Vietnam offer

DRESIDENT Nixon's latest address to his nation on the recent offers made to Hanoi in the course of 13 secret trips to Paris by Professor Kissinger can be viewed more as an attempt to demonstrate to the American people that he was doing everything possible for peace, rather than as radically new proposals. In fact, Hanoi rejected this 8-point plan in favour of its own 7-point plan

The rejection was not un-expected. Knowing well the mounting internal pressures on the U.S. President to terminate the Vietnam war, free the over 9,000 American prisoners and loosen the ties with the Saigon regime, Hanoi is in no rush to provide Mr. Nixon with an easy election victory. 



Dr. Ella Lingens, who said she was taken to the notorious camp in February 1943 as a political pri-soner, was giving evidence in the trial here of two former Nazi S.S. nam and the first reported action officers charged with complicity in involving Communist tanks in South Wietnam in nearly three years.

Dr. Lingens, who said she was allowed to work as a doctor at the camp, said some women doctors tried to put the names of people in great suffering up to the com-mission to save the lives of others. These doctors, she said, were accused of being collaborators at the end of the war.

Giving evidence for the prosecu-tion, she also talked about the notorious Auschwitz doctor Joseph Mengels — the most wanted Nazi war criminal after Hitler's deputy Martin Bormann.

She said Mengele devised a simple method of sorting out those attempts to save Auschwitz inmates. He called all the doctors together and demanded an exact record of patients' health and what was wrong with them. If they were likely to be ill longer than three weeks, they were carted off to the gas chambers, Dr. Lingens said.




No damage or casualties were caused by the firecracker, hurled as the 11-car motorcade was moving from Tokyo station to Mr. Gromyko' hotel suite.

Tax officials enter Golan

Jerusalem Post Economic Reporter Residents of the Golan Heights will be receiving notices in the coming days from the internal Revenue Department requesting them to pay their advance assessments for the current fiscal year. This is the first time that residents beyond the "Green Line" (the pre-Six Day War borders) are being required to pay taxes to the Israel

Till now only the residents of East Jerusslem were required to pay Israel income taxes, because East Jerusalem has been legally incorporated into the State of Ierael. The residents in the administered areas are required to pay their taxes according to Jordanian law on the West Bank, and Egyptian Military law in the Gaza Strip and Sinal These taxes are paid to the Military Government.

The dispatch of the preliminary tax as essments to the residents of the Goian Heights marks a change in the existing laws. It is reported that there is a decision in principle to apply Israeli laws in some measure to the administered areas. The dispatch of the tax assessments is the first legal step in this direction.

Kiryat Arba squatters defy Housing Ministry

HEBRON. - Residents of Kiryat Arba, the Jewish quarter of Hebron, yesterday actively as-sisted 10 families who tried to occupy newly-completed apartments in open defiance of the Housing Ministry. Two families were successful

Police arriving on the scene managed to persuade eight of the families not to break in but there was no attempt to evict two families who had already taken possession of flats.

The Kiryat Arba settlers, who are mostly Orthodox, object to the Housing Ministry's decision to run a general lottery for the 220 available new flats. They claim that the aim of the lottery is to "dilute" the religious character of the quarter and hamper their attempts at self-

The police yesterday evening said they did not use force to evict the squatters because no one had as yet filed a complaint.

Shalit fails in bid to register baby as 'Hebrew'

The High Court yesterday rejected the application by Sgan-Aluf Binyamin Shalit to register his third son, Tomer, born four months ago, as a "Hebrew national." It also rejected his request for a writ against the Interior Ministry in the same matter.
The Court stated that registra-

tion of a "Hebrew nationality" is merely circumvention of the law, since the terms Jewish and Hebrew nationalities are synonymous.

Speaking to newsmen, he said that the whole scheme seemed to him, after due consideration "premature" and quite unnecessary at this time, stressing that the existing development towns can take at least another 100,000 immigrants without the need for expensive infrastructure that Modi'in would Local Council Chairman B.

Wanger told the Minister that

he, like the heads of all the other development towns, had been shocked by the Modfin proposal. He considered "a stab in the back" for his Western Galilee town, which has only 4,500 residents and can easily grow to 20,000. Fewer than half the 33 existing development towns had reached 10,000 so far. Asked to comment, Mr. Sapir fold reporters that he saw "no need or use" to build another town at this stage. However, the question of whether an industrial zone should be built at Modiin to serve nearby Petah Tikva, Lydda and Ramle, should be "considered on its merits."
