SHAPIRO RESIGNATION

THE resignation yesterday of Justice Minister Yaacov Shimshon Shapiro comes after several months of often unseemly wrangling. The government and particularly Prime Minister Meir particularly Prime Minister Meirmay not be best pleased that Mr. Shapiro should have taken this decision, but large sections of the public will feel either relieved that the wrangle should be over, or satisfied that their criticism, as generally reflected in the press, should have found its

It has never been very clear just when a Cabinet minister should resign. In this country, it has been most often when incurable strains and tensions have developed within the coalition structure, that is, not in connection with an individual's failure Nobody seriously attributes improper actions to Mr. Shapiro, but in connection with the Netivel Neft inquiry he is generally felt to have given poor advice

The first time was when he declared the case was not one for an Inquiry Commission. He should know, for he designed the whole machinery of the commissions, following the endless, unsolved dispute that raged around the celebrated "Lavon Affair," which could not be forinvestigated for lack of provision for a formal investi-gating body of this kind.

As the result of public pressure an inquiry was in fact held but it may well be that Mr. Shapiro had been right, for the result proved unsatisfactory. Had he sent the early complaints to the Attorney-General's office and asked that any apparently serious accusations of theft waste and fraud be investigated by the police everybody might hav, been saved a great deal of subsequent trouble and ex-

Instead of making use of these normal channels, Mr. Shapiro asked first Mr. Yascov Arnon. he former Director-General of the Finance Ministry, and the Mr. Moshe Ben Zeev, the for . e Attorney-General, to investigate The latter recommended police investigation at least of the al-leged thefts of equipment. Under sharp criticism he agreed only that if a case went on for so long, a ceiling should have been set to the fee. Mr. Shapiro has been a well-known lawyer himself and the sums involved

named and the same involved need not have surprised him. Ultimately, the crime Mr. Shapiro has committed is to be out of touch with the public and even, it proved, with wide sections of his own party. There is no doubt he did much valuable work in legislation during his period in office and that he may consider that he has not been sufficiently appreciated by the ignorant.
But the first and most important

job of a Cobinet minister is not to be a capable technicism — for that there are advisers and ex-perts — but to understand the public on whose behalf he holds his high office. The contact between the government and the public ties often become tenuous ot years and Mr. Shapiro is not the only affender in this respect. If his resignation, which appeared final last night, serves as a reminder to other ministers that they do not operate in a vacuum. It

"Take a pill a day and you can't get strung out," Dr. Jerome Jaffe said, in explaining to a House appropriations subcommittee how the medication

Dr. Jaffe, director of the Special Action Office for Drug Abuse Prevention, testified on April 19 in support of his agency's request for \$6.8m. for use in the 12 months starting July 1.

He said development of non-addictive "antagonist" drugs was the agency's No. 2 priority goal, second only to provision of treatment of some kind for every addict who wants it. Next on the priority list is development of an easily used early detection system for identifi-

cation of users.

Air France: Unwitting accomplice to killing

passenger who registers for a flight at Orly, Le Bourget or any other French amport may feel slightly uneasy under the piercing stares of the employees. But, following the carnage at Lod, this is now the fate of anybody who could be mistaken for an Arab or a Japanese. The belated but dramatic tightening of Air France's security precautions is obvious to any traveller passing through here. Some of them respond with impatience, but the

general reaction is one of relief.

It is now clear that, despite the flood of self-righteous protestations issued by Air France during the days immediately following the tragedy, the French state-owned air-line acted as the unwitting accom-plice of the killers. The company was convinced that the Branch are was convinced that the French Government's pro-Arab policy assured them of immunity from attacks by hijackers or terrorists. Air France never gave a thought to the problem of what might happen to its passengers or to their baggage once

they were off the plane.

Air France's negligence is confirmed by a series of circulars con-cerning security which the company issued in March, two months be-fore the bloodshed at Lod. These documents were so highly confidential that they were not even made available to the captains of Air France Boeing 707s on the Orly-Lod route.

Scandal

The scandal emerged on May 18 when veteran Captain Vinai was about to take off from Orly for Israel. Vinai asked the traffic coordinator for an examination to be made of passengers' baggage which had been registered and was about to be stowed in the hold of the aircraft. The answer was: "impossible, Captain." Asked why this elementary precaution could not be taken, the coordinator replied: "This procedure has been abeliated." procedure has been abolished by a confidential circular from the management.

Captain Vinai waxed indignant: This circular is so confidential that I have never heard of it. The Pilots' Union had still not received an answer to this protest 12 days later when three Japanese terrorists stepped of an Air France Boeing at Lod and opened fire on passengers in the terminal building, killing 26 people and wounding 72. Air France immediately claimed

it had taken all the safety precautions possible in order to avoid a slaughter and denounced "whimsical or ill-intentioned information" to the contrary. But what were these precautions? And how adequately were they enforced?

Utmost rigour

On February 20, 1970, the com-pany issued a circular calling for "the utmost rigour" by flight personnel in applying security mea-sures. The same circular gave these details about how baggage should be handled: "At the moment of registration baggage should be checked or not checked according to the sort of passenger being dealt with." This meant that Air France employees were at liberty to decide whether to check registered baggage. There was no question of a systematic checking system being introduced.

This circular (No. DO. 42 ND) remained in force until March 21, 1972, when it was replaced by DG DT 55.737 which stated: "For flights ending or stopping over in Tel Aviv the permanent measures to be apcial alert) will be those relating to tight." the hijacking of aircraft. Air France may have been completely satisfied that its planes and passengers were not running any risk from hijackers or other terrorists. The Israeli authorities knew better. That is why Ambassador Asher Ben-Natan went to the French Foreign Ministry four days before the Lod tragedy to warn Secretary-General Herve Alphand.

Ben-Natan pointed out that ter-rorists were planning to use an Air France plane for their next coup and urged that the company should be specially careful on their flights bound for Israel. Mr. Alphand promised to pass the message on. But Ben Natan's tip-off had no impact on the management of Air France. assuming that they ever heard about



"No-go" areas

The present scheme is that temporary "no-go" areas will be set up for one more weekend, and then areas will be seized and held against both the police and Army indefinitely. Their aim is to force Mr. Whitelaw to move against the IRA-held territory of Bogside and Creggan in Londonderry, where British rule no longer exists.

It is doubtful whether the UDA is yet very well armed, though there is no doubt that its members have been engaged busily in recent weeks trying to obtain more. Its leaders speak of being prepared and of having accumulated weapons over the past few months, but its main importance so far has been the ability to organize a vast number of men.

Most of its members are workng-class people, who have felt the frustrations of the past year most strongly. They have seen the IRA bomb and shoot their way to political objectives such as the suspension of the Northern Ireland Parliament. Their anger at what they now see as appeasement of these same gunmen could well be channelled into forming a Protestant fighting army.

Better armed are other groupings of Protestants, outside the UDA, who might assume its leadership if civil war did break out. Many of these are middle class - such people as retired army officers — and they have at least sufficient modern weapons for themselves. These include self-loading rifles, like those used by the British Army. Mr. Nixon confers with the Shah during their recent talks.

These groups have held their hand. They were frustrated by the lack of action when direct rule from Westminster was imposed over their heads, and next time there is a similar reason to move will not be easily held back.



Delay in the UNFAIR DEAL FOR THE OLD labour courts

To the Editor of The Jorusalem Post

Sir. - I read with interest and astonishment David Krivine's article, "Labour courts may play more important role" (May 21), based on a talk with two judges, one of them the President of the Labour Courts, Judge Zvi Barniv. The article was

one-sided and superficial. Had your reporter picked out at random a dozen files from the waiting list of the labour courts he would have noticed why these courts have so far been a complete failure and a waste of the taxpayers' money. I have had bitter personal experience in such a court, where a fairly ordinary claim for compensation on discharge after ten years of work has been through three sessions spaced six months and more apart over almost two years, and no end yet in sight. Twice, one of the lay judges failed to turn up. be-cause of illness or some other plausible reason. Each adjournment means to me loss of time and extra cost for a lawyer, not to mention frustration. And if compensation is awarded to me, who will compensate me for the loss of its purchasing power after two to three years of inflation?

Each time I am in court, I meet people with similar experiences. What is going on in the labour courts today, at their present speed of work, amounts to a denial of justice. The law prevents me from taking my claim to the Magistrates' Court, which would have dealt with it much faster. The inefficiency of the labour courts would soon be exposed by statistics on the speed with which they operate.






