Do not allow berries to soak n water because of loss of flavor. Drain. Steralize jars, tops and rubbers. Make a syrup by adding two cups of sugar to four cups of boiling water. Stir until dissolved. Bring to boiling point and allow to simmer three minutes. Cool syrup. Add berries to the cold syrup. Hot syrup causes berries to shrivel. Place the sity this summer.
