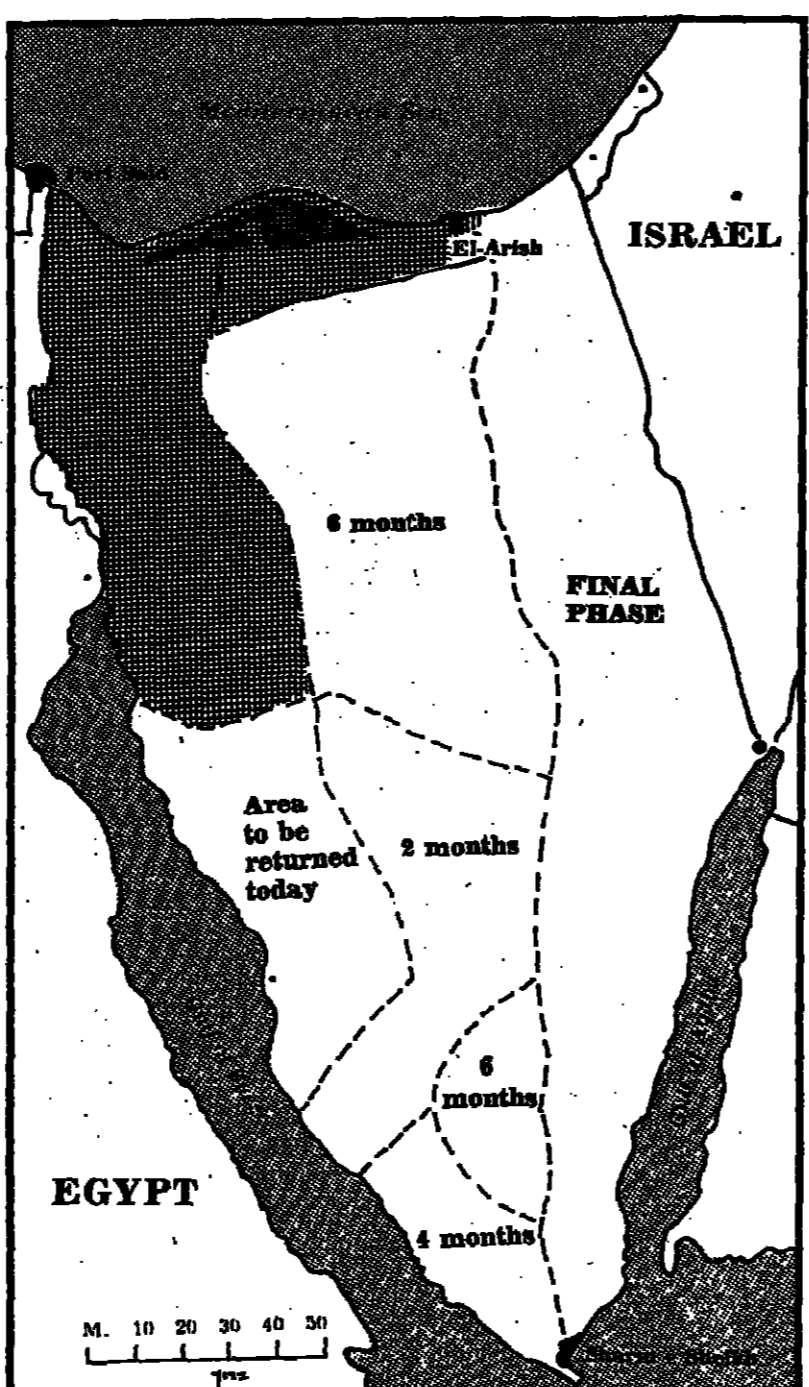

The five-year wave of terror in Italy shows little sign of abating, writes Gavin Young in Rome

"ANYONE could be waiting for us here." Anna says with a shaky smile. "That's the truth, I'm afraid. The swing-door of the apartment block closes behind us with a bang. A short black driveway glistens with the evening's rain. It is easy to imagine kidnappers with their guns in the deep shadows under the trees by the front gate.

We check through the concrete pillars to Anna's small blue car. You could yell your head off down here, and no one would hear a thing. I have no difficulty imagining four figures in windcheaters and black-and-white helmets, the smack of gun-butts on my skull, the eventual weakening, bound and bleeding, God knows where. Or the shots meticulously splintering my thigh-bones, smashing my knee-caps.

set us on fire — a James Bond gadget that can instantly cover the outside of the car in anti-fire foam. "We are in radio contact with the Carabinieri posts along the way," he says. "Did I tell you, my No.3 at the office is on the latest Red Brigades list of people to be killed." "He's married?" "Two children." "That's no joke." A thin smile. "No joke at all. One mustn't spend too much time thinking about it."

J. is a large, courteous man and his watchful face tells you he knows how to bargain. He did bargain — for weeks — on the telephone with his brother's kidnappers. Offering money for a life. J. says: "They were extremely efficient. Not educated, but certainly far, far from stupid. Can you believe that, despite what they had done to my brother, we became almost like friends after two conversations? Very polite, too. They, after all can only deal with you. You are the buyer. They need you."

long, five foot high and two-and-a-half foot wide for 71 days. Tied by an ankle-chain. The isolation was terrifying. "She smokes compulsively on a cigarette, simultaneously chews gum." "It happened one evening... I drove up to our villa with two boy friends. A little van pulled up and three masked men leaped out with guns. I knew immediately what it meant. They smashed the windows and just pulled me out. My boyfriend sat paralysed."

IF A LOVED ONE is snatched by Sardinians it is certainly time to prepare to weep. Their brutality is a byword. In the 1970s the Sardinian and Sicilian mafias began kidnapping people to finance restaurants or businesses on the mainland. The Calabrians joined in, too. Soon these poverty-stricken southerners migrated to Milan and Turin in the rich, bourgeois, industrial north. And to Rome where drugs were all the rage. Kidnapping is easier and far, far more profitable than robbing banks.

WHY CAN BE done? Efforts to block the assets of people who want to ransom their loved one and so deprive the kidnappers of their motive do not seem to work. Desperate people will find money somewhere. Oddly, no one seems to be urging the death penalty. Most think prison sentences are outrageously light, which they are.

PRECAUTIONS make good sense. The five-year wave of terror in Italy shows little sign of abating. Twenty kidnappings in the first five months of this year; by the Communist Party's count, more than 5,000 incidents of political terror in the three years from 1976 to 1978, including murders, shootings and bombings; attacks on police stations, trade union offices and the headquarters of political parties; and over 300 kidnappings during the same period, most of them non-political.

The world of kidnapping is a world apart. A world of luxury, fear — and strange relationships between kidnappers and victims, like those formed between soldiers of opposing armies. Evening in the Via Condotti. I sit in a plush office behind showcases gleaming with expensive objects in leather and gold. When I say yes to a drink, someone puts in front of me a bottle of Chivas Regal and a bucket of ice. J. pours whisky into two glasses and sits down. He is the boss of this smart shop. J's brother was kidnapped last year; it took \$7m. to spring him.

NEXT DAY, I stand at the tall window of a magnificent flat high above Rome. Behind me on the sofa, a teenage girl with blonde hair falling over a high-necked sweater is agonizing over her kidnapping. "They kept me in a box six foot

Arica has a fashionable Riviera patronized by Bolivian bathing beauties, but the bay with its headland is also a strategic prize full of goose-stepping Chileans in desert khaki. "I'm lucky. A friend of mine paid the ransom for his father in Sardinia — and then found they had fed his father to the pigs. Pigs eat everything... even the bones. The son is a big, grown man, but he weeps when he talks to me about his father."

Whether to be rich is good or bad, there are brave people in Italy. A beautiful Anna told me, half-laughing: "I take my children to school — alone. I go to my office — alone. 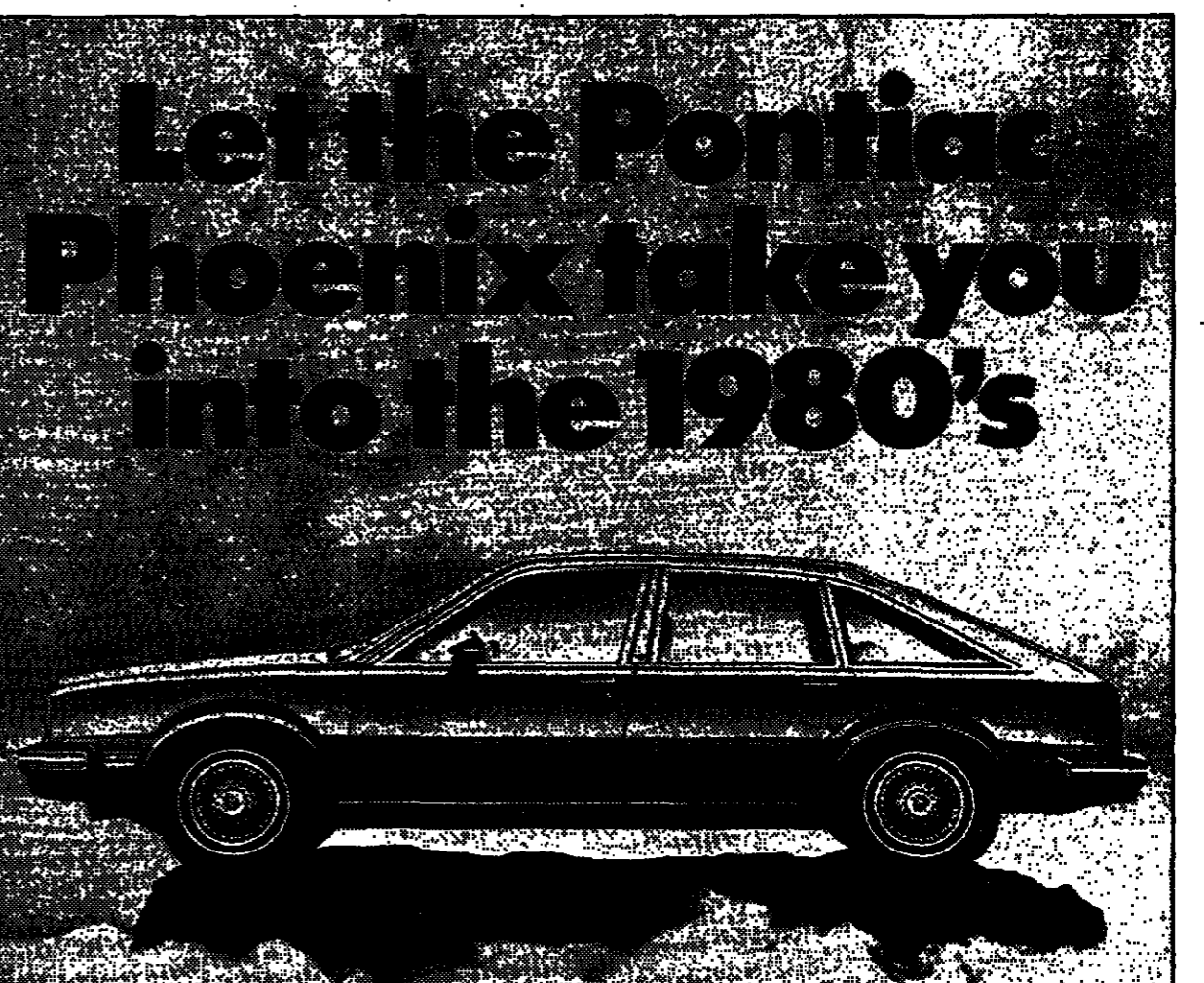
