

# Syrians hit Arafat's Tripoli stronghold

TRIPOLI. — As outgunned loyalists held their ground against repeated tank assualts by Syrian-backed adversaries, PLO chairman Yassen Arafat vowed yesterday to die falking rather than see the PLO come "a puppet" in Syrian hands. Heavy artillery and rocket shellng began shortly after dawn following a night of sporadic fighting. Shells from Syrian-held positions pounded this city of 500,000 and the two Palestinian refugee camps of Baddawi and Nahr el-Bared north

Araiat charged that the Syrians had massed up to 25,000 men, 170 tunks and up to 180 artillery pieces around the refugee camps, which house about 45,000 refugees.

### 3 die in blast near Beirut station

BEIRUT (Reuter). — A blast shook a residential area of Beirut yesterday, killing at least three people. staté-run Beirut radio reported.

The radio said a bomb blew up close to a brandcasting station of the state-run television service in mainly Moslem West Beirut. The television station lies close to

the heavily guarded home of Prime Minister Shafiq Al-Wazzan, but it was not immediately known if the premier was at home at the time. Two U.S. Navy F-14 "Tomcat" fighters streaked low over Beirut vesterday, rattling windows in the capital, it was the first time warplanes had buzzed the city since the brief mountain war in September pitting Druse Moslem lighters against the Lebanese Army

and rightist Christian forces. .The flights came amid continuing Druse-army clashes in the hills overlooking Beirut. One soldier was killed in the lighting around the lown of Souk al-Gharb in the afternoon. Beirut radio reported.

Candace lived for 16 hours and before her death was seen to be suffering from convulsions, The Journal said. Had she survived, she would have been severly handicapped by a massive brain damage.

At its meeting in Jerusalem this morning the cabinet is expected to weigh Israel's response to Friday's terrorist bombing of the IDF headquarters in Tyre. A total of 60 persons were killed in the attack, 28 of them members of the Border Police and other Israeli security forces, and 32 Lebanese, mostly detainees who were being held in the headquarters building.

As an immediate response, Israel Air Forces planes blasted PLO terrorist positions in the Beirut area on Friday afternoon.

# 28 police and security men, 32 Lebanese die in terror raid

TYRE. - A terrorist drove an explosive-laden pick-up truck through a hail of fire into the compound of the local headquarters of the IDF early Friday morning and blew up the three buildings, killing himself, 28 Israelis, and 32

Another 29 soldiers and 12 local residents were injured. Five persons were extracted unhurt from the ruins. A curfew was placed on Tyre immediately following the attack: virtually no traffic on the road south to the Rosh Hanikra border post.

The explosion completely wrecked the building which housed the General Security Services. Another, housing a Border-Police company was partly destroyed, as was a third in which Arab detainees were held.

The Israel Defence Forces snokesman announced last night that nine security personnel killed in the Tyre attack will be buried today.

Asher Hassin, a member of the General Security Forces, will be laid to rest in the Ashdud cemetery at 2 p.m. A member of the same service, Eli Pergament will be buried at 3 p.m. at the Michmoret cemetery. Avigdor Baranes of Ramat Gan will be laid to rest at 3 p.m. in the military section of the Holon

"terrorist headquarters and objectives" in the area of the Beirut-Damascus highway on Friday, hours after the bomb destroyed the IDF headquarters in Tyre.

The planes attacked the areas of Mansuria and Bhamdoun near the highway, the IDF spokesman said. The first attack was at noon, the spokesman said, and the objectives were command headquarters, several tanks and 130mm, cannons belonging to the Popular Front for the Liberation of Palestine -General Command, led by Ahmed Jibril, and the Fatah rebels of Abu-Mussa. Later in the day the planes returned to attack headquarters in Bhamdoun - an area Israel had left in September.

This was the first Israeli aerial action reported in Lebanon since October 1982, when planes attacked

According to Lebanese security sources 69 people were killed and 120 were wounded in Friday's air strikes. They included three Syrian officers and 19 men. According to

The committee met on Friday to hear Cohen-Orgad describe the new policy. According to the Treasury, the minister did not make a detailed presentation of the proposed cuts. but preferred to review his objectives in a general manner.

Cohen-Orgad stressed that his main objective will be an improvement in the balance of payments, and that the main burden should fall upon the wealthier strata of the

# Kimche: Raids were signal

GENEVA. - Foreign Ministry Director-General David Kimche told a press conference here yesterday that Israeli air strikes against Palestinian targets following Friday's bomb attack were a signal to Damascus.

"The Syrians believe very wrongly that Israel is so preoccupied with internal problems that it is not willing to respond to Syrian aggression. Friday's attacks by our aircraft... should be seen as a signal to them that they are wrong. We hope they will take note of that signal," Kimche told the press conference at the Israeli mission here.

He said Israel has evidence that

Damascus was behind Friday's blast in Tyre and the truck-bomb attacks on U.S. and French troops in Beirut in which 288 servicemen died,

Individual perpetrators might not have been identified, he said, but "we have every reason to believe that the Syrians had a great deal to do with these recent terrorist ac-

Kimche, visiting Geneva in connection with the Lebanese reconciliation conference here, declined to comment when asked if the air strikes were the full extent of reprisals for Friday's bombing. "We will keep them guessing," he said.

# U.S. wants Israel to be tough with Syria

WASHINGTON. - The Reagan administration is quietly hoping that Friday's bombing in Tyre will result in a more assertive Israeli posture against Syria and its allies in Lebanon.

Senior U.S. officials, encouraged

by the initial wave of Israeli retaliatory strikes against Syrian and Palestinian positions in Lebanon, have expressed hope that the bombing will also lead to closer U.S.-Israeli strategic and military cooperation throughout the region. The bombing came just as the

Defence Department was reportedly studying various options for a U.S. commando strike against Baalbek, base of Iranian-backed Lebanese Shi'ites who are widely

responsible for the attacks against U.S., French and Israeli forces.

The administration has not yet finally authorized any direct ground action against the terrorists, given the widely held fears in the State Department that U.S. relations with Syria and other Arab states would seriously suffer as a result. There is also concern that America's west European allies would oppose such direct U.S. punishment.

At the same time, most U.S. officials are anxious for a strong Israeli response, convinced that only such action could change the fundamental balance of power in Lebanon, which now favours Syria.

### Six Ansar inmates crushed to death

The IDF bulldozer was engaged in ground levelling work, when it suddenly veered into the dug-out. The work was being undertaken as part of efforts to prepare the camp

Following the accident, guards started a search of the area outside the camp and located two more prisoners hiding under the ground.

# Experience helps Rambam cope with Tyre wounded

Jerusalem Post Reporter HAIFA. - At 6.45 a.m. on Friday, Rambam Hospital was told to prepare to receive wounded from the Tyre military base. The welloiled emergency procedures were swiftly implemented, with Rambam closing its doors to civilian patients, diverting them to the city's two other major hospitals, Rothschild

and Carmel. Access and exit roads were sealed off to facilitate the flow of the ambulances that would ferry the wounded from the nearby helicopter landing pad to the

hospital entrance, where stretcher trolleys were lined up in readiness.

The emergency wards, operating theatres and intensive-care units were cleared. Supplies of plasma, medicines, syringes and the scores of other items needed to treat a large number of wounded were stocked up and additional staff called in. Once all the preparations had been mude, the medical teams manned their posts and waited.

The first of the wounded began to arrive just after 8 a.m. Each was wheeled into the emergency ward, where injuries were diagnosed.

Within minutes they were being moved again, either to the operating theatres or specialist wards.

Rambam Hospital director Yosef Brandes said the whole operation was virtually a carbon copy of the incident a year ago when the military headquarters in Tyre collapsed after a gas explosion.

Brandes said the medical staff had learned several lessons from that incident - particularly regarding the treatment of patients suffering from crush injuries. The most important aspect was to get them to hospital as soon as possible,

give them lots of liquid to rinse the was discharged. Three of those body tissues and connect them to kidney-dialysis machines when necessary,

A total of 35 wounded - including three local Arabs who had been detained for investigation in one of the buildings - were admitted to the hospital. By late afternoon the hospital management was informed by the military authorities that no more would arrive and Rumbam was once again opened to

Brandes said nine of the wounded were sent to other hospitals and one

detained, including one of the Arabs, were in a critical condition. five had moderate injuries and the remainder were only slightly hurt.

Deputy Knesset Speaker Meir Cohen-Avidov, the Haifa MK who visited the hospital on Friday morning, was upset to hear that \$90,000 worth of new surgical equipment which the hospital needed badly to replace outdated instrumentation, was being held up for lack of funds. He phoned the finance minister and within hours some of the equipment had arrived at the hospital. The rest is on its way from London.

# Warm message from Reagan extends U.S. sympathy

President Ronald Reagan wrote to Prime Minister Yitzhak Shamir on Friday expressing the hope that America's "deep sense of sympathy" with Israel in the Tyre bombing would "ease the loss that the people of Israel feel."

In a warm and emotional message, delivered by hand by a U.S. diplomat, the president wrote: "Once again in act of senseless terrorism has taken young men's

your forces have suffered today casualties in the same kind of terrorist attack. "Terrorism must not and will not

be allowed to achieve its objectives.

The catastrophe at the headquarters, located just south of Tyre, occurred at 6:10 a.m., when most of the men were still in their beds. It came a year after the death of 76 men when a gas explosion destroyed the former HQ of the IDF at the northern outskirts of the city. The headquarters were then moved to the present site, a former Palestinian school-building compound.

The efficient rescue operations supervised by OC Northern Command Aluf Amir Drori, were virtually completed by 3 p.m., though the clean-up continued until night-

Special equipment developed after the 1982 Tyre disaster was helicoptered to the site. It included airbags to lift masonry, hydraulic jacks to clear rubble, and concrete and building iron cutters.

Medics administered infusions to survivors even before they were extricated from the debris, as soon as a hand or foot was uncovered.

The rescuers brought two dogs trained to find victims buried under

A fleet of helicopters ferried the wounded to Haifa's Rambam Hospital for immediate treatment. From the few eyewitness accounts that could be pieced together the suicide attack was car-

ried out by one man driving a closed Chevrolet pick-up van packed with an estimated 400 to 500 kgs of high explosives. He travelled along the highway,

# UK, Italy and France assail recent violence in Lebanon

LONDON (AP). — European members of the Beirut multinational peacekeeping force (MFN) on Friday condemned the new suicide bombings against Israeli troops in Lebanon and deplored the cycle of violence as Israel retaliated with aerial bombing.

French government spokesman Max Gallo said France is "more sensitive" to the violence because it had been "cruelly struck" itself on October 23 when 58 French paratroopers -were-killed by a suicide bomber in the twin attacks on U.S. and French forces.

France "understands and shares the sorrow and anger of those who have been hit," Gallo said. France, Italy and Britain con-

tribute troops to the multi-national force along with the U.S. in an effort to bolster the Lebanese central government. The French spokesman said, "The attacks carried out this morning against Israeli army buildings

(and) also the continuing bombing of Palestinian refugee camps are obstacles to the search for a peaceful solution to the problems of the

In Rome, a Foreign Ministry

statement said: "Italy cannot but firmly deplore such a spiral of violence.

In London, a Foreign Office statement said Britain "deplores in the strongest possible terms" the outbreak of further violence in Lebunon and called on all sides to "exercise restraint." It noted that the new violence

was taking place "at a time so much effort is being dedicated to the successful outcome" of reconciliation talks in Geneva. The statement urged all parties to show some "common sense."

At the UN, Israeli Ambassador Yehuda Blum complained on Friday night that UN Secretary-General Javier Perez de Cuellar, in developments in Lebanon," did not mention that the latest victims were

"The Israeli victims of today's terrorist outrage in Tyre died as Israelis. They were entitled to be identified as such, just as the American and French victims of the Beirut outrages were not denied their nationalities," an Israeli release quoted Blum as saying.

He was knocked unconscious by the blast, and when he came round he found a doctor standing over him. He got up and started to help the doctor aid other wounded.

-He then spotted six detainees trying to escape from the base lock-up. "I ran towards them firing shots in the air and told them in Arabic to stop. Some of our soldiers came across and took them back. After that I felt terrible pain in my ears and head and I lay down on a

may need an operation. Also being treated for similar injuries in the same department was 37-year-old Peter Mahlouf, a medic with the Border Police.

"I suddenly found myself on the first floor, and then some friends helped me to get out," he said. Mahlouf, who is married and lives in Carmiel, immigrated from England 14 years ago and has served with the Border Police for 12 years.



"There were many dead bodies among the rubble, and I heard people shouting for help. Within a few minutes, a large force of troops arrived and started rescue operations. I was taken to a first-aid station and treated and then flown to Rambam."

Border Policeman Mohammed Habakah, 19, from the Druse village of Yanuch in Galilee, said he had been preparing breakfast in the dining room when he heard gunfire. "I went outside with several others to see what was happening, and then there was an explosion. I was hit by some falling masonry. When I looked round again, I saw that the building used by the General Security Services was totally destroyed and the top floor of our building had disappeared," he said. Several of the rescuers were among those being treated at the Rambam Hospital, Yoel, aged 30, serving with Haga (Civil Defence) had been sent to the scene as soon as the news came through, "I saw flames near some ammunition and decided I would have to put it out. Suddenly a

Yoel, a father of two from Hadera, who suffered arm and leg injuries, started to cry as he spoke about his wife who is in her eighth month of pregnancy. He later phoned her from the hospital to say that he was all night.

The wounded were visited yesterday by Chief of Staff Rav-Aluf Moshe Levy, who spent more than an hour touring wards, speaking to doctors, staff and the patients.

# Concrete ruins in land of cedars

As you clambered over the wreckage of the Border Police and General Security Services headquarters in Tyre on Friday, and watched the bulldozers and cranes and hundreds of Israel Defence Forces soldiers working to dig the dead and the survivors out of the rubble, it was important not to make the mistake of thinking sym-

If you gave in to symbolic thinking in the midst of all that heat and dust and sweat and shouting and stink of death and gunpowder, you might conclude that the proper symbol for the once-levely country of Lebanon is not a broad-branched cedar, but a pile of twisted con-

Worse than that, you might conceive of that building and the Israelis who were sleeping in it that morning as symbols of "Operation Peace for Galilee" and everything that has happened since. And that would never do.

Practical people take a thing for what it is, not for what it may stand for. Since Israelis, of all people, have the least margin in which to be impractical, the scene at Tyre had to be understood simply for what it was — the aftermath of a youngster high on the name of God ramming a small truck packed with explosives into the courtyard of the Border Police headquarters.

The most that you might do was to remember that this was not the first building in Lebanon to be made to collapse. Bashir Jemayel, Israel's candidate for strongman, died when a building collapsed on him. The American Embassy in Beirut collapsed. So did the headquarters of the U.S. Marines and of the French

paratroopers. So. in fact, did the previous Border Police headquarters in Tyre, exactly one year ago. And buildings housing troops, secret police and civilians have also been made to collapse in Baalbeck and Shtura in Syrian-held portions of Lebanon, who knows by whom?

The most a practical-minded, cool person could infer from this, however, was that Lebanese buildings have a tendency to collapse. He would not entertain the image of a collapsed building with bodies under it as a symbol. neither of Lebanon nor of Israel's policy in that country, for this could lead to wrong thinking and hasty deci-

And indeed, there seemed to be at least as many cool, hard-nosed characters among the IDF officers swarming in the Tyre ruins and supervising the rescue work on Friday as there were men muttering curses and words of despair to themselves. If there was a colonel muttering, "How I hate this place," there were three others nearby who were punching themselves in the ribs and assuring each other that things would be OK.

A medical corps dog, specially trained, was sniffing in

Five shirtless young men - all Lebanese - were squatting under guard near a Shekem mobile canteen. A soldier was collecting various rifles, key-rings, sleeping bags and boots, all dirty and scorched.

In a neighbouring house which is inhabited by Lebanese and whose windows were blown in by the blast, furniture was strewn every which way and a trail of blood led down the stairs. The women were sweeping up the glass and a child smiled at the men who were going to take pictures from the roof.

But everything was what it was, and nothing more.

### Terrorist suspect hurt in jail riot

Henri Eichholtzer, the 27-yearold Frenchman charged with gathering information for the PLO in a plot to bomb the Shalom Tower skyscraper in Tel Aviv, suffered burns and smoke inhalation during a riot at Petah Tikva lock-up last month and is recovering in hospital, his attorney said yesterday.

Eichholtzer, a schoolteacher from Hirsingue in Alsace, was burned on the leg and required intensive care after he nearly choked on fumes from mattresses set on fire by inmates, said attorney Roland

Eichholtzer is in the prison hospital, but will appear in court today for the resumption of his trial as scheduled, Roth said.

He is accused of taking pictures of potential bombing targets for the PLO, as well as having contact with a hostile organization and taking instruction from it on the use of weanons.







### TEL AVIV STOCK MARKET REVIEW Dollar ban stems tide of sale of bank shares

By JOSEPH MORGENSTERN Post Finance Reporter

TEL AVIV. - The ban on the nurchase of cash dollars and travellers cheques succeeded in stemming the flood of sales of bank shares.

Until control was introduced, money realized from the sale of bank shares was being used for massive purchases of dollars, travellers cheques and bank cheques. At the same time there was an increase in Patam foreign-currency deposits, which according to the finance minister will not be tampered with.

It is estimated that about \$4 billion are now in Patam accounts. The Treasury will undoubtedly try to entice investors to place these funds on longer term deposits by raising interest rates.

Non-banking shares have had a trying week, with the General Share Index falling by nearly 10 per cent, trend and gained about \$2.

The fall in the price of "free shares" was caused by the expectation of strict economic measures aimed at improving the economy.

The shares of Dafron fell in the week under review by as much as 90 per cent. The shares had a rapid rise in recent months, in contrast to the general market trend. It would not he surprising if the authorities decided to investigate whether illegal practices had been used.

Index-linked bonds appreciated by margins of 3 to 5 per cent. The shekel was devalued by 3.4 per cent. Israeli shares traded on the local and American stock markets trended lower. Elron Electronic Industries, at about \$20, seemed to be attractively priced. The Laser-Industries shares, which are traded only on the American Stock Ex-

change, moved against the general

# Campaign to sell cottages in Nofim

Jerusalem Post Reporter TEL AVIV - The Nofim construction company last night started a special one-week campaign to sell 100 cottages starting at \$70,000 in Nofim, the new town of the same name it is building in Samaria near Rosh Ha'ayin and Kfar Sava.

Daniel Weinman, managing director of Nofim and one of its owners, made the announcement at press conference here on Friday. He said the company wants to attract people who have withdrawn their money from other sources to invest in the cottages.

The campaign is aimed at young couples, who are required to pay a down payment of \$3,000 when they sign up, Weinman said. If they qualify, the couples can receive a mortgage of up to 50 per cent of the cost, to be paid back in up to 20 years. The remainder has to be in instalments over three years.

The cottages will have 88 square metres and can be enlarged, Weinman said. Since Nofim started its sales campaign 13 months ago, it



# Economic recovery rolls on — experts call it 'expansion'

NEW YORK (AP). — As the economic recovery of the U.S. passes its first anniversary this month. . most Wall Street analysts agree it is still showing plenty of youthful vigour.

According to the experts who keep track of such things, it was in November of 1982 that a long, severe U.S. recession reached bottom and economic activity began to improve.

Today officials of the Reagan administration say the upward trend has made such progress that it can now be labelled "expansion" rather than merely "recovery." That may be merely political semantics, but there is little in the latest economic data and private analyses to dispute the point. "The economy is proceeding

through the first year of recovery in an orderly and predictable way." savs Data Resources Inc., a forecasting firm. "Prospects are good that the expansion will continue for at least another year." The official figures on the pace of

the economy lately have been especially impressive. The U.S. Labour Department reported on Friday that the civilian unemployment rate fell to a 20-month low of 8.8 per cent in October. The jobless rate has fallen two percentage points since late last year.

Auto sales remained strong in the last part of October, sales of ne homes recorded a big jump ; September, and retailers reporte continuing strong gains in the husiness.

Henry Kaufman, the Salomo Brothers economist, said in a conmentary published on Friday the the improvements "shows signs c becoming increasingly more brose ly based. Business spending is risin and shows every indication of make ing a substantial contribution t economic growth in the perio ahead."

One missing piece in the puzzle however, is the enthusiasm on might expect to see in the securitie markets. Among all the positive confronting them, stock trader have chosen lately to focus on in terest rates — both their present high level and fears that they migh soon go higher still.

In the past week, the Dow Jones Average of 30 Industrials dropped 5,29, to 1,218.18, for its fourth consecutive weekly decline.

The New York Stock Exchange Composite Index slipped 51, to 93.77, while the American Stock Exchange Market value Index rose .97, to 213.42.

Big Board volume averaged 83.31 million shares a day, against 81.65 million the week before.





# Death hits again in Tyre

THE NAME of Tyre will go down in the annals of Israel's wars as the one site which has claimed the highest death toll in the ongoing war in Lebanon. Friday's massive terror explosion which totally destroyed the IDF headquarters in Lebanon's southern port town claimed the lives of 60 people - 28 Israeli soldiers and border policemen and 32 Lebanese. By a grim coincidence it took place one year less one week after the collapse of the IDF's previous headquarters in Tyre. In that major disaster close to 100 people were killed.

Again, a large number of Israeli Druse border policemen paid with their lives together with their comrades-in-arms of the IDF and of Israel's security forces. Some of them were next of kin of Druse border policemen who were killed in

Friday's tragedy is compounded by the fact that it took place in the heart of Israel-controlled territory in South Lebanon, less than 30 kilometres from Israel's northern border. To carry out the same kind of suicide attack with a pickup truck loaded with explosives as was perpetrated two weeks ago in Beirut against the U.S. Marines and the French contingent of the MNF requires most careful preparation. To make it succeed despite the stepped-up security measures taken by the IDF in the wake of the terrorist outrage in Beirut would point to an extremely well-organized terrorist group which continues to operate under the very nose of Israel's security forces.

This poses a number of serious questions about Israel's continued presence in southern Lebanon, even within the limited area which is widely recognized as being part of Israel's vital security interests.

"Islami Jihad," a Lebanese Shia break-away group which was one of the terrorist units that claimed credit for the attacks in Beirut, has also taken credit for Friday's carnage in Tyre. Although these Shia fanatics take their inspiration and support from Khomeini's Iran, there can be little doubt that such an operation could not be prepared and carried out without the connivance of Syria.

One can only wonder what the rulers of Saudi Arabia and Abu Dhabi had in mind when their radio stations praised the perpetrators of Friday's attack in Tyre. The hatred for Israel of even these so-called moderate Arab states is apparently stronger than their fear of Iranian-inspired Shia fanatics who pose a direct threat to the survival of these regimes in the Ara-

bian peninsula. The reactions of the United States, France and other Western countries to the tragedy in Tyre and to Israel's immediate aerial response were noteworthy. Their expressions of sympathy and condolones seemed especially heartfelt — and little wonder of the sent similar carnage suffered by American and French forces.

Significantly, Washington in its official statements did not condemn the Israeli bombings of Palestinian targets in the Beka'a. Indeed, President Reagan is on record as intending to punish the perpetrators of the Beirut outrage, and there are signs that his intention has not cooled.

The Israeli response itself was also significant. The targets were PLO groups aligned with the Syrian-backed Abu Mussa rebellion against Yasser Arafat. But Israeli spokesmen went out of their way to deny Lebanese media reports that the planes had hit Syrian emplacements.

Even Mr. David Kimche, the director-general of the foreign ministry, who voiced a stern warning to the Syrians over the weekend, carefully signalled that Israel would only be forced to act against them directly if the violence which they are inspiring in Lebanon continues. Although Mr. Kimche urged Damascus to take Friday's IAF bombings as a warning, there is no desire here to engage in broad hostilities with Syria; but there is a limit beyond which Israel cannot allow itself to be provoked with impunity.

There are various terrorist organizations in Lebanon - but they help one another with Syrian backing." Israeli forces in Lebanon yesterday stepped up their security precautions. The new measures included an increase in the number of guards at military installations, more barbed wire fences, placing stone blocks along routes to bases to force cars to zig-zag their way to the gates.

Work on some of these measures had begun after the attacks on the American and French bases in Beirut last month. At the entrance to the Tyre base some stone blocks had already been placed.

There will also be new measures, which will make the lives of the population more difficult, he reported. Until now Israel had tried to let the Lebanese live their lives normally, but "it seems this principle is being abused... by various hostile elements."

For many tourists who do not understand Hebrew well, these poor translations are worse than amusing; they are misleading and alienating. May I suggest that the governmental authority in charge of street sign translations consult olim, who have an idiomatic command of English, rather than Israelis with dictionaries.


