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


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CONTINUING THE FIGHT

WE learned over the weekend terrorists in bases scattered through Syrian villages, and another 5,000 in similar bases in the Lebanon. During the past month they have been more active than previously, Chief of Staff Elazar pointed out after Friday's raid of the bases, and action was due following reported bazooka attacks and border crossings which cost the lives of an Israel soldier as well as an infiltrator on Thursday.

This is slow war, not a cold one, and we have no choice but to continue to wage it until Syria and the Lebanon tire of their burden of half-disciplined men belonging to different terrorist formations who intimidate their villagers and, inevitably, bring sharp Israel retaliation down on the bases at intervals. In such attacks on sabotage bases there are always civilian losses that everyone would wish to know ended. The two govern-

ments concerned could do so tomorrow, if they were willing, by ordering the terrorists to move their camps and training grounds away from inhabited areas, or by telling them either to leave or to return to civilian life, as Jordan has done, and thereby repeated disaster before people restored peace in its area. On Friday, nevertheless, even Jordan suffered loss and damage during the dogfight between invading Syrian planes and Israel fighters in which three Syrian planes were destroyed. War cannot be confined safely to those ahead and it will take courage who are guilty.

As far as the outside world that there are still 9,000 is concerned the operation against the terrorists was nothing but a reprisal for the murder of the Israel athletes in Munich. That is true only in a limited sense. Some of the terrorists now roaming Europe may have received their training in camps in the Lebanon, as the Lod murderers did, but they cannot be discouraged by punitive action that does not hit them directly. The development of peaceful relations between Israel and Jordan robs them of support and recruits to their cadres; military action against Lebanon may be not unwelcome to them. They have moved their operational bases to Copenhagen, to Rome, to Paris and elsewhere in Europe, and they receive ample funds and such aid as passports and refuge from Arab

> Germany is taking serious steps to begin to control this menace, fully aware that it is liable to be the target of renewed threats because it now holds three terrorist prisoners who took part in the Olympic village murder. It is an unfortunate fact that it takes are willing to accept that every yielding to terrorist threats or blackmail draws further such action — as foreigners working in some South American countries have recently discovered. There is a long struggle still and determination.

LANSKY VERDICT

MEYER Lansky must leave forcement officers and ex-Mafia Israel branded guilty — or jailbirds cumulatively to create at least "not innocent" — by the Israel High Court of all manner of criminal acts which the American courts and judicial authorities have always been unable to prove against him. This is, in effect, the result of the judgment delivered yester-day. The judgment itself followed almost inevitably from the wording of the Law of Return - and may point to the need to frame it more precisely. The Court ruled that Mr. Lansky is "a person with a criminal past, likely to endan-ger the public welfare," one of the reasons listed in the Law of Return for which a Jew may be denied the right to come and live in Israel.

Whether or not a man is likely to endanger the public welfare can, of course, only be a discretionary decision, left to the responsible authority — in this case the Minister of Interior. There can be no strict legal definition or proof of such a prognosis. The Knesset, however, intending to circumscribe what might otherwise have been a dangerously arbitrary degree

of discretion, introduced the legally unsatisfactory concept of the "criminal past." "Criminal past," as the High Court has ruled before and con-firmed yesterday, is not limited to actual convictions for criminal offences, but can embrace a multitude of sins — proven or merely suspected — which the Minister feels should be taken into account.
