One judge favoured death

Sabena hijackers get life terms

By YITZNAK OKED Jerusalem Post Reporter

RIFIN. — Rima Tannous and heresa Halasseh were yesterday entenced to life imprisonment or their part in the Sabena airine hijacking on May 8.

Although the prosecution had not sked for a death sentence, one of he three military judges making up he tribunal nevertheless favoured leath for the two Arabs girls, both n their teens. The life sentence was majority ruling by the other two

A garden Secrets of Living in Judea



HERE I am again, surprised once more to see my garden looking like an overdone Van Gogh model and the strange thing about it is that I really don't like sunflowers at all. The whole thing started with the little further that live around here. They like sunflowers very much, indeed, particularly the ministure and dwarf varieties whose seeds are small enough to fit nicely into a finch's beak. There are two families more or less permanently feeding in the sunflower patch and the young finches are a delightful sight to behold as they sit on a flower, fluttering their wings and calling until the adult finch puts something into their hungry mouths. Towards the end of summer, they finally master the fine art of shelling their own seeds. Then they are less noisy as they feed.

So there we are. The finches like the seeds of the sunflowers, and I like the finches, so every year after swearing that this time there'll be no more sunflowers in my garden I find myself yielding to the winter-born nostalgia for the long singing summers.

The finches are not the only ones who dictate the landscaping in the garden. There's a pistacio tree that's been dead for several years and should, by rights, be cut down. But there's a winter-visiting robin who likes it better than any other spot and would miss it terribly if it were gone, so instead of taking it out I plant morning

And the purple salvia bush ... what a nuisance it is! We cut a new door to the livingroom on that side of the house, and the bush is definitely in the way. But there's a pair of sunbirds who find its nectar sweet in the season when little else blooms. I'd miss the shiny little male with his metallic green feathers, and his dowdy little mate so the salvia bush stays and we sort of edge our way around it.

One thing we don't have is sparrows, not that I'm sorry about it Sparrows in themselves are interesting creatures, but they compete with other more delicate species. We've got finches and bulbuls and black birds and wood peckers and tits, rock doves a plenty and palm doves as well — but nary a sparrow on the place. Being, as they are, confirmed dwellers around human habitations, the 20-odd years that this place stood empty in the hills made the sparrows leave. So far it's almost three years, and they haven't found us yet.

Zaire issues strict currency rules

KINSHASA (AP). - The Bank of Zaire has issued strict regulations on currency exchange

Foreigners cannot travel in the Zaire with more than 30 Zaires (IL270), but they have to spend a minimum of 20 Zaires a day. There is no restriction on other currencies but controls are made the country and all exchange at arrival and departure from operations must be made through official banks.

Transfer of Zaires from or to the (former French) Congo is forbidden. Transfers of other currencies must be authorized by the Bank of Zaire.

"When we first published our plan, it was accepted with widespread scepticism," Mr. Ronen pointed out, "This was at the end of the economic recession, in 1967. I remember a symposium at Ramat Rahel, attended by Government economists. They labelled our whole plan a pro-

paganda exercise.

They took exception to four points — the prediction that output would grow by 9.2 per cent a year in real terms, the investment forecast, the export targets, and the rate of private savings we set, which must increase, we said, to 18 per cent of incomes (from 15 per cent at the time).

'We can now say that all these targets were not only met, they were exceeded." Output grew by an in the same quantities as before, so average of 10.7 per 'cent annually, Investment went up by 24.8 per cent a year, instead of the 16.9 per cent predicted - though the biggest increase was in housing. Even so, investment in industry grew at almost exactly the pace predicted, by 33.8 per cent a year. Exports rose by 18.3 per cent instead of 15.2 per cent, and savings by 22 per cent

instead of 18 per cent.
Planners had assumed that defence outlay would not increase, so predicted zero growth in defence imports. In fact they expanded by 16.7 per cent a year during the four-year period till 1971.

This was the main factor causing a major deviation in forecasts about the balance of trade. Exports (including invisibles) were due to reach \$1,525m. by 1971, actually totalled \$1,753m., or 15 per cent more. But imports were one billion dollars more than predicted — \$2,943m. instead of \$1,920m., an excess of over 50 per cent. Thus the trade deficit, instead of narrowing to \$400m., wid-

ened to \$1,200m. Defence was not the only cause. Dr. Ronen castigated the Govern-ment for failing to control the growth of private consumption in 1968 and 1969. "It is true that consumption per capita grew by an average of 4 per cent during the whole period, as required. But the increase was 8 per cent in the first two years — and only then were

SENTENCED FOR LIFE

WHEN Rims Tannous, who was sentenced to life imprisonment for her part in the Sabena plane hijacking yesterday, broke down in court under cross-examination she wept and said, "I hated the Fatah men. I wanted to eat, I wanted clothes." She is no heroine, no Joan of Arc. When she might have thrown the grenades she held she pa-nicked and wailed and threw herself on the floor of the plane in a sudden, instinctive desire to

Some part of her highly-col-oured tale, as revealed in court, may be true. She was an orphan, with poor prospects in life, and the Fatah could offer travel, glamour, and the company of young men in addition to food and the clothes she craved; after all, they had the \$5m. to spend that they received as ransom for a German Lufthansa plane a few months earlier.

Rima may even not have given much thought to the fact that she was getting her relatively luxurious conditions as advance payment for a future hijacking that would involve threats to kill and might end with the des-truction of the plane and all its passengers, including herself and her three companions. One wonders what she learnt at her Bethlehem convent. If the two male hijackers, who were both killed when the plane was recaptured, were wise, they said little about the possible end of their planned crime, lest the two girls realized the full danger of what they were doing, and refused to carry the men's weapons and ex-plosives. No doubt they felt that the girls could conceal these easily, and would be searched less carefully — and indeed there was apparently little

checking on the trip.

It is quite possible that Rima in fact had not much political

aim, that she saw trips with the Fatah as little more than a Bonnie and Clyde" style life of glamorous crime that would lead to riches, or at least away from drab need. And like her American predecessors, she was not in the least concerned if the result was death and disaster for others, as in fact it proved to be. A life sentence for a girl of her age, somewhere around 20, is an almost unimaginable hardship, and in her case it with not be mitigated by any conviction that she tried to serve a higher purpose, for apparently she was bent on no such thing. Two of the men who so exploited and abused her are dead. Those who remained safely in their head-quarters in the Lebanon will perhaps think twice before they make use of such recruits again or promise them that, as girls, they will get off lightly if

things went wrong.
Therese Halasseh's story is little different, worse and bet-ter. She went knowingly into the Fatah, and on the plane taunted the passengers with the corset-bomb she held that could blow them all up. She also sorted out Israelis, other Jews and Gentiles with the calm efficiency of a Nord comp. Supplying the comp. ciency of a Nazi camp guard. She expected her life sentence relieved, perhaps, that the pen-aity was not more severe still.

The whole tale is tragic and

shocking, starting with the perversion of training two ignorant girls for murder and sabotage, and ending with the death of a girl passenger. The only ray of light derives from the fact that the Government found the courage to refuse the hijackers' demands and security forces mustered the skill to rescue all but one of the passengers and thereby make hijacking to Israel seem a less attractive

Asking too much of our athletes

NATIONS vary vastly in their attitudes towards the teams of sportsmen who represent them in Olympic competition. They are either neglected before the Games, so that any victory comes as a surprise, or so much pre-departure praise and extravagance are lavished on the team that any subsequent victory is anti-climactic — no performance they could give is good enough.

To some athletes, being accepted by their country for Olympic competition is a goal and fulfilment in and of itself, whereas to other competitors, success in the actual Games can be a matter of survival at home, affecting their living standards and the very safety of their families. Some use the Games as a political platform, with victory as a sign of defiance; others compete as a matter of national pride. The Olympic Games are no longer a simple bringing together of sportsmen. On the athletes heads rest problems and responsibilities unique to their vocation.

Pietro Mennes, considered Italy's greatest sprinter, is a typical son of that country's poor south. "I have achieved through track and field what I wanted most — a job for my father." His father had worked as a tailor in their hometown of Barletta, a small port on the southern Adriatic coast, but with

little success. Thanks to his son's sports achievements, he was given a job in the local hospital. Coloured athletes of the British teams are out for social recognition in the country to which they have immigrated. The attitude is similar to but not so violent as that of the black athletes of the U.S. who see the Games as a platform for their race struggle.

To the African athletes the games are once again a chance: show the world that there is no longer a Dark Continent.

Their great athletes have con-quered the world and shown that they are no longer an unknown quantity, but a force to be reckoned with

Perhaps the purest of all the ports competitors are our own. They struggle with conditions which are the poorest offered anyone anywhere. There is little competition in the country, where sport is not yet a tradi-tional means of displaying national pride. There is competition only for the very best and at the last moment, to try to achieve the minimum Olympic standard required for participation — while years of competitive experience is the true secret to athletic success.

No wonder that, should any of our sportsmen get beyond the first heats, they will be heralded as national heroes.

Why should we make so much of the most meagre achievement instead of providing the condi-tions to get Israel onto the sport-ing map. We look to our young hurdler, Esther Shahamurov to bring home some honours - but do we deserve her?


