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Goren gets praise and protection

Assault by yeshiva students

TEL AVIV. — The Prime Minister and leaders of most parties yesterday warmly welcomed Chief Rabbi Shlomo Goren's secret operation of Sunday which removed the mazzehr altar from the Langer altar and brother. The decision of the nine religious court judges led to the double wedding Sunday evening of Hanoch and Miriam Langer.

Four Yeshiva students tried to attack Chief Rabbi Goren in Nes Ziona yesterday, and other religious extremists threatened trouble. A police cordon was thrown around the apartment building on Sderot David Hamelech here where the Chief Rabbi lives, and one source said Rabbi Goren now had "as good protection as the Prime Minister."

The yeshiva students, aged 19 to 24, tried to attack the rabbi while he was attending the funeral of Nes Ziona Rabbi Yisrael Elzevli Be'er. Rabbi Goren's driver was scratched in the melee which ensued when the youths pushed through the crowd shouting insults in Yiddish. The four were arrested.

Justice Minister Ya'acov Shimshon Shapiro expressed the hope that this deed was the start of a turning point in the path of the Chief Rabbinate. "We can only hope that all the expectations from Chief Rabbi Goren and the new Rabbinate will not prove unfounded," he added.

The main interest in the case hinged on its far-reaching political ramifications. It is now hoped the immediate cause for a Cabinet crisis has been removed.

The Independent Liberal Knesset faction discussed the matter and resolved to let the party convention meeting next week decide whether or not to table the civil marriage bill of I.L.P. Knesset whip Gideon Hauser. Mr. Hauser said Rabbi Goren's step had "made life easier for all of us by removing this nightmare from our midst."

He praised Rabbi Goren for "solving this problem by an unorthodox manner."

However, he warned, it could not be expected that the whole line of similar cases could be settled in like manner. This he believed the party conference should decide and his motion was unanimously adopted.

The conference will have to decide whether or not to accept Rabbi Goren's plea to give him at least a year to find solutions for all those refused the right to wed by rabbinical courts.

Similar expressions of gratification came from Mapam, which might have felt obliged to follow the I.L.P. out of the coalition and thereby break up the Alignment if the I.L.P. had tabled its bill. It also has a national convention due to meet in mid-December which will consider this problem.

N.R.F. leader Yitzhak Raphael last night welcomed the authorized solution produced by Rabbi Goren and endorsed by eight other agudim. Speaking on the Moked TV panel discussion, Dr. Raphael said no hasty conclusions should be drawn that Rabbi Goren had created a new way for handling those cases of

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The next possible move on the legal front might be an appeal by Abraham Borokovsky, Mrs. Langer's first husband, whose Jewishness was invalidated by the Goren ruling, to the Supreme Rabbinical Court. His lawyers were reported to be considering the move, but they will need, of course, to see the judgment of Rabbi Goren's court before making their decision.

If Rabbi Goren persists in refusing to make public the judgment they could turn to the Supreme (Civil) Court for redress.

But whatever Mr. Borokovsky does, the Langer brother and sister will remain legally married, since under Halacha their marriage is binding. The only problems which could arise would be in regard to their children.

HEVRA KADISHA MUST JUSTIFY DESTRUCTION OF TOMBSTONE

The Supreme Court dismissed an appeal against a judgment of the Jerusalem District Court delivered on March 17, 1971 (in Cr. A. 416/69).

The appellants are the heads of the Kurdish Community in Jerusalem, which owns, for burial purposes, a long-term lease over a certain section of Har Hamenuhot. In 1968 a member of the Kurdish Community, Simha Sasson, sought to have his mother buried in that section of the cemetery and was allotted a plot by the first appellant. A few weeks after the burial, Mr. Sasson, wishing to erect a tombstone over the grave, applied to the first appellant for permission. The sum of IL1,000 demanded by the first appellant in return for this permission was regarded as exorbitant by Mr. Sasson, who complained to the Chairman of the Council for Jewish Cemeteries in Jerusalem. Upon being informed by the latter that he could erect the tombstone without permission from the *Hevra Kadisha*, Mr. Sasson arranged for an artisan to build three rows of bricks covered by a marble slab, on which he intended having his mother's name and other particulars engraved. Before he could do so, however, the appellants ordered the workmen to remove the marble slab and destroy the construction — which they did.

Mr. Sasson complained to the police and the appellants were eventually charged in the Jerusalem Magistrate's Court with trespassing on a burial place — an offence contrary to section 148 of the Criminal Code Ordinance, or, alternatively, with malicious damage to property, an offence contrary to section 328(1) of the Criminal Code.

After the prosecution witnesses had testified in the Magistrate's Court, the appellants' counsel submitted that there was no case for his clients to answer and this plea was allowed by the judge, who acquitted them. The State appealed against this decision to the Jerusalem District Court which quashed the acquittal judgment, holding that the facts which had been proved *prima facie* by the prosecution constituted an offence against either section 148 or section 328(1) of the Criminal Code, and that the case should be returned to the Magistrate's Court for completion of the proceedings.

The appellants appealed against this decision to the Supreme Court.

Section 148 of the Criminal Code Ordinance provides that: Every person, who with the intention of wounding the feelings of any person or of insulting the religion of any person, or with the knowledge that the feelings of any person are likely to be wounded, or that the religion of any person is likely to be insulted thereby, commits any trespass in any place of sepulture or in any place set apart for the performance of funeral rites or as a depository for the remains of the dead, or offers any indignity to any human corpse, or causes disturbance to any persons assembled for the purpose of funeral ceremonies, is guilty of a misdemeanour. Section 328(1) lays down that: "Any person who wilfully and unlawfully destroys or damages any property is guilty of an offence."

In the appeal to the Supreme Court, Mr. Shart and Mr. M. Cohen appeared for the appellants and Mr. M. Kirsh, Senior Assistant State Attorney, for the respondent.

dismantled at their own initiative — if they had in fact done so. Any such act on their part would, therefore, constitute "trespass" within the meaning of section 148.

The District Court had, therefore, held correctly, continued the President, that the appellants had a case to answer in so far as the charge under section 148 was concerned. This being so, he suggested that the charge contrary to section 328(1) be withdrawn and that the case be returned to the Magistrate's Court for final settlement of the question of whether the appellants had been responsible for the destruction of the tombstone and thus guilty of trespass in a place of sepulture with the knowledge that the feelings of the complainant and his family were likely to be wounded thereby, within the meaning of section 148.

The appeal should, therefore, be dismissed.

Justice Wilton
In concurring that the appeal should be dismissed, Justice Wilton agreed that all the elements of the offence defined in section 148 had been *prima facie* proved, but he emphasized that in reaching this conclusion he agreed fully with Judge Cohen of the District Court that the expression "trespass" in section 148 should be interpreted within the context of the transgression which this section comes to prevent and not in the strict technical sense. The purpose of protecting so sensitive a place as a cemetery and the feelings of those visiting there, against insults, desecration and indignity is, he continued, what gives colour to the act which is the subject-matter of the offence. For this reason, he held, he refrained from expressing any opinion on the question of whether the act of destroying the tombstone would be deemed to be "trespass" in other circumstances where there might be cause for sympathizing with the *Hevra Kadisha* (such as, for example, in a case where a tombstone in a Jewish cemetery contains a cross). In other words, he would not like to state categorically that in no case would the *Hevra Kadisha* have the right to exercise self-help without committing the offence of "trespass" defined in section 148.

LOCAL REPRINTS.
BACH: The Forty-Eight Preludes and Fugues of the Well-Tempered Clavier.
For Israelis, dependent for financial reasons on local reprints, there are only a few performances available. They include Wanda Landowska, harpsichord, (RCA). Only the Book I (the first 24) are on the market so far; the company has not yet decided if it can import the reprint or whether to import the second part from abroad. CBS has reprinted the first four of six records, with Glen Gould playing the work on the piano. I have been told that the other two records will become available during October.

Landowska, on her Playel harpsichord, performs with restraint and with idiosyncrasies of rhythm and registration which are part of her personality. Glen Gould gives very individual but always thought-provoking interpretations, and his playing is beautiful, moving and convincing.
A complete recording of the "48" has been reprinted here by Hatakit of Haifa with Malcolm Hamilton performing on a harpsichord of anonymous make. The six records are offered at the absolutely bargain price of IL10.95 per disc (Eves rest-VV 80906-11). An analytical study by Robert L. Tuller, of U.C.L.A., provides a great deal of information about the form and structures of the preludes and fugues.

Hamilton's performances are often organ-inspired in sound, and his approach strikes me as a bit flashy and over-stressing the virtuosic side. His is a kind of American Bach in interpretation and attitude — a far cry from Landowska's 18th-century drawing room or Gould's intellectual penetration. But it is a complete recording, and very inexpensive at IL65.70 the set.

Bach's Three Sonatas for Violoncello and Harpsichord are offered in the same series on an originally French label (VW 30837), played by Robert Bax and Aimee van der Wiele. These are the sonatas originally written for viola da gamba, BWV 1027, 1028, and 1029.
Robert Bax plays with an objective tone which allies the cello well with the harpsichord. The artists perform in interpretive unanimity and their presentation of these great works is an able one. P.B.

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Guides cleared in Bethlehem incident

The failure of visiting surgeons to show up at a reception that had been prepared for them last month by the Mayor of Bethlehem was due to lack of clear instructions and not to any dereliction on the part of the tour guides involved. The Tourism Ministry has found Mayor Teddy Kolek to investigate the incident. Mr. Kolek had charged that the tour guides and bus drivers who had been transporting the close to 200 surgeons had insisted on taking them on a shopping tour in order to obtain black backs instead of to the reception. The surgeons were attending a conference organized by the Israel Surgical Society.

The Ministry report states that the reception had been explained to the guides as an optional event not a mandatory item on the schedule. It was the surgeons themselves, the report declares, who preferred to spend their time "touring" to attending the reception.

Tourism Minister Moshe Kol, in a letter to Mr. Kolek, charged the mayor with unjustly accusing the tour guides. He also said he saw no reason for Mr. Kolek cancelling a reception the mayor had planned at the Israel Museum.

Habimah, H.U. to co-produce Marlowe play

A Hebrew University-Habimah joint production of Marlowe's "Dr. Faustus" is scheduled for next spring as a major Jerusalem theatrical event, the University's spokesman announced yesterday.
The cast, which will start rehearsing in February, will include some of Israel's leading professional actors — such as Levana Finkelstein, Rafael Klatschkin and Nissim Azik. Secondary parts will be played by Hebrew University students and faculty members. The University will also help in the production of props and sets, to be made at the Dram Department's workshops.

M.D.A. aid for Far East

Two shipments of medical supplies were sent out by Magen David Adom this week, to the Philippines and Cambodia.
The shipment to Cambodia, a victim of the hostilities there, was sent by request of the Israel Government. The shipment to the Philippines, for victims of the flood there, is the third in five months and was sent at the request of the Israel-Philippines Friendship Society and the Philippines Council-General in Israel.
The shipments consist of antibiotics and vitamin supplies.

Dolphins clinch Football League

THE Miami Dolphins battled to their 10th straight National Football League victory without a defeat and clinched the American Conference East Championship Sunday with a come-from-behind 28-24 triumph over the New York Jets.

Safety Dick Anderson paved the way to Miami's first and last touchdowns. The five-year veteran intercepted New York quarterback Joe Namath's first pass of the game at the Jets' 33-yard line, setting the stage for Earl Morrall's nine-yard scoring strike to Howard Twilley in the first quarter.

Then, in the last period, with the Jets leading 24-21, Anderson recovered a fumble by Cliff McClain at the New York 27 to set up Mercury Morris' second touchdown run of the day, a 14-yard dash down the left sideline that dropped the Jets' record to 6-4.

Morrall scored the Dolphins' other touchdown when he and his receivers covered and scrambled 31 yards into the end zone. Namath passed for touchdowns of 29 yards to Richard Caster and four yards to Wayne Stewart. John Riggins plunged in from one yard out, and Bobby Howfield booted a 33-yard field goal for the Jets.

In Sunday's other games, Cleveland edged Pittsburgh 26-24. San Francisco whipped Chicago 34-21. Minnesota outlasted Los Angeles 45-41. Detroit defeated New Orleans 27-14. Green Bay beat Houston 23-10. Buffalo overhauled New England 27-24. Oakland dumped Denver 37-20. San Diego surprised Kansas City 27-17. Baltimore nipped Cincinnati 28-19. Dallas drubbed Philadelphia 28-7 and the New York Giants tripped St. Louis 23-7.

The Steelers, who had a chance to take a giant step toward their first title of any kind in their 40-year history by opening a two-game lead in the A.F.C. Central race, ended the day tied for the lead with the Browns, who won the game on Don Cockroft's fourth field goal of the day, a 26-yarder with eight seconds to play.

Cleveland had taken a 20-3 lead into the second half, only to fall behind 24-23 and Terry Bradshaw's three-yard scoring pass to Gerry Mullins and touchdowns runs of one yard by John Fuqua and 75 yards by Franco Harris.

Steve Spurrier threw five touchdowns passes — two to Ted Kwalick and one apiece to Gene Washington, Vic Washington and Larry

And by beating the Bears while the Rams were losing to Minnesota the National Conference West race became a virtual three-way tie. Fran Tarkenton threw four touchdowns, including bombs of 76, 70 and 66 yards, as the Vikings remained tied with Detroit in the N.F.C. Central race, a game behind front-running Green Bay.

Atlanta's 35 points while Dwight Davis added 25 as the Cleveland Cavaliers defeated the Atlanta Hawks 109-98 with a combination of strong back-court play and aggressive rebounding.

INDIA IS READY FOR PEACE WITH PEKING

NEW DELHI (Oms.) — Pandit Nehru, made grave mistakes. But among those who matter there is an evident readiness to believe that the 1962 debacle was due to a mutual misunderstanding of motives and intentions, rather than to planned aggression by either side.

For instance, it is now realized as it does not seem to have been at the time, that China might well have seen in India's "forward policy" a serious threat to Chinese security vis-a-vis the Soviet Union. For by belligerently insisting that Aksai Chin — a desolate region in the north-east of Kashmir — was Indian territory, India appeared to menace the road China had built across it to maintain contact with her forces manning the Sikkim border with Russia.

At all events, at least one Indian journalist who has previously flown kites on behalf of the Cabel is now saying that India is ready for talks with China "without conditions." He says that the Indian Government has not been disheartened, but only disappointed, by Peking's "unrelenting hostility" and that, despite China's support for Pakistan against India, Mrs. Gandhi and her advisers are "determined to pursue their efforts for an early breakthrough in Sino-Indian relations."

It is at least clear that proposals such as these are no longer guaranteed — as they were only a few years ago — to excite unanimous indignation in Delhi. Many Indians are now willing to concede that, in the Himalayan frontier dispute with India which reached its disastrous climax in 1962, China had a case. There is, of course, no overt official acceptance here of such a view, implying as it does that in his handling of the Chinese Mrs. Gandhi's venerated father, the late

AMERICAN Arthur Ashe dropped the first set but regained his rhythm to beat Dutchman Tom Okker 3-6, 6-2, 6-1 in the final of the \$50,000 dollars World Championship Tennis (W.C.T.) tournament in Rotterdam Saturday. A crowd of 6,000 lifted Okker after Ashe had gone ahead 2-1 in the opening set. The Dutchman, who beat top seed John Newcombe of Australia in the semi-finals, won the next five games to take the set and look poised for victory. Once again Okker broke Ashe's serve after the American had opened a 2-1 lead in the second set. But this time Ashe kept his head, denied Okker a further breakthrough and won the match by reeling off nine of the last 10 games. Ashe picked up \$10,000 and Okker's share of the prize money was \$5,000. Mark Cox of Britain took third prize after beating Newcombe 6-3, 6-4. In London, Australia's Margaret Court exacted devastating revenge over Virginia Wade for defeat in a recent exhibition match by crushing the British girl 6-1, 6-1 Saturday to win the Dewar Cup indoor tennis final. The big Australian, who won all four previous tournaments on the indoor circuit this renewal, rarely made an unforced error and was well worth the triumph which netted her £1,000.

Concerning the real danger to ground-dwellers from falling aircraft, noise and pollution, Mr. Lederer said only 54 third parties were killed in the U.S. over the last eight years by crashes within 3 km. of an airfield.

Mr. Lederer, in Israel for a two-day international symposium on "The Airport of the Future," held in Tel Aviv last week, attributed the Israeli national airline's achievements in this field to three carefully-implemented security measures: thorough searching of passengers and all their luggage, effective isolation of both once searching is completed, and delegation of the searching procedure to experts.

The noise and pollution factors can be solved, he is certain. The engines of the Boeing 747 and the Lockheed Tristar already operate at far lower noise levels, and this can be further reduced by constructing planes capable of more rapid and steeper climb. Similarly, new engine designs have assured practically smokeless operation through improved burning of fuel.

Like the Americans, the Germans have thus voted for the continuation of an international process which involves risks, but also gives rise to new hope. It also ensures the entry into the U.N. of the two German states some time next year.

Readers' letters PUTTING HISTORY STRAIGHT

To the Editor of The Jerusalem Post: — For me, The Jerusalem Post has the character of "history of record" for Palestine and Israel. For that reason, I would appreciate your columns to comment and correct observations made in the recent book "O Jerusalem," by Collins and Lapierre. So many "histories" have been written — or are now being prepared for the 25th anniversary of the State — that it would be useful to have corrections made by those who can do so, that innocent or deliberate distortions may not go unchallenged. On page 163 of "O Jerusalem," there is an especially grave distortion, since it touches on Eliezer Kaplan, the first Finance Minister of the State of Israel, the 20th anniversary of whose death is now being marked. My relationship with Mr. Kaplan was unique. I was then Executive Vice-President of the United Jewish Appeal; and all the contacts between Jewish Palestine and America, as regards funds, were through myself. The relationship between Kaplan and myself was that of two close brothers, without the slightest reserve between us. Between 1938 and 1952, the principal inspiration I had, as director of the United Jewish Appeal, as director of the State of Israel Bonds, was Eliezer Kaplan. He encouraged me to undertake a very major project I undertook and executed. To him, as much as to me, belongs any credit for any achievements recorded in those years.

The book by Collins and Lapierre, on p. 162, deals with January of 1948. It reads: "Kaplan was just returned from a fund-raising trip to the United States with his pockets virtually empty. The American Jewish community, so long the financial bulwark of the Zionist movement, was growing weary of the incessant appeals for aid of their Palestine brothers, he reported. The time had come, Kaplan said, to face a bitter reality. In no case could they count on more than five million dollars from America in the critical months ahead." This alleged history is sheer fiction and nonsense; and any decent appreciation of Eliezer Kaplan requires that it be entirely refuted. In the fall of 1945, it was I who created the idea of a campaign for the United Jewish Appeal for \$100,000,000, over three times the results of 1945. If there were many who believed that what I proposed could be achieved, they could be counted on less than five fingers. Eliezer Kaplan was one of these. We raised \$102,000,000 in 1946. In December of 1946, I proposed that we raise much more in 1947. This was resisted by many communities which insisted that the 1946 campaign was for "once in a lifetime." The Annual Assembly of the Council held in late January in Chicago. This was resisted with the fullest energy. I invited the cooperation of a number of community leaders, including Harold Goldenberg of Minneapolis, to press the officers of the Council to change their negative attitude. The Council insisted that it would not permit itself to be turned into a "partisan" platform. But the pressure which I exerted without let-up finally brought about an invitation to Mrs. Meyerson to address a luncheon meeting of the Council, usually a blank occasion of no importance. But her talk at that luncheon was so vivid, so inflammatory, so memorable that every single person who attended that function could never forget her contribution. From then on she became one of the favourite personalities of Israel in the United States.

Mr. William Rosenwald. He spoke with equal conviction that this was something the United Jewish Appeal could not possibly do. It was against the character of the over-all organization and its parts. The U.J.A. could do nothing to violate the terms under which it functioned under American law. As he spoke, tears fell from Mr. Meyerson. This is not hearsay. I was there. Then Mr. Morgenthau took the floor. He said he understood Mr. Rosenwald's point of view but could not possibly accept it. Jews of the world had not carried their work in Palestine to the point where it would all have to be abandoned for lack of means of defence. As far as he was concerned, this was a legitimate and reasonable use of U.J.A. funds.

Who could dare challenge the patriotism, the Americanism of the man who had been Secretary of the Treasury of the United States for four terms, who was then the foremost American Jew of his time? It was Mr. Morgenthau's sweeping aside of all technical and legal arguments that gave the basis for the use of funds as Mr. Ben-Gurion had requested. American Jewry responded — in 1948, as it did in 1947 and in 1946. It is not necessary to belittle the memory of Eliezer Kaplan, who more than any other member of the Jewish Agency, influenced the raising of funds by U.S. Jewry. Since I am clarifying some points in history, I want to refer to p.66 of "O Jerusalem." It is a subject about which many others have written or spoken, but not I. In June of 1945, Mr. David Ben-Gurion came to the United States for the purposes of Hagana. He called on me, and me alone, to arrange a meeting quickly of leaders of the American Jewish community to initiate the collection of arms. I was then Executive Vice-President of the United Jewish Appeal. I telephoned some 35 men, telling each one what Mr. Ben-Gurion wanted and inviting him to a meeting in a week's time to be set by telegram. I then went to my friend, Mr. Rudolf Sonnenschein, and asked him for the use of his apartment for that purpose. This he promptly granted and thereafter served with energy and distinction as one of those who had accepted Mr. Ben-Gurion's challenge. His name was often applied to the procedures that followed. I want also to testify that Chaim Slavin, who is referred to in the book, is another of the Israelis who deserves the utmost recognition from the State. It was the first one to whom he came and it was I who introduced him to friends everywhere. He commanded only Jewish then, but the fire of his spirit, the extraordinary zeal of his message and his superb knowledge of machinery and techniques laid the basis for Israel's munitions industry.

Rabbi Goren's move

Commenting on the removal of the *memorandum* ban on the Langer brother and sister from marrying into the Jewish community, Davar (Histadrut) is appreciative of "Rabbi Shlomo Goren's daring and courage in having decided in the spirit of the school of Hillel to rectify the wrong committed in the case of the brother and sister." The paper adds: "Thereby, he also prevented a split in the nation, enhanced the position of religion in the state, and restored respect for the Rabbinate." Hatszofe (National Religious), stressing that the decision was adopted according to the Halacha, declares: "The decision of the court convened by Rabbi Goren may well turn out to be a major event in spiritual and social life in Israel." Al Hamishmar (Mapam) also voiced appreciation for Rabbi Goren for having displayed "determined decisiveness and human consideration."

Kuwait parley 'a waste'

Last week's conference of Arab defence and foreign affairs ministers in Kuwait was "a waste of time," the West Algerian daily La Republique said yesterday. "So long as the leaders of some Arab countries remain unconvinced of the need for armed struggle as the only effective means of opposing aggression and colonization of the Middle East situation will remain eternally the same," it said in an editorial. In Kuwait, "it was not political realism which prevailed, but rather a certain hesitation to face up to the clear realities, which require equal clear stands," "La Republique" added. It said any plan of action should first and foremost include aid, encouragement and facilities of all sorts to the Palestine Liberation Organization. "And if some Arab regimes continue to put brakes on the action of the *fedayeen* and to reject the Palestinian point of view — as was the case at Kuwait — there's no more point in holding such conferences to end up finally at the starting point," the paper concluded.

With Prejudice! by Alex Berlyne 'GHASTLY GOOD TASTE'

LIKE other connoisseurs of the almost complete eclipse of some of the greatest Victorian and Edwardian painters. Oddly enough, earlier narrative painters are considered kosher. Michelangelo covered the Sistine Chapel with Old Testament stories and Raphael and Titian, among a host of others, depicted Greek and Roman legends, while the Dutch and Flemish masters turned out innumerable genre paintings. I happen to be particularly fond of Victorian painting and the content only enhances my enjoyment of them. This does not preclude my appreciation of, say, a late Rembrandt self-portrait or a Cezanne landscape. I dislike stagey and cliché art in which the practitioners clearly enjoy themselves more than the audience and I can only say to Rauschenberg, as Lord Chesterfield said to Garter King of Arms — "You foolish man, you do not even know your own foolish business." Some 19th-century painters, in the fashion of their time, were addicted to a rather cloying sentimentality, but no more so than Dickens, for instance. They suffered, too, from over-exposure which has turned some of them into a joke. But careful examination of their work will often show first-rate painting. After all, clichés were originally valid truths.
