TEHRAN (Reuter). — Government forces personally ordered by Ayatollah Khomeini to crush a Kurdish revolt yesterday retook the town of Faveh from rebel forces, the state radio announced.

He said three helicopters had been knocked down by the Kurds with all their crews killed, but added that a Phantom jet claimed by the Kurds to have been shot down crashed because of a malfunction.

Strauss finds Begin adamant
