## 'Madness' in Argentina

 Argentina's military, rulers have used all the rightwords in condemning the mass murders of 47 people by tords in cong terrorist organizations; but on the Govern ment's record to date, its pledge to go all-out to find and punish the assassins must be taken skeptically. The good intentions for even-handed justice of Presideet Jorge Rafael Videla and tha officers of his circle seem
always to be frustrated by military and police officiais utside the ruling junta.
From the first days after the junta overthrew Presiden Isabel Martinez de Peron last Marcb, General Videla
stated policy bas been to confine tbe war against left stated policy bas been to confine tbe war against left-
wing guerrillas to the regular army and police. But an ciltra-rightist paramilitary orgaoization, the Argentin Anti-Communist Alliance, formed with official encourage ment during Mrs. Perón's presidency. continues.to murde and maim aimost anterligence sources.
Tbe leftist guerrillas were first in the field and behaved witb equal brutality. But security forces last mont viped out the leadersaip of the most effective leftis reup, to be gaining steadily agalnst the renegade Peronist lontoneros, despite the murders of a retired general End an auto company executive last week. The rightwing extremists, however, seem to attack with indis crimination and impunity a wide spectrum of liberals
intellectuals and refugees from other countries as wel as Argentine leftists.
Terrorism has claimed nearly 900 lives in Argentina this year, more than 650 of them since the military describes the recent mass murders as "barbaric" attributable "only to the madness of irrational groups." colleagues to action against tbose groups as energeti

## Rescuing Burma

During much of the Vietnam conflict, Burma's Presi dent Ne Win was regarded by many as a wily leader rouble with neighboring China and had preserved his southeast Asian nation from expansion of Chinese support to Communist and other frontier insurrections. As part of this policy, tbe American aid-mission was sent packing economic as weil as military assistance from panese programs that bad their origin in post-World War II reparations.
But political agility proved to be the prologue for conomic disaster. An economy already hogtied by an ideologically rigid system of state control, known as "the Burmese Way to Soc
Output lagged bebind population growth. Inflation ran 30 to 40 percent a year with tax evasion assuring buge hudget deficits. A smuggling trade perbaps half as large as legal commerce fed a black market that became the population's chief supplier of consumer goods. Progress
toward a welfare state, which General Ne Win promised oward a welfare state, wh in General se military dictatorship in 1962, came to a halt
As the Vietnam war wound down after 1970, Burma's president began to seek new foreign aid on a project-by-project basis. But the small
