



Israel to seek review of air pact with U.K.

Israel is to seek a revision of the civil aviation agreement with Britain. The decision was announced by the dransport Ministry yesterday following a meeting in Jerusalem on Minister Tuesday between Foreign Minister Abba Eban and Minister of Transport Shimon Peres.

A crisis has been brewing with Britain over its insistence on adhering to the present contract, which Israel regards as no longer a fair

Border clash keeps U.N. man from court

Jerusalem Post Reporter NAZARETH - A U.N. officer is suing a kibbutz tractor driver for IL784,000 for injuries he and his wife suffered in a traffic col-lision. But the officer didn't make it to his first day in court - he was trapped in Syria by Tues-day's Golan Heights fighting.

The U.N. man, Maurice Pault-Mere of France, claimed he suffered 15 per cent invalidity in the legs and his wife 25 per cent after the crash.

In his brief to the Nazareth District Court, Officer Pault-Mere said he was overtaking the trac-tor on the Jordan Valley-Beisan road September 3 when the tractor turned left without warning. The tractor driver, David Steinberg from Kibbutz Maagan, has been found guilty of negligent driving.

The U.N. officer says his injury will prevent him resuming his combat post in the French Army, while his wife will be unable to continue as deputy manager of the French Riviera hotel where she worked.

He was in Syria this week and planned to return for the first day's hearing in Nazareth on sday. His lawyer, Mr. Menahem Meislisch, said he was told by U.N. headquarters in Jerusalem that the officer had been held up in Syria by the fighting.



> Judgment for granting probate of a will, despite the existence of such defects as are listed in section 25 of the Succession Law, is that there should be no doubt whatsoever of its authenticity. In other words, he held, an applicant seeking probate of a will, despite the defects contained therein, must prove beyond any doubt that the whole document purport-

The District Court, continued Justice Berinson, had in fact held that it was satisfied that the will in the present case was genuine, despite the absence of any signatures on the first page (which contained the substantive part of the will). The appellant's counsel had argued, however, that the absence of a signature on a separate page of a will automatically disqualifies the will as it makes it impossible to identify this page as part of the will. Justice Berinson went on to hold that although the courts of Israel do not have to have recourse to English law in so far as probate of wills is concerned (and in fact section 150 of the Succession Law expressly vests that Law with autarky as it removes matters of succession from the applicability of article 46 of the Order in Council), nevertheless it was permissible to learn from the experienced and worldly-wise English judicature. In England, he continued, a rule has emerged from

a succession of precedents, in ac-cordance with which a will containing more than one page, which does not have a signature on each page must, in order to prevent fraud or possible forgery, have its pages chipped together at the time of signature or held together by the tes-tator, and the witnesses to the able testimony that those were the pages in the hands of the testator at the time he signed the will.

Justice Berinson then went on to quote from several English precedents in order to decide, by analogy with them, whether in the case under consideration the District Court had been entitled to conclude that there had been no doubt whatsoever of the authenticity of the deceased's will - which was a sine que non to turning a blind eye to defects of signature in the will. After comparing the precedents with the facts revealed in the present case he concluded that there were many circumstances in the present case which combined to cast doubt

on the genuineness of the first page of the deceased's will. Appeal allowed with IL2,000 costs. Judgment given on November 7,





In the meantime, the party chairman has relatively little power and the stars who are nurtur-ing hopes of capturing the nomination usually try to keep out of the internal strife for fear of offending factions whose support they will need later.

While it is generally assumed that Senator Edward Kennedy is the obvious heir to the 1976 nomination, he is doomed to spend the next three years evading questions about whether he wants it or not.

The effort to put the party together again is likely to go forward by a process of public squab-bling and private conciliation, with no single accepted leader in charge. Even so, when one weighs the







Mr. Schmiede charged that the mport had been "kept secret" and had come to the knowledge of the union "only by chance." He noted that 100 tons represented about seven per cent of the local catch, and that the Man plant had taken the smallest amount of local surdines during the season. The West resisted the idea of such a conference for many years, and there is still much scepticism. But various deve-lopments like the Four-Power agreement on Berlin, the treaty regulating relations between the two Germanys, progress in the Salt talks, and the increasing exchanges between the U.S. and the Soviet Union have softened some Western reluctance.

Moscow seeks a formal Western acceptance of the post-war frontiers in Europe with all the Russian territorial gains. This, of course, already exists implicitly, since not even the Soviets expect that Nato will ever challenge present borders. But a legal commitment could

be of advantage to the Kremlin in dealing with the other Eastern European countries, and give it a secure backing for any pos-sible conflict in the East with China.

The Western states are apparently divided over the concessions they should seek in

return from the Soviets.
The U.S. wants a Russian commitment to "free movement of people and ideas." This would include an end to such longstanding Soviet practices as jamming Western radio broadcasts, harassment of Western diplomats, journalists and busi-nessmen, limited exchange of newspapers.

Among the ques-tions that should be asked is how Soviet policy in the Middle East can fit in with the concept of European security.

Conservative Jewry on the Move

THE World Council of Syna-gogues today concludes its ninth international convention, held in Jerusalem. The Council embraces some two million Jews the world over, including almost one-third of American Jewry. It was founded 15 years ago by the United Synagogue of America, the representative body of Conservative Judaism in the

From its solid base in the U.S., where it was founded by Rabbi Solomon Schechter in 1913, the Conservative Movement is now emphasizing its global aspirations. With over 50 affiliated synagogues in Latin America, Europe, Australia, Canada, India and Israel, the movement has gained some 200,000 members since the formation of the World Council.

The Council looks with special pride on its achievements in Latin America, particularly in Argentina, where it has become a potent force. It is only natural that the Conservative Movement, which traditionally has supplied most of America's Zionist leaders, should now focus its attention on growth in this country.

This effort was aptly symbolized by the dedication of its new Israel headquarters in Jerusalem yesterday. The burgeoning United Synagogue of Israel, which is affiliated with the World Council sees a granter World Council, sees a growing field for its activities here, although it may face a hard struggle against the forces of secularism and indifference on the one hand, and entrenched Orthodoxy on the other hand.
