Administrator for West Virginia. To the people of West Virginia:

Kindly change the rules given out

by me a short time ago so as to

change breakfast from a wheatless

and a meatless meal to simply a wheatless meal except on Tuesdays. Eliminate the porkless Saturday. Let all the meals on Tuesdays be meatless as far as beef, veal and pork and all cattle and hog products are concerned, but let mutton and lamb be used on that day by anyone so desiring. Let this rule apply to restau rants and hotels as well as to homes. "To the people of West Virginia I extend my most sincere congratulaions on the fact that their cooperaion has been of assistance in making these new directions possible. The Food Administration has saved meat, of that there can be no possible doubt We now desire to give to all our members the benefit of this savifig and to permit them to use meat except in the one instance where restriction is held. SUPPLEMENTAL RULES, REGULATIONS Issued March 7, 1918.

1. If retailer sell whole wheat or graham flour to a customer, he will at same time sell him only six pounds flour. If the sale is to a baker, he need not require him to take any substitutes.

2 Farmer may exchange at the mill wheat of his own growing for flour without buying substitutes under the following conditions:

a. He must agree not to sell the b. He must certify that he raised

the wheat. c. Mills with a capacity of 75 barrels or more per day, may let him Are hogs a paying proposition in have a supply of flour sufficient for his household requirements for the next thirty days. Mills of smaller capacity may furnish him sufficient quantity for his household until the

ext harvest is available. Farmer may buy at mill under the

following conditions. a. He must have substitutes on hand, or must certify that he has

bought them elsewhere. b. He may buy enough for his nousehold requirements for the next thirty days but not over 98 pounds.

3. If retailers sell flour to farmers who have substitutes of their own raising, they must require the far mer to give a written statement to that effect. This statement should be approved by the County Food Administrator before it may be turned over to jobber by retailer to balance another purchase of flour without substitutes.

4. Purchasers of rye flour are not required to buy substitutes with it. Rye flour is not a substitute that can be balanced against a purchase of of wheat flour except that until March 31st bakers may buy it as a substitute at the usual rate of four pounds of wheat flour and one pound of substitute.

5. Until further notice, Tuesday of each week will be the only meatless day and on that day mutton and lamb may be eaten. 6. Be sure to emphasize wheatless

days and wheatless meals. We must go slow on wheat flour.

Victory bread may be eaten on wheatless days provided the consumer use it at all times, but it would be manifestly unfair and unpatriotic to eat straight wheat bread on other days and Victory Bread on wheatless

7. Profits on flour are limited to 75 cents per barrel for jobbers and 80 cents to \$1.20 for retailers.

8. County Food Administrators are advised that all changes in rules and regulations will be announced from this office. Pay no attention to news paper items unless signed by the Federal Food Administration.
