IDF officer killed in Hizbullah mortar attack

By DAVID RUDGE

An IDF officer and at least three Hizhullah gunmen were killed in separate incidents in heavy fighting in south Lehanon since. Thursday.

Lt. Yuval Nir, 22, of Rehovot, was fatally wounded in a Hizbullah mortar attack in the security zone on Friday afternoon. He died of his wounds in Haifa's Ramham Hospital. His funeral will be today at 3:30.

The incident occurred in the Ramim ridge area, some 2 to 3 kilometers from Kibbutz Menara, amid heavy exchanges between Hizhullah and IDF and South

Nir was an instructor in the officer's school who went to Lebanon on Friday with his soldiers for the third ome.

One of his friends said that Nir was wounded while in training in the paratroops, but he insisted on continuing in the unit, and went on to become an officer.

He was due to be released from the IDF in six months.

Nir is survived by his parents, a brother and a sister.

The IDF Spokesman said Nir was with his troops on foot patrol in the eastern sector in the zone, when the force came under fire from mortars. According to military sources, the mortar rounds

fell near the troops and Nir was seriously wounded by shrapnel. He was treated in the field, and evacuated by helicopter to Haifa's Rambam Hospital, but died there of his wounds.

Initial inquiries showed the mortar fire originated inside Hirbat el-Salim village. Firing from inside villages was hanned under the understandings reached at the end of Operation Grapes of Wrath last April.

During exchanges and clashes on Thursday morning, at least one Hizbullah gunman was killed hy SLA troops, apparently hy long-range fire. In a separate incident on Thursday night and the early hours of Friday morn-

ing, IDF troops killed at least two other Hizhullah gunmen in an returned fire. initiated operation north of the security zone.

That incident occurred in the Iqlim al-Toufah region in an area where Hizbullah is known to operate and to launch attacks on IDF and SLA troops and to attempt to infiltrate the security zone.

The fighting over the past few days continued yesterday with more long-range mortar attacks by Hizhullah of several IDF and SLA positions, particularly in the zone's eastern and central sectors. An SLA soldier and two civilians working in a nearby field were wounded in one attack. They were evacuated to a hospital in

According to sources in the Northern Command, there has been an escalation in Hizhullah acovides recently, especially in attempts to infiltrate the security zone and carry out attacks.

The sources said that on Thursday morning SLA troops spotted a Hizhullah squad trying to infiltrate the zone in the Ali Tahr hill range. The SLA troops opened fire, killing at least one gunman and probably wounding others, thereby thwarting the infiltration attempt.

Later that day, an IDF force operating several kilometers north of the security zone in the Iqlim

A full-scale inquiry has been launched by the UN and the Syrian authorities ioto the shooting deaths of two members of the Disengagement Observer Force (UNDOF) on the Syrian side of

the border on Friday.

A UN source said the inquiry was likely to take some time and it was still not clear whether the soldiers had been shot from close or long range.

The soldiers from the Anstrian contingent were found dead on a regular patrol route near Hadar village, on the Syrian side of the border oo the foot of Mount Hermon, some eight kilometers east of Majdal Shams.

They had both been shot twice and left lying on the patrol ronte which is regularly used by the UN troops supervising the 1974 separation of forces agreement between Israel and Syria.

The Austrian Defense Ministry identified the stain soldiers as Wolfgang Grasser and Gerhard Karitschnig.

This tragic incident is being investigated by the Austrian battalion assisted by the UN force military police and the Syrian authorities are also investigating the situation as rapidly as possihle. The force commander has met with senior Syrian military and police officers to ensure there is full cooperation between the investigating agencies, to ensure that the cause of this incident is determined as soon as possible," UNDOF chief of staff Col. G. G. Hug said in a state-

Fred Eckhard, the spokesman at UN headqoarters in New York. said the attack appeared to be criminal rather than political.

UNDOF was established in 1974 and has a force of around 1,250 soldiers from four countries, Canada, Austria, Poland, and Japan. UNDOF also supervises the agreement on the separation of forces.

Its headquarters are in-Damascus and its troops are deployed oo both sides of the border from Mount Hermon and the Golan Heights southwards to a point close to Hamat Gader where the borders of Jordan.

El-Baz here today with summit proposal

Egyptian peace envoy Osama el-Baz is due to return to Israel today for a meeting with Prime Minister Binyamin Netanyahu. El-Baz is expected to offer a package deal that would lead to a summit under the auspices of Egyptian President Hosni Mubarak, according

to government sources in Jerusalem. At the Sbarm e-Sheikh meeting with Netanyahu, Mubarak hinted in a news conference that he would initiate a summit between Netanyahn and Palestinian Authority Chairman Yasser Arafat.

The sources said that el-Baz's return to Jerusalem only three days after his last meeting with Netanyahu indicate Egypt's aim of continuing with the momentum of its mediation effort since Sharm e-Sheikh.

However, the sources cautioned that Egyptian mediacon is only meant to restart Israeli-Palestinian peace talks, and should not be expected to be anything more than that.

Meanwhile, the head of Fatah in the West Bank, Marwan Bargono, warned yesterday that the impasse in the peace talks created a real threat that an inofada could break out at any time in the territories.

Bargoud was speaking near Tiberias at an assembly of Arab, Druse and Beduin local authority heads to protest the freeze in the peace talks and the danger of the collapse of the Oslo accords.

Wiesenthal Center: UK sent Nazis to Canada

TORONTO (AP) - British officials convinced the Canadian govemment to allow almost 2,000 suspected war criminals into the country shortly after World War II, the Simon Wiesenthal Center said.

Members of the 14th SS Volunteer Grenadier Division, formed in 1943 largely from the ranks of Ukraioian and eastern European auxiliary police units, were allowed into Canada from internment camps in Britain after

Sol Littman, Canadian director of the Simon Wiesenthal Center, said he was shocked to find documents in British archives indicating that members of the division were never investigated for war crimes. He said a 1948 report indicated that only the most cursory screening was conducted.

The body of a Palestinian man from Jerusalem, suspected by the Palestinian Authority of selling land to Israelis, was found shot twice in the head on a side road south of Ramallah yesterday.

Internal Security Minister Avigdor Kahalani last night ordered police to give the murder investigation the highest priority.

This is a murder that was perpetrated by cowardly lowlifes. who killed an Israeli Arab," said Kahalani. He added that signs in the murder lead to the PA. The murdered man, Mahmoud

Ali Jamhour, 34, who lived in the capital's Shuafat refugee camp, was at the Ramallah police station at the beginning of last week and was told indirectly that what happened to land dealers like Farid Bashiti could also happen to him," said Jerusalem police spokesman Shmuel Ben-Ruby.

Ben-Ruhy did not know whether Jamhour had gone to Ramallah voluntarily or was kidnapped.

Bashio, 70, also a Jerusalem resident and an Israeli citizen, was bludgeoned to death near Ramallah police station two weeks ago, a few days after PA Jusoce Minister Freib Ahu Medein warned that Palestinians who sold land to Israelis were traitors and would be tried under a Jordanian law imposing the death penalty.

Shai Bazak, the prime minister's spokesman, was quoted on Israel Radio as saying. Land dealers are being murdered with the open encouragement of senior figures in the Palestinian Authority. This raises a question mark over the authority's readiness 10 maintain eaceful relations with Israel and human rights."

In addition to Bashiti and Jambour, another man, Harbi Abu Sarah, from the Ramallah-area village of Beit Yahrud, was murdered, reportedly for selling land

to Israetis. Palestinian human rights lawyer Khader Shkeirat of LAW, the society for the protection of human rights and the environment, reiterated his call "for the cancellation of the death penalty, and if there is any suspicion that someone sold land to Israelis he should be tried in an open, civil court."

The murder of Jamhour - the second Palestinian land dealer killed while nominally uoder Israeli security protection as an Israeli citizen or Jerusalem resident with an Israeli ID card - follows a warning hy Ahu Medein at a press conference in Ramallah last Tuesday that, "an Israeli idenoty card will not protect land dealers from the Palestinian National Authority."

The murder also raises the possihility that Israeli citizens living within the Green Line may be targeted in the same way. Abu Medein said two weeks ago that the PA opposed many land sales inside Israel, because the land was sold by unscrupulous relatives of the real owners who are refugees abroad, and who could thereby lose their claim for compensation or for the right to return in final settlement talks.

He reiterated this point at the press conference and said the PA is gathering material on such land sales in the Galilee, Ramle, Lod, and the Negev.

He also said he has a list of 200 names drawn up by Jordan when it tried Palestinian land dealers in absenóa until four years ago. At least 18 people so far have been arrested for questioning about land sales, he said. Israel Television reported that

Jamhour had sold a house in Jerusalem's mixed Jewish-Arab Ahu Tor neighborhood to Elad, an organization that purchases houses belonging to Arabs in the Jerusalem area.

In a PA cabinet meeong last month, Chairman Yasser Arafat called for acrion to be taken to prevent land sales to Jews. The cabinet placed the responsibility of preventing such sales on the security forces and the Justice Ministry.

German musician signs hotel tab 'Adolf Hitler'

A musician here with the German Opera Berlin is to be sent home in disgrace today after signing his name "Adolf Hitler" on a Herzliya hotel bar hill Friday.

The musician, identified only as a French horn player, is part of an ensemble from the Berlin Opera here for a performance with the New Israeli Opera in Tel Aviv.

The incident occurred wheo a group of German musicians was drinking in the hotel har late Friday. When the hill was brought to their table, one of the musicians signed his name as "Adolf Hitler," Tzvika Spieze, manager of the

Hasharon Hotel, complained to the New Israeli Opera and said the man was asked to leave the hotel. Opera director Hanna Munitz told Israel Radio she was shocked and disgusted by the incident.

Before last night's concert in Tel Aviv, a letter of apology from the director of the Berlin Opera, Gotz Friedrich, was read to the audience. He announced the offending musician would be fired.

The German Embassy issued a statement last night saying the musician has been summoned back to Berlin "to await severe disciplinary steps against him." The embassy referred to the musician as having been "in a state of drunkenness" at the time.

US plans to help Israel at UN.

NEW YORK - An American plan to help Israel get equal standing at the UN would boost Israel's cause by publicly exposing and embarrassing - any Western nation that

A handful of Israelis hold high-level positions in UN organizations where there are no geographical quotas. These are posts they earned as individual candidates, "in spite of being Israeli."

Israel's natural geographic affiliation would place it in the Arab group, which, in turn, is part of the Asian group. But a state cannot be admitted to a group without the consent of all its members. That has left

Until Asia admits Israel into the club, Israel should be part of the "Western European and Others" group, said David Peleg, Israel's charge d'affaires at the UN.

The Western European bloc, whose "others" are Canada, Australia, and New Zealand, also strikes Israel as its natural group - one that is based not on geography,

but on common interests and values.

Section 1522 of the US Foreign Policy Reform Act, which is wending its way through the Congress, calls on the State Department to promote full equality for Israel at the UN by encouraging the members in the "Western Europe and Others" group to accept Israel.

The secretary of state would be expected to declare, every three months, what the US had done to secure Israel's full and equal participation, and specifically to report what the members of the Western European group had told the US about Israel's acceptance.

This is expected to help overcome - by public embarrassment - some of the "we will if they will" excuses that have stymied Israeli acceptance. On occasion, a state would say it was not opposed to Israel's admission, if state has confidently relied on another unnamed member to be the naysayer.

The Israel measure is a slice of a broader American plan to try to compel UN reform. Advocates say Israel's exclusion is not Jerusalem's problem, but the UN's problem. They reason that there is something structurally wrong with an organization that does not allow all its members to participate fully.

Peleg declined to comment on the legislation, but he agreed with its premise. "It is the responsibility of the UN to ensure _ that its members are not discriminated against," he said last week. "Because Israel is the only UN member state which is not a member of a geographical group. there is a discrimination against Israel, and this runs contrary to the principles enshrined of the UN charter speaking of nobody else was opposed, either. But each universality of UN membership."

in which FIS had taken a commanding lead. Mahfoud Nahnah, leader of the Islamistoriented Movement for a Peaceful Society, scheduled a rally yesterday in his strong-hold at Blida, 50 km south of Algiers, to hammer home his opposition to both hard-line Islamists and their secularist foes.

AND RA. (Seates) - Ti(military chiefs yesterday turk up the beat on Islamist Prime Minister Necmettin Erbakan, using a closed-door session of the National Security Council to repeat their demands for an anti-Islamist crackdown.

The army-domioated council met for more than five hours twice the scheduled time - to review the government's progress in curbing what the armed forces see as mounting threats to Turkey's official secular order.

"Information was presented to the council and an assessment was made about measures taken related to Islamist activities against the [secular] state system," the NSC said in a communique issued after the talks.

"Peace and security across the country, affected by internal and external developments, were reviewed at the meeting," the statement said.

The army, spearheading an attack by Turkey's secularist elite, first challenged Erbakan to move against his own grassroots supporters at the council's February 28 meeting.

It issued an 18-point anti-Islamist package, including bans

er traditional Muslim dress and Sarp limitations on Koranic edu-

Since then, the army has largely been content to allow civilian leaders and the secularist media to chip away at Ernakan's 11-monthold coalition with pro-Western

conservatives. The tactics have prompted a series of defections by conservative MPs and ministers - all decrying Erbakan's failure to implement

the army directives. On Friday, the government lost its majority in parliament, leaving it one seat short of the 276 votes oeeded to win a confidence vote. Before the formal meeting yes-terday, Erbakan joined dignitaries at a ceremony to mark the coun-

cil's founding in the 1930s. The event appeared to be aimed at boosting the profile of the army, which has deposed three civilian governments in four decades, ahead of the monthly NSC meet-

Singer named to Portugal Nazi panel

LISBON (Reoter) - Israel Singer, general secretary of the World Jewish Congress, has joined a special commission helping to investigate gold which Portugal received from Nazi Germany during World War II, the country's central bank said Friday.

A statement announced the appointment of Singer and a Portuguese academic, Professor Jaime Reis of the European Institute in Florence, as members of the three-man commission, headed by former president Mario Soares.

The group will accompany the work of economic historian Joaquim Costa Leite, who was appointed last December by the Bank of Portugal to investigate its gold dealings in the years 1937 to 1946.

The board of the Bank believes that the Commission's work will be fundamental to attaining the goals of total transparency and historical clarification," the statement said.

Neutral Portugal was the second largest buyer of gold from Germany after Switzerland during World War II, giving rise to suspicions that some of the bullion bought was looted.

Protesters smashed shop windows, stoned cars and burned a national flag after security forces fired teargas at around 2,000 people in central Uhuru Park as they

started the rally with prayers. Police armed with automatic rifles in full riot gear, deployed downtown. Troops ringed parliament and state-owned radio and

television stations. "We are here to defy the illegal law called the Public Order Act, because it is against the constitution, which states that there is

freedom of assembly and associa-

tion," opposition MP Martin Shikuku said at the rally. The National Convention Assembly (NCA), an umbrella for church leaders and opposition

parties, called the rally to press for a minimum package of constitutional reform before elections later this year.



Fire at French nuclear plant

PARIS (Reuter) - A fire at a nuclear power station in central France forced the plant to scale down its operations, officials said yesterday. The transformer fire in a non-nuclear section of the Dampierre-en-Burly station in the Loiret department Friday

night was quickly brought under control.

The fire caused a large explosion, forcing the power station to reduce its overall operations. Plant management said repairs could take several weeks.

Corsicans believed behind France bomb

MARSEILLE (AP) - A bomb ripped through a post office in this Mediterranean port before dawn yesterday, causing heavy damage but no injuries in another attack police linked to Corsican militants. The powerful bomb exploded in the Capalette district post office at 1:30 a.m., destroying the customer service area. Residents kilometers across town said they heard the explosion. There was no claim of responsibility for the attack, but police said they suspected the Corsican National Liberation Front-Historic Branch.

The blast came a day after a bomb destroyed the port terminal in Corsica's southern port of Propriano.

Russian soldier kills 6 comrades

CHITA, Russia (AP) - Police and army troops used combat vebicles this weekend to search for a Russian soldier who killed six of his comrades.

Pvt. Yevgeny Gorbunov, who was drafted last year, shot an officer and five soldiers guarding military stores Thursday at his unit in Siberia, about 4,700 kilometers east of Moscow. The motive for the shooting was not known. Poor morale and underfunding in the Russian military have led to a series of shootings involving soldiers. Some of the recent incidents also have been blamed on severe hazing, a chronic problem for young recruits.

RIO DE JANEIRO (Reuter) - A bus passenger shot dead the driver because he missed his stop Friday. Osmi Menezes Moreira, 24, went up to driver Jose Hermogeno, 62, and shot him in the chest, after he drove past the stop at which Moreira wanted to get off. Moreira was arrested after trying to escape and shooting at police officers.

Korean rioters demand president quit

SEOUL (AP) - Thousands of students demanding the president's resignation hurled firebombs at police in street clashes yesterday that filled Seoul's main streets with explosions and broken bottles.

About 330 students were detained for questioning in protests over the past two days, but 219 of them were released.

One student suffered a minor burn from a firebomb thrown by another student A 19year-old student was hospitalized after showing symptoms of a heart attack during a rally

In his last year in office, President Kim Young-sam is struggling with his biggest political crisis vet.

Earlier this month, one of his sons was arrested on bribery charges. He himself faces opposition charges that he spent more than the

legal limit on his 1992 campaign.

On Friday, he offered a vague apology and urged people to leave the dispute behind to focus on more urgent national issues such as the slumping economy

But a day later, 12,000 students had taken to the streets, shaking metal pipes and chanting: "Kim Young-sam step down! Reveal the election funds!" Hundreds of students waved firebombs and hurled them in unison. The bottles exploded in an orange blaze among riot police.

Several policemen were engulfed in flames but were quickly rescued by colleagues. More firebombs were thrown in several other clashes.

Riot police lobbed volleys of tear gas to push back the students. But the students regrouped with more firebombs. Sporadic clashes continued for hours.

Opposition parties say Kim spent 20 times the legal limit of 37 billion won (NIS 160 million) for his 1992 election. One opposition party has said it has evidence to prove that but has not disclosed it. In a nationally televised speech Friday, Kim

acknowledged he spent "a great sum" of money and apologized for "past wrongdoings." That was seen as all but admitting to dubious spending.

The opposition rejected Kim's statement and said it would push for a parliamentary hearing and a special prosecutor to investigate his campaign spending.

Opposition parties lack enough seats in the National Assembly to force a parliamentary investigation. But they hope to mobilize enough public support to compel Kim's ruling party to launch one.



All of these technical terms may be of no interest to the user of, for example, the celebrated Encyclopedia Judaica CD-ROM Edition, but that mooumental new piece of software would bave been impossible to create without the belp of LiveLink.

LiveLink programmed the CD-ROM with tools including fielded search, the ability to explore articles by category, a sortable media gallery and the automatic play of all media.

It coded over one million hyperlinks and thousands of multimedia files for the Judaica disk. For another customer. Orbotech, LiveLink automatically converted engineering documents to HTML (hypertext markup language), enabling Orbotech's staffers to quickly reach data via their in-house

THE JERUSALEM Post used LiveLink to belp transfer - in five working days - five years of the daily paper to a CD-ROM. The Post's disk offers full-text fielded search, a photo gallery and an extensive array of navigational links. In addition, LiveLink wrote filters for automatic conversion of the daily newspaper for use in the electronic archive. Reichman, sitting in his indus-

trial-building office in the Shattner Center of Jerusalem's Givat Shaul quarter, expects that if present trends continue, LiveLink will outgrow its premises and require additional

"We interview only about one in 50 who apply," he notes. "There's always a shortage of good people in this field, but we're a good place to work, and we've had very little turnover." Since LiveLink's niche is unique, "there isn't really a way people can train elsewbere to do what they have to do bere, so we train those with the required knowledge."

What lies ahead? "The high tech field is built on aggressive changes and improvements. My only fear in the long term is that people might say they've had enough, that what they have suits them fine and they don't want a new improved version. Vacuum cleaners, for example, haven't changed in any significant way in decades because the way they are suits their use."

Nevertheless, in five years or so, Reichman "would like to believe the company will have a couple hundred million dollars in sales," further boosting the good name of Israeli software entrepreneurs whose innovations have made Israel a worldwide name in the field.

Baderech Lama'adim (Next Step Mars), a Hebrew-language CD-ROM distributed by Mirage Multimedia, translated from the original English-language disk by OED New Media and IVI Publishing, for children aged 5 to 14, NIS 199. Rating: four stars out of five

Adjust your oxygen tube, seal your helmet and prepare for blastoff. These two disks take users on a wonderful visit to outer space without all the discomfort of weightlessness and the claustrophobia of a shuttle flight. The programs - the first on the universe in general and the second zooming in on the planet Mars - use two different approaches

to this vast subject. The CET disk is an eye-opening piece of software, a real educational experience enriched with highquality video films from the US National Aeronautics and Space Agency and the National Optical Astronomy Observatories. Worked on by an impressive team that include several Ph.Ds. the program provides encyclopedic information about space. There are 25 major subjects, including all the planets and other parts of the Milky Way, that can be clicked. Each of these topics is divided into sections: an "identity card," size, composition, weather, moons, trajectory, research, mythological and histori-

Everything you ever wanted to know about outer space - on one

Using a very imaginative multimedia technique, mixing text, photographs, animation, sound and video, everything one could possihly want to know about space is here on the disk. Particularly amusing are the cartoon-like icons of green space creatures that, when clicked, produce a video clip on the relevant subject.

The subject matter is very comprehensive: if you click on the history button for the Earth, you will get the Jewish view on creation, with quotes from the Bible, followed by the viewpoints of the ancient Egyptians, the Indians and the Mayans.

A separate button is a lexicon for

over 100 different scientific terms such as pulsars, supernova and spectroscope, which are explained in clear language. The bibliography in each subject area offers sources of further information - unfortunately all of the books are in Hebrew, with no English sources - as well as the addresses of relevant Internet addresses. CET has its own Internet site, with a sub-site for this disk: bttp://cet.ac.il/~science/space.

This is a perfect model for teaching any academic subject in a serious, comprehensive and enjoyable way. Although it's meant for the home market, it could easily be used in school science classes. It's a Oz and return home to Kansas.

shame that CET has no plans to translate the disk into English, as it should certainly find a market among space-bungry American youngsters.

The Mars disk teaches about the mysterious red planet using much scientific material, but wrapping it up as a child's adventure. The program opens with the presentation of a Stonehenge-like circle of standing stones that come to life as humanoids living on Mars. This "council" urges the user to conducresearch about the planet and then report by k with information or, why with information or, why with ingrane so eager to know more a out Mars and how "important" Each is in the universe. Even without carrying out these assignments, the user has at his disposal a vast array of information.

It starts by suggesting you collect a basketball, large and small orange. two marbles, two peas, one grain of rice and one tomato seed to visualize the difference in sizes of the various planets.

The program, which uses very pleasant graphies but much less video material and text than the CET disk, divides the subject among four historical periods: from 400 BCE to 1930 CE, 1931 to 1970, 1971 to 1991, and from then "to the future." Information about all the astronomers, philosophers and scientists who have spoken or written about Mars are mentioned, as are superpower leaders like John F. Kennedy and Nikita Khrushchev. whose space programs competed with each other.

One very charming touch is the use of two red sneakers that must be clicked to get out of each section of the program: they click their heels together, exactly as Dorothy did with her red shoes to escape from

Running away with the color

hy does the color in jeans leach out during washing? I always wash jeans by hand because I fear they will ruin all other clothes. Do the companies purposely make the color impermanent or is this type of color impossible to make permanent? Sherry, Jerusalem.

Dr. Bina Zvilichovsky, director of the Israel Fiber Institute in Jerusalem, comments:

The original color used to make hlue jeans was indigo, which grows in India. I don't know how stable it is. But today's fashion prefers that jeans look

faded, so less-than-permanent colors and a stonewashing process are purposely used to make them lose color in the washing. I always wash blue jeans in the machine at up to 35 degrees Centigrade with colored clothes, but only after washing them at least three times by hand to remove the excess

There is cloth called "jeans" that is not blue, but gray or brown or another color. You can't know in advance if their colors will leach out into the washing water, so treat them with cau-

I advise all consumers to be careful in their choice of washing detergent. If you're washing

colored clothes, never use detergents that list bleaching agents on their label. Also, never huy clothing without a tag listing the manufacturer,

what the item is made of and washing instructions - or you may be sorry when you take it out of the washing machine.

When making a tiled floor, one can easily use triangles, rectangles and hexagons to cover the floor in a repeating pattern. But just try a pentagon. It doesn't work. Why? Orna, Omer. Prof. Amos Altshuler, dean of the science facul-

ty at Ben-Gurion University of the Negev and a member of the mathematics department, explains: A patterned floor will work only with triangles, squares, rectangles and hexagons - each with equal sides - and no other geometric shape. A pentagon bas 108 degrees in each angle. If you put their corners together, you wouldn't get 360 degrees (the meeting point of the angles is like the center of a circle) without leaving gaps. A hexagon has 120 degrees in each angle, a rectangle 90 degrees and a triangle 60, so these all fit perfectly hy making multiples that add up to 360 degrees.

Robots set to join local workforce

By POST SCIENCE REPORTER They look a bit like an over-

grown R2D2 - the Star-Wars robot. Called AGV, standing for automatic guided vehicles, these high-tech devices are meant to distribute food and collect dirty laundry in prisons, hand out mail m office buildings, handle mer-chandise at distribution centers, transfer containers between ships and storage areas and serve as a working platform in car assembly lines. Technion researchers are developing software to maximize the use of these automatic vehicles in the workplace.

AGVs don't take long lunch breaks, never get the flu and don't go on strike for higher wages. Offices and factories in the US, Europe and the Far East are increasingly using them to improve efficiency. But merely buying them is not enough to make them efficient, says Dr. David Sinceich of the Technion's faculty of industrial engineering and management in Haifa. Loading and discharging stations must be set up, and routes determined to allow the AGVs to travel speedily and safely between stations, without bumping into one another. "Our aim is to create an optimal system with simple routes for maximizing the AGVs' work potential."

Prof. Joe Tanchoco of Purdue University in Indiana; Sinreich proposes the use of a "segmented bi-directional single loop" that can be separated into several segments, allowing each vehicle to go back and forth without colli-sions. Each route can be tested using computerized simulations to see if it is reliable and feasible.

The adoption of AGVs in Israel has been slow, but some workplaces, including Iscar cutting-tools factory at the Tefen industrial park, and Studio 4, a ceramics factory in Beit Shemesh, already have this state of the art technology. Thanks to the AGVs, only two or three workers are needed to operate the factories' second and third shifts. There are several other

places in Israel that can profit from this kind of automation, such as chemical or plastics factories and; various marketing chains. And, at our robotics lab, we are working on programs to integrate several types of vehicles, each with different capabilities. I believe it's just a matter of time before this technology is widely embraced in Israel,"

Allergies worsened by hamsin

The late rains followed by hot days this winter and spring have caused an unusual proiteration of weeds and an unusually high incidence of hay fever, according to allergy experts at Kupat Helim Clalit's Lin Clinic in Haifa. The clinic reports large mmbers of patients - often more than 100 per day - seeking help for their allergies. Lin director Dr. Reuven Brannstein said the increased amount of pollen from ragweed has been making a lot of people miserable in recent weeks.

Hay-fever symptoms include runny nose, sneezing, itching in the nose and ears, eye infections and skin rashes. Short-term respiratory problems called seasonal asthma are also among the complaints. The problem, says Braunstein, is exacerbated by hamsin weather, when low clouds hold air pollution close to the ground.

There are very effective drugs for hay fever, and there is a preventive vaccine that can be given after an acute attack ends. Sometimes the vaccine wears off. but in many cases it retains its prorective effect for years, he adds.


The national health insurance law, which came into effect twoand-a-half years ago, and the patients' rights law, which was passed last year, are complicated documents full of fine print. Now, company called Economic Leverage Ltd., based in Tel Aviv, has produced a computer diskette

The genetic disease, more common among Ashkenazi Jews, can canse swelling of the spleen and liver, anemia, fragile bones and severe disability in some patients, while others have a milder form. Prof. Ari Zimran, head of the

national Gaucher's disease center at Jerusalem's Shaare Zedek Hospital, explains that Cerezyme, the genetically engineered drug, has a number of benefits over the natural enzyme: it's safer, its supply is not dependent on the collection of placentas, from which Ceredase is extracted; and the meatment can be given once a week or two, and not three times a week, yet with the same efficacy as

Shame on Southeast Asia

The right of the Association of Southeast Asian Nations (ASEAN) to admit whoever it likes into the club deserves respect, but its decision yesterday to admit Burma was extremely unfortunate. ASEAN made the principle of non-interference in its members' internal affairs a golden rule. With the admission of Burma, they have turned it into a golden calf (or better, perhaps, a golden ostrich) - all that is needed is uncritical worship of the mantra.

Burma is not just another of those states with dubious internal practices or a shaky democracy. It is a vicious military dictatorship whose leaders are sworn enemies of democracy. It should stand alongside North Korea as a pariah among Asian nations. It will be the only state in the ASEAN group that actually held a democratic election and refused to allow the winners to take power. Not only that, it has since persecuted and imprisoned the democrats, and defied world outrage to keep caged the Nobel peace laureate, Aung San Suu Kyi.

Despite the impending dehate over its ASEAN membership, Burma in 1996 managed to turn in the worst ever record for buman rights abuses, according to Amnesty International. That is a sure sign that ASEAN's pursuit of the much discredited foreign policy of non-interference and "constructive engagement" (wbicb used to be called appeasement) will influence the despicable Burmese military junta not one

The generals will bleat and complain in the manner of all such regimes about Western plots and American interference. This is complete nonsense - the abuses of Burma against its own people are a special case. The world has as much right to complain about Burma in ASEAN

as ASEAN (and Washington) would bave a right to complain about Serbia in the European Union. Laos and Cambodia were also admitted to ASEAN yesterday. No one would claim these two states live up to stable democratic or economic standards yet - but no one criticized ASEAN's decision. Indeed, Cambodia and Laos are to be applauded and welcomed into partnership with their neighbors - Indonesia, Malaysia, Singapore, Thailand, Brunei, the Philippines, and Vietnam - in the 30-year-old forum. It shows how far they bave come, and their enthusiasm for a bright new future.

In Burma's case it would appear that economic expediency and a desire to bring all 10 Southeast Asian states into the forum on its 30th anniversary bave prevailed over good judgment. ASEAN was grossly wrong to disregard a fervent appeal from Suu Kyi to exclude Burma. After all, she is the leader of the party that won the 1990 elections which the Burmese tyrants have since refused to honor.

Even as she made a smuggled video this week to appeal to the ASEAN leaders, the military usurpers were incarcerating 300 of ber support-

"What the people of Burma risk is the possibility that admission into ASEAN will make the regime even more obdurate and oppressive than ever," said Suu Kyi. She should know. In ignoring her appeal, the ASEAN leaders bave rejected democrats in favor of despots. In making this shameful capitulation to the strong-arm brigands of Rangoon, they have tainted their admirable anniversary celebrations.

The imprisoned democrats in the jails of ASEAN's newest member will bave little to celebrate. In this decision, neither does ASEAN.

Turkey's military leaders are the uncompromising guardians of the secular legacy of Kemal Ataturk, the founder of the modern nation whose name for decades has had a mystical patriotic power. They would be wrong to conclude that a military coup would be the way to safeguard them. Turkey under a military coup is scarcely more palatable than Turkey under Islamic fundamentalists. They must be patient and hope, like Turkey's democratic allies, that Erbakan will go

They came to challenge the Netanyahu government's recent announcement that it would privatize the management of 5,000 units of public housing, ostensibly as a pilot project.

They also learned about a committee currently meeting in secret to investigate the outright sale of their homes. The tenants responded with a vocal rally outside the Jerusalem International Conference Center last Monday, while the prime minister addressed an anti-poverty confer-

ence inside. While plans for the sale of El Al and other state enterprises are relatively open and involve consultation with the workers, the government's intentions for the human services are masked in secrecy, contrary to the practice in the West. Here it appears that residents of public housing do not warrant consideration regarding decisions affecting their future

Overall, Israel has a high rate of bome ownership, about 80 percent. But there are also 150,000 units of public housing, accommodating some 200,000 individuals, many of them elderly, with the remainder largely single parents. large families, and people with disabilities.

These units are mixed in with privately-owned apartments, almost always in poor neighborhoods, although there are no public housing "ghettos" as are found in Britain and the US:

The queue to enter public housing - especially in the center of the country and the major cities is long, because of the high cost and low vacancy rate in the private sector.

Governments privatize for two reasons: ideological (a belief system regarding the government's proper role) and economic (the argument that the private sector does it better or cheaper].

Ideological justifications are not really relevant here, as few if any voters chose the Likud (or Binyamin Netanyahu) because of privatization. In fact, the current agenda merely follows the directions previously set by the Labor



Shaky transplant

ossi Beilin has announced that if he wins the Labor leadership primary on Tuesday, he will form a "shadow cabinet

The concept of a shadow cabinet, as practiced in the British parliamentary system, has some real virtues. It is a training ground for potential cabinet ministers, and serves as a platform from which to launch alternate policy initiatives to those being offered by the government.

But applying the concept within the structure of the Israeli parliamentary system poses some real problems, which make its success doubtful.

First, the British shadow cabinet operates within the broader concept of a loyal opposition (the emphasis being on loyal).

The loyal opposition may differ strongly with the government's policies. Its response is to offer constructive alternate policies, and to present them as bills for consideration by parliament. The audience for the loyal opposition is the British electorate, who will decide the outcome of the next

The loyal opposition focuses its principal response to the government on issues, not on personalities. It respects the current ministers, who are serving in response to an electoral mandate, and expects the same respect from the loyal opposition when the electorate dictates a change of govemment.

The recent changeover in Britain's government bears witness to the soundness of the sys-

Ministers who are on record as holding widely opposing views have changed sides of the aisle, and the electorate knows hy and large what major changes are in store under the new government.

ISRAEL has no operational loyal opposition. Here, personal invective dominates parliamentary debate...

One rarely sees the ideas of the opposition presented in legislative form for consideration by the Knesset. The object of opposition rhetoric is all too often to delegitimize ministers through personal attacks.

This, unfortunately, has characterized every Knesset since the foundation of the state. The recent attempt by opposi-

A shadow cabinet for Israel? We don't even have a loyal opposition

tion MKs to appeal to foreign governments to endorse their views - going over the beads of both the government in power and the electorate that voted for that government - is another illustration of how far govern-ment here is from the British concept of a loyal opposition.

Beyond these considerations, another major problem stands in the way of applying the concept of a shadow cabinet in the

The British parliament has two major parties which alternately get a mandate to govern.

In Israel, there has never been a party with a majority in the Knesset. Elections are inevitably followed by a scramble to form a viable coalition government. The price for attracting coalition part-

ners is ministerial portfolios. The whole idea of serving as a minister in a shadow cabinet is to step up and assume the same portfolio when the government changes. One who serves for some time as a shadow minister and is then denied the prize will rightly feel embittered and estranged from the new government. In the process, the support of good, experienced people for the government will be lost.


Even with the best of will, under the present Israeli parliamentary system the prime minister does not have the power necessary to distribute portfolios to a 'shadow cabinet" in the way a British prime minister does. Not even the direct election of the prime minister has changed this basic fact. This makes the formation of a shadow cabinet counterproductive.

It would seem that Beilin is seeking to transplant an idea that works well in Britain to an eavironment in which it would be doomed to failure.

To create the setting for a meaningful, functional shadow cabinet would require a major structural overhaul of the entire Israeli parliamentary system.

Just now, it would be a major accomplishment if Beilin could introduce the concept of a loyal opposition - starting with himself into the Knesset.



Capturing wildlife

By DAVID BRAUNER

for most of us, wildlife photography d confures up images of hig cats on African savannas or the incandescent colors of exotic birds in the Amazon jungle. And we are conditioned to see intrepid photographers behind lenses as long as artillery pieces, lying in wait, ready to "bag" their prey in a click of time.

But to photograph wildlife does not necessarily mean going to the ends of the earth or investing thousands in equipment. The animal kingdom is as nearby as an open window or a small patch of garden, and your point-and-shoot 35 mm. camera is fine for many subjects. And interestingly, the more you look, the more you will see.

Here in Jerusalem, on our traditional Shabbat walk, we recently spotted a nicesized box turtle crossing the road. Further afield, in the Hinnom Valley we watched the fascinating behavior of goats standing precariously on their hind legs to reach an arboreal lunch of olive-branch leaves.

When the starlings in their thousands come to town in winter, they make classic photos roosting on the television aerials across the road. And the ducks and swans swimming in the pond at Jerusalem's Botanical Gardens are another accessible subject for the amateur wildlife photograph-

Good reflexes, patience, planning and perseverance are essential to wildlife photography because most animals are skinish and fast. Semi-wild street cats, as a domestic example, generally run away at the first sound of human presence.

Good animal pictures capture characteristic poses, showing the face and eyes. Assuming you get close, but the subject is turned away or, perhaps, husy preening, try attracting its attention with a low whistle or soothing animal noise.

There is nothing illegitimate about bringing an animal in range with an offering of food or water. Israeli nature photographer Yossi Eshbol, who for the past 20 years has painstakingly studied local animal habits and habitats, sometimes huilds "working relationships" with his subjects.

Learning about animal behavior in order to know when to go out and where to find your subjects is important. Wild animals, (David Brauser) especially those in our hot climate, are most

active in the early morning or late afternoon, when, incidentally, the light is softer and more flattering.

Animals congregate wherever there is water. On the banks of the Jordan River, I've seen a buge porcupine, and the blue-feathered kingfisher. Or if you happen to live near the seaside or in a port city, you'll find the sea gulls gathering where fishermen are casting or the boats come in.

One problem with wildlife photography is the protective coloration of many animals that blends in with the background. In an encounter with a herd of ibex near Mitzpe Ramon. I found that the animals matched the drahness of the desert so well that there was little contrast.

In such situations, the photographer should try to find an angle that will silhouene the animal against the sky, or attempt to get close enough to fill the frame with the subject. Move slowly, or sit motionlessly and wait. Sometimes the animal's natural curiosity will surprisingly bring it closer to

Zoos and game reserves are controlled environments where one can gain excellent wildlife photography experience. The Jenusalem Zoo, the Safari Park at Ramat Gan and the alligator farm in the Hamat Gader resort are three good attractions in Israel where there are not even any bars to impede clean shots.

Though, as we said at the outset, one doesn't need a whole gadget bag full of equipment to get good wildlife shots, it goes without saying that a single-lens reflex (SLR) camera with a 100-300 mm. fixed telephoto lens or an equivalent zoom will greatly improve your animal photography.

Long lenses have two major disadvantages. First, depth of field (what is in sharp focus) becomes very shallow with wider apertures. Secondly, the bulkier, heavier telescopic lens is hard to hold steady. A tripod and a cable release solve both problems, thus ensuring sharpness and quality.

Last but not least, anyone who tries wildanimal photography, at whatever level, should be prepared to expect failures. As one professional writes, "I have made more exposures than I care to remember of birds without wings or heads, and many others hopelessly out of focus." But when you get it right, there's nothing more satisfying than capturing animals on film.

HEADS 'N' TAILS

Put your animal's feet first

By D'YORA BEN SHAUL

Sooner or later pet-owners will have to deal with the grooming of their animal's feet. Feet fall into two basic types in the ani-. mal world. (The exception being monkeys and apes, whose feet are very similar to the human foot. For those rare people who keep ages as pets they only need to clip their toenails occasionally.) We can divide other human-owned animals into two groups: those that have claws, such as dogs, cats, birds and rodents, and those with hooves.

In fact a hoof is essentially a gigantic fingernail. They come in two styles, a full hoof, which donkeys and horses have, and cloven hooves, which goats, sheep, cows and pigs have.

If these animals are kept as pets then the owners must pay attention to their claws or hooves. Domesticated animals do not live a "natural" life and therefore lack the opportunity to care for their hooves or claws in a natural manner.

Whatever kind of claw you want to trim, it is necessary to buy a claw clipper. This is a kind of scissor that is cheap and available at pet shops. It is good for trimming dog claws, bird claws and even, in some cases, bird beaks, not to speak of overgrown rodent claws. This scissor, cutting in a round form, neatly trims, leaving no split edges as would be made by flat-bladed scissors. And remember, dog claws need a trim whenever they are long enough to click when

they touch the floor. You should pay special attention to the claw on dewclaws. It's bad enough to have this glob of flesh (that should have been removed at birth) dangling on the hind leg with-

For goats and sheep, the best trimmer is a simple garden shear, or secateur. Try to trim the hoof so that no horny material is curled under the foot. Look at the hoof of a small kid or lamb and use it as a guide.

When it comes to horses and donkeys the problem is a bit more complicated. Your horse is most proba-

out equipping it with a curved claw bly shod but you must not stint. Call that can catch on everything. grown a few millimeters. Signs of this will be obvious because the hoof shows a slight hulge just above the steel rim. This is very important. More good horses have been lamed by the lack of baving new shoes put on in time than from any other cause. And don't forget a hoof pick. Check horses after every

outing for stones lodged in the hoof. Donkeys, unshod in general, need less attendon from a farrier but you should equip yourself with good, strong rasps and give the hooves a filing at frequent intervals. Keeping feet in good condition is

one of the more demanding jobs that a pet owner faces but it is a job that can ultimately save the mobility of the animal and is therefore a must.

Stockton heroics lifts Utah to West crown

Jazz travel to Chicago for Game 1 of finals

2:15 a.m. tomorrow Israel time.

HOUSTON (AP) - Finally, the Utah Jazz can be called finalists. After three failures in the Western Conference finals in the previous five years, John Stockton made a huzzer-beating 3-pointer from 25 feet to give Utah a dra-matic 103-100 victory over the Houston Rockets in Game 6

Thursday night.
It ended Utah's cycle of losing its biggest games and allowed the Jazz to achieve the one accolade that has eluded them throughout their history. This time, they are truly champi-

ouship contenders. And almost all the credit goes to

Stockton. Stockton's winning shot capped Utah's comeback from a sevenpoint deficit over the final two minutes and set off a wild celehration at midcourt by the Jazz, who became the first road team to win a game in the series.

'l want to savor what we've accomplished so far," Stockton said. "First thing tomorrow, we'll

start preparing for the Bulls,"
Game 1 of the NBA finals is tonight at Chicago.

It will be the first trip to the championship round for every member of the Jazz, from future Hall of Famers Stockton and Karl Malone, with a combined 25 years of NBA experience, to veterans Jeff Homacek (11 years), Antoine Carr (13 years) and the rest of Utah's role players.

Even Jerry Sloan, the most tenured coach in the NBA after nine years with the Jazz, will be going to the final round for the first time. He never made it in 11 years as a player or in three seasons as coach of the Chicago Bulls from 1979-82.

Jazz: 'Ready to rumble'

CHICAGO (AP) - If the Chicago Bulls show up for the NBA finals expecting to win just because they've been there before and the Utah Jazz haven't, they will be in trouble. Michael Jordan says the Bulls must be smart equiph to ignore con-

ventional wisdom, which would suggest that the Jazz are satisfied to merely reach the finals after years of near misses. Not one Utah player ever has gotten this far. Neither has coach Jerry

The Bulls? Jordan, Scottie Pippen and coach Phil Jackson are going

for their fifth title in seven years. Dennis Rodman and Robert Parish have won three championships each. In fact, hackup center Brian Williams will be the only Chicago player making his first finals appearance when the best-of-7 series begins

tonight at the United Center. "I don't think you want to put too much emphasis on that because when we won in '91, that was the same scenario," Jordan said Friday. "We had never won. We had never been into the finals. We played against a team that was very experienced, the Lakers, and yet we won in five."

The Jazz have every reason to believe in themselves. They have Karl Malone, who edged out Jordan for league MVP hon-

ors, All-Star guard John Stockton and a talented supporting cast.

The Bulls' 69-13 record matched the second-best in NBA history, trailing only their 72-10 of last season. But even though the Jazz won "only" 64 regular-season games, they actually have a better record than Chicago since the All-Star break - 42-7 to 38-9, including playoff games.

And while Chicago is coming off an ugly, unimpressive victory over hard-working, but talent-shy Miami in the Eastern Conference finals, Utah enters the finals on the heels of a sensational triumph over a superb Houston club that many expected to reach the championship series. "What we did as a team, it's totally awesome," Malone said. "I'm so

proud. What's most important is to oot be sadsfied just being there." Said Antoine Carr, Utah's backup center: "We worked long and hard for it and finally got that chance. All I can say is: 'Let's get ready to rum-

The Bulls, of course, never back down from a rumble. That's why they are the defending champions. That's why they have four championship

"But it's getting harder and harder to defend being king of the hill because everybody's shooting at you," said Jordan.



Slaney's case is not yet over. She was found to have high levels of testosterone in her body at the US trials last June.

Under IAAF rules, athletes are banned immediately after the positive test pending an inquiry. But under US regulations an athlete is not suspended until the competitor has had time to have a hearing.

Dollar closes volatile week higher

NEW YORK - The dollar Friday closed a qualify for the proposed single European cur-lolatife week higher against the German mark, rency, or "Euro." But the Bundesbank has 116.28 Japanese yen from 116.18 yer. volatife week higher against the German mark. bolstered by concern about plans for a single European currency, a rebound in US stocks and comments from a key US financial official.

A proposal by the German government to revalue the Bundesbank's currency and gold reserves sparked a fierce debate this week between government and central bank officials.

The government wants the revaluation in order to free up cash that can be used to slash Germany's budget deficit and help the nation objected strenuously to the revaluation, saying it infringed on the bank's independence.

On Friday, Bundesbank council member Reimut Jochimsen said the government's plans to revalue currency and gold reserves marked a "dramatic conflict" with the central bank that must be played out fully in public.

On Friday the dollar soared toward 1.71 marks before retreating. In late New York trading Friday, the dollar fetched 1.7061 marks, up from The dollar climbed to 1.4142 Swiss francs

from Sfr 1.4105, but fell to Canadian \$1.3783 from C\$1.3805. The British pound edged up to \$1.6405, compared with \$1.6403.

Further support for the dollar emerged in comments by William McDonough, president of the New York Federal Reserve Bank. In response to a question at the World Forex Conference in Toronto, McDonough said a strong dollar is in the interest of the US.

Discount, where he was director of the projects branch responsible for financing real estate and building projects.

While Prime Minister Binyamin Netanyahu gave the Ronen Committee's proposals his full backing, other ministers expressed a variety of reservations. Among the bodies opposing the report are the Jewish National Fund and farmers' organizations across the country.

The JNF believes that the reform will move much of the country's state-owned land into the hands of private citizens, including non-Jews.

The Ronen report's major strategy goals are: the protection and preservation of agricultural land in the central area and the need to provide land for the annual construction of 50,000 homes over the next 20 years.

El Al sale plan to be presented today

The blueprint for the privatization of El Al, including a plan to allow Shabbat flights, will be handed to Prime Minister Binyamin Netanyahu and Transport Minister Yitzhak Levy today.

The plan has already received criticism from across the political spectrum, particularly regarding the Shabbat issue.

Since coming into office, Levy has said he will not allow El Al to fly on Shabbat and will not tolerate an increase in violations of Shabbat.

The plan allows for El Al flights on Shabbat as long as the total traffic volume does not exceed its current level. This proposal has also been criticized by MKs who say it will alienate foreign airline carriers that will have to accommodate El Al's entry into the weekend market.

According to the plan of the government-appointed committee, El Al is to be privatized via a 100 percent public flotation on the Tel Aviv Stock Exchange in the first half of 1998. The document also calls for El Al security to remain in the hands of the government and for firm guarantees to workers on their employment and dismissal rights.






The Mount Scopus campus – dedicated in 1925, cut off in 1948, regained in 1967, rebuilt and expanded, and thriving in 1997.
