## 'Journey for peace' Nixon off to Peking

WASHINGTON. — President Nixon, his wife and a handful of top aides set out yesterday on a "journey for peace" to Communist China expecting to make at least a start at erasing 20 years of hostility. Before leaving the White House by helicopter for Andrews Air Force Base, Mr. Nixon briefed 19 Democratic and Republican leaders of Congress. Then he delivered brief remarks to a crowd including about 1,000 school children on the south lawn. The ceremony was broadcast live on radio and TV in damp weather, he repeated a prediction he first made last July 15 when he stunned the world with his announcement that he would become the first American President ever to visit China.

## Sadat: 'Israel agents' arrested in Cairo

CAIRO (Reuters). — President Anwar Sadat of Egypt yesterday said that three foreigners — a Frenchman and two Belgians — had been arrested on charges of being Israel agents who tried to exploit student riots in Cairo last month.

## Israel not consulted on Jarring visit

KAMPALA (Reuters). — President Idi Amin yesterday told the Israeli Ambassador, Mr. Daniel Laor, that Uganda was firmly non-aligned and that it was "malicious and false, for anyone to make out that Uganda was aligned against Israel."

## Crucial U.K. vote on Mart

LONDON. — The House of Commons was facing a crucial vote last night on Britain's Common Market entry, with the fate of Prime Minister Heath's Government hanging on the outcome.

## Proximity talks 'soon' Sisco hopes

WASHINGTON (Reuters). — Assistant Secretary of State Joseph Sisco yesterday expressed hopes that indirect talks between Egypt and Israel would begin soon, although he did not specify when. This was disclosed by members of the Senate Foreign Relations Committee after a closed-door meeting with Mr. Sisco.

MOSCOW (Reuters). — The three top Kremlin leaders have each accepted individual invitations to visit Iraq, according to a joint Soviet-Iraqi communique issued here yesterday.

## Wall inquiry finds negligence

WASHINGTON. — The Arab World inquiry commission announced last night that there was negligence in dealing with the deplanned building adjoining the structure, according to an Israel Radio report. The commission reportedly recommended that one body should have overall responsibility for all activities concerning the Wall.

# JARRING MEETS SADAT TODAY

Jerusalem Post Arab Affairs Reporter U.N. Middle East envoy Dr. Gunnar Jarring is due in Cairo today as Egypt prepares to launch a new diplomatic offensive aimed at raising the Middle East conflict in international forums.

Following talks with Foreign Minister Mured Ghabib, Dr. Jarring is scheduled to confer later today with President Anwar Sadat and Premier Aziz Sidky.

Cairo's semi-official "Al-Ahram" newspaper said yesterday the U.N. envoy would fly directly to New York after his visit.

Dr. Jarring's current mission to Cairo follows talks he held recently with Senegalese President Leopold Senghor on last year's Middle East peace efforts by the Organization of African Unity. These meetings appear to have been concluded with an agreement between Dr. Jarring and the African leader that Israel should commit itself to a declaration of withdrawal to the 1967 frontiers prior to negotiations with the Arabs.

Al-Ahram said yesterday Dr. Jarring did "not intend to ask Egypt for concessions," adding that Jarring's position was commensurate to Foreign Minister Ghabib in advance of his visit.

Al-Ahram quoted Dr. Jarring as having told Ghabib that Egypt had "fulfilled her responsibilities" by accepting his memorandum of February last year and that it was Israel's turn to follow suit. It said Dr. Jarring had expressed this view in his recent talks with President Senghor.

## U.S. team to Kuwait for arms sales

WASHINGTON (Reuter). — A U.S. Defense Department team is to leave today for Kuwait for government level talks on possible arms sales, official sources said here yesterday.

Pentagon and State Department officials said that one of the subjects would be the possible sale of 24 Northrop F-5 fighter aircraft. Several months ago the U.S. sold Saudi Arabia approximately 50 of these planes.

## Nixon off to China

Mr. Nixon stepped past a special military honor guard and boarded the presidential helicopter which took him to the Andrews base.

A crowd of several hundred well-wishers, mostly Air Force personnel and families, saw the presidential party off from Andrews. A bit of snow began to fall as the presidential jet took off for a 10-hour non-stop flight to Kansai Marine Corps air station on the northern shore of the Hawaiian island of Oahu. The Nixon's plan to remain there until late tomorrow afternoon when they will fly to Guam for an overnight stop before landing on the Chinese mainland next Monday.

They plan to stay in China one week, the longest time any chief executive has devoted to a single country since Woodrow Wilson went to Europe at the end of World War I.

The President set off with an implicit knowledge that China's fear of rising Japanese power must be overcome before there can be a substantial improvement and the opening of diplomatic relations between China and the U.S.

Diplomatic observers believe that the results of his talks will be limited to agreements to expand trade and cultural contacts and perhaps to create informal diplomatic links.

## Nixon off to China

In Moscow, "Pravda" yesterday renewed Kremlin warnings to the U.S. and Peking not to gang up against it.

The warning was timed to coincide with President Nixon's visit to Peking. Ever since the first announcement of the visit eight months ago, the Soviet leadership has shown concern that the other two major powers would align against it.

Commentator Yuri Zhukov also used the occasion in "Pravda" for lengthy criticism of most U.S. foreign policy positions as contained in Mr. Nixon's recent foreign policy report to Congress.

He said the Kremlin regarded steps toward U.S.-Chinese normalization as natural "only if this is not at the expense of other states."

He said Moscow could not disregard evidence "of the degree of both the Peking leadership and of certain quarters in Washington to take advantage of the process of development of Chinese-American contacts to the prejudice of international detente and against the interests of the socialist community."

He said the Soviet people "express confidence that good neighbourliness and friendship between the Soviet Union and China will be restored in the long run." (AP, Reuter, UPI)

## Ulster driver dragged from bus and killed

BELFAST (AP). — A British soldier and a Roman Catholic bus driver were shot dead on Wednesday night by the IRA in the continuing violence tormenting northern Ireland.

The 47-year-old bus driver, Thomas Callaghan, a part-time militia man in the Ulster Defence Regiment, was dragged from his bus in the Craggan district of Londonderry as passengers screamed. The gunman who kidnapped him bundled him into a car, shot him through the head and later dumped his body on the edge of Foyle Road on the other side of the city.

The other victim, a British soldier in a military jeep on motor patrol near Belfast, was shot in the stomach by IRA machinegunners. He was the 51st soldier to die in the political-religious turmoil.

Two hundred Roman Catholics and Protestants banded together in Londonderry yesterday in an unprecedented strike to demand the restoration of law and order in Northern Ireland. They downed tools to protest the execution on Wednesday of the Catholic bus driver.

About 50 of the workers who participated in the one-day strike gathered outside Londonderry police headquarters to demand what they called re-establishment of law and order, both in the predominantly Catholic city and elsewhere in the province.

## Maniac slays 3 babies in U.K. hospital

BLACKPOOL, England (AP). — A knife-wielding maniac went berserk among sleeping children in Blackpool hospital early yesterday morning and escaped after slaying three infants to death as they lay in their cots. Two nurses were wounded and another child suffered minor stab injuries in the attack.

More than 200 police combed hospital grounds and a nearby town for the killer, described as a young man with dark hair and a foreign accent. Police said the intruder walked into the ward on the hospital's second floor at 1 a.m. claiming to be a student of the staff and asking for sleeping tablets. Then, without warning, he pulled out a knife and stabbed the three infants in the chest. One of the nurses, though seriously wounded, crawled to a telephone and raised the alarm.

By that time a chorus of terrified screams was echoing all over the ward as the killer raced from the room to the stairs and down to the room in a state of bedlam. The intruder had gone after slaying three infants.

The three dead were identified as Deborah Caron, 4; Martha Lane, 2; and Nicholas Lane, 2. Another two-year-old boy, James Quamer, was listed in "serious" condition. The stabbed nurse Dorothy Simpson, 49, and Christine Nuttal, 22 — underwent emergency surgery.

## Rebels demand Sudan federation

ADDIS ABABA (Reuter). — Representatives of the South Sudan Liberation Front yesterday rejected Government proposals for local autonomy for the south and called for federation.

Front spokesman Mechin de Garang told newsmen that his group handed over counter-proposals at a meeting here with a Sudan government delegation headed by Abel Alier, Vice-President and Minister for Southern Affairs. The talks between the two sides opened here on Wednesday.

Mr. de Garang said: "We reject local autonomy because it does not satisfy the aspirations of our people." In a federation both regions would enjoy local autonomy and each would have its own armed forces. The Liberation Front proposed a federal president elected by universal suffrage with a vice-president from each region.

Mr. de Garang said there should be international observers for a cease-fire and implementation of any agreement. There would be long discussions on the matter of regional autonomy or federation, but the Front was not prepared to continue talks in Khartoum, he said.

## Vienna anti-Semitism

BONN (INA). — An anti-Jewish slogan was heard last Tuesday, for the first time since the end of World War Two, in the Austrian Parliament in Vienna.

During a discussion on the building of the U.N. centre due to be erected in the Austrian capital, the names of the firms commissioned to erect the building were mentioned. Parliament members for the right-wing party "Austrian People" called out: "Jews, Jews all of them." The debate was immediately closed.

## Saudi alliance to oppose Soviet in Gulf

BEIRUT (AP). — Saudi Arabia yesterday was reported trying to form a four-nation alliance to counter Soviet infiltration of the Persian Gulf.

The alliance would link Saudi Arabia with the pro-Western emirates of Bahrain and Qatar, and the British-backed sultanate of Oman, according to Arab press reports.

Two Beirut newspapers said the Saudi bid was promoted by Monday's announcement that the Soviet Union and the recently created federation of seven Gulf Arab emirates have agreed to establish diplomatic relations, and that the Russians will have an embassy in Abu Dhabi.

The conservative Saudi regime of King Faisal was said to be alarmed because it gave Russia for the first time a strong legal presence at the mouth of the Gulf through which most of the West's oil supplies are shipped.

The usually well-informed newspaper "Al-Nashar" said the Union government concluded the accord with the Russians against Saudi Arabia's "advice." It said the recent visit to Bahrain and Qatar by the Saudi Minister of State for Foreign Affairs, Omar al-Sagoff, was to convince the two states to keep the region away from "subversive elements."

Then the Saudis set out to join with Bahrain, Qatar, and Oman in an "alliance designed to surround and block Soviet infiltration in the area," it said.

Iran is likely to support such an alliance.

The U.N. relations with Tehran are still strained by Iran's military takeover last year of three tiny islands controlling the entrance to the Persian Gulf. Two of the islands, Greater and Lesser Tumb, are claimed by Ras al Khaimah, a member of the federation. The third, Abu Musa, belonged to Sharjah whose ruler agreed to partition of the island with Iran.

## Rhodesia black raps 'settlement' at U.N.

UNITED NATIONS (UPI). — Bishop Abel Muzorewa, the newly emerged black Rhodesian leader, yesterday denounced the Anglo-Rhodesian settlement proposals as "political assassination of the majority of the people."

Meanwhile, Tanzania has prepared a strongly anti-British draft resolution on Rhodesia for consideration by the African foreign ministers conference under way in Addis Ababa, conference sources said yesterday.

The sources said the draft included all the provisions of an earlier draft submitted to the Security Council, and vetoed by Britain, when the Council met in Addis Ababa early this month. The language of the Tanzanian draft is much harsher on Britain than that of the vetoed measure, they said. The new blueprint also includes additional provisions calling for stepped-up African action to help Rhodesian liberation movements.

In Rhodesia itself, it was announced that the case of former Prime Minister Garfield Todd is to be heard in camera before a three-man tribunal. A political source said Mr. Todd may refuse to appear before it.

The former Premier, who is being held in solitary confinement at Gatooma Jail, was arrested with his 28-year-old daughter, Judith, January 18. It was meanwhile reported that Judith had ended a hunger strike against her detention when prison officials forced a rubber tube down her throat and force-fed her.

## Soviet TV: Golda tried to help Nazis

A Soviet television programme last night accused Israeli leaders of having collaborated with the Nazis. They included Golda Meir, David Ben-Gurion and the late Levi Eshkol.

The programme, "Zionism Unmasked," suggested that Zionists actually tried to foment anti-Semitism, because they thought it helpful to their cause. It accused Mr. Ben-Gurion and Mr. Eshkol of having made deals with the Nazis in connection with the liquidation of Jews. It also said that Mrs. Meir had tried to help Germany against the Soviet Union during the Second World War.

## West Bank visitor 'not Jordan envoy'

Jerusalem Post Arab Affairs Reporter The Jordanian Minister of Information, Adnan Abu Odeh, yesterday denied that King Hussein had sent an envoy to the West Bank to sound out the views of local inhabitants on the forthcoming municipal elections.

The Jordanian Minister was referring to an Israel Radio report which said that the envoy had resided in an East Jerusalem hotel and that he had held talks with notables in Jerusalem, Nablus and Hebron. The radio report did not identify the man, although it was believed to have referred to an Amman journalist, Kamel Kallal, who came last week as a tourist. Local Arab notables who were mentioned in connection with him had in the meantime scoffed at the speculation that the man was an emissary of the Jordanian government.

Information Minister Abu Odeh said that there was no need for Jordan to send an envoy to the West Bank since "the link between us and the inhabitants of the West Bank has not ceased and we are aware of their views."

## U.S. jets pound Vietnam artillery for 29 hours

SAIGON. — U.S. jets ended a 29-hour attack against new long-range artillery sites in North Vietnam yesterday and a spokesman said they damaged or destroyed five of the Soviet-made 130 mm. cannons.

The U.S. Command said Air Force and Navy jets made at least 100 strikes against the artillery emplacements. The attacks ended just five hours before President Nixon left for the start of his Peking trip.

The Command said U.S. aircraft encountered anti-aircraft fire and one F4 Phantom was shot down. The two crewmen were listed as missing.

Radio Hanoi said seven U.S. planes were downed and a number of U.S. pilots captured.

A spokesman said the new cannons, which have a range of 25 kms., were located just north of the Demilitarized Zone. From their position, gunners could shell allied military bases in Quang Tri province and several South Vietnamese cities.

The spokesman said the strikes were ordered to protect American lines. "These strikes were necessary to counter a threat to the security of remaining U.S. forces posed by the introduction of these new offensive weapons into the area," the command statement said.

During the same period U.S. fighter bombers also made 10 strikes against anti-aircraft positions and surface-to-air missile (SAM) sites in North Vietnam's coastal plain above the DMZ.

Earlier, U.S. informants disclosed that about 15 fighter-bombers had been sent from other points to bases in South Vietnam and Thailand as backup "spare" planes.

In still another development, the Navy announced in San Diego that the U.S. aircraft carrier Kitty Hawk with 80 planes sailed for Vietnam waters a month ahead of schedule to further beef up the Seventh Fleet force to four carriers. (UPI, Reuter, AP)

## Soviet prelate 'Not KGB agent'

SYDNEY (Reuter). — Russian Archbishop Boris Nikolaidze, Metropolitan of Leningrad and Novgorod, denied here yesterday that he was a member of the Soviet secret police, the K.G.B., Russian living in Sydney had sent a telegram to Australian Prime Minister William McMahon asking him to refuse entry to the Archbishop, claiming that he was an agent of the Kremlin.

On his arrival here with the executive committee of the World Council of Churches, Archbishop Nikolaidze said through an interpreter: "I am not a member of the K.G.B."

Asked how Jews were treated in Russia, he said the Deputy Prime Minister was a Jew, and there were Jewish generals in the armed services and Jewish academics teaching in the schools. Jews were treated the same as other nationals in Russia, he said.

## Poles jail 8 officials for smuggling

WARSAW (Reuter). — A former Polish Deputy Interior Minister, Lieutenant-General Stanislaw Matyski, has been sentenced to 12 years in prison on charges of smuggling and illegal foreign currency operations, the Polish news agency Paf reported on Wednesday.

Eight other Ministry officials received sentences ranging from two-and-a-half years to nine years on the same charges, the agency said. The sentences were handed down Tuesday by a Warsaw provincial court.

General Matyski was discharged from his post last June, and according to informed sources was quickly put under arrest. Other officials sentenced included Stanislaw Smokil and Henryk Zdzienicka, Deputy Department Director at the Ministry, who received terms of nine and four-and-a-half years respectively.

The Paf report gave no further details of the trial, which started January 28, but added all the defendants were also deprived of their civil rights. Foreign newsmen were barred from the trial.

## Hughes leaves Bahamas

NASSAU, Bahamas (AP). — Howard Hughes has reportedly left the Bahamas after 15 months of seclusion there. A Bahamian official indicated yesterday he may have returned to the U.S., but a cargo plane loaded with his possessions was headed for Nicaragua.

In Los Angeles, a Hughes spokesman said he understood the reclusive multimillionaire had left Nassau but insisted that his whereabouts were unknown to him.

The report of Hughes' departure and possible U.S. destination came from a ranking Bahamian government official who refused to be identified. U.S. customs in Washington declined comment on whether Hughes had been processed through customs.

Hughes has not been seen since 1953.

The C-46 cargo plane left Nassau yesterday morning loaded with furniture and other items removed from Hughes' ninth floor suite of the Britannia Beach Hotel on Wednesday. Among the items were a hospital bed, blood plasma stand, many cases of bottled water, chairs, refrigerators, two reclining beds, mattresses, reels of film and many pots and pans.

Other Hughes sources said it was doubtful that he would return permanently to the U.S. because of legal actions over his holdings and the purported Washington "autobiography" by author Clifford Irving.

## No U.S. bases for Greece or Cyprus

WASHINGTON (UPI). — The State Department yesterday said the U.S. has no plans to establish military bases in Greece or Cyprus.

Department spokesman Charles Bray also flatly denied Soviet and Egyptian press reports that the U.S. sought to overthrow the Cypriot government.

"We have no base in Cyprus and we have no intention of establishing one," Mr. Bray said.

In Cairo, the semi-official "Al-Ahram" said yesterday that the U.S. and Nato have drawn up a plan to resolve the Cyprus crisis by removing President Archbishop Makarios, and partitioning the island between Greece and Turkey. "Al-Ahram" said the U.S. wanted to get rid of Makarios to pave the way for the establishment of American naval bases in the island.

AP reports from Nicosia that President Makarios has spurned a Greek government ultimatum and in effect challenged the colonels' junta in Athens to try and oust him by force.

The next move in the developing crisis is up to Athens, or Makarios' aging arch rival Gen. George Grivas, the extremist former EOKA underground leader and hero of the successful Cypriot struggle against British colonial rule more than a decade ago.

Grivas returned secretly to Cyprus last September. Makarios claims Grivas is organizing an armed conspiracy to revive the EOKA.

## Pilot killed in 148th Starfighter crash

# Sadat speech answers few questions

THE 1,500-member National Congress of the Arab Socialist Union, Egypt's only political party, winds up three days of deliberations tonight, and is expected to issue a series of resolutions supposedly outlining Cairo's future course of action.

In summoning the congress, with a mandate to discuss home and Middle East affairs, President Anwar Sadat had two objectives. He was seeking to emphasize public support for his regime, in the face of criticism of his foot-dragging policy, and he attempted to show that Egypt was being run democratically by the A.S.U. which Sadat has called the nation's "highest political authority." Both these are merely illusions; the "workers and fellows" who are among the delegates in the A.S.U. Congress, don't really know what is going on in the country, and their resolutions are likely to be routine reassertions of backing for a "war of liberation" against Israel and of solidarity with the Soviet Union.

On his return from talks at the Kremlin earlier this month, Sadat gave more than an indication that Egypt's destiny was being handled "in coordination" with Moscow,

while declining to reveal either Cairo's "future intentions" or the contents of his talks with the Soviet leadership in public. He clarified his position only slightly in his address at the opening session of the National Congress on Wednesday, when he elaborated on two points concerning the confrontations he faces at home and in the Middle East arena.

On the home front, Sadat indicated that he was demanding overwhelming support against any opposition. "I will leave my post if at any moment I felt that there were doubts in this authority," he said. Nevertheless, Sadat does not seem one who would relinquish power without a fight. He is more likely to strike back at anyone who opposes him, tarring them with the same brush of treason which he used on Ali Sabry.

On the Middle East, Sadat said he would be "cautious." He would concentrate on the role of the U.S., which he said was consolidating the strength of its Sixth Fleet in the Mediterranean to confront Egypt in one sense and the Soviet Union in another.

In this context one might wonder whether Sadat was paving the way



after a closure of six months. The Iraqi move should encourage Amman to wait a little bit longer for Syria to follow suit. It must be recalled that Syria, once Jordan's partner in the Arab Common Market and the Eastern Front, cannot afford to boycott the Jordanians much longer.

The terrorist movement is now undoubtedly at its lowest ebb, having been suppressed in Jordan, controlled in Syria, and contained in Lebanon.

Trying to cover up for their present woes, the terrorists have been issuing "military communiques" almost daily claiming escalated activity in the major cities. As soon as the Israeli radio reports either a power failure in some part of the country or a fire breaking in one city, the Fatah information office in Beirut issues a "communiqué" claiming responsibility for the reported incident, quoting a "commando source" on the damages and casualties inflicted. The communiques in their Fatah form are then dispatched to the outside world, from Beirut, by news agencies; Arab states, hearing them, often renew their pledges of financial and material support to the "Palestine revolution."

The terrorists also continue to assert their "right to speak for the Palestinians, including those of the Israel-held territories." The so-called National Congress of the Palestine Liberation Organization is planning to convene next month in Cairo to discuss the Israeli authorization of municipal elections on the West Bank — on March 28 in Samaria and on May 2 in Judea.

But the West Bank Arabs, most of whom realize the truth about the alleged "revolution," are not influenced by the voice of the terrorists.

## SEEDS POISON SYRIAN FARMERS

BAGHDAD (Reuters). — A Baghdad newspaper Wednesday reported a wave of concern over contaminated food after an undisclosed number of farmers were poisoned by eating wheat seeds distributed to them for planting.

The semi-official newspaper "Al-Thawra" called on the authorities and people for joint action to prevent the spread of panic. It said that poisoning by the seeds, which had been treated with insecticides, had created the impression that some foods, such as meat, were also contaminated.

Agriculture Minister Nariif Jalal on Tuesday issued a statement asking farmers who had received the seeds to return whatever remained in their possession within 15 days or face severe penalties.

# How much would withdrawal hurt?

AVIV — How far can the army afford to withdraw without seriously compromising interests vital to the State? This has become a very important question considering that the Middle East conflict seems to have boiled down to such clear-cut and convincing formulations that they are so desperately in the street might as well accept what still remains to be decided. It is still Israel which is limited to make the first concession. The day gesture, Sinai is of course the principal (military) bone of contention. Its specific importance includes highly significant considerations. It provides the Israeli Air Force with a "early warning" zone, handling any Egyptian attempts to launch a "Tune fifth" in response to an all-out assault by Egyptian Air Force against Israeli airfields in the hope of destroying a combined terror attack against urban centres. At the same time, it also provides the Israeli Air Force with an ideal bombing pad enabling the I.A.F. to launch its bombers to lash out practically without warning against the Egyptian anti-aircraft de-

range and Zahal will fall back only to a second line, no more than 10 to 20 kilometres to the east. This would be a second-choice defence, inferior to the waterline, but still good enough to keep the Egyptians at bay and at the same time also provide them with the face-saving device they are so desperately looking for. It would rid them of the Star of David flags now flaunted in their face and let them get on with the task of clearing up the international waterway.

Any crossing of the Canal by Egyptian military units, let alone digging in or setting up of fortifications on this side of the waterway, would be quite a different matter, especially since it would benefit from the protection of the massive artillery line-up the Egyptians can provide. One must bear in mind that the Egyptian artillery has an effective range of over 20 kilometres and that its Luna (Nato code-named Frog Seven) missiles have a range of up to 70 kilometres and could easily be used to "plaster" Israeli airfields and military camps that far away.

The 10-20 kms. withdrawal is as far as Zahal could afford to pull back in a first phase, subsequent developments hinging on Egyptian counter "gestures." A re-population of the Canal cities, for instance, and the resumption of traffic on the Suez Canal — including Israeli shipping — would probably pave the way for limited subsequent Israeli withdrawals. A total pull-out from most of Sinai (excluding Sharm e-Sheikh, a connecting strip and perhaps areas south of Rafiah in the Gaza Strip) would be military suicide short of a much more formal and binding settlement.

sinian state to become out of bounds to Israelis. This presumably holds good not only for the Hebron area but for the Jordan Valley area as well. These are certainly likely to remain protected military areas for many more years to come.

The sealing off of the border to terrorists and possible under-cover Jordanian infiltration will also ensure that the West Bank inhabitants will be able to decide their own fate unfettered and without pressure from any outside sources. Lastly it will considerably ease security problems inside Israel proper as well as the West Bank in the face of whatever opposition the terrorists may try to raise against it (Moscow- and/or Peking-inspired).

**Pluck, luck**

As far as the Golan Heights are concerned, it should be recalled that the Mandatory frontiers (which were all Syria had a legal claim to, as far as the 1949 cease-fire agreement was concerned) ran along the upper side of the Jordan Valley ridge. For well over 20 years, the Syrians took possession of this strip without raising much more than some international eyebrows (the same also holds good for the Gaza Strip taken over by the Egyptians). Pluck, luck and lots of guts enabled the Israeli army to conquer the Heights in June 1967. Knowing that whoever commands the Golan Heights also commands the Jordan Valley (or should be capable of doing so), vital strategic parts of the Heights will probably eventually be formally annexed by Israel. Possibly here, as in Sharm e-Sheikh, some face-saving formula will have to be found — perhaps a "swap-

to prepare my people for 1,000-1,200 attacks a day? Do the people have to go to war just because I mentioned the year 1971?"

In the heavy tones yet to be written about what senior Israeli army officers here call (rather disdainfully) the "Wars of the Jews," commentators will have their say about who contributed what. They are, however, already largely agreed on one point, namely the impact American military support of Israel had on the prevention of any renewed outbreak of hostilities.

The Egyptian propaganda machine has had a hard time trying to debunk the Egyptian soldier's (and airman's) respect for the Israeli "superman." This has frequently led the Egyptian army to imitate Israel's methods and even weapons — such as the purchase of antiquated half-tracks which Egyptian agents tried to round up in European junk yards. Now comes the supply of additional modern American weapons. The U.S. weapons are not vastly superior, excluding the Phantoms, Israel has received largely at least 10-year-old models of artillery, tanks and troop carriers, whereas the Egyptians have always received brand new off-the-production-line hardware. But the Egyptian army's seniors have also been looking for excuses, and putting the blame on the Russian equipment was one fast and possibly (for the Egyptians themselves) convincing answer. The combined impact of the Israeli military status, plus the now seemingly unlimited assistance given to Israel by the U.S. cannot but impress the Egyptians and the Arab world in general.

**Lion's share**

The most significant change which has taken place here since the cease-fire went into effect one and three-quarter years ago was the relatively recent change of attitude by Washington towards Israel. There was (in Washington) a sudden "discovery" of overlapping interests with Israel, and also the fact that they could claim the lion's share of the credit for the cease-fire.

President Nixon goes to Moscow in May with a strong Israel as one of the trumps up his sleeve. This is the concerted opinion of experts here. The Americans are belatedly taking a leaf out of the Russian notebook and without entering into a formal alliance with Israel (just as the U.S.S.R. remains formally uncommitted towards Egypt) are unclipping Israel up against any tactical ambitions the Russians may have in the Middle East. It could be a calling of the Russian bluff — and with the Russians unwilling to become directly involved on Egypt's side, the U.S. may find common ground in Moscow to discuss a mutual disengagement in this part of the world. At the very least, it gives the U.S. something to offer the Russians.

Meanwhile, the Israeli army stays, at ease but by no means relaxed, where it was at the end of that second week of June, 1967.

**Manoeuvring**

On the ground, Sinai is a vital buffer zone, enabling Zahal, for the first time in its history, to indulge in a limited manoeuvring. Instead of being compelled to carry war immediately over into Israeli territory, it is now able to manoeuvre. There is also the possibility of a possible attempt by Egyptians to cross the Canal. The Canal would be a major obstacle and make all attempts to establish bridgeheads on the Israeli side of the Canal a very costly venture for the Egyptians.

Nevertheless, Zahal is still able to make a limited withdrawal, even if an irrevocable commitment to keep the peace by the Egyptian side of the waterway is within "comfortable" artillery

**Terrorists**

A continued Israeli military presence in the Jordan depression would be necessary, since no matter what kind of agreement was reached, it would certainly not be binding on the terrorist movements. The only effective way to seal off Israel would be along the Jordan River — without necessarily making any formal territorial claims. It has already been said that Israel will not permit any part of a future Pales-

# U.S.S.R.-CHINA COLD WAR MAY SPELL SURVIVAL FOR TAIWAN

Once dependent on the Capitalist-Communist balance of power, Taiwan may owe its survival to the cold war between the two rival giants of Communism, says MICHEL SALOMON, Israel correspondent of the Paris newspaper "L'Express."

As usual, Taipei's public squares are full of triumphal arches, its walls covered with portraits of Chiang Kai-shek and colorful martial posters. But the slogans have changed since Formosa, the principal victim of Nixon's new Asian policy, was expelled from the U.N. and its existence openly questioned by its former allies and protectors, the U.S. and Japan.

During the past 20 years, the slogans clung stubbornly to the fiction of an imminent invasion of the mainland and an early victory. They have now been replaced by violently lyrical proclamations which scarcely conceal despair. "Even alone, we shall resist!" Under the leadership of the Gimo, our country is invincible," and so on.

From an outpost of reconquest, Formosa has thus become a besieged fortress. And the stress is no longer placed on politics, which have proved so disappointing, but on economics, even if forcing of habit still produces a lot of superficial empty talk about carrying on till the bitter end. In the week after Taiwan's expulsion from the U.N., the Minister of Economy, Y.S. Sun, assured the "Yuan" or parliament that the "withdrawal" of Formosa from the international body would not affect the country's economic hopes. He admitted that Japanese investments had gone down somewhat, but on the other hand, he announced new investments from the U.S., Europe and Australia, including \$66m. in steel factories.

Economics have now become the all-embracing doctrine and Taiwan's policy has thus acquired a measure of empiricism and realism which had been lacking for more than 20 years. Chiang Kai-shek used to proclaim that "those who are not our friends are our enemies;" today, he says more modestly that "those who are not our enemies are our friends." As a matter of fact, Formosa can only expect recognition by a mere 15 or 20 countries in 1972.

### Strangled

If the rupture of economic relations were to follow diplomatic isolation, Taipei would simply be strangled. Western Europe is only represented in Formosa by Belgium, Spain and Portugal, the Middle East by Jordan and Saudi Arabia, and catastrophic defections are expected in Black Africa and Latin America.

To counter this isolation, Taiwan has at last decided, in desperation, to divorce politics and economics. Offices of tourism and commercial affairs will be opened in countries that no longer or never maintained diplomatic relations with Formosa. Taipei has discreetly informed the communist countries of Eastern Europe that it would be willing to do business with them, and instructions have been issued at the capital's airport to grant visas on loose sheets to any tourist or businessman, whatever his passport.

The regime remains a police state, but the mechanism has broken down; the proof is in the mildness of the repression to which students and intellectuals are subjected now, in contrast to the

harshness prevalent at the beginning of last year. The trend is no longer set by arrogant politicians, representatives of a China which has not existed for the last 25 years, deputies from non-existent electoral districts in Peking and Shanghai, or even generals of an army of half a million men which is withering away in the dug-outs of the off-shore islands of Quemoy and Matsu.

Today the trend is set by the men who are responsible for the success of Formosa's economic miracle — the managers, the industrialists and the higher administrative staff. For a miracle has occurred, even if it is partly due to cheap labour (50 per cent cheaper than in Japan, 30 per cent cheaper than in Hong Kong) and to American aid.

With a continuous growth rate of 10 per cent a year, this island of 15 million inhabitants which covers 14,000 square kms. will export one billion dollars worth of goods during 1972 — the same amount as 750 million Chinese communists. For capita income has gone up in five years from \$300 to \$350, unemployment has practically disappeared and foreign reserves have reached a peak of \$800m. The only dark spot in the economy is its over-dependence on American markets. Taiwan, like Japan, was badly hit last autumn by the quota system.

Formosans have every right to be proud when they show visitors their electronic factories, steel works, dock-yards, efficient textile industry and high-yield agriculture, which prove that Taiwan's survival no longer depends on its former "specialties" — the tremendous brood-brother of Peking, the sale of false antiquities, plated books and records, and other expedients. This relative prosperity enables the inhabitants of Formosa to remain serene in the face of the vicissitudes of their foreign policy.

"It is the decline of Chiang and his party, but not of Taiwan," I was told by a Taipei lawyer who, although he is from the mainland, claims to be a "Formosan nationalist." He made the point that the million Chinese who withdrew from the mainland in 1949 and took over the island by harsh oppression of the local population have become assimilated with the native Formosans. Local nationalism will now get the upper hand over the crazy revanchist dreams of the politicians. He predicted that the Japanese will drop Formosa, but the U.S. cannot do so and do not want to let Formosa down, as much to protect their economic investments (\$139m. at present and expected to reach \$200m. before the end of 1972) as to maintain a minimum of credibility in Asia.

According to the Taipei lawyer, a neutral Formosa, following American troop withdrawal and demilitarization of the small offshore islands of Quemoy and Matsu, may not cause the same irrevocable hostility in Peking. Chiang is the irreconcilable and the last-ditch trenchant. Proof of this, said the lawyer, is the fact that anybody can enter Communist China with

a Formosa visa in his passport, but not the contrary. If Peking admits the existence of Hong Kong and Macao, why should it not also agree to the existence of Taiwan once the island is no longer a gun pointed at China?

### Not a football

On the flower-filled campus of Taipei University, a student protests when I ask him if he is not really Chinese: "We are Formosans whatever Chiang and his clique think of it. Chiang is 85 years old, Mao 81; as long as these terrible old men are alive, there will be no hope of a solution. But Chiang Ching-kuo, the Gimo's oldest son who is 61, is more realistic. I suppose that Mao's successor will also be more realistic. We will not be a football for the world to play with forever. Our fate will be decided neither at the U.N., nor in Washington, Tokyo or Moscow, but here in our region; the true representatives of our two people may already have made contact in some discreet hotel in Hong Kong or Singapore." For the time being, however, all this seems like wishful thinking.

Will the fate of Formosa be decided at next week's Nixon-Mao meeting? American circles in Taipei, which are very discreet nowadays, do not exclude conciliatory gestures on the part of the American President. For instance, American troops, who now number about 9,000 men, might be reduced to a few hundred technical advisors. But it is difficult to imagine that Washington will pay the full price Peking is asking — namely the abrogation by the U.S. of the Mutual Defence Treaty, the complete demilitarization of the island, and the withdrawal of the American Seventh Fleet which is on permanent patrol in the straits which separate Formosa from the mainland.

It is more likely that minor compromises will be broached in Peking which will put the Taiwan problem on ice and will transform Formosa into a sort of American Albania in Asia, while waiting for better days to come. Obviously, the "Formosan gun" aimed at China has become rusty, and the masters of the Forbidden City see no danger in the South, but on the long vulnerable Northern border.

The radiant and tragic island (which the Portuguese called "Formosa" — the beautiful) became a sovereign state as a result of the cold war between the capitalist and Communist blocs. Paradoxically, it may survive thanks to another cold war, this one between the two rival giants of Communism. Nobody can predict how long Taiwan's new reprieve will last.

# Neev's counsel fails to shake Friedman in six-hour probe

"He never managed to budge me an inch," said an elated Mordcheai Friedman as he walked out of the Netivei Neft affair yesterday. He had just withstood six hours of cross-examination from Mr. Ram Caspi, appointed counsel for Dr. David Neev, the Development Ministry geologist whose complaint about the Government-owned oil company in April last year led to the establishment of the Commission.

Mr. Caspi questioned the witness, general manager of Netivei Neft, on various aspects of the Neev complaint, and has another two days at his disposal to try and refute what Mr. Friedman has told the Commission since he started testifying on Sunday. Subjects discussed yesterday included the sale of Mr. Friedman's private oil company, Continental, to Midbar, a foreign prospecting company, at the same time he was the Government negotiator with that company.

Mr. Friedman received \$700,000 for Continental. Witnesses who have testified before the Commission have claimed that Continental's equipment was not worth one-seventh of that price, and that the only reason Friedman managed to get \$700,000 for all was because "it was well worth Midbar's while" to keep on the right side of the man they had to negotiate with.

Dozens of estimates have been brought before the Commission with regard to the actual value of the equipment. Mr. Caspi brought up all of them, but Friedman was adamant in his stand: his equipment, which he had bought from a Canadian firm, Israel Continental, in 1965 for \$385,000, could not be valued by an impartial assessor in the U.S. or anywhere else.

Midbar had extensive drilling operations planned for Israel and they could find no suitable contractor to do the work for them. To bring drilling equipment from abroad would, according to Mr. Friedman, have cost a great deal more than \$700,000, and thus taking all these factors into consideration — and that "a fortune" had been spent on keeping the machine in tip top condition — Midbar got an extremely good deal.

When Mr. Caspi pointed out that an earlier witness, Mr. Yitzhak Levi, had testified that Mr. Friedman's rig, a U 15, was worth no more than \$32,000 at the outset, Mr. Friedman replied that if Levi dot were to offer him their U 15 for the same price he would "buy them tomorrow." Mr. Levi based his estimate on material he had received from an auctioneering firm in the U.S. which heads mainly in drilling equipment.

Mr. Friedman wanted to know what better proof the lawyer could want that his equipment was well worth the price — the fact that Mayflower, another foreign drilling firm which was considering operating in Israel, had offered Midbar \$750,000 for the same equipment

only a few months after Midbar had purchased Continental. Mayflower, according to estimates presented to the Commission, had worked out that within three years it could have turned a profit of \$200,000 on the deal, which fell through later because Nephtha refused to hand over an option for drilling days, which Midbar had acquired from Continental.

From the price paid by Midbar to Mr. Friedman, Mr. Caspi went on to the "aesthetic" circumstances surrounding the sale. Mr. Friedman sold Continental at the same time he was negotiating with the Company on behalf of the Government of Israel. Before he actually sold the equipment, Continental had submitted and won a tender by Midbar to act as a drilling contractor in Sinai. There had been two competitors for the bid, Continental and Lapidot, but Lapidot's general manager, Mr. Mordcheai Chen, has claimed that the whole thing was fixed from the start. In an attempt to back up Mr. Chen's claim, Mr. Caspi presented a document stating that Continental had been chosen to do the drilling. This was dated long before the results of the tender were published.

### Knew in advance

Continental was informed that it had won the bid on October 13. A drilling prospectus dated "September" states clearly that Continental would do the drilling, thus intimating that the results had been decided before the tender was even issued.

As pointed out by Mr. Friedman, however, Continental submitted its bid on September 3, 1968, and the statement in the pamphlet could have reflected an internal decision taken by Midbar before they decided to inform the parties concerned of their decision. Since the prospectus for drilling operations was dated only "September 1968," Mr. Caspi admitted that this could have been the case, but only because "it was Mr. Friedman's prerogative to have the benefit of the doubt."

Mr. Caspi questioned, at great length, the ethics of Continental in having entered the bid at all. How could Mr. Friedman have offered Midbar the services of his private company for drilling in Sinai at the

same time he was negotiating with Midbar on behalf of the Government, at the same time he was employed by a Government company, and at the same time he was the man who was responsible to the Government for drilling and prospecting operations in Sinai.

Mr. Friedman claimed that there was no conflict of interests in his dual role as private entrepreneur and civil servant at the time he entered the bid, since at the time he was considering leaving the employ of Netivei Neft. After his superiors convinced him to stay on, he said, and a possible conflict of interests arose, he sold his private company without the slightest hesitation.

He said that his equipment was sold with the blessing of all his superiors: Deputy Finance Minister Zvi Dinstein, Chairman of Netivei Neft's board, Mr. Israel Dickenstein and Special Assistant to the Minister of Defence Zvi Tsur. "What could have possibly been 'not kosher' here?" he asked the lawyer.

"Why? Why not?" Mr. Caspi had a difficult time with the witness. Most of his questions were answered with questions, and he was constantly told by Mr. Friedman to "be specific" or quote correctly. When Mr. Caspi asked the witness a tricky question, Mr. Friedman's lawyers were quick to the rescue.

Mr. Caspi charged Mr. Friedman with trying to build up his "own little kingdom" in Sinai by withholding vital information from the bodies which were entitled to receive

it. Mr. Caspi went through the testimony by geologists and government officials, all of whom claimed that, despite repeated appeals to Netivei Neft, they had been unable to get the information they asked for.

Mr. Friedman claimed that he had been told to whom to give information, and said that these persons had been kept informed. Information from Netivei Neft was classified, he said, and the general instruction was that in order to protect the interests of Netivei Neft's foreign partner and Midbar, it should be kept as restricted as possible.

He conceded that he had never received explicit instructions from the Ministry of Defence not to hand over information to the geological or geophysical institutes, but claimed that his chief geologist, Eitan Eisenberg, had dealt with the appeals from those bodies and said that Mr. Caspi had better ask him. The lawyer pointed out that Eisenberg had been asked, and had told the Commission that he had received instructions from Mr. Friedman not to hand over information.

Mr. Friedman claimed that he had received no requests for information from the Government Corporations Authority, despite claims by the Authority Director Mr. Ya'acov Salzman to the contrary. Mr. Caspi said he could not understand why Mr. Salzman should have lied to the Commission, and the matter was left at that. Had he been asked for information by Mr. Salzman, said Mr. Friedman, he would have handed it over gladly.

## AT TEL AVIV UNIVERSITY: Faculty of Law Publishes

### ISRAEL YEARBOOK ON HUMAN RIGHTS

The first issue of the Israel Yearbook on Human Rights was recently published in English by the Faculty of Law of Tel Aviv University. It includes papers and discussions from the International Symposium on Human Rights, which took place at the University in July, 1971.

The Symposium focused on human rights in time of war. It gave particular emphasis to the territories administered by Israel, and to minority group rights. High-ranking military, legal and government representatives took part as well as experts and scientists from all over the world.

The Yearbook, edited by Dr. Yoram Dinstein, covers a whole gamut of problems from the plight of Soviet Jewry to the subject of the Arab minority in Israel to the current situation

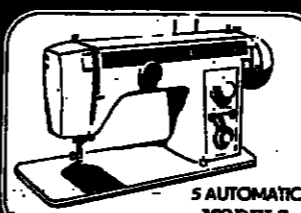
in the Middle East. The question of human rights of groups (as distinct from individuals) is closely analysed.

The Yearbook contains the first collection in English of articles and papers on the administered territories, as well as a compilation of military proclamations, orders and judicial decisions relating to the territories.

The Yearbook is supported by the Memorial Foundation for Jewish Culture (New York). Its aim is to publish studies on human rights in the State of Israel and Jewish communities throughout the world. The volume will be of value to lawyers, students, researchers and all those interested in the current state of affairs in the Middle East.

Assistant editor of the Yearbook is Dr. Nitza Shapiro-Libai. The Editorial Advisory Board includes Justice Haim Cohn of the Israel Supreme Court, Judge Zeev Zetser, Prof. Amnon Rubinstein, Dean of the Faculty of Law at Tel Aviv University, and Prof. Nathan Feinberg of the Hebrew University. 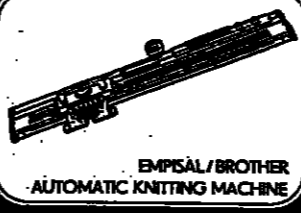

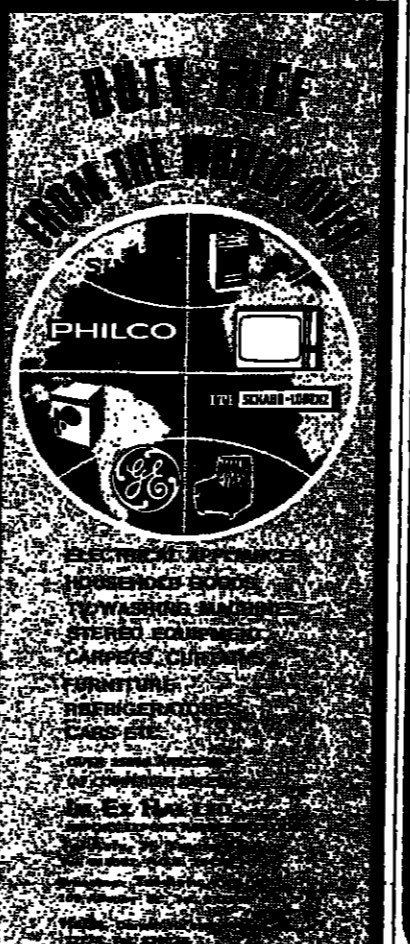

# FIGHTING INFLATION

**As the new Governor of the Bank of Israel, Moshe Sanbar has to advise the Government on all aspects of economic policy. Post Economic Correspondent DAVID KRIVINE asks him about his new job.**

at his finger tips, and the ones he used on this occasion referred to the first ten months of 1977.

German Restitutions were up by \$56m. (compared with January-October 1976) to \$190m. And private financial transfers rose by half to \$140m. Close to \$50m. was spent by foreign residents on buying "a second home in Israel." Not uncommonly, Americans who feel they are too old to settle here and whose children are already involved in the family business, buy an apartment in the hope that their grandchildren may use it as a foothold in the Holy Land, Mr. Sanbar says. In the meantime they rent out the flats and get a return on their money.

Private investments doubled to \$70m. That is also striking; it reflects a trend towards economic sag abroad, while boomtime conditions prevail in Israel. Also funds brought in by immigrants more than doubled to \$90m. over the ten-month period. "Nor should we overlook an increase of one-quarter, during a single year, in the country's visible exports."

What effect does all this have on the economy internally?

"Despite our ceiling on bank cre-

14 per cent. To charge the full 14 per cent for development loans might hit investment, and we don't want to court that risk.

"Better to see what happens with our present increase to 11 per cent. If that's not enough, we can always lift it higher. That's wiser than starting high, because any damage from overshooting the mark could not be undone after the event."

"Have you anything else in mind?"

"I think the Government should raise its premium for insuring loans against devaluation from 4 to 5 per cent."

"Isn't that like closing the stable door after the horse has bolted? We've already had a devaluation, last August."

"What I am suggesting has nothing to do with devaluation. We are concerned with the fact that interest rates abroad have dropped, while in Israel they have risen. A man can borrow money abroad for 7 per cent, pay 4 per cent for exchange-rate insurance — making 11 per cent — and lend the money in Israel at 18 per cent. We want to plug that gap."

It is known that the central bank would like, in addition, to see greater administrative control of all foreign borrowings, to ensure that institutions and private individuals do not put the nation in debt unnecessarily. Under study at the Treasury is a proposal to ban convertibility of foreign loans altogether, except for those approved as serving the long-term interests of the economy.

### Not cheap

"The difference in interest rates at home and abroad also works the other way," he continued. "A year ago I thought that export credit at 6 per cent was too cheap, and should be made dearer. But it isn't cheap any longer, by international standards. Our competitors in other countries don't pay more than 6 per cent today."

Mr. Sanbar takes counter-cyclical policies very seriously. "I suggested freezing part of the Development Budget until October, as was done last year. My advice was not taken, and I am sorry it wasn't."

"But this is outside the field of monetary policy, isn't it?"

"I am responsible for monetary policy, but in my present position I am also Economic Adviser to the Government. I have been concerned for years with advising the authorities on overall economic policy; I see it as my job to go on doing so."

"This week, for example, I have just completed an assignment as chairman of a committee appointed by the Ministerial Economic Committee. Its task was to determine how Government aid should be extended to institutions and enterprises: whether by taking capital notes, buying preference shares or what. It is not a monetary matter, yet I was asked to do it. On all problems outside the monetary sphere my role is a purely advisory one; but I have to give that advice."

My duty is to be an active partner to the Finance Minister in developing overall economic policy."

# Real estate's real value

It is a widely held belief that by far the best investment in Israel is in real estate and in flats. Everybody knows quite a number of stories about plots which changed hands only ten years ago for a few hundred pounds and which are now worth the same number of thousands. Or flats, the price of which has quadrupled in only a few years. To say nothing of tales about real estate bought in the early twenties for pence which is now worth many thousands of pounds.

No mention is made usually of the many plots that were sold in those days, mostly abroad, in far away regions of our country, which later proved to be unsaleable and sometimes still are, to this day.

Those stories about the real value of real estate are widespread, also in other countries, e.g. my native Holland. I found, however, by carefully checking the prices of all the houses in Amsterdam — over one thousand — that changed hands three or more times during 125 years, from 1825 to 1940, that although there was a clearly rising trend in the price of houses, this rise was by no means spectacular. It was closely correlated to the rise of the population in Amsterdam during those 125 years and was, during the depreciation of money was taken into account, no rise at all.

In our country reliable statistics of the average prices of real estate and flats are not available. The Journal of the building trade: "Hakablan VeHaboneh," contains in its January 1972 issue, however, interesting material about the average prices of real estate and flats in several coastal cities during a seven year period. Those prices have been computed, the article states, by carefully investigating closed deals and by checking same with the figures of official land valuers. The article compares prices which were obtained at the top of the previous boom, with those four years later at the bottom of the *mitus* and with the prices prevailing again more than three years thereafter, in early 1971, before the recent devaluation of the Israeli pound. (The prices are themselves averages as, of course, the amount of money that is paid for real estate varies widely in different areas of each city).

The first table contains average prices of real estate per room in

nine cities, from Tel Aviv to Ashkelon.

The widely known disastrous fall of land prices during the *mitus* is clearly evident in a decrease of the average price of real estate per room from IL3,405 to IL2,855, or by no less than 29 per cent in three years. The price rise after the Six Day War is also in evidence, the price of the real estate per room almost doubling in the following four-year period to IL7,134 on the average. Prices in all cities are again above, in some cases far above, the previous top.

to make comparisons not too complicated, those taxes are not taken into account. They make the purchase of real estate, however, less attractive.

In the second table, the average prices of flats are computed for seven cities as published in "Hakablan VeHaboneh."

### Adept or lucky

The figures made public show the same picture for all cities. The prices of flats in the coastal area surpassed in 1971 all previous records. Those who bought, however, a flat during the previous peak saw in no case the price of the flat rise above the amount invested plus an annual interest income of 9 per cent. This was only the case for those who bought four years later, at the bottom of the *mitus*. Comparisons of the actual decrease and increase are, of course, more difficult in the case of flats than in that of real estate pure and simple, as flats also produce an income in the form of rent. From this rent receipt — in Israel mostly the benefit the owner has from living in his own home — the expenses for upkeep, repair and taxes and the possible deterioration of the price of the flat over a number of years must be deducted. (The prices mentioned in "Hakablan VeHaboneh" are all for new flats). No reliable statistics are, however, available about the net income on flats in Israel.

Of course, the figures published have to be accepted with care, firstly because no possibility exists to check the reliability of the facts presented. Secondly, the sample studied was most probably only a limited one. Further, the consideration that since early 1971 prices of real estate and flats have again risen considerably, especially after the August devaluation, has to be taken into account.

### Paper profit

However, if one takes into account that other investments, bank accounts, bonds and trade bills bear fruit in the form of interest, the picture changes completely, even over a comparatively short period of seven years. When it is assumed that 9 per cent per annum is received as net income and this is added to the purchase price on a compound basis, those people who bought real estate in the nine cities mentioned, were in early 1971 still better off with money than with land. The deterioration in value was no less than 27 per cent, from IL3,730 to IL2,730. Only those who were lucky enough to buy real estate at the bottom of the depression in 1966-67 could chalk up early in 1971 already a paper profit of 32 per cent, IL7,134 as against IL5,397 plus four years interest.

An interest income of 9 per cent on the average seems reasonable, especially when taking into account that on real estate annual taxes have to be paid. In addition, land betterment tax is due when the land is sold at profit. In order

## Leathergoods Week

**AVIV.** — The third annual Leathergoods Week opened today at the Tel Aviv Hilton, with participation up by 50 per cent last year. Among the 60 exhibitors are 32 shoe manufacturers, 12 handbag producers and 11 representatives of tanneries and leather goods makers.

Jo Shamis, director of the Institute's shoe centre, says that exports will continue to rise, reaching at least 100 buyers, from the U.S., Canada and Japan, have all registered their attendance at the event. He classifies the types of shoes into two categories: those "super buying power" — such as those from Marks and Spencer and the British Shoe Corporation — and, secondly, representatives of department stores and private shops who buy in smaller quantities, and are expected to reach by the end of the current year an annual export capacity of between \$200,000 and \$700,000.

goods (handbags, briefcases, etc.) underwent a remarkable export growth in the past year, increasing from \$500,000 in 1970 to 1.5m.

This huge increase in exports of shoes and leathergoods can be attributed principally to the establishment two years ago of a number of large factories, as a result of foreign investments and using foreign know-how. Last year was a "running in" period for these plants and it can be confidently forecast that exports will continue to rise during a quarter of the Ordinary Budget, yet receives less than a quarter of the revenue, because taxes take time to come in.

"I would like to reduce the liquidity ratio later on, in the summer or autumn, if" he adds, "it is possible."

THE chiselling last Friday of four holes — each 15 centimetres deep — into the outer part of the Temple Wall, a section lying about 200 metres to the north of the main part, was, to be sure, an encroachment on a symbol. The Wall marks the heart of the capital of modern Israel.

The stones in question date back to the eighth century, more specifically to the Omayyad period. However, the stones beneath this part are thought to be a section of the original Wall. 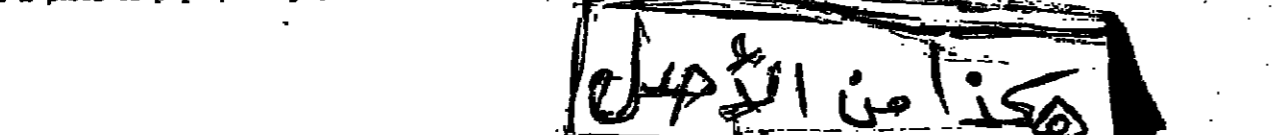

## Civil rights

More and more political candidates are being asked, often by noisy demonstrators, to take a stand on the "gay rights" issue. Senator Edmund Muskie, campaigning for the Democratic nomination in New Hampshire, has repeatedly avoided the question and has been picketed here and in cities across the U.S. by gay activists. Presidential candidate Paul McCloskey, a Republican Congressman from California, has said he supports legislation guaranteeing civil rights for homosexuals; but stopped short of supporting efforts to end discrimination in the armed forces.

In California last month, a Bill which would have legalized any form of private sexual activity between consenting adults was defeated 41 to 26 in the legislature, but an increasing number of Congressmen are gradually revising their ideas on the issue.

There are even signs that the Los Angeles Police Department, which has the reputation of being one of the nation's toughest, may be rethinking its policies, and setting a precedent for other forces. Deputy chief R.E. Merdock admits that entrapment by officers was once common, but denies it is permitted today. "We work only on the basis of complaints," he says. "We're looking for the prostitute, not the lover."

Gay movement leaders even consider it a kind of victory to have forced Chief Davis into open debate on the issue. "It's great," says the California journal "The Advocate." "The ignorance and bigotry of the man who heads one of the largest non-federal armed forces in the country has been exposed."

# U.S. HOMOSEXUALS FIGHT FOR THEIR RIGHTS

LOS ANGELES (CPM). — REPLY, without fuss or furor, Oregon this month became the U.S. state to "legalize homosexuality" by abolishing old laws private conduct between consenting adults. Many other states, including California and Texas, are moving gradually towards allowing, or at least softening, laws on "victimless crimes."

A new sex laws in Oregon closely follow the Model Penal Code of American Law Institute, and another step forward in the fight for equal treatment in which is being conducted by African homosexuals, estimated at 15 million in the U.S., is still very far from falling into line with the rest of the Western world. Many states are shocked and repelled by the campaign waged over the two years. Few public figures voiced their distaste more recently than Los Angeles Police Chief Ed Davis.

For months, several sympathetic organizations have been demanding that the Los Angeles police appoint a liaison officer to the community; he would deal with the "homosexuals' frequent complaints of police harassment and arrest. Chief Davis resolutely refused to do so, though a similar appointment in liberal San Francisco helped to solve many community problems there.

Chief Davis has been accused of "very sick people" and demonstrations held to protest against his policies, and by a series of "obscene Christmas cards" he says he received from gay activists.

Chief Davis's attitude is probably an accurate reflection of that held by conservative California at large; but it is not shared by all his law enforcement colleagues. "The figures for arrests of homosexuals are absolutely staggering," says Deputy District Attorney Vincent Bugliosi, who believes that the Police Department has concentrated too heavily in the past on such crimes, and too little on robbery and other "crimes against the community."

In San Francisco, an even more positive attitude is taken towards the homosexual "liberation movement" by newly-elected Sheriff Richard Hongisto, 35, a criminologist who spent 10 years with the city police force. Hongisto openly

courted the extensive "gay vote" in San Francisco, promising fairer law enforcement for homosexuals and support for moves to "purge enlightened legislation." The estimated 30,000 votes he gained in this way probably won him the election. Hongisto went so far as to thank gay organizations for fund-raising and other political support and accept honorary membership of SIR, the Society for Individual Rights, one of the oldest crusading groups in the U.S.

Still criminals  
If Sheriff Hongisto's stand is unusual for an officer of the law — and under California's 100-year-old penal code homosexuals are still criminals — the percentage of the population whose minds are being changed in similar fashion is increasing.

Liberationists have achieved this by a bold attack on the medical-psychiatric establishment, which they blame for much of their trouble. "Generally the medical profession has functioned as a repressive arm of society against us," says Don Kilheiser, a co-director of the Gay Community Services Centre in Los Angeles. "Their alleged 'cure' for this alleged 'disease' are aimed at underwriting a majority morality based mostly on fear. We simply reject the notion of 'sickness'."

Studies show that human sexuality extends through a much broader range than the old "Me Tarzan — You Jane" formula. Homosexuality and heterosexuality exist side by side within the same person, and no two persons occupy exactly the same place on the scale."

To push their case, homosexual rights organizations throughout the U.S. have taken to the courts. One major case is being fought by the American Civil Liberties Union, which has asked for a permanent injunction against the Civil Service Commission to halt all investigations of Government employees' sexual behaviour.

The suit names four plaintiffs: young men in the Armed Forces, the National Bureau of Standards and other Government offices, all fired when their homosexuality was revealed. It is, says the A.C.L.U., the first action filed on behalf of federal workers who have been dismissed because of their sexual nature.

## Ampa at work as usual after blaze

**Jerusalem Post Staff**  
**TEL AVIV.** — Business went on as usual yesterday at Ampa Ltd. and in the Amcor network despite the disruption of its services through the huge blaze that destroyed the firm's main warehouses at Rehov Hamasger here. A somewhat exhausted National Service Manager, Mr. Oded Grodetsky, told *The Jerusalem Post* yesterday that the experts are now estimating the damage. It would appear that many millions of pounds worth of household and kitchen equipment and spare parts went up in smoke.  
 He related that his staff "worked all night. Sixty service cars were out on the road first thing in the morning."  
 Mr. Grodetsky stated: "I can safely promise that not one family owning an Amcor refrigerator will suffer."  
 The blaze was first reported to the fire brigade and the police at 9.30 p.m. Wednesday night by a passer-by. Tel Aviv Fire Brigade Chief Y. Ritov summoned ten fire engines and 35 firemen, and later called in ten extra men when it was feared the blaze would get out of hand. The Moshe Carasso and Sons car showrooms and garage packed with new models adjoin the Ampa warehouse.

**THREE HOURS**  
 The firemen strove for three hours, at times donning gas masks because of the thick smoke, before the flames were brought under control. Three firemen were hurt and rushed to hospital for treatment — two were injured when they stumbled into a deep hole in the ground and one collapsed from exhaustion.  
 One report had it that the blaze was caused by a short circuit, but no confirmation was available last night. The blaze spread quickly through the plastic spare parts for the firm's T.V. sets, refrigerators and electric appliances.  
 Ampa provides the retail outlets and service for Amcor products. Ampa Ltd. is a private firm owned by Israeli and American businessmen. It was established years ago by Amcor in partnership with the Ha'argaz cooperative.  
 Mr. Grodetsky said he had sent teams of trucks to all Ampa service stations to bring in spare parts to the Tel Aviv region. "I would like to use your columns to appeal to

owners of our appliances to contact us only in cases of real emergency for the next few days. Our refrigerator service continues as usual, and we hope to meet all commitments."  
 Mr. Grodetsky said there was no problem at all of supplying new models. But the stock of spare parts for 25-year-old Amcor models had gone up in smoke at the Rehov Hamasger warehouse, "and this was the only place in the world where they were stored."  
 Firemen were also busy in Jaffa yesterday afternoon, where a row of stores and two woodworking shops burned out of control on Rehov Shimon Hazadik.  
 Four fire engines rushed to the scene, and Electric Corporation workers were right behind, to cut off electric power. Police evacuated families living in the immediate vicinity for fear that the flames would spread.  
 Firemen used chemical extinguishers.

**Smoke billows in high-rise house**  
**HAIFA.** — Firemen yesterday went from door to door in a 14-story apartment building in the Roman quarter to calm the tenants after a fire broke out in the ground floor and filled the stairwell with smoke.  
 They warned the dozens of tenants against trying to leave their flats or even opening their front doors. Instead they urged them to open windows for fresh air.  
 The fire broke out at noon on the electric fuse board of the house at 33 Rehov Ha'oren. It caused little damage, except for the smoke nuisance.

**How to make the Electric Company move**  
**Jerusalem Post Reporter**  
**HAIFA.** — When Fouad Hassoun Halaby, a contractor in Dohat el-Carmel, turned up with his wife and nine children, the youngest six months old, and settled down at the district office of the Electric Corporation here, things began to move.  
 In August last year, he paid IL1,500 to have his outlying home linked to the village network. Since then he went almost every week to ask when electricity would be installed.  
 "Each time, I was told another week to a fortnight. Nothing happened."  
 He received no letter of explanation, not to mention an apology. On February 8, he wrote a letter and received a reply that "the matter was being looked into and he would receive an answer."  
 Where his visits and letters had failed, the cries of the baby at the district office at the end of last week succeeded. This week a crew turned up to link his home to the grid.  
 Questioned by *The Jerusalem Post* last night, he said that he was still speaking from a dark home. "A hole in the wall that should take half a day at the most, is taking the workers three days," the contractor said.

**Histadrut over-ruled on labour dispute bill**  
 The Settlement of Labour Disputes bill will be supported by the Alignment in its present form, without the modifications urged by the Histadrut. This was decided yesterday at a joint meeting of the Alignment Executive, the Alignment faction in the Knesset and its representatives in the Histadrut.  
 The meeting rejected the Histadrut's demand for the right to declare strikes in state enterprises on issues other than wages and social benefits.  
 Labour Minister Yosef Alimogri assured the Histadrut representatives that penalties to be imposed on strike leaders who break the law would involve fines, and not prison sentences.  
 The joint forum decided by 21 votes to 14 with one abstention to dismiss a motion aimed at introducing even more changes into Mr. Alimogri's draft law. The vote found Mapai supported by Rafi, and opposed by a combined front of Ahdut Ha'avoda and Mapam, though two Ahdut Ha'avoda Ministers, Yigal Alion and Israel Galim, backed the Government.

## Wall gouging inquiry team unanimous

**Jerusalem Post Reporter**  
 The committee investigating the gouging of four holes in the western Temple Mount wall last night presented its report to Premier Golda Meir. The committee did not reveal its findings publicly.  
 The four-man committee headed by Haim Kuberan, Director-General of the Interior Ministry, was set up on Sunday by the Prime Minister following the revelation that the holes, about 15 centimetres deep, had been chiselled during the course of repairs to a building next to the Temple Mount. Fifteen witnesses were heard and the committee held seven sittings.  
 Its report, submitted unanimously, contains more than 200 pages, including 15 pages of conclusions and recommendations.  
 The report presumably places responsibility for the hole in the wall on the contractor who was engaged in the preservation or demolition of the house which was being repaired. A municipal spokesman yesterday denied a report that the factions in the Municipal Council had agreed to recommend destruction of the building in order to permit continuation of the subterranean dig by the Ministry for Religious Affairs along the western Temple Mount wall. That dig, aimed at exposing the wall underground for its entire length, has been held up for two months by the danger of bringing on an immediate collapse of the building.

**Dayan 88% in leadership popularity poll**  
**TEL AVIV.** — Defence Minister Moshe Dayan remains ahead of Premier Golda Meir, at the top of a popularity poll on who is best fitted to lead the nation.  
 This emerged from the latest public opinion poll conducted by Fori, Public Opinion Research of Israel, which was released yesterday.  
 The poll, conducted each quarter, includes an open-ended question on "which are the three personalities most fitted to lead the nation." Notwithstanding the recent smear campaign waged against him, Mr. Dayan got 88.1 per cent (last time the figure was 83 per cent). Mrs. Meir received 82.2 per cent (about the same as she had), Fori Director Raphael Gill told *The Jerusalem Post* last night.  
 He explained that the percentages are from a total of 300 per cent.  
 The next in line was Deputy Prime Minister Yigal Alion at 31.8 per cent.

**Eliminate resentment of immigrants—Meir**  
**Jerusalem Post Reporter**  
**TEL AVIV.** — Prime Minister Golda Meir yesterday called on the public to eliminate resentment of new immigrants.  
 Speaking at a rally of Latin American immigrants gathered to mark the 5th anniversary of alga from the South American continent, Mrs. Meir said she is "sure that the vast majority of Israelis welcome the new immigrants. But ill-feeling is being blown up by the mass media and bad things can spread as readily as good things. Each Israeli should fight this tendency among his friends, neighbours and acquaintances," she said.

**Goldmann's claim dismissed Dayan was emissary**  
**Jerusalem Post Political Reporter**  
**TEL AVIV.** — Circles close to Defence Minister Moshe Dayan did not treat very seriously the claim of Dr. Nahum Goldmann in an afternoon paper yesterday that Dayan had consented to be his "mysterious emissary" for the "peace-mission-that-never-was" to Cairo.  
 Dr. Goldmann says he was approached by intermediaries to arrange the contacts to which Premier Meir gave her consent. The Egyptians, however, did not.

## Lie detector test in 'Yoskai' killing

**TEL AVIV.** — Yehoshua and Elisha Mizrahi, suspected of hiding gunmen to murder Yosef ("Yoskai") Mizrahi, have been given a lie detector test, at the request of the Magistrate's Court here yesterday when Judge Kostas Kiriakou reminded the two for an additional 10 days.  
 In opposing the request, defence counsel Eliahu Kadar and Haim Kazas pointed to the fact of the lie detector test (whose results have not been released) as proof of their clients' innocence. Mr. Kasas said the mother of the two accused, Sarah Mizrahi, had suffered a heart attack after the arrests.  
 However, a police spokesman claimed a court that there was no additional evidence connecting the two with the crime.  
 Meanwhile, a charge sheet was submitted to the District Court here yesterday against the two suspected gunmen, Avraham Agrishovsky, 49, and Shimon Menshem, 43, of Tel Aviv. They are accused of having murdered Yoskai, 36, on January 21, near the Gan Hatoron, at the behest of Yehoshua and Elisha Mizrahi, whose brother, Shmuel Mizrahi (no relation to the man slain last month) was killed two years ago.  
 The charge sheet says Agrishovsky fixed an appointment with Yoskai on the pretext of discussing a deal involving stolen dollars. Yehoshua Mizrahi gave Agrishovsky a revolver and promised him IL30,000.  
 Agrishovsky took Menshem with him and the latter shot Yoskai three times as he sat in his car, states the charge sheet. Yoskai got out of the car and crawled to Rehov Hamasger where a taxi driver took him to Hadassah hospital. (He died two days later.) (Hem)

**HAIFA'S CATS WIN REPRIEVE**  
**Jerusalem Post Reporter**  
**HAIFA.** — The campaign against the cats will be discontinued. Not a hair on the head of any Haifa cat will be touched, Mayor Moshe Willeman promised on Wednesday night.  
 He was asked at a wool newspaper about the "cat" fate in the current drive to make the City cleaner.  
 A campaign was launched against stray cats because they interbred with the collection of garbage in plastic bags now being tried experimentally among 4,000 households in Hadar Ha-carmel. The stray cats tore the bags open to forage inside — as they had been accustomed to do in garbage bins.  
 The Veterinary Department had been giving the stray cats sleeping pills and then removing them, while asleep, for a lethal injection. The campaign produced indignant protests from animal lovers.  
 The Association of Cat Lovers even published a newspaper notice of protest. "The place vacated by cats will be taken over by rats," the Association warned, "especially in a port town."  
 The 4,000 householders put out closed refuse bags on the sidewalk at night or in the early morning. The refuse bins remain empty.

**Yona Kesse resigns Soviet immigrants' post**  
**TEL AVIV.** — Mr. Yona Kesse on Wednesday told the Executive Committee of the Soviet Immigrants Union that he wishes to resign as chairman. He said he had never intended to make a career at the post.  
 The Union was now a viable institution which could manage without him, he said.

## LIPSKY APPEALS AGAINST ARREST

**TEL AVIV.** — District Judge Hanna Evonor yesterday ordered French-Jewish businessman Claude Lipsky to be detained pending completion of court hearings on France's request for his extradition. Detention was postponed for 24 hours to allow Lipsky to appeal to the Supreme Court for extension of bail.  
 He did so immediately and the appeal will be heard today.  
 In contrast to Israelis who are detained, Judge Evonor noted, there was no fear that Lipsky would attempt to influence witnesses. But there was serious danger that he might not report to the Court and that an extradition decision might not be executed. Israel's international relations require that she be able to carry out extradition, the Judge said.  
 Mrs. Evonor said Lipsky was suspected of breach of trust, fraud and theft. But the offences were far more serious than would appear from these formal charges. In the contemporary business world, she said, respectable-seeming companies and subsidiaries could be set up, with all of them in fact being directed by one man, and with the same monies being transferred from company to company for speculative purposes. Some of these funds were liable to disappear along the way, she said.  
 Such acts of fraud were on the increase in various countries, said the Judge, and they were far more dangerous than ordinary cases of fraud and theft. Lipsky is liable to a maximum term of 10 years in France.  
 Mrs. Evonor took up the claim of defence counsel H. Shenhav that racial and religious discrimination was behind the extradition request. She noted the claim that Lipsky's non-Jewish partner, Andre Roland, was walking around free in France, while another French Jew connected with the affair, as well as his lawyer, were under detention.  
 A statement by a noted French journalist was submitted to the court stating that the reason for the extradition was political. Judge Evonor said that these arguments gave food for thought but they were not sufficient.  
 The Judge noted that the detention was not any kind of step towards extradition itself. Its purpose was solely to ensure Lipsky's presence during the court hearing and to permit his extradition if necessary. (Hem)

**More Soviet Jews Amidar informs here; woman seeks change in records**  
**LOD AIRPORT.** — A group of Soviet immigrants arrived yesterday morning in an El Al flight from Vienna. Most of them are from Georgia, and the rest from Odessa, Moscow, Kiev, Minsk, Riga and Lvov.  
 In Ashkelon, a recent immigrant from the Soviet Union has applied to the local court to have her name and age changed in her personal records.  
 The immigrant, a 50-year-old woman from a Baltic country, told the court that all her papers carry the name and identity of her sister. The reason for this is that when she, the immigrant, escaped from the Germans during World War II, she happened to have had her sister's identity card in her pocket.  
 Asked why she had not effected the change of records during the past 27 years, she replied: "In the Soviet Union it is best to avoid unnecessary applications to the authorities, especially in matters pertaining to personal identity."

**Herrmann Meyer, bookseller, dead**  
 Herrmann M.Z. Meyer, veteran Jerusalem bookseller and founder of Universitas Book Sellers in the capital, died yesterday. The funeral will leave from his home at 11 Rehov Herzog, at one p.m. today.  
 He is survived by his wife Elise, two daughters, Hannah and Ada, and seven grandchildren.

**Yona Kesse resigns Soviet immigrants' post**  
**TEL AVIV.** — Mr. Yona Kesse on Wednesday told the Executive Committee of the Soviet Immigrants Union that he wishes to resign as chairman. He said he had never intended to make a career at the post.
