

Middle East awaits the Moscow summit

Little progress is expected in the Middle East arena as the parties prepare for President Nixon's talks in Moscow, SAM LIPSKI writes, and present moves are simply window-dressing.

WASHINGTON (Reuters). — The review of foreign policy by Soviet leader, Leonid Brezhnev, and a series of statements by senior American officials have set the stage for the next phase in Middle East diplomacy.

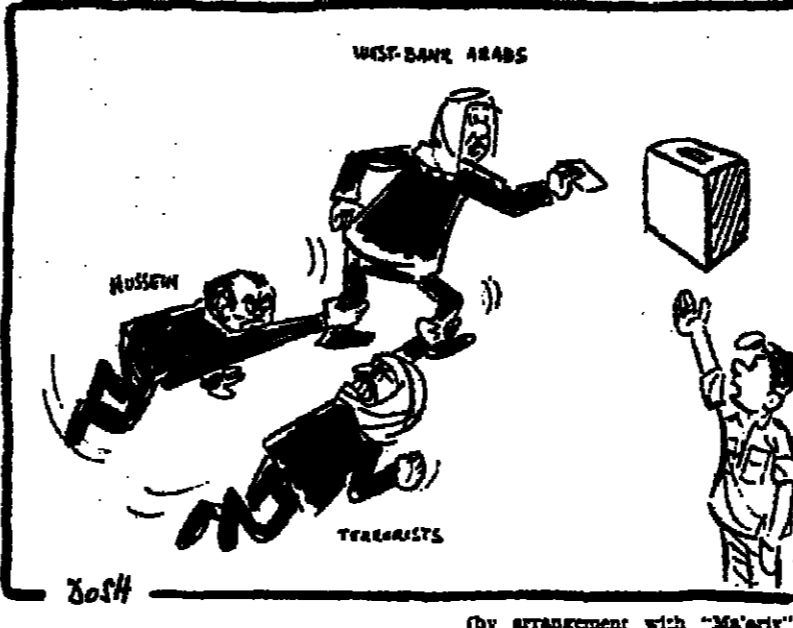

Mr. Rogers said that President Nixon decided to take the trip to Moscow to try to make it clear to the Soviet Union that we have no intention of creating any hostilities with the Soviet Union. Mr. Rogers said when asked how the new U.S. policy towards China affected Soviet-U.S. relations.

FATAL SHOOTING AFTER QUARREL

The Supreme Court dismissed two appeals against a judgment of the Tel Aviv District Court, delivered on July 15, 1971 (in Cr.C. 282/71).

The appellant, 18-year-old Mordchehal Horowitz, was left in charge of his father's snooker club in Tel Aviv. One evening a quarrel broke out between him and one of the club's patrons, known as Sabi. In the midst of the quarrel, Horowitz ran out into the courtyard of the club, where he had a revolver concealed in case of necessity to protect the club. He took the revolver out of its hiding place, intending to frighten Sabi with it, but changed his mind and went to meet a friend instead, concealing the revolver in his shirt. On his way back, and before he had had a chance to replace the revolver, he met Sabi fortuitously. The latter started taunting him, whereupon he challenged him to a fight, despite the fact that he knew that Sabi was older and stronger than he. Sabi chose a neighbouring courtyard as a suitable place for the fight and when he suddenly picked up a broken bottle and threatened Horowitz with it, the latter drew his revolver. In the ensuing scuffle he fired the revolver and fatally injured Sabi.

In the Tel Aviv District Court, Horowitz's counsel argued that his client had fired the gun inadvertently or, alternatively, that he had fired it in self-defence. The District Court held that Horowitz had intended firing the weapon but had not intended killing Sabi, found him guilty of manslaughter under section 212 of the Criminal Code Ordinance, and sentenced him to five years' imprisonment. Horowitz appealed against the conviction and sentence, and the State appealed against the manslaughter conviction maintaining that Horowitz should have been found guilty of premeditated murder.

Mr. A. Marinaky appeared for Horowitz and Miss D. Benish, Assistant State Attorney, for the respondent.

Judgment
Justice Landau, who delivered the judgment of the Supreme Court, held at the outset that there was no cause for overruling the District Court's finding that the appellant had not inadvertently squeezed the trigger of the revolver. Turning next to the question of self-defence, he noted that if the whole incident had started after the two adversaries had entered the courtyard, then he would have been inclined to concede that the appellant had proved that he had acted in self-defence, as he had had reasonable cause for fearing that Sabi would cause him grievous bodily harm and was entitled to defend himself against this danger even by means of firing a warning shot. Person claiming "necessity" must be innocent of provocation

da, the events in the courtyard could not be separated from what had occurred immediately prior thereto, and in particular from the appellant's challenge to Sabi to fight him, when he knew he had a loaded revolver hidden on his person. He was of the opinion, he held, that these factors should be taken into account despite the fact that section 18 of the Criminal Code, which defines "necessity," does not make provision for taking events prior to the act of self-defence into consideration, and, in contradistinction to section 17, does not make an exception of the case where the accused, of his own accord, places himself in the situation by which he became subject to the necessity to defend himself.

In explaining this opinion, Justice Landau held that it would be contrary to the legislative purpose of section 18 to allow a person to justify killing another in self-defence unless he were completely innocent of provoking the attack against himself, backing up this conclusion with references to English and American jurisprudence. Furthermore, he added, section 18 provides that a person shall do no more than is reasonably necessary to defend himself against danger which already exists; and all the more so, therefore, may it be deduced that a person should prevent the creation of foreseeable danger and refrain from bringing himself, by his own initiative, into a dangerous situation, if he wishes to benefit from the defence of "necessity."

In short, held Justice Landau, where a person by his own wrongful act produces a situation where-fore it becomes necessary for his own safety that he take life or do serious bodily injury, he will not be permitted to avail himself of a necessity which he wilfully brought about himself (see American Jurisprudence 2d, vol. 40, par. 145).

In applying the above rule to the present case, Justice Landau concluded that as the appellant had challenged the deceased to a fight cause him grievous bodily harm and was secretly armed with a loaded revolver, he could not afterwards claim self-defence when his opponent picked up a dangerous object

and started attacking him with it. For the rules of the fight had not been fixed in advance, and nor could it be said that the appellant himself had expected the fight to be conducted according to the best Queensberry rules. In other words, as the appellant had entered the encounter as willingly as his adversary, and as his adversary had not infringed any of the predefined rules of the fight, the appellant was not entitled to benefit from the plea of "necessity."

In conclusion, Justice Landau also dismissed the State's appeal, holding that the District Court's finding that, although the appellant had intentionally squeezed the trigger, he had not intended killing Sabi, was well-founded and that there was no cause, therefore, to change the conviction to one of premeditated murder.

Both appeals dismissed. Judgment given on March 14, 1972.

Alfa Romeo Romeo

HAIFA. — A local family man who posed as a rich divorced contractor in order to extract sizable loans from a young girl he had promised to marry was given a three-year sentence in the District Court here on Tuesday.

Michael Kirshen, of Mahane Davida, who has a wife and two children, said that to impress a 23-year-old Safed girl whom he met last October, he had driven around in an Alfa Romeo and promised her a future life of wedded luxury in Haifa. The girl, after giving her hard-pressed father loans totaling IL11,600 — against his postdated cheques — to help him meet his "payroll," finally became suspicious and went to the police, where she learned his true family status. Kirshen pleaded guilty to four other charges of passing bad cheques, involving thousands of pounds. (Hem).

Attacks on Israelis abroad now punishable here

IN THE KNESSET

JERUSALEM POST KNESSET REPORTER
ATTACKS on Israelis or Israeli property abroad will now be punishable in an Israeli Court under legislation passed by the Knesset on Tuesday. The Bill was tabled in the wake of continuing attacks on Israeli property and persons by terrorists in Europe. El Al planes and offices suffered in the attacks as well as Israeli embassies.

The Bill — the second and third readings were passed on Tuesday — was the joint effort of Mr. Shmuel Tamir (Free Centre) and the Ministry of Justice.

Building contractors
The Knesset also passed into law a bill obliging all building contractors who carry out a considerable volume of work to register in a central Contractors' Registry.

Chief Rabbinate
The Chairman of the Knesset Interior Committee, Mr. Mordchehal Surkiss, appealed to the Minister for Religious Affairs, Dr. Zerach Warhaftig, on Tuesday, to start as soon as possible with his preparations for the election of the Chief Rabbinate Council in order to prevent any further extension of the term of office of the incumbent Council. The term expires on August 31.

Mr. Surkiss' appeal came after the Committee had approved the text of the regulations to be gazetted governing the procedure for the elections.

Tricky coupon for the forecasters

TEL AVIV. — League "A" Northern Division leaders Petah Tikva Maccabi return home this Saturday following their surprise 1:0 defeat in Kiryat Simona last week.

Visitors at Petah Tikva will be Tiberias Hapoel, who went down by the same score last week to Nebariya Hapoel. It would come as even a greater shock if Petah Tikva Maccabi were not to win this game, and assure their place in National League football next season.

Second-placed Ramat Gan Hapoel also return home after last week's defeat in Netanya, but do not appear on the Toto coupon. The greatly-improved Acre Hapoel travel to Nazareth, currently near the foot of the table. Only Petah Tikva Maccabi have scored more goals than Acre Hapoel, although the Nazareth defence is one of the best in the division. Another win for the Acre team looks on the cards.

One of the trickiest games on the Toto coupon is the Herzliya derby between Hapoel and Maccabi. These clubs have virtually the same goal average, with Maccabi in 8th place with one point more than Hapoel, who are in 9th spot. Any result could emerge from this encounter.

Two winners last week, Nebariya Hapoel and Mahane Yehuda Hapoel, meet in the Galilee resort. Here too there is virtually nothing in it on the goal ledger, although Mahane Yehuda are in 4th place and Nebariya only 9th. Home-ground advantage should tell, and Nebariya Hapoel are given the vote.

Another difficult game to forecast is the meeting between Netanya Hapoel and Kiryat Simona Hapoel in Netanya. Kiryat Simona were the side to inflict the first defeat on Petah Tikva Maccabi and are eight positions higher in the league. Here too no result would come as a surprise, but the fact that Netanya are playing at home should not be overlooked.

The new leaders of the Southern Division, Marmorek Hapoel, do not appear on this week's football pool. They play at home against Kiryat Ono Hapoel, who are at the bottom of the table. Close-challengers Sha'arayim Maccabi travel to Elit and third-placed Hilon Hapoel have a stiff away game in Rishon LeZion. Elit lost at home last week to Beer Ya'acov and with an ambitious side like Sha'arayim as visitors will have an uphill struggle to save even one point.

After a fine start to the season, **ELECTRONIC GOODS**, including TV sets, transistor radios and tape recorders, valued at more than IL10,000, were stolen from the store of David Sylwio in Afeka on Sunday night.



Rishon LeZion Hapoel have not managed to keep up with the leaders. Hilon Hapoel, on the other hand, now have a great chance to regain promotion to the National League, being only a point off to place. On current form Hilon could collect both points.

Ashkelon Hapoel last week lifted themselves off the bottom rung and may well collect another two points from the home game against Be'er Sheva Hapoel. Another bottom of the table struggle will be between Ramle Beitar and Ashdod Hapoel in 13th and 14th places. Ashdod Hapoel did extremely well to hold Sha'arayim to a draw last week and if such form were reproduced they would be good for two points at Ramle. It would however be extremely foolhardy to bank on a repeat performance from the unrepeatable Ashdod Team.
