

India is also disappointed that Bangla Desh delayed appointing a permanent diplomat to represent it here, although the New Delhi government was the first to recognize Mujib's regime.

Some Indian officials are inclined to attribute the "pinpricks" partly to the suspicion the less economically advanced Moslem East Bengali has of his powerful, predominantly Hindu neighbour.

Sensitive to these fears, India has barred its businessmen from dealing with Bangle Deah lest the charge of exploitation "by the Marwaris of Calcutta" be revived.

This desire to avoid misunderstanding and to provide no grist to any propaganda that the Indian forces are an army of occupation is the main reason for the Indian Army's leaving Bangla Desh even though Sheikh Mujib does not have a police force, militia or army adequate to deal with disorder. Indeed,

Mulib wanted the Indian Army to stay to maintain law and order, but since that could involve its troops in clashes with East Bengalis, India resolved to take its troops out. A small number of Indian officers are training the Bangia Desh police, but that is the full extent of their involvement.

When Mrs. Indira Gandhi goes to Bangia Desh on a two-day visit at the end of this week. Sheikh Mujib is expected to bring up with her the question of Indian support to help maintain law and order. The Sheikh himself admits the situation to be precarious.

For one thing all the arms supplied to the Mukti Bahini have not been surrendered to the Government in spite of the Sheikh's appeal. Also, arms distributed by the Pakistani Army to Bengalis loyal to them are still around.

To avoid the charge of colonization of Bangla Desh, India will not push for a comprehensive trade treaty. Instead it will be content to make ad hoe arrangements on particular commodities. Nor will it urge a common arrangement for the marketing and pricing of Bangla Desh jute.

constructed from a previously un-identified papyrus fragment found among the scrolls. He suggested that the fragment dates from the year 50 C.E., based on the style of writing and the

date of other fragments which already have been identified. Many modern scholars had theorized until now that Mark wrote his Gospel in Rome shortly before 70 C.E., using the recollections of St.

Peter as the basis. O'Callaghan's discovery is intended to suggest that Mark's Gospel was already in circulation at least 20 years before then.

In addition, the fragment would be the oldest piece of New Testament writing ever found. The record until now has been held by a fragment of St. John's Gospel, found in Egypt and dated at around 135 C.E.



Davar (Histadrut) discussing Rumania President Nicolae Ceausescu's tour of Arab countries, says that "both Jerusalem and Moscow will follow the trip with particular interest. Ceausescu's extended tour proves the stability of his regime, and will help to strengthen Rumania's independence and reduce her economic dependence on the Soviet Union and her satellities. Unlike Moscow, Jerusalem wishes Ceausescu good luck, but on condition that he does not strengthen Rumania's links with the Arab countries, at the expense of her friendship with Israel."

Ha'aretz (non-party) commenting on Nixon's forthcoming trip to Moscow, writes that "no change is to be expected in Arab-Israel relations before the end of the Moscow talks... nor is an imposed solution to the Middle East conflict likely be decided upon at the talks. If. however, Nixon and his Soviet hosts do adopt such a solution, pressure on the parties to the dispute will probably be ineffective." Ai Hamishmar (Mapam) expresses support for the Prime Minister's attack upon the ill-will towards immigrants, saying "We are a nation of immigrants and without immigration our future cannot be guaranteed. Moreover, this state was established not just for the Jews who were living in it, but for Jews everywhere."
