J'LEM GROUP Sadat alerts 35 nations TO AMMAN to Mid-East 'dangers' FOR PARDON

Jerusalem Post Arab Affairs Reports A delegation from East Jerusalem yesterday left for Amman to seek King Hussein's pardon for an Arab paper notable who is now being held in Amman for "political reasons."

The group could not yet determine thether the detained man, Said whethe Dajjani, is being held in connection with an alleged Libyan plot to over-throw King Hussein. Mr. Dajjani, member of a prominent East Jerusalem family, was until a month ago manager of the Jordan Bank in Amman

On Sunday The Jerusalem Post reported that a Palestinian bank manager was arrested, together with an army officer, in connection with an anti-Hussein plot.

It was learned yesterday that the arrests were made following the transfer of a sum of money by Libya to finance the alleged plot. The authorities were informed of the transfer by Mahmoud el-Khalili, head of the Jordan Bank's Jebel Hussein branch in Amman - leading to the arrest of "Colonel Ma'arouf" and Mr. Dajjani.

The delegation, which is expected to remain in Amman for several days, comprises Anwar Nusseibeh, former Jordanian Defence Minister two members of Mr. Dajjani's family, Subhi Abdullah and Dr. Hisham Dajjani, and Abdul-Mo'ati el-Kotb, a Jerusalem notable.

Finance Minister Pinhas Sage told the Knesset Finance Committee yesterday that Solel Bonch all Histadrut contracting firm word not be able to write off the deficit; it had incurred by the purchase of Vered (the Water Resources Development Corporation) as an income tax loss.

Peron to meet with party leaders on national vote

BUENOS ATRES (UPI). - Former President Juan Peron yesterday made his first major bid since returning from exile to reshape Argentina's political future. He asked the leaders of all the country's major political movements to confer with him about the ground rules for the national elections scheduled next March.

Altogether, a Peron spokesman said, 70 top politicians were asked to meet the ex-dictator last night an exclusive restaurant located about 20 blocks from Peron's resi-

Leaders of two movements were not invited — the "New Force," which defends free enterprise, and the "Popular Alliance," led by a retired admiral who once held the post of Welfare Minister under President Alejandro Lanusse.

The military government Lanusse now leads is seeking Peron's re-turn after 17 years in exile be-cause he still controls the huge Justicialists party. Peron is barred from running for

president himself, but party sources say he probably will nominate a member of his party to represent his interests.

Peron received wild acclaim from supporters after arriving from Rome, where he went from Madrid in a futile bid to see Pope Paul VI. But Lanusse, in his first com-ment on Peron's presence, sounded







HEVRA KADISHA MUST JUSTIFY DESTRUCTION OF TOMBSTONE

The Supreme Court diamissed appeal against a judgment of the Jerusalem District Court delivered on March 17, 1971 (in Cr. A. 416/

The appellants are the heads of the Kurdish Community in Jerusalem, which owns, for burial purooses, a long-term lease over a certain section of Har Hamenuhot. In 1968 a member of the Kurdish Community, Simha Sasson, sought to have his mother buried in that section of the cemetery and was allotted a plot by the first appellant. A few weeks after the burlal, Mr. Sasson, wishing to erect a tomb-

stone over the grave, applied to the first appellant for permission. The sum of IL1,000 demanded by the first appellant in return for this permission was regarded as exorbitant by Mr. Sasson, who complained to the Chairman of the Council for Jewish Cemeteries in Jerusalem. Upon being informed by the latter that he could erect the tombstone without permission from the Hevra Kadisha, Mr. Sasson arranged for an artisan to build three rows of bricks covered by a marble slab, on which he intended having his mother's name and other particulars engraved. Before he could do so, however, the appellants ordered the workmen to remove the marble slab and destroy the construction

which they did. Mr. Sasson complained to the police and the appellants were even- the tually charged in the Jerusalem Magistrate's Court with trespassing on a burial place — an offence contrary to section 148 of the Criminel Code Ordinance, or, alternative-ly, with malicious damage to property, an offence contrary to section 326(1) of the Criminal Code. After the prosecution witnesses had testified in the Magistrate's

Court, the appellants' counsel submitted that there was no case for his clients to answer and this plea was allowed by the judge, who acquitted them. The State appealed against this decision to the Jerusalem District Court which quashed constituted an offence against either section 148 or section 326(1) of the Criminal Code, and that the case should be returned to the Magistrate's Court for completion of the proceedings. This being so, he suggested that the charge contrary to section 326(1) be withdrawn and that the case be returned to the Magistrate's Court for final settlement of the question of whether the appellants had been responsible for the destruction of the tombstone and thus guilty of trespass in a place of sepulture with the knowledge that the feelings of the complainant and ed thereby, within the meaning of


The appeal should, therefore, be dismissed.

Justice Witkon

In concurring that the appeal should be dismissed, Justice Witkon agreed that all the elements of the offence defined in section 148 had been prima facis proved, but he emphasized that in reaching this , conclusion he agreed fully with Judge Cohen of the District Court that the expression "trespass" in section 148 should be interpreted within the context of the transgreasion which this section comes to prevent and not in the strict technical sense. The purpose of protecting so sensitive a place as a cem-etery and the feelings of those visiting there, against insults, des-ecration and indignity is, he continued, what gives colour to the act which is the subject-matter of the offence. For this reason, he held, he refrained from expressing any opinion on the question of whether the act of destroying the tomb-stone would be deemed to be "trespass" in other circumstances where there might be cause for sympathizing with the Houra Radisha (such as, for example, in a case where a tombstone in a Jewish cematery contains a cross). In other words, he would not like to state categorically that in no case would the Hours Radisha have the right to

exercise self-help without committing the offence of "trespass" defined in section 148.







New regulations governing instalment selling have been signed by Commerce and Industry Minister faim Bar-Lev; they go into effect January I. For each item he offers for sale,

a dealer will be required to post two prices — cash and credit. In a eparate table the dealer must also post the interest rate the customer is to pay, as well as the number of payments required and the ot of each payment.

In addition, all extras added to the basic price must be listed separately on the bill of sale. These include such items as insurance, packing and delivery charges.

The merchandise covered in the new regulations includes refrigerair conditioners, vacuum ALOIS. units, tape recorders, television receivers, stereophonic music systems, sewing machines, rooftop (solar) and electric water heaters, and knitting machines.





VICTORY FOR BRANDT

BY going to the polls in the record proportion of 90 per cent, and by rejecting all ex-tremists, of the right as of the left, the West German electorate has shown that democracy is taking roots in the Federal Republic. By giving the coalition in power a working majority it has also put the stamp of approval on the leadership of Chancellor Brandt, and supported his foreign policy.

One might therefore compare Chancellor Brandt's victory to the recent presidential landslide in favour of President Nixon. In both cases the people voted for whom they considered to be the best man for the job, and in favour of a policy of global negotiations and the relaxation international tension. One might add that in the case of Mr. Brandt they also gave their votes to the man who had won the Nobel Peace Prize, and thereby brought international prestige in a field in which Germany has been most sadly lacking.

These elections have therefore seen a remarkable change in the image of Chancellor Brandt in the eyes of his own people. From a somewhat disturbing personal-ity, by his fight in Norwegian uniform against the German Nazis, his willingness to talk to the hated Pankow regime, he has become a sort of "father figure" not only for the youth, which supports him energetically, but also for a large sector of the adult electorate, almost an Adenauer of the Left. He is less authoritarian and more democratic than the "Old Man," but also more reassuring than his Christian Democrat opponent. Rainer Barzel. This change in the image of Willy Brandt under-lines a significant change in the mentality of many German people.

But unlike President Nixon, Willy Brandt has been able to make his own personal victory a success for his party. For the first time it has become the largest party in the Bundestag, with all the advantages this assures. Taking into consideration the fact that the Catholic Church had appealed to Ger-mans to "Vote Christian" and that Germany, like the whole of Europe, has been suffering from inflation, this success is even more remarkable.

It is due, of course, to the image of "responsibility" the party has been able to create while in power, and to the fact

that the young people are voting socialist — a fact which will make it possible for the Social Democrats to remain the ma-jority party in the Federal Re-public for a long time.

But even more it is due to the support the electorate is prepared to give to the government's Ostpolitik, a policy hased on the acceptance of the facts created by the Second World War, and on an effort to bring the two Germanys closer together. By voting for Brandt, the Germans have ensured the continuation of a policy which has already reduced the miseries caused by the division of Germany into two states, and made possible the forthcoming conterence on the security of Europe and mutual reduction of forces on the continent. Like the Americans, the Germans have thus voted for the continuation of an international process which involves risks, but also gives rise to new hope. It also ensures the entry into the U.N. of the two German states

some time next year. The unexpected success of the FDP, which obtained eight per cent of the votes, is certainly due to a large extent to the personality of Walter Scheel who, as Foreign Minister, played a very important role in the formulation and application of the Ostpolitik. But it may also be due to the fact that quite a few people who favour this policy are nevertheless concerned that an over-large Socialist majority could push this party far to the left in social and economic matters.

One of the most important consequences of these elections is to give to the Brandt government a safe and stable majority. It will have no alibi if it persists in the weak attitude shown during the hijacking of a Lufthansa plane in the middle of the electoral campaign, in matters which concern not only the security of the Israelis but also the sovereignty of the Federal Republic.

Chancellor Brandt has said he would visit Israel this autumn, and now that he has been reelected there are good reasons to believe that this visit will take place early next year. We hope that by that time the firm attitude of the Federal Government in matters pertaining to Arab terrorism will enable us to receive him with all the warmth due to a dedicated fighter for freedom and a good friend of







into a silent (sic) musical starring Joan' Crawford, the 1936 version with Nelson Eddy and Jeanette MacDonald is the definitive edition, one which will remain evergreen, or rather pink, in my memory.

Though Friml was definitely a couple of jumps ahead of Sigmund Romberg or Victor Herbert, he was hardly comparable with the king of the schmaltz genre, Franz Lehar. No one else could tug at the heartstrings or wring the last drop of poignancy from the E-string with the as-surance of this master of the tear-ducts. Only the most arid sort of intellectual could remain unmoved by the "Arbour" duet, "Wie eine Rosenknospe," or "Bei jedem Walzerschritt," from "The Merry Widow," sung by Nicolai Gedda and Elisabeth Schwarzkopf. The only comparable works in the Palm-Court orchestra repertoire are "Fascination," "Diane" and "Charmaine," compositions which often suffer from the rattle of tea-cups and can only be enjoyed to the full in the films of such unregenerate Vien-nese directors as the great Billy Wilder.

There is, however, a form of intellectual snobbery prevalent here which maintains that it is impossible to enjoy such light-weights as well, as, say, Vivaldi or Bach. When the late Billy Rose, composer of the immortal "It Happened in Monterrey," among other all-time favourites, came here for the opening of his Sculpture Garden, he was more or less ignored while his travelling companion, Isamu Noguchi, who laid out the terraces, was lionized. After all, you can't get much more recherché than a Japanese landscape designer. I refuse to believe that any-

one who really loves music detests a good melody and only re-sponds to mathematical patterns, though I hear many protesta-tions from my friends to that effect. Weli, among other things, Beethoven's Ninth is a rattling good tune.

England's new Poet Laureate, John Betjeman, has described a similar attitude to architecture and painting as "ghastly good taste." It is basically anti-art and, what's more, they do miss a lot, the poor dears.

When this sort of closed-shop mentality is applied to art criticism the results are unfortunate. On the one hand, the most outrageous examples of anti-art are acclaimed in terms which elevate them to the status of High Art: Lucy R. Lippard, the American critic, has reserved a place in her private pantheon for Robert Rauschenberg, who once cabled a reply to a request to paint a portrait, which read "This is a portrait of Iris Clert if I say so.

On the other hand, most modern critics emphatically reject any work which has a narrative content. This is the main reason for

gelo covered the Sistine Chapel with Old Testament stories and Raphael and Titian, among a host of others, depicted Greek and Roman legends, while the Dutch and Flemish masters turned out innumerable genre paintings.

'GHASTLY GOOD TASTE'

I happen to be particularly fond, of Victorian painting and the content only enhances my enjoyment of them. This does not preclude my appreciation of, say, a late Rembrandt self-portrait or a Cezanne landscape. I dislike stagey and cliquey art in which the practitioners clearly enjoy themselves more than the audience and I can only say to Rauschenberg, as Lord Chester-field said to Garter King of Arms - "You foolish man, you do not even know your own foolish business.

Some 19th-century painters, in the fashion of their time, were addicted to a rather cloying sentimentality, but no more so than Dickens, for instance. They suf-fered, too, from over-exposure which has turned some of them into a joke. But careful examination of their work will often show first-rate painting. After all,

cliches were originally valid truths. In a Tel Aviv print-shop I once found a reproduction of Yeames' "When Did You Last See Your Father" and promptiy bought it, to the evident amusement of the owner. I added it to my personal treasure-trove which includes such gems as Poynter's "Faithful unto Death" (the Roman sentry who refused to leave his post in Pompeli), Maclise's The Death of Nelson," Frith's "Derby Day" — which earned Renoir's praise, Millais' "The Boyhood of Raielgh," Landseer's beautifully painted stag "The Monarch of the Glen," Holiday's "Dante and Beatrice," Wallis' "The Death of Chatterton" and "Whistler's Mother." These often provoke guffaws from those too blind to look at them as paintings. Most of the originals are hidden away in museum cellars but they can be viewed on request, as I have done at the Tate and some provincial galleries. They repay careful study. A critic who can praise Rothko or De Stael without having seen Turner's "Norham Castle" is doing all three an injustice. There are plenty of historical precedents for believing that the 21st century will stand amazed at our stupidity. But the critics are capable of anything. Writing in "The Listener" in 1937, Herbert Read, "The one of the great opinion-makers of our times, said: "The supreme head of one of the great nations. makes a speech ... entirely concerned with the nature and functions of art.
