





## German spy sent for new psychiatric tests

### Jerusalem Post Reporter HAIFA. - The District Court here

vesterday ordered another psychiatric examination of a German engineer, Peter Vollmann, 28, con-victed of illegally crossing into Lebanon and turning over to its intelligence service information of military value.

Sentence was to have been pronounced yesterday, but was put off till November 1 following a report by a psychiatrist, Dr. Tikva Nathan, which recommended fur-ther observation. She said there were "certain defects in the ac-cused's judgment of reality," which, she thought, were incompatible with his good general level of intelligence. Further observation in a psychiatric hospital would more clearly establish the extent of his sense of responsibility for his con-duct, she wrote.

Vollmann arrived from West Ger many as a tourist in May 1971 and later changed his status to that of immigrant. He settled in Kiryat Thyon, married a Jewish girl and divorced her six months later. ## **DUTCH THEOLOGIAN:** Persecution of Jews united Christians'

It was the World War H persecution of Jews that brought Catholics and Protestants in Holland together — "They hadn't spoken to each other for years" — Dutch theologian William A. Visser t'Hooft said yesterday in Jerusalem.

Dr. Visser t'Hooft, former Secretary-General of the World Council of Churches and noted figure in the ecumenical movement, was speaking at a ceremony in which he was made an honorary fellow of the Hebrew University.

The ceremony was held in the University's Belgium House faculty club, with acting university pres-ident Bernard Cherrick presiding. Dr. Cherrick noted that, during the war, Dr. Visser t'Hooft had run considerable risks to set up a Holocaust information centre in Switzerland, so that churchmen and statesmen everywhere "with the courage to stand up and speak against what was being done to Europe's Jews" would have the facts before them (facts that other official agencies were then trying to suppress).



# STRIKES AND LAWS

YEAR ago strikes in public A A services were outlawed — except for bargaining where no valid contract is in force, and for special cases, approved by the "representative" trade union and offenders threatened with heavy fines.

heavy fines. The law has already become a dead letter. After a few vain attempts to enforce it, the gov-ernment has chosen to forget their intention to end work stop-pages at the expense of the weifare of the public, and reconciled itself to the hardship involved.

It does not matter very much whether the law is broken open--as at Lod Airport and in Haifa and Ashdod harbours or a way is found to circumvent it — as in the current case of so-called "sanctions" imposed by customs men. Nor does it matter greatly whether the work stoppage — or working to rule prac-tice — has been approved by the respective trade union (and the trade union leaders are often at loggerheads on this point).

The essence of the current situation is that in full employment, pre-election circumstances the administration is concerned more to avoid labour unrest than to argue about the price it is paying for a fragile peace, as every successive conflict becomes a precedent with a snow-balling effect. This erosion of authority might perhaps have been checked by a firm stand by management witness the development in this direction in private industry, where costs cannot be stretched indefinitely. In the public sector no real solu-tion is in sight, and even legal powers are not of much avail. as had been predicted by no s an authority than Labour Minister Almogi. The current wave of strikes

may yet bring about more than higher wages and fatter fringe benefits. It has begun to affect the fabric of management-labour relations, giving new power to work or group committees over issues of crucial importance to

general manager. In the Elec-tric Corporation no general manager could be appointed owing to a veto by the men on the spot. Laws alone cannot replace effective management, for they tend to inhibit action, to replace policy. This has been demonstrated by the collapse of the Industrial Relations Law in Britain no less than by our own experience. Neither the govern-ment nor the public in this country seem willing at present to consider the consequences, and there is little prospect of any action, or even planning, until after the elections next year.

# Marcos seeks a place in the history books

WHEN martial law was finally HONGKONG (Ofns). -W imposed on the Philippines for the first time in the 26-year-old history of the independent republic. President Ferdinand E. Marcos created both a shock and an anti-climax. Martial law had long been ex-

pected as one possible outcome of the turbulent years of the Marcos presidency which began in 1965. Even during the calamitous floods which struck the Philippines in July and August this year, some Philippine commentators continued their attack on martial law, and its sus-pected perpetrator, the President. For President Marcos, the floods

carried a different meaning. Moving about the countryside more freely than he has done in the last two years, he saw that the damage done by the waters (some of which have still not yet receded) had set the economy back by anything from two to five years. And the economy was not doing particularly well before the waters washed away crops and infrastructure. Marcos is a man with a strong President Marcos - aiming
