful presence, and to adore thine infinite majesty. Earnestly would we implore the for-

Mercifully succour all that are in Be the husband of the widow, the distress. father of the fatherless, and the stay of the orphan, in thy holy habitation. Shed the copious effusion of thy Holy Spirit upon us all, and upon our neighbours, friends, relations, and Christian brethren. Lord, increase our faith, confirm our hope, inflame our love,

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and grant us zeal to promote thy cause and interest in our sinful world.

Finally, O Lord, make us faithful unto death; that while thousands draw back unto perdition, we may be of that happy number who believe, to the saving of the soul. And at last, through thy great mercy, may we receive that crown of life which has been won for us by our Lord and Saviour, Jesus Christ; in whose name and words we would further pray,—Our Father, &c.

Second Week.

SABBATH MORNING.

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may the thoughts and desires that arise within us, be constantly ascending to thee, in secret acts of prayer and praise. May every truth of thy word, on which we meditate, and every object around us, help to lift up our affections and longings to thee, and keep us walking in holy fellowship with thee, the Father, Son, and Holy Spirit, all the day long.

May we also, in our fellowship with one another, be preserved from all envy, anger, selfishness, and unkindly feelings, and from all rash, imprudent, provoking, and uncivil conversation and behaviour; and may we be kind one to another, and ever watch for opportunities to assist and strengthen each other, in the grace and kingdom of our Lord Jesus Christ. May all our desires and meditations be directed, more decidedly through Christ, to thee, and all our conversation and conduct be rendered more profitable to thy cause, and useful to each other's souls. May a character of heavenly mindedness be more deeply impressed on every one of us.

For these purposes, remove from us, O God, both the pollution and the power of sin. Cleanse us from its defilement, in the blood of Christ, and deliver us from its bondage, by the sanctifying influences of thy Holy Spirit. For our many family sins, we implore thy pardon; for our many family mercies, we desire to praise thee; and, for our family wants, we beseech the supplies of thy bounty and thy grace. Lord bless us; for thou alone canst do it.

Give likewise thy blessing, O God, to all our fellow-worshippers this day, in this place, and elsewhere, whether they worship thee in public or in private. May thy Spirit work in

them, both to will and to do of thy good pleasure, and bring them unto thee with acceptance, through the merits of him who intercedes for them at thy right hand.

May the godless, who care not for the knowledge of thy ways, have also something brought home to their souls, that may awaken them from their sleep of sin, and set them seriously to seek the Lord, and flee from the wrath to come.

May thy servants be enabled to speak a word in season to many perishing sinners, and be the honoured instruments, in thy hand, of turning them to righteousness and the way of salvation. May thy work prosper in their hands, and thy name be glorified in all the ends of the earth. O make thy Son's gospel the light of all lands, and the saving health and joy of all souls. Bless our native land, with the various kingdoms and colonies therewith connected, and all that dwell therein. from the Queen upon the throne, to the meanest subject that sits under her government. Ο grant, in thy mercy, if it be agreeable to thy wise purposes, that all may be the true and happy subjects of thy saving grace, that truth and peace may prevail amongst them; and enable them, as they have been distinguished by many outward privileges, to become equally distinguished by all the virtues of a holy and useful life.

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Our prayers, O Lord, are now before thee; grant us an answer in peace, and go forward with, and direct us, in all things aright, this day, and for ever, for Christ's sake. Amen. --Our Father, &c.

TUESDAY EVENING.

WEDNESDAY MORNING.

Bless the Queen, and all in authority, that we may live a quiet and peaceable life in all godliness and honesty. Give wise, holy, and peaceable pastors to all the churches of Christ, and holy and peaceable minds to the people. Convert the heathen and infidel nations of the world; and cause us, and all thy people, to seek first the hallowing of thy name, the coming of thy kingdom, and the doing of thy will on earth as it is done in heaven. Give us our daily bread, even all things necessary to life and godliness, and let us be therewith content. Forgive us our daily sins, and let thy love and г2

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mercy constrain us to love thee above all; and for thy sake to love our neighbours as ourselves; and in all our dealings, to do justly and mercifully, as we would have others to do by us.

Keep us from hurtful temptations; let our thoughts, affections, passions, words, and actions, be governed by thy word and Spirit to thy glory: and let our souls be so delighted in the praises of thy kingdom, thy power, and thy glory, that it may sweeten our occupations this day, and preserve us in a longing and joyful hope of the heavenly glory. ALMIGHTY GOD, the Father of our Lord Jesus Christ, who desirest not the death of a sinner, but wouldest rather that he turn from his wickedness and live, and hast declared and pronounced to thy people, being penitent, the absolution and remission of their sins; thou pardonest and absolvest all them that truly repent, and unfeignedly believe thy holy gospel. We therefore acknowledge our manifold of-

fences, whereby thou art justly displeased. In many things we have all offended thee; in pride, in impenitence, in hardness of heart, in neglect of thy word, and the means of grace, in forgetfulness of thee, and in disobedience to the commands of thy dear Son. We are all as an unclean thing, and all our righteousnesses are as filthy rags; and our iniquities as the wind, have carried us away; and we all do fade as the leaf.

But we pray thee, O Lord, enter not into judgment with thy servants. We are humbled before thee. Remember that we are but dust and ashes. Let us fall into thy hands, for thy mercies are great, and thy compassions fail not. Pardon, we beseech thee, all our sins; and give unto us true repentance, and thy Holy Spirit; that those things may please thee which we do at this present, and that the rest of our life hereafter may be pure and holy; so that at the last we may come to thy etarnal joy.

But whereas we cannot, by our best services, make any satisfaction for the sin that is past, we flee unto thy cross, O Lamb of God, who hast made there, by the one oblation of thyself, once offered, a full, perfect, and sufficient sacrifice, oblation, and satisfaction, for the sins of the whole world.

We look unto thee, who wast lifted up to draw all men unto thee; and we entreat thee

to turn and look upon us; that, after the example of thy penitent apostle, who went out and wept bitterly, we may mourn, in the bitterness of our souls, for all the evils which we have done; and may feel that godly sorrow, which worketh repentance unto salvation, not to be repented of.

O Saviour of the world, who, by thy cross and precious blood, hast redeemed us, save us, and help us, we humbly beseech thee, O Lord.

These great mercies, which we have implored for ourselves, be pleased, O God, to extend unto our fellow-creatures.

Let repentance and remission of sins be preached unto all nations in the name of thy beloved Son

Cause the wicked to forsake his way, and the unrighteous man his thoughts; and let him return unto thee, that thou mayest have mercy upon him, and abundantly pardon him.

Give thy blessing to the righteous; and with thy favourable kindness defend him, as with a shield.

May those, who profess to know thee, but in works deny thee, no longer have a name to live, while yet they are dead before thee.

Have compassion upon those who are grown lukewarm in thy service. May they be zealous and repent, and do their first works. Give them the comfort of thy help again; and stablish them with thy free Spirit.

Look especially on such as are bowed down greatly with their sins; to whom the remembrance of them is grievous, and the burden thereof intolerable. Compass them about with songs of deliverance. Give them a right understanding of themselves, and of thy threats and promises, that they may neither cast away their confidence, nor place it any where but Shut not up thy loving kindness in in thee. displeasure; but make them to hear of joy and gladness; that the bones which thou hast broken may rejoice. Deliver them from fear of the enemy: lift up the light of thy countenance upon them; and give them thy peace, which passeth all understanding.

We entreat thee, also, to accept our thanks for the blessings which we have hitherto received.

We praise thee for the comforts and protection of the past day; for we are unable to defend ourselves, and unworthy to be defended by thee.

We bless thee for providing for us a place of rest by night; for thy beloved Son, when he was upon earth, had not where to lay his head. Thou only art he who makest us continually to dwell in safety. We beseech thee, therefore, most mighty God, who art the protector of all that trust in thee, without whom nothing is strong, nothing is holy, to watch over us, and keep us, through the hours of darkness.

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Increase and multiply upon us thy mercy, from day to day; that, thou being our ruler and guide, we may so pass through things temporal, that we finally lose not the things that are eternal.

Grant this, O heavenly Father, for Jesus Christ's sake, our Lord. Amen.—Our Father, &c.

THURSDAY MORNING.

O HOLY, blessed, and glorious God, who livest and abidest for ever, we adore thee as the Sovereign Lord of heaven and earth, the Giver and Preserver of all good things.

Our voice shalt thou hear, O Lord, every morning; for every morning thy mercies towards us are renewed: great is thy faithfulness and truth.

How many of our fellow creatures, during the hours of the past night, have slept the sleep of death, and shall awake no more till the resurrection in the last day! Enable us to break through our habits of spiritual sloth and negligence; and teach us the value of time, while yet we are able to improve it. And we earnestly pray thee, O heavenly Father, in whose hands are the issues of life and death, to spare our lives, till the work is finished which thou hast given us to do.

O God, the strength of them that trust in thee, we implore thy special presence and protection through this day; not knowing what a day may bring forth; only that sufficient for each day is the evil thereof.

Be with us in what immediately lies before us. Watch over us for good; and keep us as the apple of thine eye. Make us active in the discharge of present duties. Cleanse us from our most secret faults, and keep us from presumptuous sins, lest they get the dominion over us.

Save us from the corruptions of our own hearts; from the wiles and assaults of the prince of darkness; and from the wicked practices of the world around us. Give us grace to deny ourselves, to take up our cross, and to follow Christ.

Lord of all power and might, who art the Author and Giver of all good things, graft in our hearts the love of thy name; increase in us true religion; nourish us with all goodness; and, of thy great mercy, keep us in the same, all the days of our life.

Be pleased, O Lord, to hear our supplications and prayers for our fellow-creatures in general; and especially for such as are ex-

posed to any of those evils from which we are mercifully delivered.

Sanctify thy fatherly corrections unto them, and do thou, the Father of mercies, and the God of all comfort, comfort them in all their tribulations; that they may not faint under thy afflicting hand. As their sufferings abound, let their consolations abound also: and the more the outward man decayeth, the more may they be renewed by thy grace and Holy Spirit in the inner man: that so their afflictions may be the means of working out for them a far more exceeding and eternal weight of glory.

Hear us, we humbly beseech thee, Almighty God: and as thou hast given us grace, at this time, with one accord, to make our common supplications unto thee, and dost promise, that when two or three are gathered together in thy name thou wilt grant their requests; fulfil now, O Lord, the desires and petitions of thy servants, as may be most expedient for them; granting us, in this world, knowledge of thy truth, and, in the world to come, life everlasting.—Our Father, &c.

THURSDAY EVENING.

Thou seest that we have no power of ourselves to help ourselves. Take us, therefore, we beseech thee, under the protection of thy good providence. Keep us, both outwardly in our bodies, and inwardly in our souls; that we may be defended from all adversities which may happen to the body, and from all evil thoughts which may assault and hurt the soul.

Bless us in our lying down, and in our rising up. May we remember thee on our bed; and think on thee in the night-watches; and when we awake, may we still be with thee.

Furthermore, we entreat thee, O Lord our God, to bless the whole race of mankind with all things needful for life and godliness.

Prepare thy way before the face of all people: and visit them with thy salvation.

Vouchsafe thy blessing to this kingdom; and let thy glory still dwell in our land.

Bless all who have done, or wished us good;

and reward them seven-fold into their bosoms.

Do good to those who have done, or wished us evil; and give them repentance and better minds.

Preserve the rich and prosperous from worldly pride; and the poor and needy from murmurings, envyings, and discontent.

Finally, we beseech thee, Almighty God, the fountain of all wisdom, who knowest our necessities before we ask, and our ignorance in asking, to have compassion on our infirmities; and those things which, for our unworthiness, we dare not, and, for our blindness, we cannot, ask, vouchsafe to give us, for the worthiness of thy Son, Jesus Christ, our Lord, in whose name and words we further call upon thee.—Our Father, &c.

FRIDAY MORNING.

ALMIGHTY and ever blessed God! it ever becomes us to approach thee with the voice of gratitude and praise. We desire to come to the throne of grace, in the new and living way which has been consecrated by the blood of Jesus; and to praise thee for the knowledge of salvation, through him.

Make all the dispensations of thy providence towards us, and the ordinances of grace which we enjoy, the means of promoting our deadness to the world, and the spirituality of our desires and affections, and our love and resemblance to Christ. And after having done and suffered all thy blessed will concerning us on earth, may we be united to the redeemed in heaven, who have washed their robes and made them white in the blood of

the Lamb, and who are before the throne of God, and serve him day and night in his temple! Amen.—Our Father, &c.

Accept our offerings through the beloved, who, while we are undeserving, is worthy to receive power, and riches, and wisdom, and might, and honour, and glory,

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and blessing. Indulge us now, we pray thee, with refreshing sleep; or, if this be denied, may our soul be satisfied as with marrow and fatness, and our mouth shall praise thee with joyful lips, when we remember thee on our bed, and meditate on thee in the night-watches. In the morning may we arise beneath the smiles of thy countenance; and to the Tri-une Jehovah be ascribed majesty and dominion, for ever and ever. Amen.—Our Father, &c.

Be with all the faithful stewards of thy mysteries in every place, who shall minister in thy name. Enable them rightly to divide the word of truth, giving both to saints and sinners their portion. Pardon the unworthiness of ministers and people, and vouchsafe to own thy glorious gospel, by making it effectual to the salvation of them that hear. Every spiritual and temporal mercy we request for the alone sake of Jesus Christ the righteous. Amen.—Our Father, &c.

Third Week.

SABBATH MORNING.

HOLX, holy, holy Lord God Almighty, who wast, and art, and art to come! We would enter into thy presence with grateful hearts, to bless thee for the return of this sacred day We thank thee for thy care of us through the solitude of the night, for the measure of health and strength vouchsafed to us this morning, and for the cheerful expectation of being permitted to spend this day in the sacred exercises of devotion. May it be to us a Sabbath of spiritual joy!

We bless thee that this is the day which the Lord hath made; we will rejoice and be glad in it; that thou hast revealed unto us thy holy sabbaths, and that we live in a land, in all parts of which God is publicly and solemnly worshipped on this day.

We bless thee that sabbath-liberties and opportunities are continued to us; and that we are not wishing in vain for these days of the Son of man; that our candlestick is not removed out of its place, as justly it might have been, because we have left our first love.

Give us grace to remember to keep it holy, to watch unto prayer, to keep our tongues from evil, and our feet from the paths of levity and sin.

Solemnize our minds more especially in thine outward courts. May we remember that thou art great, and art greatly to be feared; that thou art a spirit, and requirest those who worship thee to worship thee in spirit and in truth. Pour out upon us, and upon all who shall assemble with us, the spirit of grace and of supplication. May we not come under the condemnation of those who worship thee with their lips, whilst their hearts are far from thee; who bow the knee, but render not the homage of a grateful mind.

Enable us also, we beseech thee, to receive the public instructions of this day with a teachable spirit. As new-born babes, may we desire the sincere milk of the word, that we may grow thereby. Give us the hearing ear, and the understanding heart. May we listen to its doctrines, precepts, and instructions with fixed attention, with candour, impartiality, and self-application.

May we find it good to draw near unto thee. May our hearts be filled with sacred joy, as we draw water out of the wells of salvation. To this end, we entreat thee to shed abroad in our hearts the love of Christ. May we rejoice in Him, as our Advocate with thee, the Father, through whom we have access with boldness to a throne of grace.

Bestow, O Lord, an abundant blessing upon the labours of thy ministering servants, in this and in every place. Increase their zeal and energy, their faith and hope, their love and devotion. And forasmuch as they whom thou hast called to labour amongst the heathen in distant lands, need a more especial blessing, we beseech thee to bestow it upon them.

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Give them all the grace and strength which their trials and difficulties demand. And O grant that the fruit of their labours may soon appear, in a more abundant harvest of Christian converts. Add to thy church daily such as shall be saved.

Look in tender compassion on all who are prevented by sickness from uniting with thy people in the public services of this day. May they worship thee acceptably in their closets, and on their beds; and may their meditation of thee be sweet.

These prayers and praises we humbly offer up, in the name, and through the mediation, of thy Son our Lord, Jesus Christ.—Our Father, &c.

SABBATH EVENING.

BLESSED Lord, give us grace to review with gratitude the mercies which we have this day received. Praised be thy holy name for every Sabbath we enjoy. May the prayers we present, and the praises we offer, be always acceptable in thy sight, O Lord, our strength and our Redeemer.

It is of thy great goodness that we have been permitted this day to engage in the services of the sanctuary, and to listen to the instructions of thy word. How many of our fellow-creatures have been prevented, by sickness and calamity, or by their own carelessness and folly, from going up to thy temple. O that we may thankfully receive thy blessings, and diligently improve them.

Give us grace to be always mindful of thy goodness, and to show forth thy praise in our whole life and conversation. thy word be choked with the cares, or the riches, or the pleasures of this life; but may we understand it, and keep it, and bring forth fruit with patience.

We confess, O Lord, our ignorance, as well as our guilt. Open thou our understandings, that we may understand the scriptures. Let the word of Christ dwell in us richly in all May we not be carried about with wisdom. divers and strange doctrines, but may our hearts be established by thy grace. We know that if thou leave us to ourselves, we shall greatly err: grant, therefore that the Spirit of truth may guide us into all truth, and cause us to hold fast the form of sound words which we have heard, in faith and love, which is in Christ Jesus.

Give us, we beseech thee, an increase of faith, hope, and love. May our faith be strong in Christ, to the honour of thy name, and the salvation of our souls. May our hope be sure and steadfast, entering into that within the veil. May our love, as a holy flame, purify our hearts, and shine forth in our lives.

Command thy blessing, O Lord, to rest abundantly on the labours of thy ministers. May they not have laboured this day in vain, nor have spent their strength for nought. May the gospel of our Lord Jesus Christ have free course and be glorified. Increase his church, and enlarge his kingdom. May all

nations come and worship before him, and magnify his name.

We pray also for thy servant, the pastor of the congregation of which we are members. Let not his ministry be a savour of death unto death to any, but a savour of life unto life to all. While he is watering others, may he be watered himself by the dew of thy Holy Spirit. Give him the deep and thankful joy of knowing that his spiritual children are walking in the truth.

Bless, gracious Lord, our dear relations and friends, and bestow upon them the blessings which we have asked for ourselves. By thy great mercy defend us from all perils and dangers of this night: may we lie down in peace, and rest in safety. And when our Sabbaths shall have ended on earth, may we enjoy an eternal Sabbath in heaven and rejoice for ever in the love of Jesus Christ our Saviour. Amen.—Our Father, &c.

MONDAY MORNING.

FATHER of mercies and God of all comfort, we thank thee for having made thyself known by the most gracious names; they encourage helpless and guilty creatures, to hope, to believe, to pray, and to rejoice.

Blessed be thy name for the various proofs which thou hast given of thy mercy; O Lord, the earth is full of them: although wickedness dwelleth in it, although it is inhabited by a seed of evil doers, yet through thy goodness, it abounds with the means of comfort, and enjoyment!

We have brought sin into the world, and sin hath brought suffering into it; but thou, compassionate God! (against whom that sin is committed) hast stored the world with the means of relief. Thou mightest have abandoned man to the evils he brought on himself; but in thy great mercy, thou hast provided remedies for us, and hast shown us where to find, and how to apply them.

We thank thee, O Lord, for every thing which thou hast mercifully provided to remove pain, to rescue us from immediate death, to give length to our days, and comfort to ourselves, and those to whom we are dear. Blessed be God for all those medicinal virtues, which thou hast taught man to discover and apply for the relief of them that suffer pain or sickness. How manifold are the instances of thy goodness! How numerous are the signs of thy compassion! Earth, air, and sea, not only displaying thy majesty, but showing forth the tokens of thy mercy. O that men would

therefore praise the Lord for his goodness, and declare the wonders which he doeth for the children of men.

But how shall we find words to express the mercy, which thou hast manifested in the redemption of mankind ! By our sin, we have not only brought pain and distress upon ourselves, but we have exposed ourselves to thy righteous anger, and to a sentence of everlasting banishment from thy presence. But to prevent this thou hast appeared for us: rich in mercy, as well as infinite in wisdom, thou hast furnished the means of our being saved from all the dreadful consequences of sin.

And, O great God, how astonishing are these means! Could it ever have entered into the heart of man to conceive, that thou shouldest so love the world, as to give thine only begotten Son for its salvation! O how shall we raise a song of praise which shall fully set forth that love divine, which hath been shown in God's being manifest in the flesh; in his submitting to sufferings, and expiring on the cross, to deliver a race of rebels from the punishment due to them: O Lord God Almighty, what grace is this! Bless the Lord, O our souls, and all that is within us praise his holy name; and let every creature which is in heaven, and on the earth, and under the earth, and in the sea, praise the God of our salvation.

Here would we fix our thoughts, O merciful God. Here let them dwell, higher they cannot rise. Let the recollection of thy mercy, so unspeakably great, abide with us all the day: rejoicing our hearts; sweetening our labours; allaying our fears; regulating our lives; reconciling us to sufferings; and securing us against snares. Let it employ our thoughts, and influence us in all our conduct towards our fellow-creatures; inclining us to charity, to peace, to gentleness, to patience, and to forbearance.

Let none of the enjoyments of this day so sensualize our hearts, as to make us forget Him who died for us. While we are partaking of the bounties of Providence, may we call to mind the bloody sweat, the crown of thorns, and the cross of a suffering Saviour. And may we lift up a thankful heart to him, through whom the curse, to which we were exposed, is removed; and the blessings, which we forfeited, are restored.

Enable us, O Lord, to walk this day as the disciples of Jesus; and if we are enabled so to walk, we may composedly leave every thing with thee. Let us go about the duties of our calling in a sweet and peaceful reliance on the care which thou art pleased to take of thy servants. Thou art able to save us from the greatest evils: and thou art willing to extend thy providential regard to the least things,

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in which our happiness is concerned. Help us then, O Lord, to look to thee as our Sovereign to rule over us, and our Friend to protect us, through Jesus Christ, our blessed Advocate with God; on whose intercession we build all our hopes of acceptance with thee. —Our Father, &c.

MONDAY EVENING.

O THOU who art the God of all the families of the earth, who didst favourably notice Abraham's commanding his children and his household after him to keep the way of the Lord, be thou present with us now, and enable us by thy Holy Spirit, and through thy Son's intercession, to worship thee in spirit and in truth.

Gracious Lord, we confess, that, in the day that is past, by vain thoughts, by idle words, by sinful indulgences, we have grieved thy Spirit, and incurred thy displeasure. Our only refuge is in thy promised mercy in Christ Jesus; we cast ourselves wholly on that mercy, fixing our hopes on our Saviour's cross; we confess our guilt, and entreat that the blood of Christ may cleanse us from all sin.

Give us, we beseech thee, the comfortable

assurance that our sins are forgiven. Plentifully impart to us the gifts of the Spirit, that we may bring forth love, joy, peace, gentleness, goodness, forbearance, and temperance. Grant that we may so copy the example of our Saviour, that we may be the epistles of Christ, known and read of all men, and bear clear evidence of our own salvation. Teach us so to live, that we may glorify thee. that all now kneeling together may pass from death to life, and love and serve thee unfeignedly. Be present with us in our more retired devotions; praying to our Father which is in secret, may we find his presence and blessing ever near us.

Bless, O Lord, all who are near and dear to us. Many beloved relatives and friends are now absent from us, but thou art with them. and all their wants are known to thee. Give them thy grace, ever guide them here by thy counsel, and may none of them be wanting in thy heavenly kingdom. We pray for the Queen, and all in authority; Lord, may their councils be ordered by thee. Give, we beseech thee, to all ministers of Jesus Christ every where, true knowledge and understanding of thy word, and may they set it forth in their lives accordingly. Make them wise to win souls. Lord, call forth and send out many faithful labourers to the work of the

ministry, and cause the Gentiles to come unto thee, and the distant isles to seek thy light.

Thanks be unto thee, holy Lord God, for all thy goodness towards us: how multiplied are thy mercies, how excellent thy lovingkindness! We bless thee, for thy long-suffering towards us, for the infinite mercy of redeeming love, for the knowledge of salvation, and light of thy truth, for protection from every danger during the night, and provision for all our wants by day. Accept these our prayers and praises, which we offer up in and through Jesus Christ, our only Mediator and Advocate. Amen.—Our Father, &c.

TUESDAY MORNING.

WE desire to bless thee, O Lord our God, for thy fatherly care through the past night, and for the returning light and the returning comforts of another day. Thou art making the outgoings of every morning and of every evening to rejoice over us. Great is thy faithfulness, and thy mercy never faileth. Justly mightest thou have made our beds our graves, and our awakening this morning, to be in outer darkness. And instead of being permitted, as we now are, to lift up our souls

unto thee in prayer, we might at this moment have been lifting up our eyes in hell, enduring the torments of the worm that shall never die, and of the fire that shall never be quench-It is of thy mercy, O Lord, that we have ed. not been consumed; it is because thy compassions flow and fail not, that we are still in the land of living men and in the place of hope. O let grace be given to every one of us, that we may all turn to our stronghold while we are yet prisoners of hope; that we may all seek the Lord while he is to be found, and call upon him while he is near. We rejoice to know that thou art nigh unto them that call upon thee, unto all that call upon thee in truth; and that thou hast not said unto any of the seed of Jacob, Seek ye my face, in vain. We would now, O Lord, worship thee, who art a Spirit, in spirit and in truth; and we would now seek thy face and thy favour with our whole heart. O hide not thy face from us: lift upon us the light of thy reconciled countenance; cause thy face to shine upon us; and regard us with that favour and love which thou bearest to thine own; that we may be glad with the gladness of thy people, and triumph with thine inheritance.

We confess before thee, O Lord, our manifold unworthiness, our multiplied transgressions, and our aggravated guilt. We have all sinned against thee, and deserve nothing

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but everlasting banishment from thy presence. Father, we have sinned against thee, and in thy sight, and we are not worthy to be called thy children. We are, indeed, utterly unworthy of so high a privilege; but behold what manner of love the Father hath bestowed upon us, that we, who are by nature the children of disobedience, should be called the children of God. We are, indeed, unworthy, but worthy is the Lamb that was slain, and, blessed be God, he was slain for us. We have indeed sinned against thee and come short of thy glory; but, adored be thine infinite mercy, we have an Advocate with God the Father, even Jesus Christ the righteous, who is now at thy right hand pleading the merits of his righteousness for our acceptance, and the efficacy of his blood for the pardon of our sins, and the purification of our hearts. See, then, O God, our shield; look upon the face of thine Anointed, in whom thou seest no iniquity in Jacob, and no perversity in Israel; and accept us in thy beloved Son, in whom thou art ever well pleased.

We desire, O Lord, to commit ourselves this day to thy keeping and care. Do thou watch over us continually for good. Do thou protect us in our going out and in our coming in; preserve us from all evil; strengthen us unto all duty; enable us to acknowledge thee in all our ways, and to set thee the Lord

continually before us, that so we may walk in thy fear all the day long.

We desire, O Lord, to remember at thy throne of grace, all with whom we are connected, whether by the ties of nature, friendship, or affection. May our friends be the friends of the Redeemer, and may they find in him a friend that sticketh closer than a brother. May our relations belong to that family which is named after Christ. May our benefactors receive out of thy fulness, and grace for grace. May our enemies obtain forgiveness through the blood of sprinkling, and may we also be enabled, even from the heart, to forgive them. Let the widow and the fatherless share thy tender pity. Sanctify the afflictions of the afflicted, and prepare the dving for their latter end.

And now, O Lord, we would go forward in thy strength, making mention of thy righteousness, and of thine only. And unto him who is able to keep us from falling, and to present us faultless before thy presence, with exceeding joy, we would ascribe all glory, and honour, and praise, world without end. Amen.—Our Father, &c.

TUESDAY EVENING.

ALMIGHTY God, Father of our Lord Jesus Christ, Maker of all things, Judge of all men; we acknowledge and bewail our manifold sins and wickedness, which we, from time to time, most grievously have committed, by thought, word, and deed, against thy divine Majesty.

Grant that we may love the things which thou commandest, and desire that which thou dost promise; that so, among the sundry and manifold changes of the world, our hearts may surely there be fixed, where true joys are to be found. Dispose us, by all the means of grace we enjoy, to attain that everlasting salvation which thou hast promised.

Teach us, O Lord, so to number our days, that we may apply our hearts unto wisdom: that we may press forward toward the prize of the high calling that is before us; with faith and patience, with humility and meek ness, with mortification and self-denial, with charity and constant perseverance to the end; that so, when we shall depart this life, we may sleep in the Lord, and at the general resurrection in the last day, we may receive that blessing which thy beloved Son shall then confer upon all that truly love and fear thee.

Take us, O Lord, we beseech thee, into thy protection this night, and by thy great mercy defend us from all the perils and dangers of it.

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We make our humblest supplications to thee for all our benefactors, friends, and relations, and also for our very enemies; let thy fatherly hand be ever over them, and so lead them in the knowledge and obedience of thy word, that in the end they may obtain everlasting life. Look with an eye of pity and compassion upon all those who are in any way afflicted in mind, body, or estate; give them patience under all their sufferings, and in thy due time a happy issue out of all their afflictions.

And as we pray unto thee, O God, for ourselves and others, so we desire to bless and praise thy holy name, for all thy goodness and loving-kindness to us and to all men. We give thee hearty thanks for our preservation during the past day, and during the rest of our lives from innumerable accidents and dangers; for the comforts and conveniences, as well as the necessaries of life: but, above all, we praise thee for our redemption by the death and passion of our Saviour Christ, who did humble himself even to the death of the cross, for us miserable sinners, who lay in darkness, and in the shadow of death, that he might make us the children of God, and exalt us to everlasting life. Teach us to express our thankfulness, by submitting ourselves entirely to thy holy will and pleasure, and by studying

to serve thee in true holiness and righteousness all the days of our life.

Finally, O God, grant that the consideration of what thou art, and what we ourselves are, may both humble and lay us low before thee, and also stir up in us the strongest and most ardent aspirations towards thee. We desire to resign and give up ourselves to the conduct of thy Holy Spirit, both this night and all the days and nights of our lives. Lead us in thy truth, and teach us, for thou art the God of our salvation. Guide us with thy counsel while here we are below, and afterwards receive us into thy glory. Accept, O Lord, of these our prayers and praises, in and through the mediation of Jesus Christ, our blessed Saviour and Redeemer. And unto him who is able to keep us from falling, and to present us faultless before thy presence, with exceeding joy, we would ascribe all glory, and honour, and praise, world without end. Amen.-Our Father, &c.

WEDNESDAY MORNING.

WE do here present ourselves this morning before thy glorious Majesty, most blessed Lord God, desiring to pay unto thee that tri-

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bute of homage and service, of prayer and praise, which is so justly due. We desire to approach thee in such a manner, that thou mayest mercifully accept both us and our services, at the hands of Jesus Christ. In him thou art a God gracious and merciful, slow to anger and of great kindness, even to the chief of sinners; in him thou art reconciled to those who deserve nothing but to be forsaken and abhorred by We acknowledge that to us belong thee. shame and confusion of face; our sins have been so multiplied, that we might well expect thy judgment and fiery indignation; and if thou shouldst be extreme to mark what is done amiss, we could not escape the curses of thy holy law.

But, O gracious Father, regard not what

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we have done against thy Majesty; but rather regard what our blessed Saviour has done for our souls: consider not what we have made ourselves; but what he is made of thee. And O that Christ may our God. unto us. be to every one of us (what he is to all thy faithful people) wisdom, and righteousness, and sanctification, and redemption! Let his precious blood cleanse us from all our sins; and let the grace of thy Holy Spirit renew and sanctify our souls. Righteous Father, subdue, we pray thee, our iniquities, and mortify our lusts; quicken us to all the duties of thy holy service, and enable us to perform them with profit and delight. O let not sin reign in our mortal bodies, that we should obey it in the lusts thereof. Let there be no sin in us which is not felt and hated, bewailed and resisted by us; let us approve our very hearts to thee, the Searcher of them; and let our ways be pleasing in thy sight.

O teach us to know thee our God; and enable us to do thy will, as we ought to do. Give us hearts to fear thee, and to love thee; cause us to live in thee, and to adhere with faithfulness unto thee. Let no temptations draw us, nor any tribulations drive us from thee; but let all thy dispensations to us be received as messengers of thy love to our souls; and let all thy dealings with us bring us nearer to thy blessed self, and make us fitter р 9

for thy heavenly kingdom. Quicken us, O Lord, in our dulness; that, instead of dishonouring thee by our lifeless and listless services, we may abound in thy work, and be fervent in spirit, serving the Lord. Make us also faithful in all our intercourse with our neighbours. Make us ready to do good, and to bear evil; make us just and kind, merciful and meek, peaceable and patient, sober and temperate, humble and self-denying, inoffensive and exemplary in our conduct: that so, glorifying thee here upon earth, we may, at our departure hence, be received into the joy of our Lord, and be for ever glorified in thy heavenly kingdom.

O thou that hast kept us alive to this day, and hast refreshed us during the night season, renew thy mercy to us together with this morning's light; thou that makest the outgoings of the morning and evening to rejoice, lift up the light of thy countenance upon us, and make us glad with the tokens of thy love; and as thou art ever present with us, O make us ever sensible of thy presence, that we may duly remember thee in all our ways, and wisely demean ourselves in all our affairs. Be with us, good Lord, at our going out and our coming in; and let thy grace follow us this day, and all the days of our life.

O never leave us, never, never forsake us; but be our guide unto death, in death our

comfort, and after death our everlasting portion. O hear us from heaven, thy dwellingplace; and, when thou hearest, have mercy; forgive the sins of our persons, and the sins of our prayers; and do more for us, than we are worthy to expect at thy hands; for his sake, who alone is worthy: in whose comprehensive words we sum up all our desires, Our Father, &c.

WEDNESDAY EVENING.

O LORD, the infinite, incomprehensible God, who wast before all, art above all, and will for ever be the same, thou hast heaven for thy throne, and the earth for thy footstool. Thou art here and every-where present; thou compassest our path, and our lying down, and art thoroughly acquainted with all our ways. Thou searchest our hearts, and triest our reins; thou knowest the dulness and hardness, the vanity and deceitfulness of our hearts; thou seest with what difficulty we can bring our souls into a holy frame, and keep them in a state fit to attend upon thy heavenly Majesty. We were born in sin, and in sin have we lived; daily have we added sin to sin, and have made ourselves children of wrath still

more by practice than we were by nature: every day of our lives have we transgressed thy laws, abused thy mercies, tempted thy patience, despised thy goodness, offended thee more, even for thy forbearance with us; and made the very abundance of thy grace an encouragement to continue in our sins. O thou whom we have so greatly provoked, what must we not expect if thou shouldest enter into judgment with us? How justly mightest thou withdraw thy tender mercies from us. and pour out upon us thy wrath and indignation to the uttermost! How justly mightest thou leave us to feel what an evil and bitter thing it is to trespass against thee; and make us to experience the same, in that place of torment, where is weeping, and wailing, and gnashing of teeth, and from whence there is no redemption.

But thou art a God of wonderful patience to bear with sinners; and a God of infinite goodness and mercy to forgive them, when they are truly penitent. Thou hast said, that if the wicked forsake his way, and the unrighteous man his thoughts, and return to the Lord, thou wilt have mercy upon him, and abundantly pardon: we humbly beg, therefore that thou wilt be graciously pleased to stretch forth thy powerful hand, and to loose the chains of sin wherewith we are tied and bound. Let it be thy good pleasure to

deliver us from every weight of sin, and from every yoke of bondage; that our souls may be fitted to serve thee with that sincerity and readiness and gladness, which thou requirest of thy people. O help us so to see and feel, so to hate and bewail, so to confess and forsake our sins, that we may have a wellgrounded hope of thy forgiveness, and a comfortable persuasion that thou hast accepted us in the Son of thy love.

And for his sake, grant thou us, O Lord, an increase of thy grace, and such aids of thy Holy Spirit, as may enable us to mortify our sins, and fit us for all the duties of thy ser-Make us, O our God, to serve thee vice. sincerely, without hypocrisy; cheerfully, without dulness; universally, without partiality; and constantly, without falling away, or being weary of well-doing. Thou art not weary in doing us good: O let us never be weary in doing thee service. But as thou hast pleasure in the prosperity of thy servants, so let us take pleasure in the services of our Lord, and abound in thy work, and in thy love and praise evermore.

O fill up all that is wanting, and reform whatever is amiss in us, and perfect that which concerns us; making us such in our hearts, and in our lives, that we may obtain peace in our souls, and be made partakers of thy heavenly glory. And be thou pleased to

grant us now, out of the riches of thy grace, the comfortable sense of thy gracious acceptance of us, and of thy merciful intentions towards us. O speak peace to our consciences, and say to each of our souls, I am thy salvation; that so we may look upon thee as our reconciled God and Father in Christ Jesus.

In his great name and prevailing mediation we enlarge our petitions in behalf of the whole race of mankind. O that all the ends of the world may remember themselves, and turn unto the Lord, and see the salvation of our God! Do good, O God, in thy good pleasure, unto Zion, and build thou the walls of Jerusalem.

Continue thy mercies to this guilty land, whereof we are sinful members. Teach us to know the meaning of thy dispensations toward us; and help us to improve by all thy dealings with us. O turn all our hearts to thee, as the heart of one man; and reform all our lives, according to the holy pattern and precepts of our Lord; that thou mayest cause thine anger towards us to cease, and mayest go on still to take charge of us, and never leave nor forsake us.

And as thou hast been good and kind to us during the past day, and throughout our whole lives, for which we desire, O Lord, humbly and thankfully to adore thy name, so we beg that we may experience the continu-

ance of thy goodness to us, and of thy fatherly care over us, this present night. O preserve and defend, and bless and keep us, that no evil may befall us, nor any plague come nigh our dwelling.

Give us sleep and rest to refresh and strengthen us for thy service, and for the performance of all our duties: and prepare us, O Lord, for our last sleep in death, and for that great account that we must give at the judgment-seat of Christ.

O instruct and assist us in that great work of preparation for our everlasting state, that we may, in this only time of preparation, finish the work which thou hast given us to do, before the night of death overtake us, wherein we cannot work; that whenever thou shalt be pleased to give us the summons of death, we may find nothing to do but to die, and cheerfully resign our spirits into thy gracious hands.

Hear us, we entreat thee, through the riches of thy grace, and the worthiness of thy dear Son, in whose merits alone we trust, and to whom, together with thyself and the Holy Ghost, the one God of our salvation, be all praise, and honour, and glory, ascribed by us, and by all thy people, from this time forth for evermore. Amen.—Our Father, &c.

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THURSDAY MORNING

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THURSDAY EVENING.

Make us sensible of our weakness, that we may be strong in the grace that is in Christ Jesus. Secure us from all those temptations which in every state of life arise from a wicked world and a wicked heart. May we, under the belief of thy all-seeing eye and thy awful tribunal, discharge faithfully Q2 the duties arising from our various relations in life. And in this family, may we keep sin from our tabernacle, and dwell together in unity and love. We present to thee the evening sacrifice of thanksgiving for the preservations, the supplies, and the indulgences of the day; and into thy hands we commit our spirits and our bodies for the night. Cover us with thy feathers, and under thy wing may we trust; and in every future period may thy truth be our shield and buckler. And to the blessed and only Potentate, the King of kings, and Lord of lords, be honour and power everlasting. Amen.—Our Father, &c.

FRIDAY MORNING.

ALMIGHTY and most merciful Father! Thou who art of purer eyes than to behold iniquity, whose government is righteous, and whose law is holy, just, and good, how may a guilty sinner presume to approach thee? To thee all things are naked and open, and our defilement and unworthiness are fully exposed to thy view. We have sinned against thee, who hast every claim to our love and our obedience; we have sinned against thee, our Creator, our Preserver, and our kindest Benefactor. If we justify ourselves, our own mouth will condemn us; if we say we are perfect, it will also prove us perverse. For innumerable evils have compassed us about; our iniquities have taken hold upon us, so that we are not able to look up: they are more than the hairs of our heads, and therefore our hearts faileth us.

Thy law, O most holy and righteous God. condemns us. It denounceth death against every soul of man that doth evil. It declares that the wages of sin is death. But we have often transgressed thy holy law, and our transgressions have been accompanied with circumstances of great aggravation. When we look back upon our life, we see that we have failed throughout, and have come short of thy glory. We have lived, and thought, and acted, as if thou, the God who hast made us, hadst no claim to our grateful affections, and hadst no right to rule over us, and in us. Our whole soul has been disordered. All our thoughts, our affections, our desires, and our pursuits, have been alienated from thee. In opposition to thy command, to seek first the kingdom of God and his righteousness, have we given our hearts to the vanities and the pleasures of this evil world.

O God, we adore thy patience, and forbearance, and long-suffering. It is of thy mercy, O Lord, that we are not consumed, and because thy compassions fail not. Thy compassions have been multiplied towards us every moment: thou hast made goodness and mercy to surround and to follow us; and, above all, thou hast sent unto us the Word of thy salvation, to assure us "that the saying is faithful, and worthy of all acceptation, that Jesus Christ came into the world to save sinners." But it is against the multitude of thy mercies that we have sinned; and it is against the love that passeth knowledge that we have hardened our hearts. Yet, O Lord, we are not cast from thy presence! Oh! there is yet a way of deliverance, there is yet hope, for us guilty sinners; may it be opened upon us, by thy grace made known in the gospel. Thou desirest not sacrifice, else would we give it? thou delightest not in burnt-offering.-The sacrifices of God are a broken spirit: a broken and a contrite heart, O God, thou wilt not despise.

Porsake not, O most merciful Father, the work of thy own hands. Though that work is now debased by sin, and though we have destroyed ourselves, yet in thee may our help be found. Oh! look upon us, in our helplessness, and in our sins, and say unto us, Live. Turn away thy face from our sins, and blot out all our iniquities. Oh! magnify thy power and thy grace in our deliverance! Make it appear, in thy work upon our souls, what great things the God of salvation can

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accomplish; and that where sin has abounded, thy grace can much more abound. Return, O Lord, and deliver our souls. Save us from the guilt and the punishment, from the power and pollution of our sins. Did not thy own Word assure us that the blood of Jesus Christ, the Son of God, cleanseth from all sin, we could have no hope towards thee. Through its great efficacy, and for the sake of thy own great mercy, may it please thee to fulfil in us thy precious promise—" Though your sins be as scarlet, they shall be as snow; though they be red like crimson, they shall be as wool."

O God of all grace! that keepest mercy for thousands, hast thou not a blessing for us—a blessing for our perishing souls? We cast ourselves, burdened with sin, and undone in ourselves, on thy mercy. For the sake of thy dear Son, for the sake of his atoning death, and ever-living intercession, grant us thy salvation. And whatever thou withholdest, O deny us not that saving grace, which can soften and renew our hearts, and subdue all its affections and desires to our only Lord and Saviour. Amen.

FRIDAY EVENING.

Oh! may we win Christ, and be found in him, not having our own righteousness, which is of the law, but that which is through the faith of Christ. May it be given unto us to believe on his name, and to receive him, as made of God unto us, wisdom, and righteousness, and sanctification, and redemption. May our views of his grace and his glory become brighter and brighter, till the day when we humbly hope to be made like him, and to see him as he is. Enable us by thy Spirit, O most merciful Father, to place all our confidence in him, and to continue to make his sacrifice, and righteousness, the ground of our hope, even till the end.

We bless thee, O God, for the peace and the joy which the cross of Christ has communicated to our hearts. And we rejoice that, by the cross of Christ, thou hast become our reconciled God and Father in him. O Lord, we will praise thee; though thou wast angry with us, thine anger is turned away, and thou comfortest us. Behold, God is our salvation;

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we will trust and not be afraid: for the Lord Jehovah is our strength and our song, he also is become our salvation. Our souls doth magnify the Lord, and our spirits hath rejoiced in God our Saviour. For He that is mighty hath done to us great things; and holy is his name. May the joy of the Lord thus continue to be our strength. May he who, we would humbly trust, has, by his grace, translated us out of the kingdom of darkness into the kingdom of his dear Son, keep us from falling, and enable us to be faithful unto death. While we daily look for salvation to the blood of the cross, and to that only, may we be enabled to adorn the doctrine of our Saviour, by abounding in all the fruits of righteousness. May we indeed be crucified with Christ, nevertheless may we live; yet not us, but Christ that liveth in us: and may the life which we now live in the flesh be by the faith of the Son of God, who loved us, and who gave himself for 118.

And now, O most merciful Father, what wait we for? our hope is in thee. And unto him that is able to keep us from falling, and to present us faultless before the presence of his glory with exceeding joy, to the only wise God, our Saviour, be glory and majesty, and dominion and power, now and for ever! Amen.

SATURDAY MORNING.

But whilst we supplicate the assistance of thy spirit that we may live as rational creatures, as creatures endowed with understanding to discern, and conscience to feel, the difference between good and evil, we beseech thee, O Lord, to impress our hearts with a sense of the love and mercy expressed in the agony which our blessed Redeemer underwent to obtain the salvation of a world of sinners. In the conviction of such loving-

kindness, we pray for humble and contrite spirits. Pity us, O Lord; turn thy merciful eyes towards us, most merciful Redeemer; only speak the word and we shall be whole.

Grant us to have perpetually present to our minds, the excellency of thy love, the merits of thy sacrifice, and the bitterness of thy Man, we know, doth not live by passion. bread alone, but by thy heavenly word and doctrine. Lord, let us ever hunger and thirst after such divine food; that, imitating thy virtues, we may dwell in the pleasures of thy kingdom. May thy holy word be unto us both life and health, a means of sanctification and spiritual growth; so being united to thee by the bonds of a strong faith, an holy hope, and a never failing charity, we may pass from receiving thy word to beholding thy face in the glories of immortality. Amen.-Our Father. &c.

SATURDAY EVENING.

Is it to poor mortals thou speakest thus, O Lord? Is it to sinful worms! O what condescension! Enter within our door, heavenly guest! Take up thine abode in our hearts. We are not worthy that thou shouldest come under our roof, but since thou art willing to enter, let it be a habitation for thyself.

And do thou, most glorious God and Saviour, not only dwell, but reign in us. O lift up thy mighty hand against every rebellious inclination of our hearts, and subdue every disposition, which opposeth itself to thy will.

Let us never provoke thee to leave us, O thou, our best friend, by the allowance of any unholy temper, or the neglect of any duty. Let us be always listening to thy word; always obedient to the motions of thy Holy Spirit, always watching against sin; and always praying to be kept from falling into temptation.

Thou hast conducted us to the conclusion of another week, for all the mercies of which we desire to be thankful. So teach us to number our days, that we may apply our hearts unto wisdom. Our last week, our last day, our last hour, must come: O that we may stand always ready for it.

Should we live to see another Sabbath, may

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we enter on the day with fervent desires to profit by it. Prepare our bodies, O Lord, by refreshing sleep, to attend the services of thy house. Prepare our hearts, by thine Holy Spirit, to worship thee with reverence, and to obtain great edification from the ministry of thy word. May we look forward to the Sabbath with earnest desire, and may the prospect of a day spent in thy courts, be always delightful to us.

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Fourth Week.

SABBATH MORNING.

O LORD, our Heavenly Father, Almighty and Everlasting God, we bless thee for defending us through the perils and dangers of the night past, and for bringing us in safety to the beginning of this day.

What thanks and praise are due unto thee for calling off our thoughts and pursuits from the things of this vain world; and for setting before us the things of a better!

Our song shall be always of thy lovingkindness, O Lord; and with our mouth we will daily show forth thy praise. Thou art worthy to be praised, and had in honour: for great and marvellous are the works which thou hast done.

We confess, O God, that we have greatly polluted many of thy Sabbaths, by doing our own ways, by seeking our own pleasure, and by speaking our own words. And thou mightest justly visit us for our iniquity, by causing them altogether to cease among us.

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But thou art a merciful God, full of compassion, long-suffering, and of great pity; sparing us when we deserve punishment, and in the midst of judgment remembering mercy. And we beseech thee, O Lord, still to spare us, and to have mercy upon us. Let the voice of Jesus Christ, thy Son our Saviour, be heard in our behalf. For his sake, look down upon us, and grant us thy blessing.

May we enter upon the duties of this day, as those who know not but that it may be our last; remembering, that for this and every Sabbath we must render an account in the day of judgment; and that to whom much hath been given, of them will much be required.

Of thy bountiful goodness, therefore, keep us, we beseech thee, from all things that may hurt us; that we, being ready both in body and soul, may cheerfully accomplish those things which thou wouldst have done. Forasmuch as without thee we are not able to please thee, mercifully grant, that thy Holy Spirit may, in all things, direct and rule our hearts.

O thou, who art greatly to be feared in the assembly of thy saints, and to be had in reverence of all them that are round about thee, prepare us, especially, for the solemnities of thy public worship.

How amiable are thy tabernacles, O Lord of Hosts! Blessed is the man whom thou choosest, and causest to approach thee in them. May we account a day in thy service better than a thousand passed in forgetfulness of thee; and always be glad, when it is said to us, Let us go to the house of the Lord.

Thither may we go, this morning, with joyful feet, looking for thy loving-kindness in the midst of thy temple, joining thy people in the praise that awaiteth thee there; praying unto thee in the Spirit; hearing and receiving thy word, and faithfully performing our vows. And while they watch for souls, as those that must give ac-

count, grant that their words may be so heard and received, that they may be able to give account of their people with joy, and not with grief.

Let the hearts of those rejoice who seek thee faithfully in thy sacred ordinances.

Comfort such as mourn in Zion. Give them beauty for ashes; the oil of joy for mourning; and the garment of praise for the spirit of heaviness.

Let those who are hungering and thirsting after righteousness be filled.

Let the poor and needy give thanks unto thy name. May thy blessed Gospel still be preached to them; and may they know the joyful sound thereof, and be glad; esteeming it dearer to them than all the treasures of this world.

Grant unto those who are trusting to themselves that they are righteous, that they may feel and lament the iniquity which cleaveth even to their most holy things.

And may such as have hitherto drawn nigh unto thee with their mouths, while their heart is far from thee, be led to see, that so long as they retain iniquity in their hearts, thou wilt not hear them; but regardest their prayers as an abomination.

Thus may it please thee to satisfy all with the plenteousness of thy house, and to suffer none to return empty away.

Grant these and all our requests, for thy mercy's sake in Christ Jesus, our only Lord and Saviour. Amen.—Our Father, &c.

SABBATH EVENING.

O LORD, our heavenly Father, High and Mighty, King of kings, Lord of lords, who dost from thy throne behold all the dwellers upon earth, most heartily we beseech thee with thy favour to behold this thy family, whom thy good providence hath preserved to the evening of this sacred day.

Mercifully accept our humble thanks for all the blessings which thou hast bestowed upon us. We praise thee for that thou hast vouchsafed to call us to the knowledge of thy grace and faith in thee; and for continuing to bless us with all spiritual blessings in Christ Jesus. We beg thy blessing on all schools and seminaries of sound learning, and religious education, particularly on the universities of this land, that useful knowledge and true religion may continue among us for all generations.

We likewise pray thee in behalf of all the ministers of thy gospel; especially those of our own church. Prosper them in their work of faith, and labour of love. And grant that many may appear as their hope, and joy, and crown of rejoicing, in the presence of the Lord Jesus Christ, at his coming.

Comfort and support all those who are labouring among heathen nations, and are endeavouring to bring them to the knowledge of the truth. For Zion's sake let them not hold their peace; and for Jerusalem's sake, let them not rest, until the righteousness thereof go forth as brightness; and the salvation thereof as a lamp that burneth; till the

Gather together thy elect out of every kindred, and tongue, and people, and nation; and bring them from the east, and from the west, and from the north, and from the south.

Take us, and all whom we love, this night, to the arms of thy mercy: and, as thou hast promised in thy holy word, give unto us the blessing of eternal life; and make us partakers of thy heavenly kingdom.

Grant these our requests, O merciful Father, for Jesus Christ's sake; in whose name we offer up these and all our petitions to the throne of grace; and in whose words we further call upon thee: Our Father, &c.

MONDAY MORNING.

O MOST merciful God, by whom the world is governed and preserved, we give thee humble thanks, for preserving us from the dangers of the past night; gratefully we acknowledge our dependence upon thee, for all the necessaries, comforts, and blessings of our lives,---

And now we commend ourselves, our prayers, and all belonging to us, to thee, our Creator and Redeemer, believing that thou orderest all things for thy honour, and for the good of those that depend upon thee: the same blessing we ask for our friends, our relations, all those from whom we have received kindness, and all those that desire our prayers, requesting those mercies for them, that we would ourselves desire, were we in their condition.

These, and all other blessings, which thou knowest better to give than we to ask, vouchsafe to give us for the worthiness of thy Son Jesus Christ our Lord, in whose name and words we sum up our wants and petitions: —Our Father, &c.

MONDAY EVENING.

Receive our supplications and prayers which we offer before thee for all estates of men in thy Church, that every member of the same, in his vocation and ministry, may truly and godly serve thee.

We beseech thee, O Lord, mercifully to incline thine ears to our petitions; and grant that those things we have faithfully asked according to thy will, may effectually be obtained, to the relief of our necessities, and the setting forth of thy glory, through Jesus Christ our Lord. Amen.—Our Father, &c.

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TUESDAY MORNING.

ALMIGHTY Father, source of every good, and fountain of every blessing, the God and Father of our Lord Jesus Christ, and in him our God and Father, give us the spirit of adoption, and enable us to cry, Abba, Father. Help us to come and pour out our hearts before thee with the same confidence and affection with which children go to an earthly parent. Enable us to repose ourselves on thy love; to tell thee all our desires, and all our sorrows; and, from the heart, to thank thee for all thy goodness to us.

Great and abundant cause we have to bless our God for all that he is in himself, and for all that he is to us. Thy mercies are new every morning. We thank thee that we meet together in peace and safety. Thou hast been our defence and our refuge: let then the outgoings of the morning and of the evening praise thee. But spare us, good Lord, spare us, according to thy great compassion and thy tender mercy. Lord God of our salvation, it is thy gracious promise on which our souls rely, that if we confess our sins, thou art just and faithful to forgive us our sins, and to cleanse us from all unrighteousness. We now confess our sins, and we ask that they may be forgiven, and our souls purified from sin. We plead thy justice, for Jesus bore our sins in his own body on the tree. We plead thy faithfulness

according to thy many precious promises. Let us now by faith obtain those promises.

Forgive, forgive us all our sins. Cleanse. we beseech thee, the thoughts of our hearts, by the inspiration of thy Holy Spirit, that we may perfectly love thee, and worthily magnify thy holy name. Strengthen us for the duties of this day. Suffer us not to be tempted above what we are able to bear; but with every temptation make a way to escape. Incline and enable us to walk in that way. Hold thou up our goings in thy paths, that our feet slip not. Set a watch before our mouths, and keep the door of our lips, that we offend not with our tongue. Enable us also to keep our heart with all diligence, seeing that out of it are the issues of life. Let the light of thy Church break forth on all around. Cause the light of life to shine into every benighted heart. Increase, espe-

cially among the people of this nation, the number of those who know, and love, and serve thee. Bless our rulers, and guide our statesmen, teach thy ministers and prosper thy people, that there may be no complaining in our streets; and that it may be said of us, "Happy is the people that is in such a case; yea, happy is that people whose God is the Lord." These prayers we offer up in the name, and through the mediation of thy Son, Jesus Christ our Lord. Amen.—Our Father, &c.

TUESDAY EVENING.

Mayest thou teach us what is good, and help us to hold fast that which we have received, until our warfare is accomplished, and our glory begun.

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Our present situation and wants are known to thee, and thou art very merciful and full of compassion. Deal with us, O Lord, as thou seest we have need. We come to thee this night, with thankfulness for the mercies experienced during another day; with petitions for pardon of those sins we have this day committed; with supplication and prayer for the continuance of thy goodness. Keep us from evil this night. We will lay ourselves down in peace and sleep; may we be protected by thy watchful providence, and awake in the morning rejoicing in that peace of God which passeth all understanding.

Remember, O Lord, thy goodness and thy covenant to thy church militant upon this earth, and exposed to dangers amidst so many enemies; yet, we believe, that, notwithstanding all these dangers, it will be safe at last: it may be distressed, and plunged in the waters, but it cannot be quite overwhelmed, or finally perish. Pour out thy blessing upon this our native country. Bless our Queen, and all in authority. Watch over our friends, reward our benefactors, forgive our enemies. We depend upon thee, O Father, without whose hand we should not have been, and without whose favour we can never be happy. Inspire our hearts with gladness, thou who alone art the fountain of solid, pure, and permanent joy, and lead us, by the paths of righteous-

ness and grace, to the rest and light of glory, for the sake of thy Son, our Redeemer, Jesus Christ. Amen.—Our Father, &c.

WEDNESDAY MORNING.

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ourselves. Girding up the loins of our minds, may we be sober and hope to the end, for the grace that is to be brought unto us, at the revelation of Jesus Christ. In prospect of the last messenger's arrival may we be able to say, We have fought a good fight, we have finished our course, we have kept the faith; and henceforth there is laid up for us a crown of righteousness which the Lord, the righteous Judge, shall give us at that day, and not unto us only, but unto all them that love his appear-While we exclaim, God be merciful to ing. us, and bless us, and cause his face to shine upon us, we would add, Let thy way be known upon earth, thy saving health among all nations. Let the people praise thee, O God, yea, let all the people praise thee; then shall the earth vield her increase, and God, even our own God, shall give us his blessing. And all we ask is through the mediation of Him who bore our sins, and carried our sorrows; to whom, with the Father, and the Spirit of grace, be endless praises. Amen.—Our Father, &c.

WEDNESDAY EVENING.

O LORD, thou art our refuge and our strength. In thee alone is our help. To thy free and T^2 abounding grace, in Jesus Christ our Lord, we must be indebted for all our salvation. May we pass through earth with our hearts and hopes set upon heaven, and feel the attractive influence stronger, as we approach nearer and nearer to the everlasting kingdom of God, our Saviour.

VOICE OF DEVOTION.

THURSDAY EVENING.

Bring us, at the appointed season, to the heavenly city, where there is no darkness, but the glory of God doth lighten it, and the Lamb is the light thereof. And for all thy patience with us, thy care over us, and thy continued mercy to us, blessed be thy name, O Lord, Father, Son and Spirit. Amen.-Our Father, &c.

FRIDAY MORNING.

ALMIGHTY God, who gavest us refreshing sleep whilst we lay on our beds, and hast enabled us to rise from them in health, we draw near to thee with the sacrifice of praise and prayer. hast opened a fountain for our sin and uncleanness. Thou hast raised up a Deliverer, who is mighty to save. We are guilty sinners, but thou hast appointed for us a city of refuge. Through the riches of thy grace, we have a Priest, to make atonement for our sins; a Physician, to heal our diseases; a Shepherd, to protect and feed us; and a Guide, to direct our feet into the way of peace.

O that the multitude of thy mercies to us may have a suitable influence on our hearts, our tempers, and our lives. Let the recollection of thy grace, most blessed God, abide with us through the day, and have a holy effect upon our minds; that while our hands are employed about the affairs of the present life, our hearts may not be improperly affected by them.

Enable us this, and every day, to tread in the footsteps of thy flock; like Enoch, may we walk with God; like David, may we set the Lord always before us; like Moses, may we endure, as seeing him who is invisible. Thus let the day of life be spent; that when its evening shall come, we may end our day like Simeon, and say, Lord, now let thy servant depart in peace.

For this we earnestly beg thy grace: rejoicing that thou hast not only given us clear precepts and bright examples, but likewise hast promised to give thy Holy Spirit to them

who ask thee for this blessing. Bestow, O Lord, this great blessing upon us, that we may obey the precepts, and imitate the examples which thou hast set before us.

Leave us not to ourselves; for it is not the mere knowledge of our duty that will ensure the practice of it; through the depravity of our hearts, we are capable of disregarding every precept thou hast enforced, every example thou hast set before us, and every mercy that we have received.

O be present with us, therefore every moment of the day. Hold up our goings in thy paths, that our footsteps slip not. And enable us to be faithful unto death, that we may obtain the crown of life, through Jesus Christ our Lord, who hath instructed us to pray to thee in these words,—Our Father, &c.

FRIDAY EVENING.

MERCIFUL God, our Creator, Preserver, and Redeemer: thou art the fountain from which all our comforts flow; without thee we are nothing but poverty and misery.

We have reason to take shame to ourselves for having often followed the devices and desires of our own hearts, when they have

been in opposition to thy will. O Lord, we would not attempt to palliate this folly and wickedness, but would, with unfeigned humility and contrition, cast ourselves entirely upon thy mercy; knowing that we are inexcusable.

Happy is it for us that thou art a God of mercy; for we are so far gone from righteousness, as to have no hope but in the riches of thy grace.

Everlasting thanks be to thee for that blessed gospel which reveals a Mediator to us. We thank thee, O God, for the glad tidings of a Redeemer, who came into the world to save sinners. How worthy of all acceptation is this faithful saying! Let us treasure it up in our hearts, and glory in him who of God is made unto us wisdom, righteousness, sanctification, and redemption.

O gracious God, let not one of this family be a stranger to himself, or to thee. May thy Holy Spirit convince every one of his own sin, that there may not be, in all this house, one who is not sensible of his need of that blessed Physician, who came down from heaven to cure the diseases of the soul, and to rescue us from death eternal.

Suffer us not, O Divine Teacher, to remain either ignorant or negligent of any thing that relates to our everlasting welfare; but especially of that great salvation, which thou hast published in thy word, and art still proclaiming by the voice of thy ministers. Good Lord, deliver us from all hypocrisy, as well as from a hardened conscience. May we attend to thy voice with the utmost simplicity of mind, and joyfully surrender our whole selves to him, who saith, my son, give me thy heart.

Enable us to live as thy faithful servants. Make us watchful over our own hearts: circumspect in all our conduct; and upright in all our intentions. Guard us in all temptations. Give us grace to improve our time, and every other talent, which thou hast committed to us.

We bless thy holy name for all the mercies of the day past, and we humbly request thy continued care and protection, to defend us from all the evils to which we may be exposed this night.

To thee we commend likewise every one for whom we ought to pray; especially, thy

servant our Queen, and all the royal family. We pray thee, O Lord, to bless our country; and though our national sins are very great, yet turn not away thy mercy from us.

We pray thee to have mercy on all men. Sanctify the afflictions of the afflicted. Enlighten the minds of those who are in spiritual darkness. And may they, who are taken captive by Satan, be recovered out of his snares.

We commend all the ministers of thy word to thee, and especially thy servant who dispenseth thy word among us. Bless, O Lord, the labours of all those who watch for souls, and add to the number of those who are faithful in this holy office.

We entreat thee to bless all the inhabitants of the parish in which we dwell. Bless them, O Lord, in their civil callings, and in their families; but above all, bless them in their souls; that they may live in fear of thy holy name, and in love and peace one with another. These mercies we ask in the name of Jesus Christ, our only Advocate with the Father, who taught us thus to address thee:—Our Father, &c.

SATURDAY MORNING.

O GOD of all grace and comfort, who show

est mercy on the unworthy, and art most bountifully pleased to fit and qualify them for thy grace, have pity upon our sinfulness; secure us from the bondage and power of our own corrupt natures, by thy greater power; from that which is the shame and sorrow of our life past. We turn unto thee with contrite hearts, unfeignedly desiring to retain no more of our former offences; and we earnestly pray to thee. Father of mercies, that, for Jesus Christ's sake, thou wouldst be pleased to accept this our repentance. We have no hope in ourselves, but only in thy mercy, nor any expectation in our own deservings, but only in thy blessed Son's infinite merits. Receive us, O Lord, according to the riches of thy mercy, and supply whatsoever is wanting in us by the power of thy grace. Teach us to prize and set a great value upon all helps and opportunities of instruction and improvement in the way of godliness. Make us willing to do justice unto all with whom we are concerned, and ready to give unto all what is their due, even though we should thereby be left upon thy good providence. If want must be our share, grant, O good Lord, that the place of our wanting may be here in this world, where our wants will soon have an end: not hereafter in the next world, where they will know no end. Conversing as we do, in the midst of an evil and dangerous world, enable us to beware of sinful men, and, knowing that the days are evil, may we not needlessly throw away our quiet, but redeem the time. Grant unto us the skill and care, O merciful Lord, to be provident in all things,

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and walk circumspectly; in wisdom towards those that are without, that they may find nothing on which to lay hold but our love and zeal to thee, and a wise and faithful discharge of our duty. Lord, we thankfully acknowledge the bounty and goodness thou hast manifested towards us, by creating, sustaining, and protecting us all the days of our past lives, and offering unto us unworthy sinners the mercies of redeeming love. Touch our hearts with such affections of gratitude and humility, that we may never venture to undervalue thy blessings; and, loving thee, may we love our brethren also, showing them all offices of kindness and charity, tenderness and forbearance towards their infirmities, praying for all men, whether Christian or heathen, that thou wilt put thy laws into their minds, and write them upon their hearts. Desiring, O gracious Father, the increase of thy power, glory, honour, and dominion upon the whole of the human race, we beseech thee to accept our petitions, through the merits and intercession of our merciful Redeemer. Amen Our Father. &c.

SATURDAY EVENING.

O thou Keeper of Israel, who never slumberest nor sleepest, be thou about our path and about our bed; defend us from all dangers, refresh our bodies with sleep; and if thy Almighty Providence should spare us to behold the light of the returning sun, may we arise with thanksgivings on our lips, remembering that the day is the Sabbath of O may our hearts be solemnized, the Lord. and may we rejoice and be glad in the day which the Lord has made. Be especially present with thy ministering servants on the

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morrow; may they go forth in the fulness of the blessing of Christ's gospel, preaching peace through the blood of the cross; and may the word of thy grace drop as rain that watereth the earth, and maketh it bring forth and bud, accomplishing thy good pleasure, and prospering wheresoever thou dost send it. All these mercies we ask for the sake and through the intercession of our only Lord and Saviour Jesus Christ, to whom, in the unity of the Father and the Holy Spirit, be ascribed all honour and glory, world without end. The night posts on, so doth that death of which night is the image-a night after which, in this world, we must expect no morning. Let us always be mindful, that the days of darkness are many; and let this thought excite us to finish our work with diligence, before that night comes wherein no man can work. Make us to remember thee upon our beds, and to think upon thee when we are waking. Then let us commune with our own hearts, and search out our spirits; and, when we wake, do thou be present with us.

And now, Lord, we will lay us down in peace, and take our rest, trusting for safety to thee, O Father, Son, and Holy Spirit, one God, ever blessed to all eternity. Amen.... Our Father, &c.

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MONDAY MORNING.

O God, who makest the out-goings of the morning and evening to praise thee, accept our hearty thanksgivings for the blessings of the past night.

We have lain down and slept, and are now assembled together, to acknowledge that it is thou only who makest us continually to dwell in safety. Thou art the God of our life: day by day will we direct our prayer unto thee, and look up. Hear us, we beseech thee, in the multitude of thy mercies, for the sake of thy Son Jesus Christ our Lord.

The holy rest of the sabbath is gone by; and we are now entering on the duties of our various callings in which thy providence hath placed us.

Grant, Lord, that the day which is past may shed its hallowed influence on this day, and on all the days of the week. Give us grace to engage in the cares and business of life with fear and trembling, as those who know the deceitfulness of sin, and the weakness of our mortal nature. Keep us from the evil that is in the world. Give us that faith which will enable us to overcome its various temptations, to renounce its pomps and vanities, to withstand its allurements, and to disregard its frowns. And grant that we, being regenerate and made thy children by adoption and grace, may daily be renewed by thy Holy Spirit. Grant, that having been received into the congregation of Christ's flock, and professing ourselves his disciples, we may not be ashamed to confess the faith of Christ crucified, and manfully to fight under this banner against sin, the world, and the devil, and to continue his faithful soldiers and servants unto our lives' end.

We acknowledge, O God, that, after former sabbaths, our vows and resolutions have too often been forgotten, and have passed away like the morning cloud, and the early dew. Strengthen, therefore, O Lord, we beseech thee, the holy thoughts and desires which may have been produced in our minds. Enable us to show our sincere gratitude to thee for thy day of rest, by causing our profiting to appear unto all men.

Make us of good understanding in the ways of godliness. Subdue the workings of our evil hearts. Preserve us from pride and envy, from hatred and malice, from murmurings and disputings, from covetousness and dishonesty, from selfishness and idleness, from unchristian tempers and impure desires, and from all hurtful lusts that war against the soul.

Pardon and correct whatever is sinful in us;

strengthen what is weak; confirm what is wavering; supply what is wanting; and make us thoroughly furnished unto every good word and work.

But without thee we can do nothing. Prevent us, therefore, O Lord, in all our doings, with thy most gracious favour, and further us with thy continual help; that in all our works begun, continued, and ended in thee, we may glorify thy holy name, and finally, by thy mercy, obtain everlasting life.

Sanctify, we beseech thee, the means of grace to all those who attended them yesterday. Water the seed which was sown with the dew of thy blessing; that being received into an honest and good heart, it may bring forth fruit abundantly.

Preserve such as are more especially dear to us, from being overcharged with the cares of this life. May they show by their conduct, that they have profited by the ordinances of thy house, and have not received thy grace in vain.

Pity and convert those who profess to know thee, but in works deny thee; and dispose them, in future, to walk worthy of the vocation wherewith they are called.

Give thy blessing unto all whom thou hast set over the congregations of thy people [especially to him whom thou hast set over us]. Strengthen their hands, and comfort their

hearts. Keep them steadfast in the faith of Christ, and zealous in the cause of thee, their God: and may they and we, and all their people, be accepted of thee at last, through the full, perfect, and sufficient sacrifice, oblation, and satisfaction, of the same Jesus Christ, our only Mediator and Redeemer.—Our Father, &c.

MONDAY EVENING.

Most merciful God and Father, who hast safely preserved us through another day, and loaded us with thy benefits, we are assembled together, to acknowledge thy over-ruling providence, which ordereth all things in heaven and earth; which appointeth the moon for certain seasons, and the sun to know his going down.

Accept our united and hearty thanks for still holding our souls in life, and for turning away from us this day all those evils which we have most righteously deserved. We confess that we have forfeited, by our manifold transgressions, every claim to thy fatherly protection in the present life, and have rendered ourselves altogether unworthy of the blessings of the life that is to come.

But, notwithstanding our guilt and unworthiness, we would still look up to thee in the name of that Mediator, through whose allprevailing merits we may yet have boldness to come into thy presence, and to ask for every thing that is necessary, as well for the body as the soul. Though thou hearest not sinners for their own sake, yet him thou hearest always; and wilt favourably hear, for his sake, those who are unworthy to be heard for their own.

Now, therefore, O Lord our God, hearken to the prayers of thy humble servants. Mercifully regard us, while we draw nigh by that new and living way which is consecrated for us through his blood, not presenting ourselves before thee for our righteousness, but for thy manifold and great mercies in Christ Jesus.

Enter not into judgment with thy servants, for having so little profited by the many privileges of thy sabbath, and for not having manifested more of the power of thy ordinances in performing the duties of the past day. Have mercy upon us, O God, have mercy upon us, according to thy loving-kindness; according to the multitude of thy tender mercies blot out our transgressions. Wash us thoroughly from our iniquity, and cleanse us from all our sin.

Pardon our want of love to thee, and our undue love of this present world. Truly our soul cleaveth to the dust. Quicken thou us,

O Lord, according to thy word; and let the love of thee alone rule and direct our hearts.

Forgive, also, our many offences against our neighbour; and help us in future to do unto others as we would they should do unto us.

O Lord, who hast taught us that all our doings, without charity, are nothing worth; send thy Holy Ghost, and pour into our hearts that most excellent gift of charity, the very bond of peace, and of all virtues; without which whosoever liveth is counted dead before thee. Let not the sun ever go down, or rise, upon our wrath; but give us more of that spirit which thinketh no evil, which beareth all things, believeth all things, hopeth all things, endureth all things, and disposeth us to cover a multitude of sins.

Blot out, likewise, the offences which we daily commit against thee and against each other, as members of the same household: And do thou, O God of peace, deliver us from every practice, which may prevent our dwelling together as brethren, and as heirs together of the grace of life.

Enable us to watch over our hearts, that we be not easily provoked, except unto love and to good works. Remove wickedness utterly out of our dwelling, and from among us. Give us grace to come before thee with clean hands and a pure heart; and let no secret or open abominations prevent our prayers from being accepted by thee.

And now, O Lord, before we lie down, and take our rest, suffer us to commend not only ourselves, but all others, to thy covenanted mercies in Christ Jesus.

Look in compassion on a fallen world. Turn sinners from the error of their ways.

Look, also, upon thy church and people. Pardon and heal our many divisions; and teach Christians to love one another, even as they are loved of thee.

Comfort all who mourn, particularly those who mourn for sin. Give unto them everlasting consolation, and good hope through grace.

Shed abundantly thy blessing on those among whom we dwell, and with whom we are more nearly connected. Take us and them under thy fatherly protection; and bless and keep us, this night, and for evermore, through Jesus Christ our Lord.— Our Father, &c.

TUESDAY MORNING.

O THOU most holy, blessed, and glorious Lord God, whom we are bound by every tie to worship and obey; behold us again, this morning, before the throne of thy grace. We laid ourselves down in peace; we have during the

past night taken our rest in safety; and by thy kind providence we are entering upon the duties and enjoyments of another day.

A wearisome night might have been appointed us; thou mightest have scared us with dreams, and terrified us through visions; and we might have been full of tossings to and fro, until the dawning : but thou hast bestowed on us sleep, such as thou givest to thy beloved, and our bed has comforted and refreshed Blessed be the God and Father of the 115. Lord Jesus Christ, for this renewed instance of his sustaining power and preserving goodness.

This morning again would we say, Come and hear, all ye that fear God, and we will declare what he hath done for our bodies and Thine hand, O God, created us at the souls. first. Our substance was not hid from thee. when we were made in secret, and curiously wrought in the lowest parts of the earth; thine eyes did see our substance, yet being imperfect; and in thy book all our members were written; which in continuance were fashioned. when as vet there was none of them. And we thank thee, O Lord, that thou hast not only granted us life, and thy visitation to preserve our spirits in the helpless state of infancy and childhood; but that thou hast cast our lot in a part of the world where light and liberty, peace and plenty, have so long existed Y

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and flourished. We would also be truly thankful, O God, that our father and mother were both of them righteous before thee, walking in all the commandments and ordinances of the Lord blameless; and that by their means we have been taught to know the Scriptures, and the way of salvation, from our youth.

O Lord, may we find that these Scriptures have not been as a dead letter unto us; but that the gospel contained therein hath come home to our souls, in the demonstration of the Spirit and with power. We would be thankful to God if we have in any measure seen our need of Christ, and been enabled to close with the offers of salvation, as freely exhibited in the gospel.

Incomprehensible Being, who searchest the heart, and to whom every secret motion within us is known, behold our souls prostrate before the throne of thy grace this morning, ready again to take hold of thy covenant and strength, that we may be united to thee in grace and peace. Look down, O God of mercy, upon us; and for thine own sake, and according to thy express word and promise, blot out our transgressions, and remember our sins no more.

We must confess, O God, that if thou shouldest be strict to mark iniquity, we have often had cause to be both ashamed and afraid.

Thou hast also said in thy word, that the just shall live by faith; but if any man draw back, my soul shall have no pleasure in him. Have we not reason at times to fear that we may have drawn back, or that we have not yet truly believed to the saving of the soul? May the good Lord heal our backslidings, and pardon our numberless failings in duty. Thou hast said, Return, thou backsliding Israel, and I will not cause mine anger to fall upon you. Turn thou us unto thee, O Lord, and we shall be turned; and from this day enlighten and renew, more and more, every faculty and power of our minds and souls, and let all be preserved blameless to the coming of the Lord.

For that protection which thou hast afforded during the past night, and that refreshing sleep which we have enjoyed, we desire, O God, to be more and more thankful. To thy care and keeping we again commit ourselves this day. Compass us about with thy favour as with a shield.

If consistent with thy will, prosper us in all our lawful employments. The same blessings we would ask in behalf of our relations. friends, benefactors, and well-wishers. Our enemies, Father, forgive them, and enable us to do the same.

Lord, plead thine own cause in the world. Let ignorance, idolatry, superstition, and

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wickedness, come to an end. Erect the throne of thy Son's dominion upon the ruins of Satan's kingdom. Let the happy time be approaching when there shall be universal peace on earth, and good-will amongst all mankind. Lord, continue kind to our native country. Bless the Queen, and every branch of the royal family. Provide for the nation, O God, rulers and magistrates, such as are able men, who fear thee, and hate covetousness. Prosper, O God, the means of instruction provided for the young, and let the hoary heads be found in the way of righteousness; that they may look backward with satisfaction, and forward with hope. Pity the sick and afflicted; spare young and useful lives; and prepare all for death and judgment. Now blessed be God for all his gifts, both of nature and of grace! And to the Three that bear record in heaven, the Father, the Word, and Holy Spirit, be ascribed all honour and glory. Amen.-Our Father, &c.

TUESDAY EVENING.

O LORD, thou ever blessed God; the high and mighty King of kings, and Lord of lords; thy kingdom is an everlasting kingdom, and

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thy dominion endureth through all generations. While creatures change, thou art the same; and while our days are passing away in haste, with thee there is no variableness or shadow of turning.

Lord, we confess our sins before thee with shame and sorrow. O may our hearts be more

thoroughly pierced and broken for all our transgressions. How should it confound us to think that we have offended so good a God as thou art: that we have, in so many instances, acted the part of rebellious children toward the kindest father.

We lament before thee, O Lord, the sins of our hearts, and the iniquities of our lives, by which we have exposed ourselves to thy wrath and indignation. O, for Christ's sake, forgive our many and aggravated transgressions, and bless us, by turning us away from our iniquities. May the blood of Jesus, who, through the eternal Spirit, offered himself without spot to God, purge our consciences from dead works, that we may serve thee, the living God, in all holiness and new obedience.

And, O give us a comfortable sense of the forgiveness of our sins, and of our acceptance into thy favour. Lord, lift thou the light of thy countenance upon us, and shed abroad thy love in our hearts; for in thy favour, O Lord, is the life and the happiness of the soul. With that we cannot be miserable in the worst condition here; and without it, we cannot be happy in the best. Whom have we in heaven, O Lord, but thee? And what is there on earth to be desired besides thee? Our flesh and our hearts, and our portion for ever.

O may the love of the world and the power of sin be destroyed in us. Grant us a constant supply of the Spirit of Jesus, as a spirit of purity, of love, of power, and of a sound mind; and enable us to bring forth in our lives all the fruits of the Spirit, to thy praise and glory.

May we be continually adding to our faith virtue, and courage in the profession and practice of religion; to virtue a growing knowledge of the things of God and the truth of Christianity; to knowledge temperance, that we may abstain from all sinful indulgences, and preserve a strict moderation in those which are lawful; to temperance, help us to add a more confirmed patience in doing and suffering thy will; to patience may we add godliness, a more divine and heavenly temper; and to godliness brotherly kindness, a hearty and growing affection towards all our fellow-Christians; and to brotherly kindness may we add charity, a more benevolent temper towards all our fellow-creatures, and a readiness to forgive our worst enemies. And, O may these virtues not only be in us, but abound, that we may be fruitful in every good word and work, and at last have a joyful entrance into the everlasting kingdom of our Lord and Saviour Jesus Christ.

May all that are dear to us in the bonds of nature and friendship, be blessed of the God

of heaven. May every member of this family be a living member of Jesus Christ, and be preparing for his kingdom of glory.

With these our prayers we would offer up our grateful praises for all past and present mercies. We bless thee for our creation, that thou hast made us reasonable and immortal beings, capable of knowing, loving and serving thee here, and enjoying thee for ever.

We bless thee for our continued preservation, and especially for adding another day to our lives; thou hast kindly preserved us in going out and coming in, and hast given us all things comfortably to enjoy. But above all, we magnify thy name for the redemption of the world by thy beloved Son; for the means of grace, and for the hope of glory.

Under a lively sense of all thy goodness to thy unworthy creatures, we would now renew the solemn dedication of ourselves unto thee. Watch over us, we pray thee, through the night; guard 'us and our habitations from every evil, and in the morning may we awake with God. Be with us through all the remaining days of our pilgrimage, and at last receive us to thy heavenly kingdom: which 'we ask through Jesus Christ, our only Redeemer and Advocate. Amen.— Our Father, &c.

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WEDNESDAY MORNING.

O GOD, whose mercies are renewed to us day by day, we will sing of thy power and grace every morning. Let them give thanks whom thou hast preserved.

But what shall we render unto thee for all the benefits which thou hast done unto us? Thine we are, and thee we ought to serve; and to love thee with all the heart, and soul, and mind, and strength, is our reasonable service and our bounden duty.

We would magnify the exceeding riches of thy grace, and exalt the honour of thy name by humble trust and confidence in the Son of thy love.

And, we pray thee, O Lord, that thy power may be great, both in pardoning our sins, and in enabling us to bring forth the fruits of righteousness which are by Jesus Christ to thy praise and glory.

As thou hast given him to be unto us both a sacrifice for sin, and also an ensample of godly life, give us grace that we may always most thankfully receive that his inestimable benefit, and also daily endeavour ourselves to follow the blessed steps of his most holy life.

Our eyes are now directed unto thee, from whom cometh all our help. May we enter upon the various duties of this day, with the

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spirit of those whom thy mercy hath spared, and thy grace hath quickened to newness of life. Deliver us from spiritual sloth and negligence. Make us active in the discharge of all that lieth before us. Help us to press forward in the way of life, and so to run, that we may obtain the prize of our high calling Incline and enable us to abound in those good works, which thou hast prepared for us to walk in; to wait all the days of our appointed time till our change come; and by patient continuance in well-doing, to seek for glory, and honour, and immortality; that so by thy mercy we may in the end obtain eternal life.

Grant also, we pray thee, O Lord, that all who are called Christians, may thus adorn the doctrine of God their Saviour.

Bless thy whole church, and order all things for its increase and prosperity. Sanctify and cleanse it, that it may be a glorious church, not having spot, or wrinkle, or any such thing; but that it may be holy and without blemish.

Pour down thy special blessing on the immediate neighbourhood in which we dwell. Grant that all who profess thy holy name may truly and faithfully serve thee in their various callings and relations.

Finally, we pray thee to regard with thy favour this family. Look down upon us in mercy. Refresh us abundantly with the dew

of thy blessing. May we be followers of thee, as dear children, walking in love, as Christ also loved us, and gave himself for us, an offering and a sacrifice unto thee for a sweetsmelling savour.

These prayers, for ourselves and others, we humbly offer up to the throne of grace, in the name, and through the mediation of Jesus Christ, our only Lord and Saviour.- Our Father, &c.

WEDNESDAY EVENING.

O LORD, thou hast been our refuge from one generation to another. Before the mountains were brought forth, or ever the earth and the worlds were made, thou art God from everlasting and world without end.

Upon thy mercy-seat in the heavens thou waitest to be gracious; and we thy sinful creatures draw nigh unto thee, as unto a God in Christ, reconciling the world unto thyself, not imputing their trespasses unto them.

We trust, O Lord, to the word of thy promise, that, though we have sinned, we have an Advocate with thee, Jesus Christ, the righteous; who is the propitiation for our sins; and not for ours only, but for the sins of the whole world.

Satisfy us with thy mercy, and that soon; that we may rejoice and be glad in thee all our days.

Grant us, according to the riches of thy glory, to be strengthened with might, by thy Spirit, in the inner man. Let Christ dwell in our hearts by faith; that, being rooted and grounded in love, we may be able to comprehend with all saints, what is the breadth, and length, and depth, and height; and to know the love of Christ which passeth knowledge, that we may be filled with all the fulness of thee our God.

Thou hast brought and defended us, O heavenly Father, through the dangers of another day; and hast blessed us with every needful blessing, in our going out and coming in.

But we beseech thee, O God of the spirits of all flesh, in whom alone we live, and move, and have our being, to touch our hearts with the solemn and affecting truth, that we know not what shall be on the morrow. Keep us continually mindful, that in the midst of life we are in death. Of whom may we seek for succour, but of thee, O Lord, who for our sins art justly displeased? Yet, O Lord God, most holy, O Lord, most mighty, O holy and merciful Saviour, thou most worthy Judge eternal, suffer us not, at our last hour, for any pains of death to fall from thee.

Give ear, O Lord, to our prayers for our fellow-creatures.

Put the ungodly in fear, that they may know themselves to be but men. Incline them seriously to think on their ways, and to turn their feet unto thy testimonies.

Let all those who trust in thee rejoice, because their redemption draweth nigh; and their salvation is nearer than when they first believed.

Be gracious unto such as, in this transitory world, are suffering either for their sins, or for righteousness' sake; and sanctify their sufferings to the good of their souls.

Finally, we pray thee, Almighty God, with whom do live the spirits of just men, made perfect, after they are delivered from their earthly prisons, to look with compassion on

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all whom the sorrows of death are encompassing about. We commend their souls into thy hands, as into the hands of a faithful Creator and most merciful Saviour: humbly beseeching thee, that they may be precious in thy sight. Wash them in the blood of that spotless Lamb that was slain to take away the sins of the world; that they may be presented pure and without spot before thee.

And teach us who survive, in every daily spectacle of mortality, to remember how frail and uncertain our own condition is: and so to number our days, that we may apply our hearts unto wisdom. Grant that neither the splendour of any thing that is great, nor the conceit of any thing that is good in us, may withdraw our eyes from looking upon ourselves as sinful dust and ashes; but that we may press forward to the prize of the high calling that is before us, in faith and patience, humility and meekness, mortification and selfdenial, charity and constant perseverance unto the end: and all this for thy Son our Lord Jesus Christ his sake: to whom, with thee, and the Holy Ghost, be all honour and glory, world without end.-Our Father, &c.

THURSDAY MORNING.

How unsearchable are thy judgments, O Lord, and thy ways past finding out! Something we know of thee; but it is because thou hast revealed thyself to man. Thou hast beheld his ignorance, and in compassion to his soul, thou hast instructed him, that he might savingly know that God with whom he hath to do.

Yet who can comprehend all thy ways? Nor are thy ways of mercy the least of those wonders, we ought devoutly to admire! O what is man that thou shouldest be mindful of him! Seeing we forsook the covenant of our God, and like sheep have gone astray from thee, why were we not left to be filled with our own wretched devices?

O Lord, we have no words that will sufficiently express the greatness of that mercy, which caused thee to give up thine only begotten Son for our redemption. But though our feeble tongues can never set forth all thy praise, yet let our minds be so affected with the riches of thy grace, that our hearts may adore thee, though our lips cannot utter the halt, nor the thousandth part of thy goodness.

O thou who didst give thy dear Son to die for our salvation, grant that we may exercise towards him, all those tempers which we ought to feel. Let the name of that Friend who was wounded for our transgressions, and

bruised for our iniquities, be deeply engraven on our minds. Set it, O God, as a seal upon our hearts, that whatever else we forget, we may ever remember the great love wherewith he loved us.

And now, O Lord, since thou hast opened a door of hope to sinners, through the sufferings and death of thy dear Son, enable us by faith to enter it. And while we thankfully embrace thy mercy, let our souls be deeply impressed with thy holy displeasure against sin, which we are taught by the sacrifice of Christ. Did he suffer for sin, and shall we think lightly of it? Far be it from us! O let us not dare to repeat those offences for which our Saviour was delivered up to death.

Grant, O Lord, that we may learn every lesson which we are taught by the sufferings of our Redeemer. May the world be crucified to us, and we to the world, by the cross of Christ. Let us turn aside from every vain object, to see this great sight; and may the contemplation of a Saviour offering himself up for our redemption, leave in us no more spirit for the shadows we are apt to pursue.

Incline our hearts, O Lord, to practise that love to our neighbour, which we are taught at the foot of the cross. Since the good Shepherd laid down his life for the sheep, never more may we shut up our bowels of compassion against our brother. Let thine Holy

Spirit implant in us that mind that was in Christ, who, though he was rich, yet for our sakes became poor.

And since thou hast not withheld thine only Son from us, let us not refuse to surrender any thing, which thou mayest call us to resign.

Let us learn, by the meek example of a suffering Master, to suffer with patience, whenever we have to taste of the cup of affliction. Let the remembrance of our sins, and our Saviour, silence all complaints; and may we be principally concerned to show, how he who patiently bore his own cross, hath taught us to carry ours.

And we pray, that not only we, but that others also may look to a crucified Saviour for eternal life. Since our Lord hath been lifted up, may all men be drawn to him. Let his gospel be published in every nation, that there may be great joy in every part of the world. Give him, O Father, the heathen for his inheritance, and the uttermost parts of the earth for his possession.

And may that blood which was shed for the remission of sins, plead for the pardon of those crimes with which the Christian name has been disgraced. Forgive the sins by which the religion of a holy and benevolent Saviour, hath been misrepresented to heathen nations. Grant that we may not have to

answer for causing the way of truth to be evil spoken of! And to this end let us not only hold forth the form of godliness, but be always seeking after its power.

Teach us to live, this day, in the comforting and sanctifying hope of seeing that Friend who came down on earth to save us. O let the glorious hour come, when we shall behold the head, which was once pierced with thorns, adorned with many crowns! Let us be growing in a meetness for so blessed a state, this, and every day, through Jesus Christ our Lord.—Our Father, &c.

THURSDAY EVENING.

BLESSED God, how great is thy goodness, how wonderful is thy condescension, in directing us to call upon thy name, and permitting us to cast our burdens upon the Lord! Many of our burdens are such as we have brought upon ourselves through our sinfulness, and we deserve to feel the whole weight of them; yet such is thy compassion that thou offerest support to us, and sustainest us when we are fainting.

Be continually present with us, enabling us to act as those who have obtained mercy—as those who have been called to behold a Saviour who wept that we might rejoice, and who died that we might live. O may thy Holy Spirit shed abroad in our hearts an unfeigned love to Christ, that we may live more to him, who lived and died for us.

With many thanks for the mercies of this day, we commend ourselves, our dear relations, and all our neighbours, to thy protection this night; praying thee to look down in an especial manner upon the afflicted. We entreat thee to hear, to answer, and to forgive, for the sake of that blessed Advocate, whose mediation encourages us to look upward, and offer the prayer which he taught us to use:— Our Father, &c.

FRIDAY MORNING.

Hear, we beseech thee, these our prayers and supplications. Be ever present with us; may we act as under thine eye, and as becomes thy people, habitually prepared for death and judgment.

These, and every other mercy, we most humbly ask, for the sake, and through the merits and mediation of our blessed Lord and Saviour Jesus Christ. Amen.—Our Father, &c.

Mercy and grace be with all that love our Lord Jesus Christ in sin-We would exercise Christian comcerity. passion towards such as may differ from us in essential matters; and pray that they may be forgiven, and converted to the acknowledgment of the truth. We would embrace in the arms of Christian benevolence and love, those who differ from us only in modes and ceremonies; and whether they assemble in spacious

churches, or humbler places of worship, we entreat, O heavenly Father, that thou wouldst be present with, and greatly bless them. And now, O God, what wait we for? Before thy presence are all our failings; and well known unto thee are all our wants. Let all our sins be forgiven, and all our deficiencies be supplied, out of the merits and fulness of Jesus Christ. In him alone would we be found, whether sleeping or waking, whether living or dying. And now the God of grace and hope be with us, and fill us with all peace and joy in believing, and that we may abound more in the love and practice of every grace that shall make us comfortable here, and happy hereafter. We ask all for the Redeemer's sake. Amen.-Our Father. &c.

Let the weapons of their warfare be found mighty to the pulling down every stronghold of error, and to the setting up that kingdom, which is righteousness, peace, and joy in the Holy Ghost.

Look, O Lord our God, upon a world still lying in wickedness, and send forth thy light and thy truth to lead men into the way of peace.

Bless all who are called to preach the glorious gospel of the blessed God. May they deliver thy word with clearness and force; and may thy Holy Spirit so accompany their ministry, that many may be brought to know thee the only true God, and to live in the faith and love of the Redeemer, to the end of their days.

And may the word of thy grace, which we hear from time to time, make us more fruitful in every good work, through Jesus Christ, our only Mediator and Advocate; in whose name

O God, who hast raised our faculties from the burial of sleep, give us this day renewed life; may we show ourselves thoroughly awakened from the sleep of sloth and darkness of sin, our hearts enlivened and refreshed through the multitude of thy blessings.

We bless thee, O God, for the souls thou hast created in us—the bodies thou hast given us—the royal bounty which provides for the daily support of mankind in general, and us in particular. We thank thee for all our social comforts—for kind friends and beloved relatives—for that reviving hope of salvation which we see through faith. And now, Lord,

We entreat thee also for the same thine infinite mercy to defend us this night from all evils and perils which for our sins might justly fall upon us; whilst we sleep, do thou, O Father, watch over us thy children, guarding us from dangers, that sleeping with thee, we may be wakened by thee, and so refreshed by moderate repose, we may be fitter to set forth thy glory in the conscionable duties of our callings. Be merciful, likewise, to thy whole Church, all our Christian brethren and sisters that suffer, and all

those of mankind in general that are in afflic. tion and misery. In health and prosperity make us mindful of sickness, and of the evil day, that those things may not overtake us as a snare, but that we may in a good measure be found prepared. And now, O Lord, most holy and just, we confess that there is no cause why thou, who art so much displeased with sin, shouldst hear the prayer of sinners, but for his sake only who suffered for sin, and sinned not; in the only mediation, therefore, of thine eternal Son Jesus, our Lord and Saviour, we humbly beg these and all other graces which thou knowest to be needful for us, shutting up our imperfect requests in that most holy prayer which Christ himself taught us to say unto thee :--- Our Father, &c.

TUESDAY MORNING.

Suffer us not to deceive ourselves by a mere form and profession of religion; but give us true faith, that we may really abide in Christ, and bear much fruit. Quicken thou our souls. Make our hearts pure, humble, and devout: and our conversation holy and heavenly. Thou art our Rock, and in thee do we trust.

Thou art our Strength, O establish us. Help us to live near to thee all the day long, and do thou preserve us from that sin which does so easily beset us.

Give us grace this day to overcome temptation, and to mortify all our corrupt affections. Grant unto us the abundance of thy Holy Spirit. Lord, we deserve not the blessing: we have forfeited the mercy: but, O thou with whom is the residue of the Spirit, for the glory of thy name, and according to thy faithful promise, give us thy Spirit, that we may never dishonour thee by inconsistency and unfruitfulness, but abound in every good work, and walk worthy of the Gospel of Christ. Enable us to begin anew this day in seriousness, and in entire dedication of heart to give ourselves to thee.

Lord, help us this day to live in prayer, to watch against the peculiar temptations of our station, to embrace every opportunity of doing good, to redeem the time, and to make steady advances in that narrow way which leadeth to eternal life.

And while we pray to thee for those mercies which we need, we would from the heart thank thee for all those great blessings which we have received, and do from day to day enjoy. The benefit of quiet repose, the renewal of our strength, the light which we enjoy, and the better light of life; these, and all the 2 c 2

mercies which surround us on awaking, call for our unfeigned thanksgiving, and we do praise and bless thee for them. Blessed be thou for redeeming mercy. Blessed be thou that Jesus died for sinners, even for us. Thanks be unto thee, that grace, pardon, peace, strength, the Holy Spirit, and eternal life, are given to sinners, through faith in Christ. Unto him that loved us, and washed us from our sins in his own blood, and hath made us to be kings and priests unto God and his Father, to him be glory and dominion for ever and ever.

O Lord God, let the bright glory and happy dominion of our Lord Jesus Christ spread through the world. Increase both the number and the zeal of those seeking the good of Sion, and the enlargement of thy Son's kingdom. Grant thy blessing to every effort to make the unsearchable riches of Christ known to the Gentiles. Give unto thy people Israel the new heart and the new spirit. Bless our favoured country, so that it may be a highly honoured instrument in diffusing the light of truth abroad; and grant that every exertion for that end may be a means of reviving true religion in all our hearts at home. Bless the Queen, and all in authority. Let thy priests be clothed with righteousness, and thy people sing for joy. May peace and mercy be granted to all our relatives, and rest on our own souls,

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and in our own family. May we and all thy people be united in one heart and mind in thy service and love, praying for each other, bearing one another's burdens, and so fulfilling the law of Christ. Hear us, for his name's sake. Amen.—Our Father, &c.

TUESDAY EVENING.

Without thy goodness we could not To thee we owe all the exist for a moment. comforts of life, health, peace, and plenty, which we enjoy, and our freedom from the pains and miseries we are subject to and have deserved. Hear us, O God, and receive our supplications and prayers for the sake of thy blessed Son, in whose holy name and perfect form of words we sum up all our wants, and

the wants of those he has taught us to pray for, saying:-Our Father, &c.

Now unto the King eternal, immortal, invisible, the only wise God, be honour and glory, for ever and ever. Amen.

WEDNESDAY EVENING.

O LORD, the infinite, incomprehensible God, who wast before all, art above all, and wilt for ever be the same! Thou hast heaven for thy throne, and the earth for thy footstool. Thou art here and everywhere present; thou compassest our path, and our lying down, and art thoroughly acquainted with all our ways. thou searchest our hearts, and triest our reins: thou knowest the dulness and hardness. the vanity and deceitfulness of our hearts; thou seest how difficult we find it to bring our souls into a holy frame, and to keep them in a state fit to attend upon thy heavenly Majesty. We were born in sin, and in sin have we lived; daily have we added sin to sin, and have made ourselves children of wrath still more by practice than we were by nature: every day of our lives have we transgressed thy laws, abused thy mercies, tempted thy patience, despised thy goodness, offended thee more, even for thy forbearance with us: and made the very abundance of thy grace an encouragement to continue in our sins. O thou whom we have so greatly provoked, what must we not expect if thou shouldest enter into judgment with us? How justly mightest thou withdraw thy tender mercies from us, and pour out upon us thy wrath and indignation to the uttermost! How justly mightest thou leave us to feel what an evil and bitter thing it is to trespass against thee: and make us to experience the same, in that place of torment, where is weeping, and wailing, and gnashing of teeth, and from whence there is no redemption.

But thou art a God of wonderful patience to bear with sinners; and a God of infinite goodness and mercy to forgive them, when they are truly penitent. Thou hast said, that, if the wicked forsake his way, and the unrighteous man his thoughts, and return to the Lord, thou wilt have mercy upon him, and abundantly pardon. We humbly beg, therefore, that thou wilt be graciously pleased to stretch forth thy powerful hand, and to loose the chains of sin wherewith we are tied and bound. Let it be thy good pleasure to deliver us from every weight of sin, and from every yoke of bondage; that our souls may be fitted to serve thee with that sincerity and readiness and gladness, which thou requirest of thy people. O help us so to see and feel, so to hate and bewail, so to confess and forsake, our 2 п 2

sins, that we may have a well-grounded hope of thy forgiveness, and a comfortable persuasion that thou hast accepted us in the Son of thy love.

And for his sake, grant thou us, O Lord, an increase of thy grace, and such aids of thy Holy Spirit, as may enable us to mortify our sins, and fit us for all the duties of thy service. Make us. O our God, to serve thee sincerely. without hypocrisy; cheerfully, without dulness; universally, without partiality; and constantly, without falling away, or being weary of well-Thou art not weary in doing us good; doing. O let us never be weary in doing thee service. But as thou hast pleasure in the prosperity of thy servants, so let us take pleasure in the service of our Lord, and abound in thy work and in thy love and praise evermore. O fill up all that is wanting, and reform whatever is amiss in us, and perfect that which concerns us; making us such, in our hearts and in our lives, that we may obtain peace in our souls, and be made partakers of thy heavenly glory. And be thou pleased to grant us now (out of the riches of thy grace) the comfortable sense of thy gracious acceptance of us, and of thy merciful intentions towards us. O speak peace to our consciences, and say to each of our souls, I am thy salvation; that so we may look upon thee as our reconciled God and Father in Christ Jesus.

And as thou hast been good and kind to us the day past, and throughout our whole lives (for which we desire, O Lord, humbly and thankfully to adore thy name), so we beg that we may experience the continuance of thy goodness to us, and of thy fatherly care over us, this present night. O preserve and defend, and bless and keep us, that no evil may befall us, nor any plague come nigh our dwelling. Give us sleep and rest, to refresh and strengthen us for thy service, and for the performance of all our duties: and prepare us, O Lord, for our last sleep in death, and for that great account that we must give at the judgment seat of Christ. O instruct and assist us in that great work of preparation for our everlasting state; that we may (in this only time of preparation) finish the great work which thou hast given us to do, before the night of death overtake us, wherein we cannot work: that whenever thou shalt be pleased to give us the summons of death, we may find nothing to do but to die and cheerfully resign our spirits into thy gracious hands. Hear us, we entreat thee, through the riches of thy grace, and the worthiness of thy dear Son; in whose merits alone we trust, and to whom, together with thyself and the Holy Ghost, the one God of our salvation, be all praise, and honour, and glory, ascribed by

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us, and by all thy people, from this time forth for evermore. Amen.—Our Father, &c.

THURSDAY MORNING.

O LORD God, that hearest prayer, and art nigh to all that call upon thee in truth, we are moved by our own necessities, and encouraged by thy daily mercies, to renew our supplications at the throne of thy grace. And we beg of thee who fashioneth all the hearts of the sons of men, to prepare our hearts, that we may now come into thy holy presence, and call upon thy blessed name, in a due and acceptable manner. O pour upon us the spirit of grace and of supplication; let thy good spirit help our infirmities; and teach us to ask such things, and in such a way, as shall be most agreeable to thy will, and most advantageous to our souls.

If thou, O Lord, shouldst enter into judgment with us for our actions, we could not answer thee for one of a thousand; we must lay our hands upon our mouths, and plead guilty before thee, and place our whole dependence upon thy mercy.

O God, be merciful to us, miserable sinners: for the sake of him whom thou hast exalted to be a Prince and a Saviour, to give repentance to thy people, and forgiveness of sins: be merciful to us, we pray thee; and heal our souls, that have greatly sinned against thee. O heal our backslidings, renew us to repentance, and establish thy goings in thy holy ways: let us not be so wavering and bent to backslide: let us not so revolt from thee, and return to folly after thou hast spoken peace unto us; but may we go on conquering and to conquer all the enemies of our souls; till every obstacle to our salvation be surmounted, and Satan himself be bruised under our feet.

O thou God of all grace! bring such thoughts to our minds, and lay such considerations upon our hearts, as thou knowest will effectually keep us from all iniquity, and prevail with us to do thy will; put thy fear in our hearts, that we may not any more depart from thee; and preserve us holy and unblamea-

ble unto the coming of our Lord Jesus Christ. In the mean time sanctify to us all the dispensations of thy providence, and bless us in every condition and relation of life. Make us humble in a high estate, or contented in a low one; nor let us ever forget, that the care of our souls is the one thing needful: O make us mindful of this, that we may follow incessantly those things which shall bring us peace at last.

Dispose of us, we beseech thee, and of all that concerns us, to the glory of thy name. O keep us at all times, and in all places and companies, from the evil of sin, and from all other evils to which the greatness of our sins has made us liable. And take thou, O heavenly Father, the gracious charge and government of us this day; and so guide us by thy counsel, that hereafter thou mayest receive us to glory. All this we ask through thy tender mercies, and our Saviour's abundant merits; in whose own words we beg all things needful for ourselves and others.—Our Father, &c.

THURSDAY EVENING.

EVER-BLESSED and glorious Lord; thou art a great God, and a great King, above all gods. The earth is thine, and the fulness thereof;

the world, and all they that dwell therein. We are thine, for thou madest us, and on thee we entirely depend for the continuance of life and all its enjoyments. It is most fit that we should daily acknowledge our dependence upon thee, and our obligations to thee, in united acts of prayer and praise.

We prostrate our souls this evening before thy throne, to tender thee the homage which is thy due; and under a sense of our great unworthiness we beg to be accepted through Jesus Christ.

We particularly praise thee for the safety and the comforts of the day past. Under a sense of thy former kindness, we commit ourselves and each other to thy future care. May we this night rest secure under the shadow of thy wings, and let thy good providence, continue to be exercised for our protection and comfort through all the remaining days of our lives on earth. Under an apprehension of the manifold dangers and calamities to which we are ever liable in this present evil world, we fly to thee as our only refuge. Be thou pleased to take the charge of us, and we shall be secure from evil, and our hearts shall not fear. O thou Great Shepherd of Israel, whose watchful eye is ever upon them that trust in thee, preserve us lying down and rising up, going out and coming in, from this time forth and for ever.

But we would more especially be solicitous for the safety and happiness of our souls. Blessed God; in the midst of ten thousand snares and dangers, from without, and from within, permit us to look up to thee as the God of salvation, to whom belong the issues from death. Let thine eyes be upon us for good, and keep these souls of ours from whatever would involve them in guilt and ruin.

When we are tempted to sloth and indolence, awaken us, we pray thee, with the lively views of that invisible and eternal world to which we are tending; and engage us to remember the infinite importance of diligently improving those transient moments which thou hast allotted us to prepare for it.

When sinners entice us, may we not consent, but may holy converse with thee give us a disrelish for the society of those who are strangers to thee, and would separate our souls from thee. May we honour them that fear the Lord, and by walking with wise and holy men, may we be daily advancing in wisdom and holiness.

Guard us, O Lord, from every unlawful pleasure. May we remember that to be carnally-minded is death. Purify and refine our souls by the influences of thy Holy Spirit; and may we aspire after those pleasures which are at thy right hand for evermore.

Preserve us, O God, from that pride which goeth before destruction. Promote in us that

humility and lowliness of mind which so well become the disciples of the blessed Jesus. May we learn of him who was meek and lowly in heart. Deliver us, we beseech thee, from covetousness, which is idolatry, and that love of the world which is enmity with God. Let us not make haste to be rich, nor seek great things for ourselves on earth, remembering that the love of money is the root of all evil. And if riches increase, let us not set our hearts upon them. May our desires after worldly possessions, and our delight in them, be moderated by considering their uncertain and unsatisfying nature; and while others are laying up for themselves treasures on earth, may we be rich towards God.

Deliver us from all those fleshly lusts which war against the soul, and from all those vices which tend to grieve thy good Spirit, and to banish peace and joy from the heart.

Especially we pray, that thou wilt deliver us from the sins which do most easily beset us, and enable us to set a special guard against them. Help us continually to watch and pray, that we may not enter into temptation, and to keep our hearts with all diligence, since out of them are the issues of life.

We lament it, that, through our neglect of watchfulness and prayer, we have so often yielded to temptation, and fallen into sin. Mercifully pardon all our past neglects; make

the bottom of our hearts, most humbly beseech thee to remit and forgive unto us all our offences and misdeeds; that, by the virtue of the precious blood of Jesus Christ, thine innocent Lamb, which he so abundantly shed, to take away the sins of the world, all our sins, both original and actual, may be so cleansed and washed from us, as that they may never be laid to our charge, nor ever have power to rise up in judgment against us.

And forasmuch, O Lord, as we are taught by thy word, that nothing unholy or impure shall inherit the kingdom of God, pour the grace of thy Holy Spirit into our hearts, whereby we may learn to abhor our sins, and be more and more stirred up to live in newness of life, and love of thy majesty; so that we may daily increase in the obedience of thy word, and in conscionable care of keeping thy commandments.

And now, O Lord, we thank thee for our life, health, liberty, prosperity, and peace: especially, O Lord, for the continuance of thy holy gospel among us, and for sparing us so long, and granting us so gracious a time of repentance. Also we praise thee, for all other thy mercies bestowed upon us; more especially for preserving us during the past night from all dangers that might have befallen our souls or bodies.

And seeing thou hast now brought us safe

to the beginning of this day, we beseech thee, protect and direct us in the same. Bless and defend us in our going out and coming in this day and evermore. Shield us, O Lord, from the temptations of the devil, and grant us the custody of thy holy angels, to defend and direct us in all our ways.

And to this end, we recommend ourselves. and all those that belong unto us, and are abroad from us, into thy hands, and almighty tuition. Lord, defend them from all evil, prosper them in all graces, and fill them with thy goodness. Preserve us likewise, this day, from falling into any gross sin, especially those whereunto our natures are most prone. Set a watch before the door of our lips, that we offend not thy Majesty, by any sinful speeches: give unto us patient minds, pure and chaste hearts, and all other graces of thy Spirit, which thou knowest to be needful for us, that we may the better be enabled to serve thee in holiness and righteousness. And seeing that all men's labour, without thy blessing, is in vain, bless every one of us in our several places and callings, direct and prosper thou the work of our hands upon us, provide all things, which thou, O Father, knowest to be needful for every one of us, in our souls and bodies this day.

Defend likewise, O Lord, thy universal Church, and every particular member thereof:

especially we beseech thee to continue the peace and prosperity of these churches and kingdoms wherein we live. Preserve and defend from all evils and dangers our gracious Queen. Bless all our ministers and magistrates with all graces needful for their places, and govern thou them, that they may govern us in peace and godliness. Give every one of us grace. to be always mindful of his last end, and to be prepared with faith and repentance, as with a wedding garment, against the time that thou shalt call for us, out of this sinful world. Above all things, may we seek thy glory, that when this mortal life is ended, we may then be made partakers of immortality in thy most blessed and glorious kingdom. Hear us, for Christ's sake. Amen.-Our Father, &c.

SATURDAY EVENING.

us thy everlasting arms. O thou who art the watchful Shepherd of thy Israel, take care of us this night; command thy angels to pitch their tents about us, that no evil may befall us nor plague come nigh our dwelling.

Lord, sanctify our night's rest and sleep, that so our frail bodies may be refreshed, and the better disposed to serve thee on thy own day, without drowsiness or wearying. And O that we may have grace to remember thee upon our beds, and meditate on thee in the night watches; and when we fall asleep, O that we may leave our hearts in heaven, that when we awake we may be still with thee. Hear us, own us, and bless us, for Christ's sake; and let the grace of our Lord Jesus Christ, the love of God the Father, and the consolation and fellowship of the Holy Spirit, be with us this night, and for evermore. And these requests are presented, not in our own name, but in the name of the Lord Jesus, to whom, with thee, O Father, and the Holy Spirit, one God, be ascribed glory and honour, dominion and praise, now and for ever Amen.

I am confounded myself at the remembrance of these things; but be thou merciful to my unrighteousness, and do not remember against me my sins and transgressions! Permit me, O Lord, to bring back unto thee those powers and faculties which I have ungratefully and sacrilegiously alienated from thy service; and receive, I beseech, thee, thy poor revolted creature, who is now convinced of thy right to him, and desires nothing in the whole world so much as to be thine!

Blessed God! it is with the utmost solemnity that I make this surrender of myself unto

thee. Hear, O heavens, and give ear, O earth, . I vouch the Lord this day to be my God; and I avouch and declare myself, this day, to be one of his covenant children and people. Hear, O thou God of Heaven, and record it in the book of thy remembrance, that henceforth I am thine, entirely thine. I would not merely consecrate unto thee some of my powers, or some of my possessions; or give thee a certain proportion of my services, or all I am capable of for a limited time; but I would be wholly thine, and thine for ever. From this day do I solemnly renounce all the former lords which have had dominion over me, every sin and every lust; and bid, in thy name, an eternal defiance to the powers of hell, which have most unjustly usurped the empire over my soul, and to all the corruptions which their fatal temptations have introduced into The whole frame of my nature, all the it. faculties of my mind, and all the members of my body would I present before thee this day, as a living sacrifice, holy and acceptable unto God, which I know to be my most reasonable To thee I consecrate all my worldly service. possessions: in thy service I desire to spend all the remainder of my time upon earth, and beg thou wouldst instruct and influence me, so that, whether my abode here be longer or shorter, every year and month, every day and hour, may be used in such a manner as shall

most effectually promote thine honour, and subserve the schemes of thy wise and gracious And I earnestly pray, that whatprovidence. ever influence thou givest me over others, in any of the superior relations of life in which I may stand, or in consequence of any peculiar regard which may be paid to me, thou wouldst give me strength and courage to exert myself to the utmost, for thy glory; resolving not only that I will myself do it, but that all others, so far as I can rationally and properly influence them, shall serve the Lord. In this course, O blessed God, would I steadily persevere to the very end of my life; earnestly praying, that every future day of it may supply the deficiencies, and correct the irregularities of the former; and that I may by divine grace be enabled, not only to hold on in that happy way, but daily to grow more active in it!

Nor do I only consecrate all that I am, and have, to thy service; but I also most humbly resign, and submit to thine holy and sovereign will, myself, and all that I can call mine. I leave, O Lord, to thy management and direction, all I possess, and all I wish; and set every enjoyment and every interest before thee, to be disposed of as thou pleasest. Continue or remove what thou hast given me: bestow, or refuse, what I imagine I want, as thou, Lord, shalt see good. And though I dare not say, I will never repine; yet I hope

I may venture to say, that I will labour not only to submit, but to acquiesce; not only to bear what thou dost in thy most afflictive dispensation, but to consent to it, and to praise thee for it; contentedly resolving, in all that thou appointest for me, my will unto thine, and looking on myself as nothing, and on thee, O God, as the great eternal All, whose word ought to determine every thing, and whose government ought to be the joy of the whole rational creation.

Use me, O Lord, I beseech thee, as the instrument of thy glory; and honour me so far, as either by doing or suffering what thou shalt appoint, to bring some revenue of praise to thee, and of benefit to the world in which I And may it please thee from this day dwell! forward, to number me among thy peculiar people, that I may no more be a stranger and foreigner, but a fellow-citizen with the saints, and of the household of God! Receive, O heavenly Father, thy returning prodigal! Wash me in the blood of thy dear Son; clothe me with his perfect righteousness: and sanctify me throughout by the power of thy Spirit! Destroy, I beseech thee, more and more the power of sin in mine heart! Transform me more into thine own image, and fashion me to the resemblance of Jesus, whom henceforth I would acknowledge as my teacher and sacrifice, my intercessor and my Lord! Commu-2 G 2

nicate to me, I beseech thee, all needful influences of thy purifying, thy cheering, and thy comforting Spirit! And lift up that light of countenance upon me, which will put the sublimest joy and gladness into my soul!

Dispose my affairs, O God, in a manner which may be most subservient to thy glory and my own truest happiness; and when I have done and borne thy will upon earth, call me from hence at what time, and in what manner thou pleasest: only grant, that in my dying moments, and in the near prospects of eternity, I may remember these my engagements to thee, and may employ my latest breath in thy service! And do thou. Lord. when thou seest the agonies of dissolving nature upon me, remember this covenant too. even though I should then be incapable of recollecting it. Look down, O my heavenly Father, with a pitying eye, upon thy languishing, thy dying child; place thine everlasting arms underneath me for my support; put strength and confidence into my departing spirit; and receive it to the embraces of thy everlasting love! Welcome it to the abodes of them that sleep in Jesus, to wait with them that glorious day, when the last of thy promises to the covenant people shall be fulfilled in their triumphant resurrection, and that abundant entrance, which shall be administered to them into that everlasting kingdom,

of which thou hast assured them by thy covenant, and in the hope of which I now lay hold on it, desiring to live and to die, as with mine hand on that hope!

And when I am thus numbered among the dead, and all the interests of mortality are over with me for ever, if this solemn memorial should chance to fall into the hands of any surviving friends, may it be the means of making serious impressions on their minds! May they read it, not only as my language, but as their own; and learn to fear the Lord my God, and with me to put their trust under the shadow of his wings for time and for eternity! And may they also learn to adore with me that grace, which inclines our hearts to enter into the covenant, and condescends to admit us into it, when so inclined; ascribing with me, and with all the nations of the redeemed, to the Father, the Son, and the Holy Ghost, that glory, honour, and praise, which is so justly due to each divine person. for the part he bears in this illustrious work! Amen.

FOR THE SPIRIT OF, PRAYER.

O HOLY and eternal God, who hast commanded us to pray unto thee in all our neces-

sities, and to give thanks unto thee for all our instances of joy and blessing, and to adore thee in all thy attributes and communications. thy own glories, and thy eternal mercies,give unto me, thy servant, the spirit of prayer and supplication, that I may understand what is good for me; that I may desire regularly, and choose the best things; that I may conform to thy will, and submit to thy disposing, relinquishing my own affections and imperfect choice. Sanctify my heart and spirit, that I may sanctify thy name, and that I may be gracious and accepted in thine eyes. Give me the humility and obedience of a servant. that I may also have the hope and confidence of a son, making humble and confident addresses to the throne of grace; that, in all my necessities, I may come to thee for aid, and may trust in thee for a gracious answer, and may receive satisfaction and supply.

Give me a sober, diligent and recollected spirit in my prayers, neither choked with cares, nor scattered by levity, nor discomposed by passion, nor estranged from thee by inadvertency, but fixed fast to thee by the indissoluble bands of great love and a pregnant devotion. And let the beams of thy Holy Spirit, descending from above, enlighten and enkindle it with great fervours, and holy importunity, and unwearied industry; that I may serve thee, and obtain thy blessing by the assiduity

and zeal of perpetual religious offices. Let my prayers come before thy presence, and the lifting up of my hands be a daily sacrifice, and let the fires of zeal not go out by night or day; but unite my prayers to the intercession of thy holy Jesus, and to a communion of those offices which angels and beatified souls do pay before the throne of the Lamb, and at the celestial altar; that my prayers, being hallowed by the merits of Christ, and being presented in the vial of the saints, may ascend thither where thy glory dwells, and whence mercy and eternal benediction descend upon the church.

Lord, change my sins into penitential sorrow, my sorrow to petition, my petition to eucharist; that my prayers may be consummate in the adorations of eternity, and the glorious participation of the end of our hopes and prayers, the fulness of never-failing charity and fruition of thee, O holy and eternal God, blessed Trinity and mysterious Unity, to whom all honour, and worship, and thanks, and confession, and glory, be ascribed for ever and ever. Amen.

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PREPARATORY TO THE LORD'S SUPPER.

HOLY, holy holy, Lord God Almighty, who art of purer eyes than to behold iniquity, who searchest the heart, and triest the innermost thoughts, I beseech thee now to assist me in looking into my own heart, and my own life. Feeling and acknowledging that my heart is deceitful above all things, and desperately wicked, I beseech thee to show me to myself. Enable me to try myself by the standard of thy holy word, and discover the true state of my soul: give me repentance for all my past sins; lively faith in Jesus Christ, the only Saviour from sin; deep humility before thee, and such tempers and dispositions as are meet for those who assemble round the table of our gracious Redeemer. These things I ask for his name's sake. Amen.

BEFORE THE COMMUNION.

Most holy, and blessed, and gracious Lord God, with all humility and reverence I here present myself before thee, to seek thy face and entreat thy favour, and as an evidence of thy good will towards me, to beg that I may experience thy good work in me.

I acknowledge myself unworthy, utterly unworthy of the honour; unfit, utterly unfit for the service to whick I am now called. It

is an inestimable privilege, that I am admitted so often to hear from thee in thy word, and to speak to thee in prayer; and yet, as if this had been a small matter, I am now invited into communion with thee at thy holy table, there to celebrate the memorial of my Saviour's death, and to partake by faith of the precious benefits which flow from it. I, who deserve not the crumbs, am called to eat of the children's bread.

O Lord, I thank thee for the institution of this blessed ordinance, this precious legacy and token of love, which the Lord Jesus left to his Church, and that it has been preserved to this age; that it is administered in this land, that I am admitted to it, and have now before me an opportunity to partake of it; Lord, grant that I may not receive thy grace herein in vain!

O thou who hast called me to the marriage supper of the Lamb, give me the weddinggarment; work in me a disposition of soul, and all those pious and devout affections which are suited to the solemnities of this ordinance, and requisite to qualify me for an acceptable and advantageous participation of it. Behold the fire and the wood, all things are now ready; but where is the lamb for the burnt-offering? Lord, provide thyself a lamb, by working in me all that which thou requirest of me upon this occasion: the pre-

paration of the heart, and the answer of the tongue are both from thee; Lord, prepare my unprepared heart for communion with thee.

Lord, I confess I have sinned against thee; I have done foolishly, very foolishly, for foolishness is bound up in my heart; I have sinned, and have come short of the glory of God; I have come short of glorifying thee, and deserve to come short of being glorified with The imagination of my heart is evil thee. continually, and the bias of my corrupt nature is very strong towards the world and the flesh, and the gratifications of sense; but towards God, and Christ, and heaven, I move slowly, and with many stops and pauses. Nay, there is in my carnal mind an aversion to divine and spiritual things. I have misspent my time, trifled away my opportunities, have followed after lying vanities, and forsaken my own mercies. God be merciful to me a sinner! for how little have I done. since I came into the world, of the great work that I was sent into this world to perform!

Thou hast taken me into covenant with thee, for I am a baptized Christian, set apart for thee, and sealed to be thine; thou hast laid me, and I also have laid myself, under all possible obligations to love thee, and serve thee, and live to thee. But I have started aside from thee like a deceitful bow, I have not made good my covenant with thee, nor hath

the temper of my mind, and the tenor of my conversation, been agreeable to that holy religion of which I make profession, to my expectations from thee, and engagements to thee. I am ever inclined to backslide from the living God; and if I were under the law I were undone; but I am under grace, a covenant of grace which leaves room for repentance, and promises pardon upon repentance, which invites even backsliding children to return, and promises that their backslidings shall be healed.

O Lord. I take hold of this covenant: seal it to me at thy table. There let me find my heart truly humbled for sin, and sorrowing for it after a godly sort: O that I may there look on him whom I have pierced, and mourn, and be in bitterness for him; that there I may sow in tears, and receive a broken Christ into a broken heart: and there let the blood of Christ, which speaketh better things than that of Abel, be sprinkled upon my conscience, to purify and give me peace: there let me be assured that thou art reconciled to me, that my iniquities are pardoned, and that I shall There say unto not come into condemnation. me, Be of good cheer, thy sins are forgiven thee.

And that I may not come unworthily to this blessed ordinance, I beseech thee to lead me into a more intimate and experimental acquaintance with Jesus Christ, and him cru-

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cified; with Jesus Christ, and him glorified; that knowing him, and the power of his resurrection, and the fellowship of his sufferings, and being by his grace planted in the likeness of both, I may both discern the Lord's body, and show forth the Lord's death.

Lord. I desire by a true and lively faith to close with Jesus Christ, and consent to him as my Lord, and my God: I here give up myself to him as my Prophet, Priest, and King, to be ruled, and taught, and saved by him: this is my beloved, and this is my friend. None but Christ, none but Christ. Lord, increase this faith in me, perfect what is lacking in it; and enable me, in receiving the bread and wine at thy table, by a lively faith to receive Christ Jesus the Lord. O let the great gospel doctrine of Christ's dying to save sinners, which is represented in that ordinance, be meat and drink to my soul-meat indeed, and drink indeed. Let it be both nourishing and refreshing to me, let it be both my strength and my song, and be the spring both of my holiness and of my comfort. And let such deep impressions be made upon my soul, by the actual commemoration of it, as may abide always upon me, and have a powerful influence upon me in my whole conversation, that the life I now live in the flesh I may live by the faith of the Son of God, who loved me, and gave himself for me.

Lord; I beseech thee, fix my thoughts; let my heart be engaged to approach unto thee, that I may attend upon thee without distraction. Draw out my desires towards thee; give me to hunger and thirst after righteousness, that I may be filled; and to draw near to thee with a true heart, and in full assurance of faith; and since I am not straitened in thee, O let me not be straitened in my own bosom.

Draw me, Lord, and I will run after thee; O send out thy light and thy truth, let them lead and guide me; pour thy Spirit upon me, put thy Spirit within me, to work in me both. to will and to do that which is good, and leave me not to myself. Awake, O north wind, and come thou south, and blow upon my garden; come, O blessed Spirit of grace, and enlighten my mind with the knowledge of Christ, bow my will to the will of Christ, fill my heart with the love of Christ, and confirm my resolutions to live and die with him.

Work in me, I pray thee, a principle of holy love and charity towards all men, that I may forgive my enemies, which by thy grace I heartily do, and may keep up a spiritual communion in faith, hope, and holy love, with all that in every place call on the name of Jesus Christ our Lord. Lord, bless them all, and particularly that congregation with which

I am to join in this solemn ordinance. Good Lord, pardon every one that engageth his heart to seek God, the Lord God of his fathers, though not cleansed according to the purification of the sanctuary. Hear my prayers, and heal the people.

Lord, meet me with a blessing, a Father's blessing, at thy table; grace thine own institutions with thy presence; and fulfil in me all the good pleasure of thy goodness, and the work of faith with power; for the sake of Jesus Christ, my blessed Saviour and Redeemer, to whom, with the Father, and the eternal Spirit, be everlasting praises. Amen.

AFTER THE COMMUNION.

I CAST myself at thy feet, O my God, to thank thee for all thy benefits, but more especially for that which I have now been receiving. Though outwardly but a single instance of thy goodness, it yet comprehends many blessings, every one of which deserves an everlasting thanksgiving. Well may I adore the boundless goodness and mercy in which thy blessings to me had their origin, when I think of my own unworthiness, and that thou hast not been prevented thereby from pouring them with such liberality upon my head.

Surely I should be unworthy of living a single hour longer, if I felt not the obligations under which thou hast laid me, if I were not penetrated to the heart by thy goodness, if I were not actuated by a sincere and ardent desire to testify to thee my thankfulness.

Accept, then, O my God, my humble thanks for this thy great and wonderful loving-kind-Thou hast carried me to thy house of ness. prayer; thou hast put into my hands the memorials of my Lord's broken body and shed blood, thereby sealing me anew unto the day of redemption, giving me a fresh proof that thou hast chosen me out of this world that is lying in wickedness, and enabling me by faith to feed upon Christ and him crucified, as made unto me wisdom, and sanctification, and life eternal. Blessed be thy name for this new mark of special favour to my soul. I was dead, and thou hast said unto me, Live; I am weary, weak, and heavy laden, and thou hast given me Christ as the resting-place of my soul; nay, to dwell in me as the hope of glory hereafter, and the earnest of many a victory won over sin and Satan, the world and the flesh. From the bottom of my heart, O Lord, do I thank thee. Accept of my thanksgiving, or rather, as thou hast accepted the satisfaction of thy Son as the expiation of all my sins, accept the plenitude of his merits, the infinite preciousness of his sacrifice. and, **2 н 2**

by its imputation to me, regard not my inability to thank thee as I ought.

But this is not all, O my God. I have still another mercy to petition from thee. May it please thee to give me the succours of thy Holy Spirit to strengthen me for the performance of every duty incumbent upon me for the future. Fill my heart with zeal and ardour in thy service, with love and respect for thy holy will, with hatred and aversion to sin, with contempt for the world and its false gratifications. Sustain me by thy good hand during the course of my life; and whatever, in thy providence, shall befall me, forbid, O my God. that I should ever abandon thee. Permit me not even to relax in the desire which I now have to please and serve thee, and to do my uttermost to observe thy holy. precepts. Rather strengthen more and more Make it pass into an abiding rethis desire. solution, and permit not that this resolution should be unaccompanied with those effects which it ought to produce, in order to please thee. In a word, I ask of thee, O Lord, all that is necessary to prepare me for receiving at length from thine own hand those infinite blessings, the earnest and assurance of which I have received in thy holy sacrament.

And whilst I am in this world, O Lord, leave me not to myself. Abandon me not to my spiritual enemies, to my native weakness,

inconstancy, and sinful inclinations. May I be found ever on the advance towards the end and object of my vocation-that perfection which is in Christ Jesus, and becometh thine house. May I every day be gaining fresh victories over myself, and learn to bring my heart more and more under the yoke of faith. For which purpose may it please thee to watch over me by thy providence, and continue towards me thy protection and care, till the last moments of my life. Forbid that thy coming, O good God, should surprise me. Forbid that it should find me asleep, or off my guard. Give me to be always waiting, always ready to bid thee welcome. May my faith be ever lively, my charity ever active; may my heart be detached from the world and its vain delights, and fixed upon thee, as the object of its main, its only desire. May I always be sighing after thee, until I be united to thy glory, to bless thee, and praise thee for ever and ever.

Go up with me, then, through this wilderness, and let that peace of thine which passeth understanding, which the world can neither give nor take away, reign ever in my soul until transported to the triumphant Jerusalem, that city of peace, and caim, and repose; elevated above the storms and tempests of this world, and united inseparably to thee, I shall be, in some degree, a partaker of thy

immutability, behold thy face in glory, and satisfy myself with the joys of thy sanctuary, the eternal pleasures which are at thy right hand. This I ask of thee not in my own name, but relying on the intercession of thy Son, the Prince of Peace, the King of Glory, to whom, with thee, and the Eternal Spirit, I ascribe all blessing and praise for evermore. Amen.

FOR THE LOVE OF GOD.

O LORD my God, thou art my supreme and consummate good! And what am I, to presume to open my lips before thee? Yet poor and unprofitable as I am, remember me, O Lord, and have mercy upon me, for without thee I have nothing, can do nothing, and am nothing. Thou alone art just, and good, and holy. Remember, O Lord, the love that brought me into being; and as thou madest all things for the communication of thy blessedness and perfections, O fill me with thyself!

When I am left to the disorderly workings of nature and self, behold, I am all weakness and misery! but when thy love cometh upon my soul, my weakness is made strong, and my misery turned into joy. This change is the

pure effect of thy infinite love, preventing me in all unholy desires, succouring me in all necessities, protecting me from imminent dangers, and delivering me from innumerable unknown evils.

By the love of myself, I lose myself; but by the love and pursuit of thee alone, I have both found thee and found myself; and the more pure this love, the more truly does it show me my own nothingness: for thou, O most beloved Redeemer, hast been merciful to me beyond all that I could either ask, or hope, or conceive.

Lord, give me that love which knoweth no limits, feeleth no burden, considereth no labour; which surpasseth all sweetness, or strength, or height, or depth, or breadth; which findeth no rest in created things, but ever seeketh him from whom it is derived.

May thy love make me circumspect, humble, and equitable, sober and chaste, constant and persevering, peaceful and calm, submissive and obedient, devout and thankful, even when thy consolations are suspended; for in this fallen life, love is not exempt from pain.

O thou supreme good, expand my heart to receive thy most excellent gift, filling me with faith, and patience, and courage. Let me rejoice in thee exceedingly, and in thee, love all thy creatures, as that perfect love requireth, which is a ray of the infinite love that shines in thee.

Blessing, and praise, and glory, be unto thee, O heavenly Father, and to thy only begotten Son, our beloved Saviour, and to thy Holy Spirit, our sweetest Comforter, for ever and ever. Amen.

FOR THE LOVE OF OUR NEIGHBOUR.

O MOST gracious and merciful Lord our God. who art goodness and love itself; thou hast commanded that he who loveth thee, should love his brother also, yea, that we should love our neighbour as ourselves. Father of mercies, forgive me all my sins of uncharitableness, and give me a heart to abound with loving-kindness to all who are partakers of my nature, and objects of thy fatherly compassion. Let me not despise any for their low estate, nor hate any for their abusive carriage, nor cast off any as reprobate for their scandalous wickedness; but be kindly affectionate to all, desirous of their holiness and happiness, and contributing what lieth in me to promote it; showing the mercy which thou knowest I need, and forgiving others, as I myself desire to be forgiven.

Make me ready to distribute, and willing to communicate; and as I should be glad to

find favour, and to receive a supply of my own wants, give me, O gracious God, a large heart, and, according to my ability, an open hand, that I may give cheerfully, and sow plentifully while I have time, doing good unto all men, especially to them that are of the household of faith, yea, loving the opportunities of such well-doing, and blessing thy name for disposing me to gladden the hearts of thy poor.

And O that we may all approve ourselves the disciples of our Lord, by the love we have one to another, and show that we have passed from death unto life, because we love the brethren. May we esteem them above all, and regard those as dearest to us, who most distinguish themselves in performing thy blessed will. O let our love be without dissimulation, not only in word and in tongue, but in deed and in truth. May we love one another with a pure heart fervently; may we seek the good of all, however undeserving they may be in themselves, or however hostile to us; and let my delight be in the righteous, that are more excellent than their neighbours. Make me to love them for thy holy image appearing in them, and to set my heart upon them, because thou art with them, and hast a favour unto them, and hast loved them with an everlasting love. O Lord of love, keep me from censoriousness and rash judging of any, that

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I may think and hope the best of all which their case will admit, and love every one for his sake, who has showed the greatest love to us all, even our dearest Lord and only Saviour Jesus Christ. Amen.

FOR REPENTANCE.

O most holy Lord, against whom I have greatly sinned, thou hast revealed thy wrath from heaven against all ungodliness and unrighteousness of men, and hast declared, that except we repent, we shall all perish.

Thou wilt not save any without repentance, yet, upon our repenting, hast assured us of thy gracious pardon and acceptance. When we return unto thee, and humble ourselves before thee, thou wilt show us thy mercy, and grant us thy salvation. O thou searcher of hearts, thou seest that our hearts are hardened through the deceitfulness of sin; without thy grace I am unable to turn unto thee with my whole heart; if thou endue me not with power from on high, I must continue for ever a miserable captive to sin and Satan.

O thou that didst cause water to gush out of the stony rock, break and melt my rocky heart. Teach me to look upon him whom my sins have pierced, and mourn. Cause me

to be in bitterness for all the offences that I have committed against thee, the Lord of love, and author of all my mercies. O give me true repentance, such as thy holy word requires, and such as thy gracious goodness in Christ Jesus will mercifully accept.-that repentance unto life which is never to be repented of. Lord, thou knowest I desire to have that brokenness of heart, and that deep contrition which thou wilt not despise. Renew me in the spirit of my mind, that I may bring forth fruits meet for repentance; not only confessing and bewailing my sins, but also forsaking and hating them from my inmost soul. Thou knowest, good Lord, I cannot recall my sins; but O that I may never repeat them more! May I have such a sense of thy loving-kindness, as may effectually remove from all evil ways. Let me henceforth walk with all possible care and circumspection; may the time past of my life suffice to have wrought my own will; henceforth let me have grace determinately to forsake all evil ways and evil thoughts, that so thou mayest have mercy upon me, and pardon all my multiplied transgressions. Hear me, O God, and answer me, through the infinite riches of thy grace and goodness in Christ Jesus, my only Saviour. Amen.

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FOR PARDON OF SINS.

O HOLY and most merciful Father, spare me, thy poor, sinful, but repenting creature. Spare me, good Lord, spare me, and let me not perish in my sins, now I am heartily troubled and sorry for them; but through thine infinite mercies, may I find pardon and acceptance notwithstanding them all.

I am a sinful person, O Lord; but thou, O blessed Jesus, art the Saviour of sinners. Thou didst come into the world to call sinners to repentance. Lord, I come and repent at thy call, cast not me and my repentance away from thy presence.

I have gone astray, and, through the frailty of my flesh, am very defective in my return to thee. But thou, gracious Lord, considerest our frailties, thou knowest our frame, considerest whereof we are made, and rememberest that we are dust. O be not extreme to mark mine offences, but for Christ's sake blot out my transgressions, receive me graciously, and love me freely.

Now I have found the way to thy fear, let me find the comforts of thy mercy. My heart is truly contrite—O Lord despise it not; my spirit is broken, and trembleth at thy word— O Lord, receive it; it is heavily laden, and wearied with my sins—O my God, give it ease from the same. Pity me, O Father, as a

father pitieth his own children—receive me as the offended father did his returning prodigal. Though I was lost, yet, by the blessing of thy grace, I am now found again. Welcome thy lost sheep when it returns home, and let there be joy in heaven on the repentance of me, a lost sinner.

O let the blood of Jesus cleanse me from all my sins; let his intercession for me in thy presence make my peace, and appease thy wrath. Shut not thine ears against the voice of his blood, nor be deaf to his mediation, but hear him, my Advocate for pardon, and let me find the forgiveness of all my sins, that thy troubled and trembling servant may have peace, and that thou mayest be sought unto, and feared and served by sinners, who will return unto thee in hopes of thy grace and pardoning mercy, through Jesus Christ our Lord and only Saviour.

FOR A FAMILY INVOLVED IN TEM-PORAL DIFFICULTIES.

O ALMIGHTY, and most merciful God, who hast the disposal of all events both in providence and grace, and doest all thy pleasure in the armies of heaven, and amongst the inhabitants of the earth; help us to approach thy footstool in great humility, and under a feeling sense of thy righteous and supreme authority. In thy hands are the issues of life and Health and strength, riches and povdeath. erty, sickness and mortality, are at thy command: and thou sendest them to whom it seemeth best to thy supreme wisdom. O prepare our minds by thy word and Spirit, to submit with humility, cheerfulness, and resignation to thy wise appointments. When our lines fall to us in pleasant places, and we enjoy a goodly heritage, enable us, we beseech thee, to conduct ourselves with sobriety, temperance, and unfeigned piety, that thy merciful kindness towards us may unite all the powers of our body and mind, to serve thee in holiness and righteousness all the days of our life.

But, O Lord, when thou art pleased to lay thy hand upon us, in the midst of judgment remember mercy. Thou hast visited us with trials, and disappointments in our temporal affairs, and we would acknowledge thy visitation to be just. Teach us submission to thy sovereign will, for thou art righteous in all thy ways, and holy in all thy works. Shew us, O merciful Father, where we have erred; and help us not only to confess and lament what we have left undone, but to abhor and forsake what we have done amiss. We are distressed, undertake for us; we mourn in our prayer, and are vexed. O may thy fatherly

goodness relieve our present necessities: thou hast no delight in the misery of thy creatures; thou dost not chastise us for thine own pleasure, but for our profit. May we look to the hand that smites us, and acknowledge the justness of the rod that thou hast laid upon us.

Though it hath seemed good to thee to withdraw the bounties of thy providence, and to permit us to experience many privations; vet take not thy Holy Spirit from us; leave us not to ourselves, nor deliver us into the hands of our enemies. Enable us to acknowledge that our present distress is of the Lord, and to say, "Let him do what seemeth him good." Though no affliction for the present seemeth to be joyous, but grievous; yet worketh out for us a far more exceeding and eternal weight of glory, while we look not at the things which are seen, but at the things which are not seen: "for the things which are seen are temporal, but the things which are not seen are eternal." Whilst thy hand is upon us, may we learn righteousness.

May we look to thee for wisdom to direct us, for grace and strength to sanctify and support us, and wait in faith and patience for renewed tokens of thy goodness; that being supplied with food and raiment, and having free access to the throne of grace, we may possess godliness with contentment, which we shall ever find to be the greatest gain. O

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Lord, give us neither poverty nor riches; but feed us with food convenient for us; lest we be full, and deny thee, and say, Who is the Lord? or lest we be poor, and steal, and take the name of our God in vain. Let thy merciful kindness be exercised towards us, and lead us to an unfeigned devotedness to thee; that finding thy favour to be better than life itself, and having glorified thee here on earth, we may at last be found meet for thy presence un heaven.

For these gracious ends, unite us to thy dear Son, by that faith which is of the operation of thy Spirit, lead us to true repentance, pardon all our transgressions, and sanctify us wholly; then shall we have reason to say, " It is good for us that we have been afflicted." Our longest sufferings in the present world are but for a moment; "for what is our life? it is even a vapour, that appeareth for a little time, and then vanisheth away." But in the world above we shall have life everlasting, without sickness, pain, disappointment, or death. There God will be all, and in all. Being freed from all earthly embarrassments, we shall be admitted to the privilege and blessedness of casting our crowns at the feet of Jesus, ascribing unto him the honour due unto his great name. O Lord, protect and keep us in the way everlasting; and though we are at present cast down, and our soul is

disquieted within us, yet raise us up, and enable us to hope in thee, and that we shall yet praise thee, who art the health of our countenance and our God.

To thy fatherly wisdom and protection, we would commit ourselves, and all our concerns, both temporal and spiritual. Order all things for the glory of thy own name, and dispose us to say, under every dispensation, with which we may be visited, "Not our will, but thine be done." Thou doest all things well, and causest all things to work together for good to them that love and fear thee. " O graft in our hearts the love of thy name; increase in us true religion; nourish us with all goodness; and of thy great mercy keep us in the same." And whilst we pray for ourselves, and praise thee for what we have received, and that which thou hast encouraged us to expect, hear us, we numbly beseech thee, in behalf of others, who are any ways afflicted or distressed in mind, body, or estate, that it may please thee to comfort and relieve them, according to their several necessities, giving them patience under their sufferings, and a happy issue out of all their afflictions. These, and all other needful blessings, we humbly ask in the name, and through the mediation of thy dear Son, Jesus Christ our Lord. Amen.

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FOR THE MINISTERS OF CHRIST.

O LORD JESUS CHRIST, the chief Shepherd and Bishop of our souls, who, when thou didst ascend on high, and lead captivity captive, didst give gifts to men—some apostles, some prophets, and some evangelists, and some pastors and teachers; for the perfecting of the saints, for the work of the ministry, and for the edifying of the body of Christ—we beseech thee graciously to look upon the bishops and pastors of thy flock, and upon all whom thou dost call to minister thy Gospel and feed thy Church, and pour upon them thy abundant blessing.

O Lord, greatly enrich them with spiritual gifts and endowments, according to thy infinite fullness and the multiplied wants of thy Church. Everywhere grant grace to thy children to be like-minded; having the same love; being of one accord and of one mind. Remove all schisms and divisions, jealousies and debates, strifes and contentions. Let us not judge our brother : let us not set him at nought : but let us rather judge this, that no man put a stumbling-block, or an occasion to fall, in his brother's way. Give us that most excellent gift of love, which suffers long and is kind, envieth not, is not puffed up, covers all

things, believes all things, hopes all things, and endures all things; seeks not its own, is not easily provoked, and thinks no evil; rejoices not in iniquity, but rejoices in the truth. Give unto us a right judgment in all things : so increase our knowledge of divine truth that we may be more and more joined together in the unity of the faith and of the knowledge of the Son of God. Give us to be subject one to another in the fear of God, and to be clothed with humility. Oh let all the churches of Christ holding the Head, notwithstanding outward differences, walk, so far as they have already attained, by the same rule, and mind the same thing; be of one heart and of one soul; speak the truth in love, and grow up into Him in all things which is the Head, even Christ. Grace be with all them who love the Lord Jesus Christ in since-Do thou at length bring in the fullness rity. of the Gentiles and the lost sheep of the house of Israel, and thus may there be one fold under one Shepherd, even Jesus our Redeemer.

(A portion of a prayer to be introduced in the daily devotion).

HEAVENLY FATHER, we entreat thee to remember with thy paternal love the members of

this family who are now separated from us for a time; be with them wherever they may be, to preserve them from danger and accident. Grant that they may remember thee in all their journeyings, and bearing in mind that thou God seest them, may they fear lest they may offend thee in thought, in word, or in deed. May they be guided by thy good Spirit into all truth, and be enabled to practise what they know to be thy holy will. Conduct them in safety wherever they may go, and if in accordance with thy gracious purposes, bring them back in peace and safety to their accustomed place of abode, in health, and strength, and in the enjoyment of every covenant blessing.

FOR DEVOTION IN PRAYER.

O GRACIOUS Lord God, who not only permittest, but invitest us, miserable and needy creatures, to present our petitions to thee; grant, I beseech thee, that the frequency of my prayer may be somewhat proportionable to those continued needs I have of thy mercy. Lord, I confess it is the greatest honour and greatest advantage, thus to be allowed access to thee; yet so stupid is my profane heart, that it shuns or frustrates the opportunities of it. My soul, O Lord, is possessed with a spirit of infirmity, it is bowed together, and can in nowise lift up

When thou hast spoken comfortably to me, make me careful not only to sin no more, lest a worse thing come upon me, but also to maintain all holy and thankful obedience unto thee, and never more to return to folly. Let the sense of thy mercies, O my God, encourage my repentance, and support me in thy fear, till I come at length to enjoy thy eternal favour, through Jesus Christ, my Lord. Amen.

FOR DIRECTION IN PRAYER.

And thus let me go on in the regular uniform discharge of the duties of piety towards God, and charity towards man, till, under the influences of thy divine Spirit, being prepared by a life of faith and hope for a state of vision and enjoyment, I shall be translated to those blessed and glorious mansions, where thou hast laid up for them that love thee such things as eye hath not seen, nor ear heard, nor can enter into the heart of man fully to comprehend; where I shall not only be sincere in my devotions as now, but equal to the angels, according to my capacities, and with fervent everlasting praises celebrate that goodness which is boundless and endless.

Let these my prayers come up for a memorial before thee, and be graciously accepted through the mediation of thy well beloved Son, my only Saviour and Advocate, Jesus Christ. Amen.

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PREPARATION FOR DEATH.

Gracious Father, I would not quit this earth of thine, and this house of clay in which I have sojourned during my abode upon the face of it, without my grateful acknowledgments to thee for all that abundant goodness which thou hast caused to pass before me here. With my dying breath, I bear witness to thy faithful care. I have wanted no good thing. thank thee, O my God, that this guilty, forfeited, unprofitable life, was so long spared: that it hath still been maintained by such a rich variety of thy bounty. I thank thee, that thou hast made this beginning of my existence so pleasant to me. I thank thee for the mercies of my days and nights, of my months and years, which are now come to their period. I thank thee for the mercies of

my infancy, and for those of my riper age; for all the agreeable friends whom thou hast given me in this house of my pilgrimage, the living and the dead; for all the help I have received from others; and for all the opportunities which thou hast given me of being helpful to the bodies and souls of my brethren of mankind.-Surely goodness and mercy have followed me all the days of my life; and I have reason to rise a thankful guest from the various and pleasant entertainments with which my table has been furnished by thee. Nor shall I have reason to repine, or to grieve at quitting them: for, O my God, are thy bounties exhausted? I know that they are not. I will not wrong thy goodness and thy faithfulness so much as to imagine, that because I am going from this earth, I am going from happiness. I adore thy mercy, that thou hast taught me to entertain nobler views through Jesus thy Son. I bless thee with all the powers of my nature, that I ever heard of his name, and heard of his death: and would fain exert a more vigorous act of thankful adoration, than in this broken state I am capable of, while I am extolling thee for the riches of thy grace manifested in him; for his instructions and his example, for his blood and his righteousness, and for that blessed Spirit of thine which thou hast given me, to turn my sinful heart unto thyself, and to bring me into the bonds of thy

covenant, of that covenant which is ordered in all things and sure, and which this death, though now separating my soul from my body, shall never be able to dissolve.

I bless thee, O Lord, that I am not dying in an unregenerated and impenitent state ; but that thou didst graciously awaken and convince me; that thou didst renew and sanctify my heart, and didst, by thy good Spirit, work in it an unfeigned faith, a real repentance, and the beginning of a divine life. I thank thee for ministers and ordinances: I thank thee for my sabbaths and my sacrament-days; for the weekly and monthly refreshments which they gave me: I thank thee for the fruits of Canaan, which were sent me in the wilderness, and are now sent me on the brink of Jordan. I thank thee for thy blessed Word; and for those exceeding rich and precious promises of it, which now lie as a cordial warm at my heart in this chilling hour; promises of support at death, and of glory beyond it, and of the resurrection of my body to everlasting life. O my God, I firmly believe them all, great and wonderful as they are, and am waiting for the accomplishment of them through Jesus Christ; in whom they are all yea and amen. Remember thy word unto thy Servant on which thou hast caused me to hope! I covenanted with thee, not for worldly enjoyments, which thy love taught me compara-

tively to despise, but for eternal life, as the gift of thy free grace, through Jesus Christ my Lord: and now permit me in his name to enter my humble claim to it! Permit me to consign this departing spirit to thine hand; for thou hast redeemed it, O Lord God of truth! I am thine: save me, and make me happy!

But may I indeed presume to say, I am thine? O God, now I am standing on the borders of both worlds, now I view things as in the light of thy presence and of eternity, how unworthy do I appear, that I should be taken to dwell with thy angels and saints in glory! Alas, I have reason to look back with deep humiliation on a poor, unprofitable, sinful life, in which I have daily been deserving to be cast into hell. But I have this one comfortable reflection, that I have fled to the cross of Christ; and I now renew my application to it. To think of appearing before God in such an imperfect righteousness as my own, were ten thousand times worse than death. No. Lord! I come unto thee as a sinner: but as a sinner who has believed in thy Son for pardon and life: I fall down before thee as a guilty polluted wretch; but thou hast made him to be unto thy people for wisdom and righteousness, for sanctification and redemption. Let me have my lot among the followers of Jesus! Treat me as thou treatest those who are his friends and his brethren! For

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thou knowest my soul has loved him, and trusted him, and solemnly ventured itself on the security of his gospel. And I know in whom I have believed. The infernal lion may attempt to dismay me in the awful passage: but I rejoice that I am in the hands of the good Shepherd; and I defy all my spiritual enemies, in a cheerful dependence on his faithful care. I lift up my eyes and my heart to him who was dead and is alive again; and behold, he lives for evermore, and hath the keys of death and of the unseen world. Blessed Jesus, I die by thine hand, and I fear no harm from the hand of a Saviour! I fear not that death which is alloted to me by the hand of my dearest Lord, who himself died to make it safe and happy. I come, Lord, I come not only with a willing, but with a joyful consent. I thank thee, that thou rememberest me for good; that thou art breaking my chains, and calling me to the glorious liberty of the children of God. I thank thee, that thou wilt no longer permit me to live at a distance from thine arms; but, after this long absence, wilt have me at home, at home for ever.

My feeble nature faints in the view of that glory which is now dawning upon me: but thou knowest how, gracious Lord, to let it in upon my soul by just degrees, and to make thy strength perfect in my weakness. Once more, for the last time, would I look down on

And as for me, bear me, O my heavenly Father, on the wings of everlasting love, to that peaceful, that holy, that joyous abode, which thy mercy has prepared for me, and which the blood of my Redeemer hath pur-Bear me to the general assembly chased! and church of the first-born, to the innumerable company of angels, and to the spirits of just men made perfect! And whatever this flesh may suffer, let my steady soul be delightfully fixed on that glory to which it is rising! Let faith perform its last office in an honourable manner! Let my few remaining moments on earth be spent for thy glory; and so let me ascend, with love in my heart, and praise on my faltering tongue, to the world where love and praise shall be complete! Be this my last song on earth, which I am going to tune in heaven-Blessing, and honour, and

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glory, and power, be unto him that sitteth on the throne, and to the Lamb, for ever and ever. Amen.

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
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

Sm,-I am rejoiced to see you have undertaken another work which is likely to be the means, under God, of propagating Gospel truth. Such a Bible I feel to be a great desideratum for Sunday-School Teachers.
