According to Langdon Unger chairman of the Department of History and Political Science, the
decision not to tenure Stenger was a financial decision and had nothing to do with his ability as a tcacher.
We would not afford to tenure al it's just not defensible" explained.

While Stenger was hired on a tenurc track (mcaning that at the period he would have been eligible period he would have been eligible for tenure consideration), the fact that he was not considered by the university for tenure did not come as any great surprise. Stenger said that two years ago it was decided that the political science department could support the number of majors that it has and the number bf survey classes that it was supposed to offer with that it was supposed to offer with three people because of declining cnrollment in credit enrollment in credit hours. Becausc he had served six of the seven year probationary period seven year probationary period required, at the end of winter the university either had to tenure him, or to fire him, according to Dr. Milton Simmons, vi chancellor of academic affairs.
