The winters in Montana are long and severe. The temperanowfall. Early in September there was eight inches of snow and two degrees below zero.

The ranchers horses are his most valuable asset. Each farmer has from eight to twenty horses. They are more endurable than the southern horse and "rustle" for their living through the winter time.
