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Soviet liberals call for political amnesty

MOSCOW (Reuters). — More than 50 leading Soviet civil rights advocates and liberals, in two separate appeals, have called on the Soviet leadership to amnesty political prisoners and abolish the death penalty.

The two appeals were addressed to the Supreme Soviet — the highest constitutional body here. They were submitted on September 13 but only became available to Western newsmen in Moscow yesterday.

Signatories include such prominent campaigners for more liberal conditions in the Soviet Union as physicist Andrei Sakharov and historian Roy Medvedev, as well as such leaders in Soviet art and culture as world famous cellist Mstislav Rostropovich.

The second appeal called for abolition of the death penalty because it conflicts with moral feelings and is no longer justified by general social considerations.

The amnesty appeal called for the release of "all those condemned for reasons directly or indirectly connected with their convictions," referring specifically to the articles of the criminal code covering anti-Soviet activities and defamation of the Soviet state.

Observers said this covered men and women arrested for their political and religious beliefs and activities.

No one knows how many political prisoners exist in the Soviet Union but some estimates range up into thousands. So far as the Soviet state is concerned they are simple law-breakers.

The list also included two Jewish scientists barred from emigration to Israel, Veniamin Levich, an electrochemist who many years ago worked on state projects, and Aleksandr Lerner, a specialist in automatic controls.

Kissinger 'will quit, but when?'

HOUSTON, Texas (UPI). — Presidential adviser Henry Kissinger will resign his position as national security adviser to accept the presidency of the Rockefeller Foundation, Kissinger's biographer said on Friday.

"The question is when," said Charles Ashman, 37, a former professor of constitutional law at the University of the Pacific. He has known Kissinger since 1956 and visited with him several days ago.

Mr. Ashman said the answer as to when Dr. Kissinger will leave depends on the details of negotiations for peace in Southeast Asia and who becomes the next Secretary of State.

He said Dr. Kissinger had confided in friends that William Rogers, the present Secretary of State, is definitely out.

Dr. Kissinger believes the choice for a successor has been narrowed to Gov. Nelson Rockefeller of New York and former Gov. John Connally of Texas, Mr. Ashman said.

Soviet wants U.N. unit to draft terrorism pact

UNITED NATIONS (UPI). — The Soviet Union announced Friday it would support moves to ask an independent U.N. commission to draft into treaty form a comprehensive U.S. proposal for curbing international terrorism.

D.N. Kolesnik of the Soviet Foreign Ministry told the General Assembly's legal committee the term "terrorism" needed to be defined, but he said the world could not wait until this is done to take action against global violence.

There was growing sentiment in the 132-nation legal committee to refer the issue to the U.N. International Law Commission, a group of 25 experts on international law who serve as individuals rather than as governmental representatives. The commission would be asked to prepare a treaty for action by next year's assembly.

A spokesman said the U.S. did not intend to drop its proposal to convene a conference early next year to work out a treaty, "but we know there is a lot of opposition to it."

Kolesnik went to lengths to make clear that a more exact definition of terrorism is necessary because the "imperialist and colonialist" regimes had been using it for years against what he called legitimate national liberation movements.

The Soviet diplomat accused both Israeli Foreign Minister Abba Eban and his ambassador, Yosef Telohah, of seeking to convert the U.N. debate on terrorism into a political weapon.

Declaring the Soviet Union's main resolve in its support of the Palestine Arabs, he accused Israel of continuing to commit terrorist acts by bombing civilian targets in Arab countries.

"Israeli Zionist hands do not restrict their sphere of activity to the Middle East, either," Kolesnik said. He referred to the mailing of letters and parcel-bombs and the sniper shooting into the Soviet delegation headquarters in New York earlier this year. The sniping, he said, went unpunished, "although it happened in a country which is so ardently speaking against terrorism."

Arabs lift boycott on 10,000 firms

CAIRO (Reuters). — An Arab boycott has been lifted from 10,000 foreign companies because they have stopped cooperating with Israel, an Arab League spokesman said yesterday.

The blacklist of firms dealing with Israel was established in 1963 and a total of 13,000 names was placed on it by the Arab Office for the Economic Boycott of Israel.

The spokesman would not name any of the companies now removed from the blacklist but said some major American and Japanese firms were among them.

The question of the remaining 2,000 companies still on the list is now under discussion by the Arab boycott office currently meeting at the Arab League headquarters here.

Mohamed Mahjoub, commissioner-general for the Arab boycott, told the conference that some of the American and Japanese companies taken off the list had ended their dealings with Israel and had invested some \$500m. in Arab industrial projects.

Mahjoub's report said the Arab economic boycott had inflicted heavy losses on Israel, compelling her to set up a special anti-boycott body at an annual cost of \$30m.

Heath says Britain on right track in Ulster

BELFAST. — Prime Minister Edward Heath's two-day fact-finding tour of Northern Ireland has convinced him Britain is on the right track toward a political settlement here, sources close to his thinking said yesterday.

Despite a spate of bombing and shooting incidents while Mr. Heath was here, and the brutal beating of a local politician's wife, the sources said the British leader believes a good opportunity exists for bringing the violence to an end.

Mr. Heath was in Northern Ireland only once before since his election, last December 23 when he made a one-day visit to British troops. This time he toured the province extensively, meeting with politicians, churchmen, business and labour leaders, students and workers to sample a wide range of public opinion.

His conclusion, announced at a press conference on Friday before his departure, was that there has been "a great improvement in Northern Ireland" since he was last here. Part of his optimism came from the fact that he was able to make the trip in the first place.

Government sources here believe Britain is slowly winning the war against terrorism. At the height of the violence earlier this year there were some 70 bomb explosions a week in the province and 50 army casualties killed or wounded. This week there were about 20 bomb blasts and one soldier was wounded by a sniper. Other incidents of violence continue, but not at the rate they used to.

The wife of a Roman Catholic politician recounted yesterday how two men burst into her home, beat her senseless and carved the initials "UVF," the extremist Protestant organization (Ulster Volunteer Force) on her breast.

Yemens agree to withdraw from border

ADEN (Reuters). — The (North) Yemen Arab Republic and the People's Democratic Republic of (South) Yemen have agreed to pull out their forces from the border areas and reopen their common frontiers within one week, it was reported here Friday.

The agreement was reached between representatives of the two neighbouring countries at a meeting in the Dhala border area, which was the scene of nearly three weeks of heavy fighting last September.

The representatives — Abdullah al-Khameri, Minister of Information and personal representative of the South Yemen head of state, and Major Abdullah-Rae, military representative of North Yemen's republican council — also discussed issues related to arrangements for starting the withdrawal process from areas occupied in the wake of the September fighting.

Small change short in Italy

ROME (Reuters). — Italy's Treasury Minister, Giovanni Malagodi, reassured Parliament yesterday that he has taken action to remedy a minor economic crisis — a nationwide shortage of small change. He has ordered new machines abroad to produce them.

The steady disappearance of the 10-lire piece is causing increasing concern in high places. For although the featherweight aluminium coin has an actual value of virtually nothing, it is causing inconvenience to people who live in blocks of flats with lifts operated with them.

No one is quite sure where the coins have gone, but one theory is that housewives are using them as backing for buttons — they are cheaper than the real thing.

Amin and Faisal 'to strengthen Islamic faith'

KAMPALA (Reuters). — President Idi Amin of Uganda and King Faisal of Saudi Arabia on Friday pledged to strengthen the Islamic faith as a positive contribution to international brotherhood among peoples of various races throughout the world.

In a joint communique, released here at the end of King Faisal's three-day state visit, they expressed their support for the Arab cause and their faith in "the inevitable success of the Palestinian people in their struggle against Zionist designs."

The two leaders also agreed that Arab and Moslem unity was a vital factor against Zionist evils in the Middle East and the world at large.

Brazil extradites three French drug smugglers to New York

NEW YORK (AP). — Three Frenchmen were whisked out of Brazil amid diplomatic rumbblings on Friday to answer charges of smuggling more than 500 kilos of heroin into this country — enough to supply the entire addict population in the U.S. for three weeks.

The French government had sought custody of the men and their surreptitious delivery into U.S. hands by Brazil created a diplomatic situation described by informed sources as "delicate."

The method of their delivery, the \$217m. scope of the smuggling operation, the fact that one of the three is a condemned murderer — all combined in a drama exceeding in impact the dope-smuggling movie thriller, The French Connection. One of the defendants, in fact, was said to have been depicted in that film.

Despite the multimillion dollar nature of the charges against them, the trio claimed to have arrived here penniless, relieved of even pocket money by Brazilian police.

Two of the defendants were held in Brooklyn federal court on bail of \$2.5m. each.

One, Christian David, 41, nicknamed "le beau Serge," has been sought for more than six years in several countries for murder, drug trafficking and subversive activity.

SUICIDE BID

Following a bail hearing before Judge Jacob Mishler, David was committed to a hospital because of a report from Brazil that he had swallowed metal and broken glass in a suicide attempt.

David, captured last month in a Brazilian hotel, escaped from French custody in 1966 after shooting dead France's anti-narcotics chief. A Brazilian dossier credited him with killing at least four other policemen in various countries. He is also sought by Morocco in connection with alleged participation in the 1965 kidnapping of left-wing leader Michel Ben Barba, believed to have been murdered after he was seized on a Paris street.

Held with David in a second Brooklyn indictment was Michel Nicoll, 42, described by Brazilians

as a model for one of the characters of The French Connection. Nicoll jumped \$50,000 in bail on narcotics charge in Brooklyn Federal Court in 1968, and fled the country.

David and Nicoll were seized in Brazil after they were named in two sealed indictments in Brooklyn Federal Court early last month. Also indicted with them were others, including four American James Christian, 41, Paul Navarr 39, Domingo Padron, 61, all New York, and Marcello Delgado 46, of Fort Lee, N.J. Of the four all were already in custody except Padron.

The various counts of conspiracy and smuggling in the Brooklyn indictments add up to a maximum of at least 100 years in prison upon conviction.

The third man flown here from Brazil was Claude Pastoua. A convicted Parisian robber, he fled Brazil in 1967 after jumping bail on a narcotics charge in Spain. He said he could not put up the \$250,000 bail demanded.

It was not clear whether the three rings listed in the indictments had operated together. The two in Brooklyn were described among five major rings which have flooded the U.S. with heroin, processed in Marseille from opium shipped in from Turkey. (AP, Reuters)

Ex-Senator guilty of taking bribe

WASHINGTON (Reuters). — Former U.S. Senator Daniel Brewster was found guilty Friday of accepting bribes to vote in Congress against raising postal rates.

The former Democratic Senator from Maryland was found guilty of accepting \$14,500 from Spiegel Incorporated, a Chicago mail order firm.

Brewster, 48, who was defeated for re-election in 1968, faces a maximum sentence of six years imprisonment and a \$30,000 fine. His lawyers said he would appeal.

An all-women all-black jury also convicted Mr. Brewster's co-defendant, Cyrus Anderson — former lobbyist for the mail order firm — of bribery. He faces a maximum prison term of 45 years and \$60,000 fine.

Unesco censures Israel excavations in old Jerusalem

PARIS (AP). — The general conference of the United Nations Educational, Scientific and Cultural Organization yesterday approved a resolution censuring Israeli archaeological excavations in Jerusalem.

The vote was 54-3 with 20 abstentions. The U.S. voted against the resolution, which was proposed Monday by 27 countries, mostly Arab, Moslem and African.

The draft of the resolution originally included a condemnation of Israeli policies but France suggested a revision and political references were removed.

The resolution calls on Israel "to take necessary measures for the scrupulous preservation of all sites, buildings and other cultural properties, especially in the Old City of Jerusalem, and to desist from any alteration to the features of the city, as well as from any archaeological excavation."

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On Wednesday afternoon the new Center of Conservative Judaism will be dedicated in Jerusalem. A special celebration will be held the same evening, marking Israel 25th anniversary. Details in tomorrow's paper.

Tel Aviv Maccabi win State Tennis Cup

By JACK LEON Jerusalem Post Sports Reporter TEL AVIV. — Tel Aviv Maccabi's veteran tennis players Elazar Davidman and Gabriel Dubitzky, doubles partners for more than 20 years, on Friday evening took their club to an exciting 2-1 victory over titleholders Tel Aviv Hapoel in the final of the seventh annual State Tennis Cup at the Maccabi Courts here.

In the vital doubles, Davidman — largely kept out of competitive tennis for the past three years because of recurring ill-health — and Dubitzky recalled their days of glory as they served and volleyed their way to a 6-1 first-set win, with Shalem, 28, and young Spieker hardly in the game. The home crowd were already getting ready to cheer a Maccabi victory as the veteran pair went to 2-1 in the second. Yesterday, Petah Tikva Maccabi and Jaffa Maccabi drew 3-3 in Petah Tikva, while Hakoah beat last season's champions, Tel Aviv Maccabi, 2-0 in Tel Aviv, and Tel Aviv Hapoel trounced Kfar Saba Hapoel 3-0. The next nine clubs, from 5th to 13th place, are divided by one point only.

Five thousand fans saw Jerusalem Betar provide extremely disappointing fare against a weak Netanya Maccabi eleven that was clearly out only to force a draw and collect a useful away point. At the start of the game it was all Betar and appeared to be only a question of how many goals Betar could get, but the Jerusalem effort failed off poorly. In League "A" South, Holon Hapoel scored a useful 2-1 home win over Sha'arayim Maccabi, while Enel Yehuda were held to a 1-1 draw in Eilat.

Arsenal moved into second place with John Radford scoring the only goal of their home match against Everton, while Leeds United slipped down to third, one point behind Arsenal, after being held to a 2-2 draw by struggling Crystal Palace. Palace, who beat Everton two weeks ago, looked like upsetting the form book again after sharpshooting John Craven gave them a 2-0 half-time lead. But Leeds fought back after the interval to equalize through Mick Jones and Johnny Giles. Norman Hunter, the Leeds and England defender, was booked for the fifth time of the season.

Pakistan was expected to wilt against one of the finest pace attacks in world cricket led by Lillee and Bob Massie. But the tourists indulged in a run orgy. Abbas was well supported by Mushtaq Mohammad who scored 59 in 159 minutes. Pakistan's 300 came up in 305 minutes. Lillee took this first wicket with the last ball of the day — Intikhab was caught in the slips off his bowling for 13.

No way to avoid army physical The Supreme Court sitting as Court of Criminal Appeals Before Justices Berinson, Kister and Etzion. Roja Daral, Appellant, v. State of Israel, Respondent (Cr. A. 402/72) NO EXEMPTION FROM MEDICAL EXAMINATIONS FOR CONSCIENTIOUS OBJECTORS

The appellant was called up for medical examinations as a preliminary step to his being inducted into the Army. When he failed to present himself for the examinations, he was tried for failing to respond to a call-up order with the intention of evading defence service, was found guilty and sentenced to six months' imprisonment. The appellant appealed against his conviction to the Supreme Court. He appeared on his own behalf and Mr. M. Kister, Senior Assistant State Attorney, appeared for the State.

Judgment Justice Berinson, who delivered the judgment of the Supreme Court, noted that the appellant had refused to do defence service for reasons of conscience and desired to see a peace service instituted in place of the Army. In this desire for peace in Israel and the world, continued Justice Berinson, the appellant does not stand alone. For every single Israeli ardently wishes that peace will come to relieve the State of the burden of war which has beset it since its establishment. However, while the appellant continues to cherish his illusive faith in world peace, his country faces a completely different reality.

The laws of all countries, Justice Berinson pointed out, have since time immemorial recognized the right to self-defence, and even the ancient precepts of Israel, despite their supreme moral content, enjoin us to forestall the killer by killing him first. In fact, he continued, the appellant himself had not denied that every man has a right to defend himself against those who seek his life, and he had confirmed that he participates in armed guard duty at his kibbutz and would possibly use his weapon to defend himself and his fellow-members. Nevertheless, he refused to cooperate in anything connected with his mobilization into the Army, because, in his words, its aim is to kill and he does not wish to kill

anyone. In other words, the appellant claims that he is entitled to be exempted from military service on the grounds that he is a conscientious objector. However, held Justice Berinson, the Defence Service Law does not grant recognition to male conscientious objectors, although section 28 of the Law does allow the Minister of Defence to exempt persons of military age from regular service for special reasons. But it would appear that the Minister will not exercise this right until the person of military age has first presented himself for the preliminary medical examinations. The appellant's adamant refusal to present himself for the medical examinations, Justice Berinson held,

is, therefore, not only an offence but also frustrates in advance any possibility of his getting a lawful exemption from military service. He fully agreed with the District Court, he continued, that in the present state of the country, the appellant's offence is a very serious one, and that it would not be fair to those who are fulfilling their duty in the Army to give him anything but a prison sentence. As, therefore, the appellant was unwilling to help himself, his indefensible conduct amounted almost to defiance, the Supreme Court could also not help him, and there was no alternative but to dismiss his appeal and confirm his conviction and sentence. Judgment given on October 31, 1972.

Second 'diploma tax' for would-be emigrant By DAVID LENNON Jerusalem Post Correspondent LONDON. - Lev Lerner of Leningrad recently was informed by the Soviet authorities that he could emigrate to Israel, together with his wife and mother. This made him very happy, even though his departure was conditional upon his finding 18,100 rubles to pay for the "diploma tax," renunciation of citizenship and the exit visas. After considerable difficulty Lerner managed to scrape together the required sum. Most of it had to be borrowed from friends. So, on Wednesday of last week he went to Ovir, the department which issues visas. But, according to sources here, the Ovir clerk informed him that the 18,100 rubles wasn't sufficient. Mr. Lerner was told that in the meantime a check had been made, and it was discovered that some 40 years ago his mother had studied at a collective farm college in Kaminski Padolsk in the Ukraine. This meant that she would have to pay the state 1,100 rubles "reimbursement" for the cost of her studies. Flabbergasted, Lerner asked his mother about this. She told him that it was true that she had applied to study at the college, but that she never in fact did study there. Lerner explained this to the Ovir official. After some discussion, the official said that if his mother could bring a letter from the college to prove that she had never studied there, she would not have to pay the "tax". That may have sounded eminently reasonable in an otherwise totally unreasonable situation. Unfortunately, there was a catch. The collective farm college in Kaminski Padolsk

was destroyed during the German invasion of Russia in the Second World War. Lev Lerner is now protesting the affair to the Ministries of Interior and Finance. However, he doesn't see much hope that he will get any satisfaction. A further complication is the fact that his exit permit is valid only until November 24. He has asked for this to be extended, while he tries to either have the tax cancelled or somehow to raise the additional money.

P.E.N. to investigate imprisoned writers BERLIN (AP). - The International P.E.N. Club has founded a standing commission to actively consider the individual plight of persecuted writers, it was announced on Friday. The poets, essayists and novelists executive committee ended a week of closed meetings and discussion in West Berlin, the first P.E.N. gathering in Berlin since 1928. The commission is to gather literature and other data on imprisoned writers. "We hope they will be able to come up with some resolutions and suggestions on what to do," said Heinrich Boell, the West German Nobel laureate and president of the Club. David Carver of Great Britain in response to a question, said P.E.N. executive sessions were closed but that full congress meetings in Israel next December would be open. He said the Israel meeting would open with an executive committee meeting in Jerusalem, travel around the country for seminars and what up in Tel Aviv. A statement said the committee voted overwhelmingly to accept Israel's invitation despite fears Arab terrorists might try to interfere.

Mourning whale drowns sorrow VICTORIA, British Columbia (Reuter). - Haida the killer whale is trying to drown his sorrows over the death of his mate in regular 26-litre doses of potent egg nog. Officials at the local aquarium discovered Haida, who has refused to eat since his albino mate called Chimo died from an infection on November 2, appeared to revive a little after gulping down his favourite lippie. Main ingredients of the mighty punch to shake the whale from his lethargy are three litres of cream, 60 eggs and 36 bottles of extra strong beer. The aquarium has also called in a jazz flautist to serenade Haida while he sucks his tonic cocktail through a tube. An aquarium spokesman said: "We're pulling everything out of the hat. Haida has responded before to recorded music, including everything from Bach to rock 'n' roll."

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EGYPTIAN COPTS ON EDGE AFTER NEW CHURCH FIRE

The outlawed Moslem Brotherhood, which is thought to be involved in recent attacks on Christians in Egypt, feels a strong affinity to Libyan leader Mu'ammur Gaddafi, writes the AP's ALEX EFTY.

BEIRUT (AP) — The burning of a Coptic church in Cairo last week is a rekindling of a campaign by the banned extreme right-wing Moslem Brotherhood, observers here believe.

The objectives of the fanatic Brotherhood are both to curb Christian influence and to undermine the authority of President Anwar Sadat and the Arab Socialist Union—Egypt's only political party — the observers add.

The previous spate of church burning last summer prompted a strong protest memorandum from the Coptic Church leadership to President Sadat.

The memorandum, dated July 18, demanded firm action to end alleged government-tolerated discrimination against the 6.5 million Coptic community and attacks on their faith by official Moslem bodies.

In a series of speeches last summer, Sadat acknowledged the existence of sectarian strife. He blamed U.S. imperialism, however, claiming that anti-Christian and anti-Moslem tracts emanating from the U.S. had been mailed to members of the respective communities in Egypt, to sow discord and weaken national unity.

Never published

The Coptic protest memorandum, which warned that the Copts would "choose martyrdom rather than lead a humiliating existence in our own country," was never published in the Egyptian press. It was,

however, followed by a meeting of the Coptic Pope Shenouda III with Moslem religious leaders and separate appeals stressing the imperative need for national unity.

President Sadat also rushed through Parliament a tough new law making any activity or statement endangering national unity an offense punishable with life imprisonment. The Copts toned down their protest after this, feeling that the new law was a double-edged weapon which could be applied to them as well as their detractors.

The new outbreak of attacks on the Coptic community and its churches developed

simultaneously with a fresh anti-Soviet campaign, especially on the campus of Cairo University. This in turn followed the resumption of a dialogue between Cairo and Moscow, to bridge the rift created by the expulsion of the Soviet military advisers from Egypt last July.

Probe ordered

In an effort to safeguard national unity, President Sadat appointed a special Parliamentary commission to investigate the latest church burning. At the same time, editorials in Cairo's newspapers denounced the church burning as an attempt to weaken national unity by the enemies of the people.

Some observers believe that the increase of anti-Soviet and anti-Coptic activity may be partly attributable to the influence of Libyan leader Mu'ammur Gaddafi, a staunch anti-Communist and a fanatic believer in Moslem righteousness.

Some Arab newspapers, including pro-Nasser ones in Beirut, spoke openly of Moslem Brotherhood influence on Gaddafi following his recent decision to introduce the Islamic law punishment of amputation for convicted thieves. Observers feel the Egyptian's latest right-wing opposition, including the Moslem Brothers, regard Gaddafi as a good man to rally around, especially in view of the projected union of Libya with Egypt by next September.

In his weekly column in "Akh al-Yom," of which he is editor, Abdulkuddous said Israel is trying to convince the world it will not fight because its international situation would not bear the strain. He said Israel also wanted to convince the world efforts to bring a peaceful solution are useless because the Egyptian regime is stable enough to implement it.
