## The Buckley Caper

Senator Buckley's possible last-minute entry as a
Presidential candidate appears to be more sensational Presidential candidate appears to be more sensational that the Repubican coovention, weary of a deadlock between President Ford and Governor Reagan,will turn to the fresh face of the New York conservative; stranger things have happened in cooventions. But on almost
every count the episode looks like a tactical byplay. Although the Senator cannot formally be placed in nomination without a majority of five state delegations -all but impossible-he needs no such designation to get the vote of anyone wbo cares to. give it to him.
Such votes may be few, but they can, theoretically, deny a first-ballot majority to either of the leading confenders. The question is, who would give Mr. Buckley their votes-Ford's suppoiters or those for Reagan? President Ford would be the psycbological loser if
the maneuver forced a second balloy, releasing delegates he maneuver forced a second ballot, releasing delegates
legally bound to him who really favor Mr. Reagan; but he would gain if there were extended balloting and conservatives were genuinely split between Reagan and Buckley.
Mr. Reagan would lose, psychologically, if the votes
came from his supporters, reducing his total on the first ballot. He-has to win over, on that ballot, practically all the votes still uncommitted if he is to have a chance at the nomination. Losing some to Buckley would hardly enhance bis chances, and some of his managers have Iready indicated displeasure at the Buckley move.
Who gains, then, from that maneuver? Possibly tho Reagan folliowers who want the Californian for President but not Senator Schweiker for Vice President. Senator Tower of Texas. a Ford supporter, sees the effort as be forerunner of a "Dumip Schwelker", movement whose promoters will gladly drop.
