# THE COUNTY INSTITUTE.

The Teachers Institute will be held at Marlinton July 24th, 1899, at 10.30 a. m, and will continue 5 days. The attention of teachers is especially called to the following extracts from the School Law, viz:

SECTION 29. Failure to attend the teachers' county Institute where such attendance may be required of teachers holding any grade certificates, unficient by the county beard of examiners, shall be cause for revoking said certificate.

This has reference to certificates already granted by the board of examiners:

SECTION 30.
